Rain falls in parts of parched West Texas

LUBBOCK — The most drought-ravaged part of Texas finally got much-needed rain.

Lubbock and Amarillo had more precipitation Thursday and Friday than their previous totals for the whole year, the National Weather Service said.

But the rain, forecast to keep falling in the Panhandle and South Plains through Monday, won't be enough to break the West Texas drought that is now in its fourth year.

Lubbock recorded 1.56 inches of precipitation Friday, NWS meteorologist Steve Cobb said. Through Thursday, the city had seen just 0.95 inch of precipitation this year. Amarillo has recorded nearly 1.50 inches of precipitation since the rain began Thursday, compared to just 0.21 inch since Jan. 1. The rain in Amarillo led to some localized flooding on Interstate 40 and low areas in the city, but no injuries were reported.

Areas east of Lubbock, in Crosby and Floyd counties, got 3.5 inches since midnight Thursday.

No precipitation was recorded at Midland International Airport on Thursday or Friday, according to the National Weather Service. There is a 60 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms in the area today and Sunday.

The Panhandle and South Plains regions of West Texas are in exceptional drought, the most severe stage on the U.S. Drought Monitor map.

Tabatha Seymore, who collects rain tallies from around the region at the weather service's Amarillo office, said the Panhandle would need as much as 18 inches

to get out of drought.

"We want it slowly," she said, so it can soak in.

Other parts of Texas aren't as dry as West Texas, but about 72 percent of the state is in some drought stage. The January-through-April period in the state was the fifth-driest on record, with just 45 percent of the normal 7.1 inches of rainfall, National Weather Service officials said this week. Those four months were just slightly wetter than the same time period in 2011, which ended up being the state's driest year ever.

Trinity School breaks ground on new building

■ \$34M project includes new upper school, commons

Five years of dreaming, discussion and planning became a step closer to reality at Trinity School on Friday morning with the groundbreaking for a new commons and upper school building.

The new buildings are part of phase one of a two-phase, \$34 million campus master plan. For the first phase, \$13.2 million of the \$17.1 million total, was raised since October, said Director of Advancement Kobi Lincoln.

The Rev. Chip Prehn, Trinity School headmaster, said the school's board and campaign committee members are public-minded people who see serving Trinity as also serving the greater purpose of Midland.

"This whole project — the fundraising and the construction — it's all about living into our mission into West Texas," Prehn said. "We're not trying to impress anyone or growing for the sake of growth. We're just trying to respond to our mission imperatives, which can be summed up by saying our mission is to educate the whole person to excellence, and to educate every student in the school thoroughly."

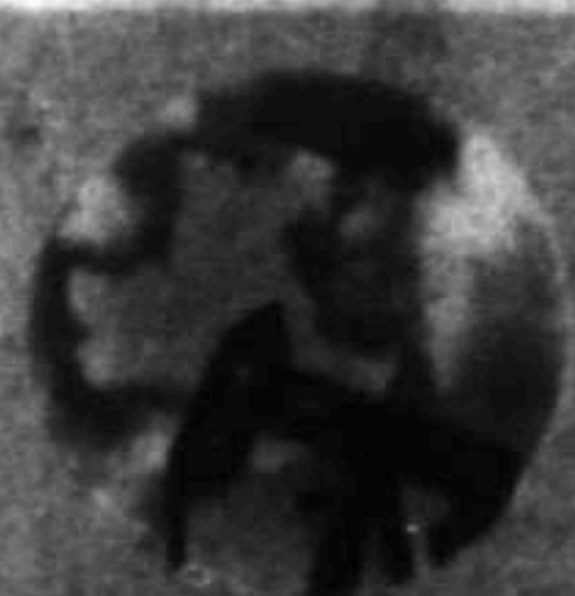
The current commons will be demolished this summer, and construction will begin on the new building later this summer. The two-story building will house the cafeteria, library and media center, said Stuart Beal, co-chairman of the capital campaign committee.

The existing upper school building will remain and later be renovated during the plan's second phase. The new upper school building will allow for more flexible classroom space and includes six science labs, Lincoln said.

Trinity is also constructing two small administration buildings on its campus.

These initial construction projects are expected to be completed in about 16 months, Lincoln said.

Houston Zoo opens bugs exhibit

HOUSTON — The Houston Zoo this weekend opens its first insectarium in the park's 92-year history, featuring some exotic and venomous species in more than two dozen custom habitats that make up what's being dubbed The Bug House. "They're fascinating and they're just hard to see out in the wild," Kevin Hodge, curator of the Children's Zoo at the park, said Friday as workers were putting final touches on the \$3 million project. "Most of these insects around here no one's ever going to see on a trip to Africa or Malaysia. A lot of times they're at the very tops of trees and could be among thousands of animals living on one huge canopy tree," he said. A specialized insect display seems appropriate in Houston, a city that's grown up on what was a swamp and where disease-carrying mosquitoes and 2-inch-long flying cockroaches are accepted facts of life. The homegrown roaches, though, are dwarfed by the giant cave cockroaches from Panama and northern South America that are housed in one of the 25 aquarium-like exhibits. Other impressive insects on display are black Asian forest scorpions from Malaysia, white-eyed assassin bugs from South Africa and blue death feigning beetles, which flop over on their blue backs and appropriately play dead when confronted with desert predators that prefer live victims. The bug house also is home for a red-spotted longhorn beetle, which despite the Texas name connection hails from Southeast Asia, and a Gooty sapphire tarantula, named for the town in southern India where it was discovered. Insects and spiders — there are more than a million species of them — are vital as recyclers, aiding in decomposition and cleanup of organic matter. They also help in food production, silk production and are a food source for other animals. Pollinating insects are important for plant reproduction and crop production. Spiders, for example, are crucial for controlling pest insects that otherwise would devour food crops. "They're not just creepy crawly things we want to get rid of," Hodge said. "Insects are a good indicator of how the planet is doing as a whole. "Insects are cool, and we need them here." The new 2,000-square-foot "Bug House" building is the result of about two years of work and eight months of construction. It required multiple U.S. Department of Agriculture inspections and permits covering the building itself, species, and native and exotic insects before it was cleared to open for the first time today.

The current atrium and library will be modified into a centralized fine arts and performing arts instruction center, seating in the chapel will be expanded, and the small gym and locker rooms will be renovated as the remaining

components of phase one, Lincoln said.

The second phase of the master plan includes renovations to the lower, intermediate and current upper school buildings, as well as a new gym, Lincoln said. Trinity won't begin those fundraising efforts until the first phase is finished.

"We feel like the purpose of Trinity is to provide a well-rounded education — educating the whole student to excellence," Lincoln said. "We feel with new construction, new buildings, we are meeting that mission."

Trinity's current enrollment is 618 students, the

highest in school history, Lincoln said.

Prehn said the school is building to improve the environment for instruction and learning, not for growth.

The school is looking to have an average of 45 students per grade level, or about 675 total students, Lincoln said.

El Paso police investigate cartel-style graffiti threats

EL PASO — El Paso police were investigating two mysterious messages painted onto billboards in the border city that included mannequins dressed in suits hanging from nooses.

The El Paso Times reported that motorists alerted police to the graffiti early Thursday morning. Both billboard companies said the painted messages were vandalism and not paid advertisements. They have been removed.

One message read "silver or lead" in Spanish, a threat heard in Mexico signifying pay up or get shot.

"This (message) has historically been used by Mexican drug cartels to threaten or intimidate Mexican citizens, business owners and government officials. However, we have never experienced this in El Paso," Sgt. Chris Mears, a spokesman for the El Paso Police Department, said in a statement. "The investigation is ongoing, but we do not have any information to suggest this

was done to target any individual person or business at this time."

The message on the other billboard read, "dying for drugs."

Drug cartels sometimes hang banners in Mexican cities with graphic threats and have even hanged victims from overpasses, but such public threats are virtually unheard of on the U.S. side. El Paso has maintained a crime rate that is among the lowest in the country, even during recent years when Ciudad Juarez, across the border, suffered a bloody cartel battle.

"Whoever did this went through a lot of work to get this accomplished," said Phil Jordan, a former Drug Enforcement Administration agent who ran the El Paso Intelligence Center. "This is possibly a message to someone who hasn't cooperated with the cartels. But even if it's a hoax, something like this is going to make the El Paso population uneasy, given that the city is not far from the killing fields of Mexico."

HOUSTON Feds probe incident involving 2 planes

Federal officials are investigating an incident in which two United Airlines planes may have flown too close to each other over Houston.

The close call happened after both planes took off from Bush Intercontinental Airport on the night of May 9.

The jets came within less than a mile of each other and 400 feet apart in height, Federal Aviation Administration FAA spokesman Lynn Lunsford said Friday. Normally planes would be separated by at least three miles in distance and 1,000 feet in altitude.

An air traffic controller told the pilot of United Flight 601 to turn right after takeoff, then realized that the plane was heading into airspace normally reserved for planes on another runway. United Flight 437 had just taken off from that second runway, and the controller gave both pilots instructions to keep the planes apart, Lunsford said.

Lunsford said the FAA has taken steps to prevent similar events in the future. Jennifer Dohm, a spokeswoman for United Continental Holdings Inc., said both United planes "were operating in compliance with their air-traffic clearances." She declined to comment further.

According to the FAA, both planes were Airbus A320 jets. One had 120 passengers and a crew of five, while the other had 95 passengers and five crew members.

An even closer call occurred last month at Newark Liberty Inter-

national Airport in New Jersey, prompting the FAA to change procedures for takeoffs and landings at the airport near New York City.

In that incident, a United Airlines jet that was landing and a smaller United Express jet taking off in the opposite direction came within about 200 feet in distance and 400 feet vertically of each other. The pilot of the smaller plane said that the United jet came "real close."

DALLAS Rarely exhibited Spanish drawings come to Dallas

Rarely exhibited Spanish drawings have traveled from a German museum to Dallas for a showing.

The exhibit opens Sunday at the Meadows Museum at Southern Methodist University.

It's the first exhibit outside of Germany to showcase the collection housed at the Hamburger Kunsthalle in Hamburg. Almost 90 works by Spanish artists from the 16th and 18th centuries will be on display, including works by Francisco Goya.

The exhibit closes in Dallas on Aug. 31, then heads for Madrid's Prado Museum, where it opens

Oct. 28. Most of the collection, which contains 210 Spanish works, came to the Hamburg museum when its first director acquired the drawings from a London-based collector in 1891. Since then, works from the collection have only been featured three times in small in-house exhibitions.

AUSTIN State review recommends six living centers close

A report recommends six state institutions for people with intellectual disabilities should close because the sites are expensive, unnecessary and some are falling apart.

The Austin American-Statesman reported the Sunset Advisory Commission staff report will be forwarded to the 2015 Legislature.

The report released Thursday said the Austin State Supported Living Center should shut down in 2017 — five years before the other sites as proposed in the report. The report said the center continues to demonstrate violations that threaten the safety of residents and its federal certification.

The report does not say which other facilities should be closed.

The Sunset Advisory Commission, which reviews and suggests changes to state agencies, reviewed the Department of Aging and Disability Services. The agency is expected to formally respond by early June.

CORPUS CHRISTI Man competent for trial in death of grandma, 77

A South Texas man has been ruled competent for trial in the death of his grandmother whose dismembered remains were found buried near her home.

A judge in Corpus Christi on Thursday determined 28-year-old David Christy is competent for trial on a murder charge. An arrest affidavit said investigators believe a chainsaw was used in the slaying.

The remains of 77-year-old Johanna Kruse Christy were discovered in February 2013 near the Corpus Christi home where her grandson also lived.

Christy initially was ruled not competent. Judge Nanette Hasette then ordered the suspect sent to a psychiatric hospital for further evaluation.

Obama chooses Julian Castro to be housing secretary

WASHINGTON — In a second-term Cabinet reshuffle, President Barack Obama tapped San Antonio Mayor Julian Castro on Friday to be the nation's next housing secretary, giving a prominent national platform to one of the Democratic Party's most celebrated up-and-comers.

Joined by Castro and Vice President Joe Biden, Obama also announced he was nominating current Housing and Urban Development Secretary Shaun Donovan to run the White House budget office — an opening Obama created when he asked his former budget chief to take over the Health and Human Services Department last month.

"Just because you are of modest means does not mean that your aspirations or your opportunity ought to be limited, and it certainly means you can have the talent to succeed and achieve the American Dream," Castro said as he accepted the nomination in the State Dining Room of the White House.

The 39-year-old Castro was propelled into the national spot-

light two years ago when Obama chose him to deliver the keynote address at the Democratic National Convention — a political baptism by fire not unlike the president's own rise to prominence when Obama keynoted the 2004 convention. Friday's announcement gives another major boost to Castro's profile, just as Democrats are eyeing him

as a potential vice presidential candidate in 2016.

As a Democrat, Castro's options for climbing the political ladder were severely constrained in Texas, where every statewide office is held by a Republican and Democrats haven't won a statewide race in 20 years. In elevating Castro to a Cabinet-level post, Obama gives Castro

perhaps his best chance to establish his credibility nationally as Democrats seek to shore up a bench of promising candidates for future races.

"The national scene in Washington is where politicians go to cut their teeth for any sort of national aspirations," said Maria Cardona, a Democratic strategist who advised Hillary Rodham Clinton's 2008 presidential campaign. "This will give him an opportunity to show off what he can do."

Castro, who is Mexican-American, would become one of the highest-ranking Hispanic officials in government if confirmed by the Senate. He comes to Washington with a compelling personal narrative: The son of a single mother, he attended Harvard Law School before serving three terms as San Antonio's mayor. His identical twin brother, Democrat Joaquin Castro, represents Texas in Congress.

Referring to Castro as an "all-star," Obama urged the Senate to confirm both Castro and Donovan quickly and without games.

"They are proven leaders. They are proven managers. They

are going to be effective and most importantly, they've got huge heart," Obama said.

Donovan, 48, is highly regarded inside the White House as a strong manager. He is an affordable housing advocate whose work overseeing the federal government's response to the destruction Hurricane Sandy unleashed on the East Coast in October 2012 has earned glowing praise from White House officials, including Obama.

Obama praised Donovan for making the agency more efficient, saving taxpayer dollars and building strong neighborhoods that have reduced homelessness.

As director of the White House Office of Management and Budget, Donovan would have influence over administration policy and spending. If confirmed by the Senate as expected, Donovan will replace Sylvia Mathews Burwell, whom Obama recently tapped to become secretary of Health and Human Services following Kathleen Sebelius' resignation and the fallout from the disastrous rollout of HealthCare.gov. Burwell is awaiting confirmation.

DETROIT Recalled beef may have been sent to 10 states

Federal food safety officials say ground beef recalled by a Detroit business may have been sent to stores in 10 states.

According to an announcement Thursday, the U.S. agriculture department's Food Safety and Inspection Service said it has reason to believe recalled beef was sent to retail outlets in Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Wisconsin.

Wolverine Packing Co. announced Monday it was recalling 1.8 million pounds of ground beef products that may be contaminated with E. coli.

FSIS said Friday that 11 people have been sickened.

China lifts ban of US West Coast shellfish

China has lifted a five monthlong ban on live shellfish from U.S. West Coast waters, officials said Friday.

The Chinese government announced the ban's end in a letter on Friday, officials said. The ban had particularly affected the Washington and Alaska shellfish industry.

China imposed a ban in December on the import of clams, oysters, mussels and scallops harvested from Washington, Oregon, Alaska and Northern California. China detected high levels of inorganic arsenic in geoducks from Puget Sound. It also found paralytic shellfish poisoning in geoducks harvested in Alaska. High levels of inorganic arsenic and paralytic shellfish poisoning have not been found in other areas of the larger region.

Kentucky agriculture officials receive hemp shipment

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Tiny hemp seeds that produced a drawn-out legal fight were freed from confinement and delivered Friday to Kentucky's Agriculture Department for experimental plantings, marking a limited comeback for the non-intoxicating cousin of marijuana.

The seeds from Italy that drew so much suspicion from federal drug officials were unceremoniously unloaded from a UPS truck and then weighed by state agriculture officials. The shipment featuring 13 seed varieties came in at 286 pounds.

It marked an uneventful conclusion to a standoff that pitted the state's Agriculture Department against the federal government. Seed deliveries for pilot projects across Kentucky will start soon, with plans to put the seeds in Kentucky soil in coming days.

State Agriculture Commissioner James Comer, a

Republican who sees hemp as a potential cash crop for farmers and a jobs creator for processors, said the arrival of the seeds puts Kentucky at the forefront of efforts to reintroduce the long-banned crop in the United States.

"As this program grows, so too will opportunities for our farmers and jobs

for all Kentuckians," he said in a statement.

The seeds were detained for two weeks by U.S. customs officials in Louisville delaying pilot growing projects meant to gauge the crop's potential. Six uni-

versities are assisting with the research for the highly versatile crop.

Eastern Kentucky University agriculture professor Bruce Pratt said his team prepared 3 acres on the school's farm for hemp plantings.

"We're excited to get this research project started," he said Friday.

The crop thrived in Kentucky decades ago, and he thinks it has potential as a viable crop for the state's farmers. His research team will assess the success of different seed varieties, which could someday help guide Kentucky farmers if the crop is eventually allowed to take its place in production agriculture.

The key would be developing markets for the crop, which could lure processors to Kentucky, he said.

"If we can get some of that competitive advantage being one of the first states

to be able to develop this as a crop to attract those processors, it has potential," Pratt said. "It's not going to happen overnight. It will take several years to fully develop."

Growing hemp without a federal permit was banned in 1970 due to its classification as a controlled substance related to marijuana.

Hemp and marijuana are the same species, Cannabis sativa, but hemp has a negligible amount of THC, the psychoactive compound that gives marijuana users a high. Hemp's comeback resulted from the new federal farm bill, which allows state agriculture departments to designate hemp pilot projects for research in states such as Kentucky that allow hemp growing.

Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky crafted the hemp language inserted into the farm bill.

Permian Basin adds one rig, ends week at 547

The number of rigs exploring for oil and natural gas in the Permian Basin increased one this week to 547, according to the weekly rig count report released Friday by Houston-based oilfield services company Baker Hughes.

Texas lost two rigs, ending the week with 889. In other Texas basins, there were 213 in the Eagle Ford, down six; 63 in the Granite Wash, up one; and 27 in the Barnett, up two.

A year ago this week there were 470 rigs in the Permian and 840 in Texas.

The number of rigs searching for oil and natural gas in the U.S. decreased four this week to 1,857. There were 1,528 rigs listed as searching for oil, down three; 325 as searching for natural gas, down one; and zero as miscellaneous, unchanged. At this time last year there were 1,762 rigs in the U.S.

By trajectory, there were 409 vertical drilling wells, up three; 1,243 horizontal drilling wells, down five; and 205 directional drilling wells, down two.

The top five basins by rig count this week were the Permian; the Eagle Ford; the Williston with 183, unchanged; the

Marcellus with 83, unchanged; and the Mississippian with 75, down two.

The top five states by rig count were Texas; Oklahoma with 191, down four; North Dakota with 174, unchanged; Louisiana with 114, up one; and New Mexico with 87, down two.

In the U.S. there were 1,783 rigs listed as on land, down eight; 14 in inland waters, up one; and 60 as offshore, up three.

There were 58 rigs in the Gulf of Mexico, up two.

The number of rigs searching for oil and natural gas in Canada increased one this week to 154. There were 65 rigs listed as

searching for oil, up three; 89 as searching for natural gas, down two; and zero as miscellaneous, unchanged. At this time last year there were 131 rigs in Canada.

The total number of rigs in the North America region — which includes the U.S. and Canada but excludes the Gulf of Mexico — decreased three this week to 2,011. A year ago this week there were 1,893 rigs in North America.

NEW YORK Oil above \$104 ahead of US holiday, Ukraine vote

The price of oil rose above \$104 a barrel Friday ahead of a holiday weekend in the U.S. and national elections in Ukraine on Sunday.

Benchmark U.S. crude for July delivery gained 61 cents to \$104.35 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Oil ended the week with a gain of \$2.33 a barrel, or 2.3 percent.

Brent crude, a benchmark for international oils, added 18 cents to \$110.54 on the ICE Futures exchange in London.

Ukrainians vote Sunday in an early presidential election that could be a crucial step toward resolving the country's crisis, but clashes between pro-Russia separatists and government forces appeared to be heating up. Russian President Vladimir Putin said his country would respect the outcome of the election.

Holidays will keep markets closed on Monday in the U.S. and Britain.

U.S. drivers are paying an average of \$3.66 for a gallon of gasoline, about what they were paying at this time last year. Californians are paying the highest price in the Lower 48, an average of \$4.13 a gallon. Arkansas and Missouri are tied for the lowest average price at \$3.40.

In other energy futures trading in New York.

rose 2 cents to \$3.02 a gallon.

■ Natural gas rose 5 cents to \$4.41 per 1,000 cubic feet.

PENNSYLVANIA Corbett order allows drilling below public lands

HARRISBURG — Gov. Tom Corbett issued an executive order Friday that allows drillers to extract natural gas from rock buried deep below Pennsylvania's state forests and parks, while barring drilling-related construction that would disturb the surface of the nearly 2.5 million acres of public lands.

The order authorizes the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to negotiate leases for the gas extraction through horizontal wells drilled from adjacent, privately owned lands or from areas leased for drilling in the state forests by previous administrations.

Corbett announced that he planned to issue the order when he unveiled his 2014-15 state budget plan in February. It rescinded a 2010 order barring any new leases on public lands.

The initial leases are expected to generate \$75 million for this year's budget. The state plans to

seek \$3,000 per acre in future rents as well as an 18 percent royalty on the sale of the gas, said Patrick Henderson, a senior aide to the Republican governor.

"We announced this three months in advance," he said.

Henderson said the process of issuing the new leases will start with an exploration company making a proposal to the department, which would conduct case-by-case reviews before entering into an agreement. Permits from the Department of Environmental Protection also are required before any underground drilling could occur under public lands.

NORTH DAKOTA Swiss company plans \$500 million Williston development

BISMARCK, N.D. — Swiss firm Stropiq is planning a \$500 million mixed-use development in the oil-rich North Dakota city of Williston.

Stropiq partner Jones Lang LaSalle said the Williston Crossing project will incorporate 1 million square feet of retail, entertainment and hotel space. The project also will include 219 acres for offices and housing.

"Williston is the center of the oil movement, but its retail infrastructure is seriously lacking and that

represents an unprecedented upside opportunity,"

Larry Jensen, senior director of retail development for Jones Lang LaSalle, said in a statement. "With no other comparable retail development in 125-mile radius, we expect it will soon become the number one retail destination."

North Dakota's oil boom has made Williston among the fastest-growing areas in the country. But development often has lagged behind growth. While finding affordable and available housing is the biggest challenge for most new arrivals, many residents also complain about the lack of retail and entertainment options.

Kerry agrees to testify on Benghazi attack

Secretary of State John Kerry will testify before Congress next month about the deadly attack in Benghazi, Libya, a one-and-done appearance that the State Department insists is enough to answer questions and means he could avoid the newly formed select committee.

In a letter to the House Oversight chairman, the department said Friday that Kerry could appear on June 12 or June 20 to discuss the Obama administration's cooperation with the panel in providing emails and other documents related to the Sept. 11, 2012, attack that killed U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans.

The department said that appearance "would remove any need for the secretary to appear before the select committee to answer additional questions."

US suspends \$3.5M in military aid to Thailand

The U.S. is suspending \$3.5 million in military aid to Thailand, its first punitive step against the Asian country following a military coup, the State Department announced Friday.

Spokeswoman Marie Harf said the department is still reviewing a further \$7 million in direct U.S. assistance to Thailand, and an undetermined amount of aid from other global and regional programs.

Secretary of State John Kerry announced the review hours after Thursday's military takeover in Thailand, a U.S. treaty ally and close military partner. Kerry said Thursday there was no justification for the coup and urged the immediate restoration of civilian government and a return to democracy.

RNC files lawsuit to raise unlimited cash

WASHINGTON — The Republican National Committee on Friday sued the Federal Election Commission for the ability to raise unlimited cash from individual donors.

The central committee, chairman Reince Priebus and Louisiana Republicans filed a joint lawsuit in U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia asking for permission to set up an independent account that could raise and spend potentially enormous sums of money to help federal candidates. Under the current rules, the RNC may only accept \$32,400 each year from donors, and local-level parties are capped at \$10,000.

"The patchwork of limits on political speech undermines the First Amendment and puts high transparency, full-disclosure groups like the RNC on an unequal footing with other political entities," RNC

Chairman Reince Priebus said in a statement. "We are asking that political parties be treated equally under the law."

Super PACs, which operate independently of the political parties or the candidates they support, can raise unlimited money from allies, including cor-

porations and unions. The groups technically cannot coordinate their spending and strategy with their favored candidates, but seldom have they pushed a message that runs counter

to the campaigns' wishes. While emphasizing that they do not want to accept money from corporations or unions as super PACs do, RNC officials said they want to have the same abilities to establish independent accounts that can buy ads, send campaign mail and make phone calls.

"In an era when independent-expenditure accounts can solicit unlimited contributions and spend enormous amounts to influence political races, political parties are constitutionally entitled to compete equally with them with their own independent campaign activity," said James Bopp Jr., the lawsuit's lead attorney.

Campaign finance watchdogs warned of serious implications if the court sides with the GOP.

"If the RNC is successful, we will again see party committees bra-

zenly soliciting \$1 million contributions from wealthy contributors seeking to directly purchase influence over candidates and officeholders, with the party committees acting as the sales agent," said Lawrence Noble, general counsel to the FEC from 1987 to 2000 and now an adviser at the nonpartisan Campaign Legal Center.

Friday's challenge was the latest effort from the RNC to whittle away at campaign finance laws, said David Donnelly, executive director of the Public Campaign Action Fund, which backs taxpayer-funded elections.

"If successful, this case would give the wealthiest among us even more influence in politics, further drowning out the voices of everyday people who can't write huge checks," Donnelly said.

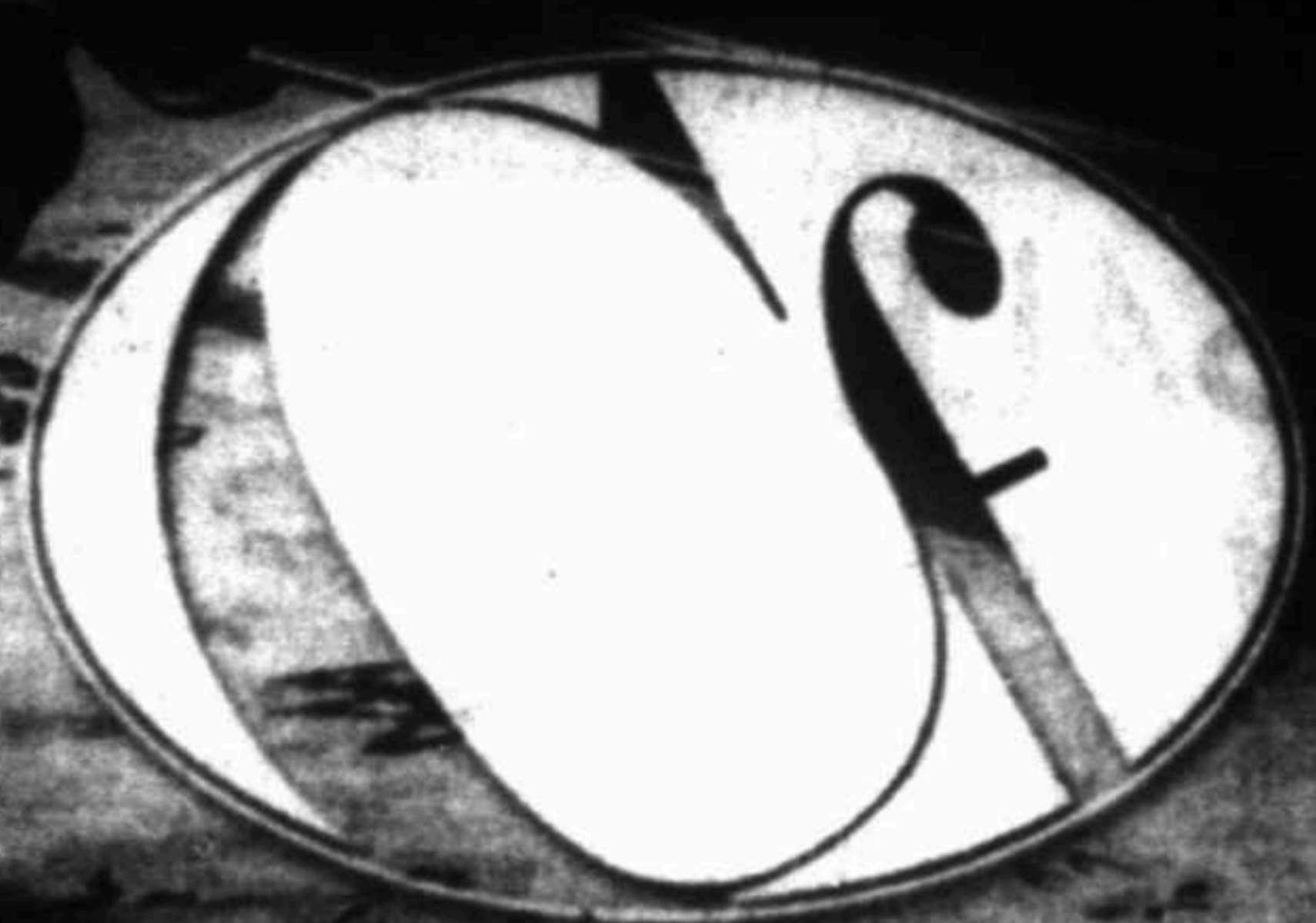

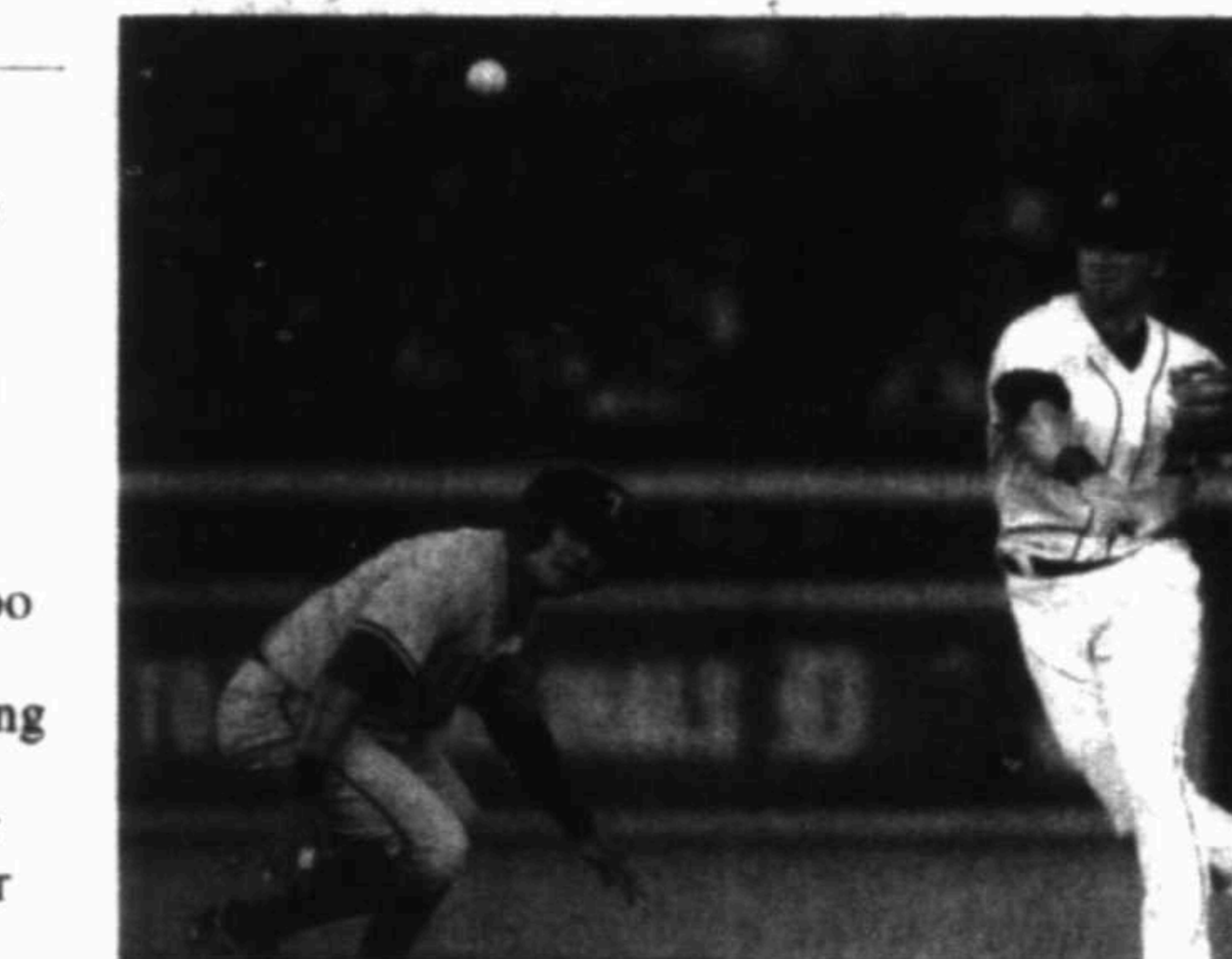

Klinsmann says Donovan was passed before US camp

STANFORD, Calif. — Jurgen Klinsmann tried to dance around the questions: Why take unproven youngsters to the World Cup and leave Landon Donovan home?

A day after announcing his momentous decision to drop the most accomplished player in American men's football, the U.S. coach hinted at answers without ever saying specifically why Donovan was among the final seven cuts.

"As a coach, you have to make a decision based on what you want to execute in Brazil, what you want to see, how do you want to build those components into the entire group. And then I felt — we coaches felt — the guys that we chose, they're a little step ahead of Landon in certain areas," Klinsmann said Friday.

The 32-year-old Donovan, the American record holder with 57 international goals and second with 156 appearances, was trying to make his fourth World Cup squad. He is scoreless in seven games with the Los Angeles Galaxy this season, and Klinsmann dropped him from the team for the first half of 2013 after Donovan took a

four-month sabbatical. Asked for specifics, Klinsmann said Donovan "maybe is not the one now anymore to go one against one all the time or going into the box or finishing off." But the coach praised "his outstanding passing game, his experience, which is a big factor always."

"He changed his game over the last few years, which is normal at that stage of his career," Klinsmann said.

Donovan has five World Cup goals, including a stoppage-time score against Algeria four years ago that advanced the Americans to the second round.

"For me it's a very easy equation: If Landon's on the field he's our top one or two players," goalkeeper Tim Howard said Monday.

Klinsmann said Donovan took the decision Thursday "with an amazing composure."

"Obviously, big disappointment. That is expected, and he said that, he doesn't kind of understand it," Klinsmann said. "He thinks he should have been in the 23."

Donovan was scheduled to discuss the decision today after training with the Galaxy.

Klinsmann said he hopes

Donovan remains available in the future: The Americans have the CONCACAF Gold Cup next year and the Copa America in 2016, when qualifying for the next World Cup also starts. Donovan also could return for the World Cup if there is an injury to one of the players selected for the roster.

"How this new cycle will start after Brazil obviously depends a lot on the outcome in Brazil," Klinsmann said, "but the vision is, absolutely, that Landon continues his national team career."

"He has a huge admiration for Landon. He's actually a big fan of him since many, many years. He has his jersey in his room," the coach continued. That was highly disrespectful, and I think he got his biggest social media lesson that he could imagine."

Hamilton questions if Rosberg has enough hunger to win

MONACO — With Mercedes looking certain to run away with the Formula One constructors' championship, the promising battle between Lewis Hamilton and Nico Rosberg should provide an intriguing backdrop for the rest of the season.

Rosberg is only three points behind Hamilton, the championship leader, who has won the past four races. The two go back a long way, to their days karting together. But with so little separating them in the title race, their friendship looks set to be tested.

Hamilton has even questioned Rosberg's desire to win.

Nico grew up in Monaco with jets and hotels and boats and all these kind of things," Hamilton said. "So the hunger is different ... if I were to come here believing that Nico is hungrier than me, then I might as well go home."

Those comments give the first indication that Hamilton, the Formula One champion in 2008, is applying pressure on Rosberg, who is far more experienced with four career wins compared to Hamilton's 26.

Hamilton dismissed any notion of diplomacy when he was asked his ideal result at the Monaco Grand Prix on Sunday, replying "(me) finishing first, Fernando (Alonso) finishing second and Sebastian (Vettel) finishing third. That would be it for me. The dream result for the team would be the Mercedes

cars finishing 1-2."

Four-time defending champion Vettel is already 55 points behind Hamilton in fourth place, and two-time champion Alonso is in third, 51 behind Hamilton. They have one third-place finish each so far and don't look like closing the gap, so it looks like being Hamilton vs. Rosberg for the rest of the campaign.

Before he joined Mercedes last season, Hamilton's final season with McLaren proved a tense one.

Relations with Jenson Button were strained and he was reprimanded by the team for posting confidential information on social media about McLaren's telemetry in September 2012. Button said he was "disappointed" in him, but it also showed Hamilton has a ruthless streak.

Kurt Busch's Double bid highlights Indy 500

INDIANAPOLIS — Dale Earnhardt Jr. is going to watch. So will Jimmie Johnson, Jeff Gordon, Tony Stewart and Clint Bowyer. NASCAR's biggest names all plan to tune in to the Indianapolis 500 to watch Kurt Busch run the first leg in his attempt to complete The Double.

Millions of other casual fans will also turn their attention to Indianapolis Motor Speedway on Sunday, where Busch's debut will bring new eyeballs to the "Greatest Spectacle In Racing." Although the Indy 500 has always been the crown jewel of motorsports, the slumping IndyCar Series struggles to gain much traction outside the showcase race.

"I think he does bring attention, and I think the series does need that added attention," 2012 series champion Ryan Hunter-Reay said of Busch. "The racing in the IndyCar

Series has been called the best kept secret in racing, and it is some of the best action out there, so I think it's a great opportunity for some fans who wouldn't necessarily tune in to check it out and see what it's all about and how good the racing is."

Fans will be treated to one of the most wide-open races in recent memory.

No single driver or team has risen to the top this season, and with so much attention on Busch, who will become just the fourth driver in history to compete in both the 500 and NASCAR's Coca-Cola 600 on the same day, so many other elements of this magical race at historic Indianapolis Motor Speedway have been somewhat overlooked.

"I don't know that there's a favorite at all this year," said Graham Rahal. "I feel like it is extremely wide open at this point, even as a driver myself, I couldn't even tell you who I would pick. I have no clue."

Indy is a race in which three owners — Andretti, Ganassi and Penske — typically have the cars to beat. That, at least, is no different this year as Andretti Autosport put three of its five entries in the top 10, while Team Penske got all three of its cars in.

"I'm sure we've got the winner sitting here," Roger Penske said of Helio Castroneves, Juan Pablo Montoya and Will Power.

But Andretti feels just as strongly about its chances, especially after James Hinchcliff qualified in the middle of the front row three days after he was medically cleared to drive following a concussion. He leads the five-car Andretti stable, which has Marco Andretti and Carlos Munoz in the two rows behind Hinchcliff.

Further back in the field is Hunter-Reay and Busch, the former NASCAR champion who will start 12th in Marco Andretti's backup car because he crashed his primary on Monday.

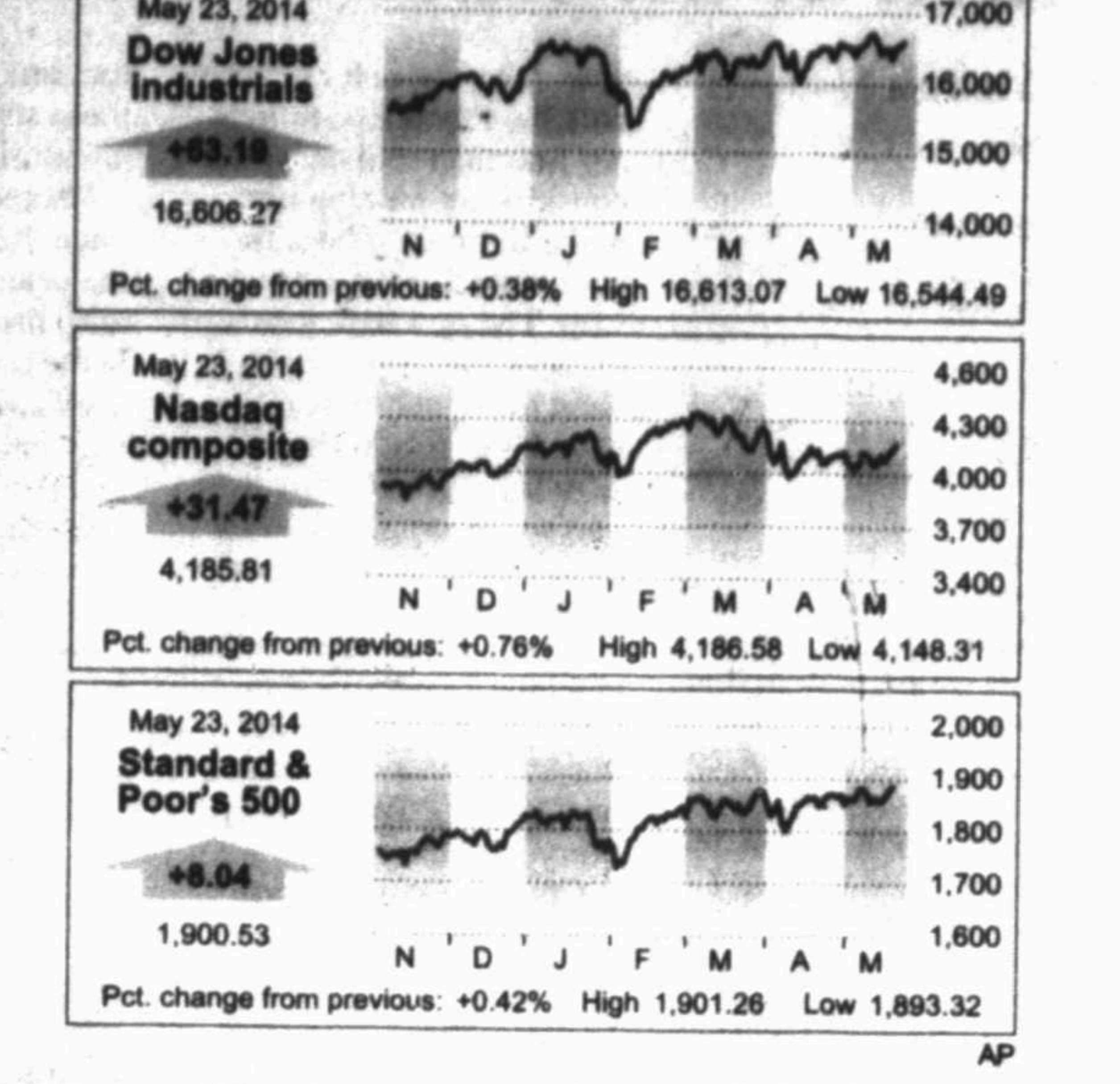

For superstitious horsemen, luck at the track is mostly bad

NEW YORK — It is easy to spot California Chrome on the racetrack as the sun glistens off his chestnut body and white blaze face. It is even easier to spot him in the barn, when his leg wrappings are removed and his four white feet, or socks in horse parlance, are exposed. This is not necessarily a welcome distinction. In the highly superstitious world of racing, the color of a horse's feet is just one type of omen. One white foot is considered good; four white feet are considered bad.

"Well, it's an old saying," Jimmy Jerkens, the trainer of Derby and Belmont contender Wicked Strong, said as he tried to remember the words. "Well, I know the end of it is: four white legs and feed him to the crows." He laughed but then stopped.

"He really has four white legs, huh? Wow!"

California Chrome, though, has been bucking trends since he was born. While most horses are purchased for well over \$100,000, California Chrome's dam, Love the Chase, was purchased for \$8,000 and bred to Lucky Pulpit for \$2,000. When Chrome won the Kentucky Derby, he became the fourth California-bred to win the race and the first since Decidedly in 1962.

Luck appears to be on the side of California Chrome, who is named for his markings, which on horses are commonly referred to as chrome. But that does not mean that his camp is prepared to change anything

now. After the colt ran away with the Preakness, trainer Art Sherman said he would consider not running him in the Belmont if he were not allowed to wear a nasal strip. The stewards decided to allow the strips, which were previously banned from New York racetracks.

Asked Tuesday why it was so important, assistant trainer Alan Sherman said, "The owners like it." "We don't change anything," said Sherman, who added that the same blanket was always used on Chrome. "We just keep everything the same."

Chrome's connections prefer to wear the same clothes, too. The two trainers and Steve Coburn, a co-owner, have worn the same outfits to his races, although Alan Sherman acknowledged that he would have to dry-clean his suit this time because it got muddy at the Preakness.

Superstitions are almost more prevalent than horses at a racetrack. Never leave your buckets at the test barn, presuming you will go back there because you won. When shipping a horse, brooms should be kept off the van. Do not name a horse after a family member. No pictures before a race, and no gear with the horse's name on it. Never look past the next race. Garlic is hung in barns, but peanuts are banned.

"One time I had a bag of peanuts in a barn, and a guy knocked them out of my hand," said Mike Sellitto, a longtime agent for jockeys. "He said, 'Don't eat those things in my barn.'"

Richard Migliore, a former jockey and now a racing analyst, said he had heard

the same thing. Origins of these superstitions, however, are murky.

"Some old groom told me once that when you shell the peanuts you tend to just drop them on the floor and a horse could step on a peanut shell and it could work its way into his body and cause an infection," he said. "I don't know if that's true, but that's what he told me."

Bad omens even abound on the racetrack. Examples include when a horse breaks through the gate or when someone says, "You're home free."

"That's the kiss of death," said Rick Violette, who trains Derby and Belmont contender Samraat. "Until they pass the wire, there is no comfort."

If there is so much bad luck around the racetrack, then what is considered good luck? Bird excrement, some said, or when a horse goes to the bathroom before a race, in theory making him lighter. Also considered positive signs: a streak of gray in the tail, an imprint in the muscle commonly called Allah's thumbprint, and unusual markings — just as long as they are not four white socks.

"They always seem like very consistent, hard-knocking kinds of horses," Migliore said of horses with white patches.

California Chrome, who has won six consecutive races, is the perfect exception to the rule.

"Just shows you that it's all a bunch of baloney," said Robert Donato, who trained the great John Henry.

"Everything is bad luck until you win, and then it's not," he said.

California Chrome unfazed by opossum encounter

NEW YORK — California Chrome was unfazed by a chance encounter with an opossum that crossed the track at Belmont Park as the Triple Crown hopeful was ending his gallop. The chestnut colt didn't flinch when he passed the

cat-sized opossum as he completed his 1 3/4-mile run Friday.

Assistant trainer Alan Sherman said coyotes have appeared at California Chrome's home track in Los Alamitos, California, so the opossum wasn't a big deal.

Sherman said California

Chrome will visit the Belmont paddock and starting gate once or twice next week as part of his preparations for the Belmont Stakes on June 7.

The colt is trying to become the first horse to sweep the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont in 36 years.

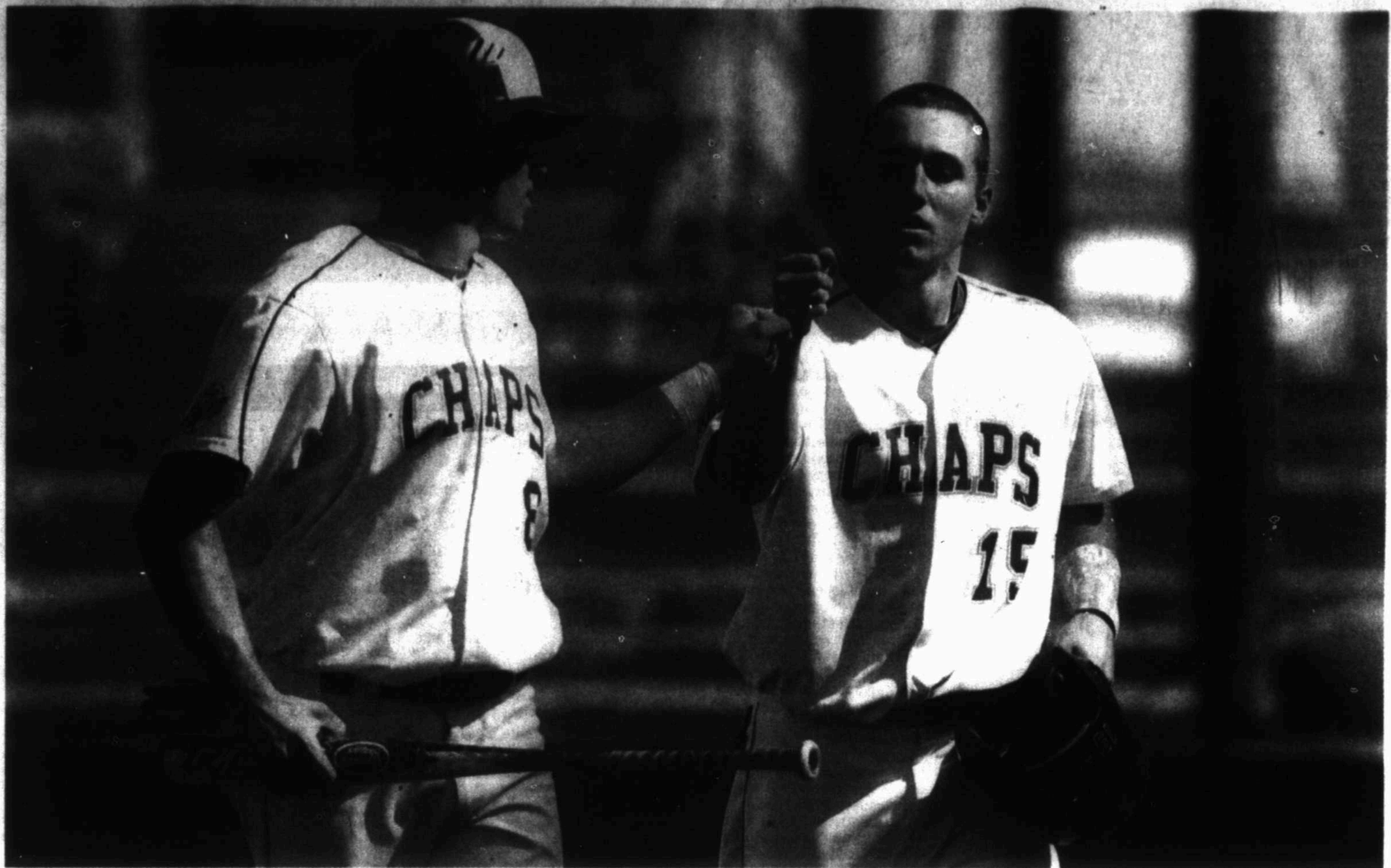

NO MORE DOUBT

Returning sophomores keep team believing through hard times

There were times this season when the Midland College baseball team could have just folded and given up on a lost season.

After a previous season that saw the Chaparrals reach their first Juco World Series in Grand Junction, Colorado, expectations were high but maybe so was the pressure of living up to that team that went 48-15 in 2013.

Midland College lost its first 10 games in Western Junior College Athletic Conference play and was just 2-14 after getting swept by Howard College in a four-game series on March 29. Things weren't looking very good about even making a return to the Region V Tournament.

"There was definitely doubt, I will admit," sophomore designated hitter Jay Gonzales said.

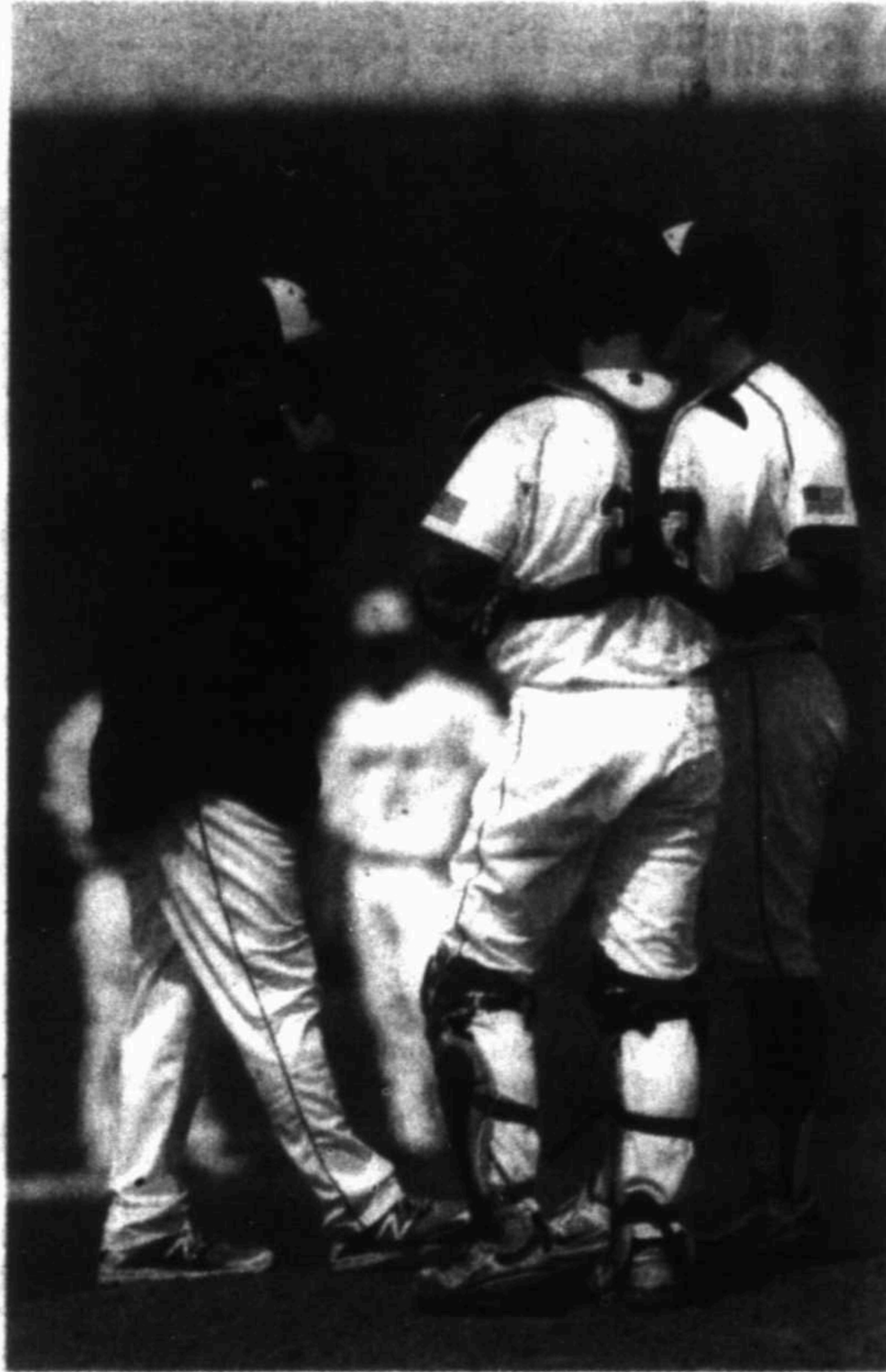
Added sophomore pitcher Thomas McLraith, "Through the first four series I was like there's no way, I don't think it was even possible. I didn't even think we would have a shot at the regional tournament."

But in the middle of the team's struggles, head coach David Coleman told his team in an e-mail that although things weren't going great, he reminded them of their good character and to believe in their character.

Soon enough, the Chaps started winning and started believing that no game was unwinnable. They eventually won 27 of 32 games, including five straight elimination games at the Region V Tournament in Lubbock to reach the Juco World Series for the second consecutive year. Midland College (40-23) faces No. 4-ranked Johnson County Community College (50-12) at 1 p.m. (CDT) today in first round action.

"There are no words for what we've been able to accomplish this season, and I'm excited to go back with the

Midland College is one of three teams making a second consecutive trip to the tournament, joining Spartanburg Methodist College and Coahoma Community College. Like MC, the Cavaliers had to win six games in four days to qualify for the World Series. They lost the opening game of the tournament to Kansas City Kansas CC 3-2 before going on their run. This is Johnson County's second trip to the JUCO World Series and first since 2008. MC coach David Coleman said from what he knows about the Cavaliers, they are really aggressive offensively and like to play for the lead by stealing bases, bunting, and doing some hit and run. He added that they also look to have a couple of good pitchers, as sophomore LHP Aaron Schnurbusch leads the way with a 12-1 record and a 1.96 ERA to go with 99 strikeouts. 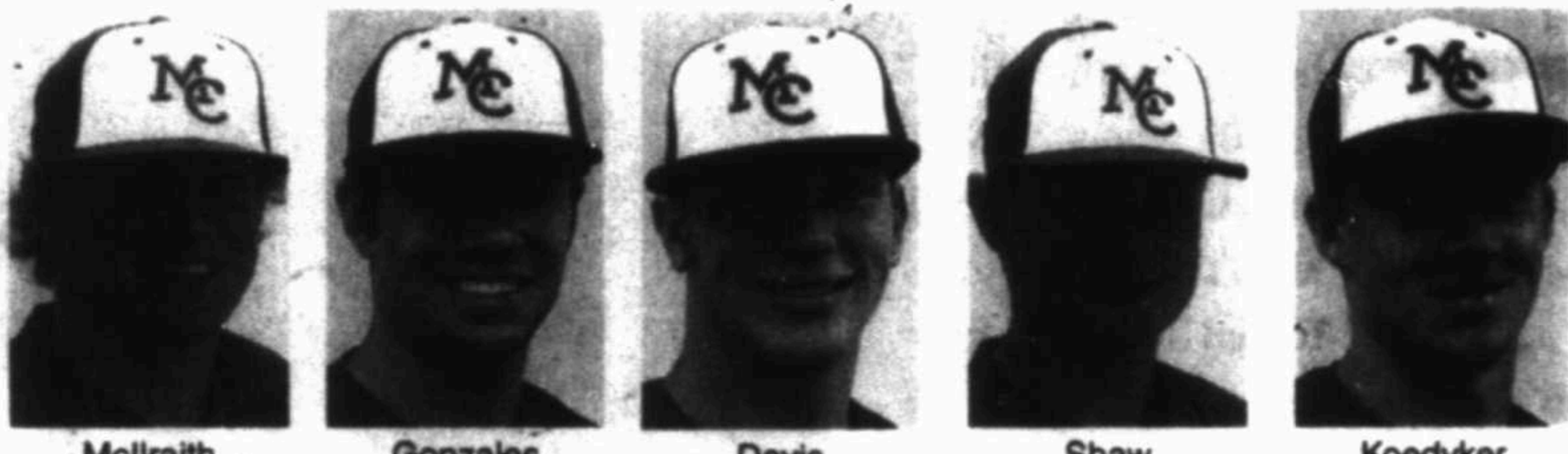

group of guys we have and hopefully have a better result than last year," said sophomore catcher/first baseman Chris Shaw, who was a key player on last year's team that went 1-2 at the tournament. Head coach David Coleman said it was key returning players like Shaw, outfielder Caleb Koedyker and the seven other sophomores who kept the team believing through the hard times. "They really were the key guys that got us to this point," Coleman said of his sophomores. "With the way the season went, they were the stabilizing force. They were the ones that held the team together, so yeah to give them the opportunity to go back is really special."

Freshman outfielder/pitcher Cade Davis said the sophomores were great leaders throughout the year. "Even when we started off slow in conference, they just kept through and kept telling us to do what's right because it's going to pay off at the end. As a team that's what we did," Davis said. "We also listened to Coach Coleman to what he had to say. He always told us to do what's right and it's going to pay off."

Added Koedyker, who is from Seminole. "It was a bumpy road but we did it. It shows that it's not over until it's over. As long as you keep on playing hard and playing the game right, most of the time it pays off. You just have to learn from your failures and keep moving forward."

It wasn't always easy as not only did the Chaps have to go through a tough start in conference, they had to blend in many new faces to the everyday lineup. "At the beginning of the season, we had guys not quite mixing in as well and binding together," said Gonzales, who is from Argyle. "It finally started getting there in that New Mexico Military series. After that, it just all felt good."



Winning three out of four games against NMMI in that series helped propel the Chaps through the rest of the season. But there was work to be done at the Region V Tournament as the Chaps were far from being the favorites as the No. 4 seed. After defeating No. 6 Grayson County, 10-9, to open the tournament, the Chaps suffered an 8-2 loss to McLennan Community College. But just like they did to close the regular season, the Chaps found a way to bounce back and win five straight games — including two against McLennan — to repeat as regional champs. "After turning our season

around and making the regionals, everyone got a clean slate," said Shaw, who is from Winnepesaukee, Canada. "It's been game on since then and we were able to do something special, especially the way we went about our business (at regionals) and pulling out doubleheader wins and finally getting that championship win that last day." Added McIlraith, who got the win in that final game. "I guess it's a big time reward for doing things the right way and to keep grinding. We showed so much heart throughout the year believing that we're going to do it." Now this group of sophomores will look to

finish their careers by winning the last game of their careers. "Some teams don't even make it to regionals in two years, and I'm just extremely blessed to make it back to the World Series and I'm definitely going to soak it all in," Gonzales said. "I'm confident we're going to score runs every game, which helps to get our pitchers comfortable, whether it's starting, relief or close. 

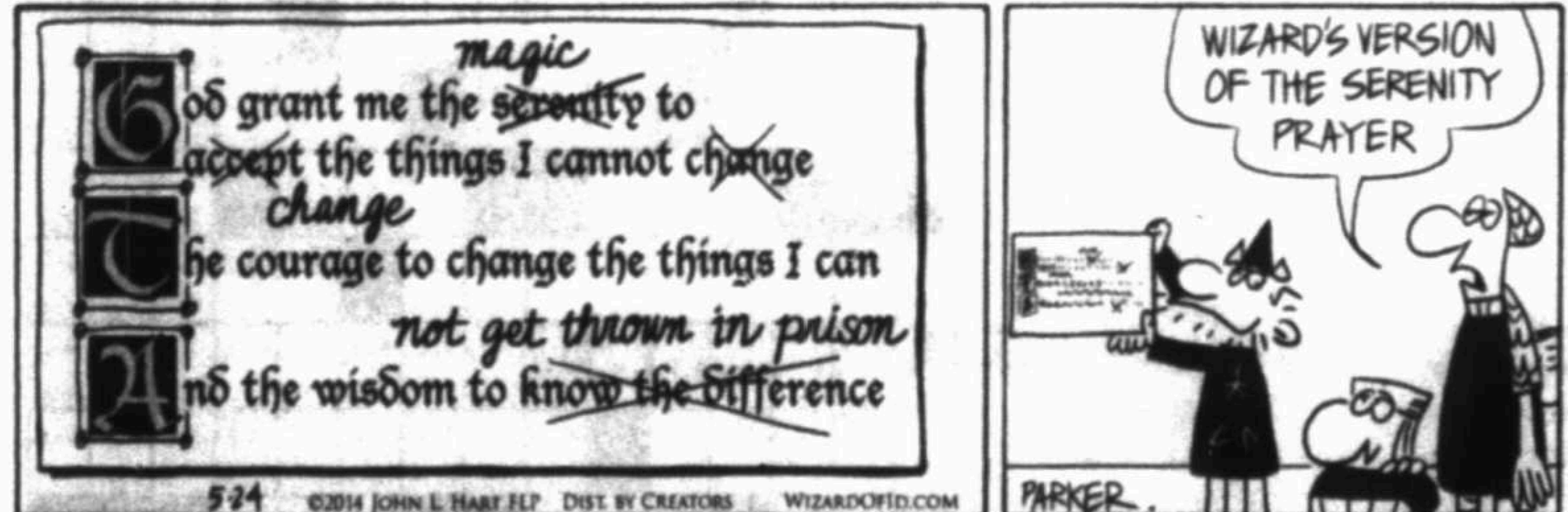

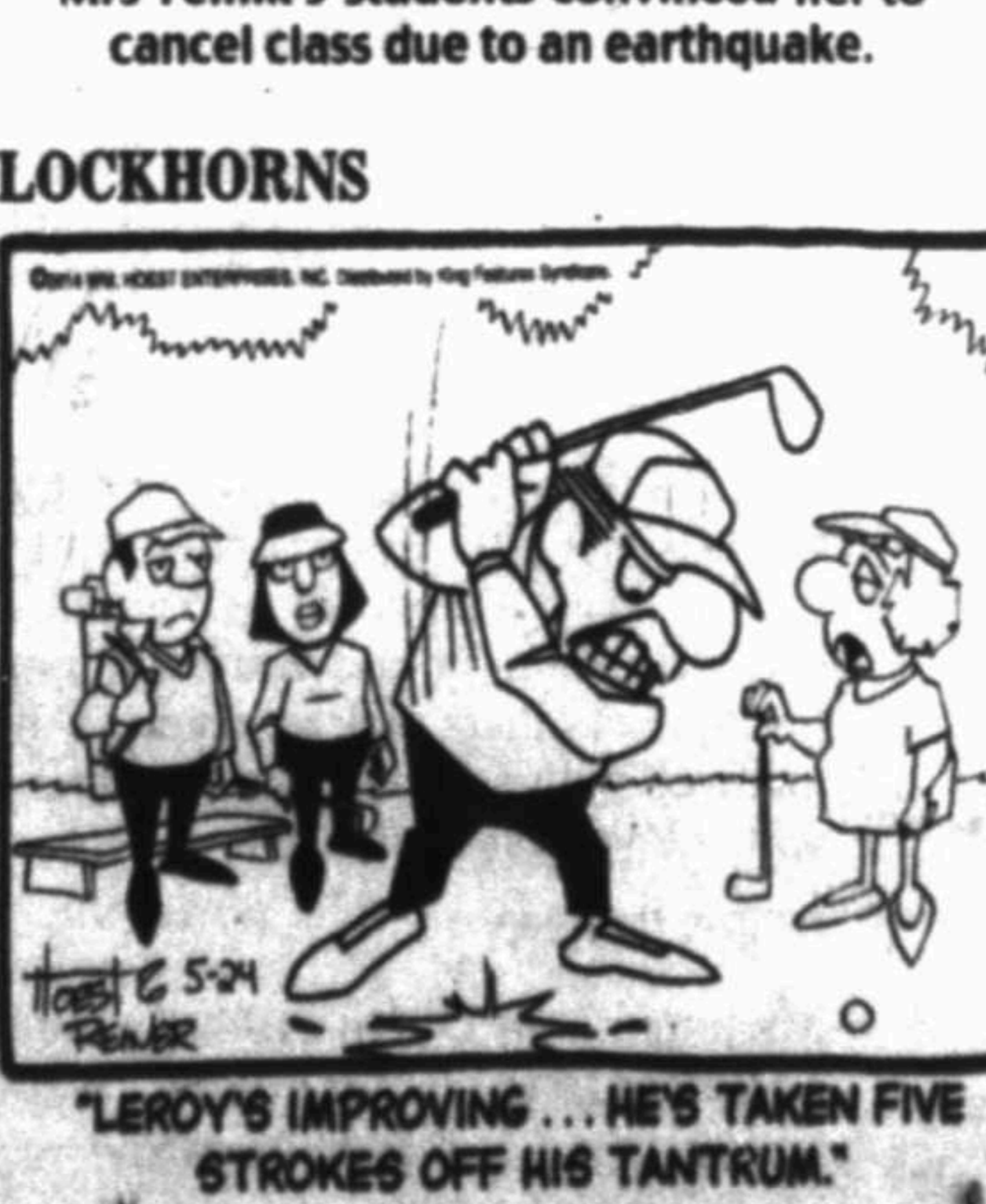

Local forecast

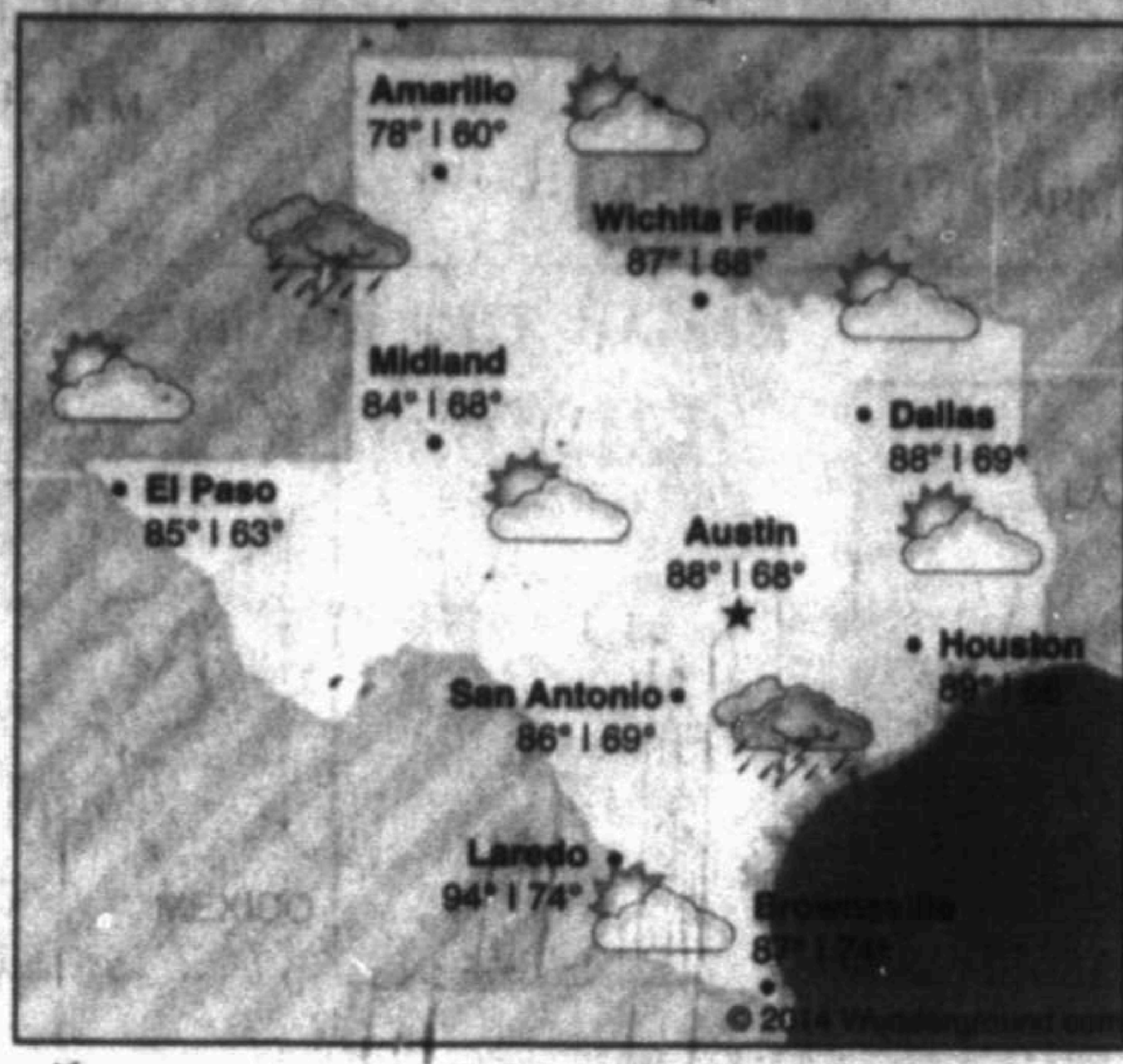

Teen initiates 'the talk,' but mom opts to dodge it

DEAR ABBY: I'm 16 and entering my junior year of high school. My boyfriend, "Jonah," and I have been dating for almost a year, and we would like to become sexually active, but I'm scared condoms won't cut it. I have tried talking to my mom about it, but she doesn't think I should go on birth control.

Abby, I'm just trying to keep the risk of getting pregnant as low as possible. I'm not sure my mom understands that. What should I do? I know for sure my mother will find out if I go to my doctor and talk privately about this with her. Please help me because I'm just trying to protect myself.

— PRACTICAL TEEN IN NEW YORK

DEAR PRACTICAL TEEN: You appear to be a levelheaded young woman who is trying to make mature decisions. Discussing sex with parents can be difficult — not only for you, but also for them.

If you are willing to talk about this with your mother again, try using a magazine, a TV show or my column as a jumping-off point to start the conversation. Sometimes it may take more than one talk to feel comfortable disclosing your personal feelings and intentions.

You should be able to get confidential health services from your doctor or another

health care provider. Depending upon where you live, however, parental permission may be needed. You will have to check to find out.

In terms of birth control methods, hormonal birth control is effective when used correctly. But using hormonal birth control and a condom TOGETHER offers the best protection from both pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases.

For many years, I have recommended Planned Parenthood (plannedparenthood.org) for reproductive health services, which include information, contraception, testing and education about a full range of options for women, men and teens across the United States. Its services are confidential and comply with relevant laws, which may vary from state to state.

Some Planned Parenthood centers scale their charges according to income, and most accept health insurance. Your local Planned Parenthood health center can give you spe-

cific information about costs and policies. If you qualify, Medicaid or other state programs may lower the costs.

DEAR ABBY: Do you think it's bad that my two girls don't see their father? I don't keep them from him. He's welcome to see them, but he is now remarried and has never asked for them. He left our household 10 years ago.

To be honest, the girls don't even talk about him anymore. Is it OK to let them go on with their lives with the family members who are in it? — NEW MEXICO MOMMY

DEAR NEW MEXICO MOMMY: It's sad that your daughters have no relationship with their father. However, because he has shown no interest in having one with them, you have no option but to let them go on with their lives.

The question that comes to mind is, has he been supporting the girls financially? If the answer is no, you should have gotten a lawyer involved 10 years ago.
