The footgear for the theater, as for the dinner party, is as light as the gown in tone. Sometimes two tones of crepe de chine are combined, recalling the effect of the ensemble of wrap and gown. These slippers or sandals, different for each different gown, are as carefully executed as jewels. Sometimes they are embroidered in fine colored beads or in small artificial pearls, and they recall to our minds the most lovely collections of the eighteenth century. Our epoch will mark a real evolution in the history of shoes. I am sure for it seems that each elegant Parisienne desires to contribute personally her quota to this branch of costume history. Her footgear is personal, original, individual, and she sternly prohibits her shoemaker from allowing any other client to wear her models. Ninety-Seven Building Projects On In City Now

Slogan Of Chamber Of Commerce Is Turned To Truth As Hub Of Plains Continues Dizzy Construction Pace

"Cities Do Not Happen—They Are Built" Shown To Be True As Lubbock's Permit Total Climbs

The slogan, "Cities do not happen—they are built" that was adopted seven years ago by the Lubbock chamber of commerce has long since been adopted by the citizenry of Lubbock, is exemplified by the building program in progress here now.

A total of 97 building jobs are being inspected at this time by Building Inspector D. J. Schlack. Building permits for these jobs total \$1,240,795.

Thus contractors, plumbers, bricklayers, laborers, business men, clerks who are building homes, housewives who are watching new homes go up and all other citizens of Lubbock are actively and financially engaged in carrying out the slogan, "Cities do not happen—they are built."

Pushing Big Cities

While Lubbock is one of the leading commercial centers of Texas it ranks under quite a number of larger cities in importance, size and wealth, however during all the days of 1929 Lubbock has been ranking fifth in building permits for the entire state of Texas, being surpassed only by Houston, San Antonio, Fort Worth and Dallas. Last year the city of Lubbock finished the entire year of 1928 ranking ninth for the state.

With a total of \$2,620,511 in building permits thus far this year, Lubbock has hung up a record for this city for so short a period. A number of other building projects have been announced which will assure the city of a continuance of this rapid building click for the remainder of 1929.

Others In Sight

Included in the building projects that are to be started in the next few months is a \$600,000 high school building, a contract for which will be let sometime in September. The Panhandle-South Plains fair is expected to launch a building program which will add to the building permits. Several other buildings of major size are to be announced soon.

Two hotel projects, a larger produce house, several apartment houses, with other buildings and over seventy-five residences are included in the building program that is now in progress.

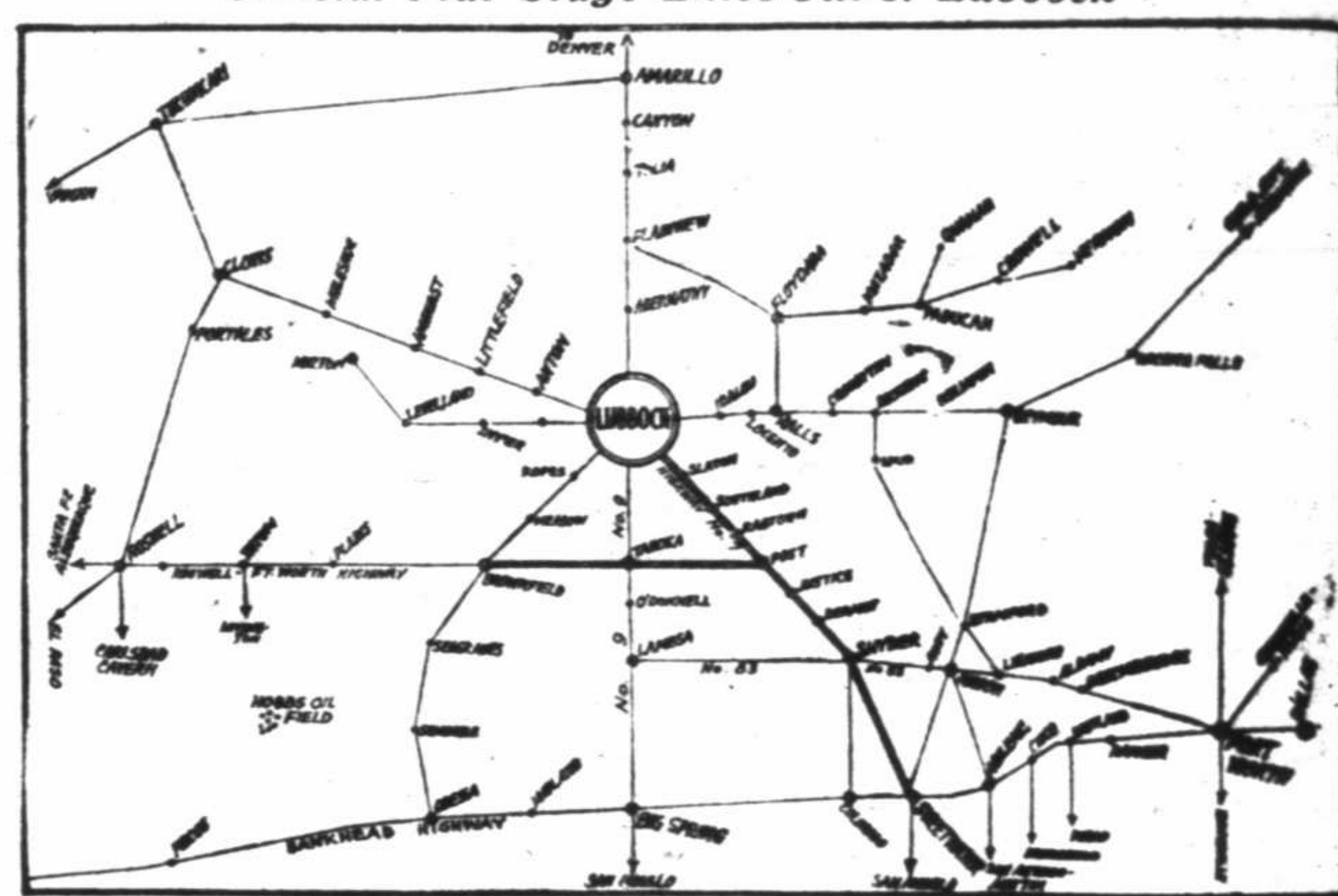

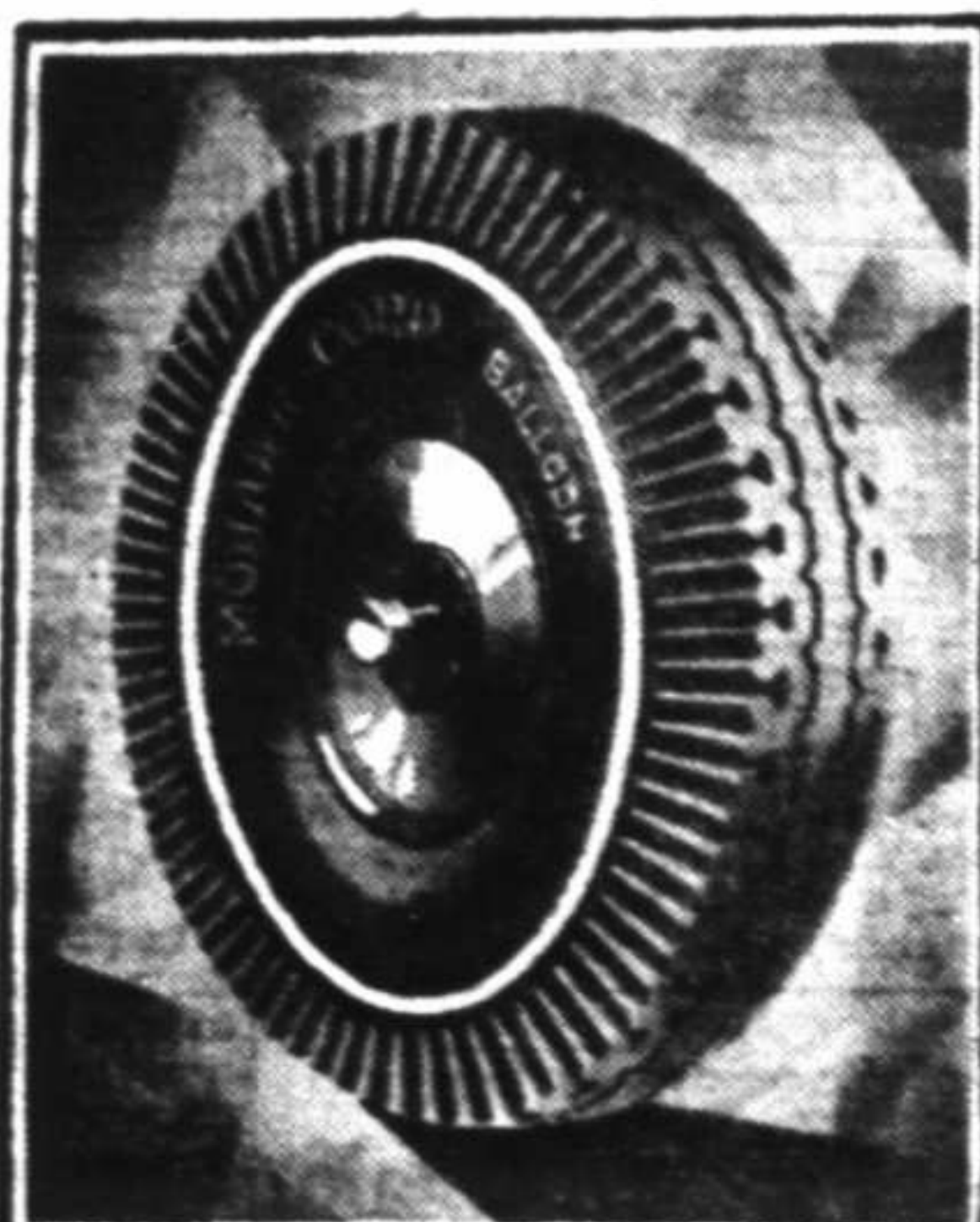

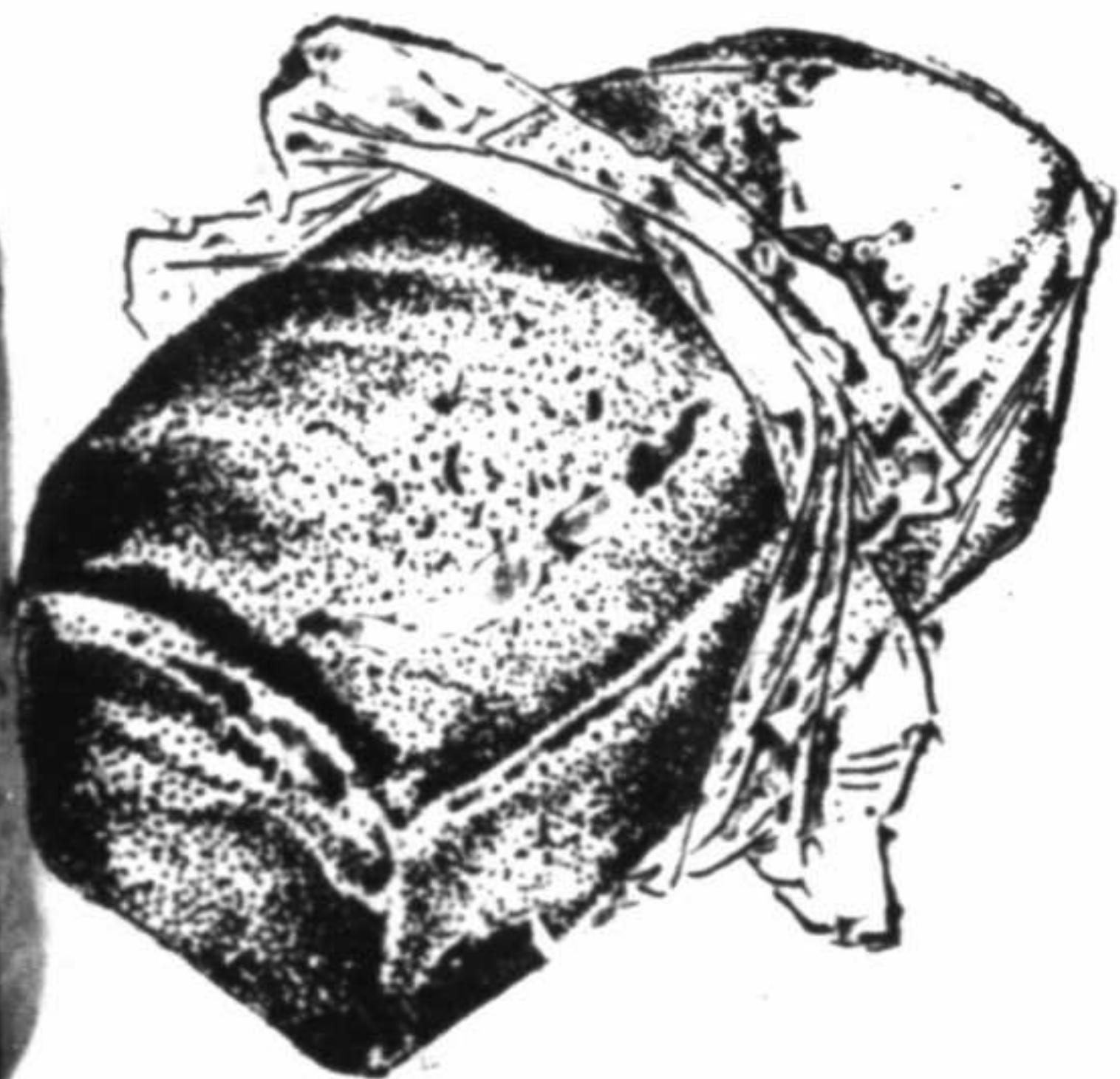

Aristide Briand Keeps Cabinet Of Poincare Intact As He Begins His Duties Of French Prime Minister

Veteran Statesman Reports To President After Plan To Strengthen Political Stand Fails

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, July 29.—Aristide Briand, France's new Premier, will retain intact the cabinet of his predecessor, Raymond Poincare, says that M. Briand will not be included in it. M. Briand will hold the post of Premier and the portfolio of Foreign Affairs, which was his in the Poincare cabinet.

The Premier called at the Elysee palace at noon and told President Doumergue his decision. The President concurred and then M. Briand called his cabinet meeting for 5:00 p. m. There was a possibility, since the cabinet was unchanged, that he would dispense with the formality of re-representing his ministers to the President.

Broadens His Support
Prior to announcing his decision to the President, Premier Briand had tried to broaden his political support with addition of some ministers without portfolio and possibly some under-secretaries of state, all of which posts would have gone to radical socialist members of the chamber.

The idea was rejected, however, today at a party council. It was understood the new Premier would have radical socialist support in the main pending problems of Foreign Affairs, such as negotiations with Germany and affairs of the League of Nations.

Herriot Is Blocked
Edouard Herriot, radical socialist mayor of Lyon, was quite willing to come into the cabinet without insisting on a portfolio but hardly had he expressed his willingness before his party disapproved the idea and he took the first train back to Lyons.

M. Briand appeared satisfied with the retention of his old cabinet, apparently realizing it was a makeshift solution at best and would

have to be shifted sooner or later to appease political appetites. His time before opening at the Hague of the conference on reparations, however, was too short to experiment further.

Left: Republican party—Andre Lefeu, minister of the interior; Georges Leygues, minister of marine.

Left: Republican Socialist and French Socialist party—Aristide Briand, Premier and Foreign Minister; Paul Painleve, Minister of Agriculture; Louis Armand, Minister of pensions; Pierre Poincare, Minister of public works and transport.

Left: Radicals—Louis Loucheur, Minister of labor; Laurent Eynac, Minister of aviation.

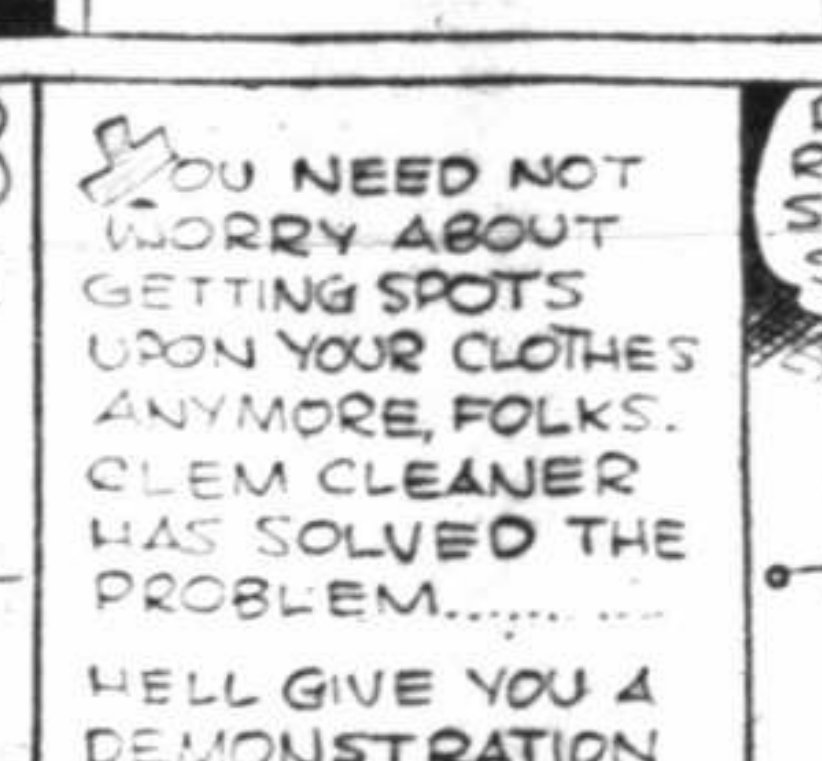
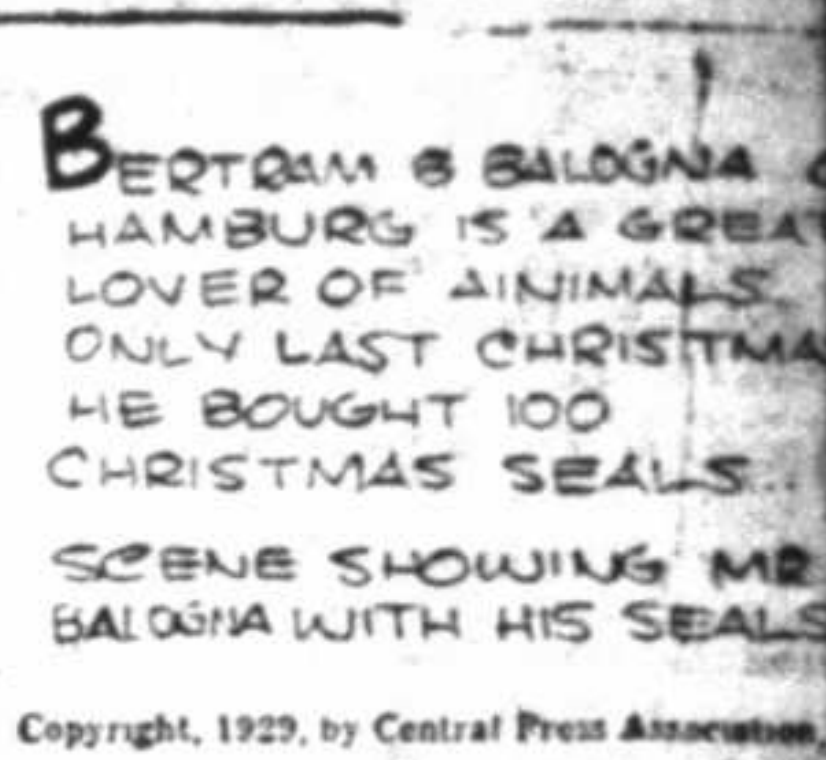
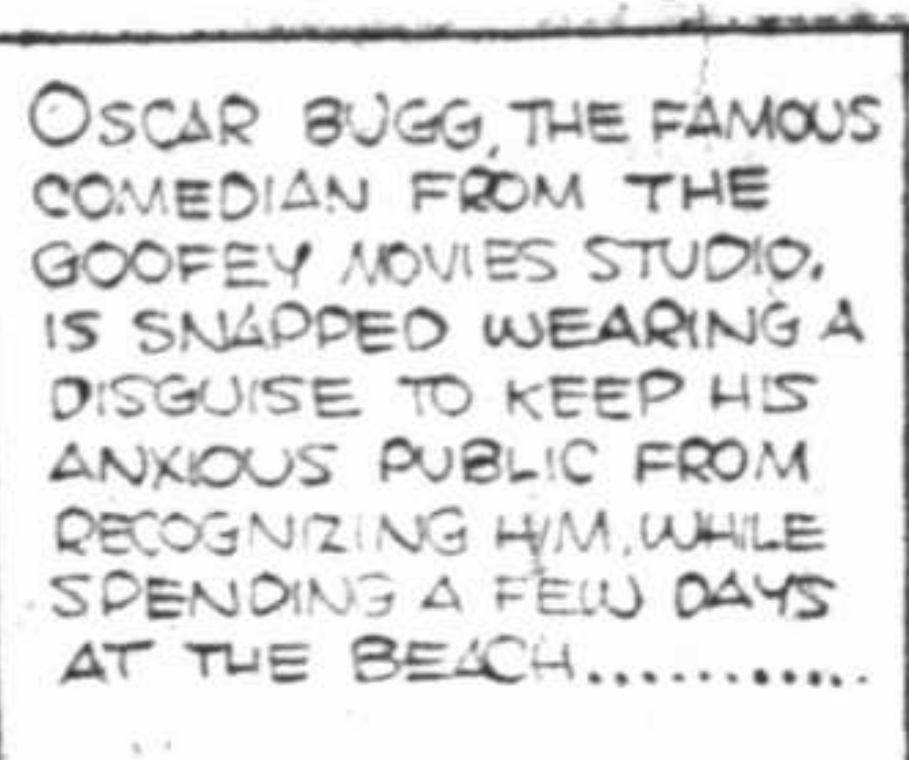
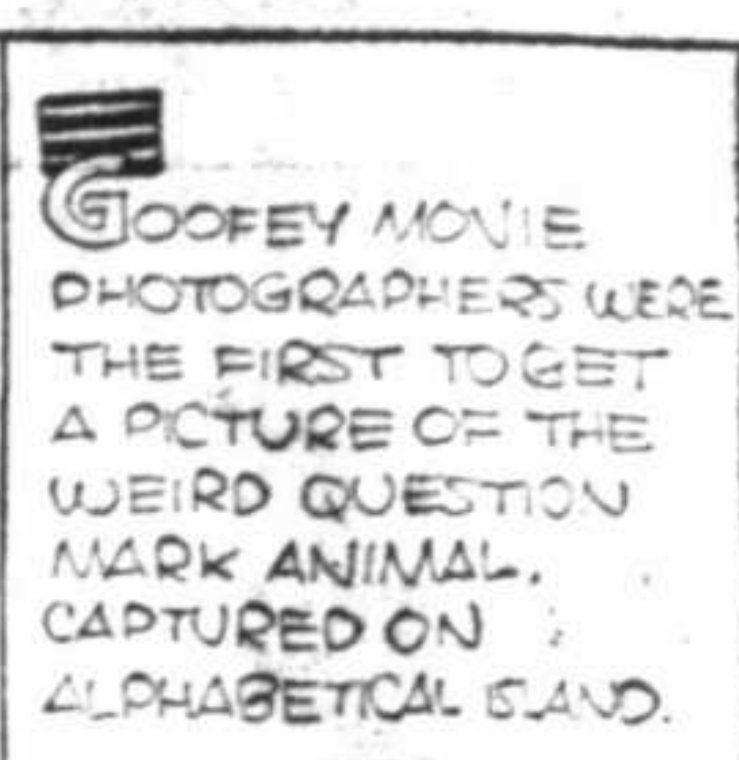

Appointed Last Year
These Ministers were appointed November 11, 1928, when, after a cabinet crisis, M. Poincare reconstituted his government.

President Doumergue agreed that the old cabinet could obtain without difficulty a vote of confidence from parliament that would send M. Briand to the Young Plan conference at Geneva, August 6, with adequate authority and prestige.

It has been suggested that the cabinet appear in parliament on Friday but it is possible that the date will be advanced, although it will take some time to reassemble the chamber of deputies and senate which have adjourned.

LIBRARY IS POPULAR

Recent Figures Show That Tech Circulation Rises

Recent figures, announced by Miss Elizabeth West, librarian at Texas Tech, show that circulation of the library is on the increase. The 1927-28 total inside and outside circulation was 39,042. This was increased to 50,361 during the season of 1928-29. This increase is partly due to an increased enrollment, partly due to longer library hours, and perhaps partly due to more intensive use of the library on the part of individual students, according to Miss West.

During the month of June, the last month for which complete figures are available, the library had a circulation of 7,940, the greatest for any single month in the history of the school.

Dormitories Will House First Year Girls At College

Texas Tech Makes Plans To Supervise Living, Study Of Freshmen Co-Eds When Fall Term Opens

Freshmen women students of Texas Technological college will live in two privately-owned dormitories, College Inn and Annex A, with the beginning of the fall session of 1929. With a capacity of 120, these two dorms have been designated by the regents as dormitories for freshmen women and they are to be operated under the direct supervision of the dean of women, Mrs. Mary W. Doak. The buildings are stucco and tile and are located on College Avenue, opposite the campus.

College Inn will be in charge of Mrs. Ellen Doak, of the University of Oklahoma, and Mrs. C. W. Conley, who has had dormitory experience at the University of Texas, will be in charge of Annex A. House-keeping accommodations for a limited number are available in Annex A. Women who live in Lubbock and those who find it necessary to work for a part of their expenses will be exempt from residing in these two dormitories.

Announcement has been made that should the enrollment make it necessary other buildings near the campus will be designated as dormitories for freshmen women and will be operated upon the same plan. The purpose of the plan is to make possible closer supervision over the first year students pending the erection of dormitories on the campus which was recently authorized in a bill passed by the legislature.
