FARMERS NEGLECTING PROFITABLE SIDE LINES

Many of Curry County's most progressive farmers are of the opinion that some of their co-workers on the farm, are leaving undeveloped a great field that will provide real money the whole year round. The News has compiled some figures the past week with reference to actual money, that the poultry industry alone has helped some of our most progressive farmers over the "hard spots" that we have all been obliged to travel during these days of tight money, etc.

Four Clovis produce houses shipped during the first four months of 1922, eggs to the value of \$39,226.51 and \$13,665.69 worth of live chickens. The above figures do not include eggs and chickens that are sold locally by the merchants, and it is well known that many of the farmers take their eggs, butter, etc. to their merchants and exchange them for goods that they need at home. One Clovis groceryman recently remarked, "Our substantial farmer customers, the ones who diversify their time on the farm, seldom pay us actual money for their groceries. In fact, we owe them most of the time. They bring their eggs and other little year-round products to us and exchange them for whatever they need in our line."

During the months of November and December local produce houses shipped out of Clovis several cars of turkeys that had a cash value of more than \$20,000. Local consumption of turkeys would amount to a neat little figure. So it can be readily seen that there is good possibilities in the turkey line.

A careful survey covering the volume and value of poultry and eggs shipped from Beckham County, Oklahoma, in 1921 recently published, disclosed the fact that the sum total realized from such shipments amounted to \$857,200. The shipments included 117 car loads of chickens averaging 18,000 lbs. per car, 113 car loads of eggs, 400 cases to the car and eighteen car loads of turkeys, 18,000 pounds to the car.

Beckham County, Okla., is much smaller than Curry County, and it does not contain as great a population in numbers. The climatic conditions are not favorable for growing any kind of grain crop except the sorghum grains such as milo and kafir. It was necessary to feed these grains at home or ship it away for consumption elsewhere.

According to experts, it requires six pounds of grain, with other available farm products, to produce one pound of chicken meat. The market value of these grains in Curry County the past twelve months has not averaged 1c per pound, making the six pounds of grain worth about five cents delivered at the shipping point. It will thus be seen that the Curry County farmers who have fed their grain this year and produced chicken meat, have received an average of eighteen cents per pound for each pound of chicken meat marketed. In other words, they received almost four times as much for their grain for the six pounds of grain would have brought about five cents when delivered, but by feeding it at home to chickens, they received eighteen cents for each pound of chicken meat produced, and this does not take into consideration the revenue from the sale of eggs.—Clovis (N. M.) News.

Those from Liberal were Lee Larrabee, Ralph Summers and Secretary King of the Liberal Chamber of Commerce. They were accompanied by J. E. Bute of Stratton, Nebraska. Mr. Bute is Secretary-Manager of this big national highway which is now being marked and logged from the Canadian border as far north as Perryton. This highway will eventually be continued on south to the Gulf and will in all probability parallel the D.C.D. from this point to the gulf.

AGED NEGRO BURIED AT CANADIAN

Forty cars were at the cemetery last Friday to lay the remains of old "Topsy" Clark away in their earthly resting place. The pall bearers were N. P. Willis, J. M. Shaw, J. L. Jennings, H. E. Hoover, W. R. Hext and Sam Isaacs. The Rev. E. D. Morgan preached a simple funeral service at the grave.

"Topsy" Clark was a Baptist preacher before he entered the army, but did not preach any more after receiving his discharge.

This funeral, composed entirely of white folks, might seem to some to be unusual, but it was a simple tribute to the life of a negro who lived for forty years entirely among white folks and segregated from from his own race. It was also a tribute to a pioneer who came here with the first prospectors and remained to see the country develop into the best section under sun. "Topsy" had at some time worked for almost every old timer at his funeral and had rendered good service. He had braved every danger, endured every hardship, answered every demand for his services and acquitted himself with honor.

Other funeral corteges have been more pretensions. The deceased often occupied prominent places in the social, financial and industrial world, and the color of the skin was fairest white. But no whiter soul nor more respected Ethiopian ever went to a grave with the sincere sorrow of the white folks than did Topsy Clark. His was a character rarely found among the negroes today, and for a life well spent on earth, for the services given his employers and friends, all can unite in saying: "Peace to his ashes." He was a great friend of the children.

can afford it they will build a house,

spirit at least, pioneers. The own-
ers are thrifty, independent, unfet-
tered by conventions, not chained by
appearances, willing to put up with
a few hardships while young and
getting a start, in order that later
on they may have something worth
while. Looking into the immediate

and a flivver. They work hard, be-

kind of a program. After eight

NOW TAKING ENLISTMENTS FOR NAVY

First enlistments in the U. S. Navy have been authorized by the Navy Department in the rating of Apprentice Seaman only. All enlistments will be for four years, minimum age for first enlistment will be 18 years. Men on first enlistment will be sent to the Naval Training Station, San Francisco, California, for training.

Men, except those under continuous service, who are married or have dependents will not be enlisted unless it is clearly shown that they will not request to be discharged on account of such dependency during their four year enlistment.

Ex-Navy men and ex-members of the Naval Reserve Force who were discharged with honorable or good discharges will be eligible for enlistment. Men who received special order, under age or inaptitude discharges must obtain special authority from the Bureau of Navigation, Navy Department, Washington, D. C., before they can be reenlisted.

Reenlistments in the following ratings only are authorized: Torpedomen, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd class; Signalmen, 1st, 2nd and 3rd class; Seaman, 1st and 2nd class; Apprentice Seaman; Radiomen, 1st and 3rd class; Carpenter's Mates, 1st, 2nd and 3rd class; Shipfitters, 1st, 2nd and 3rd class; Patternmakers, 1st and 2nd class; Painters, 1st, 2nd and 3rd class; Blacksmith 2nd class; Boilermakers, 1st and 2nd class; Coppermiths, 1st and 2nd class; Moulders 1st and 2nd class; Yeomen, 1st 2nd and 3rd class; Storekeepers, 1st 2nd and 3rd class; Aviation Metalsmiths 1st, 2nd and 3rd class; Aviation Carpenter's mates, 1st, 2nd and 3rd class.

Reenlisted men will be sent to the Receiving ship Charleston, S. C. SIREN VOICE OF THE CITY

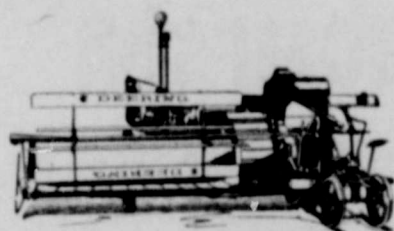

LIVE STOCK FACTS

OAK LEAF POISONING DANGER

Most Fatal Cases Occur in Spring When There is a Scarcity of Green Forage.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Oak leaves, if eaten continuously by cattle, produce a sickness which frequently proves fatal. Investigations conducted by specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture show. Most oak-leaf poisoning, the specialists say, occurs in the spring, for at that time there is a scarcity of green forage on many ranges and the craving which stock have for green

food leads them to eat the leaves in excessive amounts. In order to cause sickness, however, oak leaves must be eaten almost exclusively. If eaten with other feed, the animals are not injured. It has been found experimentally that as small a quantity as 3 pounds daily of alfalfa hay fed in connection with oak leaves prevented poisoning.

Observations on the range and experimental feeding both show that some cattle may eat oak leaves for a long time with no definite bad effects, and some will even eat them exclusively, with no harm. Generally speaking, those that are injured show the results only after eating a considerable quantity through a rather prolonged period, usually from 10 to 35 days. The specialists point out that the oaks on many ranges furnish a most important element in summer feed when additional sources of forage are available, but they urge that care be exercised during the spring that cattle be not admitted to summer range at too early a date, for oak leaves are well advanced before the appearance of the grasses.

GOAT MEAT QUITE SUPERIOR

Most of Product Reaches Market as Mutton and Is Distinguished by Sweetness.

Goat meat is seldom found on the market as such, yet the average number of goats slaughtered each year from 1916 to 1920, inclusive, was 141,487. It is probable that most of this meat reaches the consumer as mutton, which it resembles closely, as there are few cities that require it to be marketed under its own name. In cities and towns adjacent to the range country, however, Angora wethers are freely marketed as such and the meat is consumed without discrimination by the buyer. When received in large numbers these wethers usually sell at about 60 per cent of the price paid for sheep wethers.

The reduced price of goat meat is doubtless attractive to the consumer, whether he knows what he is getting or thinks he is buying mutton. According to Farmers' Bulletin 1203, The Angora Goat, recently issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, goat meat is usually superior to mutton that can be bought at the same price. Some consumers say that they are able to distinguish it from lamb and mutton by a characteristic sweetness.

GIVE RAM RIGHT ATTENTION

During Breeding Season He Should Have Supply of Grain and Access to Good Pasture.

The ram needs grain for several weeks before and during the breeding season. At least a pound a day of equal parts of oats and bran should be fed, together with good quality alfalfa or clover hay. Do not keep him closely confined, but allow him access to pasture. Avoid heavy feeding of silage or roots during the breeding season.

Small Digestive Tract. The digestive tract of the calf is comparatively small, therefore frequent feedings of small amounts during the first month is imperative.

Cattle and Sheep on Clover. Cattle and sheep do well on clover pasture, but should not be turned in when hungry or while a dew is on.

Healthy Pigs on Clover. Pigs on clover are healthy, and have good bone and constitution—points of special importance in breeding stock.

GOOD THINGS FOR THE SEASON

Did you ever try breaded pork chops? Order the chops cut thicker than usual, cut out the bone and skewer and press into shape. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Put in a frying pan and sprinkle the top of each with

dried crumbs. Pour in boiling water to one-half the depth of the chops, cover closely and bake in a slow oven one and one-half hours. Remove cover, sprinkle with buttered bread crumbs and bake until the crumbs are brown. Arrange on a hot platter and garnish with celery tips. Serve with:

Tomato Celery Sauce.—Chop one onion, one green pepper and a large bunch of celery. Mix, add two and one-half cups of canned tomato from which the liquor has been drained, one and one-half teaspoons of salt, two tablespoons of all-spice berries and two-thirds of a cup of vinegar. Let simmer one and one-half hours.

Oatmeal Soup.—Soak over night one cup of oatmeal in two quarts of mutton broth or water; in the morning bring to a boil and place in a fireless cooker until time to prepare the soup. Cook one good-sized onion, butter until delicately browned; add four tablespoons of flour, two teaspoons of sugar, a dash of cayenne and pepper to season. Bring to a boil; add one cup of tomato pulp and serve hot. Strain before serving, or if for the children's luncheon, serve without straining.

Hot Chicken Salad.—Mix one pint of cooked chicken cut in cubes, one cup of cooked peas, one-half teaspoon of salt, one-fourth of a teaspoon of pepper, one tablespoon of onion juice, one pimiento and one teaspoon of lemon juice; set aside in a cool place for at least an hour. Make a sauce, using one-fourth of a cup of butter, the same of flour, half a teaspoon of salt, a cup of each of cream and chicken broth. Add the seasoned ingredients and let stand over hot water until ready to serve.

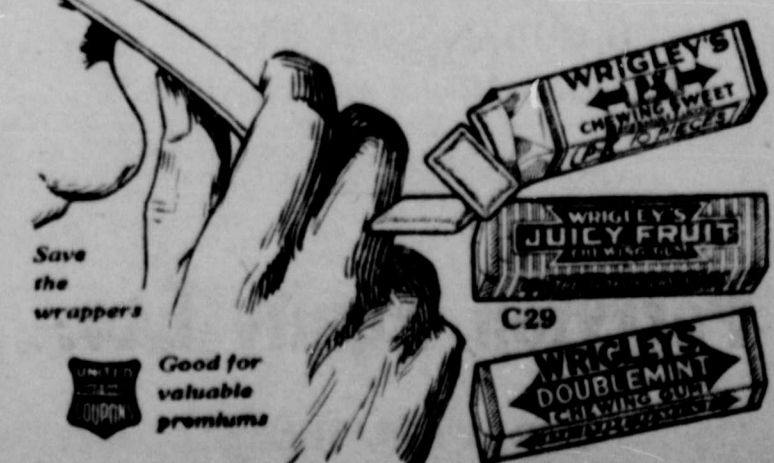

TRAINING CAMP FUNDS, NATIONAL DEFENSE ACT.

Applications for admission to the Citizens' Military Training Camp that will be held at Camp Travis this summer, are coming into Eight Corps Area Headquarters. These are not all due to official advice and newspaper encouragement, but partly to hard-working recruiting parties. Like good salesmen, they have gone on the road and taken many orders. Every reasoning, patriotic citizen agrees that the training camp scheme is excellent; but if thousands of these same patriotic citizens do not arrange to leave their usual work and devote some time to military instruction in the camps, the scheme will fail.

President Harding calls attention to the opportunity which the camps present to young men. He deems the physical and mental training received therein most valuable; that it will "increase their value to the Nation and to the communities in which they live." He has not limited his interest to a general statement; but has sent a telegram on the subject to every Governor, asking co-operation to render the Training Camp system a success.

This year it probably will be impracticable to carry out the plain intention of the National Defense Act, as Congress threatens to limit the related appropriation to such a comparatively inconsiderable sum that not more than 30,000 men can be instructed. At that rate it would take 60 years to train the available man-power as the authors of the measure contemplated. They believed that 100,000 should be trained the first few years and the number should be increased until at least 500,000 men of military age attained some knowledge of drill and discipline.

Adding these to the Regulars, National Guard and Organized Reserves, the Nation then could count on more than a million men to take the field with a semblance of preparedness. The National Defense Act contemplates that two million men shall be ready in event of foreign war, insuring victory in shortest practicable time and at smallest cost. We want no more such bills amounting to billions of dollars, as we are paying or owing now. The President's words are plain and strong, and should fill the camp quotas.—San Antonio Express.
