Threats Are Made on Eve Of Elections

THREE MARKED MEN IN MASSACRE INQUIRY

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—Tomorrow Chicago elects aldermen. Latest news from the more active fronts follows:

Candidate in "bloody twentieth" ward threatened with death unless he quits race.

Bullet, stray or deliberate, puts neat hole in wind shield of automobile carrying campaign captains of candidate in fourth ward.

Voters living within rifle range of the University of Chicago campus receive telephone warnings they will be "taken for a ride" if they show up at the polls tomorrow.

Workers for one candidate announce they will not be out election day because of a fear that it might not be healthy.

The name of Al Capone has been prominent in the "bloody twentieth" campaign, the charge being made that Capone followers and the Eller supporters have united in an effort to defeat Alderman A. J. Prignano, State Representative William W. Pacelli is Prignano's opponent.

Speaking of affairs in this ward in a radio address yesterday, Albert R. Brunker, head of the civic safety commission, said:

"I sat in a conference Saturday with several public officials and heard them say that chances of Prignano to live through Tuesday in the ward where he was born and where he has always lived, were slightly less than even."

It was Brunker who told of threats made against Prignano's life.

I. C. C. MOVES AGAINST LINE TO WEST AREA

SANTA FE PROPOSAL TO TOUCH NEW REGION MEETS FAILURE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—A Santa Fe railroad extension project in Texas, calling for the expenditure of nearly \$2,000,000 and the construction of 66 miles of line, failed today to receive the approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission. The application was presented by the Pecos and Northern Texas, a subsidiary of the Atchison-Topeka and Santa Fe, and contemplated extension from Hale Center to Parnerton, both points in Texas.

The commission already has authorized the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains company, which is connected with the Burlington system, to build a new line in this territory. The decision today said that the Santa Fe construction proposed would parallel the Denver South Plains line throughout its length at a distance of 13 miles and would represent an unjustified duplication of railroad facilities, particularly in view of the development of highway and truck traffic.

The Denver South Plains line was deemed adequate to serve the territory under the condition prevailing and the \$2,000,000 Santa Fe extension was held not necessary.

Conflicting Tales Heard On Shooting

OZARK, Ala., Feb. 25.—County officers today were confronted with conflicting stories of the shooting of Mrs. Love Nevill, a young widow, who was wounded probably fatally by Jesse Pouncey, a merchant, in his store at County Line Saturday night.

Pouncey, who called Sheriff Kennedy to his home and submitted to arrest, said he shot the woman after she had pointed a pistol at him. The quarrel started he said, when Mrs. Nevill, accompanied by several children, entered his store and accused him of neglecting her.

Mrs. Nevill, taken to a hospital at Enterprise, Ala., with two bullet wounds in her right side, told Sheriff Kennedy Pouncey drew a pistol, and when she reached for her gun, he opened fire.

WAR WOUNDS WIN 'ANGEL OF FRONT'

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Feb. 25.—A meeting between an American war nurse and a wounded American officer on a battlefield of France more than ten years ago developed into a romance yesterday with the announcement here that Mrs. Kathleen Burke Peabody, widow of the multi-millionaire collar maker, Frederick Forrest Peabody, of Troy, N. Y., would marry John Reginald McLean, mining engineer of Phoenix, Ariz., next Saturday.

Mrs. Peabody, who won the title "Angel of France" for her brilliant work as a nurse and campaigner to raise money for war charities, received decorations from five of the allied countries during the World War. McLean was a lieutenant in the 36th Infantry. He was wounded in the battle of the Argonne and became acquainted with Miss Burke in a hospital.

BULLET AIMED FOR DEMPSEY MISSES MARK

UNKNOWN PROWLER IN ATTEMPT ON LIFE OF RING IDOL

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 25.—An unidentified prowler entered Jack Dempsey's room here about 5 a. m. today and shot once at the former heavyweight champion, the bullet going wide.

Dempsey made a report of the affair to police late this morning. Dempsey was sleeping with Floyd Fitzsimmons, Chicago promoter at the time of Harry Moore on the ocean front at Miami Beach, he told police. He awakened about 5 a. m. and saw the figure of a man silhouetted in a window opening to the street. Dempsey said he thought the man was his host until Fitzsimmons, beside him, called out:

"What do you want?"

"The man at the window replied in a gruff tone:

"Turn on those lights," and addressed a supposed accomplice in the hallway, said "Come on in, Joe."

When the man spoke, Dempsey said he leaped from the bed, and the intruder retreated, firing once wildly as he backed out the window.

The bullet, from a .38 calibre revolver, buried itself in the wall about knee high from the floor.

Dempsey and Fitzsimmons said they did not follow the intruder because they were unarmed and there were no lights on the grounds. They did not telephone police at that time because it would have been necessary to go through a doorway in the direction from which the prowler and his supposed accomplice approached, Dempsey said.

TEXAS TOWNS HARD HIT BY COSTLY FIRES

TWO BURNED WHEN HUMBLE BUSINESS SECTION RAZED

(By Associated Press)
CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., Feb. 25.—Fanned by a very strong southeast wind, fire of undetermined origin destroyed practically an entire block of frame buildings in the vicinity of the Texas-Mexican Railroad station here today. The loss was estimated at \$40,000.

Places destroyed included a frame hotel, three cafes, a barber shop, two grocery stores and a fruit stand. Two passenger coaches of the Texas-Mexican railroad, caught fire, but the flames were extinguished before material damage was done.

Members of the Illinois and Eastern Iowa Klu Klux party, who arrived here yesterday on a special train, fled from their coaches when the blaze threatened their train. The special, however, was moved to safety and the party departed for Brownsville nearly an hour behind schedule.

HOTEL GOES IN SMOKE AND TWO ARE KILLED

HUMBLE, Tex., Feb. 25 (AP)—Plans were being made today to rebuild the block of business buildings destroyed by fire which took the lives of two men yesterday. Two garages, three frame buildings and two automobiles were destroyed with loss of \$40,000.

The body of John Fitzpatrick, 28, was found in the ashes of the Arlington hotel, in which the fire started. He apparently had been trapped in his room. John Saunders, 23, oil field worker, received fatal injuries when he jumped from the second floor of the hotel. He died at a hospital.

Firemen summoned from Houston, 20 miles away, subdued the fire after a two-hour fight.

LUBBOCK MAN DROPS DEAD

J. T. WILLIAMSON DIES OF HEART ATTACK SUNDAY NOON

Joseph Terrell Williamson, 43, employee of the city water department, dropped dead at about noon yesterday at his residence, 1911 8th Street.

While shaving in the bathroom, Mr. Williamson succumbed to a heart attack. He leaves a wife, two children: J. T. Jr., 7; and Mattie Lou, 4; his parents; and five sisters.

Funeral services will be at the First Methodist church of this city at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Burial will follow in the Lubbock cemetery under the direction of Bynum Brothers.

Pallbearers will be Roy Houk, E. A. Johnston, W. A. Heart, W. L. Metcalf, J. P. Steele and B. F. Warlick.

Mr. Williamson had been a resident of this section for many years and was well known here. He formerly served as a deputy sheriff here under H. L. Johnston.

Youth Cheats Death From Gas Fumes

Already turning black from lack of oxygen, Milton Dyer defeated death by a narrow margin yesterday as firemen, ambulance attendants, and physicians applied artificial respiration and a pump motor in a frantic effort to save the young man from asphyxiation by gas.

Gas escaping from a small heater overcame young Dyer yesterday, and it is thought that he had been unconscious for hours when he was discovered by a Tech student, who rooms at the same residence, 2310 Tenth Street.

Firemen summoned to bring a lung motor, dragged the youth into the back yard and resorted to artificial respiration as the only hopes of saving his life. As soon as breathing was made regular, he was taken in a Bynum Brothers ambulance to the Lubbock Sanitarium where respiration was continued.

Dyer rested well last night and was released from the sanitarium this morning.

DEATH MYSTERY

Pistol, Broken At Breech, Is Puzzle In Suicide Tale

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 25 (AP)—A pistol, broken open at the breech, injected an element of mystery today into the death of Fred C. Deininger, 26-year-old heir to the General Baking company millions.

Deininger was found by his wife, the former Virginia Deininger, musical comedy actress, on the sleeping porch of their home with a bullet wound in his head and the pistol on the floor beside him. The one cartridge in the weapon had been discharged.

Pistol experts of the police department said it would have been impossible for him to have opened the gun after shooting himself, adding it was highly improbable the gun was opened in falling.

GIANT FORD CRAFT TO BE HERE PART OF THIS WEEK

County authorities will make no investigation unless one is asked by relatives of the girl. Ernest F. Jenkins, county attorney said, Dr. Charles C. Pruitt of Comanche, the girl's father, said he was satisfied his daughter's death was accidental and the family would not request an investigation.

Dean McElroy said the college would investigate the case because of evidence that college rules against late dates and car riding at night had been broken.

SPOTLIGHT TO BE TURNED ON ROBISON NEXT

(Associated Press Staff Writer)
AUSTIN, Feb. 25 (AP)—Disposal of the investigation into affairs of the highway department and the board of control has moved the spotlight over to the inquiry into administration of the general land office. The hearing will be resumed probably on Tuesday.

The controversy envelops J. T. Robison, veteran commissioner of the land office. It was precipitated by agreement between Robison, Governor Moody, the attorney general's department and University board of regents, over the proposed leasing of mineral rights in 103,000 acres of public lands early in January.

Considerable bitterness was aroused, with the commissioner hinting at a conspiracy to force postponement of the sales, which he claimed had to be made under the law.

TWISTERS HIT AT TWO TOWNS IN NORTHEAST

COOPER, TEXAS, SWEEP BY STORM-VILLAGE NEAR DALLAS HIT

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 25.—Four persons were killed and at least seven seriously injured in severe windstorms which swooped down on two Northeast Texas communities this morning, flattening flimsy structures and twisting others of more stable construction.

At Cooper, Tex. and Mrs. W. N. Jones were killed when a tornado, which swept through a path less than 200 feet wide and about a mile and a half long, crashed their house to the ground. Three other persons, Troy Young, 21; Mrs. William Duncan, 60; and an unidentified woman, were injured seriously.

Mrs. Duncan's husband was slightly hurt when their home was destroyed.

At Grand Prairie, ten miles from Dallas, another high wind took the lives of two negroes, Alfred Gibson, 46, and his wife, 22. Three members of the family of J. B. Trigg and one member of the W. E. Smallwood family were seriously injured.

Gibson was killed instantly when the wind leveled their small house, and his wife died while in an ambulance on the way to Dallas.

The storm, while not equally violent in other points, seemed to have been a part of a general disturbance over northeast Texas. A heavy rain with large hailstones, fell in Dallas and adjoining communities last night, but no loss of life was reported.

ONE PARTY GOVERNMENTS TESTED

SPANISH DICTATORSHIP CRUMBLING; FASCIST FACTION CELEBRATES; CHINA IN TURMOIL

(By Associated Press)

One party governments are undergoing varying experiences in Spain, Italy and China.

Uncensored border reports continued to predict disintegration of the dictatorship of General Primo De Rivera of Spain. One of the latest of these said that disaffection was spreading to influential civil elements because of the dismissal from service of 2,000 artillery officers, all members of old families.

In Grand Council of the Fascist party was to meet in Rome today and among other things plan for celebration of the party's tenth birthday. It is also to approve a list of more than 400 men selected for the new Chamber of Deputies. Some 9,000,000 voters are later to go through the formality of casting a single ballot for these approved candidates.

Nationalist China, another one party government, is facing serious outbreaks near Chefoo in Shantung. Some 7,000 Nationalist troops there have been fighting four times their number of revolutionaries. Unrest has been expressed in British circles because the neutral railway zone maintained by Japan cuts east and west across about two-thirds of Shantung, making it difficult for the Nationalist forces at Chefoo to receive reinforcements. There are many chances of a clash in this situation. The Japanese position is difficult because the policy of that government in Shantung has been costly in men and money and the

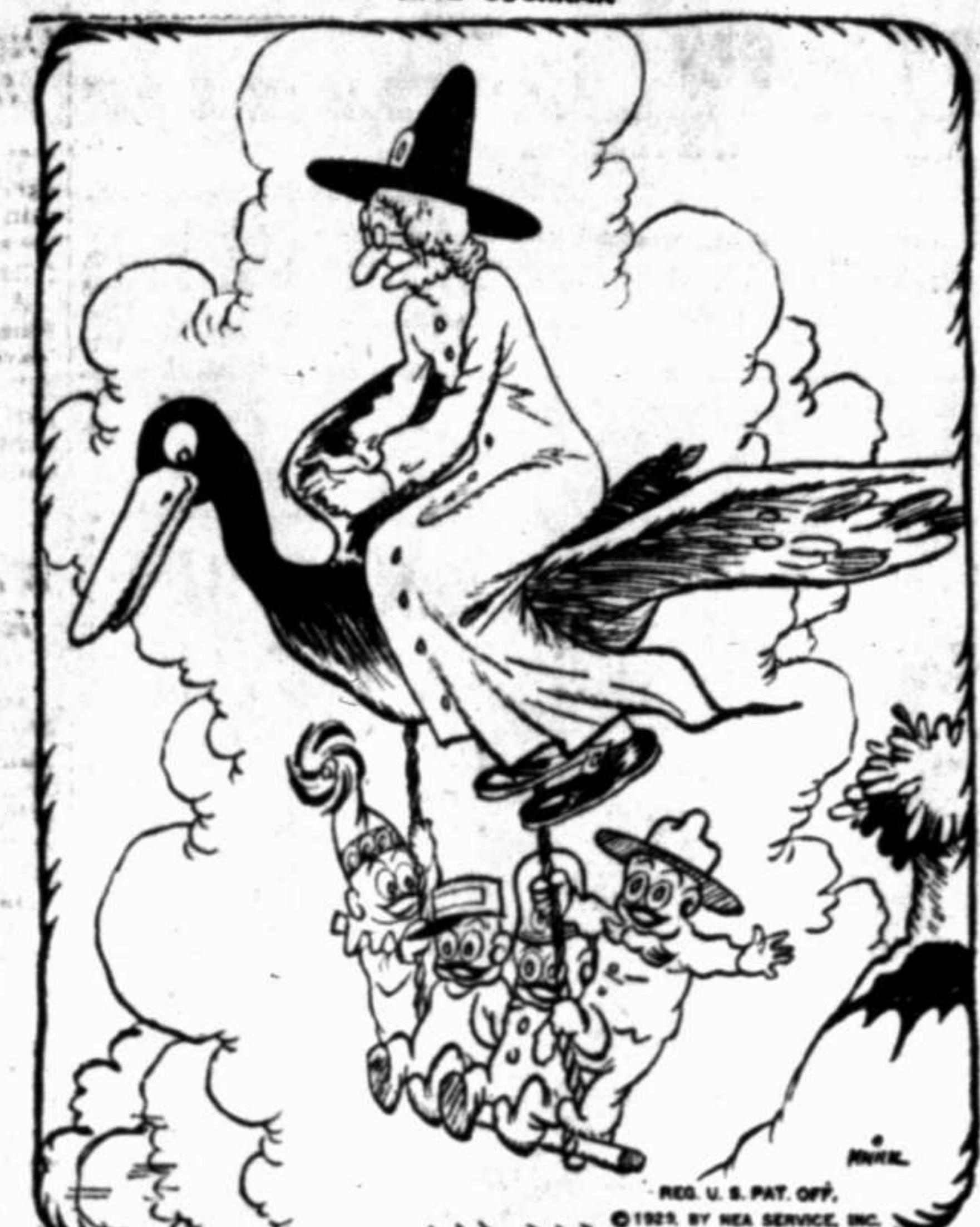

"If the 'T' is the infield, and the quality in quantity of talent available indicates that question mark might be removed. At any rate, Beaumont probably will leave the eighth place berth in the league to some other entry.

Robby naturally will do most of the heavy catching. Mike Wiley, pace-setting receiver in the West Texas loop last year, may develop into satisfactory relief, and if he does, T. Robertson still can consider Wesley Parms, who had a trial last season, and Aubrey Hendrix, Dallas sandler.

Outfield Is Strong
As for the outfield, Robertson will depend on Lyman Lamb from Wichita Falls, Paul Easterlin, and probably Bob Pettie, who is training with the Detroit Tigers. If Pettie doesn't come back, five semi-pros will be after his job. If he does, the Shippers should have one of the strongest outfields in the circuit.

Then comes the question mark. Floyd Burt, who whammed the ball for about a \$300 average the few days he was with the Exporters in 28, will be staked on first. John Chapman, last year with San Antonio and Chattanooga, will try for the keystone bag. At short, Bill Akers from Decatur in the three-I league will get a chance to use what has been hailed as a great throwing arm. And Hende Odum, utility infielder last season, seems destined to be drawn away from bench warming for a post at third. The other infield candidates, any one of whom might tie down a job, are Tommy Marshall, whose brother, Eddie, a former Exporter, is getting a try-out at short with the Giants; Dode Porter, a Beaumont product; Dean Martin from Malone, Tex.; Sam Reagan from Coleman of the West Texas League; J. S. Lindsey, Vivian, La.

If Eddie Marshall should return from New York, the infield problem without doubt would be solved. Robertson thinks he has it solved already.

For the first time since entering the American league as a member of the Detroit Tigers in 1905, Ty Cobb, one of the greatest players that ever lived, is missing from the army of players limbering up at the southern training camps. Baseball has had only one Ty Cobb, and when his amazing span of years as an active player is considered, it is doubtful if there ever will be another. During the 24 years Cobb played in the American league, he established more records than any other man in the game. He is a leader in several departments, particularly batting. And these records are set so high that it will be many a year before any of them are equalled.

As a manager, Ty was not a howling success, but there is no doubt that as a player he was one of the greatest and most enduring of all time.

He will miss the game, but the game will miss him more.

NURMI MAY DO FAST FADEOUT

FINNISH SPRINT KING FAILS TO APPEAR IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Unless he can find an alibi for his non-appearance at the National A. A. U. championships, Saturday, Paavo Nurmi may do a fade-out for the next six months by request.

Nurmi, already under suspension, must appear before the registration committee of the Metropolitan Association, A. A. U., to explain why he withdrew from the two mile steeplechase an hour before that event was to be run. Unless Paavo can offer a legitimate excuse, the chances are he will be plastered with a long suspension.

Hugo Quist, generalissimo of Nurmi's campaign, said Nurmi had gone stale and was suffering from a bad cold.

But some critics declare Quist learned Saturday afternoon that Eino Purje, younger Finn, would start in the steeplechase instead of the two mile flat race in which he has to have met Edwin Wide, the Swedish schoolmaster. Nurmi already had been charged with side-stepping a duel with Wide when he entered the Steeplechase and some critics contended that Paavo, rather than face so formidable a rival as Purje in the Steeplechase, decided not to run at all.

It appears that Nurmi would have been trounced had he entered either event. Purje broke the world's record for the Steeplechase and Wide, in winning the two mile flat race, covered the distance in 9 minutes and seven seconds, much better time than anything Nurmi has done on his present tour.

CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—(P)—So anxious are Chicago baseball fans to get a glimpse of the Cubs' 1929 team that a sell-out is anticipated a month before their opening game with the Pittsburgh Pirates at Wrigley field, April 16.

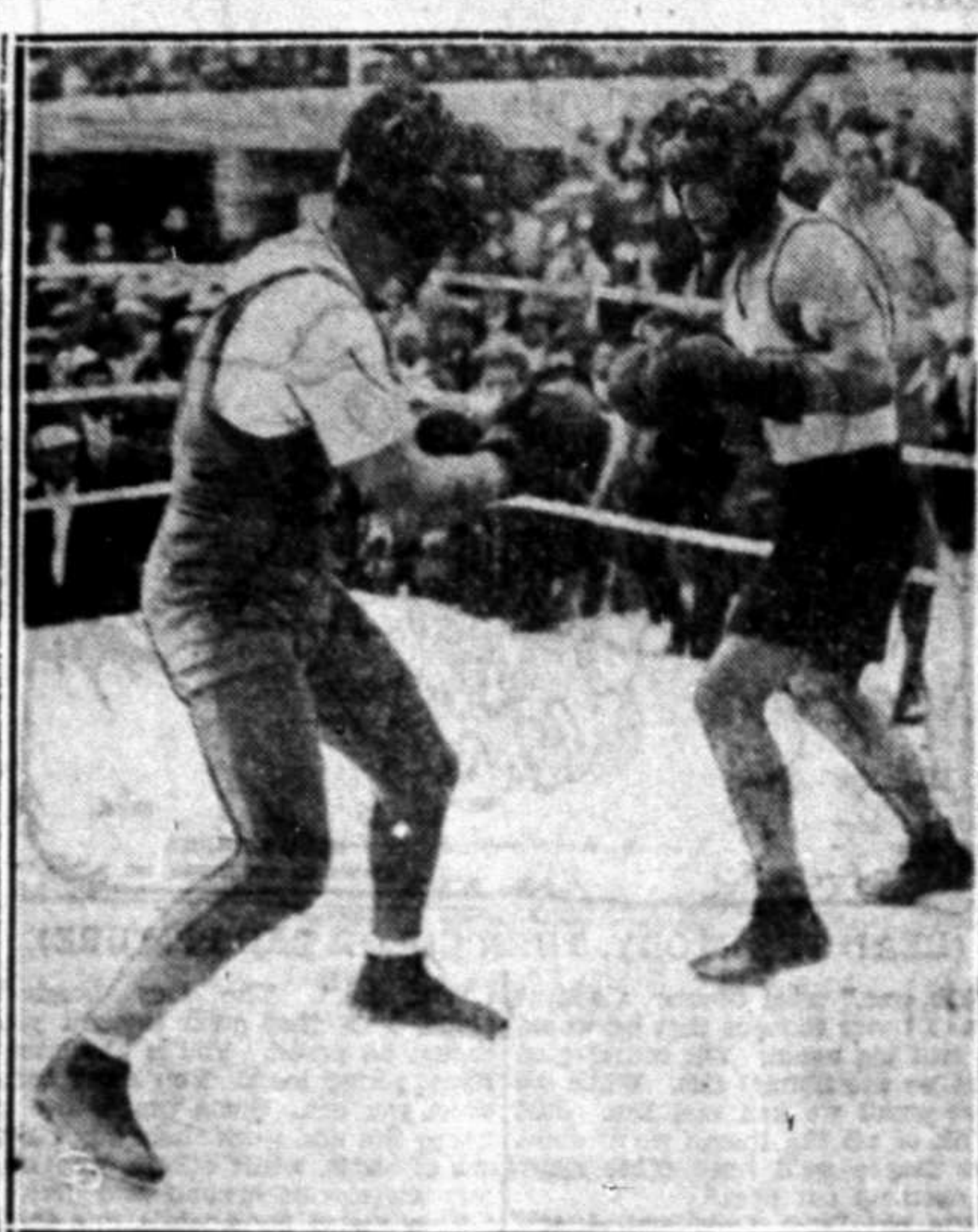

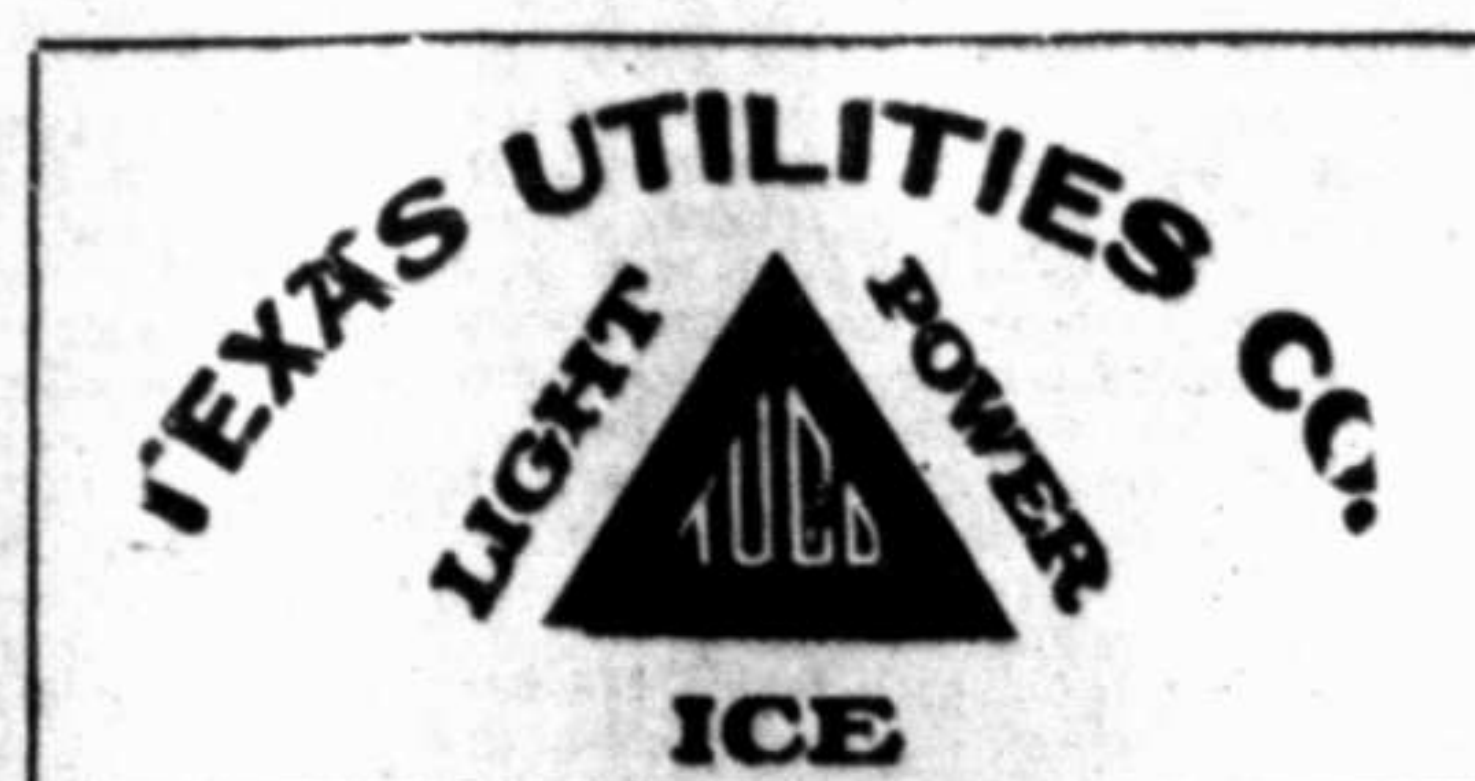

The Mind

The average man develops less
than half of his real mental ca-
pacity. The race is constantly pro-
ducing hundreds of minds poten-
tially as great as those of Einstein,
Edison, Ford or Rockefeller, but only
one or three out of each hundred
ever rise above the commonplace.

These assertions come from the
country's leading psychologists, as
interviewed by Myron M. Stearns in
the February issue of *World's*
Work.

One psychologist is quoted as say-
ing that most men develop hardly
more than a fifth of their natural
brain power. Another says that every
adult, at least up to the age of
50, is as capable of learning new
things as a child—but fails to do it.
Most of us say another, stop learning
in our teens and go through the
rest of our lives with closed
minds.

There is both discouragement and
hope in such ideas.
It is profoundly discouraging to
learn that we are failing to accept
our opportunities. This modern age
specializes in the elimination of
waste, and what could possibly be
more wasteful than the habit of let-
ting more than half of our great
minds be idle?

Yet there is room for hope in it
too. The blind and stupid
that cause most of the world's un-
happiness and suffering are not
things that we must always carry
with us. We can get rid of them
just as we can get rid of disease
and poverty. Surely if mankind can
voluntarily raise its own mental
level, almost any kind of optimism
is justified.

The trouble of course comes from
the fact that there is such a wide
gap between what is possible and
what is actually done.
We are born with great gifts, but
we are also born lazy. We want
more than any thing else to be con-
tented. We have things that un-
settle us. Comfort is the greatest
boon life can bring us.

So we follow the path of least
resistance and settle into grooves.
We find a comfortable place and
stick to it. We make ourselves
contented with something inferior,
because it would be too much trou-
ble to get the best.

The contentment that comes from
a sense of genuine achievement is
one of life's greatest blessings. The
contentment that most of us get,
however, is the contentment that
means we have stifled our visions
of what is high and noble in order
that we may put up with something
ordinary and commonplace as a
course. It prevents us from being as
fine as we were meant to be.

To be restless and dissatisfied is
to be unhappy—granted, but it is
not possible to make progress in any
other way. When a man takes stock
of his achievements and feels
ashamed because they are no better,
instead of proud because they excel
those of his neighbor, he is on the
way toward attainment.

College Students

What class of the population pro-
vides the largest proportion of col-
lege students?

Statistics recently gathered at the
University of Illinois provide a partial
answer to this question. Of the
31,000 odd students there, 5,180 are
sons and daughters of business men.
Oddly enough, the next largest di-
vision of parents is that classified
as skilled and unskilled laborers: 2-
681 students come from such pa-
rents. Farmers rank third, with 1-
706, and the professions, with 1-
719, are fourth.

The world moves forward.

Not so long ago, when the oil
business was in its comparative in-
fancy, to mention making a loca-
tion upon a geologist's findings was
to invite derisive laughter. To
base any kind of confidence in a
"doodle-bug," a contraction which
was supposed to ring a bell when
over an oil structure, was even worse.
The hard-boiled petroleum geology
preferred to drill their tests as they
would play a roulette wheel and let
it go at that.

But as already been noted, the
world moves and it was no excep-
tion to the rule as far as the oil
business was concerned.
The "doodle-bug," a throw-
back of the voodoo age, was thrown
onto the ashpile but the geologist,
with his structures and his theories,
forced himself into acceptance by even
the hardest of the hard-boiled.
Statistics began to favor the
geologist and oil companies large
and small began to rely upon the
advice of the rock-hounds. Every-
thing went along pretty much on the
up-and-up for awhile and then the
world, as pertains to the oil in-
dustry, moved up another notch.
Men of science were summoned
to aid in the search for flowing
gold—and they did.

As a result the knowledge of the
geologist, versed as he is in the
matter of structures and world his-
tory, is being augmented by new
and entirely different types of in-
struments which differ from the
doodle-bug in that they are deeply
scientific and practical. Three of
them are being used in this section
—namely the seismograph, the tor-
sion balance and the magnetometer.
Doubtless most of the readers of this
column will become more or less ac-
quainted with the appearance of
each ere many more gallons of
water flow under the well known
bridge.

The seismograph, which is also
used to determine the locations and
the seriousness of earth tremors, is
used to locate structures by means
of reflected waves as the result of
an explosion. Dynamite charges are
set off and a seismograph locates
the structures underlying the
ground. A seismograph costs in the
neighborhood of \$5,000 and a crew
of several trained men is needed to
make its tests. If it weren't fairly
accurate efficient operators would
cease to use it.

The torsion balance, probably the
best known of the three in-
struments in this section, also
costs in the neighborhood of
\$5,000 and a crew of a dozen men
is necessary to make exhaus-
tive tests. A sensitive pendu-
lum, which measures the pull of
gravity in certain sections in its
principal worth in defining loca-
tions. The magnetometer,
which can be operated by a single
worker and costs only about
one-fifth as much as its more
expensive brother, does its bit
in the search for oil by
measuring variations in magne-
tism at different localities.

Probably the explanation of these
three delicate instruments sounds
like greek to the rank and file of
the readers of this column. To be
mildly frank about it, The Plain-
sman is far from well versed in the
subject. Yet it is interesting, even

tent to which science is helping in the
search for that more definite thing
—a fortune in the form of crude
oil.

In a meeting of representatives
of the ten schools of higher learn-
ing, sometimes termed colleges,
maintained by the Methodist church
in Texas, beginning yesterday at
Georgetown, the proposition to con-
solidate these elements into not to
exceed two high-grade institutions
was started upon by the prepara-
tion of comparative tables of ef-
ficiency, costs and the like of that.

Local interest is given by the pre-
sence there of Warren M. Evers,
generally recognized as an expert on
such matters, and who has effective-
ly served in many other states. He
has taken up the question which
has arisen from time to time for
years, whether Methodism in Texas
is not defeating its own aims by
maintaining so many colleges, some
of them wretchedly equipped, in
preference to just a few upon whom
the support of the church might be
directed. The initiative was caused
by an editorial in the Houston
Chronicle in which a list of the
many church schools were given, and
the direct every made as to how
long the struggle and waste of their
operations should be maintained and
whether in fact it were the part of
real wisdom to maintain church
schools at all, except for training of
divinity students. Naturally, that
raised a howl from all denomina-
tions, although it found many pow-
erful adherents among the members
of the sects, who over a long course
of years have paid the freight. These
were powerful enough to cause the
calling of the conference, and it is
quite possible that it definite recom-
mendations for eliminations are
made that other denominations will
follow suit.

The situation is not peculiar to
Texas, for it exists in many large
and thickly populated states, as well
as in some of the humbler divisions.
For half a century the belief in these
sectarian schools was so strong that
little attention was paid to their stu-
dents area, equipment, quality of in-
struction and those other essentials
that are generally considered desir-
able in imparting a well-balanced
education. "Colleges" were estab-
lished in almost every diocese and
they struggled along with heart-
breaking conditions, under the pres-
sure of an ideal that taught that
there could not be too many in the
field. The modern tendency toward
centralization is forcing a calm
study as to whether this is a mis-
take or not, and whether there is
not in reality far too many col-
leges.

From this point it is not a far
cry to the presentation of the claim
that Prof. Edward Snow, of Cornell,
that there are not only far too many
colleges in the United States, but a
vastly excessive number of stu-
dents who are designed for profes-
sions already overcrowded, and
"forcing the conclusion that there
should be a reduction of both, or
rather the substitution of occupa-
tional training schools at which the
chief instruction should be in the
higher classes of mechanical call-
ings, or trades to use the most fa-
miliar word. Figures show that not
one student in a hundred is tem-
peramentally or intellectually fit for
efficient service in the profession for
which he is supposed to aspire. A
vast system of industrial schools,
directly following the ordinary high
schools would be infinitely more
beneficial to the nation and to hu-
manity."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—This
"marked" Congressman George
Huddleston of Alabama in the course

Men have amassed fortunes and
prizes in other times.

"The result is that all of man's
interest and attention has been di-
verted away from the spiritual life,
which embraces religion, art and
politics in the purest sense, and
concentrated on the material side—
on things that one can see, smell,
feel and hear. So we have elevated
to the supreme matters relating to
sex, a low form of materialism, and
to food, drink, fine clothes, automo-
biles, buildings and other things
shading up to the power, influence
and prestige that comes from the
possession of wealth.

es his richest parishioners, preach-
ing what they want to hear so that
they will contribute and give him

ago have abandoned entirely the
practice of relying on force to set-
tle troubles. But we continue to
build cruisers and to admit that our
anti-war treaties really do not mean
very much.

"Among ourselves we have come
to put our faith in legal forces. We
are now treating prohibition as a
legal and political question instead
of as a moral question.

"The prohibitionists made two
great original mistakes. In obtain-
ing passage of the prohibition laws
they anticipated public opinion and
expected the law to enforce itself
in communities where sentiment
was against it. Second, after en-
acting the law they failed to sup-
port them. Many prohibitionists
violate the law openly and those
who do not are willing to take to
their bosoms those who do.

"If we are to have prohibition in
this country—and I believe a ma-
jority of the people want it—a
majority must get up on its hind legs
and fight for it. It is utterly im-
conceivable to me how prohibition-
ists can give countenance and re-
spect and patronage to known violators.

"Prohibition is an ethical ques-
tion and we will not have real pro-
hibition until a very large per-
centage of people believe in it not only
for others but for themselves. I
think that sentiment for prohibition
is growing. We will never have ab-
solutely complete enforcement, for
you must remember that in some
sections of the country we still have
peonage, a modified form of slavery,
even though sentiment is almost
unanimously against it.

"It may take 25 years to get real-
ly satisfactory enforcement. But I
expect that a sentiment will develop
which will put the bootlegger in the
same class with the narcotics ven-
dors and cause his customers to be
regarded as addicts. I voted against
the eighteenth amendment, but the
sooner people make up their minds
that we have prohibition the better
for them."

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Each
year, as the Chinese calendar moves
more closely to the year 8000, New
York's Chinatown stages a holiday
that reveals the gradual absorption
of American customs.

To be sure, the program itself is
made up of novelties that could be
traced back many thousands of
years. But the participants have
changed and the purposes of the
paganism themselves are twisted. It
has been said that Orientals are un-
assimilable and that they never
come to take to our particular ways.
This may have been true of a former
generation of "the old men." It
is not completely true of this second
and third generation, which wears
spats and patent leather shoes and
which sends its trousers to the
pressers and fashions its attire a la
Broadway.

Thus the fiery dragon may make
its way through the curves and an-
gles of Mott, Doyer and Pell streets,
but the feet of the dragon wear
shoes that have recently been shin-

ed. The acrobats still go frantically
through the steps of their three-
honored adagios, but their shirts
are from the Broadway stores and
their trousers are of the type to be
found in any of the clothing store
windows on or off of Main Street.

There is something humorously
incongruous about all this—and
one feels that the cymbal-clanging
paraders did not accidentally halt
their dragon march in front of some
popular tourist chop suey resort or
national shop. After all, these dra-
gon parades are trailed by thou-
sands of tourists and natives with
money to spend!

Somewhat, the paganism of New
York's Chinatown lack an allure
that was always present at a San
Francisco Chinatown spectacle. I
find myself missing, for instance,
the colorful flower vendors of the
San Francisco curbstones, and while
the western city has found its
Chinatown invaded by flashy mod-
ern antique shops and contempo-
rary architecture, still the flavor
clings to the side streets and there
is a sense of the fabulous and the
ornate which is missing from the
Manhattan affairs.

New York's Chinatown, as a
matter of fact, borrows much of its
atmosphere from propinquity with
the old Bowery. Its lanes have never
lost their tawdry dishevelment.
There is a mustiness that suggests
dark cellars and airless, light-
less rooms. There cling a hint of
the melodramatic and the mysteri-
ous. It is an excellent stage set.

Then, just a few steps away, an
elevated shadow and darkens the
Bowery block as it sprawls toward
the famous Five Corners, once the
capital of tough gangland. Today
there are more baby carriages than
gangsters at the Five Corners, but
nearby are reminders of a "time
when." The buildings are unchanged
and have that particular odor
suggested by mean streets.

Here, on the rim of Chinatown,
sailors wander in silent or hilar-
ious groups. Here are the famous
"tattoo artists," one or two of whom
still work under a flickering gas jet,
while crowds gather about to watch
an anchor being placed upon a
muscular arm. Here are cheap
restaurants and cheap lodging
houses; rescue missions and bums—
and this particular atmosphere
melts strangely into that of the
Oriental section, creating a theatrical
unreality which makes it dis-
tinctive.

asthma and had low blood pressure.
I am 5 feet 5 inches tall and
weigh 160 pounds. I was under the
care of a doctor for some time and
improved in the wheezing, but lately
my feet and
hands have be-
gun to swell and
haven't a bit of
energy. I don't
overeat; some-
times for two
days at a time I
don't eat a bite,
except for coffee
with canned milk
and sugar. I
just eat because
I realize I need
something in my
stomach. I am
extremely ner-
vous and melan-
choly. Do you
think it is caused by my heart?"

If you are only 5 ft. 5 in. tall, you
are about 20 to 25 pounds over-
weight. Did you measure your
height without your shoes? If you
didn't, then you are about 3 ft. 5
in., and you would be around 35
pounds overweight.

The fact that you are overweight
shows you have been on an unbal-
anced diet for a long time. This
alone may account for your bad
heart condition, perhaps coupled
with some infection. Not eating for
two or three days, except coffee,
isn't a good plan. You must over-
eat when you do eat, else you would
not keep up this overweight.

With a bad heart and the swelling
of the hands and feet, showing drop-
sical condition, you should be ex-
tremely careful of your diet, omit-
ting salt entirely for a while and
cutting down your food until you
gradually reduce.

You must go to your doctor again,

to South Dakota. Admitted to the bar in 1886, he did not follow law
but became engaged in the real estate and investment business. From
1886 to 1897 he was a member of the South Dakota house of repre-
sentatives. He was elected to congress in 1899 and served continuously
until 1915 with the exception of the years 1906 and 1909. He
was named commissioner of Indian affairs in 1914. His home is in

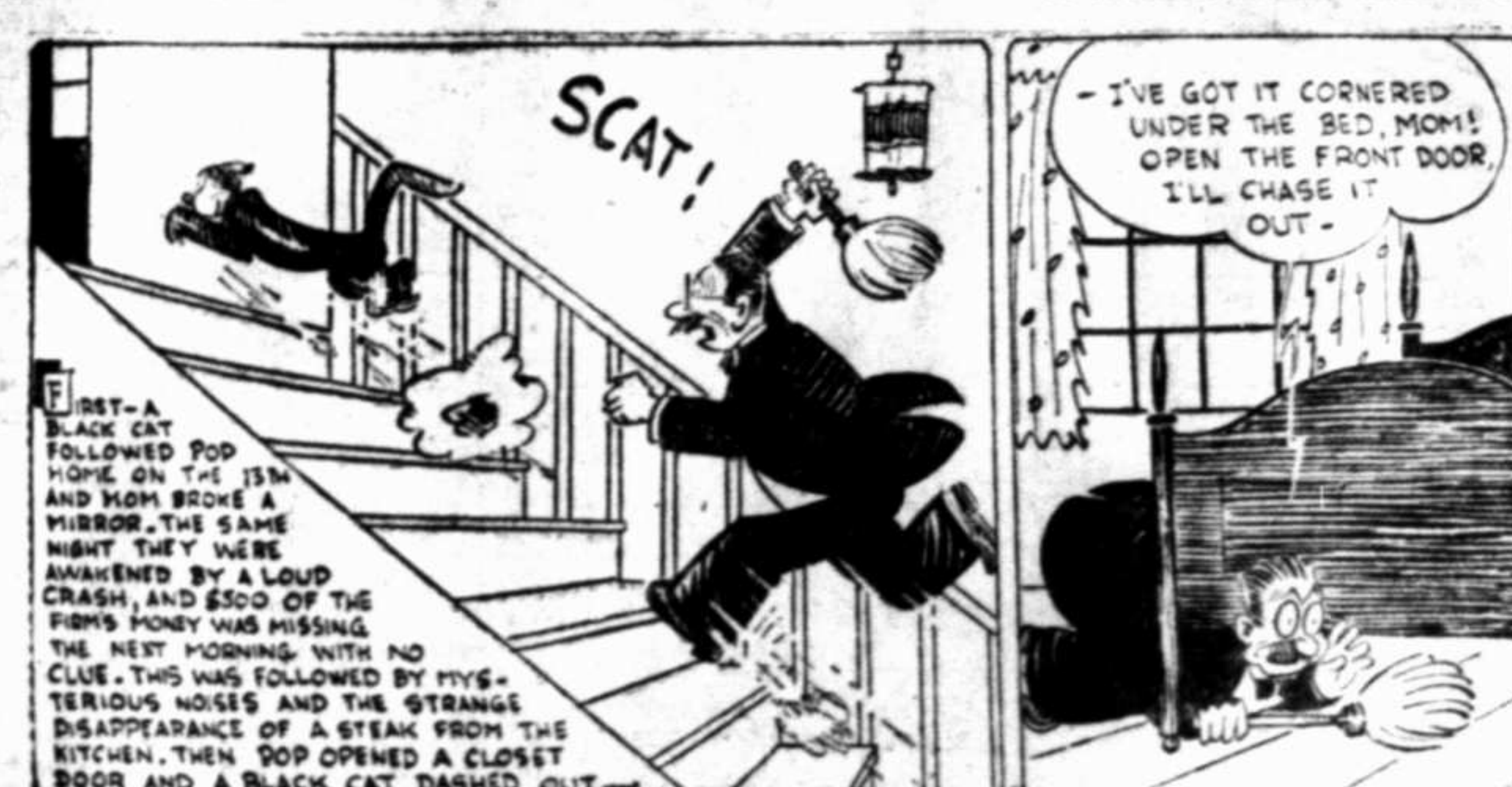

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 25.—The 188 passengers bound for Alaska on the coastwise vessel Aleutian when she grounded on Maud Island at the entrance of Seymour Narrows, British Columbia, yesterday, were returning to Seattle today aboard the steamship Alameda.

The Aleutian sent out an SOS but was refloated in fifteen minutes. She started back to Seattle, but developing a list, anchored off Waldron Island, near Bellingham, Wash., where the passengers were transferred to the Alameda last night. Maud Island is 230 miles and Waldron Island 100 miles north of Seattle.

Officers of the Aleutian apparently feared to venture across the treacherous Straits of Juan De Fuca with passengers aboard. Escorted by the Alameda after the transfer of passengers, the Aleutian will proceed to Seattle on a favorable tide late last night.

Both ships are owned by the Alaska Steamship company. Another company liner, the Northwestern, last year was badly damaged in Seymour Narrows where she grounded in a dense fog.

The Aleutian will be drydocked here for a survey fender hull.

PACT UNITES BELGIUM AND FRANCE FOR ONE DEFENSE AGAINST WAR BY HUNS

(By Associated Press)

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Feb. 25.—Publication of alleged provisions of a secret Franco-Belgian military treaty excited considerable discussion in Holland today.

According to Utrecht Bagblad, leading provincial paper, the convention came into its hands by "for tuitous circumstances."

Publication was withheld until satisfactory guarantees of its authenticity were secured. The treaty was negotiated in 1920 at Brussels, the paper says.

By the terms of the treaty the two countries would make common cause in the event either is at war with Germany or any power allied by Germany, each placing all its available forces at the disposal of the other.

Mobilization shall be instantaneous and spontaneous with prior consultation immediately after a cause for invoking the treaty has been established. Acts of aggression are not confined to the Rhine frontier but apply to any front.

Belgium is set a minimum of 600,000 men for mobilization, while France's minimum is placed at 1,200,000 men. One article provides that each shall undertake simultaneously a vigorous offensive, compelling Germany to fight at once both north and south of the common front.

The duration of the agreement is set at 25 years, each contracting party being entitled to abrogate it with one year's notice.
