

SIMMONS, AMARILLO NEXT FOR LOCAL TEAMS

SANDSTORMERS ARE STRONGER THIS YEAR

Plenty of work and long drills are in line for the Westerners this week as they get ready for the Golden Sandstormers in the first conference game, this week-end in Amarillo. At hand now is ahead for the lads of the Franks and Morgan machine and the handlers realize that their only chance with the Sandstormers is to outfight them. They will go into the conference game this week-end as the "underdogs". The mighty offensive machine that has been brought to the front by Coach Butler in the Panhandle city has created wide-spread attraction and the coaches of the local club are facing the game rather dolefully.

Sandstormers Won Last Week
Last Saturday the Sandstormers blew hard and walked away with a 45 to 8 victory over the Clovis New Mexico club, who are recognized as one of the strongest aggregations in the Eastern New Mexico. A total of 191 points have been gathered in by the Butler machine which is a good accumulation of evidence that the offense of that club is to be as dreaded as can be found. Until the game with the lads of Mexico last week-end the Sandies had yet the first opposing club to cross their chafed line; and it was only a break of the game that caused that—a block ed punt that went out of bounds on the Amarillo one yard line and was backed over for the counter against them with three drives through the Sandie defense.

Amarillo Record Impressive
Comparing the two clubs by the season record thus far, the Sandies have already captured the game with the Westerners. The Sandies have played four games and have been victorious in each instance by a large score—they have totaled 191 points in the games with an average of 47 and 2-4 in each game they have played in—and only one club has thus far crossed their goal. Lubbock has played three games this season and has piled up only 31 points against her opponents, played one scoreless tie, was defeated by the Florida White-windies, a Class B machine 13 to 12, and won one game with a count of 19 to 6 over the Spring. It looks like a sore day for the Westerners when they start the engagement with the Sandies on the Amarillo gridiron; but with hard work and long drills to put them more and more in line with the dreaded Butler outfit Henry Kriska and Del Morgan are attempting to put the Westerners in first class condition to meet the foe in the hand-to-hand battle.

Officials Of Pittsburgh Baseball Club Deny Persistent Rumors That Dreyfus Has Sold Interest In Team

(By Associated Press)
PITTSBURGH, Oct. 10.—Officials of the Pittsburgh National league baseball club tonight reiterated emphatically their denial of reports that the team had been sold. Rumors that Barney Dreyfus, former owner, had disposed of the club, circulated in Pittsburgh last night. These reports were revived today when the New York Evening World published a story reporting the sale of the club for \$2,000,000 to a New York syndicate.

Dreyfus was kept busy all day denying the reported sale. When he received a telegram from the Evening World, asking for details of the sale, he replied that the club had not been sold and that no offer had been made for its purchase. "There is absolutely no truth in the report and there never was the slightest foundation for it," said Dreyfus. The Pittsburgh club has not been sold to Mr. Dreyfus or any other person, Mr. Dreyfus said. He had made no offer for the club since the occasion several years ago when he expressed a desire to purchase it, but his advances were declined.

Sam Dreyfus, treasurer of the Pirates, seconded the denial, but when asked if the club would be sold later he said "anyone could sell almost anything he owned if he were offered a large price for it."

Reports Are Frequent.
Reports of the sale of the Pittsburgh club have been chronicled in baseball circles for several years, and in each instance the name has been linked with that of Fred Clark, former Pirates manager, as the purchaser. Dreyfus denied the report in each instance pointing out that the club was making money, that he was thoroughly satisfied with it as owner and that since his chief interest in life was baseball, he did not intend to sell.

Clark, assistant manager of the team, held a stock interest in the club in 1925. When the movement was launched by certain players to remove him from the bench, Clark was in the process of being released and was not connected with the club.

Say He Won't Sell.
Clark, however, believed he would sell in order to get away from the constant strife which has marked the internal affairs of the team since 1925. Clark said they point out that even this year Dreyfus had his troubles, many fans claiming he was behind the benching of Kiki Cuyler, star outfielder. The Cuyler case, they added, caused him to leave the club, and he kept him busy denying he had anything to do with the incident.

700 Freshmen At C. I. A. Take Test

MONTH'S RAIN BELOW NORMAL

TOTALS ONLY 1.16 INCHES; MONTH EXCELLENT FOR MATURING CROPS
Precipitation during September totaling 1.16 inches was nearly two inches below normal for the month, according to figures of Den L. Jones of the experiment station here.

The mean temperature for the month was 70 degrees, and according to Mr. Jones, the period was excellent for maturing of cotton. Maximum temperature, 95 degrees; minimum temperature, 41 degrees; mean temperature, 70.91 degrees; mean departure from the normal, 23 degrees; maximum relative humidity, 80 per cent; minimum relative humidity, 51.5 per cent; total evaporation, 5.713 inches; normal evaporation, 5.555 inches; total wind run, 4,159 miles; number of clear days, 12; number of cloudy days, 8; number of partly cloudy days, 10; precipitation for the month, 1.16 inches; normal precipitation for September, 3.168 inches; total precipitation from Jan. 1 to October 1, 8.38 inches; normal precipitation from Jan. 1 to Oct. 1, 16.137 inches.

BROWNFIELD, Oct. 10.—Recent rains have retarded cotton picking to a large extent, but it has opened rapidly within the last few days and pickers are needed badly. The south part of the county has produced a good crop of cotton as ever in its history and it is estimated that five hundred pickers could be used at this time and a majority of the farmers have provided themselves with comfortable quarters for the use of pickers and their families.

Light Frost Felt Here Sunday, But Crop Not Hurt

Jack, Frost's icy finger, traced lightly over certain sections of the South Plains area early Sunday morning, according to various reports received here yesterday, but failed to damage the cotton crop in any way.

On the other hand, it was declared, the frost did much toward maturing the cotton, the present alternating periods of warm and cold weather being just what is needed.

HIG SPRING, Oct. 10.—Howard County is planning to advertise its agricultural possibilities in the North and East. One hundred and fifty thousand acres of good fertile agricultural land will be put on the market at prices ranging from \$20.00 to \$25.00 per acre. The Big Spring real estate board will promote this publicity campaign, according to announcement made by R. L. Cook, chairman. Details of the plan have been formulated.

lary of Standard Oil Company of-
fers a question which congress must
decide, the court held.

"The tanks, pipe line and other
improvements put up on the re-
serve for the purpose of taking
away its products were not au-
thorized by congress," it was ad-
ded. "The lease and supplemental
agreement were fraudulently made to
circumvent the law and to de-
feat public policy."

Whether Fall was bribed by the
payments of liberty bonds he re-
ceived from Sinclair or other
sources during or after the nego-
tiations for the Teapot Dome lease
the statement did not undertake to
say, since the government did not
charge bribery in this case.

"It was not necessary for the
government to show that it suffer-
ed or was liable to suffer loss or
disadvantage," Justice Butler said
for the court, which was unanimous
except that Justices Stone and Van
Devanter did not participate.

Throughout the opinion Justice
Butler was severe in his condemna-
tion of Fall. Referring to the pay-
ment in Liberty bonds made to Fall
by Sinclair, after the former left
the Harding administration the
court said that obviously this was
"not a straight-forward transac-
tion."

"Coming so soon after the sup-
plemental agreement made to per-
fect and carry out the scheme,"
Justice Butler added, "it strength-
ens and confirms the inference that
Fall had been willing to conspire
to defraud the United States; and
taken in consideration with other
circumstances disclosed it is per-
suaasive evidence of such a con-
spiracy between him and Sinclair."

and next have been allotted and
promised and that only about 50
of the counties have benefited.

Federal aid, he added, is ex-
hausted for at least a year.

The southeastern part of Texas,
around Houston where E. S. Ster-
ling, chairman of the commission,
lives and the western part, in which
member W. R. Ely, of Abilene, re-
sides, Johnson asserted, have been
obtaining most of the state money.

"I have been over nearly 5000
miles of Texas roads—probably four
times more than the total mileage
traveled by any other member of
the commission—and I haven't been
able to get one of them to ride over
East Texas roads."

Matters Made Worse.

He said the commission, when it
was indicted, found a great mass
of roads designated with little hope
of their construction and that mat-
ters, instead of having been improv-
ed, had been made worse.

Johnson said he would vote for
such a proposition only with the
clear understanding that the state
had no money in sight to help pay
for construction. Ely and Sterling
made the designation over his protest
and an assentive "no" entered
by Johnson in the record.

Total state and federal aid al-
lowed: Navarro county, \$37,674
for paving highway 14 north and
south through the county; Archer,
\$61,837, for grading and building
drainage structures on 16 miles of
highway No. 79; Young, \$30,000, for
grading and drainage structures on
the highway from Olney to the

852, rock asphalt eight miles of

BOND IS REFUSED

Mrs. Lillendahl and Admirer,
Held in Killing of Doctor
Face Each Other in Court

MAYS LANDING, N. J. Oct. 10. (AP)
Mrs. Margaret Lillendahl, and
William Beach, her reputed admirer,
jointly charged with the murder of
the woman's husband, Dr. A. Wil-
liam Lillendahl, today were refus-
ed their release from jail on bond
after they had pleaded not guilty to
slaying the elderly retired physi-
cian.

Facing each other for the first
time since a few days after the
killing on September 15, and then
standing side by side before the

which rushed through, police lines
and into the fire from both officers
and Pinkard. Three spectators were
wounded.

Tear Gas Fails

Attempts to rout the negro with
tear gas and fire were unsuccessful.
While members of the riot
squad drew his fire, others rushed
the house from an opposite di-
rection and set fire to it, but it
burned for a moment and then died
out. Pinkard rushed to a window
in time to wound one officer who
failed to get out of range.

Another attempt to burn the
stronghold was made when an
armored police car was driven to
the side of the house and tear gas
bombs rained in through windows.
But Pinkard was on the watch
and when the squad bearing torches
came within range, he poured a
volley down on them. Officers said
the tear gas appeared to have little
effect on him.

Police had difficulty in removing
the body from the house through
the crowd of several thousand.
Pinkard's body was taken to police
headquarters and later to a negro
mortuary where it was held under
guard.

Few of these wounded were be-
lieved to have suffered seriously,
and all but two or three were re-
leased from hospitals after hav-
ing their wounds dressed.

unity to surrender.
General Alvarez, chief of the
presidential staff, declared "the
revolution is about ended."

President Calles' face was beam-
ing as he stood at the door of his
private office in Chapultepec Cas-
tle when the reports arrived there
this evening. The president ex-
pressed extreme happiness at the
outcome. He declared that the
revolution had been given the revo-
lution and that the movement had
been utterly crushed. He declared,
however, to give a formal interview
for publication.

Although Gomez and Almadia
have succeeded in eluding capture,
headquarters here are certain that
they will be taken soon, or reduc-
ed to the status of mere bandits,
refugees in the mountains, without
any appreciable number of follow-
ers.

The battle between the federal
and rebel forces began at 2 o'clock Sun-
day afternoon, and continued fier-
cely until 3 o'clock in the evening.
By that time Gomez and Almadia
were in flight and their followers
were either captured, dead or well
scattered. With the rebel casual-
ties estimated at 150, of whom 50
were killed, there is no information
thus far made public as to the fed-
eral casualties.

Mediano Teleha, half brother of
Gomez, who made his escape fol-
lowing his arrest at Navojos, Ro-
nos, last week and with 250 fol-
lowers headed south into the state
of Sinaloa, was reported in another
dispatch to have been killed by fed-
eral troops. The pursuing troops
overtaken Teleha and his followers
near Rosario, Sinaloa, this morning.
The majority of Teleha's followers
fell on the field of battle with their
leader.

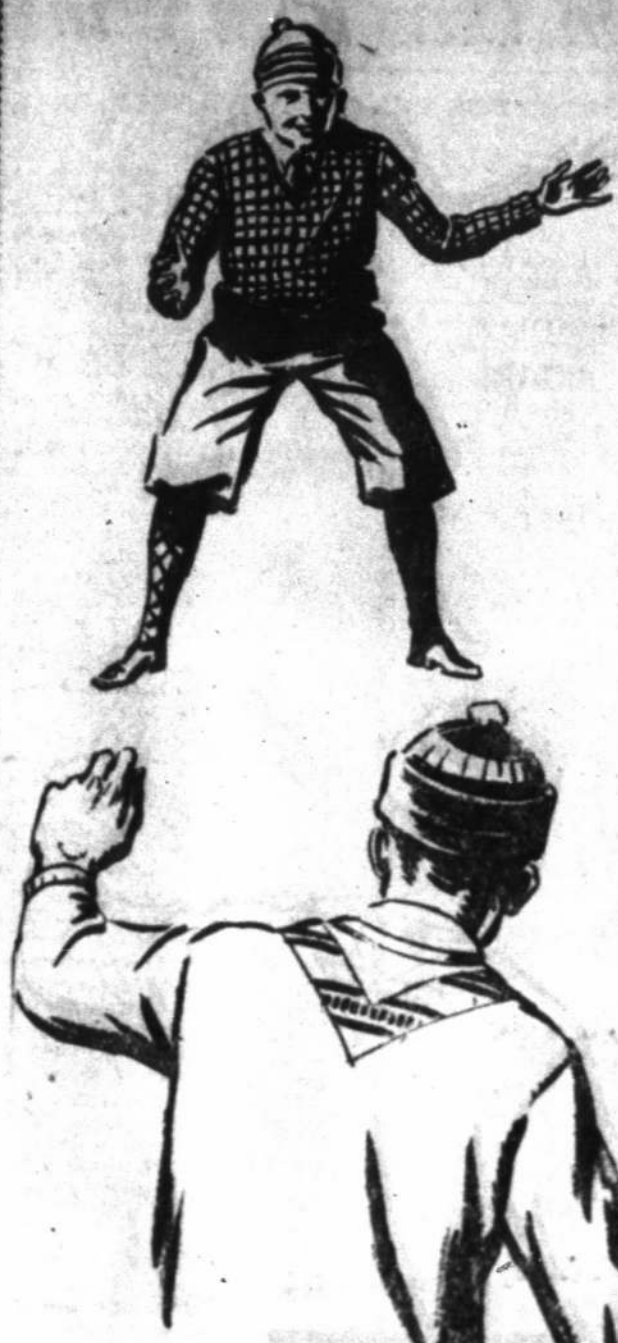

Petition To Commute Sentence Mar-
ried in Killing Men Braufels
Woman Denied By Moody.

AUSTIN, Oct. 10. (AP)—Barring
further executive intervention, A.
V. Milliken, San Antonio, must be
electrocuted Friday on a charge of
murdering Miss Virginia Petty,
real estate woman, at New Braun-
fels in May, 1926.

Governor Dan Moody in a lengthy
statement refused today to com-
mute Milliken's sentence to life im-
prisonment, declaring that the cir-
cumstances in the state coincide
with, account for, and render
probable the guilt of the defendant,
and they exclude to a moral cer-
tainty every reasonable hypothesis
except the defendant's guilt.

FRENCH LOAN OKEYED

Government Hopes Attitude On
Refunding of Loan Will
Help Tariff Muddle.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—
Formal announcement was made
today by the state department that
the French ambassador here had
been officially informed that the
American government would have
no objection to the refunding of the
\$100,000,000 eight per cent loan of
1926 made to the French govern-
ment by American bankers.

Coincidentally, it was announced
that the American charge at Paris
had been instructed to deliver the
French foreign office the American
reply to the last French tariff note
in which France is asked to restore
the minimum duty on American
imports, pending the negotiations
of a general commercial treaty.
