OCHILTREE TO BE T-B TESTED

DAIRY AND RANGE STOCK TO BE TESTED; COUNTY TO BE MODIFIED ACCREDITED

Ochiltree county will be included in the modified accredited area of the county. As soon as the work started by this week by the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture, is completed, five veterinarians from the county will be in Perryton, working on the project which will be completed within the next four weeks. Those in the party include Dr. M. A. Phillips, Amarillo; Dr. L. R. Noyles, Amarillo; Dr. C. P. Brady, and Dr. M. L. Purdy. The party is being under the supervision of Mr. Guy Porter, Amarillo, who is in charge of this district.

According to County Agent Guy R. Sheets, the actual testing is done at cost to the livestock owners. The owner is expected to do it to get up the cattle and to assist the veterinarians while they are working on their cattle. The test is being done on all dairy cows and all registered cattle, all bulls and ten per cent of the range herds. In case a dairy is found in a ten per cent group of a range herd, the herd is tested.

Keep in the modified accredited area will be necessary to test a range herd. The benefits derived from the establishing of a range herd are many. It will permit Ochiltree county stock raisers to sell their cattle or stock into any part of the county. Many states east and in the corn belt will permit stock to enter that does not come from accredited areas. Daniel M. Purdy who has been sent to Perryton for some time to remain here after the work is completed to look after details of this tuberculosis eradication work. INCOMPLETE RETURNS GIVES JOHNSON SLIGHT LEAD IN REPRESENTATIVE VOTE

Rogers, Ochiltree county candidate a close second, trailing by only 342 out of 10,918 votes accounted for. A possible vote of 176 is still unreported.

ALLOW DIVIDED TAX PAYMENTS

DELINQUENT CITY TAXES MAY BE PAID IN AMOUNTS AS SMALL AS 35 PER CENT NOW

According to recent action taken by the city council, delinquent city taxes may now be paid in amounts as small as twenty-five per cent, without any penalties and costs except interest at the rate of six per cent from the time taxes became delinquent.

This action will permit delinquent taxpayers to pay one-fourth of their taxes each month until they are paid up thus giving them the benefit of an extension of time without penalty.

City taxpayers should appreciate this offer and make an effort to pay up their taxes, taking advantage of the split payment provision.

13TH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

PERRYTON WILL BE HOST AT FREE BIRTHDAY PARTY ON MONDAY, AUGUST 22

One of the biggest days in the history of Perryton will be observed here Monday, August 22, at which time the city will observe its thirteenth birthday, and will be host to the entire Panhandle at the big free celebration.

According to the present schedule of events, the days program will open at five minutes after midnight, Monday morning and will continue for a solid twenty-four hours, opening and closing with a dance at Donley's hall, sponsored by the American Legion. The Blue Jackets, seven-piece orchestra from Liberal, Kans., have been secured for these two dances. These are the only events of the day at which an admission will be charged.

On the morning program will be a big list of races and contests for the boys and girls, a total of twenty-five dollars in cash prizes being awarded to the winners. A band concert by the Perryton band has been arranged for the noon hour.

Promptly at 1:30 o'clock will be the horse races, admission to which is free. Three splendid races have been arranged for this event for which suitable cash prizes are being offered. The race track is being prepared on the grounds north of the tracks, just east of the ball park, which has been leased for the day. Starting at 3:30, a free ball game has been scheduled between Beaver and Perryton. A purse of fifty dollars has been put up for this event and the two teams who are already bitter rivals for supremacy of the diamond, are going to fight hard for this prize.

Following the ball game, the crowd will have an opportunity of seeing a different kind of race, a terrapin race, to be staged by the American Legion on Main street. Entrance fees will be charged and terrapins will be supplied anyone wishing to take part in this event. No charge will be made for spectators.

During the evening hour, a band concert on Main street will be provided followed by a big free boxing exhibition from the band stand. Several good bouts have already been arranged and others will be listed within the next week. This event will close the days program with the exception of the final dance at Donley's hall.

The entire days celebration is being financed out of the budget of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce. Jack Allen is chairman of the celebration committee and states that all of his committees are hard at work on their various projects and everything will be in readiness on the morning of August 22.

County Agent Recommends Planting of Fall Gardens

EDITORS NOTE—The following article was prepared by County Agent G. R. Sheets, in which he gives some helpful hints in the planting of fall gardens.

The value of fall gardens, at this time, cannot be overestimated. As a factor in reducing the grocery bill and the necessity of obtaining that type of food needed by people at a season of the year when meat and bread comprise too large a portion of the daily ration, the fall garden is extremely important. Those who are fortunate enough to have facilities for watering a garden should lose no time in preparing to plant such vegetables that will be apt to mature before killing frosts. The uncertainty of date of killing frost, in this section, must be taken into consideration when planning the fall garden.

Below is a list of vegetables that may well be considered for the fall garden:

* Sensitive to heat and will not thrive under high temperature but will mature if killing frost is extra late.

The ground for fall garden should be free from all weeds and plants that are left from the summer garden. Plowing under this material at this time is bad practice, because it will prevent the moisture from rising to the upper soil surface, and the seed will not germinate. Then too, the unrotted plant materials seriously interfere with the cultivation of the young fall vegetables and the heat resulting from the turned under vegetation dries out the soil. All plants should be destroyed as soon as the crop is harvested. These plants serve to harbor insects and diseases if permitted to remain in the garden. This is true of all gardens, whether fall or summer.

The soil for the fall garden should be plowed shallow to a depth of four or five inches, or thoroughly disked. Immediately following the breaking of the soil it should be harrowed and the seed bed made as firm as possible to re-establish capillary attraction of the soil particles and bring the moisture, if possible, to one and a half to two inches of the surface.

It is advisable to plant about one-fourth more seed for the fall garden than for the spring garden. The germination of the seed at this season is poor, consequently the extra quantity of seed will ordinarily be necessary to secure a good stand.

H. J. R. No. 1. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit: First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and lunatics. Third: All paupers supported by any county.

Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislatures may make.

Fifth: All soldiers, marines and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserves, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps.

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps.

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, or an officer of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States; or retired officer of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election, General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

S. J. R. No. 28. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

"Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932. (A correct copy.)

H. J. R. No. 24. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 1 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property

for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which the taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis:

(1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) per cent of the aggregate total.

(2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding fifty (50%) per cent of the aggregate total."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932. (A correct copy.)

H. J. R. No. 12. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so-as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extend, or to authorize the releasing or extending, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the General Election in 1932. (A correct copy.)

H. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political subdivision of the State or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, or in any political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

H. J. R. No. 6. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Article VIII.—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes; nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

H. J. R. No. 5. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, and other improvements, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such works and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932. (A correct copy.)

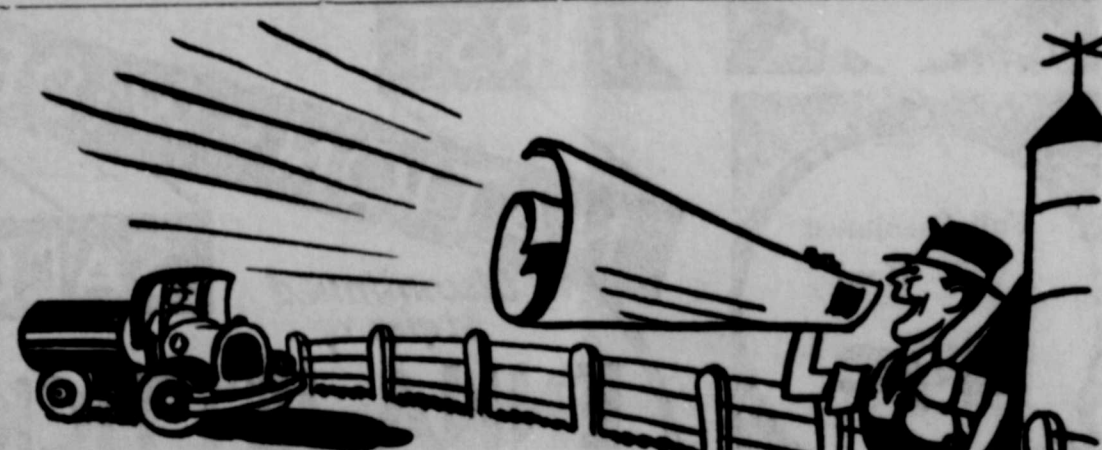

Christians Outside The Church

In a well-kept orchard the trees are pruned and cultivated. The weeds are kept down. A fence protects the trees from being bruised or trampled down. Regular spraying keeps out destructive insects. The trees flourish. They have a goodly shape, nice green leaves, and a healthy bark. And when harvest comes around, you should see the fruit. The branches bend low with the weight of large, luscious apples or golden-cheeked peaches.

Just outside the orchard stands another apple tree. Many of its limbs are broken. Its leaves are turning yellow. The bark is scuffed up. And fruit? Yes, there is a little, a few small, knotty apples on the top limbs. It is an apple tree, but a very poor one, because it is outside the orchard.

Likewise, it is possible under certain conditions to be a Christian 'outside the church. But on the outside you do not have the care of a spiritual care-taker, the minister who wards off dangers and keeps obnoxious weeds from growing up in your heart. He nourishes your faith by the Gospel until it brings forth much fruit. A Christian outside the church is usually so scarred up and broken-limbed and has such knotty fruit that you can hardly recognize him as one of God's trees.

Yes, it is possible to be a Christian and not be a member of a Christian congregation, but only under certain conditions. Either there is no church to be found which preaches the Word of God purely, or faith is so weak that it does not truly express itself. Christ instituted the church; He founded the local congregation. Is it not differing with Christ to ignore the church? The apostles gathered their converts into churches. Early Christians thought of salvation only through held confession of Christ by joining a congregation.

Hence, a normal Christian believes in Christ as his Savior from sin and out of love for Christ perpetuates the Gospel through church membership. Remember: not all church goers are Christians, but all true, normal Christians are church goers.

S. J. R. No. 25
PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 41st Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands

and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made or hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of

Texas, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided that the one-tenth of the alternate Sections of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858,

entitled, "An Act to establish the University of Texas," shall not be included in, or constitute a part of, the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

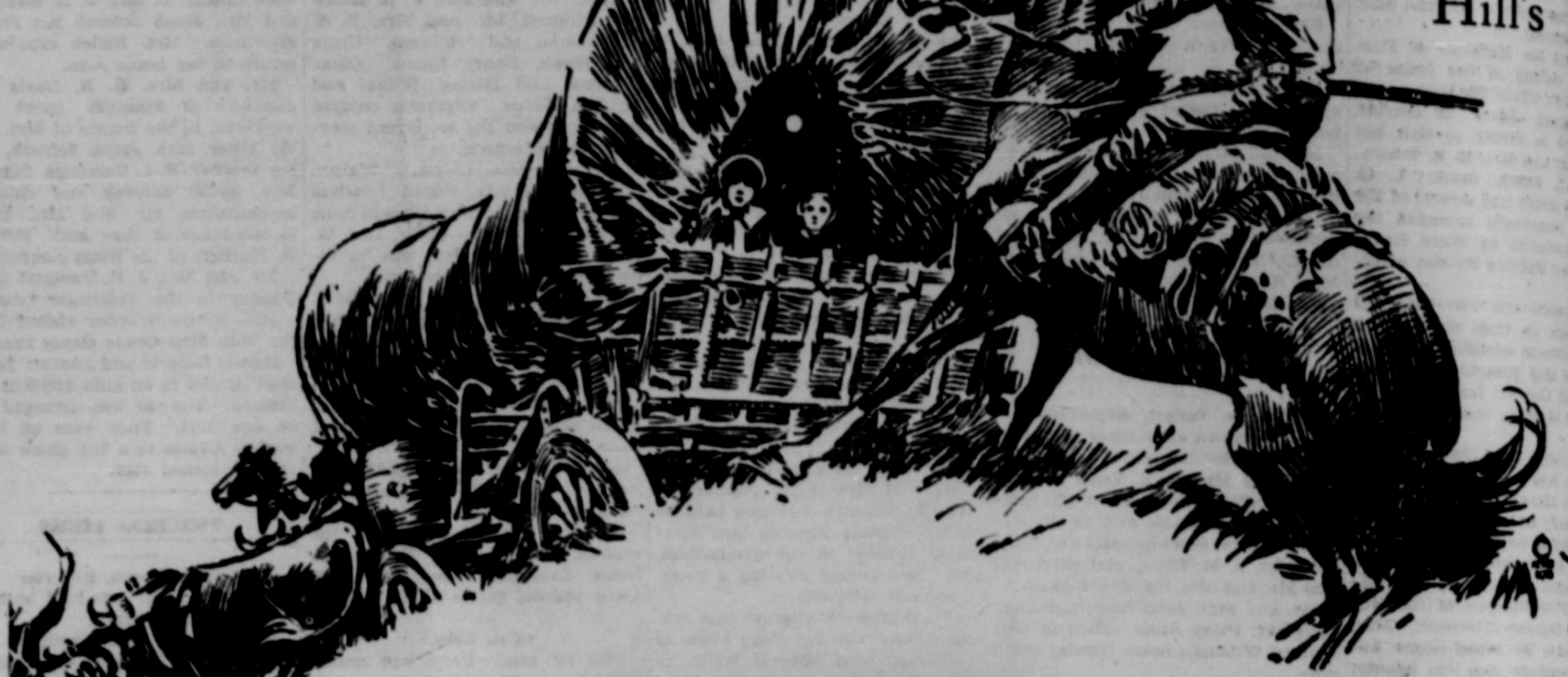

Your Teeth

Their Relation To Your General Health

By the Educational Committee of the American Dental Association

ELIMINATING DENTAL BILLS

A wise man never runs to see his dentist. His teeth are never in such a condition that the pain makes him run. Wisdom in dental health is knowing the value of preventative measures.

There is nothing involved about preventative dental hygiene. It is simplicity itself. It can be summed up and symbolized by three words: cleanliness, care and diet.

Cleanliness means that teeth should be brushed carefully and regularly. Ideally, this should be done after every meal and before going to bed at night. At the very least, teeth should have a good cleaning once daily. Care means that you should watch your teeth for signs of decay, and give them prompt attention.

Diet is considered by modern authorities as one of the most important factors in dental health. Some put it ahead of cleanliness and care.

"The greatest menace to our teeth at this time," says Dr. P. G. Puterbaugh of Chicago, "is the fact that most of us eat merely to satisfy the caprices of our appetites and not with any definite plan in our choice of foods. A little intelligent effort in the selection and proper chewing of food would do much toward the making of sturdy bodies."

Sturdy teeth are equally dependent on wholesome food. Regardless of how thoroughly they are cleaned and cared for, teeth will decay if they do not get proper nourishment, best obtained from an abundance of milk, fresh fruits and vegetables, especially of the leafy variety.

Two of the three things that go to make up a good preventive hygiene program can be carried out by the individual. Cleanliness and following a wholesome diet depend on you, not your dentist. All that the dentist does is check over your hygiene program at regular intervals, and eliminate decay before it makes serious inroads. But the dentist's job will be a comparatively minor one if you do your job well and consistently.

With less than five-eighths of the votes in my race accounted for, my plurality is 42,392. If the ratio continues, my plurality will be about 70,000 votes over my next highest opponent. I will make an active and vigorous campaign in the second primary, and shall deeply appreciate the active support of everyone interested in my re-nomination.

H. J. R. No. 21 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

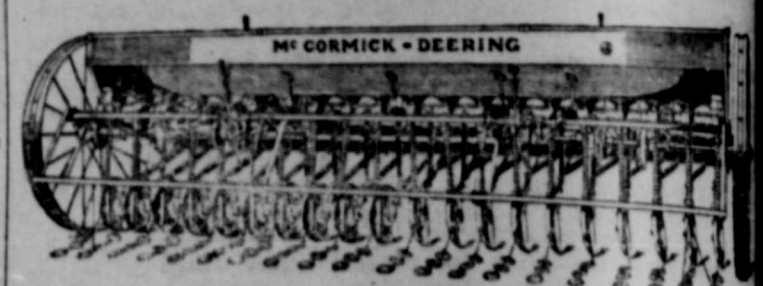
Sec. 2. That Section 16 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes for counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the last preceding general election, to hold office for (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.
