## TORNADOES IN AUSTIN FOR STATE MEET

To Meet El Paso Team in First Game Friday

Coach Lester Gregg and ten members of the Lamesa High School basketball squad, District 3, Region 1, high school champions left Wednesday for Austin where they compete for the third consecutive year in the Texas Interscholastic League tournament.

Winning third place in 1933 and second place in the tournament in 1934 the Tornadoes are going to make a determined bid this year to bring home the State crown.

Opening the tournament which brings together the surviving eight teams of more than two thousand teams that started the season more than two months ago, the Bowie High school of El Paso will be pitted against the powerful Lamesa quintets and Killeen will endeavor to halt the march of the Hughes Spring cagers in the opening games.

The feature contest of the first and probably will be that between Woodward and Huntsville. Denton is favored to defeat Taft in the opening contest. The schedule is as follows:

Friday, 2:00 P. M. Lamesa vs. Bowie of El Paso.  
Friday, 3:10 P. M. Hughes Spring vs. Killeen.  
Friday, 7:00 P. M. Denton vs. Taft  
Friday, 8:10 P. M. Brownwood vs. Huntsville.

The semi-finals will be played Saturday afternoon with the final game scheduled for Saturday night.

Ziggy Sears, Dusty Bogges and Abbe Curtis have been named to officiate Friday and Saturday. These three men are Southwestern Conference officials and among the best in this section. Bogges and Sears will be regulars with Curtis alternating.

Coach Gregg of Lamesa said his regular lineup, Burkhardt and Kidd, forwards, Harrell center, Jordan and Boswell, guards, were ready to play. One or two of them have been complaining of colds, but the Tornado mentor opined that all would be ready Friday. In addition to the regulars, Sandell, Walker and Hilburn, forwards, Kinnerson, center, and Matthews, guard, made the trip. The Tornadoes spent Wednesday night at San Angelo, continuing to Austin Thursday.

A large number of fans left today (Thursday) for Austin to cheer the boys along.

## Dawson County Now Has 1927 Farms

After a recent check of the 1935 Census of Agriculture it was found that Dawson county had 1927 farms on January 1, 1935. This is a decrease of 271 farms in the number since the last census in 1930 when Dawson county was found to have 2218.

This decrease, Agriculture officials say, is due to a decided trend toward owner operation of farms and larger acreage being farmed by one operator, which is being brought about by modern farm machinery, including the double row equipment and tractor farming.

## TORNADOES WIN REGIONAL TITLE

The Golden Tornadoes won their second consecutive Regional Basketball championship last week at the West Texas State Teachers College, Canyon. The regional play-off plan has been in effect for only two years thus the local school's representatives have made history. The year before the beginning of the regional play-off, the locals defeated Pampa two successive games for the bi-district championship and went to Austin for the State meet following Pampa's defeat. Their winning this year sends them to Austin for the third consecutive year.

The Canyon games won by Lamesa were those against Amarillo and Pampa. Amarillo was the first team to be eliminated and Crowell was the second, thus throwing Lamesa to play Pampa twice.

The scores of the three games played by Lamesa were: Lamesa 41 Amarillo 25; Lamesa 32 Pampa 24; and Lamesa 41 Pampa 28.

Reports of the games indicate that Lamesa had an unexpectedly easy time winning their games but considerable interest was manifested in the teams by its supporters because of the possibility of foul-outs and recent illness of some of the players.

## United States Savings Bonds on Sale at P. O.

The New United States Savings Bonds, often referred to as "Baby Bonds" are now on sale at the local post office. These bonds are offered in the following maturity units: \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000. The purchase price is three fourths the maturity price. For instance, \$75 invested now will increase in ten years to \$100. Unlike most bonds, these bonds will be redeemed by the Government on demand after 60 days from issue date. If redeemed during the first year, only the purchase price will be paid. But after the first year the interest gradually increases each six months until maturity. The purchaser's investment is increased by one third if permitted to remain the full ten years. The bonds are free from all taxation. Postmaster J. D. Dyer states that the sales have been surprisingly good so far. If interested see him for more information.

## OIL TEST DRILLING AT 4,025 FEET

Drilling at 4,025 feet in anhydrite and lime the Ray Albaugh et. al. No. 1 John Robinson is reported to have hit an air or gas pocket the first of the week, which resulted in the tools being blown up the hole. The first report of a lime stringer in the test was at 3,920 feet which is not considered the top of the section, but it is said by some to pre-empt a "high well".

The test is located in the northwest quarter of section 46, Block M., E. L. and R. R. Survey. Elevation is 3,078.

## Drug Stores To Get Ball Game Reports

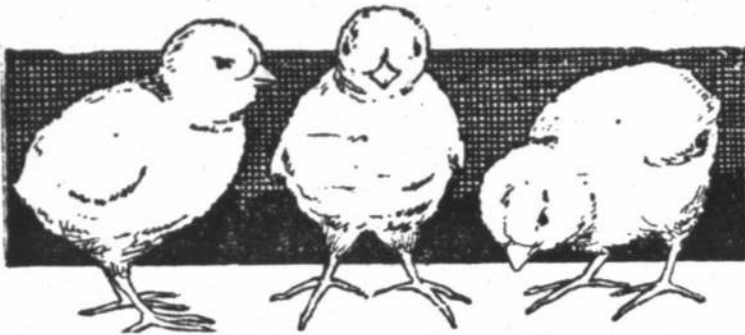

## FARM NOTES

### 1935 Cotton Contracts

The new cotton contracts will be signed in the county agent's office beginning March 19th. All contracts will be signed in the agent's office to keep down mistakes as far as possible on the 1935 contracts.

### Use of Rented Acres

The same as last year applies to the rented acres: that it is not to be used for profit either directly or indirectly. Neither can food and feed crops that would normally be grown on other land be diverted to the rented acres, thereby releasing the unrented acres for the purpose of producing crops for sale. The rented acres may be used for the purpose of producing food and feed crops for home use only.

### Raising Lint Over Last Year's Contract

Any producer which is not satisfied with the averages in the old contract can go before his local committee and submit proof for a raise, however in all cases where one contract is raised a like amount must come off of some other or others in that particular district. In other words any that want to get raises on their contracts must see their local committeeman before March

15th in order to get any consideration. All adjustments must be completed before any new contracts are signed up for this year.

### Side Agreements Between Landlords and Tenants

No side agreements will be recognized between tenants and land owners whereby the landowner will receive a larger portion of the reduction money than he is entitled to receive under the contract. Any such practice will forfeit the contract and the parties in such cases will of course be obtaining money under false pretenses and such benefits as are paid will naturally be due back to the government.

### Selecting Committeemen for Adjustments on 1934 Contracts

The communities will be asked to have five men to work on the adjustments of raising or lowering of contracts. The three already elected by the farmers of the community will have the privilege of selecting or calling an election and having these parties selected according to their own wishes. Previously I made a statement that we would have elections in every school district, but due to busy times at present it seems advisable to leave the selection of extra men to help up to the local committees to handle as they see proper.

### Change in Size of Farm Under Contract in 1934 to 1935

In case a farm is subdivided after December 31, 1933 (regardless of whether such farm has been covered by a contract in 1934 and 1935) the parties involved shall apportion each subdivision its prorata part of the percentage of cotton allowed such farm with reference to the cultivated land of such farm. In other words it would be out of line for an owner to rent part of his land out for feed and he take all the reduction moneys of such farm, with out the written agreement of the parties involved, and a copy of such agreement be filed with the county committee, for their consideration.

### Refusal of Parties to Sign Contracts

Producers who desire to sign contracts and if such parties whose signature is necessary to complete the contracts, such parties, desiring to cooperate, shall give the names and addresses of the parties so refusing and the county committee will get in communication with the parties so refusing. The parties desiring to enter into contract and cannot do so on account of lack of cooperation, will submit in writing the names and addresses of such parties as refusing and the county committee shall keep a record of such parties who refuse to cooperate, and such record shall be certified and signed by the county committee.

dollar can be valued up or down as circumstances warrant.

But the value which the President and congress place upon the dollar may differ materially from the value which the public places upon the currency. The public will view the dollar in terms of its purchasing power. Public confidence in the currency, therefore, becomes an absolute necessity and once it is shaken, if history means anything, it takes a long hard pull to get it back. So, if congress shows a willingness to repudiate obligations as it has shown already, the public sooner or later begins to wonder what the end will be.

Throughout history, wherever and whenever such a condition has arisen, the public seeks to convert this doubtful currency into material things, those of a utilitarian value, which it may use. Money, being inedible, is sought to be exchanged for things to eat, to wear, to sustain life and comfort. This is what is meant in expressions "the flight from the dollars," or "the flight from any other currency about which we have heard so much since the World war."

The situation in congress in the last few weeks has provided a test for

### Up to the President

President Roosevelt's political acumen. It has been far more a test of his skill than otherwise would have been the case because for almost two years he has had a congress so obedient to his command as to merit the description of a rubber stamp legislative body. Now, however, the President is faced with the necessity for political maneuvers of the highest order and upon the results of his tactics much will depend. He can cement the links of the Democratic party or he can cause them to disintegrate by the courses he follows.

Some curiosity has been aroused by the fact that for the first time since he became President, Mr. Roosevelt omitted in several instances lately to send administration drafts of bills for congressional consideration. His practice hitherto had been to have the bills drafted in executive departments and submitted with a recommendation that they be enacted in that form. Until some of the factions in congress began to feel their oats this plan worked very well. A change has come over some of them, however, and they are now insisting upon preparation of the legislation themselves.

Another significant development—and this links to circumstances of several months ago—was the presentation by Senator Wagner of New York of a bill to settle labor disputes. This bill does not have administration approval. Indeed, it is quite contrary in some of its phases to the policies which Mr. Roosevelt has sponsored in his dealings with organized labor. It seems important, therefore, that Senator Wagner, who for so long was regarded as Mr. Roosevelt's alter ego in the senate, should deliberately offer legislation to which the administration had not agreed. With further reference to Senator Wagner, who comes from the President's home state of New York, it is interesting, even if unimportant, that Senator Wagner did not support the President in the latter's efforts to force the \$5,000,000,000 work relief bill through the senate. Since Senator Wagner has been consistently a New Dealer many observers are asking with some logic whether the New Dealer supporters have begun to crack up.

It will be recalled that in asking for an extension of the national industrial recovery act for a period of two years, President Roosevelt merely outlined in his message the fundamentals of the plan he was recommending. He carefully avoided reference to any draft of such a bill. It occasioned some surprise that this was so but closer analysis of the situation should have developed reasons therefor. Most of these reasons are traceable directly to the circumstances I mentioned above, namely, the necessity for tactical skill in maneuvering the political strength available to the President.

Observers here generally are agreed that Mr. Roosevelt can turn on full steam and hold a powerful majority in both house and senate. But, the question is whether this is the wiser course from a political standpoint. In this connection the expression has been heard several times lately among Democrats who have been regarded as among the leaders that it might not be well to prod stubborn mules too far.

The best information I can gather is that while Mr. Roosevelt did not offer a draft of NRA extension legislation, a bill will be forthcoming in a couple of weeks from the senate finance committee that will have had prior approval from the White House. Something of the same course is scheduled for the house side. Thus, the picture becomes complete. The fine Italian hand of the administration comes into view.

The story we get around Washington is that this course of action will be used more and more as a means of avoiding open disputes and stubbornness on the floors of the house and senate.

Washington.—Although it has been several weeks since the Supreme court of the United States rendered its history-making decision in the gold cases, there is no slackening in the disturbance from the effects of the administration's gold policies, even in the light of the court ruling. While the court held that congress had no power to enact legislation invalidating the gold clause in government bonds, it said in the same breath that collection from the government by a bond holder was another story. Since the government has taken gold out of circulation, collection appears virtually impossible but the appearance is not going to stop bond holders from seeking what they regard as justice.

### Call It Repudiation

It is now apparent that the government's action is going to be regarded both here and abroad as repudiation. That is a nasty word when applied to governments and its repercussions likely will be heard for a good many years.

While the repudiation of the gold payments will affect comparatively few people directly, the significance of the action in a political way is becoming more and more apparent. The repudiation in its effect on the bond holders may be only temporary, but its effect politically will be far-lung.

I think it is generally considered now that the gold question will become a paramount issue in the next political campaign and it is not impossible that it will continue to be an issue over a period of years. This is so because, admittedly, actual damage has been done to American prestige in foreign lands. It is made to appear, therefore, that there will be a combination of international and domestic influences at work henceforth with respect to this government's gold policies.

Domestically, the issue was born in the presentation in congress of two bills designed to restore, partially at least, the status of this government as regards the gold policies to that obtaining before the devaluation of the dollar. Simultaneously, former President Herbert Hoover, in one of the few expressions made since retiring from office, declared his belief that the return of gold payments was necessary and vital to stabilizing conditions and re-establishing the United States in world favor.

Of course, with the abundant Democratic majority in congress, the gold bills will get nowhere very fast. Likewise, Mr. Hoover's expression can and will result only in providing ammunition for New Deal supporters, whose answer to criticism usually is a question whether it is desired to return to the conditions that caused the depression.

Nevertheless, I hear considerable discussion to the effect that these ripples must be considered as only the beginning. They will have the effect of causing many people to think about the problem. Discussions will take place in the homes and in the shops. There will be those who contend for sound money of the old style. Equally vehement defenders of the New Deal will arise. Thus, the issue becomes joined and it is not outside the realm of possibility that monetary questions will become as important in 1936 as they were in the Bryan free silver days.

Now as to the practical operation of the gold rulings:

There can be no doubt that the Constitution gives congress power to coin money and regulate its value. The Supreme court always has sustained this power. So, when congress, by resolution, allowed President Roosevelt to seize all of the gold in this country and hold it in the treasury, it accomplished indirectly that which it could not do directly. In this way it forced the invalidation of thousands of private contracts wherein one party promised to make payments in gold. Congress made such payments impossible and those who were to be paid have nothing left but disillusionment. As to the gold payment clause in the government bonds the Supreme court said that congress had no right to enact legislation the effect of which was to void that payment. It would seem, therefore, that some way should be found to force the government to make good. That way lies only through the Court of Claims of the United States, and when that court is denied jurisdiction in suits to recover, the bond holder is left with a right, but that right is unenforceable since the government can be sued only with its permission.

On top of these circumstances, and as a long range proposition, considerable attention has been directed to the relationship between the gold clause decisions and inflation. There is a direct link. This link, without doubt, should be watched by all of those who think of the future of this nation.

Inflation of the credit has been going on continuously since Mr. Roosevelt took office. The federal government has set no limit to the borrowing which it will undertake in its program for recovery. The Supreme court has said directly that government securities are worth whatever the administration and congress determine them to be worth because the

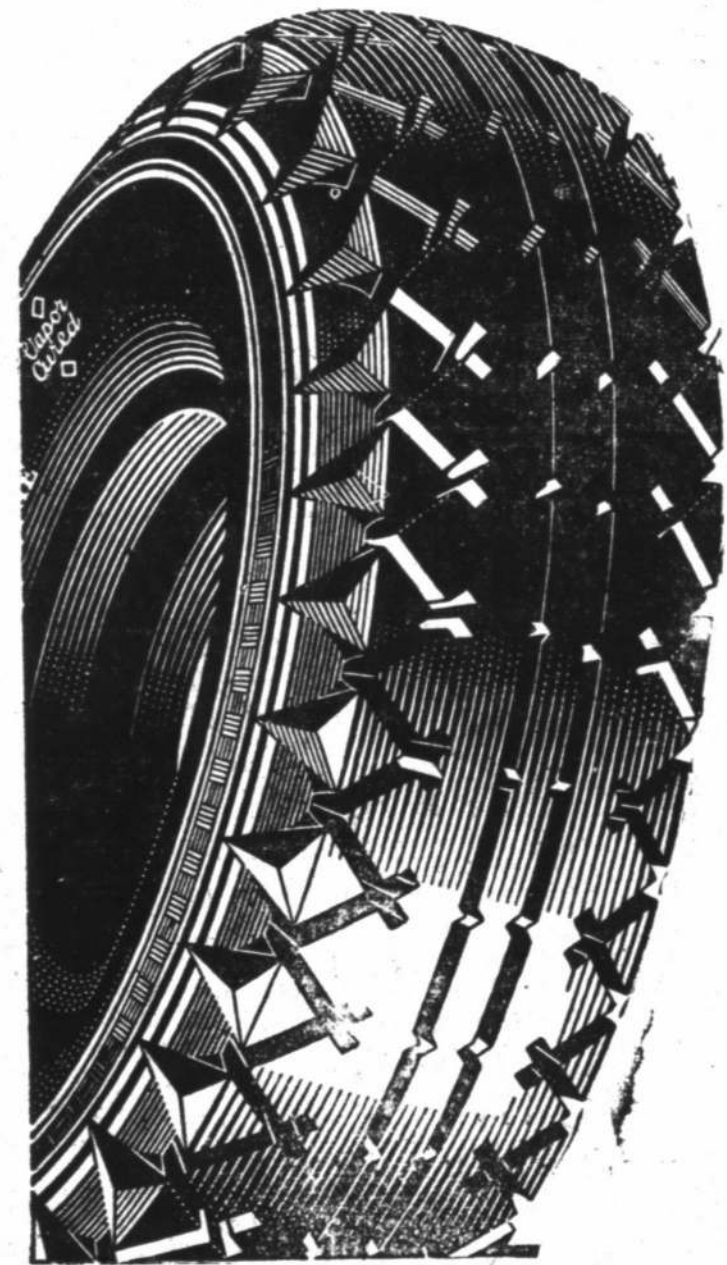

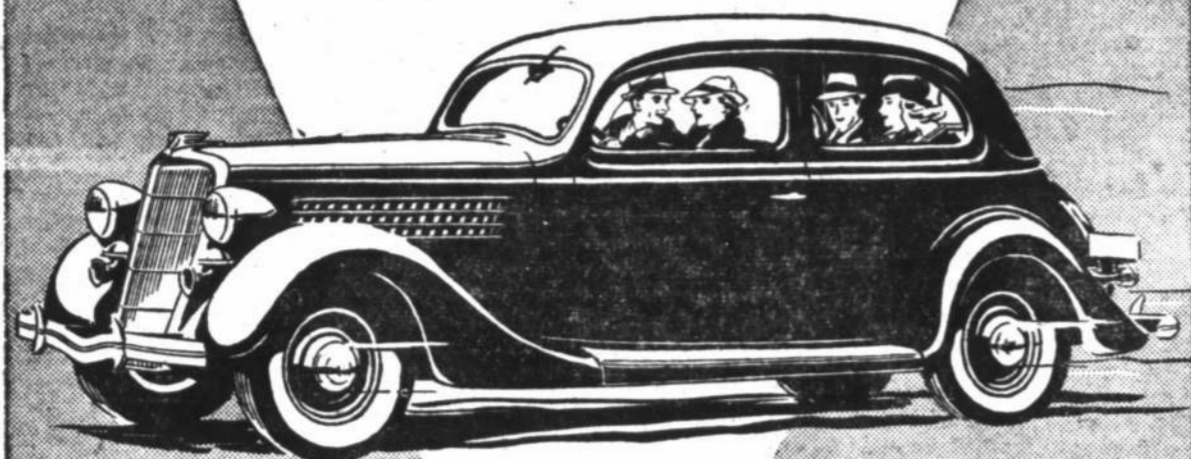

NEW CHEVROLET OILING SYSTEM MECHANICAL FEATURE OF NEW CAR

A unique method of flooding connecting rod bearings with a surplus of lubricating oil at high engine speeds is one of the new mechanical features of the Chevrolet engines in all 1935 models. The new oiling system assures an extra supply of oil to the bearings when most needed that is, when the car is being driven above 70 miles per hour for long periods.

At lower engine speeds, lubrication of the crankpins is provided by oil picked up from troughs by dipper on the connecting rods. The oil pan troughs are kept filled by the

oil pump, which feeds fresh oil thru nozzles opening below the surface level.

At high engine speeds, as the pump pressure increases, oil is forced from these nozzles with sufficient force to cause high pressure streams of oil to be thrown clear across the crankcase directly in the paths of the connecting rod dippers. Because of the high speed of the dippers as the engine turns over 3000 or more r. p. m. they hit a solid stream of oil with so much force that tremendous pressure is created. The oil flows through the outlet in the top of the dipper and is forced through the deep grooves in the connecting rod bearings. The force of the impact of the oil stream provides positive lubrication to the entire surface of the bearing and clears away any obstruction in the oil grooves, such as a high pressure stream of water from a fire engine rips roofing from a building.

and it cost about 4 cents per pound to make.
