WASHINGTON, April 22.—Despite the strong protest by President Hoover, the senate agriculture committee today sent to the floor a bill providing for the use of export debenture certificates in procuring foreign supplies. A few days after the President's letter denouncing the bill, the committee reported it. The bill would allow the government to issue debentures to purchase foreign goods, which would then be sold to American farmers at a profit. The President's action was seen as a direct challenge to the committee's authority.

Governor Moody Submits Five Major Subjects For Special Session Work

Abolition Of Death Penalty In Texas May Be Made

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, April 22.—Enlarging the field of subjects submitted to the state penitentiary, and simplification and reform of procedure in civil court cases, Governor Moody today turned the special session of the 41st legislature loose on five propositions.

In his proclamation for the extraordinary session he mentioned only civil service, penitentiary relocation and concentration, and laws carrying into effect the constitutional amendment voted last November reorganizing the state board of education.

May Abolish Death Penalty
There had been talk that the Governor would make it possible for passage of a law indirectly abolishing capital punishment in Texas. He had gone through harrowing experiences in the cases of condemned men whose relatives pleaded for clemency.

Prisoners' Rule Made
Under the plan, condemned prisoners would be placed in confinement and an attempt to escape would make it obligatory on the governor to issue a proclamation setting the man's date of execution within five days.

Mississippi River Threatening To Go Out Of Its Banks

Murky Waves Lapping Over Tops Of Levees At Various Points; Thousands Of Acres Flooded

(By Associated Press)
QUINCY, Ill., April 22.—The murky waves of the swollen Mississippi lapped the tops of levees in this region tonight as the river, choked with spring rains threatened to rise to record heights and flood additional thousands of acres. It is within a foot and a half of its highest mark in history, recorded in 1881. Rich farm lands for 100 miles along the river's edge to a distance of 10 miles on either side were in danger.

It was expected the crest of the flood would be reached some time tonight, for the river was stationary at Keokuk, Ia., all day. Once more Illinois National guardsmen patrolled the levees protecting the prosperous truck farms of the South Quincy district. Others watched the new Lima Lake district to the north.

Five hundred men were thrown out of work when the river forced factories along the water's edge to close down.

The water, which ran through the streets of Canton, Mo., was found to have come over the embankment of the Burlington railroad. A hundred and fifty families deserted their homes for higher ground.

A weak levee north of Canton received special attention. The Mississippi river at St. Louis was reported headed for a stage of 21.5 feet, or 18 inches over the flood level some time about Friday. This, however, it was said, merely would cover the levee and slow up railroad shipping and traffic.

Reports of men out of work because of high water also were received from Hannibal, Mo., where the stage was 21 feet, highest since 1903. A small leak appeared in the levee in the South Quincy Gardens district late today. Workmen were rushed to the scene to stop the leak. The South Quincy Gardens district is a new development in which is located many fine homes.

Brothers Is Named U.S. Marshal Here

Oscar Brothers, 2013 Main street and a former local grocer, was yesterday appointed as Deputy United States Marshal for the Lubbock division of the Northern District of Texas. Mr. Brothers has resided in Lubbock for the past five years and is a former Oklahoma peace officer.

According to Mr. Brothers he will be active in the enforcement of law over the 17 counties of the Lubbock division. He moved here from Cooke county, where for a number of years he headed the republican county organization.

Citizens To Vote Today On Issuance Of Airport Bonds

Balloting Will Determine Whether Lubbock Is To Have Airport Or Not; \$75,000 Project Planned

Whether or not bonds of \$75,000 shall be issued by the city of Lubbock for the creation of a modern municipal airport, will be determined by means of the ballot today. Voting will begin at 8 o'clock this morning and cease at 7 this evening, at the one polling place to be open, downstairs in the city hall. Those eligible to vote in this election include every resident of the city, possessing a poll tax, who is a qualified taxpayer.

Judges of the election will be W. E. Bailey, P. C. McCoy and J. T. "G. With a light vote anticipated, results will probably be known within an hour or so after the polls close.

Improvement In Baking Is Cause

How to Achieve Beauty

Beautiful hands are the distinctive mark of the gentlewoman. Breeding, character and taste are expressed in them—and every woman who cares about the finer aspects of beauty, is particular about the appearance of her hands.

One rite which most women are faithful about performing is the weekly manicure. And those who find it inconvenient to go to a manicure shop regularly may easily care for their nails at home, themselves.

Given proper materials and a little experience in using them, the manicure is not at all the difficult proceeding that it may seem.

You should have a flexible steel nail file, emery boards, an orange-wood stick, cotton, a pair of cuticle scissors, buffer, nail brush, cuticle cream or oil, polish and bleach.

Here is the technique of the home manicure—a very simple one.

First file and shape the nails, going from the corners to the center. In shape they should follow the tips of the fingers unless the fingers are blunt, when it is better to point them conservatively.

Now hold one hand in a bowl of warm soapy water for a few minutes until the cuticle is softened. Then, after drying the hand, take the orange-wood stick, cover the tip with cotton and go over the nails, pushing back the cuticle firmly. Some women prefer to use a liquid cuticle remover on the cotton to hasten the process of removing the cuticle.

If the nails or cuticle are stained, the bleaching solution may be used at this point to whiten them. Dip the orange stick into peroxide or lemon juice or a special solution made of two teaspoonfuls of peroxide, one tablespoonful of rose water and four drops of tincture of benzoin—and gently clean the nails.

Next, with the cuticle bleached and pressed back, take the little scissors and clip off any hang-nails or loose bits of skin. Do not use the scissors to cut the cuticle—cutting toughens the skin, causes hang-nails and other troubles. Pushing back the cuticle with the orange stick, or with the towel each time after washing, is much better method of revealing the little half-moons at the base of the nail and of keeping the cuticle delicately rounded.

As you finish each nail, rub some of the cuticle cream or oil around it. After all are finished, wash the

Texas Tech won its third consecutive dual track and field meet of the season at college field Monday afternoon, tangling up with the Simmons University Cowboys in the hottest battle of speed and brawn waged here in many moons. With the outcome of the dual affair hanging on the mile relay, the scarlet quartet walked away with the four-point event to pile up 61 1-2 points as compared to 55 1-2 for the visitors.

The Cowboy aggregation, matching closely the strength of the Matadors in all events, gave the Paymenen their closest call of the current season. It was a nip and tuck scramble for points from the first back to the finish of the mile relay that decided the meet. The points stood 56 1-2 to 55 1-2 for Tech when the two relay teams lined up for the baton passing event. Tech runners lead throughout the race and the meet was won.

Lead Alternates.
Points were at a premium as the two evenly-matched teams alternated with the lead. Tech took an early lead in the 100-yard dash and mile run, but Simmons came back with a first and second place in the shot and discus. From there on out, the lead was seldom more than one point for either team.

Not only was the race for points a close struggle but three events ended in a tie between the opposing schools. Two running events ended in a dead heat. Tadlock of Tech and Bounds of Simmons broke the tape at the same instant in the 220 yard hurdles. A final jump by the Matador hurdler brought him ahead of the Cowboy star.

Tie In 880.
Hill of Tech and Weatherly of Simmons furnished one of the thrills of the meet in their brilliant 880 race which also ended in a tie. Hill held the field up until the last 100 yards when Weatherly passed him and came up on Hill, putting on a burst of speed at the finish to fall forward across the tape with Hill.

Johnny Gregg, the Simmons scoring ace and J. H. Tadlock, the Matador high point man, hooked up in a hot contest in the high jump. The two were the only survivors after passing the six foot mark and with Gregg setting the pace, the two athletes gave a brilliant exhibition of muscular co-ordination in clearing the bar. Tadlock stayed in the game until Gregg raised the pole to 6 feet, four inches and cleared it in the first leap.

Freeland Wins Two.
Freeland of Tech continued to set the pace in the distance races by taking first place in both the mile and two mile runs. In neither event was the Matador star closely pushed.

Gregg's first place in the high jump and second place in the discus, shot and high jump gave the Cowboy leader 14 points and individual scoring honors of the day. Tadlock's Tech was next with 13 1-2 points. Smith of Simmons was close behind with 13 James Dallas took two first places and ran one lap of the relay for a total of 11 1-2 points.

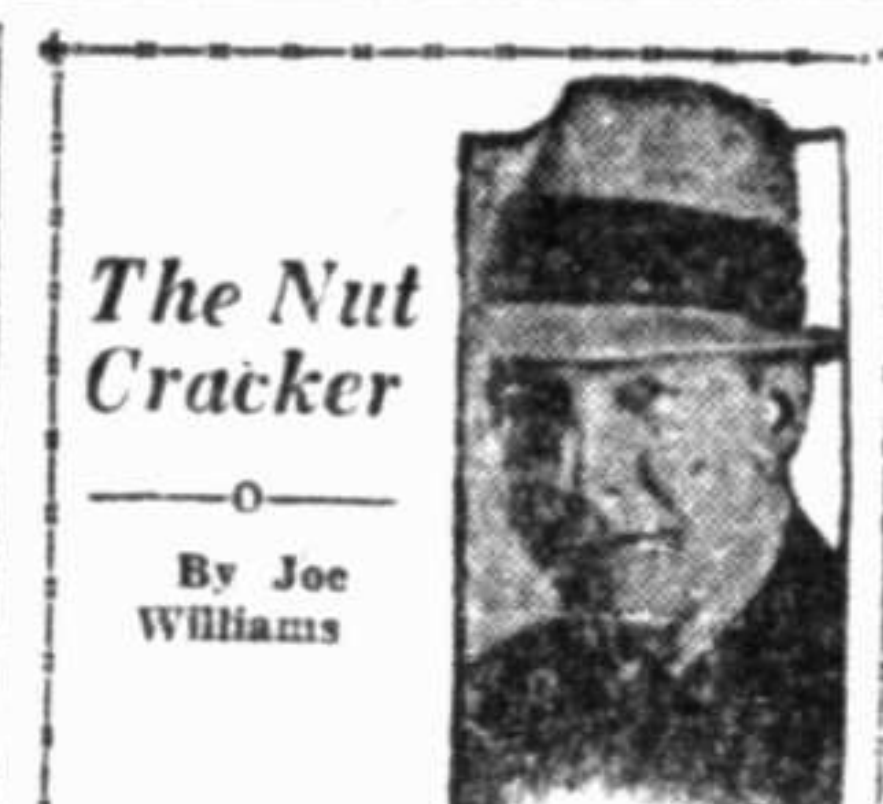

ASHINGTON, April 22.—The row over Mrs. Edward E. Gann's place in Washington society proved to be better worth while than most people think for.

Some folks are under the impression that Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson dodged the question put up to him by the capital's diplomatic corps. He did not. He settled it.

The United States does not run a three-to-four-billion-dollar-a-year government to decide on anybody's seat at the dinner table. Secretary Stimson made that mighty clear. Now the diplomats know it.

The diplomatic corps' colossal impudence in trying to play horse, as it did, with the state department seems rather to have been overlooked in the flurry of amusement over the incident's character.

Social precedence really counts at old world courts; here, needless to say, not a bit, except among a few very silly Americans.

Nobody knows this better than the foreign representatives, who simply were bursting with laughter when they met to consider the status of Vice President Curtis' sister at diplomatic functions.

To his credit, Sir Esme Howard, British ambassador and dean of the corps, had the good breeding to urge his brethren to solve the Gann problem on their own account, without making it a state department issue.

The rest of the corps promptly voted him down, however.

As expressed at the meeting, the diplomats did not propose to help the state department to "pull its chestnuts out of the fire."

Pretty nearly in so many words—as must be seen by anyone who will take the trouble to analyze the Aesop's fable of the sultan, the cat and the chestnuts—it was their opinion that Uncle Sam was making a monkey of himself, and their idea of diplomatic courtesy was to let him go the limit.

In Secretary Kellogg's day the diplomats undoubtedly would have put this program through. Indeed, Secretary Kellogg's handling of the Gann case was responsible for the situation in which the corps anticipated so much entertainment from the expected unhappy wrangling of Secretary Stimson.

Accustomed to the soft-boiled Secretary Kellogg, the corps had not reckoned with his 20-minute successor, the present incumbent.

If the average American, instead of a foreign envoy, were to call on as busy an official as Secretary Stimson and use up two hours of his time in an effort to make him answer an equally idiotic question, the bouncer inevitably would throw him downstairs or out through the window.

The diplomats' spokesman did not encounter quite such unceremonious treatment.

But to the query, intended to be a poser, "No more fooling, where do we seat Mrs. Gann at table?" short and sharp came back the rejoinder:

"Decide that for yourselves. What do I care?"

The language was much more diplomatic than that, to be sure—both question and answer.

Nevertheless, the latter's substance was: "The state department has a good deal more important things to worry over than social cross-word puzzles."

It not only ended the matter insofar as the government was concerned, but it also worked out satisfactorily for Mrs. Gann. The diplomats met again in hot haste and decided that she takes precedence over everybody but Mrs. Hoover. The very next evening, both a Chilean Ambassador Carlos Davila, in person, escorted her into dinner—the guest of honor—at a blowout he was giving. Only a few more hours previously the same Don Carlos had been half crazy to decide what seat she was entitled to. It took him no time at all to make up his mind, left to his own ingenuity.

Your Health

YES, SOME RHEUMATIC SUFFERERS CAN PREDICT RAIN ALL RIGHT.

Some people believe that an old woman with rheumatism can invariably predict when it is going to rain. This idea is one of the beliefs that seem to have some basis in fact.

People who have had painful joints or injuries to the bones or joints early in life claim in many instances that they can predict a change in the weather by the appearance of pains in these tissues. Almost every neighborhood has somebody who feels that he has this special power.

From time to time the idea has been laughed away as being purely a notion. More recently very careful investigations have been made in several large clinics. These investigations have been made under controlled conditions.

Old people with rheumatism who thought they had the power have been compared with people with rheumatism who made no assertion relative to this ability. At the same time attention has been paid to the state of the barometer, the temperature, the average rainfall, and all of the other meteorologic phenomena that are investigated in the modern weather bureau.

The results thus far seem to bear out the contention that these weather conditions have a definite influence on the sick and that there are some changes in the blood and in the tissues which occur regularly associated with rising and falling of the humidity or barometric pressure.

Studies of the blood made in laboratories show definite changes in the nature of the blood under such circumstances.

It has been mentioned that many of the ideas regarding the human body that have persisted for thousands of years have a definite basis in long continued observation.

Apparently the old lady can tell a change in the weather by the pain in her joints, but she is not quite as certain as the weather bureau. Not infrequently when the weather man says "fair and warmer" he takes his rubbers and umbrella when he goes out for a walk.

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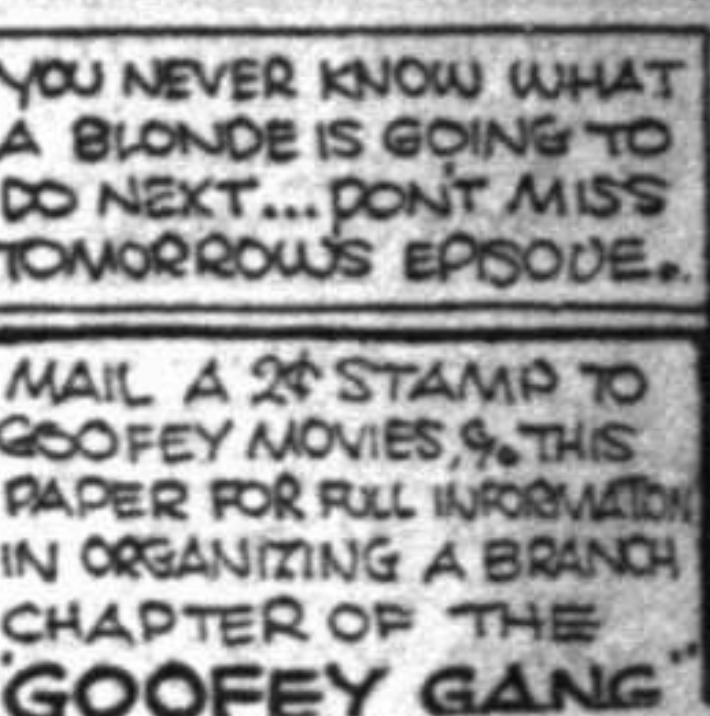

Gibson Presents American Thesis To Armament Meet

American Ambassador Appeals For Fresh Examination of Entire Problem; U. S. Ready On Solution

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, Apr. 22.—Hugh S. Gibson, American ambassador to Belgium, presenting an eagerly awaited American thesis before the preparatory disarmament commission today, appealed for a fresh examination of the entire problem based on the idea that all nations are going to be friends and settle their difficulties by peaceful means.

Through Mr. Gibson's address, President Hoover is generally deemed in Geneva to have launched an important move to place the relations between the United States and Great Britain on a firm foundation of collaboration and friendliness.

U. S. Ready
Mr. Gibson's declaration of American policy, in brief, was a statement to the world that the United States was ready to make substantial reductions in naval strength and sought a common sense naval agreement, based on the idea that nations are going to be friends.

The United States, Mr. Gibson explained, had found no reason for modifying its view that the simplest, fairest and most practical method is that of limitation by tonnage of categories. At the same time he announced that in the hope of facilitating a general agreement as to naval armaments, the American government was disposed to accept the French proposal whereby a total tonnage would be assigned to each nation and this total divided among categories of ships by specified tonnages as a basis of discussion.

Assures Great Britain
By today's appeal President Hoover was felt here to have assured Great Britain, through Mr. Gibson, that the United States attaches more importance to friendships with Britain than to any possible American naval supremacy. It was no exaggeration to say the American declaration profoundly affected international life as reflected in the preparatory disarmament conference.

Lord Cusheuden of Great Britain and the representatives of the three remaining big naval powers, Japan, France and Italy, all immediately hailed the spirit of Mr. Gibson's statement and expressed the conviction that it held out high hopes for settlement of the naval problem.

CAMPAIGN TO END
Approximately 20,000 Acres Terraced In County

The county-wide terracing campaign, started March 1, will come to a close this week. County Agent D. F. Eaton announced yesterday. To date there have been between 18,000 and 20,000 acres of land terraced, according to Mr. Eaton. John Patterson of Idaho, terracing expert, having been in charge of the work.

DRAFTS NEW MEASURE
Kemble To Introduce Bill Into House This Session

AUSTIN, Apr. 22.—P.—Modeled much after the fashion of systems used in larger cities of the state, a civil service bill by Representative George Kemble of Fort Worth, Emmett Morse of Houston, and W. T. Williams of Austin, was drafted today for submission to the house as a step towards Governor Moody's announced plan of placing state employees on a merit basis.
