MATADOR SPECIAL LEAVES TONIGHT

RECORD CROWD OF BOOSTERS TO MAKE TRIP

EXPECT FIVE HUNDRED WILL INVADE FORT WORTH FOR GAME

More than 500 representatives of Lubbock will swoop down on the city of Fort Worth tomorrow to witness the third annual football battle between the Texas Tech Matadors and the Texas Christian University Horned Frogs.

Headed by Dean James M. Gordon of Tech, the college football special will leave here at 7 o'clock tonight with about 250 students and approximately 150 faculty members and townspeople. Included on the special will be 50 members of the Tech band; 40 members of Las Armas Ritas, college girls pep squad; two college yell leaders, and a representative delegation from the student body and faculty.

Based on the heavy advance sale of football tickets by ones who have not made reservations on the special train, Dean Gordon estimates that about 150 students will wend their way to Cowtown by way of automobile. Should this estimate prove accurate, the Matadors will be urged to fight to victory by half a thousand Lubbockites from the side lines.

Gordon in Charge
Mrs. Mary Ooak, dean of women at Tech, will be in charge of the girls students on the special train, and Dean Gordon will be in charge of the entire delegation. The special will arrive in Fort Worth at 7:55 o'clock tomorrow morning. The return trip will begin at 11:45 tomorrow night, the special arriving in Lubbock at 1:25 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

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EXTENSION OF MAIL DELAYED

INCREASING SCOPE OF SERVICE DEPENDENT ON CITY'S PART

Application to the United States postal department by Postmaster John L. Vaughan for a sixty-three block extension to the city mail delivery system is being withheld until the necessary requirements for delivery service in met, Mr. Vaughan said this morning.

Street signs and street lights will be required before the proposed extension can be granted. Other requirements which have already been met to a satisfactory degree are continuous sidewalks, house numbers and mail receptacles. Postmaster Vaughan has discussed the extension with members of the city commission and with Mayor Harley D. Woods, and the commission discussed the street light addition this week although no definite action was taken.

Possibility of beginning the proposed extension of service before the first of December in the event that the city meets the necessary requirements in the near future was voiced this morning by Mr. Vaughan. SILVER SAVED FROM CHAIR BY CLEMENCY ACT

GOVERNOR C O MUTES DEATH PENALTY TO LIFE IN PRISON

HUNTSVILLE, Oct. 26.—Bob Silver, who for months had felt the near presence of the electric chair, dropped happily today into prison routine through that routine may end only with his death.

The governor's last night commuted to life imprisonment the death sentence assessed Silver for participation in the robbery of a Fort Worth theater, in which Rose Wilson, treasurer, was killed.

The governor cited various reasons for the clemency, the fourth extended Silver. W. A. Stone, convicted with Silver, was sentenced to only 99 years and the executive felt, he said, that "if there was any miscarriage of justice, it may have been in Stone's case, and not in Silver's. . . with the inequality of punishment imposed on the two men. . . I feel that the circumstances are such as to merit a commutation of the sentence. Nothing can be said in mitigation of the crime."

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Demand For Cotton Pickers Not Filled

Although cotton pickers are coming into this section in greater numbers every day, the present demand for workers has not yet been satisfied, according to requests by farmers at the local Chamber of Commerce offices.

Pickers ranging from individuals to groups of as many as thirty-five have been reporting every day to R. F. Nelson, U. S. employment agent here, for distribution.

Mr. Nelson predicts that the need of pickers will be met by the middle of the week with the arrival of hundreds of pickers sent in this direction from Central and East Texas.

Due to the present weather conditions cotton in this section is opening at a record pace, Mr. Nelson said.

LABOR LEADER INDICTED FOR BOMB OUTRAGE

GRAND JURY CHARGES SEVEN, AFTERMATH

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 26.—Frank J. Peterson, secretary of the Kansas City Building Trades Council, and three others, indicted yesterday by the Jackson county grand jury in connection with bombings and other acts of violence in labor and trade troubles, were arraigned today before Circuit Judge Thomas J. Seehorn.

Peterson was arraigned on two indictments charging assault with intent to kill in connection with an attack on F. A. Taylor, contractor, and with malicious destruction of property in connection with an explosion which damaged the home of Philip Minkin, another contractor who employed both union and non-union labor. The labor leader's bond was fixed at \$15,000.

Edwin Watson, former business agent of the Painter's Union, and John M. Deuchler, present business agent, were arraigned on a joint indictment charging felonious assault, and their bonds fixed at \$2,000 each.

Aaron Schultz, cleaning shop operator, gave bond of \$10,000 on an indictment charging malicious destruction of property.

Three of the ten men indicted were arraigned yesterday.

NET CLAMPED ON MURDERER

OFFICERS FROM THREE COUNTIES CLOSE IN ON SUSPECT

ABILENE, Oct. 26.—One of the most intensive man hunts in the history of this section still was in progress today as hundreds of armed possemen, led by three West Texas sheriffs, searched the brazen of the Brazos River bottoms along the boundary between Haskell and Stonewall counties for Bill Fritz, 35.

W. Hamilton and his son, Earle, at Rochester Wednesday night. Sheriff Al Cousins of Haskell, Tom Hudson of Jones and Bailey Bingham of Stonewall counties were leading the search which began a few hours after Hamilton and his son were shot down at the door of their home.

All exits to the bottoms were guarded and officers hoped to force Fritz from cover into the hands of guards stationed on the roads. This falling, it was believed the fugitive would be forced by hunger to surrender.

The Hamiltons were believed to have been killed as the outgrowth of a liquor investigation in which Earle was a state witness. Mrs. Hamilton, who supplied information which resulted in a murder charge being filed against Fritz, said he called her husband and son to the door of their house and demanded that Earle leave the country before October 29, when the liquor case was to have come to trial. Earle refused, she said, and Fritz opened fire on both men.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26 (AP)—Another drink parlor bombing, the second of the week, occurred early today, damaging a place on the West Side operated by Walter Hackett and damaging nearby buildings. The place was closed for a week, and the bar and other furnishings removed.

Lad With Mania To Kill Kidnaps Nebraska Child

ALLIANCE, Neb., Oct. 26 (AP)—A 12-year-old boy with a mania to "kill something," who kidnapped a two months old baby and who, when caught, was hunting for an ax to behead the infant, presented a problem to county officials today.

The baby was kidnaped from the automobile of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Colerick, the parents, who had been removed. The infant suffered a problem to county officials today. The boy was discovered by Sheriff J. Jones as he was searching for an ax. The boy told the sheriff he intended to kill the baby, but refused to give a motive, other than a desire to "kill something."

Mrs. Colerick's purse, which was missing from the car, was found near the baby, whose clothes had been removed. The infant suffered slightly from exposure, but was otherwise uninjured. The boy, whose name was withheld, is in second grade in school, behind most children of his age. He was allowed to return to his home until County Attorney Romig decides what had best be done with him.

The force of the collision was so great that one of the sleeping cars of the Simpson express was completely wrecked. Two first class coaches and a baggage and mail car of the other train were smashed. Identity of the victims has not been established.

NEW NON-STOP RECORD MADE BY AIRPLANE

TWO HOURS CHOPPED FROM FASTEST TIME SET PREVIOUSLY

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 26.—A monopoly on trans-continental non-stop air records was held by Harry Tucker's trim little Lockheed-Vega monoplane "Yankee Doodle" today, following the plane's successful flight from New York which ended at Mines Field here yesterday.

The "Yankee Doodle" with Captain C. B. D. Collier, co-holder of the around-the-world travel record, and the controls and Tucker in the passenger seat set a new East-to-West non-stop record of 24 hours, 51 minutes when it came to earth. The previous record of 26 hours, 50 minutes was made in 1923 by Lieutenant John Macready and Oakley Kelly.

With Art Goebel, Pacific flier, at the controls and Tucker aboard, the cigar-shaped craft flashed to an astonishing West-to-East record of 18 hours, 15 minutes a few weeks ago. The flight was from Los Angeles to New York, and the fliers later announced a new and shorter route had been discovered, which, with a brisk wind at the ship's tail accounted for the fast time.

The course of both flights lay over McKeesport, Pa., Columbus, Indianapolis, Terre Haute, Ind., Wichita, Albuquerque and through the San Bernardino Mountain pass. The West-East flight was the only successful non-stop hop ever made, while yesterday's flight was the second non-stop flight westward across the continent.

The latest successful flight for the fleet little monoplane was a decisive victory over adverse wind, fog and rain above the Alleghenies and again over the Rocky Mountains that threatened to send it down short of gasoline before the goal was sighted.

Pools were again at work on a large scale with new high records established by Pure Oil, Kennecott Copper and Jordan Motors. Western Union points by touching 184 1/2 or approximately 50 points above the quickly extended its gain to 1 1/2 years' low.

R. H. Macy ran up 7 1/4 points to a new high at 172 1/2. With Aeronautical, Curtiss, Sears Roebuck, General Motors and Green Cananea all advanced 2 points more. American Smelting, Fox Film and Century Ribbon were heavy.

ZEPPELIN TRIP IS POSTPONED

BAD WEATHER REPORTS AND WINDS CAUSE DELAY IN START

(By Associated Press)

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 26—The cruise of the Graf Zeppelin over the Middle West has been postponed again with possibility that the trip may be abandoned.

Continued unfavorable weather reports and an 18-mile cross hangar wind at the field caused Dr. Hugo Eckener, the ship's commander, to

defer the proposed start last night. He said no decision would be made as to the starting time until the receipt of weather reports today. Capt. Ernest Lehmann, first officer, said the decision as to whether the trip would be attempted at all would be made after these reports were studied.

Dr. Eckener expressed himself as still anxious to make the trip. He said, however, he was unwilling to make the start under adverse conditions as the only purpose of the flight is to show the big dirigible to the Middle West and if visibility was poor or weather caused her to change her course after taking the air many would be disappointed and the purpose of the trip nullified.

The Zeppelin's commander is anxious to start the return trip to Germany before the weather becomes more severe. One woman and five men have been selected to

fill the vacant places on the passenger list for the return journey. Fourteen passengers who made the flight to this country will make the return trip.

HOOVER STAYS WITH SPEECHES ABOUT ISSUES

WILL CONFINE TALKS TO REMARKS ON BIG TOPICS

(The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—Events of the presidential campaign down to the present time have caused no change in Herbert Hoover's major political strategy of confining his speeches to a discussion of what he conceives to be the issues and to keep clear of exchanges with his democratic opponent and others.

As has been the case in the past, party leaders and speakers are replying to the latest attack of Governor Alfred E. Smith. However, in his next address at St. Louis on the night of November 2, Hoover will take up two subjects which Smith has emphasized—waterways development and farm relief.

The Republican standard bearer already has spoken on these, having declared for a coordinated system of inland waterways and for federal financial aid to a farm board to assist in meeting the problems of seasonal surpluses in the major farm crops. He also has stated that if elected he would invite farm leaders, such as former Governor Frank O. Lowden, into conference to help work out the details.

Extra Session In Doubt

Whether he would call an extra session of Congress to tackle the problem has not yet been concluded. It was stated in an official statement made public at the candidate's personal headquarters yesterday after Governor Adam McMullen of Nebraska had stated that Hoover had informed him he would call the new congress into extraordinary session for this purpose.

Additional details of the final western trip which will take Hoover to his California home to vote are now being worked out and the nominee will make a number of addresses aside from the one at St. Louis during his four days' journey to Palo Alto.

The first of these will be at Cumberland, Maryland, within a few hours after the journey begins at 5 p. m. next Thursday. His second talk will be at Louisville, Kentucky, on November 2, his train stopping in that city for an hour and ten minutes.

A procession will be formed at the station and Hoover and his party will drive to the Jefferson county courthouse at which place

Among the acts of violence under grand jury investigation was the alleged beating of F. A. Taylor, a contractor, in a downtown hotel October 28 last.

Other acts investigated included the slugging of H. M. Koontz, a contractor, and bombing of a cleaning and dyeing establishment.

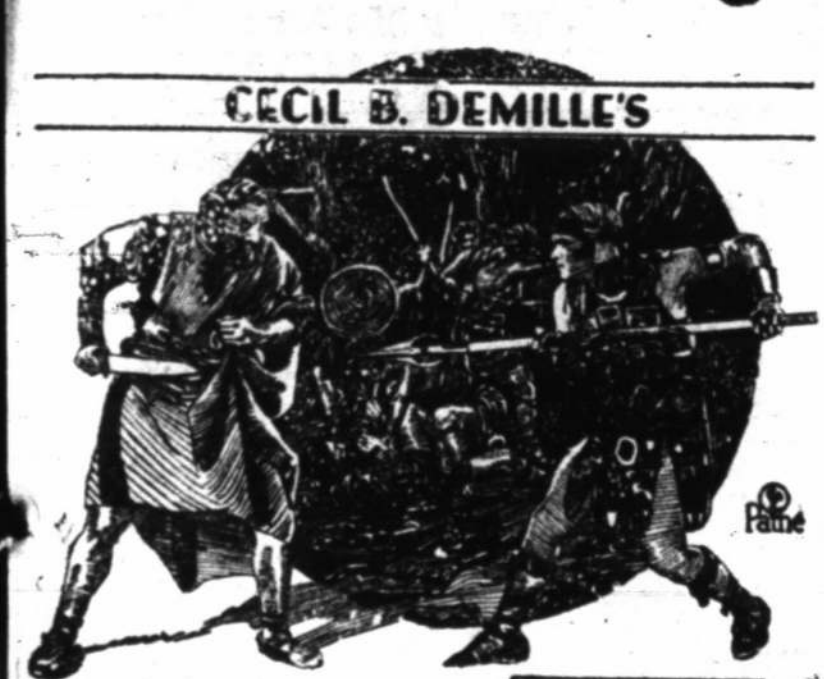

LAFOLLETTE DISPLEASED

(By Associated Press)

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 26.—Senator Robert LaFollette, Wisconsin Progressive, said today in a signed statement in LaFollette's magazine that "neither Republicans nor Democrats are on record in favor of principles for which the Progressive group has fought."

"But because of the Progressive Republicans and Progressives Democrats operating as a group in congress have forced them out in the open and compelled their consideration at the polls."

Smith of New York had made "public declarations and definite commitments which are in substantial accord with the Progressive views on water power, farm relief, the injunction in labor disputes, corruption in public service and abuse of presidential power in Nicaragua."

PHILADELPHIA POLICE PATROLMAN FORCED TO SEE HOLD-UP

LANCASTER, Pa., Oct. 26.—Kidnaped in an automobile by two men and a woman whom he was escorting to a police station and forced to witness the holdup of another automobile, State Policeman Robert Troup of New York today reported to his headquarters here that he had been left by his captors outside of Baltimore, unharmed but relieved of his revolver.

Troup and another officer were one of seven pairs of state highway patrol officers operating on the Lincoln highway east of Lancaster last night in a campaign to enforce the state regulations regarding headlights.

They stopped a machine containing two men and a woman and found that none of the occupants had a driver's license.

Troup then entered the machine and, preceded by the other highway patrolman on a motorcycle, was proceeding toward the police station at Lancaster. After going a short distance the officer on the motorcycle looked around to discover that the automobile had disappeared.

Three hours later, and about 53 miles from the place where the car in which Troup was riding disappeared, an automobile driven by William Cameron, 18, accompanied by Miss Odienne Pite, both of Penn Hill, Pa., was held up by the occupants of another machine. One of these, brandishing a revolver, and accompanied by a man in uniform, robbed Cameron and ordered him and his companion out of their car. When Cameron remarked that it was strange he was being held up when an officer was present the robber said, "that's all right. I am holding him up too, and this is his gun."

LAUNCH FIGHT AGAINST POLYGAMY

ANCIENT PRACTICE STILL PERSISTS IN EAST DESPITE EFFORTS FROM COMMUNISTS

SAMARKAND, Turkestan, Oct. 26 (AP).—A merciless struggle against polygamy and the paying of "Kalam" or ransom for Moslem brides, has been started by higher Communist authorities throughout the Kazak, Uzbek and Tadzhik republics in Central Asia. A special society to fight these Mohammedan practices has been organized.

Ten years of intensive Bolshevik propaganda have affected the practices of Moslem rites by the native population but little, even among certain classes of government officials and communists, who in the depth of their souls still cling to the law of the prophet.

The Sar-Darinsk Communist party organization, submitted a report stating that Kalam and Polygamy, although concealed in form, were prevalent not only among non-party members but even among communists, old and young.

Another practice adverse to communist doctrines is the trading of marriageable girls by their parents to the highest bidder, and the subsequent resale of the girls if the bid is later raised by some other person. An example was the case of a certain Desunov, once a wealthy Kirghiz peasant of the Barabinsk Steppes. He submitted before the Moscow court this letter:

"In 1920 I was married, in accordance with our Moslem customs and ancient traditions, to Macki Temerbekova, and paid for her seven cows,

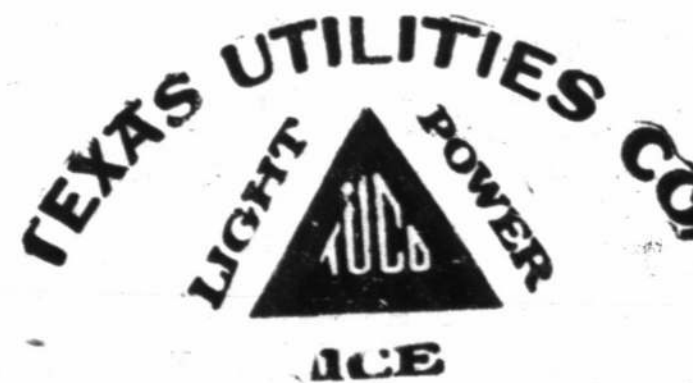

Hooks and Slides

The hitting featured pitched every world series. Addie Joss, one of the game's greatest pitchers, once said that pitching was 60 per cent of a team's strength. Of late years that belief has been universally accepted, although some of the boys are inclined to the belief that Joss was a wee bit modest, that he should have rated pitching as 70 per cent of team strength.

In the 1928 series, recently won by the Yankees in four straight games, batting for the first time rated on a par, if not better than par, with pitching in determining the final result.

The pre-series dope didn't enthuse over the possibilities of the Yankee pitching staff. Yet seldom has a series had four better pitchers than the two turned in by Hoyt and Gehrig by Pippas and Zachary. The batting average of the Cardinals team was only .206, while only one player, Maranville, not rated among the sluggers of the St. Louis club, hit better than .300.

In the four games St. Louis made only 27 hits, and of these just six were for extra bases. That kind of hitting simply will not win a world championship, as the Cardinals early discovered. New York, on the other hand, made 37 hits, 16 of them being for extra bases.

These extra bases, designated as power in the slang of baseball, plus super pitching best explains why the Yankees won four straight games.

These Terrible Thunders. Two surprise elements featured the 1928 series to my way of thinking. One of course was the home run angle, while the other concerned the matter of strikeouts.

Yankees, winners of the championship, figured in the home run angle while the Cardinals had to do with the strikeout figure.

New York made 27 runs in the four games and nine of them were home runs. That best tells the story of the great power possessed by the Yankees. With a batting average of .623, a new series record, and Gehrig close up with .548, featured in the slugging order, staved by the champions, they had four homers to three for Ruth, while Mousie, the catcher, contributed a fourth. Never was there a series in which home run hitting so dominated the issue.

Getting back to pitching for a moment, forgetting for a time the devastating home runs of the Yankees, we find the pitching of the New York staff, with the hitters for the honor of dominating the series.

A glance at the statistics reveals the amazing information that in four games 29 members of the St. Louis Cardinals were "set down on strikes," an average of better than seven per game. To make the work of the Yankee pitchers stand out all the more, it might be well to stress the fact that in returning 29 St. Louis players accounted for a strike more than one game in the matter of strikeouts.

Jim Bottomley is regarded as one of the best hitters in the game, yet the Yankee pitchers stopped Bottomley to a whisper. Bottomley struck out six times during the series and made only three hits. In the second game, Pippas fanned "Sunny Jim" three times. Pippas used an overhand curve, that he kept inside and broke low, around Bottomley's knees. Against this style of pitching Bottomley seemed helpless. In the final game, Hoyt worked on Bottomley in the same manner. The only home run made by Bottomley came from the bat of Bottomley.

As said before, pitching invariably dominates every world series. However, in 1928, power of batting, for the first time, is entitled to the edge, if not the edge at least a 50-50 break on the hero role status.

The argument for the series league for the winter resolves itself into the question: was the batting of Ruth and Gehrig greater than the pitching of Hoyt, Pippas and Bottomley? Take your choice.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26 (AP)—Voters of California were electrified for a while yesterday by rumors, later vehemently denied, that United States Senator Hiram Johnson was about to declare himself in favor of the presidential candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith, democrat.

LONDON, Oct. 26 (AP)—R. H. Tate, a young scientist in West Hartlepool, has given the scientific world something to discuss by declaring he has made a discovery enabling

him to overcome the law of gravity. Newspaper accounts of a demonstration of his method say that this takes the form of a mysterious new metal and that a plate of it floats in the air when placed above a plate of similar material lying on the floor.

Tate declined to say how he achieved his results. He said that he hoped to demonstrate the discovery soon in the presence of leading scientists.

Another Age

An 81-year-old woman is dead in
an obscure retreat near Copenhagen,
and with her death went
one of the last links that connects
this age with an age that has passed.

She is the one-time Dowager
Empress Marie of Russia, mother of
the late Czar Nicholas and widow
of Alexander III. She outlived the
era into which she was born, and
her last years have been empty and
desolate.

The Russia of Marie's day must
have seemed to her circle, a fine
place.

The czar was the "little father"
of his people. He ruled by divine
right, and held unlimited authority.
He and his family lived amid
all the pomp and ceremony that a
station uncounted millions of
industrial people can furnish. Life
in the imperial palace at Petrograd
must have been very pleasant and
inspiring.

To be sure, those in the palace
occasionally caught the sound of
murmurs of discontent filtering up
from below. There were shocking
abuses in the land, but Nicholas
amiable and good-natured, realized
his responsibilities as "little father."
These abuses could not be remedied
overnight. Surely, the more he
would be made right, the Russian
people would be happy and all
would be well.

But people have a way of becoming
impatient with slow reforms.
They got impatient in Russia. Then
there came the war, and a million
or so of peasants, poorly equipped
and betrayed by schemes in high places
and sacrificed by bungling officialdom,
were killed by the methodical
efficient German and Austrian
And at last there was a vast
explosion, and unmanageable forces
came welling and boiling up from
the dark places below, the czar and
carina lost their lives, and the
Dowager Empress Marie fled to
Copenhagen, to live another decade
in lonely, amazed obscurity.

We often hear it is a tragedy to
be born before one's time. Probably
it is. But it is infinitely worse to
be born too late for one's time.
Marie was part of a medieval
system in a day when that system
had to go on the scrap heap. If
she could have lived a century
earlier her last days would have
been made far more pleasant as
an empress could make them. There
would have been court physicians,
formal deputations of court ladies,
messages of comfort from kings and
princes, a palatial sick room in a
great palace, instead of the lonely
of an exile who has seen
all that was familiar and dear
ground to him.

It is tragic to be out of date. To
be fixed and unchanging in a world
that is eternally changing and
developing is to court disaster. The
twentieth century is a cruel place
for all who try to live by the standards
and watchwords of the nineteenth.

A New Grounds

The American sportsman who
will travel long distances in the fall
to get a shot at a moose or a deer
is beginning to give serious consideration
to Alaska as a hunting
ground, according to a report from
the Interior Department.

Hunters are going to Alaska in
ever-increasing numbers, the report
says, and the town of Anchorage

Southwestern Bell Telephone company
erected a fine building here.
"We're growing with Lubbock,"
the said, "we're bettering the service."
We're making an investment
of thousands of dollars to make
telephone service better," was the
report emanated from the high
places.

Lubbock was "licked pink." That
was fine business because every-
body wanted better telephone service
and everybody was glad to see
a new building and plant.

A short time after that the
company was largely by an announce-
ment that the telephone rates
had been hiked. The improved
service, the new building, the
said the telephone company,
made it necessary to charge
more. In other words, the
corporation which reaches from
coast-to-coast and also into
foreign fields, not only asked
but forced the citizens of Lubbock,
through an increased rate
and why the improvements
and pay for the building in the
long run.

There was nothing the citizens
could do about it so logically they
did nothing but fuss a little on the
increased payment. Time rolled on
and that vaunted service crumbled
until today it is distinctly inadequate.

The Avalanche-Journal asked
the telephone company why it was
that "cut-off" between con-
sumers and service was so frequent.
It asked why it takes longer than
necessary to get "central." It asked
why several minutes must elapse
before information can be located
and why the service generally had
deteriorated. The telephone company
reported that it hasn't enough
"board room." The exchange, where
the girls work, is not large enough
as it stands, it would need
enough workers. The trouble will
be corrected, the company said, "after
the first of the year." That was
several weeks ago.

Further than that there is a section
of the city where telephone
phone company is not available to additional
subscribers and won't be until after
the first of the year. In other
words, the telephone company that
saddled higher rates upon Lubbock
because of a new building and an
increased service is not keeping step
with the advancement of the community.

The Plainsman is one citizen
who would like to see the tele-
phone company be constant. He
would like to see that improved
service we heard about, kept
improved. The people—us
and I and everyone else,
who has a telephone are pay-
ing extra today for something
that we're not getting. The
rates were raised to pay for the
improved service of a couple of
years ago, but this year we haven't
heard anything about their being
lowered to compensate the
people for the short-sightedness
of company engineers when they
failed to construct the new
plant so that it would fulfill the
needs of the city two years
after the rate increase.

The Southwestern-Bell Telephone
company showed plenty of speed
when it piled the rate increases on
columbuses, but it showed no
speed when it made phones in
Lubbock cost more than phones in
Amarillo even though the number
of connections on an exchange
forms part of the basis upon which
rates are fixed. What the company
needs to do now to climb back to
public confidence is to get its service
back to par in double-quick
time or readjust the rates so that
the people here are not paying for
"improved service" that they're not
getting and haven't re-
ceived for several months.

This writer is confident that this
article will result in his being given
a barrel or so of statistics showing
why the rates were raised and
why the service of today has
reached the place where it is and
why it "won't be long" until con-
ditions are improved. But those
statistics aren't going to look so
good as the figures which show
just how much more Lubbock has
paid for telephones during the past
two years than it did during the
two years previous to them and
there's no going to be so hot when
a few statistics based upon the
average time it takes to get "central"
and "information" in Lubbock
are produced.

publican corruption, water power,
prohibition, state issues in New

"They have always wanted to see
Greenwich Village, and since you
live there you can show them
around. Don't be afraid! They're
good scouts! You can take them
anywhere."

Now I ask you! It makes me
fonder concerning the life my
friends must think I lead. These
good folk will come intent on see-
ing the wild life of the gay and
giddy Village. And what shall I
do about it? What does anyone in
New York do about such matters?

For some three years I have
dwelt in Greenwich Village because
it made me feel more "homey,"
more as though I were living in a
small community. There is little
of the severity of the cold lines of
brownstones encountered in the
mid-town and up-town belt. The
places are, on a average, smaller.
In the morning as I make my way
to the subway, I can see women
going to the market places with
their baskets. Most of them are
wearing aprons. In summer it is
even possible to come upon an oc-
casional sunbather. There is a
humanness and a neighborliness
to be found in few parts of Man-
hattan.

Riverside Drive is austere, aloof
and impersonal. The hotel apart-
ments about town freeze my neigh-
borly blood. I can't live in hotels.
There's the glow of the hearth-

without speaking to a soul for years
and still have an overwhelming
sense of being part of the life.

And how can I tell that to future

they're so obvious and, to me, rather
dull. I've set foot in but a couple

And if I tell them we live as

wich Village, they'll never believe
me. They'll go home and ask what
kind of a guy I am. And I know
thousands in the same fix here.

The World And All

BY CHARLES B. DRISCOLL

There is a popular belief that
people live to a greater age now
than ever before. This, according
to Dr. Louis Dublin, of the Me-
tropolitan Life statistical depart-
ment, is an error. We do not live
to a greater age than our fore-
fathers, despite all the much-ad-
vertised conquests accredited to
medical science.

The average person at birth has
a greater life expectancy than he
had some years or centuries ago.
This is due to the fact that babies
are now given more intelligent care.
Much has been learned about care
of babies. Nowadays, when a baby
is born he has a good chance of
living to adulthood. Even thirty
years ago a baby was lucky if he
lived to be five years old.

Saving the babies, you see, has
led to the existence of the greater
average life span. The average per-
son lives longer than formerly,
but the higher average is made up
in babyhood; not in old age. Three
score and ten is still a plausible
limit for human life, unless by reason
of strength or resistance to
microbes the individual may live to
four score years. Beyond eighty
not many live.

Much money has been spent
in saving babies. All kinds of babies
are saved for all kinds of lives.
You can't tell when you're saving
a baby whether the child is going to
be a useful citizen or a bandit.
Many a doctor in the big cities has
labored many a weary night to save
babies destined for the electric
chair. A reputable doctor once told
me that he was at heart opposed to
the compulsory inoculation against
diphtheria of children in certain
districts of New York City, because
such a large percentage of the chil-
dren thus preserved from death in
those sections grew up to plague
society and prey upon honest citi-
zens, and finally have to be shot by
police men who would much rather
be doing other useful work.

But the good work of saving
babies goes on anyway, and most
of us are glad of it.

Now, I'd like to see some good
work done to reward with long life
those who have demonstrated their
usefulness in the world. For in-
stance, a doctor who has saved the
lives of a thousand babies ought to
be saved the annoyance of dying of
cancer at the early age of sixty
years. Charles Lindbergh ought to
have at his disposal anti-age serum
or something equally certain to give
him the privilege of telling his
great-grandchildren all about
that buggy ride across the Atlantic.
Diabetes is about the only disease
of middle life that has been beat-

ties to different substances that are
breathed in, or to substances that
are absorbed from different foods.
For instance, animal fats give off
tiny particles of dander (similar to
dandruff in man) feather pillows,
wool materials and many other
things may be the offenders, and
costs food or overeating in gen-
eral may cause attacks.

There are skin tests which will
determine which substance is dis-
turbing.

There are other types of asthma
the cause of which is not under-
stood. All efforts to build up the
resistance, such as exercises, to
strengthen the chest and all the
muscles, liberal fresh air and sun-
shine, and the proper diet, are all
factors that have to be thought of.

Acidosis in Grandchildren
"What would you do if your
daughter-in-law insisted on doing
your only grandchild with baking
soda three or four times a day,
thinking she is guarding him against
acidosis? The child is now 6 years
old and all his life has had vomit-
ing spells due to too many sweet
things." "MRS. S."

This question requires a "heart
and home" adviser to answer. I can
see that you certainly love that
only grandchild—but don't I read be-
tween the lines that you are a little
critical of your daughter-in-law? Are
you sure that you have always
been quite tactful?

You are right, however, in your
inference that posing a child with
acidosis continually is

GRAND JURIES HUNTING DOWN BALLOT FRAUD

RING LEADERS BEHIND CORRUPTION SOUGHT IN DUAL QUIZ

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Two grand juries—one in Woodstock Ill., McHenry county, the other in Chicago—today were hunting down the ring leaders behind vice election frauds and corruption in their respective districts.

They named more than 100 persons yesterday in 48 indictments and continued their separate investigations today.

Five of the indictments were returned by the special grand jury investigating election frauds in Chicago, bringing the total number of indictments by special grand juries in this city to an even 100.

Seven persons were named, one an assistant state's attorney.

The indictments charged election conspiracies and accused Louis V. Keeler, assistant state's attorney, and John M. Nelson, both of whom were precinct captains in the 27th ward, with filing a false affidavit. Investigators reported the affidavit certified as voters 92 residents of a hotel, whereas only 35 voters lived there.

Charges that Jack Hirsch, a paymaster, ruled how many votes each candidate should get resulted in the naming of Hirsch, Charles "Chick" Hedgesman, Paul Dorfman, and Sam Koppel, an assistant precinct captain in the second indictment. They were charged with conspiracy to alter republican ballots. The same men were named in another conspiracy indictment charging them with making false election returns.

Koppel was charged in a separate indictment with altering ballots in the 13th precinct, of the twenty-fourth ward, and Daniel Pannell, was named in an indictment charging perjury before the grand jury.

How he was chased from a polling place and later fired upon by hoodlums, was told the grand jury by the Rev. Isiah Smith, negro clergyman, who testified he refused the offer of Morris Eller, city collector, to put him on the payroll if he would support the "America First" ticket.

The forty-three indictments returned by the McHenry county grand jury named 68 persons on charges of perjury, conspiracy to violate the dry laws and violation of the dry laws.
