Morgan Accepts Eldorado Position

CHS head coach Truman Nix expressed his regrets at losing Morgan from the coaching staff. "He (Morgan) is the best assistant coach I've ever had in 17 years of coaching," Nix said.

Nix explained that Morgan's acceptance for the new job was "a compliment to the staff and myself."

Morgan will be hired later, according to Nix.

Morgan came to Colorado City from the coaching staff at Packard High School in El Paso. He had formerly been on Nix's staff at Wink.

Morgan's wife, Beita, and their two sons, first graders Charles and Davis, four, will remain in Colorado City until the end of the school term.

The family resides at 1137 Walnut and both Morgan and his wife are Sunday School teachers at the First Christian Church.

In addition to his coaching duties, Morgan also teaches four classes of biology at CHS.

CHS Wolf Band Gets UIL Honors

Colorado High School Wolf Band won creditable honors Saturday for their performance in the University Interscholastic League band contest held all day in Sweetwater.

Wolf Band was rated by all three judges with a 1, highest grade given, in concert. All three judges gave Colorado High musicians the "solid 1" rating in concert. Hamilton high was the only other band in Region 6 to be graded with 1 from the trio of judges.

In marching, Wolf Band was rated 2 and received another 2 in sight-reading. Winters band and the band from Hamilton were the only bands in this region rating "the solid 1" in sight-reading. Colorado High competes in the AA class.

No ratings of 1 were awarded by judges in the marching contest. Crane High School and Colorado High were the only two bands rating the 2. Grades ranged in all contests 1.2.3, down to 4.

About 1,400 students in class B, A, and AA competed in the UIL band contest. Ninety-six members of the Wolf Band, out of the 112 members, and their mentor Dwight Tomb made the trip to Sweetwater.

Thursday of next week Wolf Band, their director Mr. Tomb and assistant director Bob Newman, will leave for Corpus Christi where they will take part in the famous Buceaneer Music Festival.

About 30,000 musicians will converge in Corpus Christi for the Festival. Colorado High musicians are scheduled to play Friday, April 29, and will leave for home Saturday, April 30.

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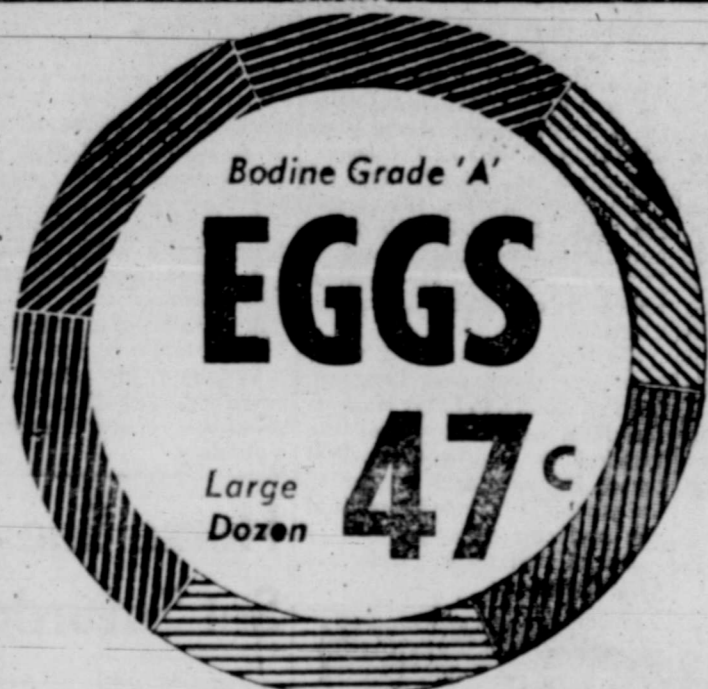

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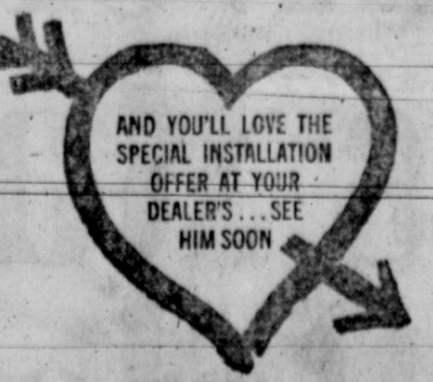
