EARLY AID IS IN SIGHT FOR FARMERS

SOLONS AVER
HUGE SUM IS
TO BE GIVEN

500 MILLIONS SHOULD
BE AVAILABLE SOON,
THEY CLAIM

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Congressional leaders indicated today that after enactment of the pending farm bill they would favor a recommendation by the Agriculture department to make available immediately the \$500,000,000 appropriation proposed by the measure for stabilization of the agriculture industry.

The farm bill, expected to be enacted into law within a week or ten days, merely authorizes a half billion dollar appropriation.

Some Not Favorable

It has been thought the department would suggest an immediate appropriation of only one or two hundred millions dollars, but some leaders now favor the full amount. These leaders take the view the wheat situation demands immediate attention, and if the farm board is to buy up the surplus wheat crop, about \$175,000,000 would be needed alone for this. They hold the board ought to have the full amount so as to be able to take full advantage of its powers under the bill to deal with the wheat situation and that needing attention in other crops.

GOES J. RUFUS
ONE BETTER

FORT WAYNE, Ind. June 4 (AP)—A "get-rich-quick" scheme involving half a million dollars was laid today at the door of Miss Irma Bittinger, 39, a former bank employee. Her attorneys indicated she would plead guilty to a grand larceny charge.

Miss Bittinger began by borrowing \$100 from a friend, deducting related, saying she would invest the money in bonds to earn a profit of \$50 in 50 days. Before that time was up they said she obtained \$200 from a second friend, using \$150 of it to pay the first debt. This so pleased the first friend that she asked to have the entire amount reinvested. From that point the scheme grew to surprising proportions, the detectives declared. They said her victims numbered some 300 persons.

ROBBERY MAY
END FATALITY
FOR COLEMAN

FORMER LOCAL BARBER
BEATEN AND ROBBED;
TWO ARE HELD

(Special To The Journal)

BIG SPRING, June 4.—The victim of robbery and a subsequent attack here on Sunday, George S. Coleman, 37, former Lubbock barber, is fighting for his life in a local hospital today while officers grill two men suspected of the dual crime. Coleman was robbed of \$100 prior to the attack and two brothers, S. J. and J. J. Covington, of Coahoma, near here, are being held in connection with the case. Officers are endeavoring to substantiate Coleman's robbery and also J. J. Covington's confession through the recovery of the money.

Confession Is Claimed

Covington is said to have made a confession to the attack before County Attorney J. B. Lewis of Callahan county, following his arrest Monday.

Still in a semi-conscious condition, Coleman is able to give details of the attack which took place after he had agreed to buy the gas and oil for the brothers if they would take him to Abilene. With his jaw broken in two places, an injured scalp wound, Coleman staggered to the residence of the Texas and Pacific railroad tracks about 3:30 Sunday morning after regaining consciousness. Coleman said he had been left on the tracks to die by the two men.

Officers were notified and a search instituted for the men. They were arrested in Baird several hours later.

Mrs. Coleman and child of Lubbock, Coleman's sister, Mrs. John Pugh and Mr. Pugh of Lubbock, and J. Parker are here at the injured man's bedside.

CHARLOTTE, S. C. June 4.—With the glory of the warrior shining in their faces from rekindled memories, gray haired men who followed the flag of the South in the Sixties assembled here today for the opening of the 39th Reunion of United Confederate Veterans.

By every avenue of travel the veterans, wives, sponsors, maids of honor and all the harvest-on that go to make up a reunion poured in to the city.

From Many States
They came from almost every state although that territory from the Potomac to the Rio Grande where the Stars and Bars once waved sent the largest quota.

The reunion will be formally opened tonight with an address by North Carolina's Governor O. Max Gardner, and an address by General A. T. Goodwyn of Elmore, Ala., commander in chief.

The birthday anniversary of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy, was observed last night. Veterans heard Clyde R. Hoey, of Shelby, N. C., former Congressman from North Carolina, praise Davis the Confederacy and the valor of the men who fought for the South.

NEW FLOW OF
MT. VESUVIUS

HOT LAVA POURS FROM
ANCIENT MENACE IN
LOWER ITALY

(By Associated Press)

NAPLES, Italy, June 4.—The eruption from Mount Vesuvius became more serious today and caused the evacuation of Barre before a heavily increased flow of lava. Latest dispatches said the lava was moving with irresistible force at the rate of 150 feet an hour and had increased in width to more than 70 feet. It was only 650 feet from the town of Barre at 4 p. m. (9 a. m. E. S. T.).

People In Panic

And only half a mile from the town of Terzigno panic had seized upon the population of neighboring towns.

Director Malladra of the Vesuvian observatory said there was a decided increase in the lava flow from the cone through which the eruption burst. The interior of this cone in the crater is a lake of boiling rock and lava.

Vineyards and woods near Terzigno were destroyed by the lava.

Although an early official statement from the Vesuvian observatory declared the eruption would gradually die away, the authorities considered the situation dangerous.

Prompt measures were taken. A trainload of soldiers was sent to Barre to superintend the evacuation of the town. General Tranto, commander of the army corps in this area, Count Capiabbi, vice-prefect and a number of engineers went in a special train to Terzigno, to survey the menaced territory.

Volcano In Brazil

BUENOS AIRES, June 4 (AP)—Dispatches from Mendoza today said the volcano Nevado near there had begun new activity, spouting a great quantity of lava, fire and mud.

Near Villa Ateul, greatly damaged in the recent earthquakes, streams of boiling water have weakened the consistency of the soil, giving rise to fears of caving.

DEATH TOOLS

MYSTERY SHROUDS THE
BEATING TO DEATH
OF YOUNG GIRL

(By Associated Press)

The bloody corpses of two young women, one believed to be that of Pauline Wilson, former consort of a slain Cincinnati gang chieftain, were discovered in two widely separated American cities this morning, Associated Press dispatches to the Daily Journal said today. The Wilson woman was shot to death near Cincinnati while Los Angeles was the scene of the second slaying where a young woman had apparently been beaten to death with a hammer.

Search Under Way

LOS ANGELES, June 4 (AP)—The body of a young woman, her battered head swathed in a blood-soaked cloth which was tied to a clothes hook was found hanging in the closet of an abandoned apartment here today.

Police started a search for a man who rented the apartment May 28 under the name of W. C. Johnson. Apartment house employees said he had not been seen since yesterday, and no woman had been seen about the place who might have been the victim.

Clothing Is Found

A suit of clothes found in the rooms which carried the name of an Oakland, Calif., firm might have come from there. They said the woman, described as "youthful"

COURT WAITS
FOR LAWYERS

FEDERAL TRIBUNAL IS
POSTPONED UNTIL
WEDNESDAY

Due to the absence of attorneys in the case scheduled for trial, today's session of the Lubbock division of the northern district of Texas, United States Court, business was adjourned until 9 o'clock Wednesday morning by Judge James C. Wilson.

In each of the two cases tried yesterday in which Gene Buck, president of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, charged Oskar Korn, a motion picture theater owner operating in West Texas, with infringement of copyrighted musical compositions without the written consent of the copyright, Judge Wilson rendered judgment against Mr. Korn for \$250 and \$100 attorneys' fees and court costs in each case.

The enrollment for the summer session at Texas Technological college was far in excess of any previous summer term up until noon today. Registrar E. L. Doherty reported. Official figures on the total enrollment would not be available until later in the day.

With many students still registering at that time, indications were that the total enrollment would exceed the expectations of officials. Between 1,000 and 1,200 students had been expected for the term.

Regular class schedules were inaugurated this morning. A late registration fee of \$2 is being assessed against all students registering late, officials of the business office said.

Howard was convicted in El Paso of the murder of N. V. Nixon. J. (Pete) McKenzie, convicted of the murder of Chief of Detectives J. J. Croft, will be executed today.

Harry J. Leahy of Mathis, convicted for the murder of Dr. J. Ramsay, will be electrocuted on June 12.

Red Anton Injured
In Automobile Smash

SANTA FE, N. M., June 4 (AP)—J. Anton, superintendent of the Santa Fe railroad with headquarters in Las Vegas, and C. B. Brady, a millman, were critically injured in an automobile accident here yesterday.

The car was wrecked when the driver lost control and crashed into a telephone pole. Anton, prior to coming to New Mexico, was prominent in railroad work at Lubbock, Dallas and Slaton.

Federal Judge Will
Face Investigation

MEMPHIS, June 4.—The Commercial Appeal said today that dissatisfaction with the record of convictions in the Federal court here has led Lindsay B. Phillips, United States District Attorney, to complain to the Department of Justice that Federal Judge Harry B. Anderson has favored the clients of certain attorneys.

Phillips, it was said, laid his charges before the department when he went to Washington recently to explain why he "was unable to obtain convictions in many liquor cases."

No New Arrests In
Texas Attack Case

HOUSTON, June 4 (AP)—Police today were no nearer an arrest of two negroes who robbed H. S. Skinner of Houston, Sunday night and attacked his 24-year-old woman companion.

Two negroes were arrested yesterday. One was released and the other was held today because police had not checked up on his record. It was not believed the negro had anything to do with the attack.

Skinner's automobile taken by the negroes was found yesterday.

Frantic Fight Made
On Weakened Levee

GREENVILLE, Miss., June 4 (AP)—Frantic efforts of a thousand men who labored all night long constructing an auxiliary loop around a crashing Mississippi river levee south of Greenville served today to quiet considerably a frightened populace.

A thousand other workers previously had finished a loop in which ten thousand sacks of sand were used around the base of the levee. That was accomplished in the face of the surging water.

Engineers believed the threatening situation was in hand.

WOODS HOLE, Mass., June 4 (AP)—The yacht Mouette, in which Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and his bride are believed to be passing their honeymoon, sailed from here today after anchoring in the harbor during the night.

Watchers on the shore said a young man who they were sure was the Flying Colonel was seen on board the Mouette as the yacht sailed from the harbor

and headed in the direction of Vineyard Haven. No one else was seen aboard the craft.

Through green silk curtains, drawn completely across the plate glass windows of the deck house, could be seen a silhouette that bore every resemblance to the outline of a young woman.

The Mouette sailed about 8 o'clock last night, and pulled up alongside the fish wharf. A light burned all night.

Early this morning, a rowboat put out from the shore, and the occupants approached the Mouette. As the skiff circled the cruiser, a blonde young man bounded to the stern and raised a naval ensign. He then ran to the bow, hoisted a small pennant and returned to the cabin.

Hailed by occupants of the skiff, he responded from behind the curtains of the cabin. In a not unfriendly, but somewhat imploring, tone, he said:

"Oh, won't you please cast loose?"

The request was repeated and the skiff pulled away.

Within three minutes of the halt, the Mouette was under way and soon disappeared in the haze of Vineyard sound.

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ET BIDS ON LOCAL BONDS

IMPORT, STREET AND SEWAGE BONDS UP FOR SALE TODAY

Bids are being received this afternoon by the Lubbock city commission for the purchase of \$225,000 in municipal bonds, aggregate \$225,000 for the construction of a municipal airport, street improvements and sewer extensions.

Bids for the municipal airport were voted on April 23, 1929 while the street improvement and sewer extension bonds were included in the \$350,000 bond election held on December 24, 1928.

Forty Year Period
As outlined in the notice of sale, the bonds are to mature serially over a period not to exceed forty years. The bidders are requested to bid on bonds bearing interest at the rate of 4-3-4 per cent per annum and separate bids on bonds at five per cent per annum interest to be payable semi-annually.

Applications were at the start of the meeting this afternoon that a number of bids would be received for the bonds.

GAY NIGHT PAGEANT WITH MOVIE STARS IN LINE TO FEATURE ANNUAL SHRINE CONCLAVE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 4.—A \$1,000,000 motion picture electrical pageant, the most colorful display in the history of Shrine meetings, is the highlight of the 55th annual conclave, which opens here June 4.

Parading before 20,000 spectators in Los Angeles Coliseum, 40 illuminated floats, forming a line two miles long, will be interspersed by movie stars riding in brilliantly lighted automobiles.

In addition to seven major events scheduled as the entertainment features, five performances of a circus and several parades will be held in the huge stadium.

The absolute lack of hotel accommodations will force many of the 100,000 delegates and their families to live in special trains which will bear them here.

Although the formal opening of the three-day convention will not take place until June 6, a special pre-convention trip to Catalina Island is planned for June 3.

A march of 40 Shrine bands and thousands of Shriners in colorful regalia to the coliseum will take place the first day. The parade is in honor of Leo P. Youngworth, who will be elected imperial potentate at the meeting.

Following the afternoon festivities,

a real Hawaiian banquet will be served to the delegates and their wives at the Biltmore hotel. Many special dishes, peculiar to the Hawaiian Islands, will be prepared by a native chef.

Plan Spanish Fiesta

The second day some 6,000 Shriners will travel by special train to Santa Susanna, where they will participate in a Spanish fiesta and barbecue. The roasting of whole steers and the preparing of fiery Spanish dishes is to be one unusual feature.

Thousands of marchers will carry illuminated novelties in the Oriental parade to be given that night. At the close of the brilliant spectacle two formal balls will open at the Biltmore and Ambassador hotels.

"High Jinks," and unusual features have been promised for the closing day, which will be featured by the election of officers for the coming year. In the evening, the electrical motion picture pageant, the outstanding feature of the convention, will be held.

Election of the imperial outer guard, lowest ranking officer, is the only one which will occasion any considerable attention at the meet-

ing, since all other officers move up one grade.

Besides Imperial Potentate-elect Youngworth, other officers to be elected at the Los Angeles convention are:

Eastern A. Fletcher of Damascus Temple, Rochester, N. Y., deputy imperial potentate; Thomas J. Houston of Medinah Temple, Chicago, imperial chief rabbi; James H. Price of Acca Temple, Richmond, imperial assistant rabbi; William S. Brown of Syria Temple, Pittsburgh, imperial high priest and prophet; Earl C. Mills of Za-Ga-Zig Temple, Des Moines, imperial recorder; Clifford Ireland of Mohammed Temple, Peoria, Ill., imperial treasurer; John N. Sebrill, Jr., of Khedive Temple, Norfolk, Va., imperial guide; Dana S. Williams of Kora Temple, Lewiston, Me., imperial first ceremonial master; Leonard P. Stuart of Almas Temple, Washington, imperial ceremonial master; Hugh M. Caldwell of Nile Temple, Seattle, imperial marshal; Clyde I. Webster of Moslem Temple, Detroit, imperial captain of the guard.

One of the most important moves by the Shriners during the coming

year will be advancement of the crippled children movement, according to Imperial Potentate-elect Youngworth.

New Head Tells Aims

"During the last seven years we have erected 15 hospitals in which we have cared for more than 30,000 children of all races and creeds," he said. "During the coming year we plan to erect three more."

"They will be situated in western New York, Kentucky and Pittsburgh. Other than that, I have no definite plans. I hope to increase and direct in a definite way the basic ideas of the Mystic Shrine, which are the promotion of friendship, happiness and the doing of charitable deeds in a big way."

Youngworth is a practicing attorney of the firm of Youngworth, McLean & Hartman in Los Angeles. He is married and has three children.

As a post-convention feature, approximately 600 Shriners will board the liner Maipo on a four-day trip to the Hawaiian Islands. The pilgrimage is to the Aloha Temple in honor of Youngworth.

Are we about to return to the charming manners of the eighteenth century, when friends and acquaintances met together in the evenings, not to play bridge, but to indulge in conversation, sometimes of the wildest character, as the memoirs of the time record so well?

Certainly it is true that many young Parisian couples, tired of bridge, love to meet in each other's houses not only for conversation, but to play those old games, written or spoken, that give an opportunity of sharpening one's wit. Informal engagements for dinner are made among friends who know each other well, and without the formality of dressing, they meet solely for the pleasure of passing the evening in each other's company.

Sometimes after an evening at a good film other friends drop in, and play like children until a late hour. Here is a revived form of amusement which costs nothing and has met with immense success.

If one does not "dress," then what sort of a gown should be worn on these occasions?

Just a pretty, simple afternoon gown, with its completing hat which is as important as the frock itself, and is never taken off, in accordance with the old tradition that when a woman wears a high-necked long-sleeved gown she should always wear a hat also.

Most of our most fashionable women spend their day in sports clothes, changing in the evening to a frock of satin or crepe de chine.

Charming gowns, with frills, short skirts, long sleeves, very slightly décolleté in a simple round or pointed line, usually black, are worn for these evening in, by modish lamps with soft-colored shades. Some women prefer gray or rose-beige to black, two delicate shades, as much in the mode as they ever were, especially in crepe satin or in a supple flat crepe. No embroidery, no trimming, but a movement of drapery, which is trimming in itself, sometimes in the front of the skirt sometimes to one or both sides. The play of floating panels, scallopes, or flying flounces, gives a woman a look of wings that is most attractive, especially in chiffon.

Occasionally, a woman who loves eccentricity, chooses for such an evening a frock in printed gauze, or chiffon, dark ground with a scattering of bright flowers, short in front, trailing one end on the floor in the back, with immense sleeves, like those of an Arab's robe. A gown which is neither an afternoon model nor an evening one, but just between the two, is the best type for such a reunion.

Nothing is prettier, with such gowns, than the black velvet cap like that worn by Pierrot, in the pantomime. A beautiful jeweled pin is placed on front or at the side, sometimes even in the nape of the neck.

Other jewels are indispensable, such as pendants on a long chain, or a large brooch on the shoulder, or holding the drapery on one hip. The mode demands that each woman possess her special jewel, made for her, from stones of great beauty, expressive of her own taste.

Shoes have never been more important in the ensemble than they are today. For these occasions, they must be black, either simple or of complicated cut, but with an appearance of simplicity. The prettiest of all is a sandal, which seems to be nothing more than two crossed bands holding a sole as thin as a piece of paper. An acceptable model is the pump in black satin, with a buckle of real stones.

Bracelets are numerous, worn outside the long sleeve, and another accessory is the huge chiffon handkerchief, often of brilliant color. The black is tiny, of black velvet, with a diamond fastening, just big enough to hold the vanity case.

And dressed like this, our young matron sets out for an evening of wit, for, gifted with a quick tongue, and a ready repartee, she enjoys nothing more than to put her talents against her friendly adversaries in all sorts of games. When the games are over, discussion begins, and that is often the most amusing part of all.

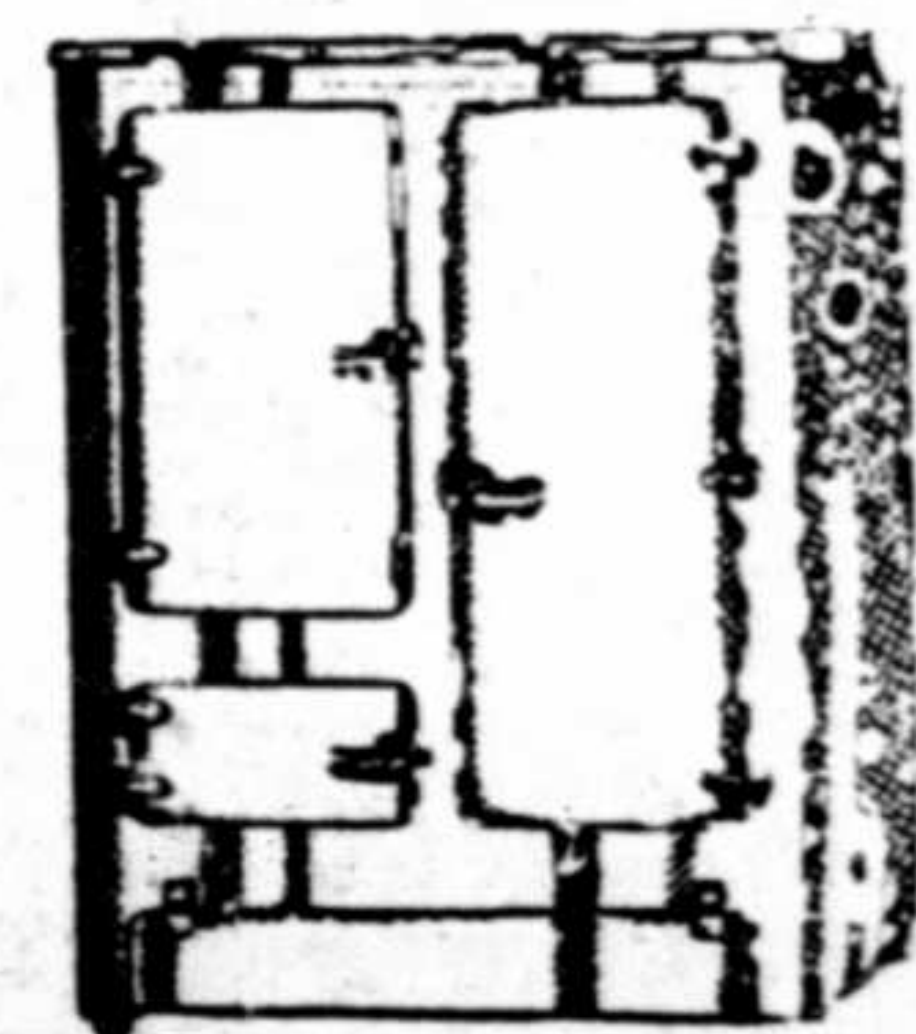

GALVESTON, HOUSTON AND DONNA MIXES CALLED OFF

(By Associated Press)
GALVESTON, June 4.—Acting under orders from Governor Dan Moody transmitted in person by Ranger Captain Frank Hamer, Benno Sproule, Galveston fight promoter, called off the boxing card scheduled at the municipal auditorium here last night.

Nearly one thousand people had gathered in front of the auditorium to see the card which was headlined by two negro heavyweights, Long Tom Hawkins of San Diego, Calif., and Al Walker of New York. UKIAH, Cal., June 4.—Sheriff R. R. Byrnes, announced today that Tom Le Hew, 22, wood chopper, confessed he attacked and killed Teresa Johnson, 6, in the woods near Mendocino City last week. "I just went haywire," Le Hew told Sheriff Byrnes, who said a charge of murder would be placed against the man. Le Hew told of waiting for the child to walk through the woods on her way home from school. As she walked down the path, with her school books and lunch box in her arms, Le Hew leaped upon the girl, attacked her, and then choked her to death.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 4.—(P)—Ensign Henry P. Gow was killed and H. C. Neumann, mechanic, escaped death by jumping with a parachute when a navy plane from North Island dived 10,000 feet near Nestor, Calif., Monday.

A navy report said the plane fell as a result of a broken wing.

HOSPITAL FIRE PROBE ORDERED

CHICAGO, June 4.—(P)—The Chicago General hospital was swept by fire at 1 a. m. today, and although 17 patients, several doctors and nurses were in the building, all escaped unhurt. Some were carried down ladders by firemen. Passersby, seeing the fire, ran into the smoke-filled rooms and brought others out.

The fire started in the laundry room and was confined to one side of the building.

Chief Fire Marshal Michael J. Corrigan was particularly interested in the quantity of x-ray films stored in the hospital. He said he would start an immediate investigation into the careless manner in which the x-ray films were left in a jumbled heap in a room dangerously close to the flames.

"If the flames had reached the film, he would have had a disaster similar to that in Cleveland," he said.

The Mallon Case
An American newspaper reporter,
Paul Mallon, of the United Press,
recently refused to tell the senate
committee who gave him the
roll call on the nomination of
Irvin L. Larnett, as judge of the
court of customs appeals.

The average layman might brand
such resolute silence before a dis-
tinguished body as contemptible, but
under the surface of Mallon's re-
fusal there is something tenable.
Long ago the supreme court con-
firmed his right to refuse.

The newspaper man who betrays a
confidence is unworthy of the co-
operation he receives and is depend-
ent upon in daily contacts. His
code of ethics pledges him to the
same privacy with which bankers
deal with their clients.

From the beginning the American
public has demanded information as to
the actions of its servants. The
newspaper is the medium through
which the public serves those ac-
tions, and if the press fails in sup-
plying that information it fails in
its obligation.

The public official who clandestinely
hides records from the
reporter is not feigning an indepen-
dence which concerns the newspaper
only, but he is saying to his con-
stituents by his actions, "It is none
of your business what I am doing."

The New Age
It is a long time since the steam-
er Vestria went to the bottom off
the Virginia capes, carrying 100
people down with her, but new facts
about the tragedy are still coming
out.

At the present inquiry in London
it is disclosed that the steamer was
considerably overloaded when it
cleared from New York, and com-
petent witnesses have testified that
this was a contributory cause to
her sinking.

The citizen who embarks on a
steamship has not naturally, any
way on earth of telling whether the
vessel is loaded properly or equipped
properly. Things of the sea are a
closed book to most landmen. To
make a sea voyage is to perform an
act of faith—faith that unknown
men have been conscientious and
thorough in the performance of
their duties.

Indeed, this is becoming increas-
ingly true of everything we do.
Never before was the average man
so much under the necessity of tak-
ing it for granted that his fellow
men would be upright and capable.
The machine age might well be called
the age of faith.

You do not have to make a sea
voyage to demonstrate this. Every
day of your life you stake your life
on faith that the men you meet
will do their parts properly.

For instance, you drive along a
street in your automobile at a
speed of 30 miles an hour. Com-
ing toward you on the left, is a
stream of autos going the other di-
rection. The cars whiz past you at
a speed equal to your own, missing
you by a scant two or three feet.

You are putting up your life on the
faith that none of these drivers
is drunk or incompetent, or
near-sighted. If one of those cars
should swerve slightly out of line
you would have a bad smashup
that would probably kill you—but
you simply take it for granted that
all of these unknown drivers are
men as good as yourself.

You could find a similar instance
in almost every hour of your daily
routine. The whole complicated
fabric of modern life is held to-
gether by nothing in the world but
faith.

That is why the bungler—the
careless, witless incompetent—is
able to do more harm today than
ever before in history.

In the old days it usually took a
certain amount of malice to bring
about a disaster. Today a moment's
inattention on the part of the
most well-meaning of men can have
fearful consequences. Incompetence

utes! That's a lot of automobiles

Consider for a moment that the
average Lubbock automobile's pur-
chase price is \$880 the total num-
ber of machines passing Sunday re-
view at Broadway and Avenue N
will show initial expenditure of four
million dollars—providing, of course,
that the arithmetic The Plainman
studied had the right dope.

Seriously speaking, the figures
thus compiled are nothing short
of stupendous. The growth of
the automotive business in
this country during the past few
years. These figures are not only
indicative of American prosper-
ity and genius but they are
indicative also of American in-
dustriousness and the willingness of
the average American to accept
new things—and make use of them.

It is not a far cry to the day when
the automobile was something un-
usual. And it's not that far back
when the "gasoline buggy" was con-
sidered a luxury—a plaything for
the rich man who hadn't enough
other ways to spend his money. To-
day the automobile is a necessity

The office of the county tax col-

was a squawking infant there
were a few brave souls who had
faith in the future and backed
their faith with their dollars.
Today you'll hear those men's
names mentioned whenever "big
money" is the topic of conver-
sation. Today, the airplane in-
dustry is at the point where the
automobile industry was 20 or
25 years ago. Whether the same
opportunity for riches holds
good is a matter of personal
opinion but it's one cinch well
most of us live to find out.

Speaking of airplanes makes most
of us think of the local airport sit-
uation. Now that it's all over but
the shouting, weren't we a bunch of
humbugs not to get in the bugs?
A couple of years ago and step out

and if The Plainman wanted to be
sassy he'd say "I told you so!"

You take Amarillo, for instance—
located about 140 miles north of
here. They've got an airport there
now and it's in operation. They've
got two airlines that The Plain-

from Kansas City to Los Angeles,

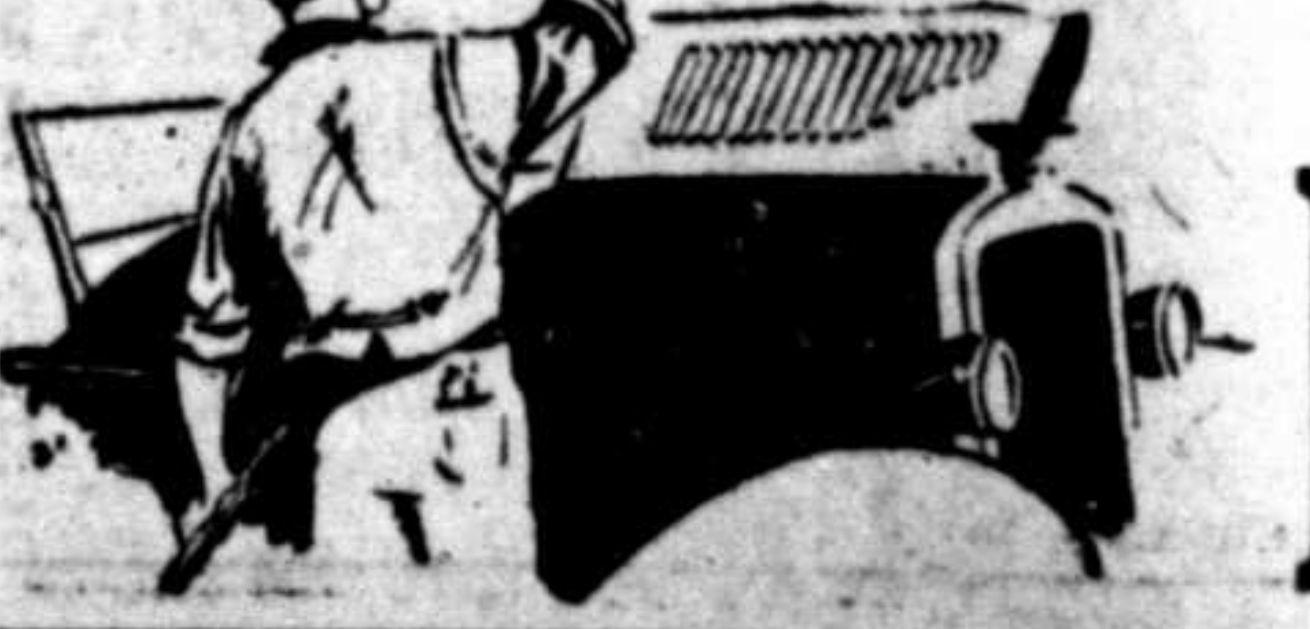
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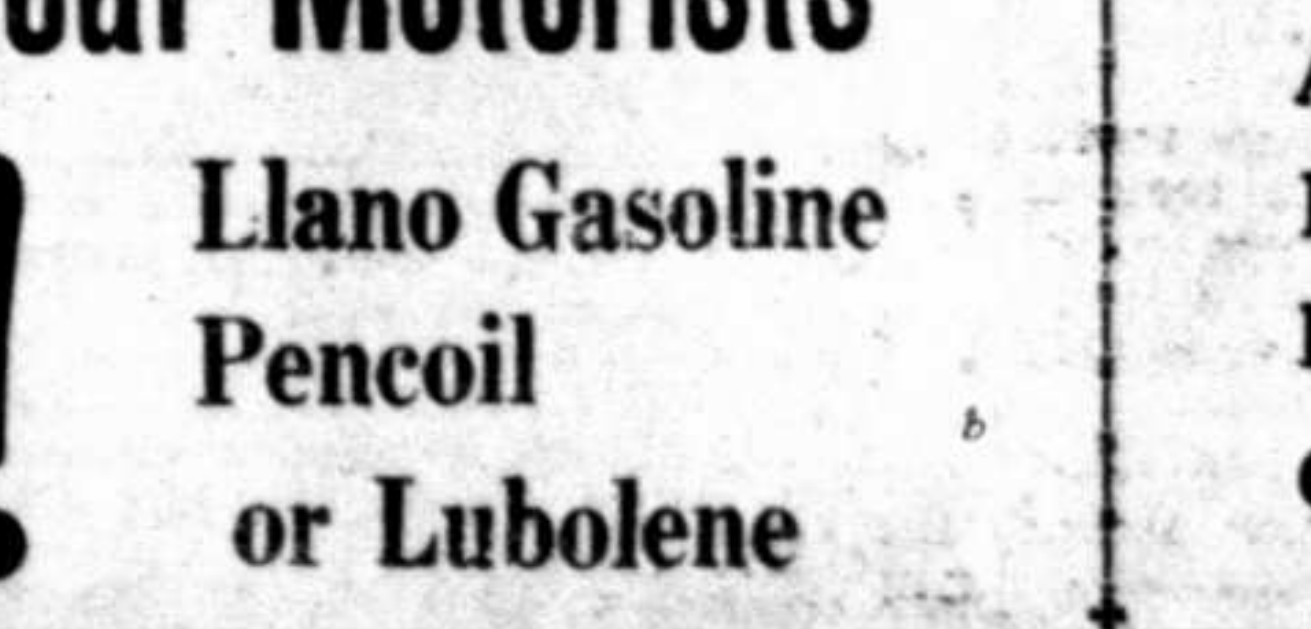
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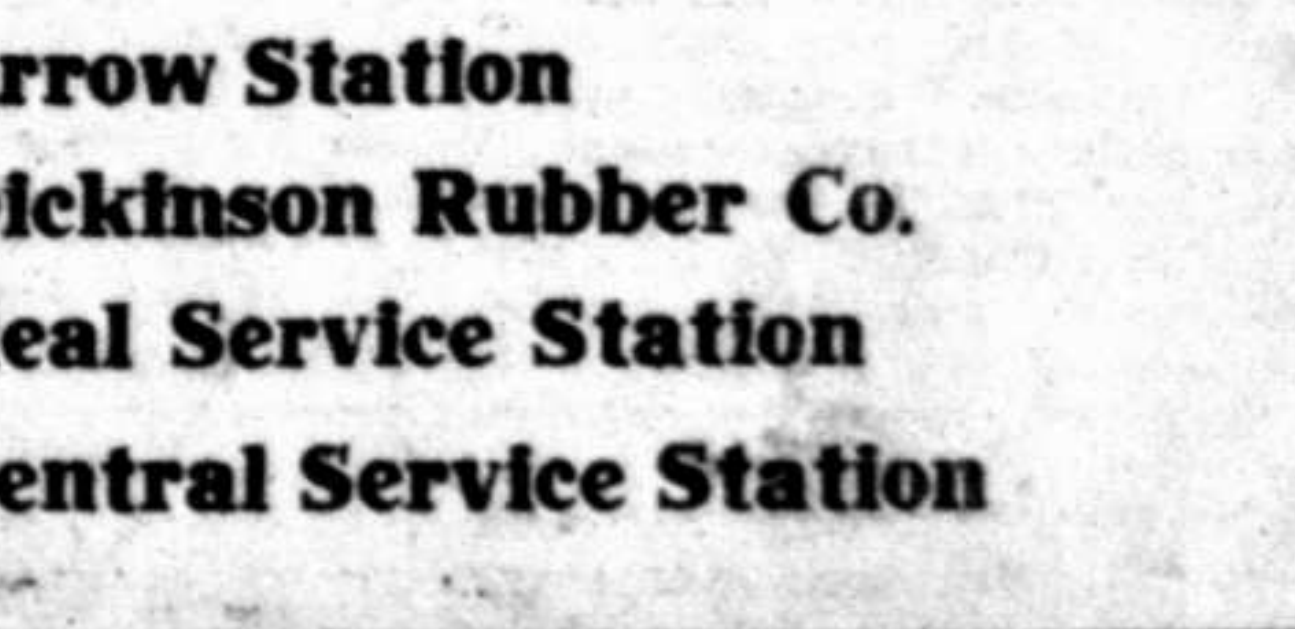

Great Britain got a new parliament, but no majority government out of the general elections last week.

The labor party, in the greatest triumph of its history, swept conservatives and liberals alike before it to roll up a total of 267 seats in the next House of Commons, but fell 21 seats short of the 308 necessary for an absolute majority.

Liberals Hold Balance

The liberals who made a tremendous effort under the leadership of David Lloyd-George, held the balance of power by increasing their representation from 46 to 54.

Meanwhile, the relapse of King George, again in a sickbed at Windsor castle, contributes to the uneasiness felt in Britain over the parliamentary situation.

Although His Majesty's physicians announced his condition was satisfactory, they admitted his recovery would be slow from an abscess under the old scar of the lung incision made while he was undergoing treatment for emphysema, last winter.

U. S. CRUISER PLANS GIVEN

PROVISIONS FOR NEW SHIPS TO BE MADE IN NEXT BUDGET

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The American cruiser building program will be carried forward by President Hoover as laid down by Congress and provision for new ships will be made in the next federal budget.

The administration recognizes that work toward construction of 15 additional 10,000-ton fighting ships is made mandatory under the program until an agreement for reduction of sea armaments is reached by the leading nations and ratified by the Senate.

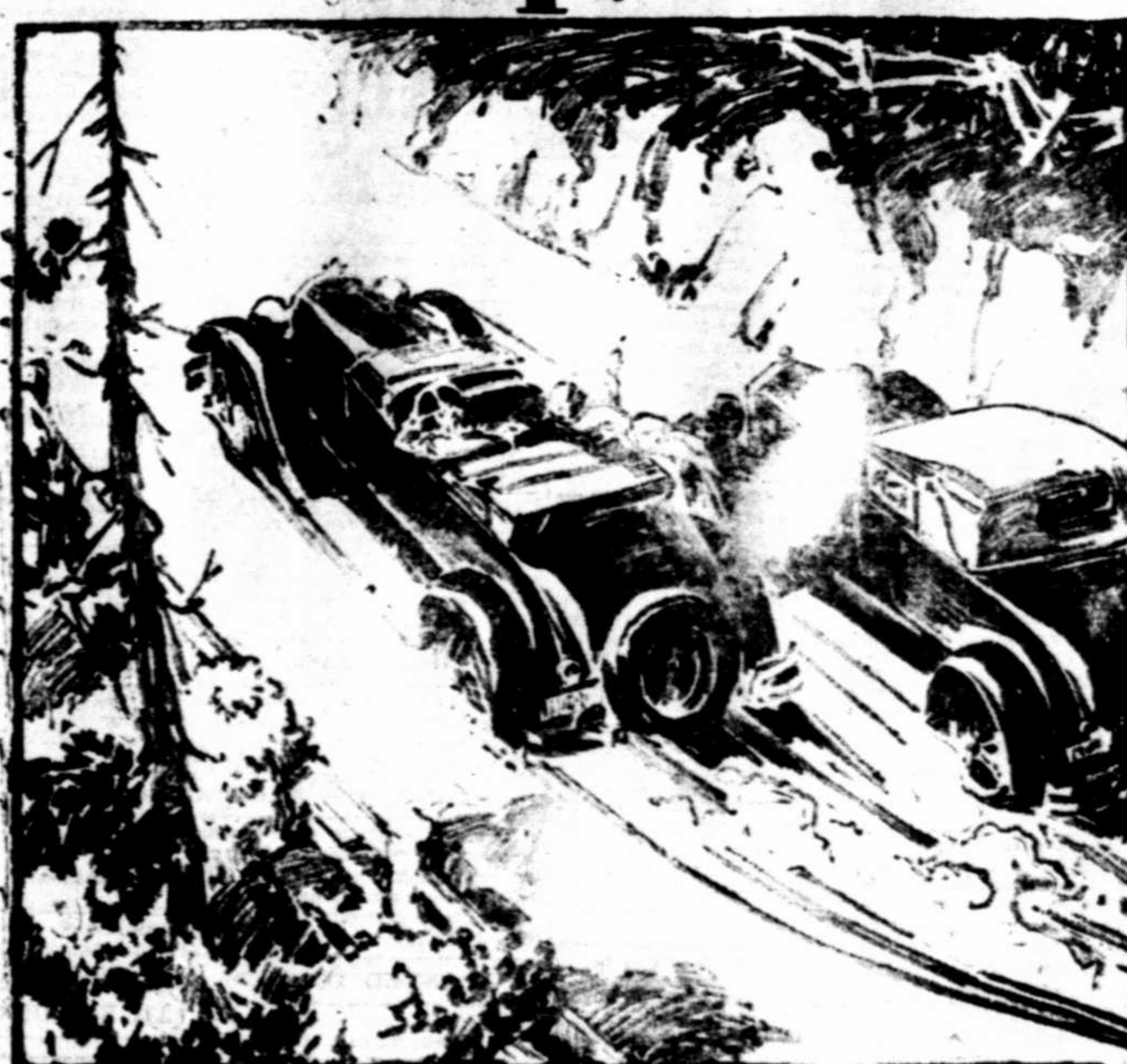

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Congress today appeared to be assured of a summer vacation of at least two months, if not three.

House rules were in effect to limit debate and speed up action on amendments to the Senate bill providing for the 1930 census and re-apportionment of the House membership, one of the measures President Hoover wants to see enacted before a recess.

Finance Group Meets

The Senate finance committee was called upon to complete its program looking to the fulfillment of another of his pre-vacation requirements, assurance of enactment of tariff legislation before the regular session in December. After adopting plans designed to assure completion of its own job of rewriting the House bill by mid-August, it put off until today selection of dates for a Senate vote on the bill.

The present tax is two cents. Representative Holder's bill is a double-barrel proposition, proposing a reduction of 50 per cent in the motor registration fees.

During the special session the House passed a bill reducing registration fees on privately owned passenger automobiles 35 per cent, and the committee had sanctioned a four cent gasoline tax.

ORDERS ARE ISSUED

AUSTIN, June 4 (AP)—The Supreme court has issued a temporary writ of prohibition to restrain clerks of Courts of Civil Appeals from destroying records of cases at any time pending in the courts.

Compress Men Seek Action From Court

The order was entered on application of Joe Brown, former assistant attorney general, representing the Gulf Production company.

Under a law passed by the first called session of the legislature clerks of appellate courts were authorized to destroy records in cases that had been disposed of for a period of 10 years or more.

Brown and other attorneys contended that under this law many important records, especially those involving land cases, could be irreparably lost.

A bill to repeal the law will be introduced at this special session. Brown announced.

MARY CULBERTSON WEDS ENGLISHMAN

DAUGHTER OF LATE TEXAS SENATOR MARRIES AS SEVEN YEAR COURTSHIP IS ENDED

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, June 4.—The New York Herald Tribune said today that Miss Mary Culbertson, daughter of the late U. S. Senator Charles A. Culbertson of Texas, had informed relatives she was married in New York Sunday to Alexander E. Robertson, England world war veteran, after a courtship of seven years.

Mr. Robertson in 1922 charged that private detectives were attempting to drive him from this country because of his affection for Miss Culbertson. He caused the arrest of one detective on a charge of kidnapping, but an indictment returned in Newark, N. J., was dismissed when the court was informed Robertson had refused to testify.

The courtship started when both he and Miss Culbertson were students at the University of Texas, at Austin. Mr. Robertson had come to this country in 1919 after serving in France with England's "first hundred thousand" to volunteer after the outbreak of war. He was gassed and shell shocked.

Major H. M. Reed, professor of English at Virginia Military Institute, a cousin of Miss Culbertson, told the Herald Tribune his wife was informed of the marriage by Miss Culbertson, but she did not say where it had been performed. At the municipal building here there is no record of a marriage license.

Robertson was to have come to this city yesterday to begin employment with the banking firm of Dillon, Reed & Company, but it was said there he had phoned from Washington that he wouldn't report before today. Mr. Robertson, since coming to this country, has resided at times with an aunt, Mrs. May Andrews at Bloomfield, N. J.

AUSTIN, June 4 (AP)—Lieut. Governor Barry Miller of Dallas Monday heard himself introduced as a candidate for governor and did not remonstrate.

In turning the gavel over to the lieutenant governor, at the joint session of the legislature to honor pilots of the endurance ship Fort Worth, Speaker of the House W. S. Barron said:

"I present Lieutenant Governor Miller who has had the degree of bachelor of laws, and may be doctor of divinity, conferred on him recently, and a candidate for governor."

"Speaker Barron got slightly mixed in interpreting that D. D. business," Lieutenant Governor Miller replied. "The D. D. does not stand for anything but Durn Democra."

The degree of bachelor of laws was conferred on Lieut. Governor Miller by St. Edwards university Sunday.

WILBUR EMPOWERED
