DALLAS REPORTER FINED AND JAILED

Pedestrian Seriously Hurt When Hit by Car at Dothan

LEG BROKEN, AND INJURED INTERNALLY

A pedestrian, about 35, giving his name as George Finn and his residence as Cheyenne, Wyo., was seriously injured when struck by a car on the highway in front of a garage at Dothan, 6 miles west of Cisco, Monday morning. A Green ambulance took him to the Graham sanitarium where he was found to be suffering from fractures of the right internal injuries and cuts and bruises. His condition was described as serious.

The youth, about 18 years of age, driving the car which struck the pedestrian, according to reports, being the youth, four women and an elderly man, Joe Gozola, of Minneapolis, were in the vehicle.

Spectators said that Finn started driving the street just as the car approached and that both he and the driver evidently became confused. Finn was carried about 80 feet before the car could be brought to a stop, witnesses said.

Finn was reported to have a wife, Haverhill, Mass. She is being notified.

WESTOCK CONDITIONS EXCELLENT

AUSTIN, March 11.—Cattle and sheep will be fat earlier this year than range conditions, from present reports, are excellent for early abundant grazing, says the March 1 livestock report for Texas issued here today by the United States department of agriculture.

Condition of ranges on March 1 rated at 86 per cent, an improvement of eight per cent over a month of four per cent above average and 14 per cent above the condition on the same date last year. Cattle were rated at 84 per cent, 10 per cent better than a month ago and eight per cent better than a year ago; sheep at 88 per cent, 14 per cent better than a year ago, and goats at 87 per cent, or 12 per cent better than a year ago.

A seven and one-half pound son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Randolph on Sunday night, at 9 o'clock, has been named Paul Gene.

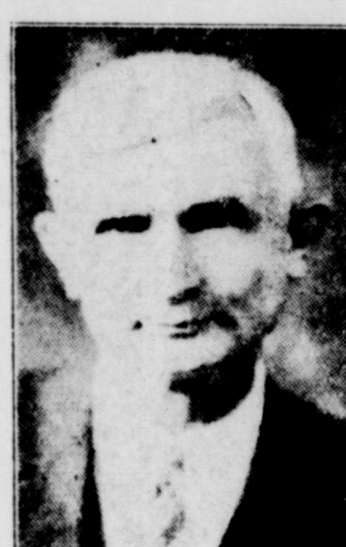
If no earlier birth on March 8, reported within ten days, the date on the merchants' birth calendar will give the baby the gift for this date.

3 NOMINATED FOR VACANCY ON C. C. BOARD

Three men were nominated by the board of directors of the chamber of commerce last night to fill a vacancy on the board caused by the resignation of L. B. Norvell, who was elected a director at the beginning of the year but declined to serve because business duties prevented his giving sufficient time to the place. From the three nominees the city commission will select a director.

The board named a committee consisting of Dr. Charles Hale, H. S. Drumwright and J. A. Bearman to prepare a budget for the operation of the chamber in 1932.

After an informal discussion of the Randolph college question it was definitely determined not to invite a legislative committee to Cisco in the prospect of the state's taking over the institution. Plans for continuing the operation of the school under church management were discussed.

The committee named to raise \$1,000 as Cisco's share of the financing of a sweet potato curing plant at Scranton reported it was unable to secure the necessary amount and this project was postponed. The committee reported it had secured \$650 in subscriptions.

Directors present at the meeting were J. A. Bearman, President; J. J. Collins, E. P. Crawford, H. S. Drumwright, Dr. Charles Hale, P. Shepard, F. D. Wright and L. B. Campbell. Others present were J. E. Spencer, secretary, and F. A. Blankenbecker, visitor.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., March 11.—A single blond hair clasped in the hand of little Virginia Brooks today gave police a tangible clue with which to continue the search for her murderer.

Autopsy surgeons found the hair while making further examinations of the body. The hair was not Virginia's, they reported, and did not resemble that of Harry L. Wahlstrom, 28, a suspect in the case.

Officers refused to say what connection the suspect had with the case but it was believed he had been convicted previously on a charge of degeneracy.

REPEAL BILL IS PASSED BY SENATE 23-1

Passage by the Texas senate of house bill No. 317 for repeal of the receivership law enacted by the second called session of the 41st legislature and designated as senate bill No. 31, was reported from Austin today. The senate vote for repeal was 23 to 1, according to information. The house passed the bill last Wednesday by a vote of 12 to 2. The bill now goes to the governor for his approval or veto.

The receivership law which this bill repeals provides for appointment of receivers for towns and cities defaulting in the payment of public indebtedness under what were claimed practically confiscatory provisions. It was attacked on the ground that it is unconstitutional, but the repealing act drew principal support because of the drastic nature of the receivership law which would in effect take control of municipal affairs from the hands of the citizens and vest them in a receiver appointed by the court. Powers of a receiver under the law would be practically dictatorial.

The bill was written by Judge J. J. Butts and Clayton L. Orn, Cisco attorneys, and introduced in the house by State Representative Victor B. Gilbert, of Cisco.

Entire Control.

Under the receivership law a receiver for a defaulting city would have entire control, subject to court direction, over the financial affairs of the city. He would serve as assessor, collector and board of equalization and the only appeal from his decisions would be to the court from which he derived authority.

Sections of the receivership law, repealed by the house bill just passed, are:

Sec. 3. The receiver shall forthwith investigate the financial affairs of said municipality and report to the court the amount of bonds and other obligations outstanding maturity thereof and rate of interest thereon and other obligations, and whether in form of cash or securities; the amount of ad valorem taxes levied for current expenses of said municipality for each of the preceding ten years, or from the date of incorporation thereof in event it has not been incorporated for that period of time; and, so far as may be possible, the receiver shall also report to the court the amount of all other revenues received from all sources each year, during said ten-year period, or during the period said municipality has been incorporated; in event it has not been incorporated for a period of ten years and such revenues are not produced by ad valorem taxes, then the receiver

Mr. and Mrs. Hoover expressed great pleasure at receiving a copy of this recently-discovered photo at the White House, and went to great pains to identify all the sitters.

BILL TO HASTEN GUARANTY FUND LIQUIDATION PENDING

A bill designed to remove control of the distribution of money in the guaranty fund from the depositors guaranty fund from the banking board, composed of the banking commissioner, state treasurer and attorney general, to a special committee of three members of the state house and two members of the state senate, has been introduced in the house of representatives at Austin. The bill has been referred to the committee on banks and banking.

The legislative committee, under the terms of the bill, would proceed promptly with plans for distribution of the residue funds due banks which withdrew from the guaranty fund system and the depositors of nine defunct banks which had funds on deposit in the guaranty fund as protection for their depositors. If any of the funds remain on hand on December 31, 1931, the bill provides that these shall be transferred to the general funds of the state and any claimant who has not received his proportion before December 31, 1931, would be authorized to file suit against the state for such amount as could be established as due him.

Cisco Bank.

One of the nine defunct banks whose depositors are entitled to payments from the guaranty fund residue is the Commercial State bank, of Cisco. Approximately 60 per cent of the claims of the Cisco depositors has been paid and about \$60,000 in money is still due on these claims. Of this amount a \$10,000 remittance is promised within the next few days.

"A law similar to this would be a very good thing," in the opinion of P. D. Wright, one of the attorneys for the Cisco depositors. "It would tend to determine the interests of all parties in a comparatively short time and to save further delay in the liquidation of the fund which totals approximately \$1,500,000."

There are about 800 former depositors in the Commercial State bank of Cisco who are interested in the liquidation of this fund, and

who would receive the benefits of this liquidation.

The following is the text of the bill:

A bill to be entitled:

An act relating to Depositors Guaranty Fund by calling attention to the fact that certain sums of money have been on deposit for several years with the state treasury and on deposit with certain banks over the state which funds rightfully belong to depositors of the defunct banks named herein and to member banks who had placed in the hands of the State Banking commissioner the aforementioned funds as a guaranty fund for the protection of their depositors and providing for the appointment of a legislative committee of five of the Forty Second Legislature, three to be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and two by the Lieutenant governor of the senate to supervise the distribution of the sums herein mentioned to the depositors of the nine defunct banks and to the member banks who had placed these funds into the hands of the banking commission; and if any of the funds still remain on hand December 31, 1931, to authorize the state treasurer to transfer such funds to the general funds of the state, authorizing any claimant who has not received their proportion of these funds before December 31, 1931, to file suit against the State of Texas, for such amount as

IS SILENT ON QUESTIONS OF GRAND JURY

DALLAS, March 11.—Eddie Barr, Dallas Dispatch reporter today was fined \$100 and sent to the county jail by Judge Grover Adams for refusing to tell the county grand jury where he obtained his exclusive story last week of the kidnapping and beating of Lewis Hurst and C. J. Code.

Barr was the sixth witness called into the grand jury room in the investigation of the kidnapping and kidnapping of their lawyer, George C. Edwards. He told District Attorney William McGraw and the jurors that he could not betray a confidence. McGraw then took Barr to Judge Adams.

"From whom did you get the information about the flogging of these men and the kidnapping of Edwards?" asked Judge Adams.

"I told Mr. McGraw and the grand jury that I couldn't betray a confidence," Barr answered.

"Do you tell me the same thing?" the judge asked.

"Yes, sir," Barr replied.

"I fine you \$100 for contempt of court and you will be taken to jail and confined there until you are ready to answer the questions asked you by the grand jury," said the judge.

"Mr. Sheriff, take charge of him."

Edwards, attorney for the two communists, was in Eastland today in the trial of a lawsuit. He told an interviewer that he did not know where Hurst and Code are and that he had not seen them since the night of the alleged kidnapping. He maintained that the men were kidnapped because he said that he was with them and was cleared of the kidnappers at the city limits of Dallas. He asserted, also, that the two were beaten in a police station in Dallas before the kidnapping, by an ex-prize fighter who was not a prisoner in the Dallas jail.

At the conclusion of the case at Eastland he said he intended going back to Dallas and tell the grand jury all he knows about the affair.

Ask Cooperation in School Census

Residents of homes in the area between Tenth and 18th street this afternoon and tomorrow may expect calls from those who are taking the annual scholastic census. Supt. R. N. Clark and high school Principal H. Brandt expect to call at all homes in this neighborhood during this time and they urge all parents and guardians to cooperate with them in securing a complete enumeration of children of scholastic age in order that the Cisco public school system may obtain all state funds to which it is entitled. Each child is worth \$17.50 in state maintenance appropriations and it follows that each child enumerated will increase by just that much the amount of money available to conduct the school system next year, Mr. Clark pointed out.

Missionary in Cisco for Message

Dr. J. Howard Taylor, who is a medical missionary of the China Inland Mission, having for the past 40 years had a great part in the history making of that section of the world, is also a world traveler, author, and lecturer, whose time and talent are widely sought. His message is international, and inter-denominational, and press reports of his appearances elsewhere indicate that his message is altogether unique, eliciting the highest praise. Dr. Taylor arrived in Cisco at noon today, and will be heard at the First Presbyterian church at 7:45 this evening. It was announced by the minister, the Rev. B. C. Boney, "This message is open to the public which is urged not to miss the opportunity to hear our distinguished visitor." Mr. Boney further said. There is no admission charge.

SPEAKING OF COUNTY CONSOLIDATION PLAN.

There is an important amendment pending at Austin. It would provide for a change in county government. According to The Kansas City Times a very considerable part of the tax burden of the country about which complaint is growing "is the self-imposed burden of local subdivisions." Indeed The Times editorial points out that it is the burden of our necessary government that steadily has been built up through the years, "a chief feature of it arising from the obsolete county organization in the great majority of states." Furthermore The Times editor argues that though once justified because of conditions of travel, the number of counties in the average state now is excessive by one-half or more and as a result "county consolidation is beginning to be advocated in various parts of the country."

Mention is made that it is a particularly live issue in some of the southern states, "where business conditions recently have made existing taxation especially serious." County government is very costly to the taxpayer and the fat and exorbitant fee system is responsible for the load the taxpayers have been carrying through the years. This is the conclusion of The Times. "The question relates exclusively to no one section, nor is the desirability of a simpler and less expensive arrangement an outgrowth merely of an unfavorable business situation. Wasteful government costs are a menace at any time. How wasteful unnecessary county government may be is indicated by estimates, one of them in Kansas, that consolidation would bring annual savings in taxation running into millions of dollars. To effect economies of such proportions nothing material would be lost except certain numbers of places for county job holders; but the interests of the people as a whole and the tax payers should be given precedence."

GOVERNOR ROOSEVELT DIDN'T SIDESTEP.

Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt has named Samuel Seabury to act as special commissioner to investigate charges against District Attorney Thomas C. T. Crain of New York city and county. Crain is 70 and an important Tammany Hall official. His removal is demanded by the City club of New York. Speaking for the district attorney his secretary said that Crain would fight the charges; that he has nothing to hide or to fear and that his record as district attorney has been better than that of his predecessors, "as will be amply proven at the proper time."

Samuel Seabury, a former supreme court judge, is serving also as the appellate court referee in the investigation into the magistrates courts of the city of New York. He is an independent in politics and has a national reputation as an advocate of law and order and law enforcement. If the decision of the referee is against Crain the governor has the power of removal, the power to name a successor or to fill the vacancy to serve as district attorney until the voters of New York fill the office in the election of 1932.

Franklin D. Roosevelt has a spotless record. He was an assistant secretary of the navy during the reign of Woodrow Wilson. As far as his personal integrity goes no man has ever challenged it. As far as efficiency goes he is one of the greatest governors New York has known. He did not evade the issue in the Crain case. He did not appoint a dummy investigator. He picked a man known as a fearless champion of the rights of the people and honesty and efficiency on the part of public servants. Most of the Roosevelt run true to form and tradition and Franklin D. is a Roosevelt who is "without fear and without reproach."

MEXICO READY FOR AMERICAN TOURISTS.

President Rubio is building public highways in Mexico. State Chairman W. R. Ely of the Texas highway commission is covering Mexico and the Central Americas on his way to the South American conference of highway builders. Now the National railways of Mexico will establish offices in six cities of the United States and in France and England to encourage business and the coming of tourists to Mexico. American offices will be in New York, Boston, Chicago, Detroit, St. Louis and San Francisco. "On to Panama" is a dead slogan. "On to Patagonia" is the new slogan. Some day the United States of North America will be on the map. Some day the United States of Central America and Mexico will be on the map. South of the Rio Grande river there is said to be 150,000,000 Spanish speaking people. Why not friendly relations and trade ties?

STONE FOR THE LEGGE POLICIES.

It is announced via Washington that the general policies of the farm board will continue without change under the reign of Chairman James C. Stone. This applies particularly to the present operations of the grain and cotton stabilization corporations. In a statement Chairman Stone asserted the co-operative method of organization was the most effective and best adapted to the needs of the farmers. Since the organization of the board financial assistance has been given 101 associations, many of them national or regional marketing agencies composed of hundreds of local co-operative units. Loans total slightly more than \$250,000,000 and the farm board has undertaken 120 projects in studying marketing and financial problems for these associations as units have been organized with the assistance of the board. This is the verdict of Chairman Stone: "One sees and hears a lot these days about how much the farm board is going to lose of the \$500,000,000 revolving fund. Yes, some money may

be lost, but any losses sustained will be small in comparison with the benefits to agriculture and, for that matter, the country as a whole." Alexander W. Legge blazed the trail. Chairman James C. Stone appears to be walking in the trail as Legge surveyed it and then passed it on to his successor.

OTHER OPINIONS

BUSINESS IS IMPROVING

The bank deposits issued last week by the federal reserve banks of the nation show that surely the business of the country is getting back on the right side of the ledger. This movement may seem slow to some, yet it is apparent to all.

The report made by the Dallas bank is highly encouraging, and shows improved conditions in nearly all lines of business and endeavor. About the same time these reports were issued, Julius Barnes, noted national financier, who has been gathering data from all European countries, as well as in America, announced that the buying movement in nearly all products made in America is getting under way.

Throughout the middle west, where more than a hundred banks were closed during the peak of the general depression, nearly all of these banks have either "opened" or are arranging to. That may sound remarkable, but when it is considered that most of these banks were forced to close, not because they were weak or unreliable but because of the hysteria of the people, it is easily understood.

In the very nature of the banking business, there are certain rules and regulations that must be observed on the part of depositor as well as borrower, and now that confidence is returning the whole scheme of business is getting on a sounder footing.

It appears that even Providence is throwing in to lend a hand in restoring prosperity. The weather during the entire winter, over most of the country, has been balmy. There has been plenty of green food for livestock and early gardens for the people. It may be that cotton will not be as high as we should like, but it is predicted now by financial men that the next cotton dollar will bring as much to eat and wear as any dollar the farmer has possessed for a decade.

So, taking it by and large, the outlook is anything but dismal for those who are not afraid of work and who will work at the things their hands may find to do.—Sherman Democrat.

IN THE POLITICAL ARENA

Many of the greatest of women who have flourished in America in all the periods of history flourished under the six flags of the stars of Texas. Many are in the land of the living today—ever tireless, ever courageous, ever intelligent and ever planning for the welfare of the people. As community workers, as state workers, as national workers they have won their laurels and yet what is known as "Woman's Age" was ushered in with the adoption of the 19th amendment and the placing of the ballot in the hands of woman. Mrs. Chan. Shuber of Fort Worth, outstanding in welfare and educational and club work as a leader for almost a third of a century, appeared under the big dome to ask the members of the committee on constitutional amendments to submit a very modest proposal to the people. If adopted, it would provide a very light county tax for the establishment and maintenance of county libraries, the commonwealth eyes. A very remarkable and yet a very modest leader is Mrs. Shuber. Fort Worth was a very small city when she began her missionary labor—near the place where the last panther is said to have laid down and through the years she has been the chief apostle of progress, the uplift of those who needed uplift, the dissemination of knowledge, the establishment of libraries and for welfare laws which have a tall times, been so badly needed. Ever a champion of parks and gardens and boulevards and the addition of city slums and all unrightly places she has erected her own monuments in the city. She lives so well as a leader of her people.

She was largely instrumental in obtaining a Carnegie library for Ft. Worth. This library is supported by a very light city appropriation. She has been its librarian since its establishment. She has made a study of libraries for the people and how they should be maintained in many of the states of the union and has extended her travels to foreign lands. Indeed she has been prominent in community and state for the building mind program which has meant so much to the people of Texas and the country. In club life she has ever been a leader and when it comes to economics or the legislative needs of the state she is as well informed as any woman who has made history in the southwest. Not many years ago Fort Worth had a famous mayor, known as "Wild Bill" Davis. He was a city builder along certain lines but authority made him as autocratic as Mussolini. He made up his mind as an important municipal campaign was on the way that Fort Worth did not need a great public library—that is if the taxpayers had to contribute a very meager sum annually to assist in its maintenance and development. Truth is he had made up his mind that one leader was sufficient in all the movements of the city upward, that the mayor was the man and that the woman librarian should be relegated to some life where God and nature had intended woman should confine her activities. He made the issue and forced the fighting. What happened is ancient history. "Wild Bill" Davis, the invincible political leader and mayor and autocrat of what was known in those days as "Cowtown" met with overwhelming defeat at the polls. An unknown scholar in politics, a member of the faculty of Texas Christian university became the successor of "Wild Bill". At last accounts Bill was a very demure and domesticated citizen of El Paso. Mrs. Shuber remained the leader of the women of Fort Worth, their chief apostle of welfare and educational and club and city beautification endeavors. She did not have to dismount. She yields the scepter today and now she is in Austin hitting her musical notes for the county library proposal which would furnish the best of back literature to the people in the sparsely settled communities as well as to push along the car of progress and the torch of enlightenment. This is a short news story dealing with a great woman who does not know she is great but who has the confidence and the love of the real people of a great and growing Texas city.

Speaking of Texas women the 35th annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers association is to be held in Corpus Christi, the coastal city, March 17, 18 and 19. It has been well said that a woman's touch, tempered by the traditions of the South Texas cow country, will be felt in the many entertainment features for the 35th annual roundup, as the local convention committee has as its head Mrs. Lorine Jones Spoons, daughter of Col. and Mrs. W. W. Jones. Col. Jones is one of the most widely known ranchmen and millionaires in the section known as the Coastal Empire. Mrs. Spoons

is a native daughter of Texas. She served four years as president of the chamber of commerce of Corpus Christi. She was tendered the mayoralty nomination and declined it. She is a globe trotter and has visited many countries. A year ago she made the invitation speech, appearing before the San Angelo convention, and won over all competitors. Now she expects her committee to entertain 2000 visitors next week and to make the coming of the convention one of the really big events of the history of Corpus Christi. Mrs. H. H. Sevier of Austin and Corpus Christi is president of the largest of city banks. She owns vast ranches and oil and gas wells. She is the national committeewoman of the democratic party. Texas has its full quota of women who have made the high mark—and this applies to the living as well as to the dead.

SCHOOL FOR CHINESE

NEW ORLEANS, La., March 11.—New Orleans now has its first Chinese language school for the children of its 400 Chinese colonists. Simple characters of the 3,000-word Cantonese dialect are being taught to the youngsters and it is hoped to make them good scholars of their native tongue in time. Chinese Consul Lee is one of the sponsors of the school, which is being undertaken under Christian auspices.

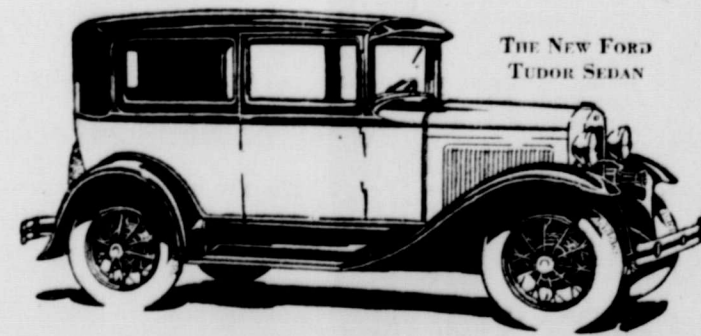

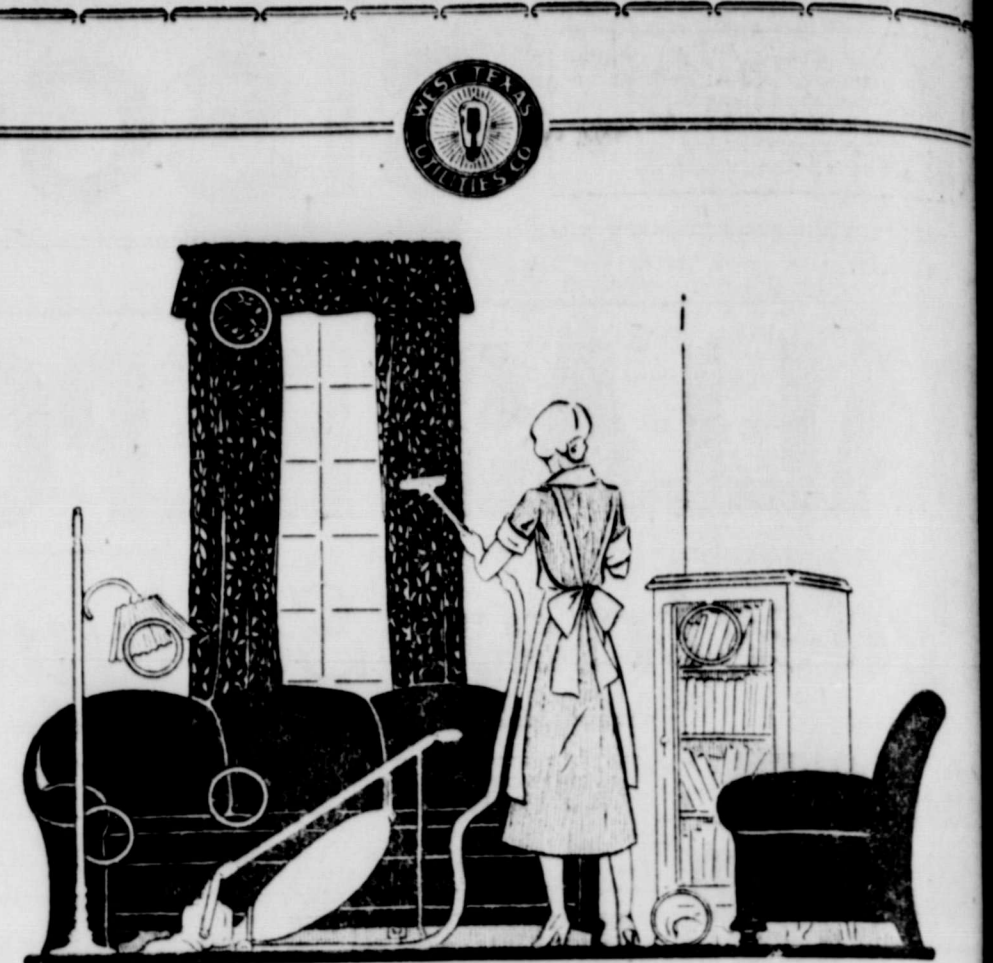

OLONS PLAN YEARLY SCHOOL FOR EFFICIENCY

CHICAGO, March 11. — A legislature for legislators will be annually to promote efficiency in law-making bodies, the state law-makers' association, announced today.

The legislature will be composed of representatives of both branches of every legislature in the country. Through annual national convocations the association hopes to make an exchange of ideas and views.

The program, according to Henry W. Toll, director of the association, will be to give each state the best possible legislative, improved efficiency in organizing the state and expert advice and information.

Information will be sought in connection with crime, health, law, courts, administrative efficiency, transportation, legislative efficiency, agriculture, education, welfare, and mental hygiene.

Clearing House
An information clearing house has been established and council in operation in all states. Annually a conference, open to legislators will be held as well as the annual interstate legislative reference bureau directors' regional will also be held.

ROMANTIC OLD SHIP TO QUIT ALASKA TRIPS

BATTLE, March 11. — Development of faster transportation necessity for enlarged facilities will cause the passing of the romantic boat that continues to ply between the United States and the far-flung territory of Alaska.

The Arctic ship Boxer, which carried school supplies to government posts for years, will be replaced by a larger, faster vessel, scheduled for the first deficiency appropriation bill.

Native of Alaska, as far north as Point Barrow, look forward to annual visits of the little motorship Boxer, which carries government teachers to their posts, distributes winter supplies, ministers medical aid to isolated posts, and returns with a cargo of furs, ivory and reindeer carcases.

The new ship will accommodate passengers, instead of 10 provided by the Boxer, and will be equipped with Diesel engines of 1,000 horsepower, capable of a speed of 14 knots compared to the nine knots which is about top speed for the Boxer in good weather. A bathed hull will protect her from the fumes of the Arctic.

Refrigerator space for 2,000 reindeer carcases, compared with 500 provided by the Boxer, will be provided, and the new ship will carry a clinic attended by a physician and dentist.

The new vessel will serve northern Alaska and the Alaska peninsula, making three trips annually. The Boxer will continue to operate but will be kept in the protected waters of Southeastern Alaska.

they could establish rightfully due them; making the necessary appropriation for the carrying out of the provisions of this bill; and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Whereas, by an act of the 40th legislature, regular session, chapter 12, effective February 11, 1927, the Depositors' Guaranty Fund law was repealed, and article 439, of the revised civil statutes of Texas, 1925, was amended, whereby the banking board composed of the banking commissioner, state treasurer and attorney general were no longer invested with the power of regulation, control and management of the depositors' guaranty fund or system, and:

Whereas, at the time of the repeal of said Depositors' Guaranty Fund law, the following banks, members of said system had theretofore failed and the depositors of such banks entitled to the benefits of said law had not been paid:

Commercial Guaranty State Bank, Longview, Texas, failed September 29, 1926.

Commercial State Bank, Cisco, Texas, failed October 31, 1926.

Altza State Bank, Altoga, Altoga, Texas, failed November 3, 1926.

Farmers and Merchants State Bank, Mt. Calm, failed November 16, 1926.

Guaranty State Bank, Trinidad, failed November 26, 1926.

Farmers State Bank, Kemp, Texas, failed December 2, 1926.

Guaranty State Bank, Gunter, Texas, failed December 14, 1926.

Addison State Bank, Addison, Texas, failed March 3, 1927.

First State Bank, Belton, Texas, failed January 7, 1927.

The unpaid depositors' claims growing out of the failure of the above mentioned nine banks totaled \$319,609.84, which sum was on hand January 1st, 1931.

Whereas, there was in the possession of the state treasurer, on January 31, 1931, funds coming in to his possession by reason of the provisions of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Law, the sum of \$949,087.50, and:

Whereas, the Banking Commissioner has under his control funds coming into his possession by reason of the provisions of said Depositors' Guaranty Fund Law, the sum of \$1,527,103.89, and:

Whereas, said funds in the hands of the state treasurer do not bear interest, and some \$135,000.00 of the funds in the possession of the banking commissioner have been on deposit in two Austin banks for about four years without interest, and the remainder of said sum of \$1,527,103.89 in possession of the commissioner has been on deposit with various banks at a very low rate of interest, not exceeding 2 1/2 per cent per annum; and:

Whereas, there seems to be no valid reason why such money should not be paid over at once to the depositors of said failed banks

and to the contributing banks in accordance with principles of equity and justice, and:

Whereas, there is no state agency charged by law with the further administration of said guaranty fund, and for that for all practical purposes the fund is a state fund in the possession of the State of Texas, and beyond the jurisdiction of any court, there being no law authorizing any such depositor or bank to sue the state to establish or collect his interest in, or claim against the state fund.

Section 2. That said fund and monies mentioned in the preamble to this act be declared to be in the possession and under the control

of the State of Texas, and held by the state in trust for the use and benefit of the depositors of said nine banks failing before the repeal of the Depositors' Guaranty Law, and for the contributing banks formerly members of the Guaranty Fund System, provided that this act shall not affect any dividends already declared but not yet paid.

Section 3. That the state treasurer and the banking commissioner shall immediately upon the passage of this act cause all said funds and money to be placed in the state treasury in a special account, which shall show from whom and from what source received, and from what account it was withdrawn and placed in the treasury.

Section 4. Immediately upon the passage of this act a committee of three members of the house of representatives and two senators to be selected by the speaker of the house and the president of the senate, shall be appointed to manage, control and distribute said fund and money to the depositors and contributing banks, equitably and as justice may dictate. Said committee shall immediately after their appointment organize, select a chairman, and it shall have power and authority to employ such clerical assistance as it may see fit, as well as counsel for advice. It may call upon the attorney general,

the state auditor or the banking commissioner for such aid and assistance as it may think necessary. It shall proceed promptly and shall determine the methods and manner of distribution and shall distribute the funds.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the committee herein provided for to see that all the accounts mentioned in the preamble of this bill shall be properly audited and to see that all interest charges due from banks with whom the aforementioned funds were deposited have been or shall be collected, and paid into the state treasury, and such interest funds as are thus collected and paid to the state

treasurer shall be distributed by the committee herein provided for in like manner as are the principal funds herein mentioned.

Section 6. Any of the aforementioned funds that may be left in the hands of the state treasurer on December 31st, 1931, shall be transferred by the state treasurer to the general fund of the state.

Section 7. Authority is hereby given to any legal claimant for any part of such funds as may be transferred, to the general fund for any amounts which may be claimed to be due them. This authority to be effective after December 31, 1931.

Section 8. The sum of Ten

Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated from any funds in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expense of the committee in performing the duties herein imposed.

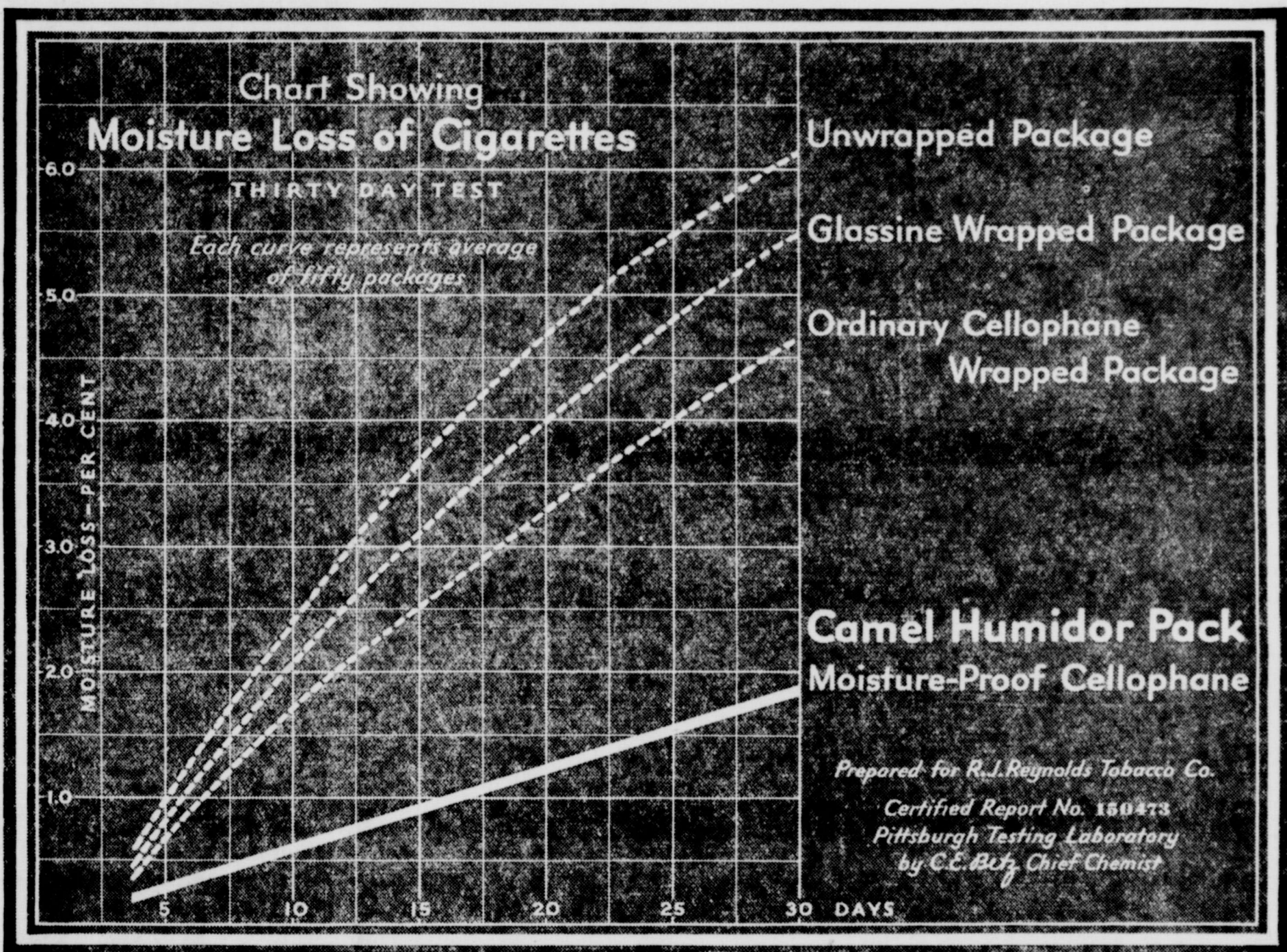

shall report the amount expended in each of said years, or for said period, for the operation of the municipal government, and the amount of delinquent taxes then unpaid; together with all other facts necessary to fully advise the court in respect of the financial affairs of such municipality. If it appears to the court that sinking fund requirements of any such bond or their obligations have not been met, or that taxes have not been levied for that purpose as provided by the ordinance authorizing the issuance thereof, or if it shall appear that such levies have been made but the proceeds thereof have been diverted to other purposes, the court shall thereupon direct the receiver to make such levies as were authorized and provided for by the ordinance or ordinances creating such debts, in an amount sufficient to create cash as required by such ordinance or ordinances for interest and sinking fund purposes, and which such taxes shall be in addition to all levies for any other purpose, being the intent hereof to specify that all tax levies lawfully made for payment of bonds or other obligations of such city or town, including interest thereon, shall constitute a prior pledge thereof for that purpose to the full amount of such tax levies.

Valuations by Receiver.

Sec. 4. The valuation of taxable property of such municipality for all purposes of taxation shall be fixed by the receiver, at the full value three-fourths after giving notice to the taxpayers and inhabitants thereof, of a time and place for hearing upon such questions. Such notice shall be made by publishing same at least once in a newspaper published in such municipality, such publication to be made at least 15 days prior to the date of such hearing. In the event no newspaper is published therein then such notice shall be sufficient if copies thereof are posted for a like time, in not less than three public places within such municipality. The valuations arrived at by such receiver after such hearing shall be reported to the court for its consideration and after approval thereof, by the court, shall constitute the basis for the levying of taxes for all purposes in such municipality. Provided, however, taxes then in process of collection based upon assessed valuations therefore determined shall be completed and taxing therefor shall be upon the valuations so fixed by the court.

All such taxes shall be levied by the receiver under the direction of the court and collected by the receiver, or his agent appointed for such purpose by approval of the court.

court, and all remedies for enforcing collection of such taxes and of all delinquent taxes and license fees and rates for service in municipalities shall be the general laws of the state shall be applicable thereto.

Sec. 5. Said receiver shall be required to levy taxes upon all the taxable property in said municipality to the limit now provided by the constitution of this state regarding any provision or limitations in any special charter of such municipality.

Section 2 of the receivership law provides that the court shall appoint a receiver of said municipality with power to take over and control, under the direction of said court, the financial affairs thereof and thereafter no funds of said municipality shall be transferred or expended, no claims allowed or indebtedness incurred, or taxes levied, or license fees imposed, or rates for service from municipally owned utilities fixed or valuation of taxable property determined, except with the approval of said court.

WASHINGTON, March 11. — Sec'y of Interior Wilbur today signed an authorization awarding the construction of the giant Hoover dam and power plant on the Black Canyon of the Colorado river to the Six Companies, Inc.

Last week Six Companies, Inc., a combination of as many construction firms, made a low bid of \$48,890,999 for the contract to build the dam and power plant.

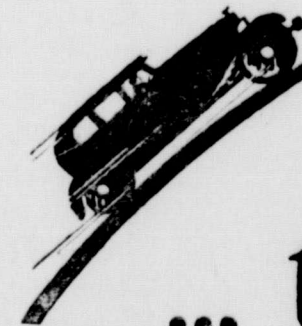

"Thanks," she drawled as she laid the file on the desk. Gypsy glanced up.

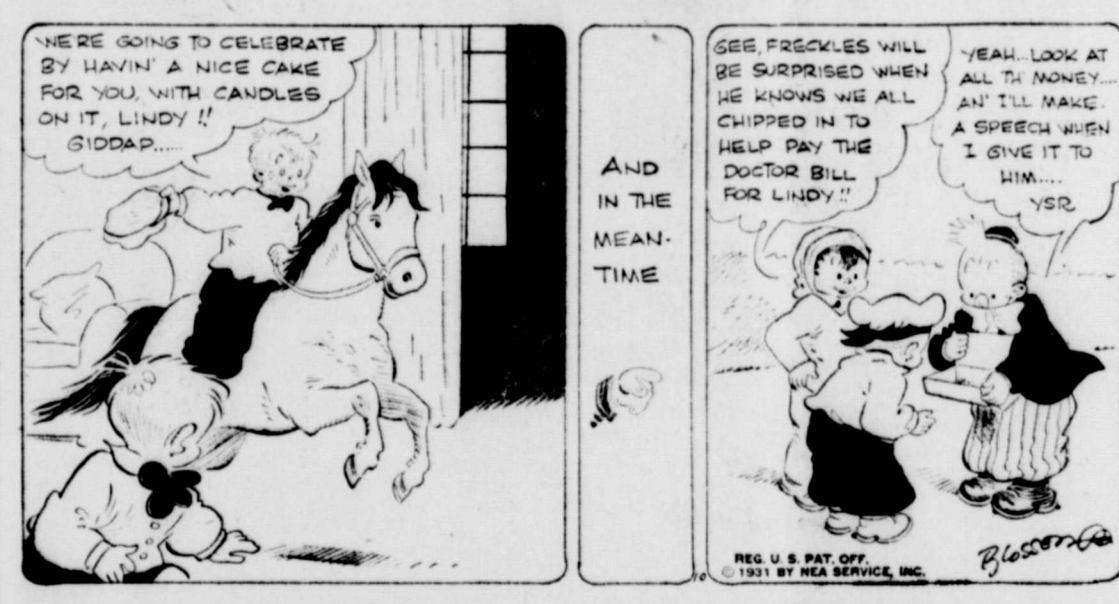

TEXAS TOPICS

AUSTIN, March 11.—A new form of intangible levy, that of an initial tax on securities and mortgages of one year or longer duration, as proposed by Representative Johnson of Dimmit county in a constitutional amendment, is expected, if adopted, to bring the state an initial million and a half dollars a year, and in future, as investments improve, probably double that sum.

Representative Weinert, former senator, reminded the house during debate over his bill not to make exceptions against violators of liquor laws by denying them the same right as other accused persons to suspend sentences, how it came about that the first prohibition amendment was submitted to the people.

The pros had 21 votes in the senate but one of their number was gone. As a measure of fair play, when the vote came, he cast his vote to submit the question to the people.

Representative Hawley told the house that Mr. Weinert's suspended sentence law has done more than any other to reclaim hundreds of young people into law-abiding citizens, instead of sending them to a felon's cell and a life of crime and degradation.

While the house discussed whether it should keep in the law a discrimination that said liquor law violators must go to the penitentiary, though those accused of nearly all other crimes might have suspended sentences, thoughts of those charged with the responsibility of making the laws could not have been diverted to Governor Dan Moody's parting injunction to keep democratic government in the hands of sane conservatives, and out of the hands of the "fanatics of the extreme right or of the extreme left."

Texas made a blazing start this year, by sending up in flames considerably over \$1,033,533 worth of property during January. That much was reported as destroyed in the ultra-conservative fire-loss reports of the cities that have fire marshals. Small-town and rural losses are in addition to this. There are 27 fires charged to intention, 230 to unknown causes, and the rest to carelessness and conditions outside control. The 27 "on purpose" fires cost \$31,788, and the 230 of unknown origin cost \$645,398. The presumption is strongly in favor of the idea that some of the unknown origin fires having had an element of criminal purposiveness about them. Whether on purpose or due to carelessness, the state fields in charge of insurance affairs remind the people that the citizens pay the bill for these fire losses, and that the heavy toll is reflected necessarily in higher insurance rates and penalties.

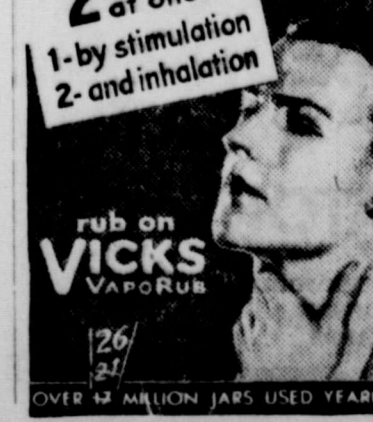

FILIPINO AIDS COUNTRYMEN BY FEDERATION

WASHINGTON, March 11.—One million Filipinos scattered from Ketchikan to New Orleans, Harlem to Baguio, have accepted the moral tutelage of a quiet-minded young Filipino philosopher, Dr. Hilario Moncada.

Professing a faith derived from the study of Comparative Philosophy, Dr. Moncada asserts no purpose except to educate his countrymen, practically and morally. He is organizer and president of the Filipino Federation of America, which he says has about one million members in the Philippine Islands and 23,000 more in continental United States, Hawaii and Manila.

Dr. Moncada studied philosophy in India, China, and other countries of the Orient. He learned something also from American thinkers, particularly Thomas Jefferson, and he seems to have acquired from Hollywood the faculty for universal propagation of his ideas.

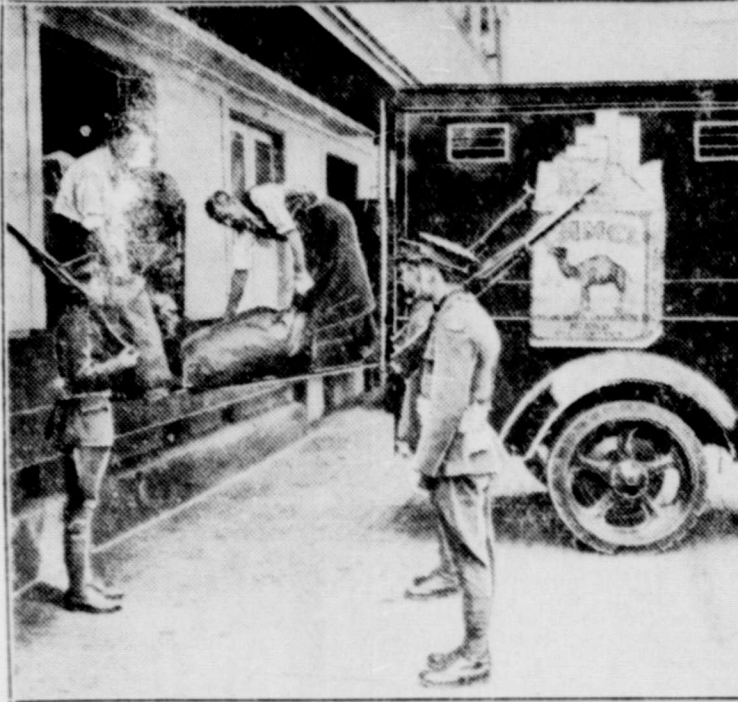
The Federation is engaged in a variety of educational and fraternal enterprises. It claims 100 per cent employment for its members attributed to their special fitness for whatever employment they undertake. It looks to the welfare of the 10,000 Filipinos who work in the fisheries and canneries of Alaska; and it spends large sums for the education of its members in mechanical and agricultural vocations.

The Filipino Federation also is active in the Territory of Hawaii, where Dr. Moncada will attend a Territorial Convention in August.

Dr. Moncada came here to protest against Congressional bills to restrict the immigration of Filipinos and alternatively to appeal for immediate independence.

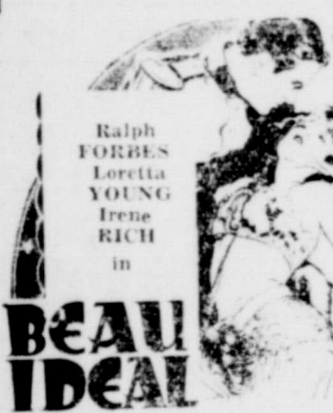

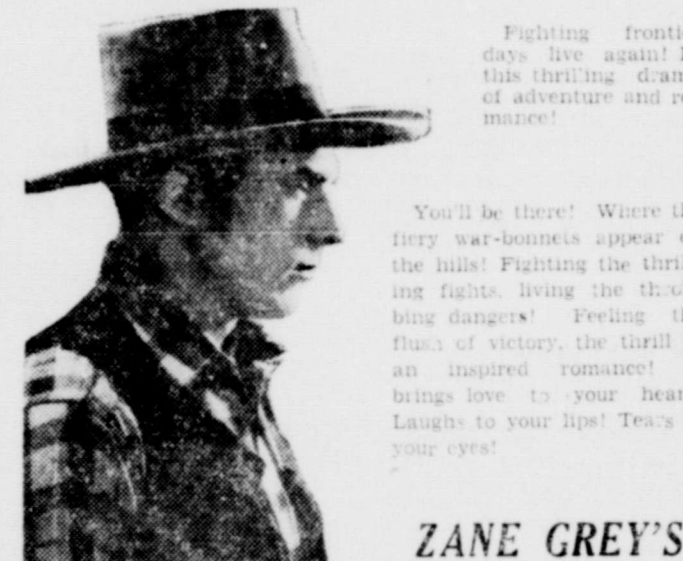

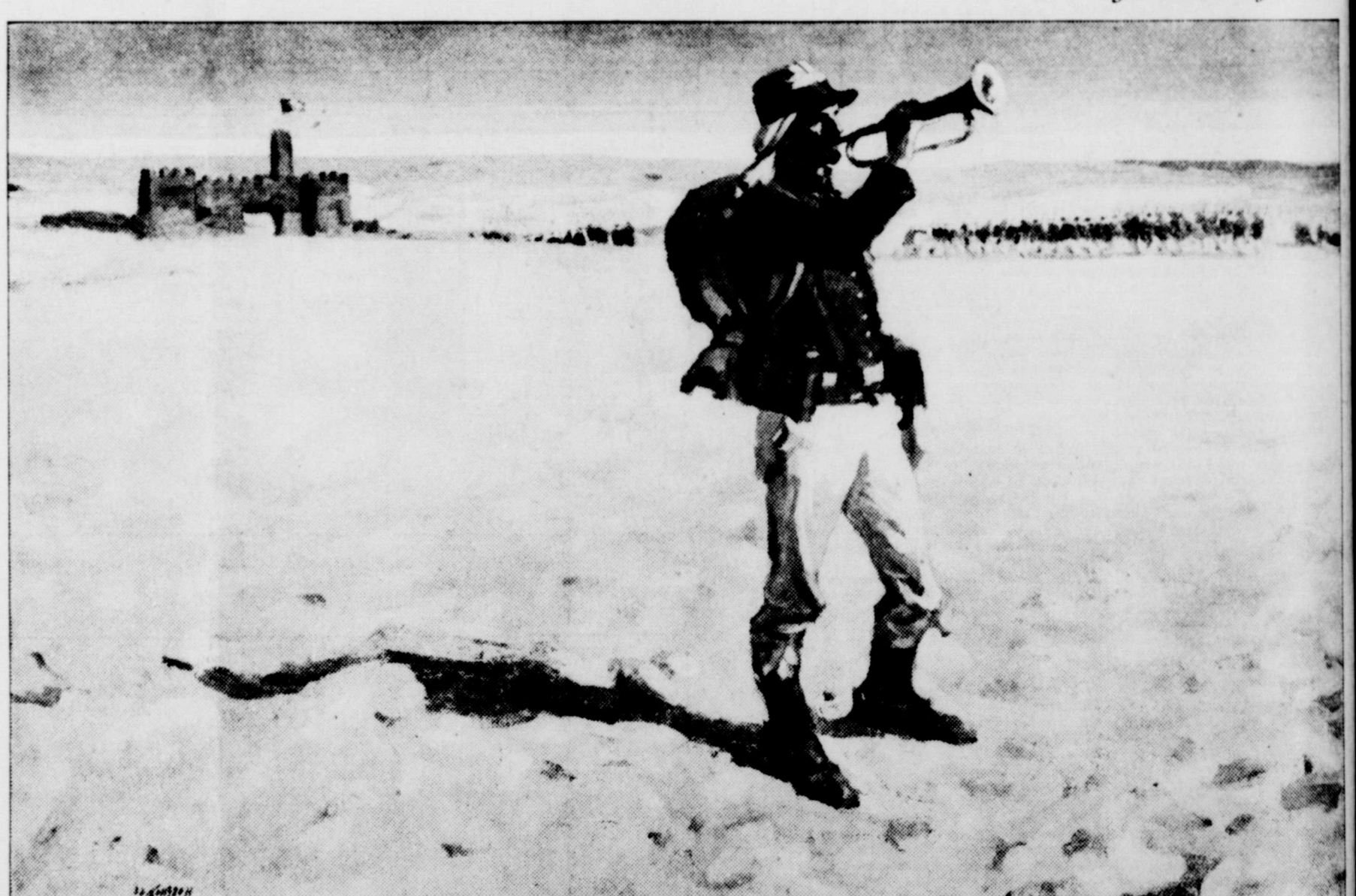
