Four Persons Injured In Automobile Crash Here Two Unmasked Bandits Loot Postoffice At Borger

Postmaster Is Forced by Two To Open Safe To Check Records

Harold Rothchild Held Up at Home and Made to Open Office While One Robber Stays to Guard Wife

To Check Records

Between \$2,000 and \$4,000 Taken; Family Compelled to Stand in Bathroom While Robbers Make Escape

BORGER, Nov. 20.—Two unmasked and armed men forced Postmaster Harold Rothchild to leave his home, shortly after 8 p. m. to-night, and open the postoffice safe for them, taking money estimated at between \$2,000 and \$4,000. One man remained at the house and guarded Mrs. Rothchild while the other took Rothchild to the postoffice.

The exact amount obtained was unknown but postal officials and Inspector Johnson from Amarillo were checking records to ascertain the loss.

On Main Street
The postoffice is on the main street of Borger and the postmaster's office, where the safe is kept, is in full view of the sidewalk. Window curtains were drawn by the robbers as they entered and as the public lobby of the building was open, the postmaster was warned to keep quiet.

At the point of a pistol, the robber compelled Rothchild to open the safe.

After about 20 minutes, he and Rothchild returned to the Rothchild home, where the other robber had compelled Mrs. Rothchild and Marie Brumback, Rothchild's nephew, to enter a bathroom and stand facing a wall. Rothchild was compelled to enter the room with them and as the robbers departed, they shut the door, although they did not lock it. They warned Rothchild not to seek help until they were gone.

Charge Howard With Homicide

Keeper of Leopard Held in Hale County Jail in Connection With Fatal Attack of Littlefield Child

PLAINVIEW, Nov. 20.—Facing a charge of negligent homicide, Charles Howard, keeper of a leopard which fatally injured four-year-old James Evans at Littlefield, was in the Hale county jail here today. The charge was filed at Littlefield.

The leopard was confined to a zoo at Clovis, N. M. Wade Potter, county attorney at Littlefield, said that Howard had made an affidavit that the drug store in which the child was attacked shortly before noon Saturday had employed him to exhibit the cat there.

Owners of the drug store denied that a contract had been made with Howard, according to a press dispatch today from Littlefield.

J. D. Evans, Littlefield tailor and father of the boy, who died at Lubbock sanitarium about noon Wednesday, said he had nothing to say in the matter when asked if he would prosecute Howard on the negligent homicide charge.

Funeral services for the child were held Thursday afternoon at Littlefield at Tabernacle Baptist church. Rev. Roy A. Kemp, pastor, officiated. Burial was in the Littlefield cemetery.

Hostile feeling toward the leopard's keeper was subdued at Littlefield, Thursday, and there was no indication that violence was considered. Howard was transferred from the Littlefield city jail to the Hale county jail at Plainview, Tuesday night, by officers who feared mob violence.

"I win the hat."

Today McDuffie said:

"Yes, Mr. Garner was afraid Senator Heflin would win."

First Freeze Of Year Felt Here Thursday

Indian Summer Routed When Temperature Drops to 32 Degree Mark; No Change in Weather Forecast Today

Coats Become Mode

Winter Halts Communications and Hampers Highway, Rail Traffic Throughout West; Snow Blankets Wide Area

FREEZING temperatures were recorded here early Thursday for the first time this season, completely routing Indian summer warmth and making topcoats and furs the mode.

A minimum temperature of 32 degrees was recorded at the state experiment station Thursday morning and the mercury never climbed beyond the 50-degree mark during the 24-hour period. The day became warmer with arrival of afternoon but dropping temperatures accompanied sunset and it continued to grow colder.

No Change Forecast.

No change in temperature was forecast for today and Saturday in this section. Purchases of gloves, scarfs and topcoats, sale of anti-freeze solutions for automobile radiators and a marked decrease in laxity of pedestrians marked the arrival of cold weather.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 20.—(AP)—A winter storm riding east from the Rocky Mountains tied-knots in wire communication and hampered rail and highway traffic through the west today in the wake of tornadoes that took 21 lives and injured about 100 persons in Oklahoma, Kansas and Arkansas yesterday.

Next Congress Asked to Give Drouth Relief

Resolutions Urging Solons to Appropriate \$50,000,000 for Highway Construction Passed by Committees

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Resolutions urging the next congress to appropriate \$50,000,000 for highway construction in drouth states and to authorize loans for seed, fertilizer and livestock feed were adopted tonight by representatives of more than a score of state drouth relief committees and the national drouth committee.

The highway resolution called on congress to appropriate the \$50,000,000 without requiring the states to match the fund dollar for dollar at the time the distribution is made.

The portion to be borne by the state would be repaid to the government by an annual deduction from the normal federal road appropriation over a period of 10 years.

Earlier in the day the delegates to the drouth conference received word from Dr. C. W. Warburton, secretary of the national committee, that congress would be asked to make the \$125,000,000 allotted for federal aid in road construction in 1932 available immediately on enactment on the agriculture department's supply bill.

The conference also urged liberal contributions to the American Red Cross to enable that organization to meet the relief problems in more than 1,000 drouth stricken counties.

Another resolution requested the secretary of agriculture to ask congress to relieve the counties of their share in the cost of maintaining county agents to June 30, 1932.

Former Sheriff At Brownfield Dies

J. N. Lewis, 55, a former sheriff of Terry county and a resident of Brownfield for 27 years, died at 8:46 o'clock Thursday night in a Lubbock hospital.

Mr. Lewis was sheriff of Terry county eight years, or four terms, and a deputy for two terms.

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Chest Leaders To Meet Today

Drive Probably Will Be Conducted Here Last Week of November; Further Plans to Be Made at Meeting

Leaders in the annual Community Chest drive which probably will be conducted here during the last week of November will meet at 5 o'clock this afternoon at chamber of commerce offices to review what has been done in connection with the approaching campaign and to make further plans.

Those expected to attend the meeting include: Roscoe Wilson, general chairman of the drive; O. W. McLeod, colonel of teams; Francis Baker, chairman of the big gifts committee; Mrs. R. A. Mills, chairman of the women's division; W. B. Atkins, E. J. Parsons, D. N. Leaverton and W. G. McMillan, majors in the drive, and officers and directors of the Community Chest. E. L. Klett is president of the Chest.

A. B. Davis will direct the campaign, tentative dates of which are November 24 and 25 inclusive.

Goal of the drive as fixed by the Chest directors is \$25,750, total budget for the six member-agencies of the Chest for 1931. Budget requests of four of the member-agencies were cut by the Chest directors in favor of the two charity agencies, Salvation Army and United Charities.

Other organizations affiliated with the Chest are the Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls, Y. M. C. A., and Y. W. C. A.

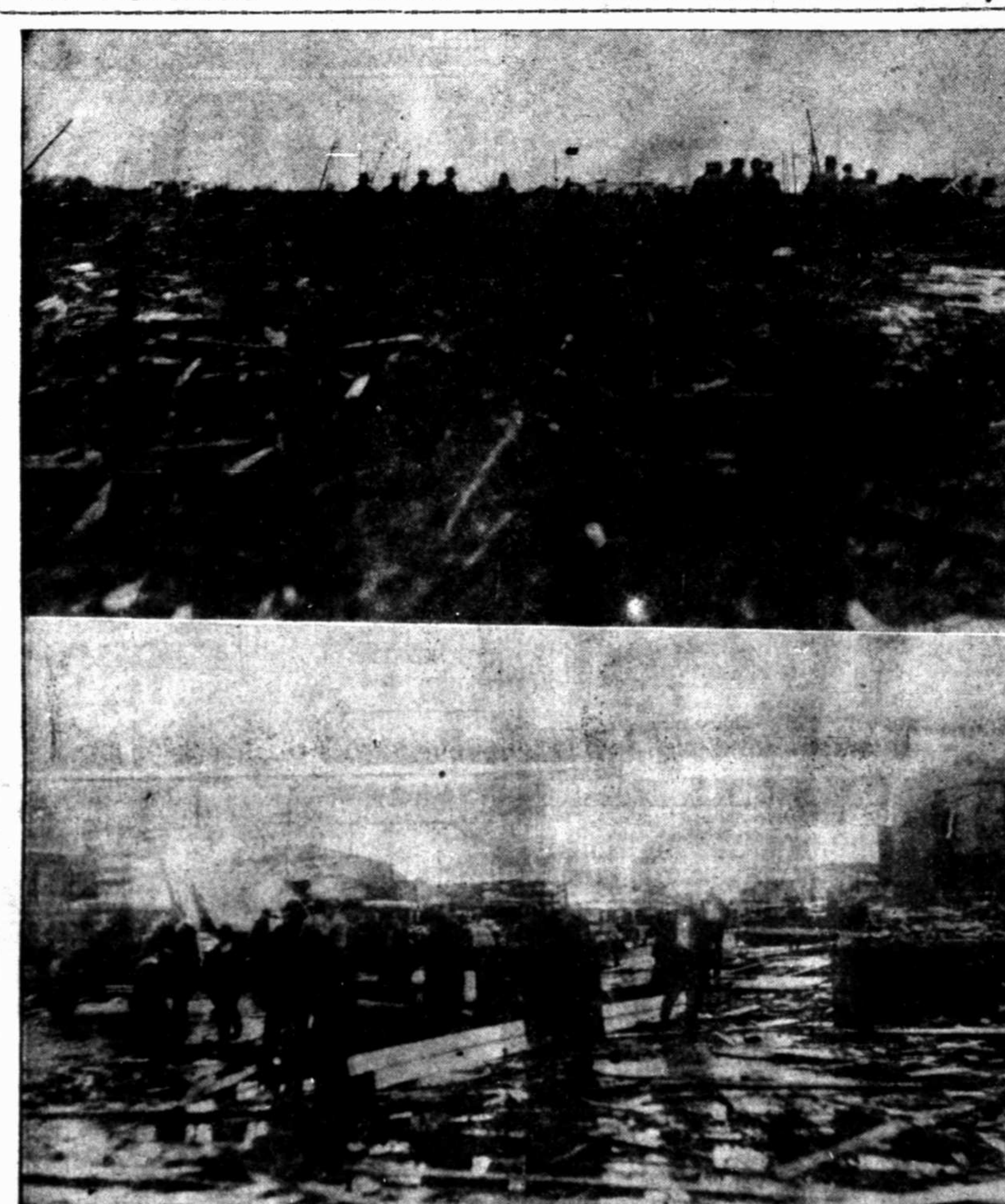
Restaurant, Hospital, Salvation Army And Church Feed Houston Unemployed

Receive Bids On City Well

Sealed Bids to Be Opened by City Commission at 10 Thirteenth Morning on Sixth Water Well Owned by City of Lubbock

Sealed bids on construction of a water well for the city with option of an additional well will be received this morning at city hall until 10 o'clock when the proposals will be opened for consideration by the city commission and the city manager. A contract will not be awarded for several days.

Seven or eight bidders representing firms at Kansas City, Houston, Fort Worth, Dallas, Amarillo and Tucuman, N. M., are expected. The city will not accept a well which will not furnish an average of more than 350 gallons a minute on a 72-hour test.

Small Would Not Divide Panhandle

AMARILLO, Nov. 20.—(AP)—State Senator Clint C. Small of Wellington today said he would oppose any re-districting bill in the legislature which proposed to divide the "Panhandle proper."

He said he would introduce a bill cutting off the lower end of the 18th congressional district and attaching it to a new district, but he would insist that the upper Panhandle territory be left intact when the legislature starts re-districting to make room for three new Texas congressmen.

The present 18th district has almost sufficient population to entitle it to two members, he said.

DO-X Forced Down By Storm Weather

SANTANDER, Spain, Nov. 20.—(AP)—The German seaplane DO-X came down here today while en route from Bordeaux to Corunna and encountered such bad weather that the crew could not go ashore nor could those on land go out in the water to welcome the big German craft.

When the DO-X first anchored about three miles off the mole the sea was calm, but it soon became extremely rough. The boat which attempted to brave the big waves were compelled to return to port.

The plane's officers had intended to continue to Corunna after a short halt here.

Bethany Recovers From Effects Of Tornado As Death Toll Reaches 20

BETHANY, Okla., Nov. 20.—Helped generously by a sympathetic public, this little Nazarene colony was recovering rapidly tonight from the effects of yesterday's tornado.

The death list continued to mount through the day, however. The deaths of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Hiet, an aged couple, brought fatalities to 20.

Two brothers, named Griffin, were reported to Red Cross headquarters as missing. Several injured victims still were in a critical condition.

A call by the American Red Cross and Governor W. J. Holloway for \$30,000, broadcast by newspapers and radio, had met with pledges and cash totaling more than \$25,000 early tonight.

To Strengthen Dry Machinery

Organized Prohibition Forces to Hold Series of Conferences in Coming Weeks; Question of Wine Is Discussed

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The plans of organized dry forces to act for an immediate tightening of their machinery, and for holding a series of joint meetings here in coming weeks, became known today while federal prohibition chiefs again were considering one phase of the enforcement question—wine.

Dr. James M. Doran, commissioner of industrial alcohol, listened for some time to a group of New York rabbis, who laid before him a plan for securing a sacramental wine on a quota basis to remedy complaints they brought against the present system.

Two Autos Run Together Last Night in City

Clarence J. Rollo Is Most Seriously Injured; Face Is Cut, Nose Broken; Concussion of Brain Feared

Only One Unhurt

Grover Coleman, Christine Smith and Vonelle Shelby Also Victims of Collision on 13th Street, Avenue Q

FOUR persons were injured early Thursday night when two automobiles collided at Thirteenth street and Avenue Q.

Clarence J. Rollo, 23, of 1628 Sixteenth street, driver of one of the cars, was the most seriously injured. His injuries included cuts about the face, a broken nose and possibly concussion of the brain.

Late Thursday night he was reported to be in a semi-conscious condition at Lubbock sanitarium. Clarence is the oldest son of Dr. and Mrs. J. W. Rollo, 802 Avenue S.

Three Others Hurt

Grover Coleman, of Wilson, Tex., driver of the other machine, and two companions, Miss Vonelle Shelby, 15, of near Lubbock, and Miss Christine Smith, 17, of 2621 Twenty-second street, were less seriously hurt. Another unidentified youth who was with Coleman and the two girls escaped injury.

Coleman suffered a head wound in which stitches were taken, abrasions about the face and back and other minor injuries. He remained at Lubbock sanitarium.

Miss Shelby, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Shelby, route 2, Lubbock, was dismissed from the sanitarium following treatment for a small abrasion on a shoulder and slight shock.

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A soda driven by Rollo, who was alone, turned over on its side after it had been struck by a lighter coupe operated by Coleman. Rollo was pinned beneath his machine.

Brynum-Morgan and Rix-Sanders ambulances took the crash victims to hospitals. Police investigated the collision.

The coupe was going west on Thirteenth street and the sedan north on Avenue Q when the accident occurred, according to a police report. Both machines were badly damaged, a side of Rollo's car being caved inward and front wheels and motor of the small coupe being driven backward.

FIRE LOSS \$30,000

Robbers Take \$115,000 Loot

Alabama Institution Looted of Negotiable Bonds, Cash According to Cashier; Officers on Lookout

BERRY, Ala., Nov. 20. (AP)—Berry authorities announced today that the bank of Berry, had reported to them the bank was robbed of approximately \$100,000 in negotiable bonds and \$15,000 in cash last night.

Payette county officers began a search for the robbers and state authorities were notified immediately, in Berry officers said. The cashier said the loss in bonds involves between 35 and 40 customers.

J. C. Shepherd is president of the bank, which is capitalized at \$50,000. He said the customers would suffer no loss.

Berry has a population of approximately 200. Shepherd said the robbers gained entrance to the building through a window and used an acetylene torch to open safe deposit boxes from which the bonds, belonging to customers, were taken. He said they overlocked other negotiable securities held by the bank itself.

The robbers also used the torch to cut through the bank vault, taking all contents, including small coins, the cashier said.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 20. (AP)—A blizzard swept the plains of western Nebraska today while rain soaked the dry fields of the eastern part of the state.

At the same time, sleet froze on telegraph wires in central and northern portions of the state and broke down miles of line.

Snowdrifts piled by a gale to the eaves of houses brought business to a standstill in some western localities. Near Sidney a dozen automobiles were stalled on the Lincoln highway. Drivers sought refuge in nearby farm houses.

Scott Receiver Of Oil Company

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 20. (AP)—Walter B. Scott, Fort Worth attorney and president of the Chamber of Commerce there, was appointed ancillary receiver for the Monarch Oil company and the Monarch Oil and Royalty company of Texas by Judge William Hawley Atwell in federal district court here today.

Judge Atwell acted after attorneys seeking the receivership order informed him that they understood an attempt was being made to transfer some of the corporation's holdings in Texas.

The attorneys also said that after a motion for a receiver had been filed in federal court at Tulsa, Okla., the company obtained a week's continuance and then filed an application for a receiver in a Delaware court.

Judge Atwell transferred the case to the court of Judge James Wilson at Fort Worth after appointing the receiver. He said that because some of the company's officials appeared to live there the case proper should come before Judge Wilson.

Reorganization Of Wheat Co-Op Made

WINNIPEG, Nov. 20. (AP)—Reorganization of the Canadian Cooperative Wheat Producers, Ltd., central selling agency for the prairie wheat pools, was reported under way today, but there was no visible evidence of such a step.

Premier J. E. Brownlee, of Alberta, Ottawa despatches said, was slated for general manager of the agency. The post was vacated by E. B. Ramsay last year.

Pool officials declined to comment on the Ottawa report. Brownlee was said to be in Montreal with Premier Bracken, of Manitoba, and A. J. MacPhail, president of the Saskatchewan wheat pool, conferring with bankers. Liquidation of the pool was scouted as "without foundation."

GROWTH IS PICTURED

Water Consumption Shows Big Increase in Lubbock

Indicative of Lubbock's growth, figures compiled by the city show that a total of 363,322,000 gallons of water was pumped here during the first seven months of the current fiscal year, as compared to 288,113,000 gallons during a corresponding period in 1929.

An increase in water consumption of 74,209,000 gallons, or an average of more than 10 million gallons a month, thus is indicated. Gallonage for October was 44,681,000, or 9,962,000 gallons more than was used in October, 1929.

Tariff, Prohibition, Expenditures On Campaign, Sex And Ambition Had Big Part In Mrs. McCormick's Defeat

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. It would be extremely instructive if anyone could analyze in their proportionate importance the various factors which led to Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick's crushing defeat by James Hamilton Lewis in the Illinois senatorial election.



Mrs. McCormick was the first serious woman contender for the Senate and she was buried under one of the biggest individual landslide ever seen. In proportion to the total vote, the Lewis Democratic majority of around 700,000 was even larger than Governor Roosevelt's in New York. And it was rolled up in a normally Republican state where Republican presidential majorities have averaged around 740,000 for the last three elections.

The same issues affected Mrs. McCormick that hit Republicans in other big industrial states. She also suffered from some which she created herself. But the size of the Lewis landslide also raises the interesting question whether the Republican candidate's sex militated against her in the minds of the

voters and whether a woman of a different type could have done any better. Anyway, few candidates ever reached election day with so many serious handicaps. You know, of course, about the economic situation, the tariff and the fact that Illinois is markedly wet. All those things worked against Ruth.

Failed to Hold West
After campaigning in the primary and winning nomination as a dry, she said she was still a dry, but would vote in accordance with the Illinois referendum. It seemed political wisdom, especially as her party's state platform called for it. But the designed effect of holding Republican wets in line was not retained. The organized drys deserted Mrs. McCormick and backed a third candidate, Mrs. Lottie O'Neill, at least 100,000 of whose votes must have been taken from Mrs. McCormick. Unquestionably Mrs. McCormick's promise lost many more votes than it saved.

Up to that time Ruth was the favorite to win. Senate investigators revealed that she had spent a third of a million dollars to be nominated, and that hurt her some. Other things being equal, such disclosures do not defeat a candidate. Illinois elected Frank Smith to the Senate despite campaign contributions of \$125,000 from Samuel Insull, whose utilities he had been charged with regulating. Possibly the Senate's refusal to seat Smith may have influenced voters to believe Mrs. McCormick would meet a like fate if

elected, although she spent her own money.

Shadowed Nye
At first she contented herself with an able defense of her expenditures, which attracted sympathy. Then she hired detective to shadow Chairman Nye of the Senate committee, boldly and defiantly admitting it when the fact became known. Thereupon she lost more sympathy than she had gained.

Meanwhile Lewis, the pink-whiskered fox, never let himself get on the defensive. He gently spoofed "the lady" without overdoing it. Mrs. McCormick, although facing a man 12 years out of the Senate and by most rules a political has-been, was helpless. The dominant issues of dissatisfaction and prohibition were on his side and she couldn't escape it. World Court? Lewis was against that, too.

It had been guessed all along that the political gang of Senator Charles Deneen, her defeated primary opponent, would try to knife her in the campaign. Undoubtedly it did. And when Big Bill Thompson came out against her in a slashing last-minute attack, it was obvious she would lose Chicago by a large majority. Thompson had supported her in the primary and she doubtless anticipated the same support in November without making a deal for it.

"Too Ambitious"
Now, as for the effect of Mrs. McCormick's personality. She was generally being regarded as America's smartest woman politician: brilliant, successful, direct, vital, pleasant, wealthy and eminently practical. Her enemies said she was arbitrary, ruthless, bossy and consumingly ambitious. Certainly she was ambitious, for she

pired to higher political honors than any woman ever attained.

It seems like that she was too smart, too ambitious to appeal to a great many voters. She must have appealed to many others. It would be interesting to know just how many her personality affected favorably and adversely.

How many women and how many men voted for her because she was a woman? A woman, incidentally, standing on her own feet after beating a powerful politician and his machine at their own game. And how many men and how many women voted against her for the same reason? The answers would be welcomed by both politicians and psychologists. But one can only look at the huge Lewis majority and guess.

The Woman's Angle

THE only trouble with these budgets that people work out for the poor working girl is that I never can seem to apply them to my salary.

They always sound so practical: One pays \$1.50 twice monthly to have the hair shampooed and curled; a new coat is to cost \$70 this season and a new dress \$30 and cosmetics and shoes and higher life and food and board all come in for stipulated amounts and the one making out the budget gives good advice on how to lay away a definite amount monthly for the ever-impending rainy day. Of course, there are always budgets for the various salaries.

But my salary never seems to be of the amount that is called for and my needs evidently aren't normal. About the time I think I have everything nicely budgeted, my dress bursts out at the elbows and I have to buy a new one in the wrong season, or my car has a breakdown and must have general renovations, or both pair of my hose wear out the same week.

I think I'll start giving advice on how to make money and keep it I seem to know so little about the subject. How a man ever manages to support himself and take a family on, too, when he works for a small salary is more than I can understand. A lot of them do, however, and their families manage to have some luxuries along with their necessities and they are just as happy as anyone else.

BOX PLEATING LEADS
Box pleating has outstripped the pleating of any other variety in the current mode, according to a fashion note from Paris. Sport, tailored and afternoon dresses are box pleated by preference. Some pleating is very narrow and held in place by multiple rows of machine stitching. Whole blouses and even dresses for afternoon wear are occasionally fashioned of finely pleated georgette.

THESE CHILD BRIDES
SOMEONE in New York recently unearthed some statistics to show that within the last academic year 483 boys and girls dropped from the schools because of marriage. There were more girls than boys in this group. At the age of 14 twenty boys and girls married, 83 of the number were fifteen years of age and 342 of them were sixteen years of age.

The averages on these marriages won't run very high because of the vast number of boys and girls who are in the Lubbock high school, and yet it seems too bad that 483 youngsters who are yet in their teens should be taking on the responsibilities of married life. To those of us who are older, it seems that they are growing old before their time; that they have married before they have had experience to yield them the proper judgment and philosophy to accept marriage.

New York isn't any different from any other place on these early marriages. Every year youngsters marry who are in the Lubbock high school and I remember that several years ago there was an epidemic of these marriages. Whether or not the percentages on divorces or separations in this group will run higher than they do among older people, I do not know. Some of the young people continue to live together and are apparently as happily married as anyone else; others live together for only a short time.

ON WEARING COTTON
RECENTLY a lot is being said about women—particularly of those women, wearing more cotton. Some speaker took this subject for discussion last week at the annual convention of the Texas Federation of Women's clubs, and in her talk she told the women of ways that they can consume cotton in the home.

Today at noon the subject was up for discussion again and, as working women, we decided that we have very little use for cotton now. Of course, we might revolutionize our wardrobes, but, excepting the cotton that is used in adulterating silks and wools, most of us wear very little cotton today.

We have grown accustomed to the sleekness of rayon and silk underwear and to the ease with which they can be laundered. Woolen and silk dresses solve so much of the laundry problem, but we would have with cotton frocks. I suppose that cotton clothing could be as popular as that of any other material, but I don't want to be the pioneer who comes out in cotton hose and wash dresses for winter wear in offices and such things.

Here is something else of interest concerning our consumption of articles and it is about our dependence on minerals. I found it some where the other day: The base of face powder is talc, a soft, pearly mineral and another powder, titanium oxide, which makes the talc sticky, is likewise a mineral. The mud pack of the beauty parlor is made up of volcanic ash, and rouge is made from hematite, a very pure iron ore. Silk stockings may contain as much as 50 per cent of tin to give them weight and most silks are adulterated to some extent with metals. Chromium is used to tan the leather in shoes and sulphur is used in making rubber heels. Coal tar products are used in making dyes and perfumes and aluminum is used in coloring dyes in fabrics.

Oil Proration Order May Be Given Change

New Difficulties in Equal Distribution of Production May Lead State to Base Order on "Common Purchases"

AUSTIN, Nov. 20. (AP)—New difficulties in the way of an equitable distribution of the oil production of Texas may lead the state railroad commission to base its state proration order for the next 60 days on the "common purchaser" act, it developed on the eve of a state wide hearing today.

Whether this law should be utilized, rather than the conservation law under which the order of August 26 was issued, undoubtedly will be one of the subjects discussed among operators at two preliminary hearings here tomorrow preceding the commission hearing, set for Saturday.

Order Promulgated
Although the previous ninety day order was promulgated under the conservation statute, in effect the common purchaser act has been resorted to in enforcement of proration. The common purchaser act provided pipe lines should purchase equitably from all operators.

Belief that a discussion of this subject would form a large part of the hearing arose from announcement of pipe line nominations by Dave Donoghue, technical adviser for the central proration committee. Donoghue reported total nominations and nomination estimates were 718,000 barrels daily as compared to the allowable production of 75,000 barrels and the actual production of 780,000 barrels daily under the present order.

The nominations disclosed cuts ranging from about 1,500 barrels in the Panhandle to nearly 35,000 barrels in West Texas. Conversely, the gulf coast, which was allowed 150,000 barrels during the last 90 days, and produced 165,000 barrels, would be allowed 171,000 barrels under Donoghue's tabulation.

Production Reported
Present actual production and nominations for the next sixty days as reported by Donoghue follow:
Panhandle present production 81,150 against nominations 79,815; North Texas 63,100 against 57,947; West Central Texas 47,400 against 34,304; West Texas 283,550 against 249,877; East Central 41,500 against 38,255; Southwest Texas 98,350 against 87,253; and Gulf coast 165,000 against 171,448.

This shows the gulf coast, already on a ninety day probation period the only field in Texas where the demand for the next period will be in excess of production for the last period.

Obviously, the gulf fields have the advantage of being nearest the ports, while many of the other sections, remote from ports and in some cases from rail lines, must depend entirely upon the pipe lines.

The situation was further complicated today by the decision of Prairie Oil and Gas to discontinue its purchases in the Panhandle, cutting down the potential allowance of that field another 13,000 barrels.

Equity Basis
Proration, it is generally admitted, is to provide for an equitable production, an average withdrawal of oil, from all fields; prevention of storage, held to result in waste; and prevention of other forms of waste to the end that natural resources might properly be conserved.

But if one field is allowed to produce at near the peak of its potential, by reason of having a ready market, while another field is forced to close in entirely because of lack of a market, waste would result.

Panhandle operators claimed, before Prairie' announcement, that they were operating on a minimum margin of profit.

This all leads to the possibility that the commission might exercise

Seattle Next Host to WCTU

Possibility of Counteracting 'Wet Propaganda' Discussed as Annual Convention Ends at Houston

HOUSTON, Nov. 20. (AP)—Officials of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union today selected Seattle, Washington, as the 1932 national convention city, and discussed the possibility of counteracting "wet propaganda" the union believed designed particularly to injure or hamper President Hoover in his administration program.

President Ella A. Boole and her executive committee remained over from last night, when the 56th annual convention of the union was ended. No national convention will be held next year, but two state or more regional "campaign conferences," the first to be held in Washington, D. C., probably in December of 1931, will replace the usual general gathering. The conferences will be designed to crystallize dry sentiment in all sections of the country.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Omaha, Neb., and Indianapolis, Ind., lost to Seattle in bidding for the 1932 convention.

No definite action was taken by the committee, an official said, concerning the matter of defending President Hoover, but it was agreed that some step might be taken. The details of the discussion were unavailable, as the meeting was executive.

The date for the Seattle convention was not determined, but the committee decided to hold it some time prior to the next presidential election.

BURLINGTON, Kas., Nov. 20. (AP) Richard Wilson, 47, shot and killed his divorced wife, Chonita Wilson, 28, here last night. He was charged with first degree murder and placed in jail. The slaying was witnessed by several persons.

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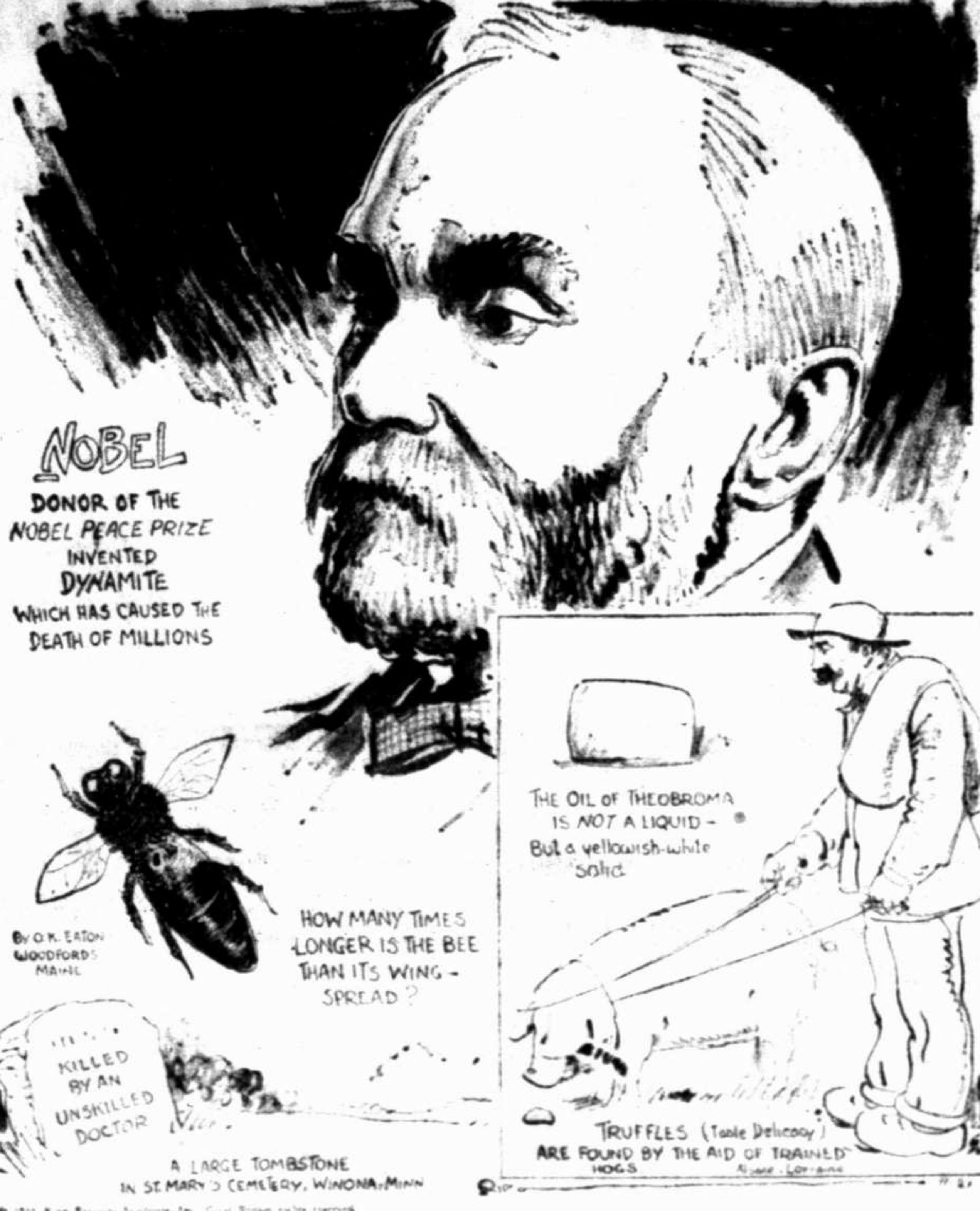

That New Apportionment

UNDER census figures announced by President Hoover and bearing upon congressional representation, Texas will gain three seats in the lower house but already peanut politicians are endeavoring to throw a monkey wrench into the machinery.

Representatives of agricultural states, losers of representation, said they would seek to exclude aliens from the reapportionment count to prevent big gains in California, Michigan, Texas, New York and New Jersey. The "outstanding evil" of the reapportionment plan, they said, lies in the fact that "there are more than 7,500,000 aliens included in the census figures who are not American citizens, yet representation is being taken away from our American citizens in old, settled states such as Virginia, Mississippi, Kansas, Iowa and the Minnesota and is given to those foreigners who owe their allegiance to a foreign country."

Practical Health Problems

PROPER MINERALS ESSENTIAL TO KEEP THE BODY FUNCTIONING

By DR. MORRIS FISHER, Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine

As has been mentioned in all of the discussions of nutrition in these columns, the protein, carbohydrate and fat furnish the necessary sources of energy for the body and the protein particularly supplies the material for building new tissues.

In his discussion of infant nutrition, Dr. W. M. Marriott emphasizes especially the necessity of proper minerals. Every tissue of the body and all of the fluids which are in it contain mineral salts. These mineral salts enable the cells to function properly and aid in the digestion of food.

In the activities of the human body, mineral salts are constantly used up, and unless an equivalent amount is supplied in the diet, wasting of the body occurs. For every part of protein that is deposited in the body, about one-third as much mineral matter is also stored. Furthermore, there is a definite relationship between the amount of mineral material and the amount of water.

When there is a great loss of the mineral matter occurring as a result of diet deficient in salt, or as a result of starvation or prolonged diarrhea, the body is unable to maintain the proper amount of water content.

When a great amount of mineral matter is taken into the body, only sufficient for the uses of the body is retained, and the rest is then passed out. Sometimes it is necessary for the body to give up a great deal of water in order to get rid of an excess of salt taken into the system. This is the basis of action of various kinds of salts taken as cathartics.

In order to find out the kinds of mineral matter that are necessary for the human body, analysis have been made of the various tissues which the body contains. Thus the bones consist chiefly of calcium, magnesium and phosphates. The cells of the body generally have potassium salts and phosphates.

The various fluids in the body, such as the blood and the bile and the lymph, contain sodium salts, chlorides and bicarbonates. Oxygen is the important constituent of the red coloring matter of the blood, and iodine is necessary for proper activity of the thyroid gland.

Sometimes the cells of the body are modified in various ways, so that the balance of relationship between the various salts in the blood is disturbed. If there is a sudden deficit of calcium salts in the blood, spasmodic conditions develop. If there is a decrease in the bicarbonates in the body, acidosis follows.

U. S. Power Control Urged

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Said Chief Justice Hughes, addressing a recent meeting of legal specialists on transportation questions: "If an agency like the interstate commerce commission had been established much earlier, with adequate authority, we would have been spared many of the most difficult of our present problems."

Whereas Solicitor Charles A. Russell of the federal power commission, a guest at the gathering, led all hands in applause.

HIMSELF formerly of the interstate commerce commission's legal staff, Solicitor Russell is just where the railroad were when an agency to regulate them ought to have been established—but was not, until it was well-nigh too late.

There is, indeed, a federal power commission but its authority is small and its members (Secretaries of War, the Interior and Agriculture Hurley, Wilbur and Hyde) are too busy with other duties to know most concerning its work than underlings choose to tell them, according to Solicitor Russell, who adds that this enables the power interests to shape power policies mainly to suit themselves.

Obviously, argues Solicitor Russell, an independent, full-time power board similar to the interstate commerce commission, is needed. For this matter, it is in prospect. Russell drafted the bill and Senator Couzens of Michigan is pushing it in congress, which probably will pass it next winter.

BUT WILL the new power commission, if and when created by congress and appointed by the president, possess the "adequate authority" specified by Chief Justice Hughes?

A federal commission can regulate only interstate industries.

Most railroads are interstate, but how about power? Though some of it is transmitted across state lines, the bulk of it is consumed not far from where it is generated.

SOLICITOR RUSSELL reasons thus:

In numerous cases a single big corporation exercises control, in one way or another, over a multiplicity of power-producing concerns scattered throughout many states. Such power really is sold, between states, by the central company to the consumers, with the small local outfits as mere agents.

If Russell can make this contention stick, he will have vested his prospective commission with a lot of authority—but of course the power folk will fight it tooth and toenail.

AS SOLICITOR RUSSELL relates railroad history (into which he delved deeply during his connection with the interstate commerce commission) it is clear enough why Chief Justice Hughes regrets that such an agency, "with adequate authority," was not "established much earlier."

The railroads quite largely were already built when the commission was created, which was in 1887, but it was several years later than that before it was given "adequate authority" to do much regulating.

Regulation consisted principally in fixing fair rates, to determine what rates were fair, it was necessary to ascertain what the roads were making on their investments, to learn what they were making, it was essential to discover the aggregate of their investments—and to this day the commission never has discovered it.

AT THE OUTSET, the roads undoubtedly fixed their books to indicate construction costs far greater than they were in reality, enabling them to begin by demanding dividends upon countless imaginary millions.

Next they borrowed heavily, presently shuffling their borrowings into the investment total and demanding dividends upon the new, higher basis.

Then followed the consolidation period, signalled by the stiff marking up of the book value of each road included in each merger—with, of course, demands for increased dividends in proportion.

To further complicate the reckoning, there have been at least two major fluctuations (a third appears to be just now beginning) in prices. A certain number of dollars in January, 1914, for instance, meaning something altogether different in purchasing power from the same number of dollars in January, 1930.

HAD THE interstate commerce commission begun its career when all this hocus-pocus was in its infancy and grown up along with it, perhaps it could have kept up with the figures.

Trying to break into the midst of it—all well, it was hopeless.

Solicitor Russell sees power now as an infant industry—compared with what he expects to see it a few years hence. He wants the prospective power commission put on the job in plenty of season to sit right alongside the cradle and agree with the child on some preliminary book-keeping.

PROVINCIALISM

If the present trend of events continues, there will soon be no provincialism left in the United States. Isolation is what makes people provincial, and isolation is rapidly becoming a thing of the past.

The telephone was the first medium to connect far-lying districts with the life of the cities. The automobile next furnished a means of rapid and convenient transit. Now the city has been brought to the small town by means of the radio. When Prairie Depot, Ohio, can listen in on concerts as far East as Newark, as far South as Atlanta, and as far West as Kansas City, then that town partakes in a measure of the characteristics of the cities. They have something in common together.

The great national roads form another de-provincializing element. A sparsely settled district, however far it may be from the larger centers, cannot grow self-centered and peculiar when cars from 10 different states pass through there every day.

In fact, the danger lies in the opposite direction. Towns tend to grow rather too much alike. Without labels, it is difficult for a stranger within a diameter of 500 miles to be able to distinguish one town from another. Town spirit is also becoming more difficult to foster. Communication and easy travel have brought this about. There may come a time when the people of this country have extended their travels around the globe so widely that they will not appear even as distinctively American.

Mahatma Gandhi, Indian Independence Sponsor, Most Comfortable Prisoner

POONA, India, Nov. 20. (P)—Mahatma Gandhi, sponsor of the independence movement in India, has been made one of the world's most comfortable prisoners. In addition to enlarged quarters in Yeroda prison two white warders have been assigned to see that the Mahatma wants for nothing.

By a recent arrangement on the part of the British government Gandhi was shifted to more spacious quarters in that part of the jail originally designed for European prisoners. He has three rooms or cells to himself, a bath and in addition a flower garden opening off that part of the jail which is his.

Sleeps Under Stars.
At night the first breaker of the salt laws, who has been interned since last May, sleeps out under the stars, an arrangement possible since the Monsoon rainy season has passed. The two European warders in constant attendance upon the Mahatma move his bed out in the garden at nightfall and carry it back into the building again in the morning.

As from the beginning of his life at Yeroda, near Poona, Gandhi has his own Brahman cook. Milk forms one of the chief articles of the Mahatma's diet and other faithful Brahmins send a herd of goats specially provided by the government. Every bit of food entering the prison for the prophet is handled only by Brahmins. At no time does any European have anything to do with the food which is provided for Gandhi, the government having taken these precautions to counter congress party assertions that Gandhi was in danger of being poisoned by white attendants in the prison.

Cultivates Flowers.
As a means of recreation C. has recently taken up the cultivation of flowers. He looks after his blooms early in the morning, before the sun becomes too hot, usually afterward operating his spinning wheel until noon, in compliance with one of the national aims that as Indians should wear nothing but homespun clothes.

A good part of the afternoon Gandhi devotes to reading and attending to his correspondence.

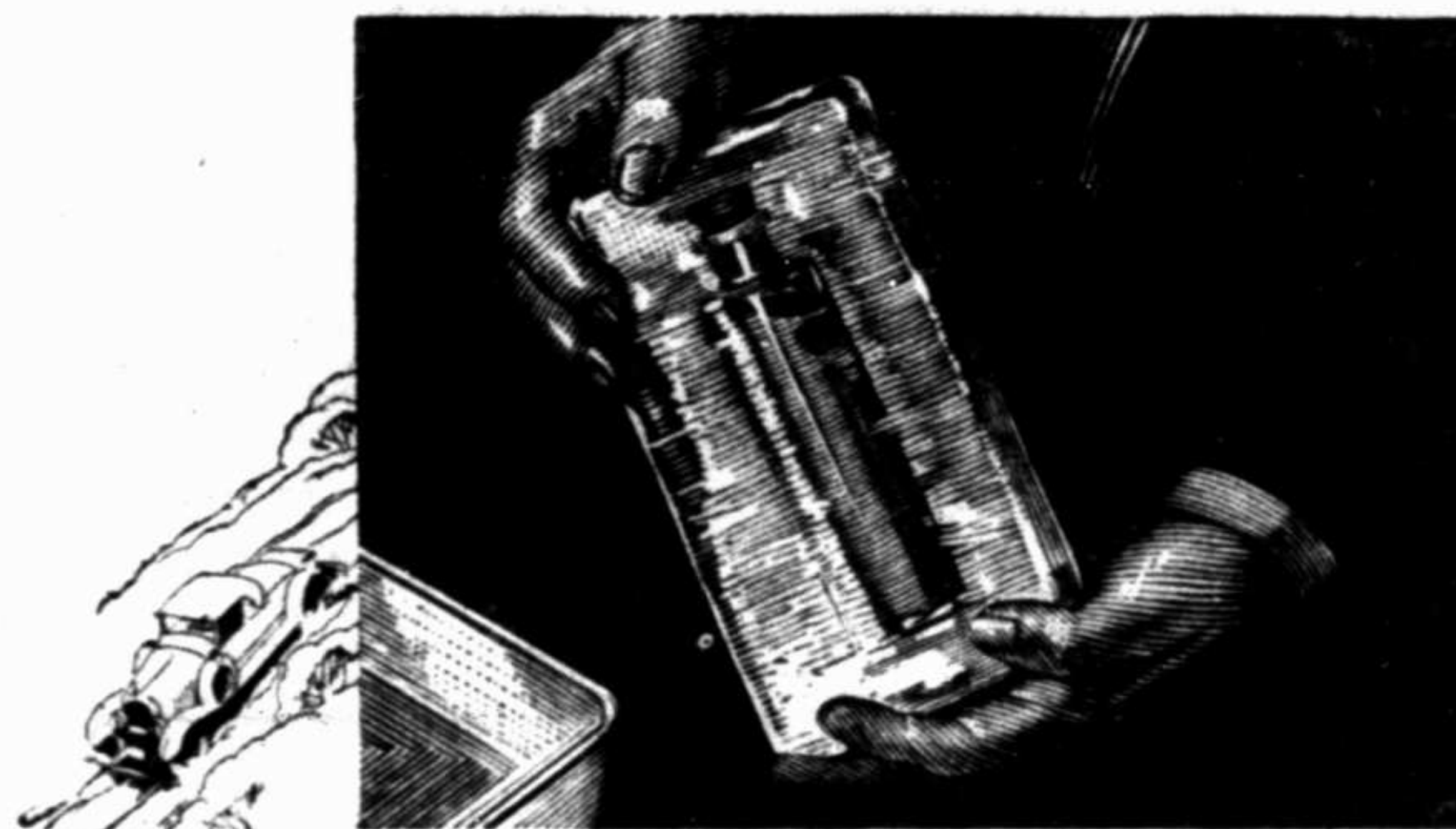

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Consumers of Wheat Assured Of Protection

Grain Stabilization Corporation Says Purchases May Be Made with Reasonable Safety in U. S. Market

CHICAGO, Nov. 20. (AP)—The grain stabilization corporation served notice today that consumers of wheat products may now make purchases with reasonable safety for their reasonable requirements and protect themselves against advances that may come through "many underlying constructive factors."

The assurance was given by George S. Milnor, president of the stabilization agency, after a market session in which government support in fact, out of the pit had lent stability to prices. Corn surpassed wheat in the upswing, gained 1-1/2 to 2-1/8 cents a bushel while wheat advanced 1-8 to 1-1/8 cents.

December wheat closed on the Chicago board of trade at 73 1-2 to 8-4 cents a bushel and May contracts at 71 to 72 1-4, the world having gone around the trading floor that bids from houses handling government orders for May wheat were raised 1-2 cents to 78 1-2 today against 76 yesterday.

Adds To Buoyancy
The farm board's advocacy of a 13 1-2 cent boost in import duty on corn was another factor adding buoyancy.

Milnor's post-market statement reviewed the situation of the last week, during which the federal stabilization agencies have stepped into the domestic pits and bought both cash and futures of wheat to prevent drastic declines. He said farm stocks of wheat were declining and although the visible supply seemed large, there was no congestion at terminals. He saw "no reason why dumping of Russian and other wheat on foreign markets should be permitted to injure our own markets."

Emergency Cited
"Disturbed economic conditions throughout the world," Milnor said, "during the last week were augmented by unsettled conditions in foreign grain markets. Continued shipments of wheat from Russia depressed European prices. Much uncertainty prevailed in regard to Canadian conditions, all of which resulted in drastic declines in wheat futures in all foreign markets. Winnipeg December wheat sold below 35 cents a bushel."

Protection Is Asked in Spain
Eight Thousand Employers in Valencia Send Delegation to Government Seeking Protection in Labor Riots

MADRID, Nov. 20. (AP)—Eight thousand employers in Valencia today sent a delegation here to ask government protection against a "reign of terror" established in their city by various labor unions, but from other points to which the general strike of the past week has extended came reports that the tension had eased appreciably.

The Valencia delegation blamed the "brutal" strike a labor organization held responsible for much of the recent disorder, for "intolerable conditions" under which Valencia workers have been driven from their jobs under threat of violence against which the local authorities had no effective weapons.

Minor disorders continued at Barcelona today, where left wing irreconcilables refused to obey union orders to go back to work. There were clashes in the outlying industrial sections but the city itself remained peaceful.

So far we have been able to find only one of these vocalists in the firm colony who shuns that idea. And incidentally this one, Jeanette MacDonald, has been the only feminine singer imported from Broadway who has conquered every demand made by motion pictures.

Scores of girls who were huts as singers behind the footlights have come west and scores of them have had to use the other half of their round trip tickets, only Jeanette remaining to bask in the glory so loved by cinema celebrities.

Of course there have been many actresses of the legitimate stage who have sought and found increased fame through the movie cameras. But they were brought out here primarily because of their acting ability, not their singing talent. And there are old established screen stars who have proved to the world that all they needed was an opportunity to demonstrate their remarkably fine voices. Gloria Swanson and Bebe Daniels both come under this category. But Miss MacDonald stands alone in her class.

"I haven't the slightest ambition ever to sing in grand opera," Jeanette told me as we swam leisurely around her swimming pool. It was a terribly hot afternoon—a fact the chamber of commerce no doubt would deny—and the only possible means we could devise for keeping cool was to go swimming.

"For one thing, I am not through in pictures yet," she continued. "And when I do bow out of the picture in Hollywood, everyone must sooner or later, I think, I will be entitled to a good long vacation. I have been working hard for 10 years now and I can see no reason why I should go through the strenuous training grind required of grand opera singers. They work hard, too, don't they think they don't?"

"I have been told that the average life of a film player is five years. That will be enough for me. By that time I will be ready to spend my life playing for a while. Of course, I probably will go back on the stage again when I get tired of playing, as everyone does. But that is way in the future. My chief interest now is in what I am going to do in pictures."

Threats Cause Of Repudiation

Wealthy St. Louis Man Causes Collapse of State's Case Against Gangsters When He Fails to Identify Them

BELLEVILLE, Ill., Nov. 20. (AP)—Repeated threats of death to himself and family sealed the lips of Sam Scortina, wealthy St. Louis grocer who yesterday unexpectedly repudiated his identification of five St. Louis gangsters as his kidnapers last July 12 and caused the collapse of the state's case. Scortina is held in jail on perjury charges.

Constant telephone calls came to the Scortina home in St. Louis, where the grocer, his wife and 17-year-old daughter remained under heavy police guard since last July. Scortina and his wife said today.

Tells Of Calls
Scortina nervously told of the calls today, saying the caller always would repeat: "Kill—kill—kill."

Scortina's going to Belleville to testify, a long distance call came to the house and the caller threatened that Scortina's entire family, even to his most remote relatives, would be killed if the grocer testified. Mrs. Scortina said, St. Louis police said they made efforts to have the phone removed from the house, but Scortina refused.

State's Attorney Hilmar Lindauer said today every effort would be made to convict Scortina on perjury. The penalty is from one to fourteen years.

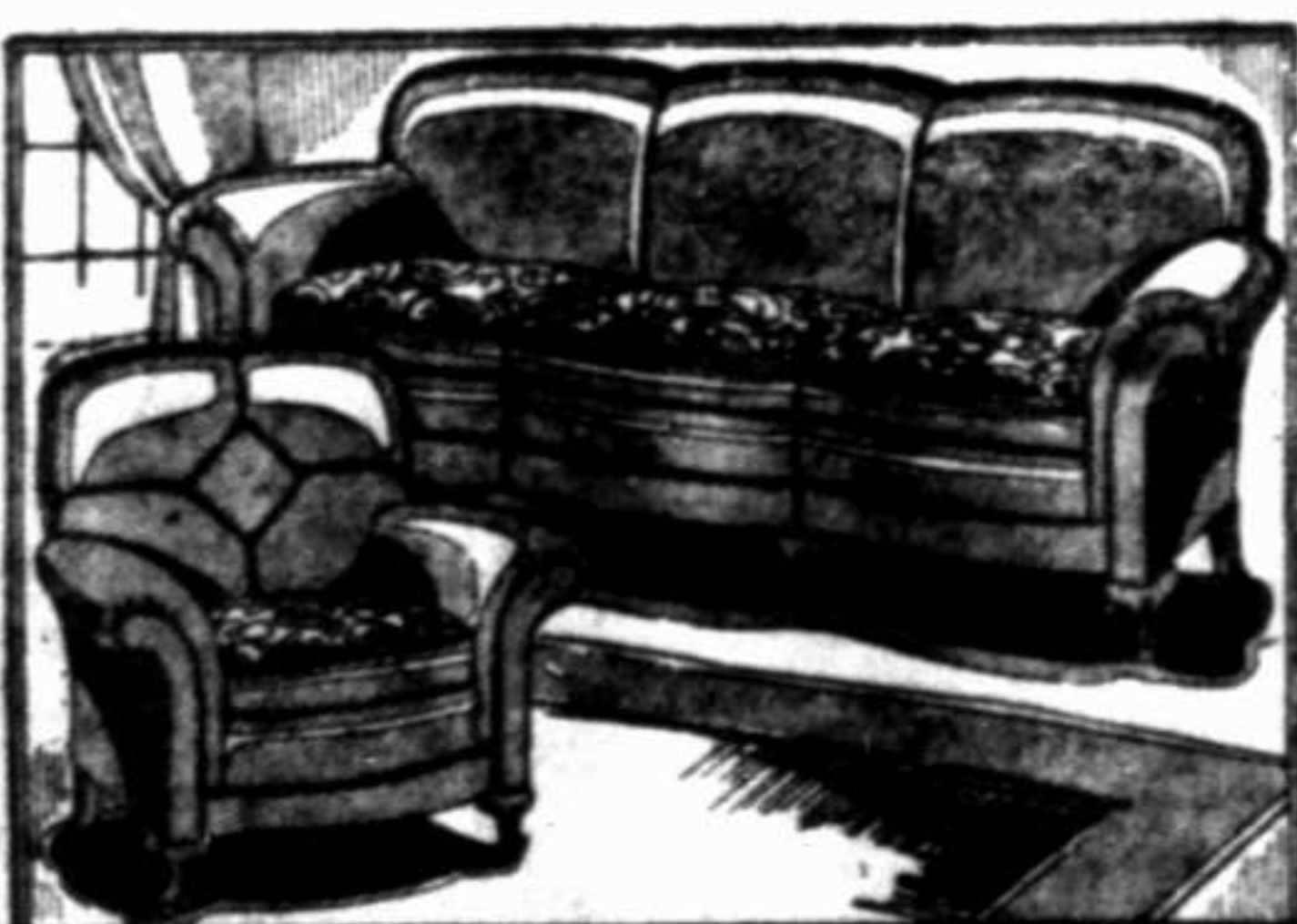

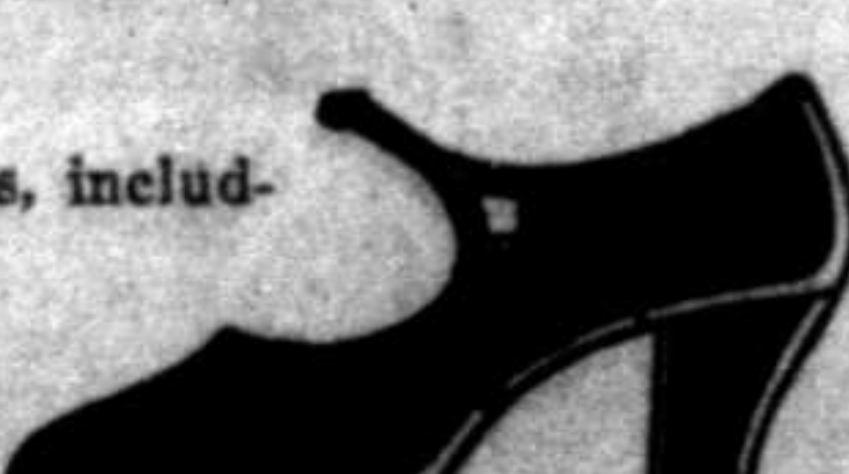
