

# American priest safe, issues statement

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — An American priest, missing in El Salvador for 10 days and feared dead, has turned up safe at the U.S. Embassy here and issued a statement criticizing U.S. support for the embattled junta.

Embassy spokesman Howard Lane said the Rev. Roy Bourgeois, 42, entered the embassy alone Wednesday afternoon and appeared in good health. He was to fly to the United States today, the spokesman said.

Bourgeois "went off on his own free will into the (country-side) and came back the same way," Lane told a news conference Wednesday night.

Bourgeois, a Maryknoll priest based in Chicago, vanished April 26 after he left the Camino Real hotel here, reportedly to buy medicine.

A letter from Bourgeois delivered to The Associated Press office here at the time of his reappearance implied he had spent several days with the leftist guerrillas who are fighting to overthrow the ruling civilian-military junta. But Lane said the priest would not comment on his disappearance until he had

returned to the United States.

"It hurts me deeply to know that my country, the United States, is supplying military advisers and arms to a repressive dictatorship at war with its own people," the letter said.

"After much reflection and prayer I have decided to join the poor of El Salvador in their struggle for justice and peace."

"While I recognized that the armed struggle of the Salvadoran people is justified I personally cannot and will not bear arms."

Lane confirmed Bourgeois had written the statement and said "he had intended that the letter be delivered several days earlier to explain his mysterious disappearance, but for some reason it wasn't."

Last Thursday, a body believed to be that of Bourgeois was found in a ravine near here. However, fingerprints flown in from the United States determined the body to be a still unidentified victim of the political struggle that has claimed an estimated 22,000 lives in this Central American country in the past year and a half.

Bourgeois was in El Salvador as an interpreter and "field contact source" for a Chicago television station. His visit was unrelated to his duties as a Maryknoll priest.

A native of Luther, La., Bourgeois was assigned to Bolivia from 1972 to 1977 following ordination. The Bolivian government once arrested him for his human rights work with that country's political prisoners and their families.

In the last year, Bourgeois traveled throughout the Midwest crusading against repression in El Salvador and U.S. support for the junta. He wanted others to know "what kind of government our money is supporting down there," said Denise Plunkett, a friend of the priest.

Two nuns of the Maryknoll order were among four American women missionaries slain in El Salvador last December. Bourgeois was deeply distressed by the murders and isolated himself for days afterward, Ms. Plunkett said.

Meanwhile, military sources claimed Wednesday that government troops had retaken all towns held by the guerrillas and that the leftists controlled no populated areas of the country.

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## Catholics gather to mourn Sands

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Thousands of Roman Catholic mourners poured into Belfast today for a hero's funeral of Bobby Sands, and businesses in the city's Catholic districts were reported responding "100 percent" to requests they close as a mark of respect for the IRA hunger striker.

Protestants were gathering for a memorial service for Irish Republican Army victims, scheduled to be held at Belfast's city hall five miles away from the cemetery where Sands was to be buried after a Catholic funeral Mass.

The 600 British troops airlifted in overnight to strengthen the shield between Northern Ireland's Protestant majority and Catholic minority were on standby as fears rose of escalating violence following Sands' burial with full IRA military honors in a part of the Milltown Cemetery reserved for IRA men and women.

Police armed with rifles were on patrol, but security forces appeared to be keeping a low profile before the Mass at St. Luke's Church in the Twinbrook district of Catholic West Belfast. Up to 20,000 people were expected to join a 3½-mile-long procession from the church to the cemetery.

Early today, an explosion shattered windows in Belfast's market district. They body of a young man was found at the scene, and police said they believed he had been carrying a bomb that exploded. A dozen people were treated for shock and cuts from the broken windows.

In the second night of violence since the 27-year-old IRA guerrilla starved himself to death in the Maze Prison early Tuesday, a sniper killed a policeman and a youth apparently blew himself up with a bomb. Mobs attacked the police with gasoline bombs and rocks in several Roman Catholic areas of Belfast and Londonderry.

Five other people were wounded by shots, including a policeman and a 9-year-old boy in Belfast, a policeman in Londonderry and two British soldiers ambushed in Crossmaglen.

The National H-Block Committee, named after the H-shaped Maze Prison in which Sands died, said there was a "100 percent response" in Catholic districts to appeals to shut businesses and stay away from work. Most shops in Catholic West Belfast were shut.

## Plan's passage near

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's budget-slashing blueprint arrived at the point of passage in the House today, with Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. conceding that "only the Lord himself could save this one" for opposition Democrats.

The stage for today's showdown was set Wednesday when the House swept aside two attempts to boost spending on social programs.

That left a choice of the Democratic leadership's plan or a modified Reagan program that would outline deep cuts in social programs, accelerated defense spending and a three-year, 30 percent tax reduction.

By nightfall, the Democrats' alternative was likely to be gone, too, putting Reagan within reach of getting the first phase of his economic program through Congress.

The Senate was beginning debate today on a

spending plan drafted by its own Budget Committee and endorsed by Reagan, and that version was expected to have little trouble winning approval in a chamber ruled by Republicans.

In the House, where most counts showed defecting Democrats giving the Reagan plan at least a 13-vote cushion, O'Neill was left to question not what the result would be, but the wisdom of it.

"The Republicans may be unlucky enough to win this one," the Massachusetts Democrat said.

He charged that Reagan's economic program could send inflation "through the roof" and push interest rates "into the high 20s."

The Reagan-backed plan, crafted by Reps. Delbert L. Latta, R-Ohio, and Phil Gramm, D-Texas, would spend \$688.8 billion and leave a deficit of \$31 billion next year while, on paper at least, meeting the president's goal of a balanced budget in 1984.

## It seems there's no end to Midland's building boom

Midland is going to put those pooh-poohers in their place, those doubting Thomases who scornfully laugh at the thought of Midland taking its place out in the boonies as a city of the future.

It is a city of today, they scoff. And, they say, once its marrow of oil is sucked out of the bone-hard ground, the city will be tossed into the wind with its high-rise office buildings to crumble onto the desert floor.

No longer does that thought float into the minds of even the most pessimistic forecasters. As the months pass, the building continues, the city

sprawls farther and the people pour into the once-bust city to grab for its precious jewels. Midland has reached the point, say local economists, where there is no turning back. And that thought was confirmed last week by the unprecedented record set by building permits issued in the first trimester of 1981.

By the close of business on May 1, the city inspections department had issued \$90 million in permits for new and renovated construction. Only two years ago, in 1979, the city set a new record with \$94 million. And last year the city didn't surpass that mark until the fall when permits went on to set a new record of \$138 million.

THE TOTAL for 1981 should be staggering, but not one local forecaster knows or even wants to attempt a guess as to what that figure will be. But it's certain, said one economy-watcher, that the city will hit \$100 million in building permits by the end of May. Past that time frame, however, no one will touch, not even with wizard sticks.

The May 1 figure of \$90,514,511 was more than double the dollar amount for the same time a year ago, which was \$41,471,148. Comparing it on a month to month basis, April this year saw twice the amount in building permits as that of one year ago — \$20,993,916 this year to \$10,168,118 in 1980.

Midland's building figures far outstrip those of any city in West Texas, even El Paso. And the Tall City's growth ranks it near the top of the 25 biggest SMSA's in Texas, according to a report in the April issue of "Texas Business" magazine.

El Paso, listed in "Texas Business" as having a population of 478,834, had issued \$83,355,029 in building permits by the end of April. This is above the figure for the same time last year, said a city employee, which was \$69,078,960. Total dollar figure for 1980 was \$257,326,027.

Odessa, with an estimated population of 115,000, falls far below Midland (pop. 82,000) on building permits. For the first trimester, Odessa reported

\$37,538,486. And this figure, said an Odessa city employee, is above that for the same time a year ago. Building permits for April were about half that for Midland — \$9,140,450.

LUBBOCK, A CITY almost three times the size of Midland with 211,846, reported a building permit total for the first four months at half that of Midland — \$44,638,585. This figure, said Wayne Jennings, a Lubbock planning checker, is above what the city had for this time a year ago, which was \$24,994,885.

Midland's \$90 million figure already beats what Lubbock reported in building permits for all of 1980, which

was \$88 million, according to Jennings.

Amarillo, a Panhandle city of about 173,000 persons, falls far below Midland in new construction. To date, the city reported \$39,483,090. This is about \$20 million below the figure for the same time a year ago, said a city employee. But that extra \$20 million went to permit a new hospital, the employee added, explaining that without the \$20 million the figures are about the same.

Abilene to the east of Midland was cited in "Texas Business" as "planning on explosive growth during 1981."

## Native West Texan to lead MC

The Midland College board of trustees announced the selection of a new president for the school today in an early morning press conference in the administration board room. Replacing outgoing president Dr. Al Langford will be Dr. Jess Parrish, outgoing president of Shelby State Community College in Memphis, Tenn.

A native of West Texas, Parrish was selected after an executive session Wednesday in which search committee members interviewed some four top candidates for the position.

Parrish, who was the last interviewed, was preparing to return to Memphis Wednesday when Midland College officials stopped him at Midland Regional Airport and asked him to stay to be available for comment at this morning's press conference.

"We have made a diligent and thorough search and have interviewed numerous applicants," said Jack Huff, immediate past president of the trustees. "The board has unanimously selected...Dr. Jess Parrish of Memphis, Tenn. We feel Dr. Parrish meets all of the high standards and qualifications we are looking for," Huff said.

He continued to say Parrish would be installed as president Aug. 1, while Langford, who resigned in March with plans to go into private business as an independent oil operator in Midland, would be retained until the end of that month in an advisory capacity.

"We feel extremely fortunate to obtain the services of Dr. Jess Parrish," Huff continued. "His roots are in this area, he has a distinguished academic background and a record of developing a community college from

its inception. His experience and commitment to the highest quality of community college education will provide the leadership to keep Midland College moving toward its goal of becoming the finest community college in this state and in the nation."

Parrish, who was born in Ballinger and educated at Texas Tech, said he had already resigned his position at Shelby State before he applied for Langford's position.

Having accepted a position as "regents professor at Memphis State in the Center for Study of Higher Education," Parrish said he had given up presidency of Shelby State and his founding position. "And then, this position came open and I just couldn't resist coming."

Parrish said he would enjoy returning to the West Texas area. Having received his bachelor's, master's and

doctorate degree from Texas Tech, he said he has "been out of the state for 14 years."

He said he was interested in losing Memphis humidity and gaining the friendship of West Texans. "It's the people. It's awfully hard to beat Texas on the people," Parrish said this morning, adding Tennesseans are generally friendly, but Texans are more so. In addition, he said, "there's a pioneering feeling still in Texas."

Parrish said although he was "not familiar with the campus," he thought "instructional programs will take my first priority" at Midland College.

Having helped found Shelby State, which now has a student population around 6,000, Parrish said he

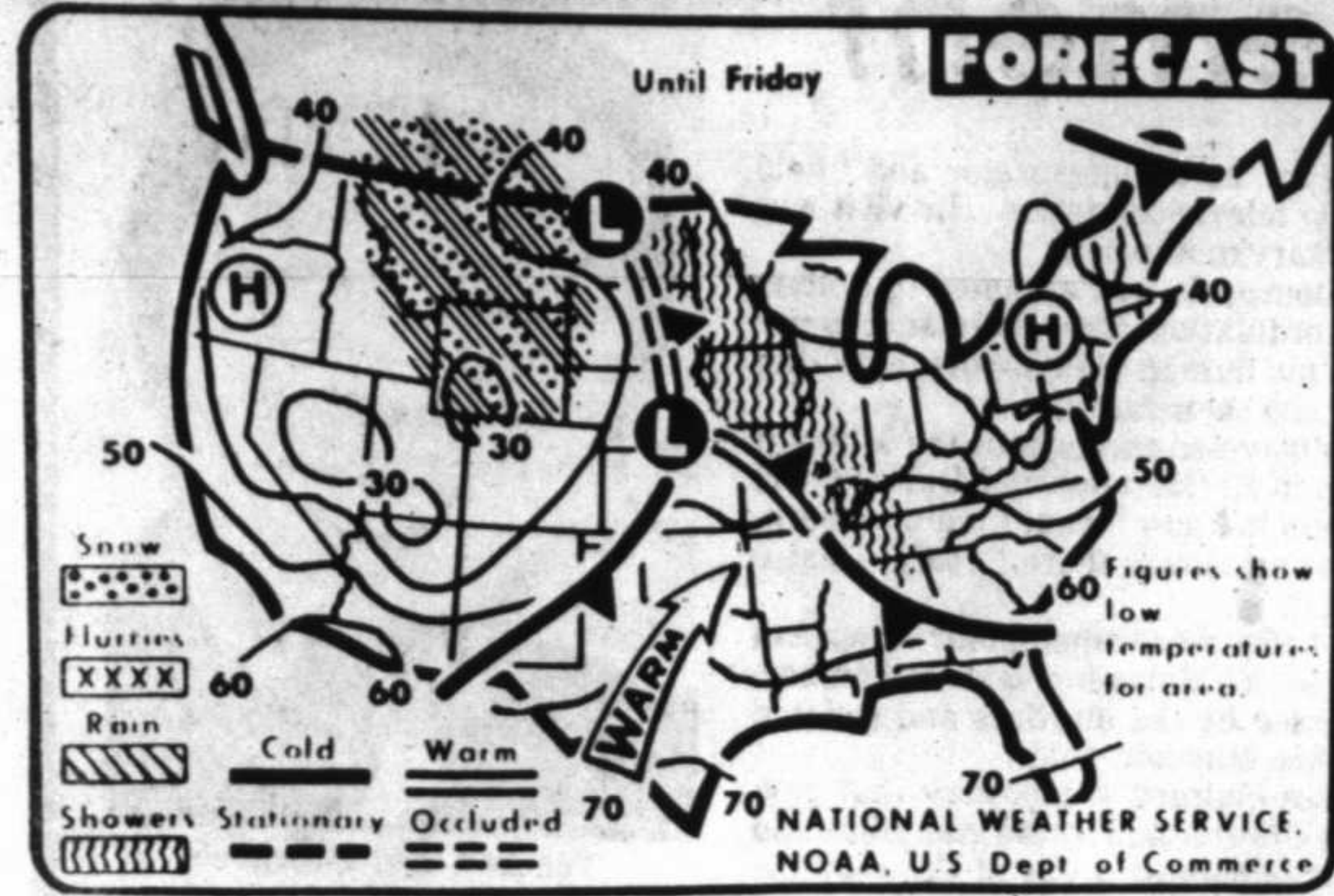

## Last of 21 crash victims sought

WALKERSVILLE, Md. (AP) — Air Force crews were searching a remote barley field today for the last of 21 people who died when a missile-tracking jet on a training flight blew up and crashed, scattering documents and debris.

The area was cordoned off and state police were sifting through the papers amid conflicting accounts about whether they were classified.

All those aboard the \$50 million advanced range instrumentation aircraft were killed in the Wednesday morning crash, which occurred about a mile from this western Maryland community of 8,000, said Air Force Maj. William Campbell.

Twenty bodies, many dismembered, were found before the search was called off for the night, officials said.

The Pentagon said the aircraft was

based at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio, where it was assigned to the 4950 Test Wing. The flight was to have been a "routine training flight" that ended back in Ohio, said Air Force Lt. Thomas Larock.

The EC-135 four-engine jet, the military version of the Boeing 707, is used to track missiles and unmanned satellite flights.

A Pentagon source said the plane was carrying classified documents when it went down, but Wright-Patterson spokesman Maj. Edward Robertson denied that report.

Papers from the plane were strewn over the area, and state police worked to retrieve the documents, which were sodden from a light rain which fell throughout the day.

Local radio stations were asked to broadcast state police requests that

residents who found documents turn them in, said Jane English of WZYQ-FM in Frederick.

Newspaper photographers at the crash site reported having their film confiscated by authorities. But the film later was returned.

The cause of the crash was not determined immediately.

Area residents who saw the accident said the plane was a mass of flame before it struck the ground.

"It looked like a ball of fire," said Edward Watson, vice president of operations for the Maryland Midland Railroad, which halted service on its line adjacent to the crash site because a piece of wreckage fell on the rail.

Nancy McCullough, a resident of a nearby housing development, said the plane "went over our development and then I heard this explosion that sounded like a long, loud, thunder

clap."

"Within minutes, the entire development was covered with a yellow substance that seemed like fiberglass insulation," she said.

"It apparently blew up in the air," said A.E. Appleby, police communications officer at the Frederick state police barracks.

A spokesman at Andrews Air Force Base said that all witness reports indicated that the plane was exploding as it came down.

Campbell said an Air Force investigation of the accident could take several months to complete.

The Baltimore Sun reported today that the aircraft was flying at 28,000 feet when it disappeared from radar in the Washington Air Traffic Control Center, where it was being tracked.

## Residents hear blast, jet crash

WALKERSVILLE, Md. (AP) — Karen Green thought lightning had struck her house when she heard an explosion that preceded the fatal crash of an Air Force missile-tracking jet.

"It was loud, really loud," Mrs. Green said Wednesday, recalling how the giant plane exploded and slammed into a grain field near her home in rural central Maryland earlier in the day.

All 21 people aboard the EC-135 four-engine jet were killed.

"At first I thought that lightning had struck the house. I looked out the window at the chicken shed," she said. "There was an orange glow on the roof. I ran upstairs and looked out. Over across the wheat field was all this flame and smoke."

Mrs. Green said she and her husband found yellow, spongy debris outside their home.

"but it still falls behind Midland on building permits. To date, that city has recorded \$35,618,324."

And San Angelo, with a population similar to that of Midland, trails the pack of cities with only \$16,349,912 in building permits for the first trimester.

Midland's record \$90 million doesn't include any of the new projects that have been announced recently, such as the First National Bank 40-story tower, mall and parking garage; the hotel with high-rise office building; or any of the ClayDesta buildings planned for that \$100 million development.

Austin and Arlington near Dallas-Fort Worth.

"But Midland is unique," he said, explaining that it isn't situated near a major metropolitan area.

While his department tries to keep a handle on expected growth, Hennessy said they were unprepared for this first trimester. But he views it as "an indication of strong growth," he said.

"There are other factors to Midland's growth now besides the oil industry that will tend to play a role in the future."

rather than a community."

IT'S BASED ON such statistics as building permits, personal income, retail sales and employment figures, according to Henson.

The \$90 million figure in building permits amazed Henson, he said, but it "means that Midland will maintain a dominant position for headquarters. We're geographically isolated, but because of the dominance of the petroleum industry, we can't help but stand out."

And the people apparently have noticed Midland. The first three months of 1981 saw a net increase in the population by 1,000 persons, according to Billingsley who keeps tabs on that figure.

In 1980, Midland averaged a net increase of 82 family units per month, he said. For the first three months this year, it jumped to 115 family units a month. A family unit, he explained is 2.89 persons.

This influx of people has brought on the city's housing shortage, said Billingsley. Although the residential permits were almost \$40 million, he noted they are primarily single family homes. For the first trimester, "there were only 340 multi-family units permitted. We're falling way short in apartments."

## Ten victims identified

DAYTON, Ohio (AP) — Wright-Patterson Air Force Base has released the names and hometowns of 10 of the 21 crewmen who died when a military jet exploded over a farm near Walkersville, Md.

Officials at the southwestern Ohio air force base said Wednesday they would release the remaining names as soon as the victims' families had been notified.

The victims include:

2. Technical Sgt. Larry Gene Wetzel, of Freeburg, Ill.

NEW COMMERCIAL buildings accounted for \$44,519,524 of the total figure while new residential takes up \$39,978,842, according to figures from the city inspection office.

Richard Hennessy, director of the city's planning and community development department, remarked that "you won't find any city in Texas that is growing as fast as Midland, based on the percentage basis for office construction. You would have to look at Dallas and Houston to find as much office construction as in Midland. But their rate of growth percentage-wise would be lower than ours" because of the higher population figures.

Looking at Midland's \$90 million building figure with its 80,000 citizens means that construction amounts to about \$1,012 per person.

Other cities that would be growing at a similar rate as Midland, said Hennessy, are suburbs of metropolitan areas, such as Round Rock near

In the "Texas Business" magazine report, Midland ranked 24th out of the 25 SMSA's in population, related Grant Billingsley, director of the economic development department with the Midland Chamber of Commerce. But the Tall City ranked eighth on its economic SMSA, with the next higher one being Corpus Christi, "which is about four times our size."

"We're in a tremendous rate of increase pattern right now," he said. "We're competing with cities out of our league population-wise."

SMSA stands for Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area and applies to cities with more than 50,000 population, according to Doug Henson, an economist with The First National Bank of Midland.

An SMSA, he added, "is a magical designation that you've become a city

Taking a stab at forecasting, J.B. Keaton, who heads up the city's inspection department, said the next 10 years should be good economically. "That's proven each day by the building permits."

"I don't think Midland will become the ghost town that people have talked about. We've expanded too much."

## Permian Corp. refused writ

AUSTIN — The Texas Supreme Court has refused to grant a writ of error in an appeal by Permian Corp. against an order entered in a class action suit.

W.R. Davis filed the class action suit on behalf of himself and other sellers of crude oil to Permian in May 1979. A Midland County trial court later entered an order requiring that all parties to the suit receive notice.

Permian appealed that order but the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals ruled that it did not have jurisdiction because no final judgment had been entered in the case.

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## Fitzsimmons fought to the bitter end

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Funeral arrangements are pending for Frank E. Fitzsimmons, a trade union success story who went from a 22-cent-an-hour truck-loading job to the \$160,000-a-year presidency of the Teamsters, the nation's biggest and richest union.

Fitzsimmons, who died of lung cancer at 73 Wednesday at the Scripps Clinic, took over the 2 million-member union in 1967 when the late James R. Hoffa, in federal prison for jury tampering and mail fraud, decided not to seek re-election as president.

Rising through the Teamster hierarchy on Hoffa's coattails, Fitzsimmons inherited a union with a reputation for corruption and scandal. The criminal misdeeds of Dave Beck, Hoffa's predecessor, helped get the Teamsters kicked out of the AFL-CIO in 1967.

When he died, Fitzsimmons was fighting a federal government suit seeking to recover millions of dollars he and other former trustees of the union's \$1.4 billion Central States Pension Fund allegedly lost through questionable management.

In 1977, the Labor Department forced him and the others to resign as trustees of the scandal-ridden pension fund. The following year, dissident Teamsters accused him of nepotism, ties to racketeers and using union funds for a lavish lifestyle.

Fitzsimmons, supplied by the union with a \$98,000 home, limousine and jet for meetings and golf — in the low 80s — with labor and business leaders, was cleared of the dissidents' accusations by the Teamsters executive board in 1979.

Born in Jeanette, Pa., he dropped out of school and went to Detroit at age 16 after his father died, joining the Hoffa-led Local 299 in 1934. His militant activism impressed Hoffa and he became business agent in 1937.

As Hoffa rose to succeed Beck in 1957, he kept Fitzsimmons a

step behind. Fitzsimmons served as union caretaker when Hoffa went to jail. His loyalty was so strong that he awaited Hoffa's last-minute decision not to seek re-election before declaring his own candidacy.

Fitzsimmons, many hoped, would help build a new image for the union. He settled into office slowly but grew to relish the job. When Hoffa was paroled and began making noises about returning to power, the friendship deteriorated.

On March 1, 1975, Fitzsimmons called Hoffa "a bum, a has-been. He's soft in the head. He's a liar and a stool pigeon." A week earlier, Hoffa had criticized Fitzsimmons for being "more interested in playing golf" than working for union members.

In July 1975, the possibility of a battle for union control ended. Hoffa disappeared from his Detroit home, presumably kidnapped and murdered. Investigators questioned persons allegedly linked to both the union and organized crime, but the case remains a public mystery. Fitzsimmons denied any knowledge of the circumstances.

## Williams may gain Teamsters leadership

WASHINGTON (AP) — The death of Frank E. Fitzsimmons leaves a Teamsters official accused of mob connections as the leading contender to head the nation's largest union, which has been tainted for a quarter-century by allegations of corruption.

Although maintaining publicly that they did not want to discuss a successor for Fitzsimmons, who died of lung cancer Wednesday in a Southern California clinic, union sources said the top candidate appeared to be Roy L. Williams, head of the Central Conference of Teamsters.

Williams, 66, under investigation by the Justice Department, announced last week that he would seek the presidency of the 2 million-member union in June if Fitzsimmons could not continue in office.

One knowledgeable source said

Williams "is clearly the leading candidate, but I think there will be a lot of politicking" during the next 10 days that makes Williams' selection less than certain.

The 73-year-old Fitzsimmons, who had headed the Teamsters since succeeding James R. Hoffa in 1967, was unable to attend a recent meeting of the union's 22-member executive board in Florida because of his failing health.

At the time of his death, Fitzsimmons was a defendant in a 1978 civil suit by the federal government, which charged that he and other former trustees of the multibillion-dollar Central States Pension Fund had mismanaged retirement money through questionable loans involving gambling casinos, race tracks and risky real estate ventures.

Williams also is a defendant in that suit, which is still pending and seeks to recover millions of dollars in alleged losses.

Williams, called before a Senate subcommittee in August 1980, was questioned about his role as a trustee for a scandal-ridden pension fund and about whether he knew several reputed members of the Kansas City mob. Williams repeatedly invoked his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination, saying he could not answer questions because he was under investigation by a federal grand jury and was the subject of FBI wiretaps. However, he has denied allegations that he has organized crime ties.

Fitzsimmons took command of the union in 1967 after Hoffa was imprisoned for jury tampering.

Washington, D-Houston, is speaker pro tem of the House and chairman of the House Human Services Committee.

Speaker Bill Clayton announced

Wednesday night that physicians examining Washington found the pains were "nothing associated with the heart."

Washington's pains were the result of "fatigue and an old injury from an automobile accident," Clayton said. He told the House that Washington should be released from Brackenridge Hospital today.

Other survivors include her husband, a son, six grandchildren and a great-grandchild.

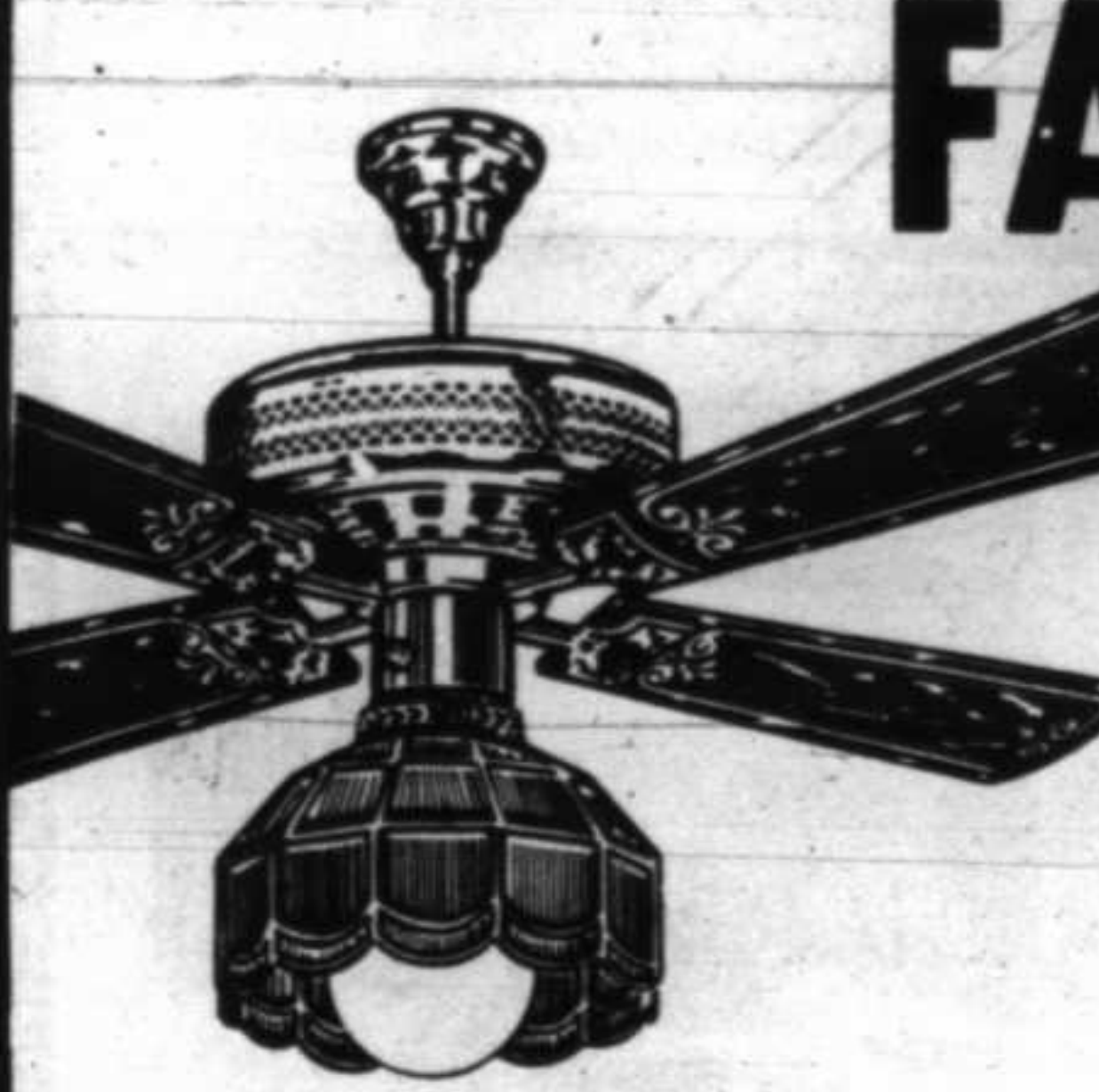

## Diplomats trying to defuse Mideast crisis

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syria and Israel made more threatening gestures at each other as Soviet and American mediators began trying to defuse the latest Middle East missile crisis.

Syria staged war games on its own territory Wednesday to show that its forces are "continuously ready to confront Israel at any time," the official SANA news agency said in Damascus, the Syrian capital.

Israeli warplanes, meanwhile, streaked over Syrian surface-to-air missile batteries in the Bekaa Valley of eastern Lebanon for the first time since Syria deployed the Soviet-made missiles there last week.

An Associated Press reporter in the valley said no missiles were fired at the planes overhead.

Syria moved the SAM-6 and SAM-2 missiles into Lebanon after Israeli jets shot down two Syrian helicopter gunships attacking pro-Israeli Christian militiamen around the embattled Christian city of Zahle.

Israel demanded Syria remove the missiles, claiming they restrict Israeli air strikes on Palestinian guerrilla positions in southern Lebanon.

Israel contends the missile deployment violated a secret 1979 agreement with Syria that allowed Israeli pilots freedom of the skies over

Lebanon in exchange for non-interference in Syrian policing of the armistice that ended Lebanon's 1975-76 civil war between rightist Christians and an alliance of leftist Moslems and Palestinian guerrillas.

Syria denied the existence of such an agreement and refused to withdraw the missiles.

The missile problem "must be solved," Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin said in an interview published Wednesday in the Israeli newspaper Maariv.

"If a solution is not found one way, it will be found another way," he said, apparently threatening military action if diplomatic efforts fail.

Begin said he feared giving the diplomats too much time would allow Syria to move in more weapons, and any Israeli effort to destroy them "may hurt our boys."

Begin's interview was published on Yom Ha'Zicharon, Israel's Memorial Day for its dead in the four Arab-Israeli wars.

President Reagan's envoy, veteran American diplomat Philip C. Habib, was expected in Beirut today for talks with Lebanese leaders and U.S. Ambassador John Gunther Dean, the Lebanese Foreign Ministry said.

Habib was to meet with Syrian leaders in Damascus Friday, then move on to Israel Sunday.

Syrian Foreign Minister Abdul Halim Khadram said he would listen to what Habib had to say, but Israel's insistence on the missile withdrawal is "ridiculous and not negotiable."

The missile crisis brought Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Georgy M. Korniyenko to Damascus Wednesday. Syria is the Soviet Union's closest Mideast ally and the two nations have a friendship treaty that requires them to consult whenever either is threatened.

In Moscow, the Soviet Foreign Ministry refused to comment on the purpose of Korniyenko's visit to Damascus.

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## Summer school now available to all

For the first time, special education students may attend summer school this year in Midland.

With the exception of learning disabled students, all special education students, aged six through 21, may attend classes at Bonham Elementary School from June 8 through July 2. Learning disabled students will be included in regular summer school classes, also at Bonham, which will begin June 2 and continue through July 30.

Registration forms have been sent home with students, and parents are encouraged to return forms to the schools by May 15. Tuition for the school will be \$55 per child, however, Midland Association for Retarded Citizens' representative Mary Ann Wiesepape said full

scholarships are available. Parents or guardians can contact Mrs. Wiesepape at 694-0090 or Mary Ann Stice at 694-8015.

Classes will begin at 9 a.m. and dismiss at 11:50 a.m. While parents are responsible for transportation, Mrs. Wiesepape said arrangements can be worked out with Mid-Tran to transport students for 50 cents per day.

A day care program is

available at the Alamo YMCA for students who wish to remain in a scheduled atmosphere for the entire day. Students who want to register for the day care program should plan on bringing a sack lunch. Students will be supervised by a Y staff member while walking to the Alamo YMCA after school.

Genie McCartney of the Alamo Y said a gym and swim program is available as part of special

ed day care. The gym swim program costs \$4 per day and dismisses at 3 p.m., while the day care program begins at noon and dismisses at 6 p.m. and costs \$14. Mrs. Wiesepape said scholarships also are available for the day care program.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Former First Lady Bess Truman was in fair condition early today at a hospital awaiting surgery for a fractured right hip, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Mrs. Truman, 96, who lately has used wheelchairs and walkers to get around, apparently fell from her bed at her home in suburban Independence early Wednesday, an aide said.

Dr. Wallace Graham, the family physician, described the hip fracture as "serious." Surgery at Research Medical Center was planned for late this morning.

Wallace said Mrs. Truman's thigh bone would be removed from the hip socket and the damaged ball portion of the bone replaced with metal. He said the thigh bone then would be replaced in the socket.

Mrs. Truman, the widow of President Harry S. Truman, was discovered on the wooden floor next to her bed by her aide, Valerie Lamere. Mrs. Truman had been sleeping when she was checked about an hour earlier, the aide

## Silencers seized in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Federal agents posing as narcotics smugglers seized a record 807 gun silencers that apparently were to be used as "drug hits" in El Salvador and along the U.S.-Mexican border, authorities said.

Undercover agents seized the silencers, designed to muffle .22-caliber pistols, and arrested three Houston-area machinists Wednesday, said Special Agent-in-Charge Manuel Gonzalez of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

Homer Gene Hawkins, 34, a Houston welder; Aaron P. Knopps, 34, a Houston machinist; and William K. Kimball, 38, a machinist from Sugar Land, were jailed and held in lieu of \$500,000 bond each.

The trio was accused of trying to sell the illegal devices to undercover agents for \$100,000. They were arrested Wednesday morning at a suburban airport, capping a two-month investigation, Gonzalez said.

However, Gonzalez said, the raid was not linked to organized crime.

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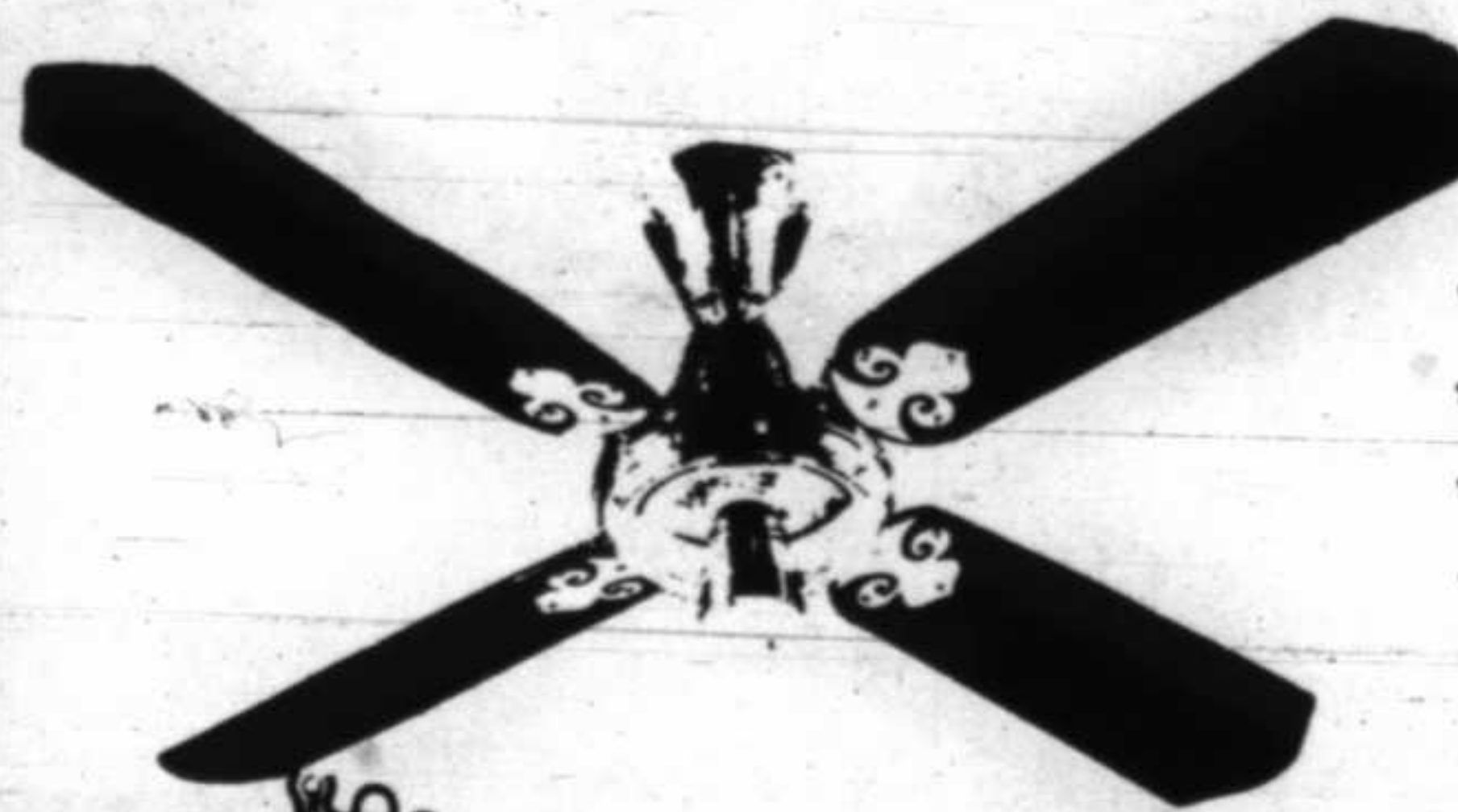

## House Democratic Caucus elects majority leader, whip

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Words like "majority leader" and "majority whip" were alien to the Legislature of the old days.

But on Wednesday, the House Democratic Caucus elected the Legislature's first leaders in modern memory with those titles.

Rep. Bob Bush of Sherman, a former Kansas Republican, was chosen as majority leader. Rep. Gene Green of Houston was elected majority whip.

Green defeated Rep. Lloyd Criss of LaMarque, the choice of the caucus' nominating committee for the job.

Party organization is new to the Legislature, a one-party institution from Reconstruction to the late 1960s, and its future is uncertain.

If the Democratic Caucus grows and becomes permanent, it could provide organized opposition to legislative programs of any future Republican governor. And it could, if it evolves as the party organizations of Congress and other state legislatures, elect speakers and shape House committees.

Besides Bush and Green, the caucus elected a nine-member steering committee: Lynn Nabers of Brownwood, Wilhemina Delco of Austin, Carlyle Smith of Grand Prairie, Foster Whaley of Pampa, Smith Gilley of Greenville, Ron Coleman of El Paso, Irma Rangel of Kingsville, Doug McLeod of Galveston and Wayne Peveto of Orange.

Bush, Nabers and Delco all hold committee chairmanships under Speaker Bill Clayton.

Caucus officers represent a mix of liberals, conservatives and moderates.

Bush, a moderate, called the slate "a good balance" of various political viewpoints, essential if the caucus is to succeed.

Rep. Milton Fox, R-Houston, said the caucus election on Wednesday should tell Republicans they need to organize, too, and take a more partisan stance in the House.

Republicans have tended to minimize partisanship and work with Clayton. As a result, they hold several key committee chairmanships.

Bush said the future of the caucus "is going to depend on how wise they are in coming up with

programs that win majority support."

"I think we will be trying to evolve into a functioning, active caucus," Bush said.

Rep. Jerry Benedict, D-Angleton, a founder of the caucus, said he was "very happy" with the slate of officers and pleased that conservatives and moderates have joined.

He said 37 of the 114 House Democrats were present for Wednesday's election.

# House backs balanced budget

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — After sweetening the pot for teachers, state employees, elected state officials and college professors, the Texas House has voted initial approval of a balanced \$26.5 billion state budget bill for 1982-83.

House members climaxed three days of debate Wednesday night by advancing the general appropriation bill on voice vote. The formality of final passage to the Senate comes today.

There's plenty of room for argument with senators, since their Finance Committee's version of the bill is a red-ink document that tops anticipated revenue by \$170 million.

Legislative Budget Board staffers said the House bill falls exactly within Comptroller Bob Bullock's latest revenue estimate as required by the Texas Constitution.

"It's right on the nose," said Jim Oliver, the LBB's assistant director.

Oliver said the House bill, though fattened by \$50 million worth of amendments, also satisfies the constitutional rule that the Texas budget may not grow faster than the Texas economy. The measure exceeds the 1980-81 budget by 19.6 percent.

The big surprise was the acquiescence of the House and its leaders to the addition of \$24 million in teacher pay raises.

Discovery that money requirements for a teacher retirement increase had been overestimated by \$28 million enabled the House to pump up teacher pay without a fight.

Counting automatic experience raises that most teachers get every year, the House bill would increase teacher salaries an average of 27.7 percent over the next two years.

"They ought to be happy with that, shouldn't they?" asked Rep. Bob McFarland, R-Arlington.

"Very happy," replied Rep. Hamp Atkinson, D-New Boston, chairman of the House Public Education Committee.

The bill originally provided 26.6 percent. The Texas State Teachers Association wants a 33 percent pay hike, while Gov. Bill Clements has recommended 22 percent.

Also added without a struggle was \$19.5 million for state employee salaries, largely in the lowest eight of the 21 pay grades. All employees would get raises of 9.2 percent on Sept. 1 and another 8.7 percent a year later, coupled with the 5.1 percent they received in February. The extra \$19.5 million would guarantee low-ranked employees, who received over 5.1 percent in February, the same percentage raises as other government workers in September and in 1982.

## Bankers' chorus continues

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Senators get the second verse of the same song next week in the battle of Texas banks and savings and loan companies versus money market funds.

Sen. Bill Meier, D-Euless, asked and received permission, 30-0, Wednesday for a second public hearing on a House-approved bill that, as a result of a Meier amendment, would require money market funds to keep financial reserves in Texas.

He said "fat cats" from New York City has flooded Texas with "lies and misrepresentations" about his amendment.

Sen. Walter Mengden, R-Houston, said he agreed another hearing was needed but for a different reason.

"I think the banks and savings and loans are the ones who shepherded this bill through the House to get it over here," Mengden said, "and they put the amendment on it in committee. I'm sure that you (Meier) are just an innocent victim."

"There is nothing illegal about it and it is totally within the rules. This is just a typical political trick that works within our system," Mengden said.

## Americans now at end of rope?

NEW YORK (AP) — Today's Americans live in an age of depletion — the fear of running out of things.

As we sat in long lines at gasoline stations during the 1970s, we came face to face with the idea that supplies of oil were not infinite. Every drop consumed theoretically brought us closer to the day when there would be none left to burn.

When drought hit many areas of the country this year, a news magazine posed the ominous question, "Are we running out of water?"

Many a family budget has to cope with the problem of running out of money, even though recent Federal Reserve figures show the overall money supply growing too fast.

And all the while another precious commodity — time — is steadily running out for everyone.

The "shortage mentality" that develops from all this is well known. A facetious remark on television about a shortage of toilet paper, and the next day the stores are mobbed with panic buyers.

Comedians, with their sensitive antennae, have picked up the mood. Thus, Bob Orben's recent suggestion that a crisis is approaching for the proliferating television and radio talk shows, with the pool of guests said to be down to a five-year supply.

Financial advisers have been quick to capitalize on the situation with best-selling books, newsletters and lectures urging people to stock up on canned goods and other essentials in preparation for the day when the economy comes undone.

Lately, one diehard optimist, stock market analyst Raymond F. DeVoe Jr. at the Wall Street firm of Bruns, Nordman, Rea & Co., claims to have seen signs of another developing shortage. We appear, he says, to be running low on crises themselves.

Thanks in part to conservation, worldwide supplies of oil are now described as ample at least for the moment, the question of what to do about oil seems to be a problem for the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries than for the industrialized nations.

The hostages are home from Iran. The space shuttle mission, despite computer problems at the outset, was an impressive success.

The state of the economy may still be very troubling, as demonstrated by the recent surge in interest rates. But there are a few hints at least that it is improving.

The slide of the dollar against most foreign currencies, which experts were so upset about just a few years ago, has been dramatically reversed. The other day, for example, it reached a 10-year high against the French franc.

Inflation is still very much with us, but some think it is starting to lose its momentum. From a peak annual rate of about 15 percent in early 1980, the rise of the consumer price index gradually slowed to an annual rate of less than 8 percent in March.

The price of gold, regarded as a thermometer of international anxieties, is hovering roughly 10 percent below the record high of \$875 an ounce it reached a little more than 15 months ago. Some leading advocates of investing in gold have simply lost interest in it, and gone looking elsewhere for profit opportunities.

Deleptophobia is sometimes justified, as when the reservoirs run low and there's no rain in sight. Other times, as in the toilet-paper fiasco, it plainly is not.

At the moment, it's too soon to tell whether DeVoe's vision of a "crisis shortage" will be realized. It flies in the face of the time-tested precept known as Murphy's Law ("Whatever can go wrong will go wrong").

Still, it's nice to contemplate the prospect with him when he points out, "An old Chinese curse goes, 'May you live in interesting times.'"

"We've had that for most of the last two decades. Now it looks like they might be a lot less interesting — even dull!"

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NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market halted a broad retreat with a modest gain Wednesday, despite fresh predictions of rising interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, which plunged 51.61 points in the six sessions after it closed at an eight-year high on April 27, rose .90 point Wednesday to close at 973.34.

The blue-chip average had been up more than 7 points in the early afternoon, spurred by a rally in oil issues, but most of the gains evaporated in the final two hours of trading.

Advances outnumbered declines 8-7 on the New York Stock Exchange.

Big Board volume totaled 47.10 million shares, against 49 million Tuesday.

Analysts said the market's early Wednesday rebound was in response to low prices following the selling spree.

The six-day decline in the stock market was triggered by soaring interest rates and Federal Reserve's steps to tighten credit.

Treasury Secretary Donald Regan told reporters Wednesday that interest rates could rise further and remain high for months.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrial stocks picked up .58 to 148.44, and S&P's 500-stock composite index rose .46 to 130.78.

Conoco was the most active issue of the NYSE, up 6 1/2 at 56 1/2.

Canal-Randolph chalked up the largest percentage gain on the NYSE, soaring 1 1/2 to 45 1/2. On Tuesday, Picara Valley, a Netherlands Antilles company which invests in securities, said it intends to make a tender offer for 750,000 shares of Canal-Randolph at \$39 a share.

Active issues included Sony, down 1 1/2 at 19 1/2; IBM, up 1/2 at 57 1/2; AT&T, up 1/2 at 54 1/2; and General Motors, up 1/2 at 52.

The NYSE's composite index of common stocks rose .30 to 75.60.

The market value index at the Amex was up .35 at 353.23. The NASDAQ composite for the over-the-counter market closed at 211.98, up .43.

The three — Secret Service agents Tim McCarthy and Jerry Parr, and Police Officer Tom Delahante — will be inducted into the department's Honor Legion, which salutes officers who "faced imminent death" in a dangerous situation.

ATLANTA (AP) — Television comedian Junior Samples has been released from Northside Hospital after spending 10 days for treatment of hardening of the arteries, according to hospital officials.

Dr. Fred Bennett said Samples, a regular on the country music television show "Hee Haw" since 1969, was hospitalized April 27 after suffering chest pains.

He said the hefty actor was released from the hospital Wednesday. Tests showed that Samples had not suffered a heart attack but coronary atherosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries, Bennett said.

GARDEN CITY, N.Y. (AP) — Rita Jenrette says she regrets posing nude in Playboy magazine and will never do it again because "I have to establish my credibility now."

The estranged wife of former Rep. John Jenrette, D-S.C., told students at Nassau Community College Wednesday that she did the nude layout "to get money for my husband's defense" against his conviction in the Abscam scandal.

"You will never see me take off a stitch of clothes again, not even a shoe," she added.

Mrs. Jenrette, 31, also told the students that her husband is asking her for alimony while living with another woman in Miami.

## NBC's 'People vs. Jean Harris' is true carbon copy of trial

NEW YORK (AP) — The defendant, judge and jury members look like their real-life counterparts. The courtroom is precisely duplicated, down to the wall clock, judicial portrait and the "In God We Trust" inscription behind the bench.

NBC-TV's two-part dramatization tonight and Friday of Jean Harris' trial for the shooting of Scarsdale Diet developer Herman Tarnower doesn't depart from the trial transcript. Tarnower, Mrs. Harris' long-time lover and a millionaire cardiologist, is not portrayed.

But the lawyer for the former headmistress says the program shows a "blatant disregard for the rights of the defendant, whose case is still on appeal."

Corrections officials said Mrs. Harris, convicted of murder and sentenced to 15 years to life, would watch "The People vs. Jean Harris" in prison.

But her lawyer, Joel Aurnou, said she "vigorously opposes" the TV dramatization and contends any trial re-enactment will jeopardize her legal position.

He said neither he nor Mrs. Harris had consented to their portrayals by Martin Balsam and Ellen Burstyn and had not been consulted.

Because of her opposition, only those events that are a matter of public court record can be reproduced.

Thus there is no portrayal of the 69-year-old Tarnower, shot to death in the bedroom of his Purchase estate last year, no scene with Lynne Tryforos, the 37-year-old divorcee whose relationship with Tarnower allegedly drove Mrs. Harris to murder.

Paul Klein, the executive producer, said the trial re-enactment was drawn from actual testimony to show the "real drama," and that a courtroom artist and the trial stenographer both were used as consultants to aid in faithful reproduction.

The movie includes some of the duller moments of testimony about Tarnower's bullet wounds.

Omitted is the revelation by Tarnower's housekeeper that she kept diaries of his overnight female houseguests.

The movie begins with a portion of Mrs. Harris' testimony, which did not actually occur until two months into the trial.

"I simply wanted to get dying over with," Mrs. Harris says, explaining why she drove to Tarnower's home from The Madeira School for girls in McLean, Va., where she was headmistress.

She contended her lover of 14 years was shot by accident when he tried to prevent her suicide. The prosecution said she shot Tarnower in a jealous rage over his romance with Ms. Tryforos.

As the stylish defendant, Miss Burstyn wears silk and pearls, as did her real-life model. As Aurnou, Balsam is mostly confined to asking Mrs. Harris questions that elicit such emotional statements as "I was a person sitting in an empty chair." But he doesn't cry as Aurnou did at his client's words.

Peter Coyote as the young prosecutor, George Bolen, has the task of accusing the 58-year-old Mrs. Harris of being a liar.

Coyote's reading of the "Scarsdale Letter," in which Mrs. Harris vilifies her younger rival, is similar to Bolen's dead-pan reading of the document that jurors later said helped destroy Mrs. Harris' credibility.

Richard Dysart as trial judge Russell R. Leggett has copied Leggett's folksy dialogue.

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## Playboy bunnies protesting

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — The high heels make it hard to stand, the fluffy tails make it hard to sit down and the whole outfit makes it almost impossible to take a quick bathroom break, say some of the bunny dealers at the new Playboy Hotel & Casino.

And their bunny mother, who claims she is "fighting for my girls," has quit the hutch in protest.

Sandee Vogelsson has resigned her post as bunny supervisor at Playboy's new \$150 million, 500-room, casino hotel on the Boardwalk.

Mrs. Vogelsson contended her 148 bunny dealers have encountered serious problems in their first three weeks on the job, including occupational hazards springing from the scanty uniform that marks the Playboy bunny.

But Playboy spokeswoman Lori Teblum said Wednesday that Mrs. Vogelsson's recent resignation was "a personal matter" not completely related to bunny concerns. Most xplayboy bunnies, Mrs. Teblum said, "are thrilled to be bunnies."

Mrs. Vogelsson charged that Playboy bunnies who work as dealers are shivering in the chill of the air-conditioned, three-level casino. Pit bosses, she said, tell the women to "think warm."

Also, she said, bunny dealers are forced to work 10-hour shifts while bunny cocktail waitresses work only six hours.

Bunny dealers then must stand in high heels and cannot sit down correctly because of their fluffy tails, Mrs. Vogelsson said.

Consequently, she said, many bunny dealers "ache all over" after work.

## MCT will stage comic masterpiece

The comic genius of one of France's greatest playwrights, Moliere, comes to life as Midland Community Theatre presents his comic masterpiece, "Tartuffe," Friday through May 23 in Theatre II of Theatre Midland, 2000 W. Wadley Ave.

The MCT production is directed by the theater's new assistant director, Ted Strickland.

Born Jean-Baptiste Poquelin, the son of an upholster, in 1622, Moliere refused to follow in his father's footsteps. At the age of 20 he joined a troupe of actors and took the name Moliere.

After touring the provincial towns of France for 16 years, the troupe finally received an invitation to perform at the Court of Versailles for King Louis XIV.

The play, "The Doctor in Love," was written, directed, choreographed and featured Moliere. It was such a hit that he quickly became the unofficial playwright for the king. During the next 15 years Moliere wrote 27 plays, most of them receiving their premieres at court with Louis XIV occasionally appearing in a minor role.

"Tartuffe" was first performed at the Court of Versailles in 1664. Focusing on a consummate con-man who uses religious piety as a means to usurp the wealth, position and even the wife of a wealthy nobleman, the play created an uproar. Those who found it perhaps too close to home succeeded in preventing a public performance of the play for five years.

However, when finally presented publicly in 1669, it was an instantaneous hit and quickly achieved the reputation as Moliere's comic masterpiece. It has been so popular that the name "Tartuffe" has become in many languages a synonym for the word "hypocrite."

According to Strickland, the production of "Tartuffe," which is funded in part by a grant from The Western Company, continues MCT's commitment to provide a broad range of the best that theater can provide.

## Carnegie Hall has birthday bash

NEW YORK (AP) — Carnegie Hall gave itself a 90th birthday bash Tuesday night that it'll be hard pressed to top when it turns 100.

The New York Philharmonic played the same program that it played May 5, 1891, to inaugurate the hall. Then, Tchaikovsky conducted his festive "Marche solennelle" and Walter Damrosch conducted

Carnegie Hall was named Music Hall from 1891 to 1894, when it was decided that sounded more like vaudeville than classical music. So it was renamed for Andrew Carnegie, who gave \$2 million to build it.

## MC offering new round of defense driving courses

In an effort to assist motorists who feel a sense of apprehension about other motorists, Midland College periodically offers a three-evening short course in Defensive Driving. For those who cannot attend classes during the week, the college also offers the course on the second Saturday of the month during May, June and July.

"Our next Saturday course begins May 9, and the week-night course begins May 12," noted James Bramlett, director of the MC Department of Community Services. "I believe that defensive driving is one of the most effective courses we schedule. It's in such demand that we hold it more often during the year than any other course in our short course curriculum."

Bramlett pointed out that the defensive driving course differs from the regular MC Drivers Education course. "Defensive driving is for the already-experienced driver. What we emphasize here is sophisticated defensive technique."

Bramlett explained that many students seem to feel that driving a car is becoming a battle for survival. "It is no longer a matter of getting behind the wheel and turning on the ignition," he said. "Drivers need to know how to spot a difficulty before it becomes a situation, how to handle the unexpected, and how to react and maneuver in a tight situation. This is what we are teaching in the defensive driving course."

Participating students learn through a series of audio-visual displays, instructor lectures and filmed re-creations of accidents which are followed by discussions and analysis.

The course is open to new students as well as to those wishing to renew their certificates for auto insurance discounts. It is limited to 35 students accepted on a first-come basis.

Hours for Saturday's course are 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m., May 9.

Hours for the upcoming week-night course are 7 to 10 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday, May 12-14. Course fee on either is \$15.

Because the number of students which can be accepted is limited, Bramlett suggests early pre-registration. This may be completed now in room 156 of the MC Administration Building between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays. The office is open during the lunch hour.

## Suzuki to discuss Japan's defense

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan and Japanese Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki are holding two days of talks that U.S. officials hope will lead Japan to take more responsibility for its own defense and help guard sea lanes from an expanding Soviet navy.

Officially a get-acquainted session, the meeting opening today was intended "to set the framework" for more intense and detailed talks at lower levels.

Hours before Suzuki's arrival in Washington on Wednesday, an administration official characterized recent Japanese defense spending trends as "healthy" but nonetheless contended that if faced with a full-scale attack Japan probably could not mount a credible defense.

The official emphasized that Japan is not being asked to replace American forces in the Far East or to take on a high visibility military assignment contrary to the anti-war provisions of its constitution or to the traditions that have developed since the

end of World War II.

Rather, he said, the United States seeks Japanese recognition of the increasing seriousness of the strategic threat from the Soviet Union and help to meet that threat by increasing surveillance over some of the vital sea lanes in the North Pacific.

He said the United States would like to see that coupled with a beefed up defense of the Japanese homeland and increased Japanese assistance to the economies of other nations important to the non-communist world.

"A larger Japanese maritime self-defense force would be an appropriate measure," said the official, who spoke with reporters on the understanding he not be identified.

Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger recently asserted that the United States spends six times more than Japan to keep Far Eastern defenses strong and that Japan must spend more on defense than the current rate of 1 percent of its gross national product.

"It's no secret that it would be far preferable from the point of view of American officials to see that rate gradually increase to reflect a recog-

nition of the increased threat," the U.S. official said.

He said he couldn't "hold out much hope" that the Suzuki visit will produce instant or concrete decisions.

A prime purpose for the meeting, he said, is to give Reagan and Suzuki an opportunity to establish a personal relationship.

"The visit is important from a psychological point of view and it is fully assumed its principal objective will be harmony," the official said.

After his arrival Wednesday afternoon, Suzuki met with Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. and laid a wreath on the tomb of the Unknown Soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery.

During his stay, Suzuki also was scheduled to meet with Haig, Vice President George Bush and members of the House and Senate foreign affairs committees.

In addition to defense, topics high on the agenda are the problems caused by Japanese auto and high-technology exports to the United States and Japanese displeasure over the administration's handling of the decision to end the U.S. grain embar-

go against the Soviet Union.

Also expected to be discussed are the recent sinking of a Japanese freighter in a collision with an American nuclear submarine, long-range energy programs, relations with China and American efforts to round up contributions to the shaky economies of Turkey and other countries.

The auto import issue, long a point of contention among beleaguered U.S. automakers, apparently will not be a dominating factor in the sessions because Japan recently agreed to reduce imports and thus made it unlikely that Congress would set mandatory import quotas.

The agreement called for an import cutback of 7.7 percent for one year, with a promise to re-examine the situation next year in the light of the performance of the U.S. auto industry.

Japanese car manufacturers, who last year sold 1.82 million cars in the United States, had resisted the reduction. They charged that the Japanese government had yielded to pressure in hopes of eliminating the issue as a cause for controversy at the meeting between Reagan and Suzuki.

## Lopez Portillo blasts U.S.

MEXICO CITY (AP) — In a veiled attack on the United States, President Jose Lopez Portillo lashed out at enemies of Nicaragua who he said are seeking "in the name of democracy" to destroy a democratic country.

Welcoming the leader of Nicaragua's Sandinista National Liberation Front, Daniel Ortega, the Mexican president accused the Reagan administration Wednesday night of promoting an international public opinion campaign aimed at destabilizing the leftist government of Nicaragua.

Ortega, coordinator of Nicaragua's ruling junta, flew here Wednesday to meet with Lopez Portillo. Diplomatic sources said he was looking for ways to offset U.S. pressure on his nation.

"The campaign against Nicaragua is carried out in the name of democracy," Lopez Portillo said. "It is no small paradox that it proposes the destruction of a democratic regime."

The Reagan administration has accused the Sandinista government of allowing Soviet arms shipments to be funneled through Nicaragua to leftist guerrillas in El Salvador. It also warned that Nicaragua could be used as a Communist foothold in Latin America.

Lopez Portillo, who is

scheduled to meet with President Reagan in Washington next month, ridiculed "the expedient of presenting Nicaragua as a transcendent domino in a vast conspiracy to destroy Western democracy."

"A false idea does not become true if it is repeated millions of times," he said, "but its repetition stereotypes it as a propaganda formula that fulfills determined

political objectives. "Mexico will be consistent with its principles and compromises — Mexico will defend as its own the cause of Nicaragua."

## Bishop asks Kennedy for help

BOSTON (AP) — The acting Roman Catholic archbishop of El Salvador has asked U.S. Sen. Edward M. Kennedy to use his "position in the Congress" to see that military aid to the war-torn country is stopped.

Bishop Rivera y Damas, quoted in today's Boston Globe, asked the Massachusetts Democrat in a letter to work toward a "process of dialogue that will bring about a just and peaceful solution to the present conflict and violence."

Kennedy responded to the bishop Wednesday, promising to "do all that I can" to halt U.S. military aid, the newspaper said.

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## Khadafy changes sides in Chad's civil war

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy has withdrawn military support for Chadian President Goukouni Oueddi six months after helping him win a civil war and has backed a new challenger for power, kindling 10 days of fresh fighting, reports from Chad said.

Military analysts say Libya has kept an estimated 12,000 troops in Chad, its southern neighbor, since intervening on Goukouni's side last December against forces led by former Defense Minister Hissene Habre.

Khadafy backed Goukouni because the president permitted Libyan annexation of the uranium-rich Aouzou strip in northern Chad. A conflict arose, however, when Goukouni loyalists urged the withdrawal of the Libyan troops along with an unspecified number of Soviet, East German and Cuban military advisers.

The Libyan leader, who recently returned from a trip to Moscow, is now backing Goukouni's former foreign minister, Ahmat Acyl.

Chadian diplomats familiar with the power struggle said the Libyans backed Goukouni on the premise he

had significant military support when he took over. Acyl, described as "totally loyal to Khadafy," was kept as "the ultimate pawn on tap in case Goukouni should turn against them," the diplomats said.

Khadafy announced Jan. 6 he planned to merge Libya with Chad, the North African desert country's neighbor to the south. "If Acyl takes over, the planned merger with Libya will most probably be consummated," one well-informed source said.

Diplomatic sources in Sudan, which shares borders with both countries, said Wednesday about 70 Soviet-backed Libyan troops have been killed fighting Chadian troops who objected to "the heavy Soviet and Libyan presence in Chad."

They said the fighting broke out April 27 in the eastern city of Abeche, where the airport has been expanded to accommodate MIG-23 fighter jets, radar installation and a broadcasting station directed at Sudan and the Central African Republic.

Refugees are coming out of Abeche into Sudan "in large numbers," Western relief sources in Sudan said.

Earlier reports from Chadian travelers arriving in Cameroon said 100 people had been killed in Abeche.

## Paper hits artistic freedom

PEKING (AP) — China's army newspaper has launched its second attack on a famous literary playwright, and literary sources said the articles indicated disagreement in the Communist Party over the limits of artistic freedom.

Three critical articles appeared in the Liberation Army Daily this week, in the latest round of a literary tempest over the film "Unrequited Love."

Chinese literary sources said the criticism in the restricted circulation army paper would not be reprinted by leading newspapers because they oppose the army's position.

The paper called the script by Bai Hua "a distortion of fact" that "injures people who love the motherland."

The story concerns the plight of a Chinese painter who returns from abroad, where he had lived in relative

luxury, only to be persecuted to death during China's 1966-76 Cultural Revolution. It was made into a movie which was withdrawn from distribution last March because of attacks in the military press.

The journal's latest criticism was more temperate than its initial review, which accused Bai Hua of being "anti-party and anti-people." This time the daily merely accused him of lacking "any sense of political responsibility."

The army publication objected to Bai Hua's contention that intellectuals find greater freedom of expression abroad than in China.

"Quite a few of our comrades in the army became indignant," it said. "This is a bizarre and ridiculous story created at the whim of the author."

The article concluded that democracy in the arts never should be used as an excuse to oppose China's Communist Party.



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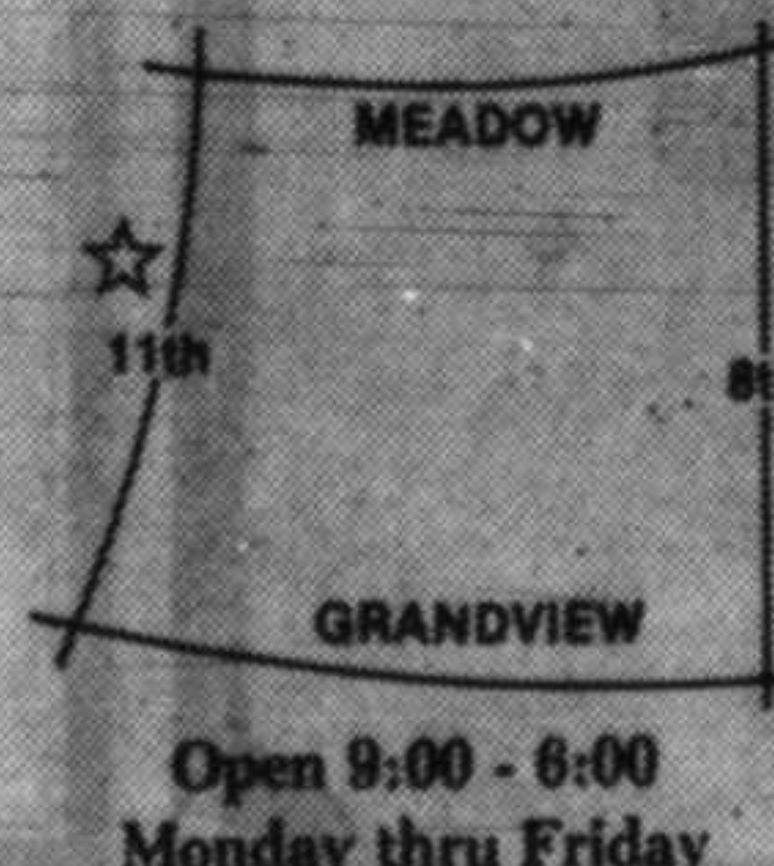


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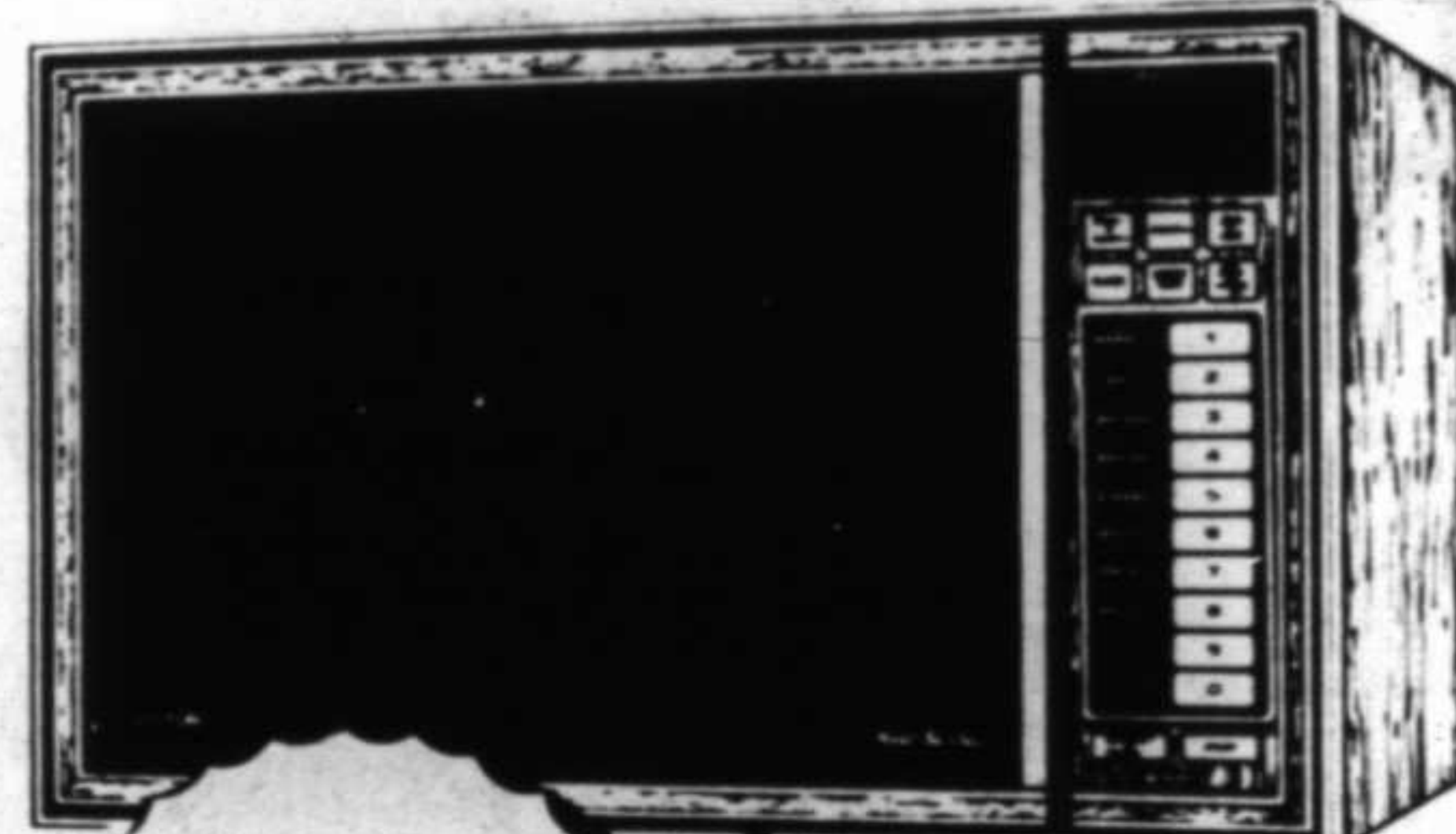
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
