Brownwood And Early Police File Charges On Man Held For Local Assault Incident

Two charges of indecency with a child were filed in Brownwood last Wednesday on Jimmy Irvin Christian with bonds totaling \$20,000. The indecency with a child charges are third-degree felony.

Christian, whose name could not be released until formal charges were made on him in the Brownwood cases, was arrested in Santa Anna on August 24 by Santa Anna Police Chief Carlos Torres after attempting to rob a 32-year-old woman at knife-point. He had tied her wrists together and threatened to kill her if she didn't cooperate and stole her purse as he fled on foot.

He was arrested about 20 minutes later and remains in Coleman County Jail on charges of

aggravated robbery and assault with a deadly weapon, with bonds totaling \$120,000 on the two charges.

Christian was arrested in Brownwood on August 18 on a charge of indecent exposure and was released after posting a \$5,000 bond at the Brown County Jail. A Brownwood police detective said that at that time there was insufficient evidence to pursue the other charges.

Charges continued to mount against the suspect as the Early Police Department filed felony indecency with a child charges against him on Friday. Bond in that case was set at \$150,000.

According to a news release in

the *Brownwood Bulletin* the charges in Early stem from a June 27, 1995 incident at the Texas Express store across from Heartland Mall in Early where Christian is alleged to have exposed himself to two adult women and an 8-year-old female child who was with them.

Early police officer Butch Lawson developed information that led him to stop Christian, who was living in Early at the time. A picture was taken of the suspect for identification purposes. After investigative procedures, the two women from the Texas Express incident identified Christian out of a "video lineup". But by the time identification was made, Christian had left the Brownwood/Early area, reportedly headed for Santa Anna.

School Board Holds Line On Taxes, Keeps Same Budget

The Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees met in a special called meeting on Tuesday, August 29.

The meeting opened with a public hearing of the proposed operating budget for the 1995-96 school year. The board adopted the proposed budget.

Board member Edwin Hipsher made the following motion which was passed: "I move that any portions of the Student Handbook or District Discipline Management Plan that conflict with Subchapter A, Chapter 37 of the Texas Education Code, as enacted in Senate Bill 1 by the 74th Legislature in Regular Session, or the Notice to Parents of Changes Regarding Student Discipline shall be invalid and that the provisions of Subchapter A, Chapter 37 and the Notice to Parents shall control the substance and procedures regarding student discipline and student con-

duct to the extent of any conflict."

Superintendent Dean Bass explained to the board that the action taken at the August 8 board meeting regarding worker's compensation would become null and void because the deadline had passed for terminating the previous coverage. Therefore, the school is obligated to continue worker's compensation with Hibb's Hallmark for another year.

Bass and Business Manager Judy Hartman discussed with the board options being considered by the district health insurance plan for 1995-96. It was agreed that the plan will be comparable to what is now in place.

The final amendments to the 1995-96 budget were approved. The total budget for the 1995-96 school year is \$2.3 million.

The tax rate for the 1995 collection year will remain the same; 1.285 for O & M and .115 for

Texas Association of Counties of Austin, a company which the county has been using in the past. This was tabled since a decision is not necessary until October 1.

Also tabled was a decision on the Sheriff's Department request for two additional cellular phones.

The new tax rate will increase county taxes by 3% over the effective tax rate. The new rate is fifty-five (55) cents per \$100 valuation. Forty-two cents of this will go to the General Fund and thirteen cents will apply to the Road and Bridge Fund.

A new county retirement plan was passed. The new plan will give an employee full retirement at the age of 60 with 8 years of vested service or if the age of the em-

ployee added to the years of service equals at least 75 years. In the past an employee was required to complete 10 years of vested service to be able to receive full retirement at age 60. Commissioners felt this new plan will work favorably for employees. No benefits would be lost and the county would only be required to pay a total of \$476 annually.

Election judges for the November 7 amendment election will be Barney Ransberger, 2 East; Arvel Cullins, 4 West; Rose Bass, Santa Anna; W. T. Graves, East Ward; and Billie McCorkle, 3 South.

The election judges and helpers will continue to receive \$4.25 per hour.

County Commissioners Set New Tax Rate

Coleman County Commissioners met last Thursday in the district courtroom due to visitors present for a special meeting.

Alice Spillman, Betty Key and Ovelia Williams representing the Santa Anna Library asked commissioners to continue to include the local library in the budget expenses. County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale stated \$2,000 has been included in the budget and advised commissioners that the Santa Anna Library had been receiving 1/4 of that amount each year.

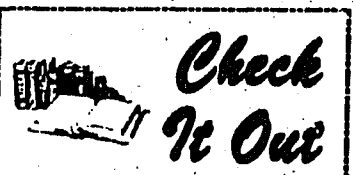
She died at 1 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 31, 1995 at Granbury Villa in Granbury.

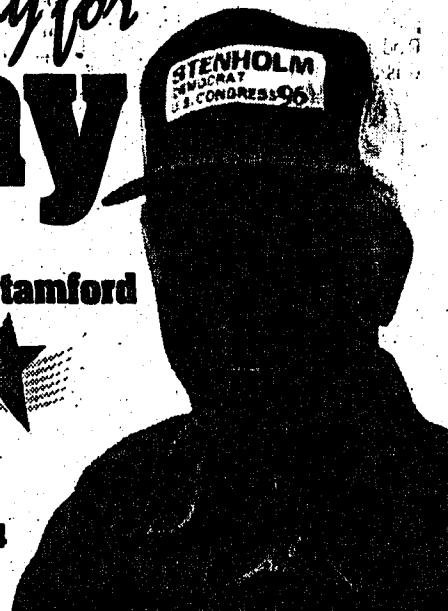

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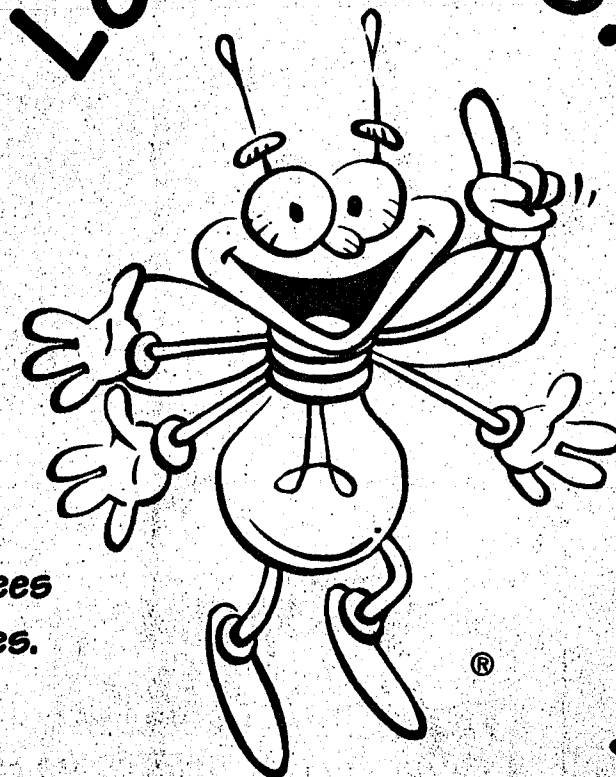

"Help Your 6-Year-Old Succeed In School"

Most of us remember or have heard of Art Linkletter of radio and T.V. fame. His interviews with children were favorites of their day. Mr. Linkletter had these words to say about children and adult reactions to him. "To me, raising kids is just about the most exciting, maddening, rewarding, exhausting, puzzling and satisfying occupation there is. There's no foolproof system, because all kids are different. But there's no area in the world where loving common sense and a touch of humor pay such big dividends."

Some typical behaviors are not finishing tasks, "I won't", and taking things SIX really likes to work in school. He likes to "begin" work, that is but he doesn't really like to "finish". This behavior is typical. (Parents may notice it when SIX half-way does chores at home.)

Encouragement and praise will help. Encourage SIX by saying, "You're almost through, only two more to go." When he sees the end in sight, he's enthusiasm returns, and he'll hurry to finish.

Even without the stress of adjustment to school, SIX can be a frustrating age at home. The initial response to any demand is usually "No!" or complete disregard of the request. Nagging only increases the stubbornness. The pleasant touch works best. Allowing SIX a little time or several false starts will save face by allowing him to come around on his own.

At school, taking things that belong to others is much more common for six's than parents may wish to believe. However, SIX will confess (and really be sorry) if indirectly approached ("Where did you find this?") rather than directly accused ("You stole this eraser!") SIX wants to be good and is aware of "goodness" in himself. Active listening by parents at bedtime will give SIX the chance for "absolution" and a good feeling about himself again.

Why all the illnesses? After a few weeks of school, absences become common. SIX gets tired from all the adjustments and is more susceptible to illness. Colds may come back off and on all year. Be on the lookout for inflammation or infection of the middle ear. SIX must be also to hear to learn, to listen and follow directions.

District Court Handles Two Dispositions

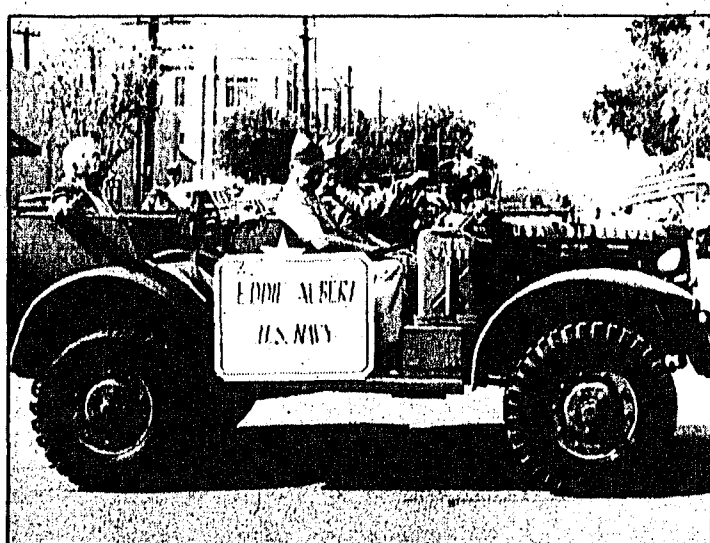
District Attorney Ross Jones presented the following cases before District Judge John Weeks recently:

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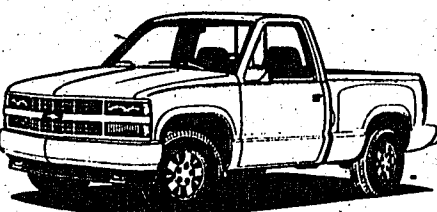
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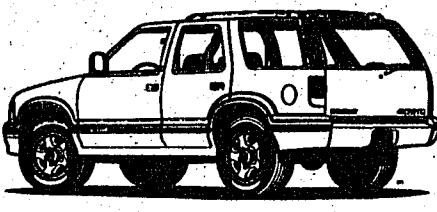
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Fishing Lake Ivie

Catfishing this past weekend was real good. Several nice channel cats were reported, most in the 2-3 lb. range. Trotliners are doing especially well.

Some nice bass were weighed in over the weekend, one at just over 8 lbs and another just over 6 lbs. Bass fishing is just a little slow but some quality fish are being caught. Both the fish I mentioned were caught on Carolina rigs in 40 ft. of water. You can find an occasional school of white bass and occasional schools of black bass. Mostly early mornings, but you have to look for them.
