MEN AGED 26 OR OVER TO BE CALLED INDRAFT

R. A. Jefferies, Hale county selective service board head, Wednesday received word from State Director J. Watt Page, that the order issued the previous day, that no men, 26 and above, are to be called into the service at present, regardless of their classification, had been rescinded, and that the previous day's order was a misinterpretation of news from Washington.

Hale county pre-induction calls for physical examinations in May total 108 men, six Negroes May 1, 102 white men May 2. There was a pre-induction call for 113 Hale county men for April (on the 4th). Induction calls for April: April 1, 1 Negro navy; April 3, 19 white men, army; April 13, 26 white men, navy; April 17, 20 white men, army; April 18, 2 Negroes, army.

England, March 30, 1944.
Dear Buford: Just a few lines to let you know I'm still receiving the Review, although they are a little slow in getting here at times. I usually receive one every week-end. I really enjoy them. England is a beautiful country but there is no place as beautiful, or as good, as the good old USA I was in London about two weeks ago and met a friend of

mine. He was visiting some relatives near London so we spent the night with them. I really had a swell time. Slept in a nice big, soft bed with clean sheets and had breakfast in bed at nine the next morning. Only one thing wrong, it didn't last long enough. Well, Buford, I must close for now. your answering my letter. . . Thanks

don't want you to feel we have done
much. Please believe me when I say
we feel privileged that Tex took to
us and came here so often. He has
become one of us, and he has always
been a gentleman in every way. Mr.
K. and myself could go out anytime,
I know that the girls were in very

good hands. He has been so good to
them and we were very proud any
time to take him anywhere and have
him meet all our friends. . . He has
gone away now and we do miss him.
We said goodbye a week before he
eventually did go, and he came out
twice after. The last day he came I
made him a Christmas cake and
showed it to him, but didn't give it
to him, because we expected him a-
gain the next day and the girls had
wanted to ice it. Now we will have
to post it to him. I do hope it will
reach him o. k. . . My friend, at
whose house we met Tex, let us know
when he went, and Mrs. Shadden, it
was a nasty shock. We have all been
very sad because there isn't much

must be nice people to have such a

great boy. . . I will close now, hop-
ing this finds you all in the best of
health. Do write again soon. Yours,
faithfully, Mrs. K. Korotcoff. P. S.
I am sending a little brooch to you
and when you wear it, think of me,
because I feel we are somehow re-
lated through that kid. Hope it ar-
rives OK.

Hughes, Brownfield, Grover Baker, Daie Moody and Miss Mary Baker. Jackson McKenzie Rankin was born in China Grove, N. C., Jan. 9, 1873. He came to Texas with his parents, Elder J. D. Rankin and Mary Sechlar Rankin in April of 1870. He walked off a steamboat at Galveston April 11, 1870 and lived in Texas 71 years and in New Mexico three years. He was united in wedlock with Sarah Alice Mayfield at Rockdale, Tex., June 16, 1888. To this union were born five daughters and six sons. He is survived by his wife, 10 children, 20 grand-children and one sister, Mrs. Andrew Fleming of Austin. He was preceded in death by his first born, Jackson Bennie, by nearly five years. The surviving children are: Mrs. R. G. O'Rear, Lorenzo; J. M. Rankin, Dallas; Mary E. Rankin, Abertnathy; Elder H. C. Rankin, Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Lula Mae Farris, Lubbock; M. H. Rankin, Abertnathy; C. G. Rankin, Valleyview; Capt. Jno. S. Rankin, chaplain with the armed forces somewhere in England; Mrs. J. F. Barron, Lamesa; and Mrs. R. W. Womack, Houston. All of the children were present except the son in service and the youngest daughter in Houston.
