PORTUGUESE CLERKS JOIN STRIKERS HOUSTON PEOPLE VOTED BOND ISSUE

Antonio Almeida, Minister of the Interior, quits because of his failure to end the strike.

Lubbock, Jan. 19.—Antonio Almeida, minister of the interior, resigned Wednesday night, following an unusual incident which he made during the day to secure the withdrawal of the railroad strikers. The strike movement has been on foot for several months, and the government has been endeavoring to arrange a plan for meeting such a demand. The strike of the railroad men was followed by a strike of the state clerks, who quit work on the ground that the authorities had failed to issue about \$100,000 in salaries for an appropriation of their funds of \$200,000. Almeida was reported to have been in the city for several days, but he failed to secure the withdrawal of the strikers.

Houston, Jan. 19.—Voting on the bond issue for deepening Buffalo Bayou and \$250,000 to build Viaduct at Foot of Main Street.

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The railroad men are reported to have been in the city for several days, but he failed to secure the withdrawal of the strikers.

The other bond issue of \$200,000 was voted for the purpose of building a viaduct across the bayou in the foot of Main street, connecting that thoroughfare with Magnolia street in the Fifth ward and meeting the streets of Adams and Houston in the Sixth ward. The vote in the city was 1,000 for the bond issue and 1,000 against it.

Charters Filed.
Austin, Jan. 19.—The Secretary of the State has received the following charters for incorporation:

It was early apparent that the viaduct bond issue had overwhelmingly carried, being a city proposition. It was expected that some of the outgoing precincts would be divided on the deep water bond issue and returns received from several of the precincts in the northern and western voting blocks, parts of the precincts indicated that there was some opposition to the deep water project. The vote in the city and precincts along the bayou and bay, however, guaranteed that the deep water bond issue was authorized by a majority of not less than 5 to 1.

Large Acreage in Potatoes.
Wharton, Jan. 19.—A Lincoln, whose farm is located near Wharton, expects to plant 200 acres in Irish potatoes, 75 to 100 to 400 to 500. Last year Mr. Lincoln planted 10 acres in Irish and 100 acres in Irish potatoes, and he gathered 300 crates of Irish and about 100 bushels of potatoes in his acres. The fine soil of Wharton county, where the potatoes are grown, will make it an excellent section in which to engage in general diversified farming.

Gusher Near Wichita Falls.
Wichita Falls, Tex.—An oil gusher has been brought in at a depth of 1,500 feet in the Electric field, twenty-six miles west of Wichita Falls. The well is known as Wagoner No. 5 and spouted sixty feet high. It was immediately cut off into a storage tank, and is producing an estimate of 1,500 barrels per day.

Hogs Better Than Cotton.
Brenham, Tex.—Mr. E. H. Frank of Washington county owns and operates one of the largest hog ranches in the state. He has already 300 acres in his hog pasture and will at an early date enlarge it. In season Mr. Frank ships hogs in carload lots and he finds the raising of these animals vastly more remunerative than the planting of cotton.

Hearne Cattle Shipments.
Hearne, Tex.—Three carloads of fat cattle were shipped this week to St. Louis. About 800 head have been on feed in the pens on the north side of town during the past three months, and another party has 200 head in feeding in the city pens south of town.

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MEXICANS FIGHT ON BORDER

MORE THAN TWENTY KILLED IN FIERCE BATTLE.

Eighteen Insurgents Held at Bay Seventy Rurales and Seventy Infantry Soldiers.

Comstock, Texas.—More than twenty men were killed in a desperate battle between the Mexican federal soldiers and a small party of revolutionists on the bank of the Rio Grande, opposite Comstock Thursday. The insurgents had only eighty men and for three hours they held at bay seventy rurales and seventy infantry soldiers. When darkness ended the battle the insurgents held the field and the federal troops withdrew a couple of miles and camped. The revolutionists left a couple of hours later for their mountain headquarters, fifty miles away, carrying their wounded with them. Of the eighteen insurgents two were killed and seven wounded. E. S. O'Reilly, an Associated Press correspondent with the insurgents, received a slight wound in the thigh. The determined stand of the handful of insurgents has never been equaled in border warfare. Twice the rurales charged the insurgents' position, only to come within fifty yards, but each time they were repulsed. Eighteen soldiers were carried from the field during the battle.

The arrival of twenty more insurgents in the last few minutes of the fight saved the defenders and prevented what would probably have been a massacre of the little band. The original party of insurgents numbered forty men. They had been on a raid through the district south of Las Vegas, securing horses and recruits. For two days a party of seventy rurales had chased the band of insurgents and the night of the 10th the rurales made their way to the river to wait their fated hour and rest, thinking that they had eluded the government forces.

The next morning twenty of the band started for a ranch sixty miles away in order to secure a fresh supply of horses. The camp of the revolutionists was discovered and a company of seventy rurales was mounted and sent to the support of the squadron of rurales. When they approached the camp of the insurgents' preparations were made to give them a hot reception. Only twenty men were in the camp at the time and two of these were set at work packing extra ammunition and rifles on mule back.

The eighteen remaining insurgents took position in a line across the trail of the advancing rurales. The firing commenced at a distance of about fifty yards. The insurgents poured volley after volley from their revolvers and shot into the ranks of the rurales. The rurales replied with the Mauser carbines and the battle started like a roll from a snare drum.

After half an hour's continuous firing the rurales received reinforcement from their main body and a charge was made on the insurgents. As they advanced the defenders of the position fired a storm of bullets into their ranks, firing slowly and making every shot count. The rurales withdrew a short distance and then returned to their original position.

The firing continued and one by one the band of insurgents dropped from the ranks either dead or wounded until only nine men remained working their guns. Again the rurales charged and this time they were within fifty yards of the body when the insurgents were concealed. Not a man gave way, but continued firing directly until the rurales again retreated. Both in the charge and retreat the rurales kept their line in good order and showed no panic.

Forty Perish in Hurricane.

Victoria, B. C.—Sixty-seven pearling vessels were wrecked and forty lives were lost as a result of a hurricane off Western Australia in December, according to advices brought by the steamer *Mauret* Wednesday. Hroome, headmaster of the pearling fleet in a series of disastrous many buildings having been destroyed by the storm.

Sale of Black Ranch.

San Antonio, Tex.—Negotiations were completed for the sale of the Black ranch, in La Salle County. The consideration was \$100,000. The ranch consists of 25,000 acres and lies along the Nueces River. It is now being divided for irrigation. The ranch is owned by Colonel J. K. Black, a pioneer settler of that section.

Admit New Bank.

Austin, Tex.—The state department of banking and insurance Tuesday admitted to the state banking system the Centerville State Bank, subject to the verification of the state bank examiner. This bank adopted the guaranty fund plan for the guarantee of deposits.

Naval Officer Dead.

Washington.—Commander John F. Luby of the protected cruiser *Des Moines* died on board that vessel Jan. 8 in the vicinity of Cape Verde Islands. The navy department was advised of his death in a dispatch received Wednesday from the executive officer of the *Des Moines*.

Burns Were Fatal.

Johnson City, Tex.—Mrs. George Holden, who was seriously burned a few days ago, died Tuesday from the effects.

TO ORGANIZE GIRLS' TOMATO CLUBS

Work on Similar Plan of Boys' Corn Clubs—Federal Department of Agriculture Behind Movement.

Washington.—The department of agriculture announces a plan to interest girls in the details of truck gardening as it has interested the boys of the farms in improved corn growing. The plan is to begin by encouraging girls through contests similar to the corn growing contests for boys, to raise tomatoes.

The method is the same that has been pursued with the boys. The girls are to be taught the principles of seed selection and then encouraged to use seed. The result was fine in the two counties where the experiment was first tried, and the girls raised from two to four times the average crop of the locality.

They were taught, too, how the roots of the tomatoes developed and what sort of cultivation they needed and when. Doing the work in the right way took more attention and intelligent effort, but little more actual labor, than the old "hit and miss" method.

One of the first experiments was made near Asheville, N. C. Many of the girls made enough pin money to convince themselves there was a good business in raising tomatoes and raising them. Their elders also saw that the home garden that could be set on the hill and still raise twice as much stuff as before, if it were worked in the proper way.

The work has spread now so that next season in all probability there will be a general competition and the girls' tomato clubs will rank with the boys' corn clubs as object lessons to the "house" farmer, showing that his land and soil will do for him with proper attention. It is all working to the end aimed at by Secretary Wilson—increasing the value of the southern acreage, in speaking of the work he said:

Let us show the world what land in the South can really do and its value will raise in the market. There will be a rack of people to get hold of land that is now lying idle.

SKILLED COMPUTER IN PEARY'S FAVOR

Says His Data Couldn't Be Faked. Virtually Reached the North Pole.

Washington.—The house committee of naval affairs completed their examination of Captain Robert E. Peary Wednesday on his claim to attainment of the north pole and Hugh C. Mitchell, a skilled computer of the coast and conduct officer, testified that he handled Peary's observations.

Peary was subjected to searching examination by Representative Major of Arkansas during the hearing Wednesday. Mr. Major pursued his inquiry along lines intended to bring out the length of the naval officer's service in the navy, what he accomplished by his Arctic explorations and his contributions to the knowledge of Arctic currents and icebergs. Captain Peary detailed incidents and hardships attending his last dash for the north pole.

Statewide Campaign Committee Active.

Houston, Tex.—With the election of Tom C. Swope of Houston as secretary of the campaign committee of the statewide prohibitionists, the party will begin to roll in earnest on that side of the coming campaign. The pros have secured ample quarters in the Scanlon Building, corner of Main and Preston streets, Houston, and the offices have been furnished and equipped in every way to facilitate the rapid handling of the work. Mrs. Frances McHugh, an office woman of much experience in campaigning, has been installed and Colonel Thomas H. Ball, chairman, will spend much of his time in the office. Secretary Swope has put into the hands of the printers orders for the printing of the platform adopted by the mass convention of prohibitionists at Fort Worth and 100,000 copies of Judge Ponder's speech on "Local Self-Government," it being intended to give these two documents the widest possible circulation. A strenuous appeal is being sent out to all prohibitionists, urging them to pay their poll tax, and for all of the young men and old men to secure their exemption papers.

GOV. CAMPBELL'S FAREWELL MESSAGE

A SUMMARY OF THE DOCUMENT PRESENTED TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE

Statewide Prohibition Now Before the People and Says Should Be Set-Aside at Once—Committees, Etc.

Austin, Tex.—Summary of the message to senate and house: Texas has the lowest tax rate enjoyed by any state in this republic. Factories have multiplied and more miles of railroad have been built during the past four years than during a like period in the last quarter of a century.

The state's bonded indebtedness amounts to \$5,978,190, all of which is owned by the permanent school fund and other permanent funds of the state's educational and charitable institutions. The bank guaranty law, as wisely designed and skillfully framed, has been beneficial to the state banking system and not harmful to the national banks of the state.

On February 6, 1907, there were 182 state banks and bank and trust companies, with total resources of \$25,724,841, and on November 10, 1910, there were 212 state banks and bank and trust companies, with total resources of \$38,052,755.

The life insurance laws as enacted and amended compare favorably with the best legislation on this subject to be found in any state of the union. The fire insurance laws, if properly enforced, will reduce the cost of insurance to the insured public, and reduce to a minimum the tremendous fire waste heretofore suffered.

Laws securing the rendition and assessment of intangible values of railroads of the state for taxation have been improved. The state's tax rate has been reduced during the past four years from 25 cents to 4 cents on the \$100. The state school tax rate has been reduced from 18 cents to 12 cents and the state ad valorem tax has been reduced from 20 cents to 4 cents on the \$100 valuation.

The total assessed valuations of the state in 1906 were \$221,259,809 and in 1910 were \$2,384,909,124. The state's revenue from the sale of land has been reduced from 20 cents to 4 cents on the \$100 valuation. One of the most gratifying of all the achievements of legislation during the past four years has been the recognition of the voter, says the governor. The cause of education has been strengthened, a new impetus has been given and conditions throughout the state have improved. Distribution of state's available money fund has increased from \$1,319,320 in 1906 to \$2,232,745 in 1910.

Passage of bill known as the International Great Northern bill for the purpose of securing a direct route for railroads. Strongly recommends the retention of this law and opposes "quag" amendments. During the past four years there were two regular sessions and five special sessions of the legislature. The present session would come from the general revenue, and that it remain, free and depend alone on Texas manhood. Recommends separation of the university and the agricultural and mechanical college. Suggests constitutional amendment be submitted to the voters.

LEGISLATIVE NEWS

WHAT THE SENATE AND HOUSE ARE DOING

In the Senate.—Austin, Texas.—The senate opened Saturday with every member in his seat in spite of the fact that Friday's session had lasted until 2 o'clock in the morning.

Some routine business was transacted and the committee report for the inauguration and canvassing of the vote for governor was adopted. The joint session intervened and by recessing the senate while the pros were at their guard the anti's were able to make a little extra business, but no statutory prohibition bills will ever reach Governor Campbell for his approval.

The pros are still insistent that they will pass these bills. About this there can be little doubt, for they have the votes. However, the anti's say that they will not do it until after Governor Elliott takes the chair, and the pros are about ready to agree with them.

The reading of Michigan's penitentiary reform bill was completed in a vote of the 122-000 mileage and passage of the \$120,000 mileage and per diem bill and the \$20,000 contingent expense bill.

Mr. Sturgeon moved that the further reading of the House mileage bill be dispensed with that the morning call be Wednesday. This was completed. Mr. Sturgeon moved that the House call be put in writing, while House stood ready to make a point of order that this could not be done under the constitution. Sturgeon was delayed and other business intervened, which prevented a contest upon this point at this time.

In the House.—Austin, Texas.—When the house convened a large number of bills were introduced.

A concurrent resolution, prepared by the joint committee from the house and senate, was introduced providing for a joint session to begin at noon to consider the vote on governor and lieutenant governor. The resolution also provided that the inauguration of the gubernatorial candidates place be on Monday, January 15, and the inauguration was adjourned without discussion.

At noon the senate bill into the hall and was greeted with applause. The joint committee which had prepared the resolution was appointed by the two presiding officers to canvass the vote on governor, the lieutenant governor. The members of this joint committee are: Arin, Perkins and Weiner for the senate, and Hill, Rowell and Harman for the house.

Bills in the House.—Austin, Texas.—The following bills were offered in the house: By Law.—To make such criminal law governing trials for murder, if a conviction is obtained fixing the crime at murder in the second degree and the case is reversed on appeal, the second jury can not find the defendant guilty of a higher degree of murder. The bill would allow the jury on second trial to find the defendant guilty of any degree of murder.

Stock Law Election Returns

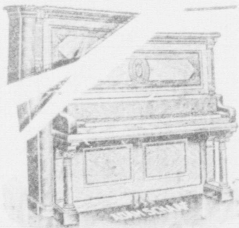
