County Farmers Eligible For Insurance Increase

Farmers in Farmer County are eligible for a 25 percent increase in irrigated wheat insurance benefits under the All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance program for the 1975 crop, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture representatives. Mike E. Custer, field representative from the District Office at 1205 Texas Avenue, Room 214, Lubbock, said recently that insured farmers are now able to value their guaranteed production under the FCIC program at \$2.50 per bushel compared to \$2 a year ago. In addition, the federal agency has given Farmer County wheat producers a virtual "pat-on-the-back" by increasing its production guarantees for the 1975 crop year based largely upon good insurance experience in the area due to good farming practices. Custer will be in the county for the next few days advising farmers of the FCIC program changes and taking applications from those interested in participating in the volunteer insurance program. He may be contacted through the FCIC District Office or the local ASCS County Office. During the 36 years Federal Crop Insurance has been available to farmers, the program has underwritten the local farm economy in Texas by protecting growing wheat crops with an insured value in excess of \$11.7 million.

Disposal Inadequate - -

City Commissioners Discuss Solid Waste

Discussion of the Farwell solid waste disposal site highlighted the Tuesday evening meeting of the Farwell City Commissioners at City Hall. Mayor Gil Patschke reported on a letter from the Texas State Department of Health citing five violations of the Municipal Solid Waste Rules, Standards and Regulations. Roland Dove, a representative from the State Health Department, inspected the solid waste disposal site on April 10 and following items were found to be in violation: Improper earth covering procedures. Improper disposal of hazardous materials. Conditions favorable for proliferation of rats. Improperly covered solid waste transport vehicles are being used. Solid waste transport vehicles allow leakage of liquids. Suggestions for compliance and new equipment for compaction were discussed. Commissioners will check into a used garbage compaction unit located in Friona as well as the purchase of a truck bed on which to mount the compaction unit. Proposal plans regarding the implementation of needed corrections are to be submitted to the Texas State Department of Health within 30 days from the date of the letter of May 16. Commissioners accepted a bid from McDaniels, Inc. of Clovis for work on the Farwell Fire Department. The bid included \$390.00 for the preparation of floors, installation of vinyl base and installation of vinyl asbestos tile in the kitchen, bath, living room and bedroom and \$25.00 for moving appliances and furniture. A rate proposal from Southwestern Public Service Co. was accepted and Commissioners noted that this was the third time since 1942 that the company has asked for a rate increase. Concerning a rate increase for Southern Union Gas Co., Fred Chandler requested an explanation and additional information before any action is to be taken. Chandler reported on the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission manpower meeting which he attended in Amarillo. No action was taken on a summer manpower program pending a conference with County Judge Archie Tarter. Mayor Patschke appointed Jim Berry to meet with city employees and report back to the Commission on a retirement system for city employees. In other business, Commissioners noted that the air conditioning unit in City Hall is not working, bills were approved for payment and attorney Charles Aycock reported that paving receipts were being received on schedule.

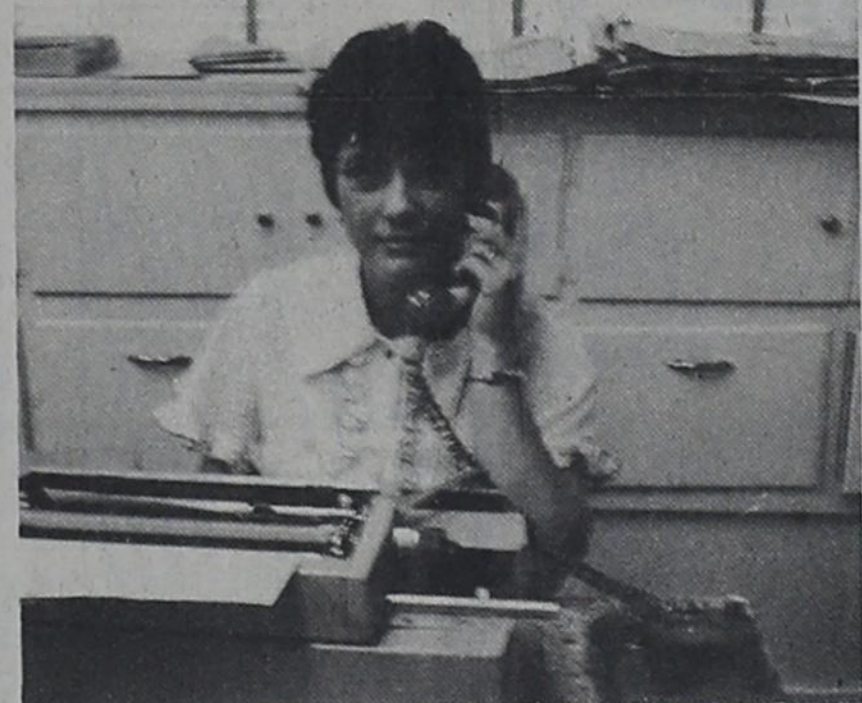
Texico City Commission Meets In Regular Session

Texico City Commissioners met Tuesday at 6:30 MDT in City Hall to discuss an agenda ranging from the hiring of a pool manager, to resurfacing of streets. No firm decision was reached on hiring a pool manager, pending the Commissioners' interview of an applicant. Action on resurfacing all paved streets in Texico was tabled pending receipt of specifications. A lengthy discussion of rates on out-of-city limits water and sewer charges resulted in Commissioners asking for an evaluation of last year's rates and expenditures. Commissioners passed a motion to leave a trailer at the city garbage dump to facilitate weekend disposal in the proper place, rather than dumping at various sites around the dump. In other business Commissioners authorized the purchase of a fire extinguisher for the patrol car, and put off for the next meeting a discussion on garbage rates. City Clerk Clara Wiehl was authorized by the Commissioners to collect donations for the purchase of an emergency vehicle for the Texico Fire Dept. Funds will be put in an escrow account pending purchase of the vehicle. Records will be kept in the event that the purchase is not made so the money can be returned to donors. In other business bills were approved for payment.

Primary Election - -

New Mexico Voters Go To Polls Tuesday

Qualified registered New Mexico voters will go to the polls Tuesday, June 4, to cast ballots in the Democratic and Republican primaries to elect a U.S. Representative, Governor, Lt. Governor and other state, county and local officials. According to County Clerk Angeline Stanley polls in the county will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Thirty-six voting precincts will be open in Curry County. Absentee voting closed Thursday at 4 p.m. Voters in Texico will cast their ballots at City Hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m., according to City Clerk Clara Wiehl. The race for U.S. Representative pits incumbent Democrat Harold Runnels and Republican Donald W. Trubey. Democratic candidates for Governor include Boston E. Witt, Drew Cloud, Odie Echols Jr., Bobby M. Mayfield, Berg Hughes, Jerry Apodaca and Tibo J. Chavez, while the Republican candidates are Walter E. Bruce Jr., Joseph R. Skeen, John P. Eastham and James Lindberg Hughes. Democratic candidates for Lt. Governor include Fred Chavez Jr., Les Houston, Kenneth E. Wallin, Robert E. Ferguson and Raymond Garcia. Juan Raigoza and Virgil O. Rhodes are the Republican candidates. Other state offices up for consideration by the voters are Secretary of State, State Auditor, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Commissioner of Public Lands, State Corporation Commission, Justice of the State Supreme Court, Judge of the Court of Appeals and State Board of Education. In local races for State Representative, Hoyt Pattison, Republican candidate, District 63 is unopposed; H.B. Barnard, Democratic candidate District 64 is also unopposed; and for District 65 Democratic candidate John Hays Jr. and Republican candidate Anna L. Thomas are opponents. Democratic candidates for District Magistrate have no Republican opponents. Wandel Massey is candidate for Division I, and Division II candidates are Val Baumgart and James W. Henderson. Democratic candidates for County Commissioner First District have no Republican opponents. Melvin Estes, Democrat, is unopposed in his race for County Commissioner Second District, and Calvin Stout, Democratic candidate for County Commissioner Third District has no opponent. Incumbent Democratic candidate Angeline L. Stanley has no opposition for the office of County Clerk. Three Democratic candidates are vying for the office of County Treasurer: Ernestine C. Tucker, Oscar P. Cantwell, and Flora E. Urioste. Alyce Pat Williams, Democratic candidate for County Assessor has no opposition. Democratic candidates R. B. Boney and L. B. Redwine are vying for the position of County Sheriff. Opponents for Probate Judge are A. C. Olona, Democrat, and Harry M. Pierce, Republican.

Oh, ho! In an editorial last Sunday, the Friona Star gave us a peek at the real reason why there seems to be some opposition in Friona to the new Law Enforcement addition to the County Courthouse. It apparently boils down to a desire on the part of some elements in Friona to let the Courthouse fall into a state of disrepair with the hopes of, at a later date, rebuilding it in Friona. We can understand the desire of some in that community for the Courthouse. We could not understand the reason for saying that the building was in bad shape, when obviously it is in very good physical condition. We could not understand the call for a "study" when the need for more room for the County Sheriff's department has been under study for several years. In short, the hypocrisy of the reasons for opposition to improvements have been exposed, and the real reason has surfaced. Some folks in Friona want to take the Courthouse away from Farwell and rebuild it in Friona. Possibly they can, but it will be only at the expense of all the taxpayers in the county. At the present time it would be economic folly to discard the very serviceable present building in favor of a completely new structure. All persons in the county would be called upon to pay for this bit of nonsense and we suspect that the saddle-sore taxpayer may not be inclined to add to his already heavy tax burden to appease the civic aspirations of some people in the Friona area. In the meantime, let's all realize that opposition to the Law Enforcement Center is an emotional thing rather than any opposition based upon fact. *****

Now is a good time to suggest to the citizens of Farwell that they begin to think of expanding the size of the city council. Currently, Farwell is governed by a mayor and two councilmen. This makes for a pretty busy group when it comes to handling the city's business. It also prevents the council from transacting appointed business when two members are absent, as has happened in the past. It narrows the spectrum of thought and representation of viewpoints when city problems are presented to the council. This will become of increasing importance as the community continues to grow and a greater diversity of interest is generated within the community. We do not know of any of our sister cities in the area that restrict their city governments to only three representatives. We also do not know the reason for the original choice of the size of the city council, but do feel that we have outgrown the three-member variety. Farwell will have another City Council election next April, and it would be a good thing if there were from five to seven places to be filled at that time. This expansion of the City Council will probably take some charter amending or some ordinance passing, so now is not too soon to begin the legal wheels turning on this project. Your thoughts on this subject will be welcomed by this column and this newspaper. Let us know these thoughts.

Tips On Economics

As soon as warm temperatures are here to stay - for most of Texas, late April or May - many homemakers like to "send" houseplants outside. But place them in a shady location. Most grow naturally in the shade of other plants - and are damaged by strong, direct sunlight, warns Dr. William C. Welch, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

July 15 Deadline - -

Growers Urged To Certify For Acreage Programs

It is time for growers to certify their wheat, barley, oat and rye acreages under the 1974 farm programs, according to Prentice Mills, County Executive Director of the Soil Conservation Service.

Any acreage of small grain that a farmer wants (or needs) to have made a matter of record should be measured and certified before harvest and before any other use is made of the land planted to the crop. Farmers will sign that they intend to participate in the program(s) at the time they certify their acreage.

The question has been asked "Why sign to participate in the 1974 farm programs?" There are at least three reasons which are or can be important. They are as follows:

1. It behooves farmers to protect their farm's allotments. They do this by measuring their acreages and reporting them to their ASCS office during the sign-up period.

2. A farmer who signs to participate in the programs has automatic insurance coverage on the crops planted on the farm. He will probably receive some benefits in the event that the farm's 1974 production is low due to adverse weather, insects, or other circumstances beyond the farmer's control.

3. A participating farm is eligible for a deficiency payment should such payments be triggered by a low market price. Certainly, it is hoped that the market will never go that low; however, no one can predict what might happen in the coming marketing year.

One other thing not mentioned above is that the wheat, feed grains, cotton, soybeans and other price supported crops produced on a participating farm are eligible for

price support through the loan program. This loan program is sometimes a useful marketing tool. If a farmer has a disaster strike his crop, he should contact the ASCS office and report the situation before doing anything to the land where the crop is planted. He should know, by carefully measuring, the acreages involved before contacting the ASCS office.

What does it take for a farm to be eligible for all program benefits? Farmers must plant a total acreage of crops for harvest equal to the total allotments for their farm or the farm will lose allotments for 1975, according to ASCS officials. However, if a farmer doesn't have enough crops

planted to protect the farm's allotments, he may waive deficiency payments on one or more of the crops and protect the farm's allotments for 1975. This applies even if there is actually no payment due in 1974.

Attention Won't Spoil Baby

COLLEGE STATION -- Picking up and soothing a crying baby won't spoil him, one authority says.

"Nor will it make him even fussier in the future," Dr. Jennie Kitching, specialist in family life education with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, added.

She cited results of studies by Ainsworth and Bell, child development researchers, who found that mothers who are unresponsive to the crying of tiny infants tend to have babies who cry more often later on.

"However, mothers who attend to infant crying almost every time and respond with little delay have babies whose non-crying communication has more variety, subtlety and clarity."

According to the Ainsworth and Bell studies, when a baby's signals (both crying and non-crying) are responded to promptly and appropriately, he builds up a sense of competence.

"In other words, he gains confidence that he can control what happens to him through his own activity.

"This confidence, in turn, carries over into his transaction with the physical environment -- and affects the level and quality of his behavior and play," the specialist added.

WHO CAN BE AGAINST US?

We have shown in a previous article that God is for sinners and desires their good. We have shown how He proved this by paying for their sins Himself as God the Son at Calvary. But if this is so, how much more must it be so with regard to His own children who have trusted Christ as their Savior?

How often—and how significantly—the Apostle Paul uses the words "for us" in this connection!

In Eph. 5:2 we read that "Christ... loved us, and hath given Himself for us." In Rom. 8:3 we are told that "while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." In II Cor. 5:21 "God hath made Him to be sin for us." And in Gal. 3:13 we read: "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us."

And the love that brought Him down from heaven to die in shame and disgrace for our sins is not affected by our many failures as Christians now.

In Heb. 9:24 we read that our Lord has ascended to heaven "now to appear in the presence of God for us."

In Rom. 8:34 we learn that He is "at the right hand of God" to "make intercession for us." And in Heb. 7:25 we read that He is able to save us "unto the uttermost" because "He ever lives to make intercession for us."

Our failures now, after having trusted Christ as Savior, may—and should—trouble our conscience and thus hinder our fellowship with God. This does not change the fact that God's dear children through faith in Christ, who died for all our sins and, unworthy though we still may be, God would have us come into His presence and be spiritually renewed. Our Lord's intercession for us in time of failure is most comforting. As a boy the writer often sang an old church hymn, part of which went thus:

Five bleeding wounds He bears,
Received at Calvary,
They pour effectual prayers,
They strongly plead for me,
Forgive him, oh, forgive, they cry,
Nor let that ransomed sinner die.

What shall we then say to these things? IF GOD BE FOR US WHO CAN BE AGAINST US? (Rom. 8:31).

On The Farm In Parmer County

Exciting things happen during Roundup time in Texas, at least as far as some 1,800 4-H boys and girls are concerned. 4-H Roundup marks the occasion when district 4-H contest winners gather on the Texas A&M University campus to compete for top honors in some 30 different events. These range from livestock judging and public speaking to demonstrations on foods and nutrition and safety. Those who compete have been named winners in their respective counties and districts.

Texas 4-H Roundup, one of the oldest annual statewide 4-H events in the nation, is slated for June 4-5. The State 4-H Food Show on June 4 is held in conjunction with Roundup. In addition to the throngs of youth, some 600 adults, including county Extension agents, 4-H leaders, friends of 4-H, mass media representatives, contest donors and members of the board of directors of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, will also be on hand. T. Louis Austin of Dallas, president of Texas Utilities Co., chairs the board.

Roundup activities will officially get under way with a general assembly at 5:30 p.m. on June 4 in J. Earl Rudder Center. Dean of Agriculture Dr. H. O. Kunkel will welcome the group. Special awards will be presented to 10 individuals, businesses and mass media representatives who have made outstanding contributions to 4-H. Winners of 10 \$4,000 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scholarships will also be announced.

Twenty-five outstanding 4-H leaders (two from each of the 13 Extension Service districts except one) will be recognized at a luncheon on June 5.

Contest and demonstration winners and donors will be honored at a special recognition program that evening at 8 o'clock in the Rudder Center.

Eight 4-H youngsters will attend 4-H Roundup from Parmer County. Jacquelyn Langford will be one of four girls in District I to compete in the State 4-H Food Show. Scotty Gilliam will give his Farm and Ranch Management Demonstration. Cheryl Gohlke and Susan Mimms will present their demonstration in Landscape Horticulture, and Donnie Gustin, Rocky Bartlett, Haden Walling and Miki Blackburn will judge dairy cattle at College Station.

The group will be accompanied by Extension Agents Mack Heald and Jana Pronger and by Mrs. Houston Bartlett and Mrs. Leland Gustin.

All cattle under two years of age should be vaccinated for blackleg every year.

Blackleg is a disease which is usually fatal to young cattle. The death or lameness of the best young calf in a herd often signals an outbreak of the disease. The most common sign that an animal has the disease is a swelling of the heavy muscles in the hip and shoulder.

Blackleg has been around for a long time and seems to show up wherever cattle are raised. It is caused by bacteria which are usually ingested with feed.

The infection ends up in the heavy muscles of the animal, where it causes great damage and forms large quantities of gas in the tissues. When pressure is applied to the affected area, the gas in the tissues makes a crackling sound, like paper being crumpled.

An animal which has died from blackleg has a characteristic posture. Because of the terrific swelling soon after death, the animal has its legs extended and still like a sawhorse.

Once animals are stricken with the disease, they usually die in 12 to 48 hours. The disease can be prevented by vaccination with a bacterin made from the organism which causes the disease. Since animals under two years of age are the ones usually affected, they are the ones which should be vaccinated.

Although annual vaccination means that some animals be vaccinated more than once, this will not hurt the animals and will keep resistance at a high level.

Sheriff's Report

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace this week reported a burglary and arson at the Agriculture Chemical Farm Service six miles South of Friona on Highway 214 Sunday, May 26.

The Fire Department answered the fire call at 1 a.m. The building burned to the ground, with only a hull left on one end. Investigation showed that the incident began as burglary, but progressed to vandalism; then the building was wrecked and burned.

A guitar, mandolin, clock radio and desk calculator were reported taken from the building. An amplifier for the instruments was also taken, and the telephone was destroyed.

Approximately five miles southeast of the burned building investigators found a box of ball point pens, an honorary plaque belonging to Dale Westbrook and papers that had been taken during the burglary.

The incident is still under investigation and the Sheriff theorizes that there is a possible connection between this burglary and arson and other fires that have occurred at Friona.

Sheriff Lovelace stated that in his entire law enforcement career, this is the first time he has known of a combination burglary and arson in Parmer County.

The following is a biographical sketch written by Mrs. Corn.

I was born in Czechoslovakia when it was still a Republic. The only difference was that my parents and I happened to have German Citizenship. My life as a child was delightful. We always had a maid. We went on long summer vacations to the Baltic Sea.

Then one day in 1938, Hitler decided to liberate the Germans in Czechoslovakia. We didn't mind - we lined the streets to greet this "Great Leader" of the Germans. But things didn't progress as we thought they should. In a short time I saw my mother wave good-bye to my father and saw him off to the war. It was exciting at first, but when he came home only once a year for two weeks, it didn't seem so glamorous any more. My mother became the "bon" of our business, and with it came all the worries related to that. I had to join Hitler's Youth, which was a sort of a Girl Scout Organization with political overtones and pressures. We had uniforms and meetings and marches and all that. Our parents didn't like to see us participate, but if we didn't, the police would come and make us go.

The war took a reverse turn after the U.S. joined the Allies, and we lived through bombings and strafing and street battles. Most of the last year of the war we spent in basements and cellars. Mail service became almost non-existent - no one knew where anybody was. Refugees kept coming with their few belongings, advising us that the Russians weren't far behind. We stayed, and luckily the American forces took our town. Peace, at last! We heard through other prisoners that our Dad was alive in a POW camp. Joy reigned. But it was short-lived.

One day the U.S. troops pulled out, and the Communists followed. We were persecuted day and night - interrogated - searched - shipped into the interior for hard labor - until it became unbearable for me, and I fled across the border on foot to West Germany. There, I found a farmer's family whom I stayed with and got room and board in exchange for tutoring their four children and helping in the household. My mother was transported to West Germany in a cattle car with only a few belongings. My Dad found us, and we were together again, only all our bank accounts, property, etc. was in Communist hands. We had to start all over again.

My parents found jobs, and rehabilitated themselves. I found a job as interpreter for the U.S. Army, and attended the University of Munich. I met my future husband there, eventually got married and came to the U.S. My first home was in El Paso, which I will always love for its kind people, and diverse culture. I was granted U.S. Citizenship here.

After some time we came to Bovina, where we've lived for 20 years. I learned to love this country, but it can be hard. After having been used to cosmopolitan areas - Bovina was, to say the least, different. No concerts, no library, no theater. Tips For Two Home Owners

For safe, enjoyable vacations and weekends furnish the vacation home with the same care used for the primary home. It doesn't have to be fancy to be safe.

TSA suggests that you measure up your vacation home against this checklist of some of the major hazards that afflict second homes:

—Are wells, cisterns and similar fixtures protected with sturdy covers?

—Are wooden stairs and porches in good shape and free of rotting lumber and protruding nails?

—Is interior paint low-lead or lead free?

—Is mechanical equipment in safe working condition?

—Are roofs fire resistant and in good condition?

—Are there sufficient electrical outlets to avoid overuse of extension cords?

—Has wiring been safety checked by an expert?

—Are heating installations inspected and serviced once a year?

—Do all sleeping areas

have at least two means of exit in case of fire?

—Are fuel pressure tanks and fuel storage tanks kept outside the house?
