Rebels Defang Bulldogs

The Rivercrest Rebels defeated the Cooper Bulldogs Friday night in Rebel Stadium 20 to 8. The Rebels now have a 1-1 season record, and Rebel fans may be in for one of Rivercrest better seasons in three years.

The Rebels had a near record crowd on hand to help cheer them through four quarters of good hard hitting football. This weeks statistics shows a much improved and more aggressive Rebel team.

The first play of the game found the Rebel blistering the Bulldogs on the kickoff. Ronnie Rape kicked off to the Bulldogs Danny Hagan who fumbled the ball to Rodney Birchfield. A series of four plays put six points on the score board with a pass from Kip Stansell to to Nickey Brown. The extra point was missed and the Rebels kicked off to the Bulldogs, who could not move the ball against the Rebel Line.

The Bulldogs got off a bad punt that was taken by Jimmy Forsyth and returned four yards. Todd Wright and Ronnie Rape picked up a first down with short gainers up the middle of the field.

With a Rebel first down on the Bulldogs 34 yard line the ball was fumbled and recovered by Cooper, but the Bulldogs were unable to move the ball.

The Cooper quarterback slipped and fell on the first play, losing two yards. Danny Hagan tried left end and was greeted by a teeth rattling tackle by Todd Wright for no gain. On third down Terry Williams and Joe Rhoades pressured Randy Reynolds into an incomplete pass.

The Rebels started their third series of plays on the 24 yard line and had four excellent runs.

Wright's run was wiped out with a penalty. Stansell ripped off 16 yards over left end to the 41. Milton Scales found the right side of the Bulldogs line sleeping and picked up another 11 yards to the Cooper 49. Rape took a pitch out from Stansell for a quick five yards.

The Bulldogs stopped the Rebels drive when Stansell fumbled the ball on the 41 yard line. Three plays netted the Bulldogs only six yards with Rickey Franks and Joe Rhodes staying on top of each play. Tim Lowery on fourth down punted for 43 yards giving the Rebels the ball on their own 18 yard line.

The quarter ended with a series of three plays that netted the Rebels 16 yards and a first down. Ronnie Rape got off one of his best runs of the evening for 13 yards around right end. After two plays that lost the Rebels four yards, Stansell tossed Nickey Brown a nineteen yarder that set the ball on the Cooper 25. Three plays later, with the ball on the nine, Rape was jarred loose from the ball to stop the threat.

The Bulldogs managed to pick up 18 yards and a first down before they were forced to kick from their own 25. Another good 31 yard kick from Lowery put the ball on the Rebels 44.

Three plays and a penalty forced the Rebels to punt. Rape got his toe into one for 35 yards. Coopers next drive was short lived and they were forced to punt, giving the Rebels the ball on the Cooper 47 yard line. Stansell put the ball up and Coopers 85, Kevin Walker snagged it on the 30 for a 20 yard return. Here Cooper mounted their only good drive of the half. Rivercrest got a 15 yard penalty for a personal foul and Cooper had a nine and a six yard gain wiped out by a 15 yard penalty. The ball was turned over to the Rebels on the 25 yard line after two incomplete passes.

With only 18 seconds left in the half Wright found a hole in the center of Cooper's line, where he picked up another seven yards before the horn sounded ending the half.

Coach Milford Groves and his staff made good use of the half time break to make adjustments and send the

Rivercrest Rebels back on the field all fired up and with a victory in sight.

Rape took the kickoff on the Rivercrest 25 and returned it to the 33 where he took the first play over right guard for seven yards. Wright punched out three yards for the first down. The drive sagged and the Rebels punted to Cooper's five yard line where they made

Bulldogs fumble, thus denying possession.

After two penalties the ball wound up on the Cooper eight yard line. Stansell took the snap from center and followed Wright for eight yards and six points. The try for extra point was a pass play from Stansell to Rape for two points.

The kickoff found the

Bulldogs in good field position on the 33 yard line. Cooper's first play was down the line by Danny Hagan who was greeted by a jarring tackle by Jace Jeffery. Mankins and Williams joined to limit the Bulldog's next two plays to one yard each, and they were forced to punt.

County Ranch Qualifies For Land Heritage Program

AUSTIN—The Red River County Alma Pace Ranch, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Harold S. Wallace, Clarksville, has qualified for the 1976 Texas Family Land Heritage Program, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

"In this, our third year's search for century farms and ranches, we have qualified 160 properties, putting us over 1,000 mark in total registrations since the Program first began," Commissioner White said.

Plans are now underway for a special honors day presentation at the State Fair in Dallas, October 8, when Commissioner White will present honorees with certificates commemorating their participation in the Program.

Information concerning each farm and ranch will also be included in the Texas Family Land Heritage Registry Vol. III, which will be published in early 1977.

Commissioner White instituted the Heritage Program in 1974 as a means of honoring those farms and ranches in the state which have seen continuous, productive operation at the hands of one family for 100 years or more.

Since its inception, the Heritage Program has received national attention from the American Association for State and Local History as well as the praise of state and local historical groups and people.

Lands and their owners included among the honorees span the spectrum of

agricultural endeavor, White explained.

"Some are the result of mammoth Spanish Land Grants, passed from the 18th Century by their original holders through succeeding generations, while others are lands now farmed by descendants of slaves freed at the end of the Civil War," he said.

"Participation in the Land Heritage Program has been one of the most rewarding experiences in my tenure as agriculture commissioner," White added.

"The contributions of these families in maintaining productivity throughout the years are monumental and we, as modern Texans, owe them a special debt of gratitude," he concluded.

Red River County Fair Begins September 21

Red River County's 21st annual Fair begins its 1976 run next week with more than double the previous exhibit space, thanks to a new building completed during the year. Official dates for the event are Tuesday, September 21, through Saturday night, September 25, with the big parade scheduled for Wednesday afternoon. Bob Moody is Fair chairman.

The Citizens Shows of Hugo, traditional carnival attractions for the Red River County Fair, will open early in the week with a full yard of rides, booths, games, and concession stands.

The new Exhibits Building, under the supervision of Mrs. Dianah Zehetner and Mrs. Beth Dannheim, will house clothing, textiles, foods, crafts, and the art shows. Check-in time will be Tuesday, from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., with judging for cash awards and ribbons being held Wednesday morning. The building and exhibits will be open to the public beginning at 1 p.m. on Wednesday through Saturday evening. Check-out time this year, previously late Saturday night, has been changed to 3 to 4 p.m. on Sunday afternoon when there is less traffic congestion at the building.

A considerable portion of the Exhibits Buildings and some of the Livestock Barn will be devoted to commercial exhibits. Those wishing space are asked to contact A. J. (Drew) Bell, chairman.

The old Exhibits Building, supervised by Ms. Wilma Hall, will contain the expanded horticulture section and educational booths. Check-in time is also Tuesday 1 to 6 p.m., with judging Wednesday morning and open to the public at 1 p.m. the same day. Prizes will be given in all categories.

Those planning to enter may call the County Extension office, 7-2493, or the division chairmen for further details.

Parade chairman James Paul Harvey has announced that the parade will form in a new location east of the Fairgrounds, across the creek, on Legion ground just west of the partially-completed new Missionary Baptist Church. Everyone is invited to participate and is asked to report as near 4:30 as possible as the group will leave the area promptly at 5 p.m. A highlight of the event this year will be a wagon train of more than a half-dozen authentic wagons sponsored by local individuals.

The parade will proceed east on U.S. Highway 82, arriving at the square about 5:15 p.m. At the First National Bank corner the group will turn north, then east at the Red River Bank corner, and will leave down East Broadway. The parade

will thus move along the south, west, and north sides of the square, but not the east.

Paul Hamilton is in charge of nightly entertainment in the band stand area, beginning about 7:30 p.m. Square dance groups will perform Tuesday night and outstanding bands and vocalists in the country and western and blue grass musical fields will entertain on other nights through Saturday. Some bleacher space will be available for seating or spectators are invited to bring folding chairs for their comfort.

The Livestock Barn this year will contain commercial beef animals, halter cattle, poultry, rabbits, agricultural products, and a special new area. A section will be set aside as a barnyard tended by FFA and 4-H youth directed by Raymond Zuehlke. It will contain domestic animals and poultry in a barnyard atmosphere. Youngsters will be invited to tour the area and pet the animals. The barn will also contain some commercial exhibits.

Livestock and poultry will be checked in from 1 to 6 p.m. on Wednesday, and all agricultural entries must be in a day earlier, from 1 to 6 p.m. on Tuesday. Agricultural products will be judged Thursday morning for ribbons and prizes.

The public is invited for poultry and livestock judging beginning at 1 p.m. on Friday afternoon.

Concession stands this year will be in the tennis court area.

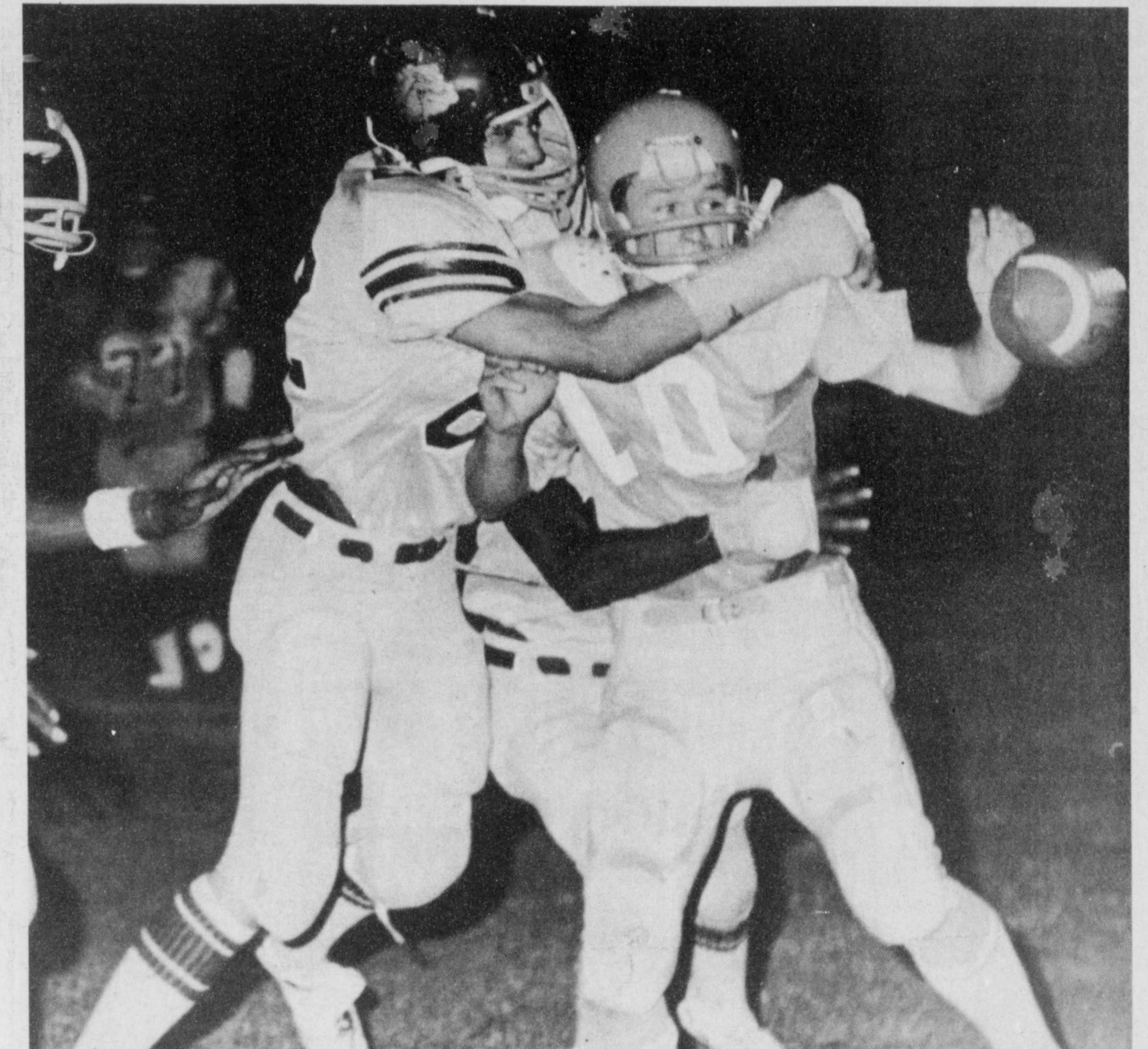
Rebel Balance Makes Difference

Continental Files For Rate Increase

Dallas—September 10, 1976—Continental Telephone Company of Texas today filed for a rate increase of approximately \$5.2 million with the Public Utility Commission of Texas according to James F. Miles, President.

"We're taking this action today because of our service improvement program, inflation, competition in the capital market, and increasing operating expenses," Miles noted.

"For years, we have used a variety of methods to keep earnings stable. These have included tighter operating

controls, greater sales efforts and programs to increase efficiency by adopting new time and money saving technology wherever possible. We have also, for the past three years, conducted an aggressive rate adjustment program. However, despite these efforts, present earnings are not sufficient to cover the costs of doing business and attract the necessary investor capital," he added.

Since 1971, Continental has invested over \$78,000,000 in construction expenditures to meet service needs of its customers. Total investment in Texas is in excess of \$109,000,000.

"From 1976 to 1978, for example, we will be investing approximately another \$60,000,000 in planned service improvement and expansion projects," added Miles.

Of the total amount requested, approximately \$2.4 million will be paid directly to the Federal Government in the form of income taxes and approximately \$100,000 will be paid to the State of Texas for gross receipts tax. The balance will be used to continue to upgrade the quality of service, meet the demands of additional improvements necessary to keep pace with the growth in all serving areas and to cover the cost of capital.

The increase for individual customers will vary according to the location and type and class of service in the residence or business.

"Utilities must maintain a financially sound position. Those that do not deal effectively with their financial needs will cease to be of service to the investors, to employees, or their customers. Continental Telephone Company of Texas must maintain a healthy financial position in order to meet our obligation to our customers. This rate is a major part of that effort, Miles concluded.

School Board Meeting Brief

In major action taken, Red Ball Termite Company of Paris was awarded a contract for termite control at the Rivercrest building with the superintendent being authorized to negotiate with the company for their services on the Bogata and Talco campuses if needed. The firm of McClanahan & Holmes of Paris was approved as school auditors for the year. In final action, approval was given for the school district to take part in a State Dental Care Program for students who can qualify by family income and the various financial reports were approved.

Stocker-Calf Operators Facing Hard Winter

Red River Valley producers are looking at a cloudy picture for winter pastures and stocker-calf operations, according to Dr. James T. Long, Area Economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Long states that a good producer buying 34c calves and stocking 1.75 head per acre can expect his cost of production to remain at \$.34 if he gains 500 pounds per acre and his death loss is two percent. A gain of 285 pounds per head would result in sale weights of 685 pound feeders.

To make a profit, prices next spring would have to exceed \$.34 a pound. Even with a price \$.38, producers could have a net return of only \$19.02 per acre. For better producers, in-

creased stocking rates could increase gain per acre to 572 pounds per acre. This would lower production cost to \$.32 a pound and with the increased production per acre, \$.38 calves would result in a profit of \$.34.32 per acre.

Even this exceptionally good management results in such low profit potential that local producers should do some careful and cautious cost projecting. Keep in mind that any price decline or weather conditions reducing rate of gain could be disastrous.

Long lists the following suggestions:

1. Highly fertilized, well managed production pastures are essential. Heavy seeding rates and planting by the middle of September is important for fall grazing.

2. Stock these pastures heavily for optimum production. A stocking rate of 1.75 head per acre is the minimum most producers should consider.

3. Calf prices in excess of \$.30 per pound reduce potential with current market projections next spring.

4. Buy calves that will be top quality feeders at the end of the winter pasture period. These may or may not be the lowest price calves in the fall. Calves with age and frame, but lacking

finish and weight are preferred.

Some of the better winter pasture observed in the county have been those with a combination of legume, ryegrass and small grain. A thumb rule seeding rate recommendation is 5 pounds of clover such as Yuchi, 20 pounds of ryegrass and 80 to 100 pounds of small grain.

The selection of a small grain is an important one. Many of the oat varieties used in the past have been severely affected by rust and their use is questionable. Elbon and Bonel rye have proven their value throughout East Texas. Blueboy II wheat was the top wheat in forage produced at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Dallas. A relative new variety of Barley, TAMBAR 401 was the top forage producer of all small grain.

If seed harvest is planned after grazing, there are other varieties to be considered that produce higher yields of seed and lower forage.

Yuchi clover is probably the number one clover in the area due to its past performance. It is adapted to all of our soils except poor drainage areas. Adequate seed supplies are available for about \$1.75 per pound.

Cattle Outlook

Ed Uvacek, Jr. Livestock Marketing Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is forecasting a continued weakness in the cattle market for the next two or three months. This pressure on feed beef will come from four main sources: about 10 percent more fed cattle from feedlots; only slightly less non-fed and cow slaughter than the record highs of last fall; and substantially larger pork and broiler productions.

Uvacek anticipates fed cattle prices to move to their lowest level in the October period. Hopefully, by mid-November, slaughter supplies of non-feds and cows will then out enough to allow some market strength.

Feedlot losses are mounting and should substantially reduce the demand for replacement animals. This, together with larger supplies of feeder animals that are still available and only slightly lower feed grain prices, could cause some real pressure on feeder cattle prices this fall, according to the specialist.

The local grant is among 78 approved by Governor Briscoe with Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) funds under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

Tenure Not Related To Social Benefits

Some people who become disabled don't apply for social security disability payments because they think they haven't worked long enough, but they may be wrong, according to Emma H. Ware, social security district manager in Paris, Texas.

"They may be young people who've worked only a few years," Mrs. Ware said. "They may think that a disabled worker needs 5 years or more work covered by social security to be eligible for payments—so they don't apply."

"But under the law, workers disabled before age 31 may need less than 5 years of covered work, in some cases as little as 1½ years," she said. "They should get in touch with a social security office without delay to get information about applying for disability benefits."

Workers disabled at 31 or over generally do need at least 5 years of covered work in the 10 years before they became disabled to be eligible for social security disability benefits, Mrs. Ware noted.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible workers under 65 and their families if the worker is severely disabled and not expected to be able to do any work for a year or more. Payments generally start with the 6th full month of disability.

Disabled people who haven't worked long or recently enough to get social security disability benefits may be eligible for supplemental security income (SSI) payments. The SSI program, administered by social security, makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are disabled or blind or 65 or over.

"People can get more information about the social security disability program and the SSI program by calling or writing any social security office," Mrs. Ware said. The

Texas Baptists Launch Voter Registration Drive

Texas Baptists have launched a major effort to have all 2 million of their members register to vote in the November 2 general election. The drive is being spearheaded by the Texas Baptist Christian Life Commission, which is enlisting the support of pastors, educational directors, and leaders of other key groups affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

"This is probably the most intense voter registration effort that Texas Baptists have ever entered into," said Phil Strickland, the commission's associate director.

The commission is urging each of the state's 4,000 Southern Baptist churches to designate its own deputy voter registrar to register voters prior to the October 2 registration deadline. "The thing that protects us from the kinds of tragedies the

American government has experienced in recent years is the involvement of responsible people who care," Strickland said. "If we really want a better life for our children, a beginning point for that is being a part of the decision-making process."

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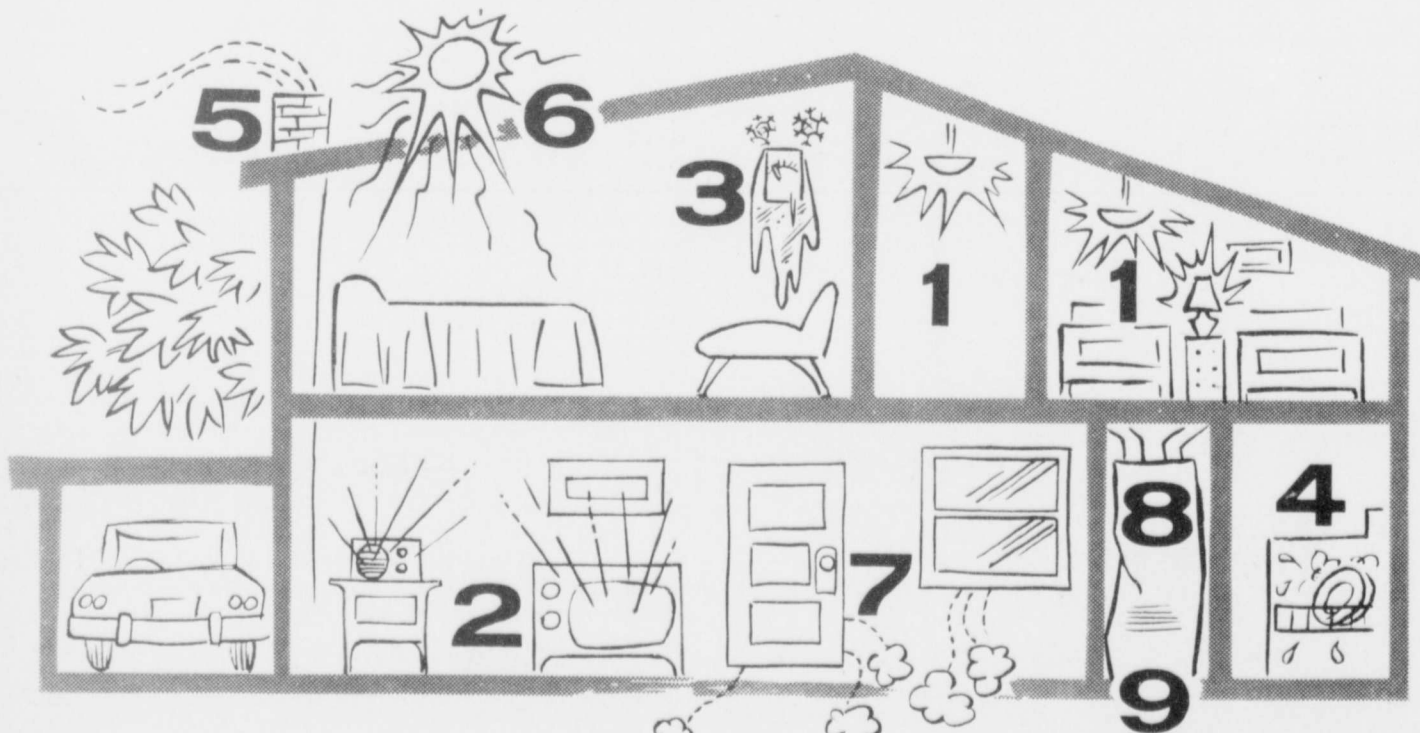

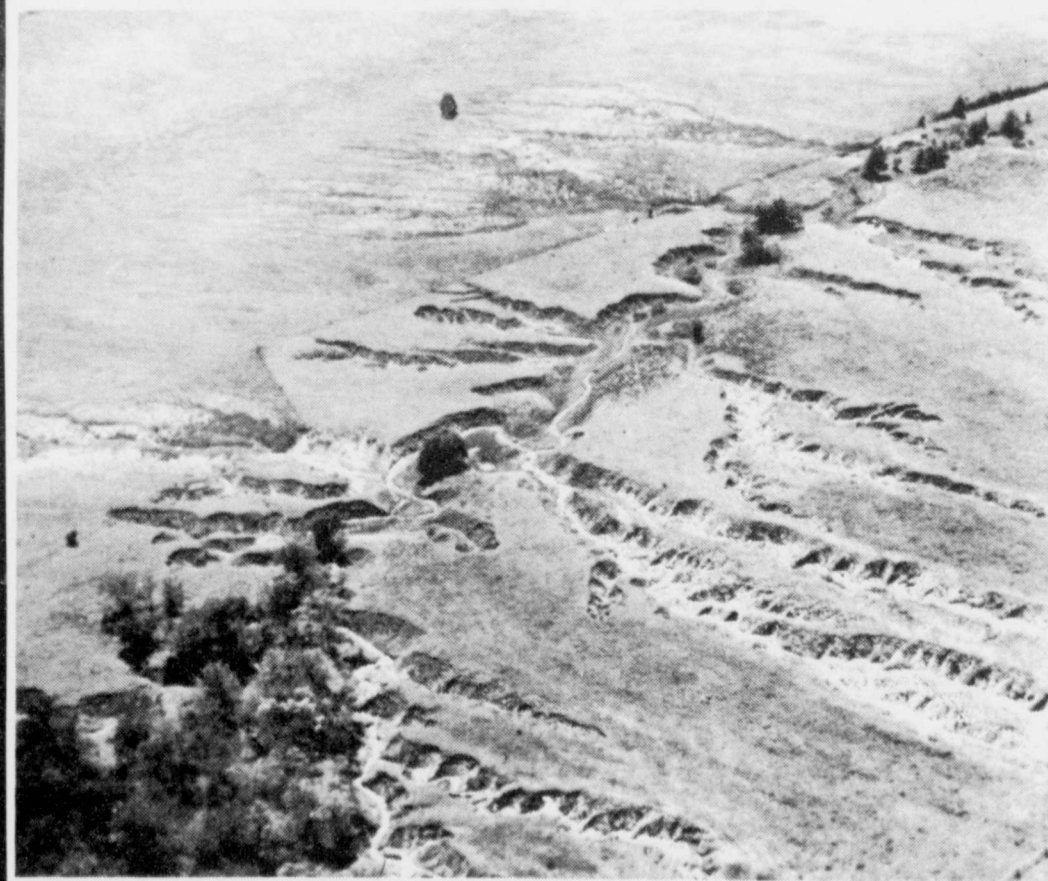

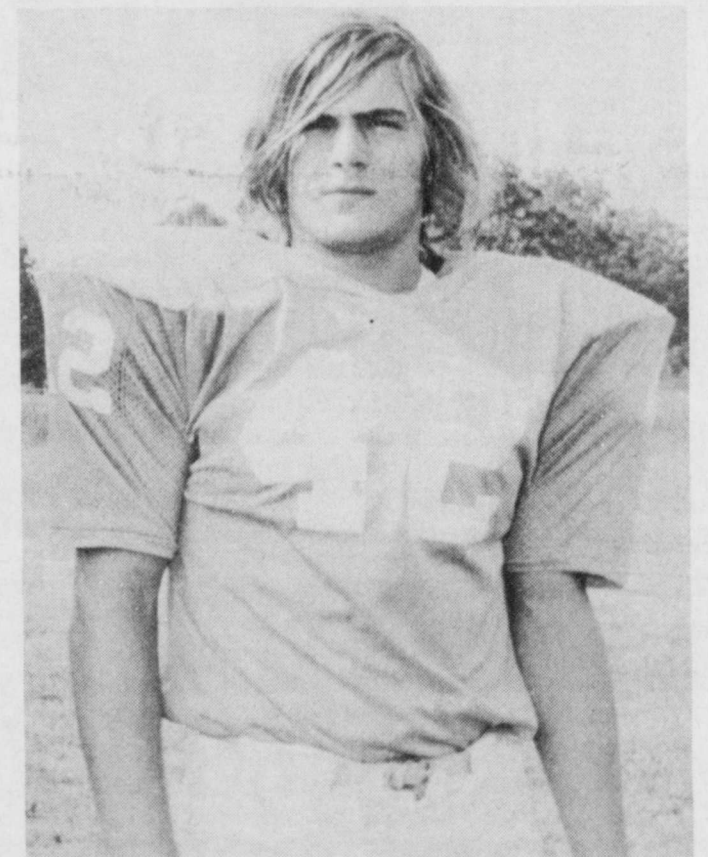

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d, and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."
