The Result of the Steady State Key Mission.

The results of the winter's labors in the Steady State Key Mission, as far as the time permits an estimate of them, may be briefly summed up as follows: A new and unprecedented interest in the concerns of the soul with the people has been awakened. Hundreds of converts have been made to the Gospel, prayer, and have been earnest hearers. The Steady State Key Mission has been successful in its mission. Clergy-men of various denominations, who too generally running only in parallel lines, if not indeed, in collision, have prayed and walked together, divine truth, in sermon and hymn, has been sent down into the hearts of the people, and the men and women claiming to be religious have had their souls, as they affirm, wonderfully stimulated, and their benevolent activities increased. Systematic efforts for the ignorant and neglected have been organized and provided for. Many thousands of such persons as "Join the church" here in New York in two and three at quarterly intervals in our churches have, according to their respective methods, been received into the churches in some instances as many as a hundred at a time. And all this has been done without making any new party, setting up any new sect, proclaiming any novel and distracting "ism," but by the earnest, forcible presentation of what among us is called "the old Gospel," to the people, "in their own tongue in which they were born."

Man ask "will this last?" Will what last? The Steady State Key Mission, the religious fervor! Did the Steady State Key Mission last? The effects of it did. The "fruit remained." Did the soul, personal power, and heroic courage of the reformers last? The effects did, and they would have been more prominent and extensive as far as we can see, but for the unbelief, selfishness, and cowardice of those who ought to have perpetuated their work. To churches and to communities it is as to individuals—according to their faith so is it unto them.

Latest by Mail.

SEN. BULLER.

NEW YORK, August 17.—General Buller was invited to address a public meeting under the auspices of the Legal Tender Club, of this city. Other engagements making it impossible for him to be present, the General writes:

"I am unable to comprehend, appreciate, and much less admire that system of government finance which has wrought upon the business and production of the country that over two millions of working men and women, who desire productive employment, have not had it for the last two years, and by which production which they would have added to the wealth of the country during that time is lost. Assuming that each of that number, skilled and unskilled, could have averaged two dollars per day for working days of the past year, then we would have lost one billion two hundred millions, or about equal to half of the national debt, by their enforced idleness, to say nothing of the loss of the morale of workingmen and women. How long men in active business and property holders, and holders of those kinds of property which are open to the tax gatherer, will permit a system of financial administration to go on by which their property shall be depreciated in value; while owners of other property, such as mortgages and bonds, which are not affected because not open to the tax gatherer, have their property appreciated and escape taxation, is a problem which the good sense of the people of this country will solve in the coming Presidential election."

SEARCHING FOR DONALDSON.

CHICAGO, August 18.—A Journal special from Whitehall, Mich., says arrangements have been made for the disinterment of Grimwood's body and for forwarding it to Chicago, so that it will arrive to-morrow morning. The notes and papers will also be sent for publication.

Towns along the east shore of the lake are much interested in the matter, and are sending out parties to search for Donaldson's body, which, it is expected, will drift ashore near the point where Grimwood's body was found. A flotilla of boats to have been sent off the shore north of this place, and other reports are current that the balloon has been seen in the lake, but they are doubtless without foundation.

NASHVILLE, August 18.—At 9 o'clock to-night, Governor Porter appointed Chancellor D. M. Key, of Chattanooga, as successor to Andrew Johnson in the United States Senate.

LOUISVILLE, August 18.—Reports in regard to supplying the Tennessee vacancy in the United States Senate will now terminate, as Governor Porter, in response to a message from East Tennessee, has appointed D. M. Key to succeed ex-President Johnson. The Governor's Journal's Nashville special says Mr. Key is not a great man in Tennessee politics. He is a man of forty-five, of decided talent, diligent, reticent, and very popular in our section, but is not generally known throughout the State.

THE UNION LEAGUE.

WASHINGTON, August 18.—A meeting of the National Executive Committee of the Union League of America will be held at

the Continental Hotel, Philadelphia, on Thursday, August 26, at 1 o'clock. The notice says that it is very important that all members attend there in person or substitute.

THE NEW YORK REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION will meet at Saratoga Springs on the 8th day of September next. It will be composed of 423 members, of which New York city will have 50, Brooklyn 31, Buffalo 15, Albany 13. It will be seen that New York and Brooklyn combined, have less than one-fourth of the delegates, and that the aggregate of the four largest cities does not much exceed one-fourth. The rural districts then will control the body, and the presumption is, a very fair convention and a very good ticket, will be the results. We want New York to be speaking strongly and properly this year.

Our City's Prosperity.

The child, constantly under the eye of the parent, grows from infancy to manhood without its growth being noticed. The food mother knows, every few months, from the necessity of enlarging his garments, that her little boy has grown but he looks just the same to her as he did months before.

Our old city grows continually, her population increases, her wealth accumulates, and her borders grow wider every month. The growth is slow, steady, and natural, but to the old residents, who never leave its precincts, the city seems to stand still, and the changes have been so gradual, which have taken place about them that they see no improvement, and imagine that it is all as it was years ago.

San Antonio is certainly the most remarkable town of its size in America, considering its locality, its frontier position, lack of railroad facilities or navigation, but containing within itself all the elements of the most civilized community in the world. Its merchant princes have sent the prairie schooner in all directions, hundreds and hundreds of miles, and brought back the wealth of distant peoples. And out of the richness of this wilderness has sprung millions of wealth, and San Antonio, like a Queen sitting upon the throne of the West, has received the offerings of all this region. No wonder we have grown where we had so much room to grow in.

There have been years when San Antonio was dull and the itinerant merchant folded his tent and slipped away to other regions. Go to any old merchant and he will be able to show a chart of his voyage for the past twenty-five years and it will be marked by calm, gentle winds, brisk gales, and lively times. During the confederacy, there was a certain moribund prosperity that excelled anything since that time. The restoration of the Union brought with the army flush times, and from '67 to '73 San Antonio was particularly brisk, our people had plenty of money and spent it freely, they drank costly wines and dined sumptuously, and now and then when we come across some noble wreck who travels about on his gaudy legs, we can with certainty point to the date and the coast upon which he was cast away; where the beds and walks of the private grounds or a gentleman are bordered with inverted champagne bottles you can trace the convivial days of '67, '68, '69, '70, '71, '72 to the graceful curves of his flower plots.

Then came the sober days, when the military thinned out, and railroads encroached upon our commerce, and last but not least came the reign of Coke, when all our brilliant hopes of railroad facilities, were dashed rudely to the ground, and San Antonio took a back seat. We were laughed at and ridiculed, and it was predicted that Austin, or Seguin would do our trade for us, and we might as well close up our shops. The year 1874 was the darkest San Antonio ever experienced since 1848, except the times immediately preceding the war. Our dullness touched bottom in 1874. In July, one year ago, the City Assessor found two hundred and sixty-four vacant dwellings in the city, and buildings formerly used as stores, stood vacant for months. This July past there were not a dozen vacant houses in the city. This single fact speaks volumes.

Having no means of ascertaining the building statistics, as the city authorities are remiss in this particular, we can only guess at the growth of the city, during the past year several fine private residences have been built, and at the present writing at least one hundred new buildings are in process of erection and completion. If we had a railroad the buildings would spring up like magic, when at present they grow up simply from necessity. The price of city property and of outside lands has advanced, and the steady stream of travelers seeking our city and nation, proves that San Antonio is improving in business, increasing in size, and advancing along the broad highway of prosperity.

MARKET.

LONG STARS VS. BEARS.

The match game between the Lone Star and Bear base ball clubs, both of this city, which was played on the grounds of the former yesterday, resulted in a decided victory for the Stars by a score of 19 to 12.

The Bears are a new club, and this is

their first match game, while the Stars have been practicing several months, and have played a number of match games without defeat. The Bears are cast down for the time being, but will hold their own eventually. They need practice badly, and should use a little more judgment in the selection of their first nine. Had Rhodes, Lindheimer, Prosser and McAllister played yesterday the score would not have shown such a wide difference. The club however worked hard, but without avail.

Since the departure of six of the Lone Star's first nine, to form the Milan club, the Stars have been a little down in the mouth, but their game yesterday proved that they have good material yet, and we expect to see them contend successfully with other clubs ere long. Several of their men made long field hits, and the fielding was not far behind their batting.

Karl proffers well as a pitcher and by continued practice, will toss a swift ball. Spahn and T. Dunbar are good anywhere. Bismout fairly out done himself in the field, catching a number of fly balls. Mitchell is a heavy batter, and plays well on third. E. Dugher, Bergeret, and Holligan are all new men, but played excellently. Richter, as short stop and change catcher, will make a fine player with practice. He made few errors yesterday and fielded his station well.

Of the Bears, James leads for surety, taking in a number of fly balls and striking heavily. Beckmann and Bauer pitch well, but not swift enough. They need practice. Sager is good as catcher, except that he uses his feet too much, while his hands should do the work. Schutze, Dreiss and Johnson played well, while Moye and Kellner were not far behind. The Bears, playing only on Sunday, cannot compete with clubs that play nearly every day, but with a fair practice they will make hard work for some of our base ballists.
