Posse Of Guards Search Sections Near State Farm

Gun Battle Appears Possible As Officers Surround Prisoners In Woods Near Penitentiary

Bloodhounds Used

Several Are Injured After Sensational Break From Prison Thursday; Guards Are Held As Captives

(By Associated Press)

SWEENEY, Texas, June 21.—Four convicts already having been wounded, real gun battles were expected to get under way early today between prison guards and many of the 43 convicts who escaped yesterday from the Clemens state farm. At 11 o'clock last night 25 of the original 43 who kidnapped their guards and escaped into the woods of Brazoria county still were at liberty. Two more of the men were shot down near here but are not believed to be fatally injured.

They are Tom Nichols, Limestone county, serving a 12 year term for murder; and J. L. Hader, McLennan county serving two to five years for forgery.

Eighteenth Captured
The eighteenth convict captured shortly before midnight was Tom Watta, Harris county, serving two to five years on a burglary conviction at Houston.

Nichols and Hader, the wounded convicts were shot as they were preparing to board a freight train.

HOUSTON, June 20.—Fifteen of the 43 convicts who, kidnaped their guards and escaped from the Clemens state prison farm, Brazoria county, early today had been recaptured tonight and a gun battle appeared possible as officers surrounded a dozen others in the woods near Sweeney.

Headed by W. M. Hickman, prison farm manager, and Sheriff John Jones of guards, officers and citizens.

Autopsy Of Fatal Poison Gas At El Paso Performed

Officers Determine Deaths Resulted From Hydrogen Sulphide Fumes, Origin Remains Mystery

EL PASO, June 20.—Poison gas that swept over a residence district near two oil refineries and a natural gas company plant here last night, taking the lives of two sleeping children and overcoming more than a score of other persons was identified today as hydrogen sulphide.

While the nature of the death dealing gas was determined, its origin remained a mystery.

Autopsy Determined Gas
Dr. T. J. McCann, county health officer, reported to a joint meeting of the city council and county commissioners that an autopsy performed on the children showed death was caused by hydrogen sulphide, a

Seventy Members Of Executive Committee Gather At Abilene To Select Successor To H. D. Wade

ABILENE, June 20.—(AP)—A. M. Bourland, Vernon, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, today was named acting manager until the next annual convention at El Paso. Bourland will receive a salary of \$10,000 a year.

The action was taken by 70 members of the chamber's executive committee, the advisory board and vice presidents who met here today to name a successor to H. D. Wade, resigned.

An advisory committee including J. A. Wheat, Seymour, C. B. Jones, Spur, R. W. Haynie, Abilene, and Ray Nichols, Vernon, was named to act with Bourland.

The meeting today voted opposition to a state income tax and to any increase in the gross production tax.

Among those previously mentioned for Wade's position were: A. Garland Adair, Breckenridge newspaperman; Porter Whaley, manager of the San Antonio chamber; J. E. Convict Murders Foreman In Pen

Prisoner In Solitary Confinement After Running Amuck In Penitentiary Laundry Thursday

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 20.—A convict charged with the slaying of a woman was sentenced to the penitentiary today for housebreaking and burglary.

Prior to his sentence Panoram confessed to slaying a boy in Salem, Mass., another in Philadelphia, and a third in either New London or New Haven he said he had forgotten the address because of the number of persons he had killed.

Yesterday the convict was imprisoned for an infraction of prison rules.

This morning he sat in a flat iron in the laundry where he was employed, and drove it into the skull of the foreman. He was overpowered by a guard before he could attack anyone else.

Panoram, under federal regulation, could be sentenced to death for killing the foreman. Disposition of the case was placed with the department of justice.

Governor Moody Is Asked Not To Sign Or Approve Resolution Criticizing Mrs. Hoover For Action

DALLAS, June 20.—Two Texas Hoover leaders today asked Governor Moody not to sign or approve a resolution passed by the legislature criticizing Mrs. Herbert Hoover for the De Priest incident.

Robert B. Greager, republican national committeeman, in a telegram to the governor said that Mrs. Hoover merely had followed precedent in entertaining the wife of the negro congressman from Illinois.

Tea Not Social
"Invitations to these affairs are extended to the wives of all members and are based upon lists furnished by the officers of house and senate," the telegram said. "In this occasion Mrs. De Priest as the wife of Congressman De Priest was invited to one of a series of teas for the wives of members of house and senate. The names of none on the official list were omitted. The affair was wholly official and not personal or social."

The president had no slightest idea or intention of creating, destroying, or in any manner affecting existing social or racial lines or barriers.

Other Visits Cited
Greager's telegram, as did another sent to the governor by J. F. Lacey, Hoover leader in the late election, emphasized that "during the last democratic administration, from 1912 to 1921, persons of negro blood were on the White House and, on several occasions, on the White House grounds."

Three Crash To Death As Plane Falls In River

Captain J. C. Jervis Son Of Lord St. Vincent And Two Companions Killed When Plane Hits Wires

MONTREAL, Que., June 20.—(AP)—Captain J. C. Jervis, M. C., 32, elder son of Lord St. Vincent and former aide de camp to the governor general of Canada, and two companions were killed today in a crash of their airplane into the St. Lawrence river between Point St. Charles and Hun's Island.

The plane was flying down the river at a low altitude when it struck two high tension wires carrying electric power from the city to Nun's Island.

Flames Are Seen
Witnesses said there was a burst of flame just as the craft crashed into the water and overturned.

Snook Confesses Killing Theora Hix With Hammer

Deposed Professor Of Ohio State University Makes Signed Statement After 23 Hours Of Grilling

Intimacy Related

Fear That College Co-Ed Would Tell Wife, About "Affair" Leads To Slaying, Dr. Snook Admits

(By Associated Press)

COLUMBUS, O., June 20.—The Ohio State Journal tonight said Dr. James H. Snook confessed that he killed Theora K. Hix, Ohio State University co-ed, on a rifle range here last Thursday night. The confession is in the hands of county prosecutor, John J. Chester, Jr., the paper said.

The paper added that the deposed Ohio State University professor of veterinary medicine signed a written confession that he struck Miss Hix over the head with a hammer, then severed her jugular vein with a pen knife and left her body on the rifle range after a violent quarrel in his automobile.

Threatened To Tell Wife
The confession had it that Snook said Miss Hix climaxed a period of trying to dictate his movements by threatening his wife and child with death if he dared to leave her with his family for the week-end. She then reached in her pocket book where she sometimes carried a derringer Snook previously had given her, and in the struggle "she was hit" over the head with a hammer, "with intent to slay her," the confession as related in the Journal said.

Snook then severed her jugular vein, put the body out on the ground hurriedly gathered up his things and left the spot, the statement declared. On the way home he threw her purse in the St. Lawrence river between Point St. Charles and Hun's Island.

Export Debuture Plan Is Revived

The National Grange, Original Sponsor Of Measure Gives New Life To Plan After Congress Adjourns

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Less than 24 hours after congress quit work to await a report on the house tariff bill, the controversial export debuture plan was revived today by its original sponsor—the National Grange—as the only method by which the grover of surplus crops could obtain tariff benefits.

L. J. Taber, master of the Grange, placed the proposal before the senate finance sub-committee holding hearings on the agriculture schedule of the bill and said unless it was approved by the senate, "there would be a different story to tell."

He added he was optimistic over its prospects as a rider to the tariff measure, despite its overwhelming rejection by the house as a part of the farm bill.

The debuture twice was approved by the senate by 3 votes in the face of opposition by President Hoover. One of its principal backers, Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, already has proposed it in slightly different form as an amendment to the tariff measure.

We have sought continuously to build up agriculture without turning down any other group," Taber declared, "but if we are to be denied every means to make the tariff effective on the export branches, and if we are then to be denied equal rates with industry on our non-export branches, there will be nothing left for organized agriculture to do but to rally its forces for a general lowering of the tariff bill."

Texas and Florida growers clashed before the committee with importers and representatives of American producers of tomatoes in Cuba and Mexico over the house increase to 3 cents a pound of the present one-half cent duty.

Shannon Released Under Bond After Paducah Slaying

Troy Taylor Meets Death In Argument Over Bet On Ball Game Wednesday; Stakeholder Loses Money

PADUCAH, June 20.—Roy Shannon, 28, was at liberty today on \$2,500 bond in connection with the fatal shooting of Troy Taylor, 30, last night in an argument over the stake money in a bet on a baseball game.

Shannon held the money of two betters but after the game was over he had lost it. One man went through Taylor's pockets in search of the money recipitating a fight.

Shannon was escorted to his home by the city marshal only to find Taylor waiting. After the marshal left a second altercation began, during which a gun was discharged, several bullets striking Taylor, who died in a hospital a short time later.

Both Taylor and Shannon were arrested recently and charged with possession of liquor for sale.

Lubbock Burglars Take To The Grass

Lubbock burglars are taking to the grass. A call late last night came to the police from 1916 Dixie Drive stating that a man was lying in the grass in front of the house.

An officer rushed to the scene and when he arrived the prowler had made good his escape. A woman said that she had been in the front yard watering her grass when she saw a tall man lying in the grass just across this street. "I watched him for a few minutes," she said, "and I saw him sneak up to a house and peak into the window. Then he came back and fell into the grass again. I picked up a large brick and started to see what he was about. He jumped up and ran across the street into the yard of the house just next to mine then on down the street." The woman's description of him said that he was about 6 feet tall; had on no cap or coat.

DROPS IN CANYON

New Yorker Meets Death In Royal Gorge Thursday

CANON CITY, Colo., June 20.—(AP)—Plunging from Eagle Point near here, a man named Polo, said to have been from New York City, fell 2100 feet to his death in the Royal gorge late today.

Polo, employed by a carnival playing here, climbed the point with friends. It is possible to look straight down for nearly a half mile to the hanging bridge which crosses the Arkansas river at the base of the gorge.

Polo climbed far out on a ridge over the gorge and lost his balance, falling while his companions looked on. His body was recovered.

Old Time Methods Are Revived When Yeggs Loot Bank

Bank Of Caney Is Relieved Of \$2,256 By Two Yeggs Riding Cow Ponies; Head For Hills After Robbery

Posse Organized

Pair Thought Trapped In Strip Of Thickly Wooded Wilderness Known As "Boggy Bottom"

(By Associated Press)

MALISTER, Okla., June 20.—Two bank robbers, who today revived old time methods and staged a holdup in wild west style to loot the Bank of Caney of \$2,256, tonight were believed trapped in a strip of thickly wooded wilderness known as Boggy Bottoms.

The men forced C. H. Brown, cashier, to scoop up all of the cash and currency on the counter, while Brown's daughter, Mary Virginia, and J. W. Trimble, retired merchant, stood against the wall. Mounting cow ponies, the two bank robbers clattered out of town, and headed for the hills.

Posse Formed

A posse, all its members mounted, started into the underbrush in pursuit.

Several hours later Mitchell, member of the posse riding in advance of the main body of men, saw two men ahead of him "aching" their ponies with quirts. Mitchell fired.

One of the men, Mitchell said, half turned in his saddle, and dropped a package which was found to contain \$280 in gold, before the two turned into the underbrush and disappeared. Further along the trail another package, containing \$500 in currency, was found.

Posse men trailed the two riders into the Boggy Bottoms, and a ring of guards was established around the territory. Sheriff Maxwell said his men would start into the underbrush at daylight.

Senate Has Busy Session Thursday

Search And Seizure And Prison Concentration Measures Are Sent To House; Surprises Sprung

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, June 20.—While the house was arguing the gasoline tax and listening to testimony bearing on the proposed impeachment of J. T. Robison, land commissioner, the senate sprung two surprises today.

The upper body warriors on search and seizure and prison concentration stacked their arms and smoked the pipe of peace sending to the house measures representing composed differences of all factions on these subjects. The senate also passed the "Blue Sky" bill sponsored by Mrs. Jane L. McCallum, secretary of state, who has been advocating more stringent restrictions of stock selling.

each bank. On the Detroit side, the signal man would keep an eye on the customs patrol boat. When it had gone to the other end of its beat he would flash a signal to the Canadian side. Instantly a speed boat would dart out and tear madly across the river. The customs boat would wheel and come back—but by the time it would reach the scene the liquor boat would be securely docked, hidden by some projecting boathouse or pier.

Sometimes the runners selected shallow inlets, which their boats could enter but which were too shallow for the coast guard cutters.

Sometimes, when the government boats were patrolling too closely, the runners would dart out from the Canadian side and draw the government boat after it. After extending the chase as long as possible it would allow itself to be overtaken. The coast guards would find it empty—but, while the chase was going on, a fully-loaded rum boat would quietly sneak across and

land its cargo.

Liquor meant for Detroit consumption reached the speakeasies a short time after it was landed. Cargoes for out of town were placed on trucks and taken overland, with Detroit's notorious "Purple Gang" riding in front and behind, armed with machine guns, for an escort.

Now, however, all of this activity has ceased—as far as Detroit is concerned. Most of the speakeasy proprietors have closed up. Some of them are lying low, waiting for a more favorable time to re-open; others have gone to Canada with the remark that they are not coming back at all.

Thus the biggest campaign of the entire prohibition era has opened with a victory for the government.

DETROIT, June 20.—The greatest prohibition army and navy ever brought together under the American flag have made the once rip-roaring Detroit river into a peaceable and law abiding stretch of water as the North American continent can show.

The "big push" of the prohibition forces has made the opening of its campaign a huge success. The runners are not coming across at Detroit now. The Detroit speakeasies are closing right and left. The highways leading out of the city no longer resound to the roar of big truck trains carrying booze for distant cities.

There's a reason—several reasons, in fact.

500 Agents On Duty.

Five hundred prohibition agents or other government forces serving in that capacity are on duty here now.

The coast guard has five of its snappy 75-foot cutters, each one mounting a one-pounder rapid-fire gun, a couple of machine guns and a squad of expert rifle-men. It has a dozen more cutters on the way here, and is building a whole flotilla of high-speed motor boats for use in patrolling the river.

Thus Detroit, through which Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Seymour Lowman once estimated that 85 per cent of the nation's imported liquor supply found its entry, is being dried up.

The rum runners are not trying to get across.

"Aw, what's the use?" remarked one smuggler. "We don't need to take a chance. Detroit ain't the only place in the United States where they drink booze. We can find another market."

Thus, while Detroit is growing parched and arid, other cities such as Chicago are getting even more Canadian liquor than they got before.

Turn To Unguarded Spots.

Chicago's supply, for instance, is being brought across the upper end of Lake Erie and landed in obscure coves and inlets on the Michigan shore north of Toledo, where

heavy trucks wait to receive it and take it overland to the market. Similarly, some operators are bringing their cargoes over the line north of Detroit, selecting landing places on the shores of Lake St. Clair or the Huron river.

But Detroit itself isn't getting any—not now.

Up until a short time ago the situation was almost unbelievably bad.

Lowman not only estimated that 85 per cent of the country's booze came in through Detroit; he had figures, furnished by the Canadian customs men, to show that since January 1, the runners have landed 1,533,750 gallons of liquor in Detroit.

And that isn't the half of it. Millions of gallons in addition were cleared from Windsor for such places as Cuba, Mexico and the like. Actually, of course, they all went to Detroit—but the customs men didn't include them in their list of exports.

Lowman Visits Scene.

Carey D. Ferguson, collector of internal revenue here, recently resigned after his handling of the smuggling situation had been criticized. Then the fun began.

E. R. Norwood, recently appointed co-ordinator of all the prohibition forces in this area, came on the scene and studied the situation, under cover. He sent a report to Seymour Lowman. A few days later Lowman himself came.

At that time there were 144 customs border patrolmen on duty here, 40 prohibition agents and 40 coast-guardsmen to man the cutters.

The day after Lowman's visit, prohibition agents began pouring

into the city from all directions. Prohibition headquarters in the Buhl building were swamped with them. At present there are 800 of them, with more on the way.

Elmer J. Lewis, chief of the special treasury agents in the middle-western area, sent one "Mr. X," a high-powered under cover man, here to investigate the bribery situation. Mr. X, posing as a prohibition officer, soon made a number of very interesting contacts. He stayed on the job six weeks and then turned in his report. As a result, 20 customs patrolmen were arrested for bribery, three were locked up for perjury and 19 "big shot" rum runners were indicted.

Eleven of the government men either pleaded guilty or were convicted, and the indicted rum runners have cleared out for the Canadian interior. Mr. X, who testified that he had collected \$1,700 in bribes in six weeks, has been identified as Lawrence Fleischman, a naval chief petty officer especially loaned for the investigation.

Bribery wasn't the only thing that enabled the rum runners to bring their product in, however.

The geographical set-up on the Detroit river seems to have been made to order for the smugglers. Detroit's river front sprawls along the bank for miles. At no place is the Canadian shore more than a mile away. All along the river there are slips, piers, covers, docks and inlets, offering countless places for the reception of contraband cargoes. The rum runners had a fleet of speedboats—a rakish little craft that could come across from the Canadian shore in less than two minutes.

There would be signal men on

A resolution registering protest against drug manufacturers selling to chain stores cheaper than to independent druggists was adopted. Several speakers emphasized the importance of the movement launched by the druggists to protect the independent druggist and urged every member of the convention to cooperate in the concentrated effort to put the one-store man and the corporation on even terms in competing for patronage.

Claim Marriage Law "Half-Baked"

BEAUMONT, June 20. (P)—The new Texas marriage law, which recently went into effect, is termed an example of "half-baked" legislation by E. D. Leach, who has lectured widely in this country and Europe on divorce matters, and was one of the leaders of the National Congress for Uniform Divorce Laws. Leach lectured in England under the auspices of the Divorce Reform League, of which Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was president.

Leach's criticism of the new law is that it requires physical examination of the man and not the woman of the alliance. He said he believed the doctors who receive the examination fee will be the only ones to profit.

Hope To Continue Investigation Of Dairy Cow Status

County Agent Eaton States 10,000 Cows To Be Found In Fifteen Mile Radius Of Lubbock

D. F. Eaton, county agricultural agent, Thursday expressed a desire for a further investigation by F. H. Douthitt, president of the Douthitt Engineering company, of Chicago, stating that there are at least 10,000 dairy cows within a 15 mile radius of this city and that at least 4,500 of those cows could be available for use in the event of a milk product plant for Lubbock.

Mr. Douthitt stated Tuesday that it was his belief that there is not a sufficient number of cows now in this territory whose milk could be transferred into the milk products channel. He said that there would have to be at least 3,500 cows within a 15 or 20 mile radius of the city before a plant would even be considered.

4,500 Cows Here

"I would like to make a survey of the county with Mr. Douthitt," said Mr. Eaton. "I feel certain that I can convince him there are no less than 4,500 cows whose production would be available for the proposed plant. This number would not include the thousands of dairy cows now supplying milk through dairies and retail dealers to consumers."

Mr. Douthitt at this time is in Lamesa conferring with citizens there with reference to the establishment of a plant in that city.

DES MOINES, June 20. (P)—Dr. T. T. Shields, storm center in the recent Des Moines university controversy, was named acting president of the university for purposes of reorganization, by the board of trustees today. He was also re-elected president of the board.

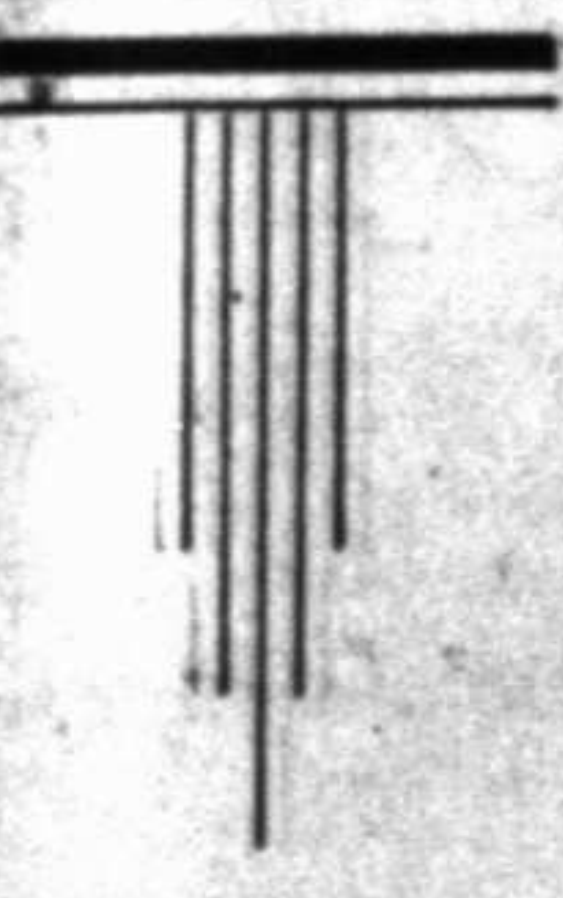

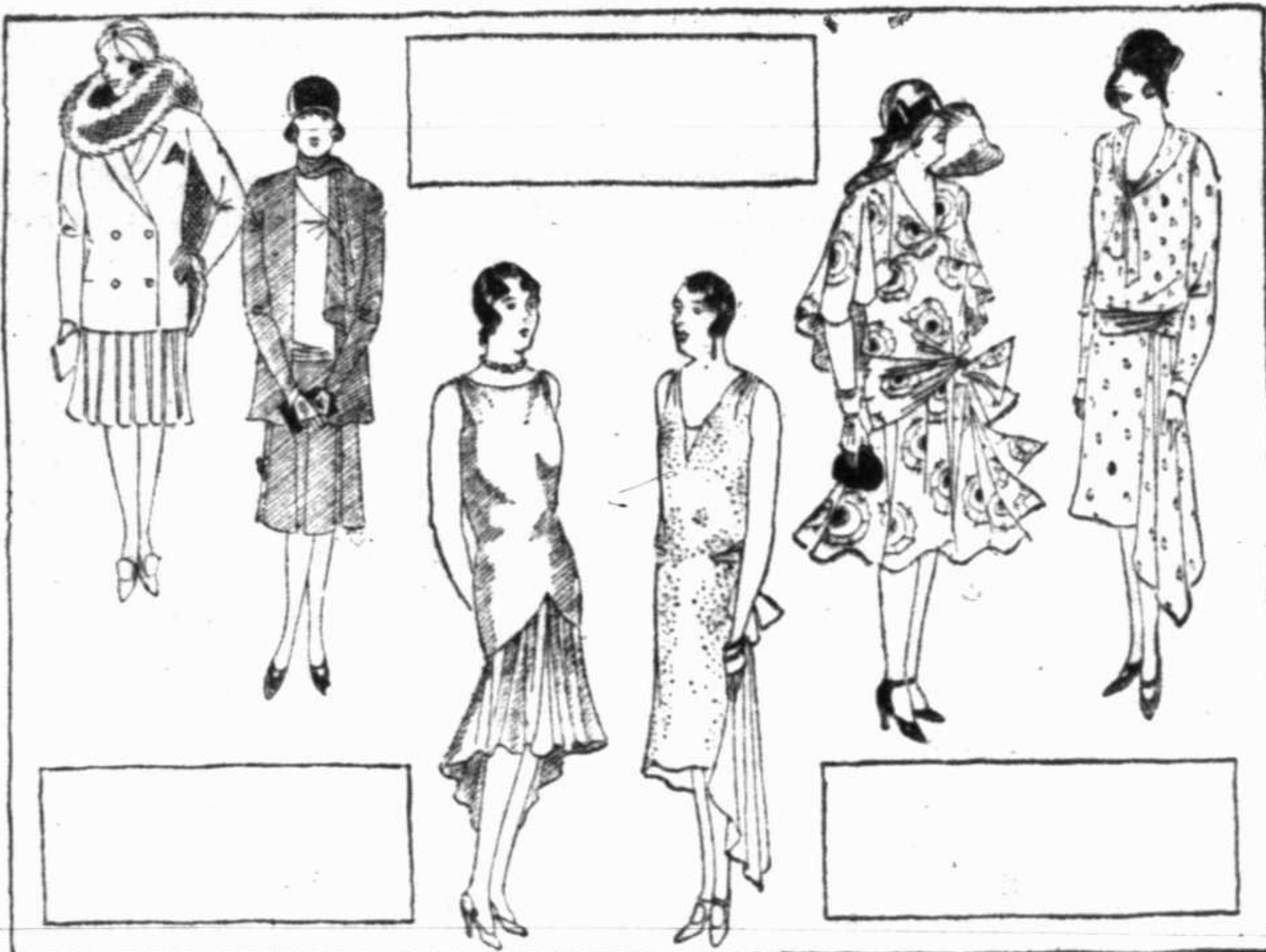

Slenderizing Lines In Dress Are Never Molded

In this season of the more fitted lines, with the flare important, the larger woman, whether she be in the "slightly stout" class or just tall and built on a large frame, has problems of her own. She requires long lines, not too closely fitted, and a somewhat modified flare. The lines should have the effect of pulling the figure down. She can neither stand the severely tailored lines nor the loose panels and floating ends her slimmer sister wears to advantage. Frequently women of this type make the mistake of wearing too small sizes, thinking they make her look smaller, when they have exactly the opposite effect. The fabric drawn taut about the figure not only makes the figure look larger, but gives the impression that the frock is a makeshift, because the larger size was not available.

Right and Wrong Way Lines should conceal rather than reveal the figure, but without the fluffy effects that add roundness. The lines should be straight, but not too straight, with broken surfaces, because the plain unbroken surface suggests expansion. The very snug hipline, belted, padded or smoothed, should be avoided, as should draperies of fabric that build the figure out. Draperies should conform to the long flowing line effect.

Three examples of the right and the wrong way for the larger woman to dress are shown in the sketch. In sports, afternoon and evening models. In the grouping at the left are shown two types of suits. The first, with its double-breasted effect, short revers collar, large fur scarf and full pleated skirt, is the too strictly tailored type that exaggerates size. The more correct type of suit is shown to the right of this grouping. It has more feminized lines, loose fit, circular, but not full, skirt, and the long silhouette effect. Taking the evening group next sketched at the center, a glance is sufficient to show the effect of the flatter princess lines with the lines pulled up in the front. Compare this model with its neighbor.

Save for a slight indication of the waistline over the hips, and a discreet flare, the lines are practically straight. Yet here we have the princess lines with the dip back emphasizing the long lines which achieve a slimmer figure. Not the difference in the neckline between this and the other model, and the absence of the heavy choker. The round neck with a heavy round choker are never becoming to the stout figure. The V neck gives the desired pull-down appearance. The third grouping illustrates the over draped, over flared, over feminized frock, with its tightly girdled hipline, as compared with the long, slim lines of the frock with the side drape. The waistline is almost normal, yet not conspicuous, and the long side drape helps to pull the costume down.

It is scarcely necessary to mention figured fabrics and colors. Many of the larger women make the mistake of wearing large figured fabrics, and conspicuous colors, though they must know better. But it is in the lines of the silhouette that the greater proportion make their mistakes.

Sheep Raising On Plaines Profitable

Numerous farmers of the South Plains have learned, during the last few years, that the raising of sheep is both a means of welcome income and of preventing the spread of avaricious plant pests, the worst of which is known as the blue weed.

One Lubbock county farmer, Mr. Fuchs, faced the prospect of blue weed taking his farm. He purchased 100 ewes and has consistently kept his herd at this figure for the last five years. Each year he sells the young lambs, for approximately \$10 each. His wool clip nets him between \$250 and \$300 a year, more than paying for any expense of feeding the herd.

The Fuchs farm has long been freed of blue weeds, the sheep fattening on these plants when the weeds are young.

New West Texas Railway Planned

Line From Abilene To Cross Plains Is Advanced By Chamber Of Commerce; Frank Kell Interested

ABILENE, June 20. (AP)—A new railroad, 45 miles long from Abilene to Cross Plains, was contemplated in plans announced here today by O. C. Anderson, chairman of the Abilene chamber of commerce railroad committee.

The road will be built as soon as financing is completed and a certificate of convenience and necessity obtained from the interstate commerce commission, he said.

Frank Kell, Abilene Falls, capitalist and pioneer builder of West Texas railroads, was reported to have agreed to take \$350,000 of the capital stock, personally float a \$400,000 to \$500,000 bond issue, direct the construction of the road, and operate it after it is built.

Citizens of Abilene will be asked to subscribe \$400,000 capital stock. Anderson said the chamber of commerce originated the plan and invited Kell to pass on the undertaking with the result Kell joined the enterprise. Anderson also said the local stock sale would be subscribed 100 per cent.

Solons Agree On Appropriations

Free Conference Committee From Senate And House Vote For \$10,638,216 For State Wards

AUSTIN, June 20. (AP)—Free conference committees from the senate and house today agreed on a compromise measure carrying an appropriation of \$10,638,216 for the care of state wards during 1930-31. The figure represented a cut in the senate bill of \$2,673,374 and an increase over the house bill of \$234,610.

Wakefield declared he was "all right" today and refused to discuss the case.

18 Members Proposed
The house has a bill calling for the same plan except one of the 18 members would be appointed by the governor. The house committee substituted its bill for the senate measure late today.

The house argued whether it should pass an excise tax or an occupation tax on gasoline. Montgomery of Edinburg proposed re-enactment of the existing gasoline tax statute except to increase the amount of the tax from two cents to four cents.

Tilton of Sealy, author of the excise tax bill, contended that many users of gasoline are escaping payment of the tax, because it is levied against sales. He said many of the large users, such as jobbers, bus owners and others shipped their gasoline from tank car lots from other states, thus avoiding the tax. The excise tax would levy against gasoline shipped in from other states and used in Texas, he said. Montgomery and Pope of Corpus Christi cautioned the house that the change over to an untied bill from one that had been tested in the courts might be costly in the end.

Hope To Conclude Religious Trouble

MEXICO CITY, June 20.—(AP)—Hope that the Vatican today permitting announcement of either settlement of the Mexican religious controversy or failure of the negotiations practically was given up this evening.

gas containing sulphur and having the odor of bad eggs.

The health officer said the gas was heavier than air because the two children who died, Ignacio Cenceros, 3, and Carlos Cenceros, 8, were asleep on a cot while those overcome either were standing or on higher ground at the time.

Sixteen persons, most of them Mexicans, were taken to hospitals. All but two had been released late today.

The impromptu court of inquiry convened by city and county officials summoned chemists and refinery and natural gas company officials in an effort to determine the origin of the gas and to attempt to prevent a recurrence.

Mayor R. E. Thomason, and County Judge E. B. McClintock questioned W. G. Hamilton, general manager of the Pasotex Petroleum company's refinery; A. L. Forbes, general superintendent of the El Paso Natural Gas company, and R. G. Collins of the Texas Company's refinery.

Everything Regular
The Pasotex company head said everything in his refinery was "perfectly regular." He declared he declared he would not deny that "West Texas crude oil has some hydrogen sulphide in it." He added that the gas was taken from the oil during the process of refining and burned at the plant.

It would have been impossible, Forbes said, for the poison gas to have come from the Natural Gas company's lines. "We made a thorough inspection of our lines and there was no indication of a pinhole leak," he added. "Besides, there is no trace of hydrogen sulphide in our gas. Natural gas is lighter than air."

Collins declared that the Texas Company's refinery, recently completed, was not yet in operation.

The mayor and county judge appointed several chemical experts to make a test of the water in the ponds near the Pasotex refinery.

Experts Called
Army chemical warfare experts were called on to help solve the mystery of the gas.

"The thing happened so suddenly we hardly realized it. I noticed a peculiar smell, started gasping for air and my throat seemed to start closing up. I tried to yell for the others to run but I could not. I staggered out into the yard."

"My wife was invited as a white or black, republican or democrat. She was invited because she happened to be the wife of a man who was a member of congress."

He added that southern democrats were trying to help themselves politically by insinuating that she voted against A. Smith.

The article said President Emilio Portes Galt has repeated that the Catholic clergy must submit to the main section of the barracks where the public exercise of its rites and conclusions "as can be seen, we still are in high water."

Bloodhounds Used

Bloodhounds from prison farms in this section also were on the trail. In a telephone conversation with the Houston Post-Dispatch tonight, Mrs. Hickman, wife of the manager, said fifteen of the men had been recaptured and possibly others not reported.

Two of the first three recaptured were slightly wounded at Henkle's Ferry when fired on by J. V. Henkle, Jr., aroused from sleep by shots fired. A negro from whom the convicts had commandeered a car.

Henkle fired into the group injuring two and capturing three.

The break, according to Emmett Moore, night guard, came about when Joe Williams, serving a term for burglary in Tarrant county, and Robert Massey, serving for a similar charge in Galveston county, asked permission to go to the hospital ward for medicine.

They returned shortly saying that they were unable to awaken the hospital attendants.

Guard Held Up
"They then covered me with a gun," Moore said, "ordering me to stick them up. I tried to talk them out of breaking, but they said their mind was made up."

After taking his keys, Moore said, Williams and Massey went into the main section of the barracks where a guard Cook and Red Cash, two other guards were on duty. As if by a pre-arranged signal, convicts inside the main barracks pulled knives and rushed at Cash and Cook.

Williams and Massey, Moore said, "took the keys and ran for the doors of the building, unlocking them and inviting all of the prisoners to make a break for freedom."

"Some of the men left, at once while others were hesitating, taking several minutes to make up their mind. They then broke through the door for an hour."

Outside the building, Williams forced Cash to exchange clothes with him. They then lined the three guards up in front of them and forced the guards to start running.

"They ran up half of the four miles to the river," Cook said, "part of the time they rode us, took, while the others walked. They let us slow down to a walk to allow us to catch our breath."

When questioned by the guards as to whether or not they intended to injure him, Williams, according to the guards, declared that they would not.

"When we got to Hinkles bridge and the convicts saw a car approaching," Cook said, "Williams made all the convicts take the car except himself and me. He was dressed in Cash's clothes and did not look like a convict. He ordered me to find the car, and when I argued that I would be run over he said that I was covered from both sides of the road."

"I then ran and flagged the car. It was a Ford coupe with a negro driver, and when he stopped, convicts swarmed from the ditched. "The negro came out of the car running and sped down the road. Williams fired four times at him, but I do not think he hit him."

When the convicts attempted to start the car, they found the starter hung, and this gave me my chance to escape. I jumped over the fence and met Cash and Moore, and we started running across the field to a cotton patch."

Cook declared that the three of them tramped around for nearly an hour and finally came back to near the river, where they could hear the convicts still crossing the bridge. Later they came to a negro's house, but were refused admittance, and then tramped around the river bank until daylight when they made their way back to the farm.

Those who stayed at the farm remained indoors for an hour or more, until a trusty summoned courage enough to give the alarm. In a few minutes the other farm guards came running and the alarm was flashed all over this section.

"Should the school year be changed to run the full twelve months the city would be able to care for all the job-seekers as only about one-fourth of this number would be released at once."

hours of almost continuous grilling. According to this confession Snook met Miss Hix about three years ago, and the friendship had continued in an intimate way, since. Snook expressed a desire "to get it over with quickly," and told Chester that he would plead guilty to a first degree indictment which Chester will seek before the grand jury tomorrow morning the paper said.

Chester said he believes Snook may change his mind and fight for a penalty less than execution.

Aided Her Education
During three years, Snook said he aided in her education, but "I found out it was not appreciated as much as I thought it should be," their association was "not a love affair," and they had no thought of marriage. Miss Hix, he claims, devoted more determined attitude in regard to dictating my movements," the Journal continued.

He says that the "final culmination" of "this occurred Thursday night. He met her about 8:30 drove to the rifle range, and they began to quarrel. The girl, Snook says, threatened his wife and baby with death if he dared go out of the city for the week-end with them.

Struggle Made
Then the confession states, the student reached for the revolver. There was a struggle. Snook reached over the head with intent, he says, to stun her. "She continued to fight desperately and an increased number of blows of increasing force was necessary to stop her," he continued.

Snook claims that he thought her skull was fractured and that she was suffering so he severed her jugular vein with his knife. Some of his things had scattered during the struggle so he retrieved them, left her body on the ground and drove away.

He had the hammer on the back part of the seat of his car, he said, and he put this in the rear of his machine as he drove away. He went over a quarry bridge on the way home and tossed Miss Hix's purse, from which the revolver was missing, into the water. He could not account for the missing revolver at the time, but believed it dropped out during the struggle. The revolver was found in Miss Hix's apartment shortly after her death. When Dr. Snook first was implicated he admitted giving it to the girl for her own protection.

In his confession Snook did not say that he killed her with the hammer. He said he used it "to quiet her." Prosecutor Chester said that he will base his demand for a first degree indictment on promediation grounds, saying that Snook's admissions would bring the death penalty, whether or not the case goes to trial before a jury.

At the bottom of his confession, Snook said he made the statement voluntarily, that no one threatened him or promised him anything for making it, and that he told the truth about the murder.

Blue Sky Bill Is Finally Approved

Measure, Written To Prevent The Sale Of Fraudulent Stock In Texas, Passed By Senate 15 To 8

AUSTIN, June 20. (P)—The "Blue Sky" bill, written for Mrs. Jane Y. McCallum, secretary of state, to prevent the sale of fraudulent stock in Texas, was finally passed, 15 to 8, in the senate today.

The measure has been the subject of recent debates during which Senator W. D. McFarland, Graham, assumed the leading role as opponent of the bill. He contended it dealt unfairly with independent oil operators who had pioneered in the petroleum industry in the state. The measure provides that the secretary of state be satisfied that the applicant for a permit to sell stock be of good business reputation and that the proposed plan of business is equitable.

Debut Plan Again Advocated

WASHINGTON, June 20. (P)—The export debut plan, eliminated from the farm relief program, was advocated today before a senate finance sub-committee by L. J. Taber, master of the National Grange, as the only method by which growers of surplus crops could receive the benefit of the tariff.

He said unless the farm was given a "drawback" like that given domestic manufacturers of improved goods for export, there "will be a different story to tell."

"You better tell the story because you are not going to get it," observed Senator Connally, democrat, of Texas.

"I am an optimist," Taber replied.

Johnson Measure Passed By Senate

AUSTIN, June 20. (P)—The Johnson house bill imposing a state tax of \$1,000 on emigrant agencies engaged in the hire of laborers for out of state employment was passed in the senate today, 28 to 0.

In addition to the state tax, a county levy based on population also is assessed.

Senator Walter Woodward, Coleman, obtained an amendment to the bill so that railroad companies engaged in interstate commerce would not be construed as coming under provisions of the act.

The measure repeals a similar bill passed during the first special session and which was attacked in federal court at Dallas as unconstitutional. Its purpose, members of the senate were told, was to prevent laborers needed on Texas farms and ranches from being transported outside the state.

VETS GIVEN PENSION

SENATE PASSES BILL AIDING VETERANS AND WIDOWS

AUSTIN, June 20. (P)—Confederate veterans were given a monthly pension of \$25 and each widow attaining the age of 75 the same amount in a bill by Representative Walter Acker, sr., of Houston, passed the senate today.

The vote was 29 to 0.

FORT MYERS, Fla., June 20. (P)—Before a court of his own people, at the annual dance of Green Corn today, Josie Billy, Seminole Indian medicine man, without the aid of an attorney or psychiatrist, will answer a charge of slaying Nuf-Che, widowed squaw, with a plea that he was temporarily insane while under the influence of liquor.

Deep in the everglades, the tribe has gathered to celebrate this festival and to try the medicine-man who in the past has sat in judgment upon his fellows.

What ever the verdict, and it may be death or trial by fire, it will be executed summarily, and without interference from the white men, for the courts have taken no action in the case. Seminole law has long taken precedence over Florida jurisprudence. Prosecutors have found the tribal language and customs an insurmountable barrier.

Philip Billy, also known as John-Billy, must likewise answer to the assembled tribesmen for a slaying which resulted from an argument over liquor. Charley Lee was killed during the argument.

The purpose of this club, other than to entertain the children is to provide more time for students of the class to present their stories. There are more than fifty students enrolled for the course.

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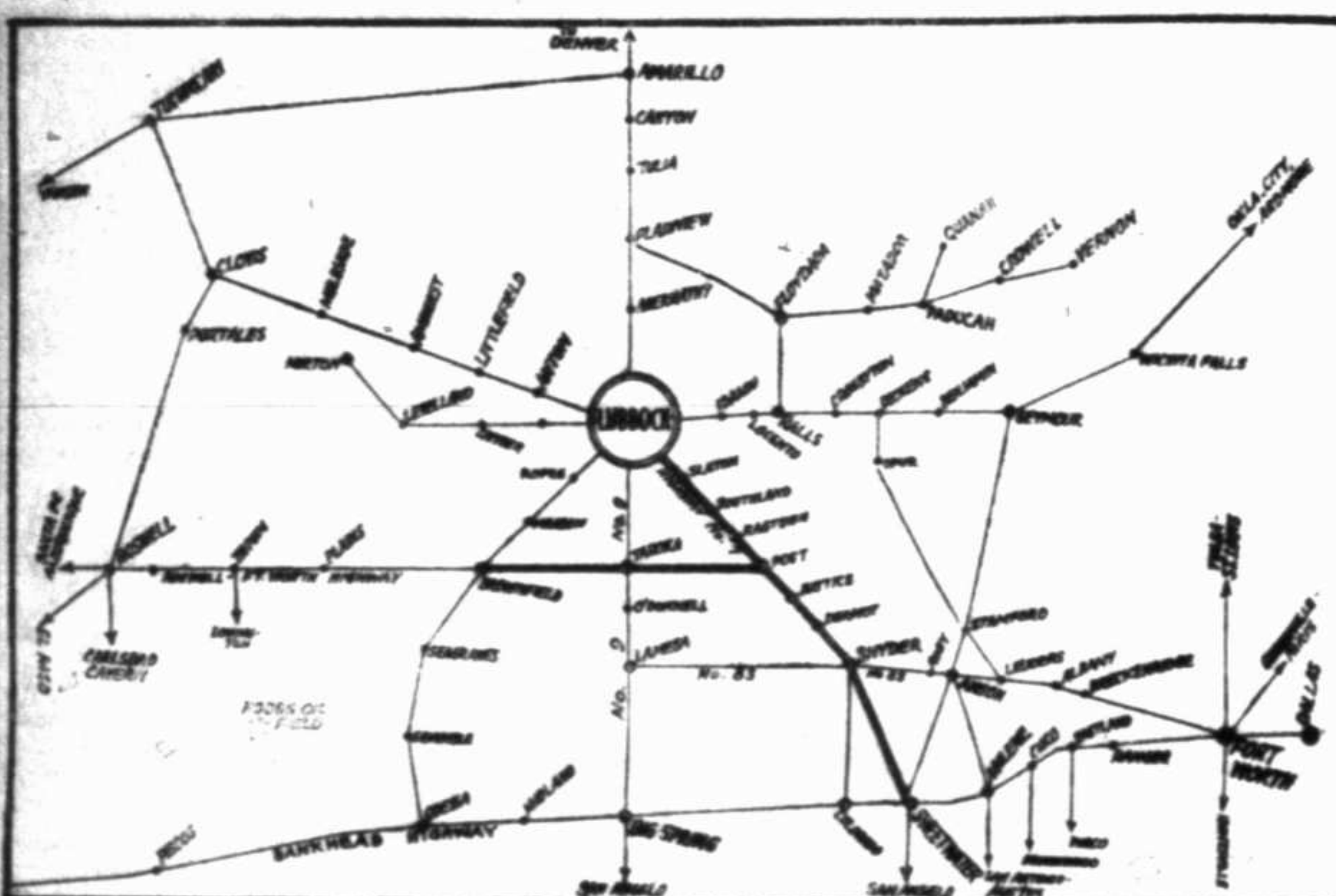
