A. Yes and no, depending upon the number of years he's been in office.

Anyone with 10 years vested service will not lose their retirement benefits. They will just have to wait until the appropriate age to draw the benefits.

Those with less than 10 years service have a variety of options depending upon their length of service and if they go to work for another government entity with the same retirement plan.

Hospital board election slated

The Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors Tuesday adopted an order for a directors' election to be held Saturday, May 5 to elect three directors to full two-year terms.

The terms of Virgil Stone, Linden Solomon and A.K. McCarley Jr. are expiring. Filing deadline is April 10 and drawing for a place on the ballot will be conducted April 11.

Qualified applicants must be a registered voter of the county and must have resided in the county for six months prior to filing. Candidates also must have a petition signed by at least 25 qualified electors asking that his name be printed on the ballot.

In other business, board secretary McCarley was appointed plan administrator for the hospital's pension plan to replace administrator Richard Murphy who has resigned effective Friday.

The board also appointed Dr. Richard Kretsinger as the Home Health Care Administrator to replace Murphy. Sue Dossey is the Home Care director, but policy states there must be an administrator as well.

The board agreed to purchase a cardiac monitor system for \$58,348 from Nihon Kohden to

replace the hospital's system that no longer works. The new system will include three bedside units and a central nursing station unit. The other bid submitted was for \$77,902 from Space Labs.

Murphy said the present cardiac monitor system is no longer working and that repairing the several-year-old system would be costly. He said portable units temporarily are being used in the care units until the new system can be installed.

The board approved new rates for health insurance. The rates for paid by the hospital and its employees will be the same, but the rates paid by persons whose employment with the hospital is terminated, but remain with the insurance program, will increase.

Murphy told the board that the firm which the hospital has contracted to recruit new physicians has recommended that the recruitment efforts be put on hold until a permanent administrator is hired.

"One of the aspects of recruitment is a permanent administrator," said Murphy.

The hospital board has contracted with Lubbock Methodist Hospital to provide and interim administrator until a permanent administrator can be found.

Other plays entered in the district meet were Kermit's "The Magician's Nephew, Crane's "Chamber Music" and Greenwood's "Anybody for Tea?"

Be counted! - 1990 census underway

CENSUS '90



Sunday, April 1, the 21st national "Census Day" in American history, marks the final phase of the nation's most important once-every-10-year statistical project: the Decennial Census of Population and Housing.

Census forms were mailed out to Mitchell County residents starting March 23 and Census workers have already started collecting the forms and checking household locations to up-date census maps. This will continue through April, 1990.

The big count will allow the U.S. Bureau of the Census to start painting America's portrait by collecting numbers from an estimated 106 million housing units and some 250 million people living in them, located in some 39,000 governmental units.

The basic reason for taking the 21st census is the same as cited 200 years in Article 1, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution: to provide the facts needed to divide the seats in the House of Representatives fairly among the states based on population, reflecting changes during the previous decade. Census numbers also are

used to redraw state and local legislative districts.

Beyond political representation, however, there is a great deal of federal and state money at stake in the final census numbers. Despite recent cutbacks, billions of federal dollars for a wide range of programs are distributed to local governments based on population, age, income and other census statistics.

State governments also use census figures to dispense shares of revenues to local governments that have been collected through statewide fuel, liquor, sales and tobacco taxes.

Not only do the census counts translate into government dollars for every community, they also are used for planning and improving public facilities and programs. State and local government plan-

ners use census facts to establish long-range, community plans, to develop capital improvement programs, to help locate new schools, to improve nutrition programs, to set up day-care centers and health clinics where they are most needed, to develop facilities for older people, and to provide better transportation.

The 1990 count is a "do-it-yourself" census taken largely by mail. Every household will have received a census questionnaire through the mail shortly before Sunday, April 1 - Census Day. One adult member in each household is asked to serve as census-taker. The job: to fill out the form and give it to the census workers who will call door-to-door to pick up or complete the forms and check them.

There are two census forms in

1990. The short form, taking about 15 minutes to fill, contains 144 basic population and housing questions. Five out of every six households will receive this short questionnaire. Questions asked include age, race, sex, marital status, and household relationship for each person in the household. Several questions about the housing unit also are on the basic form.

The remaining 17 percent of the households will get a longer form that may take about 45 minutes to complete. The long form contains the basic questions plus additional ones about the demographic and socioeconomic characteristics of each household member, as well as some additional housing questions. These long-form-only questions request information on income, ancestry, occupation, education, travel to work and housing costs. The information from this large sample will be statistically inflated to depict the entire population.

The Census Bureau is testing locally each Thursday at 10 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. at the Civic Center.

Cotton convention set April 5

Ways cotton producers can achieve their goals of the '90s to gain higher yields, premium quality and greater profits will be outlined in a seminar April 5 during the annual trade show and convention of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association. The convention annually draws more than 6,000 ginners, producers, officials and others in the industry.

The seminar will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from 1:15 to 4:30 p.m. in the banquet hall of the Memorial Civic Center in Lubbock, Texas. It will conclude the 33rd annual meeting of Plains Cotton Growers, which is open to all interested persons.

The significance of marketing fiber quality will be explained in the opening presentation by Dr. Don Ethridge, professor of agricultural economics at Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

Beginning in 1991, the system for grading cotton will change and this will impact on the way cotton is marketed. Ethridge will show how producers can use the new rules to do a better job of

marketing their crop. The growth and development of cotton, and how this relates to improved yield, quality and

profit, will be reviewed by Stephanie Johnson Hake of Memphis, Tenn.

County Oil & Gas Report

Two new producers with combined ability to pump 75 barrels of oil per day have been brought on line in the East Howard-Iatan Field, Mitchell County, by Mobil Producing of Midland.

The wells include the No. 255 and No. 260 Mary Foster, pumping 50 and 5 barrels of oil per day, respectively, along with 112 and 139 barrels of salt water.

Both wells are in a lease block nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

Production will be from sets of perforations ranging from 2,500 to 3,027 feet into the wellbore.

Chevron U.S.A. of Midland is preparing to conduct a re-entry operation for extended well life in the Westbrook Field, Mitchell

County, about five miles north of the Westbrook townsite.

The well currently is bottomed at 3,500 feet in the T&PRR Survey A-1849 Section 14 Block 29. It is designated as the No. 5407 North Westbrook Unit.

Discovered in 1921, the Westbrook Field currently has 703 active oil producers.

Bee Kay Oil of Midland has plugged and abandoned a depleted oil well in the North Coleman Ranch Field, Mitchell County, about eight miles north of Westbrook. The well was known as the No. 1 Simpson "A" and was located in the H&TCRR Survey Section 60 Block 97. Total depth was at 3,335 feet.

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet 1000, CentraNet 2000, and CentraNet 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

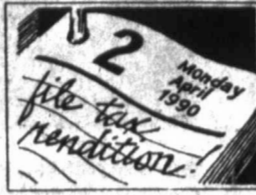
The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated, persons who wish to file or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS—



RENDER YOUR PROPERTY

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1990. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar form.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district wants a higher value for your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for

paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

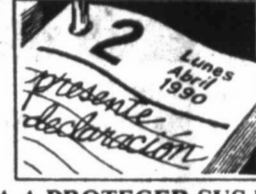
You can also file a report of decreased value, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1989. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1990.

The last day for filing or post-marking 1990 renditions is Monday, April 2. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the April 2 deadline.

Una declaración (rendition) es un reporte al distrito de valoración que enumera todas las pertenencias que usted tiene o controla a partir del primero de enero de 1990 sobre las cuales se pueden cobrar impuestos.

Usted debe presentar una declaración si es dueño de bienes muebles tangibles (tangibles personal property) que son usados para producir ingresos—tales como el inventario y otro equipo usado por una empresa.

El distrito de valoración puede exigir a cualquier contribuyente que entregue una declaración notificándole por escrito y enviándole un formulario para hacer su declaración.

Las ventajas de presentar una declaración:

valoración impone un valor más alto sobre su propiedad le debe de notificar por escrito de ese valor más alto y le debe de explicar como puede protestarlo ante la junta de revisión de valoración.

Usted registra su dirección correcta para que sus cuentas de impuestos sean enviadas a la dirección correcta. Si su cuenta es enviada a una dirección incorrecta, la ley aún lo hace responsable de que pague sus impuestos a tiempo o que pague cargos extra por hacer pagos tardíos.

Entregando un tipo especial de declaración llamado *reporte de valor decreciente*, usted puede notificar al distrito de valoración de daños graves que le ocurrieron a su propiedad en 1989. El distrito envía a alguien para que verifique los daños y se tome en cuenta para cuando se le asigne valor a su propiedad para 1990.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS



MAY LOWER YOUR HOME'S PROPERTY TAXES

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on that date. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium, or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners to lower their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. And, if you receive the over-65 exemption, you also qualify for a ceiling on school taxes. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts.

Who should apply? If you received a homestead exemption on your home in 1989, you won't need to

re-apply for 1990 unless your chief appraiser requires it.

If you became 65 or disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1990.

File your homestead exemption with your local appraisal office at the address shown below.

The last day to file for applications is April 30, 1990. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time to file.

EXENCIONES DE RESIDENCIA



PUEDEN REDUCIR LOS IMPUESTOS QUE PAGA POR SU CASA

Una exención de residencia le ayuda a reducir los impuestos sobre la propiedad que tiene que pagar por su residencia reduciendo el valor que se utiliza como base para calcular sus impuestos. Por ejemplo, si su casa está valorada en \$50,000 y usted recibe una exención de residencia de \$5,000, usted va a pagar impuestos de residencia como si su valor fuese de \$45,000.

Usted puede recibir una exención de residencia si usted era el dueño de su casa el primero de enero y la usaba como su residencia principal en la misma fecha. No importa si su residencia es una casa, un condominio o una casa remolque.

Hay exenciones que cualquier persona que es dueño(a) de su residencia puede usar para bajar sus impuestos escolares. Exenciones adicionales se ofrecen a dueños de residencia que están incapacitados o tienen 65 años o más. Si usted recibe la exención porque su edad es mas de sesenta y cinco años, usted califica para un límite en los impuestos escolares. Otras exenciones pueden ofrecerse a propietarios por distritos escolares, condados, ciudades y distritos escolares.

Solicite todas las exenciones que usted puede recibir en la oficina local del distrito de valoración en la dirección que se cita abajo.

Si usted recibió una exención para su residencia actual en 1989, usted no necesita solicitarla para 1990 a menos que el jefe de valoración pida que haga una nueva solicitud.

Sin embargo, si usted cumplió 65 años o quedó incapacitado antes del primero de enero haga una nueva solicitud para recibir exenciones adicionales.

Si usted no ha recibido una exención para su residencia actual o si se cambió de casa haga una nueva solicitud para 1990.

El último día para hacer su solicitud es el 30 de Abril de 1990. Comuníquese con su distrito de valoración antes de esa fecha si necesita más tiempo para hacerla.

PRODUCTIVITY APPRAISAL



MAY LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR FARM, RANCH, OR TIMBERLAND

Texas law provides farmers and ranchers, and timber growers with a way to lower their property taxes, known as productivity appraisal.

If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock, or timber, instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity appraisal can lower the taxable value of your land, and lower your property taxes as a result.

If your land has never received productivity appraisal, you must apply to the appraisal district no later than Monday, April 30, to get

tax benefits for 1990. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

If your land already receives agricultural or timber appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If an annual application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

El último día que usted puede solicitar una valoración es el Lunes, 30 de Abril para recibir este beneficio de los impuestos en el año 1990. Si usted no puede cumplir con este plazo, puede usted solicitar, pero usted tendrá que pagar multa. Infórmese con la oficina de valoración del condado.

Call Return - enables the customer to automatically redial the telephone number of the most recent incoming call. If the number is busy, Call Return will continue to dial the number for up to 30 minutes, or until it completes the call.

Priority Call - provides the customer with a distinctive alerting signal, ring or Call Waiting Tone (if the customer has subscribed to Call Waiting), when the customer is called from a maximum of three preselected telephone numbers.

Call Trace - enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding - enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.

YOUR INTRODUCTION TO THE 1990 CENSUS

The Bicentennial Census

It's on the way. It will be here before you can say "everybody counts."

The 1990 Census will be the 21st in the nation's history and the largest and most complex ever undertaken. The Census Bureau expects to count 250 million people and 106 million housing units.

Why A Census?

It's part of the U.S. Constitution. Article I, Section 2 says:

"Representations... shall be apportioned among the several States... according to their respective Numbers... The actual Enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of Ten years, in such manner as [Congress] shall by Law direct."

How Important Are You?

Success of the census depends on you, on everyone.

In 1990, questionnaires will be delivered to more than 106 million housing units and living quarters in the country. More than 300,000 census takers and support personnel will help conduct the census and add up the final results.

How well you cooperate - this means completing and returning your questionnaire - will determine how accurate the census will be.

What's Ahead?

About a week before Census Day (April 1, 1990) most households will receive a questionnaire by mail. Others, depending on location, will have forms delivered by census takers. Roughly five out of six households will receive a short form. About one out of six households will be asked to fill out a longer form.

What Will Be Asked?

The questions are basic. The short form asks about race, Hispanic origin, age, marital status; whether you rent or own your residence, the number of rooms, etc. The longer form asks additional questions on ancestry, employment, education, income, type of housing, utilities, and so on.

If You're Not Counted

For a number of reasons, about 2.2 million people were not counted in the last census (about 1 percent). This is called an undercount. Among minority populations the percentage was higher - about 6 percent.

Unfortunately, an undercount can result in flawed decisions. Inaccurate counts can curtail projects and cause

What Happens To Your Answers?

Once the Census Bureau receives your questionnaire, a key part of our work begins. If the questionnaire is incomplete, a census employee must contact you to obtain the information. Then the answers on your questionnaire are combined with those from other questionnaires to produce statistical totals for various geographic areas. It is these combined numbers, not your personal answers, that are published and put to thousands of uses.

What Kinds Of Uses?

The population count for your area is used to determine how many seats your state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives. States use the numbers to allocate seats in their legislatures.

Billions of dollars in federal funds are returned to states, local governments, and American Indian reservations and Alaska Native villages. State funds are returned to cities and counties. Amounts are based in part on population or housing data. Beyond that, planners use census facts to determine where to locate such facilities as hospitals, schools, day care and senior citizen centers. Various social programs receive funds based on census information. Businesses use the data for decisions involving expansion and jobs.

The Census Is Confidential

So, why not stand up and count yourself in the census? Neither a census taker nor any other employee of the Census Bureau can reveal information about you or your household. Census personnel take an oath to uphold this confidence. Failure to do so can mean five years in prison and \$5,000 in fines. And what about other federal agencies, can they get your census information? The answer is NO!

Title 13 of the U.S. Code prevents any agency - Immigration, the FBI, the IRS, the courts, the military, welfare agencies - from getting any specific information about you. In fact, personal information from the 1990 Census will be locked up until the year 2062.

What Will The 1990 Census Tell Us?

- How the nation is changing.
- The condition of housing.
- Education, employment, and income information about your area.
- The census takes the social and economic pulse of the nation.

Texas A&M study finds roadside vendors make taxpayers pay

COLLEGE STATION - Roadside vendors along Texas highways are not just farmers selling vegetables anymore, and those vendors will end up costing taxpayers more than \$5 million over the next five years, according to a study by the Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) at Texas A&M University.

Fewer than 3 percent of roadside vendors surveyed are classified as "the farmer selling his goods near his home on the road," says Jack Lamkin, supervisor of the six-person TTI team that conducted the study for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (SDHPT). Nearly 70 percent sell commercial items. More than 60 percent use the highway right-of-way due to heavy traffic, wide shoulders and nearby vendors, the study found.

Although traveling merchants foster pavement damage, increase litter problems and raise chances for traffic accidents - all highway rights-of-way and all rent-free - the present state policy of doing nothing is likely to continue, said Lamkin.

"We have a problem out there that will increase, but it is not perceived as a vital social or safety issue," Lamkin said. "There is just no major outcry to stamp out highway vendors."

The state highway department spends more than \$1.6 million a year just in maintenance and repair at roadside vending sites, the study found. Pavement and shoulder repair, vegetation and soil mending, litter cleanup and sign removal or replacement are major expenses.

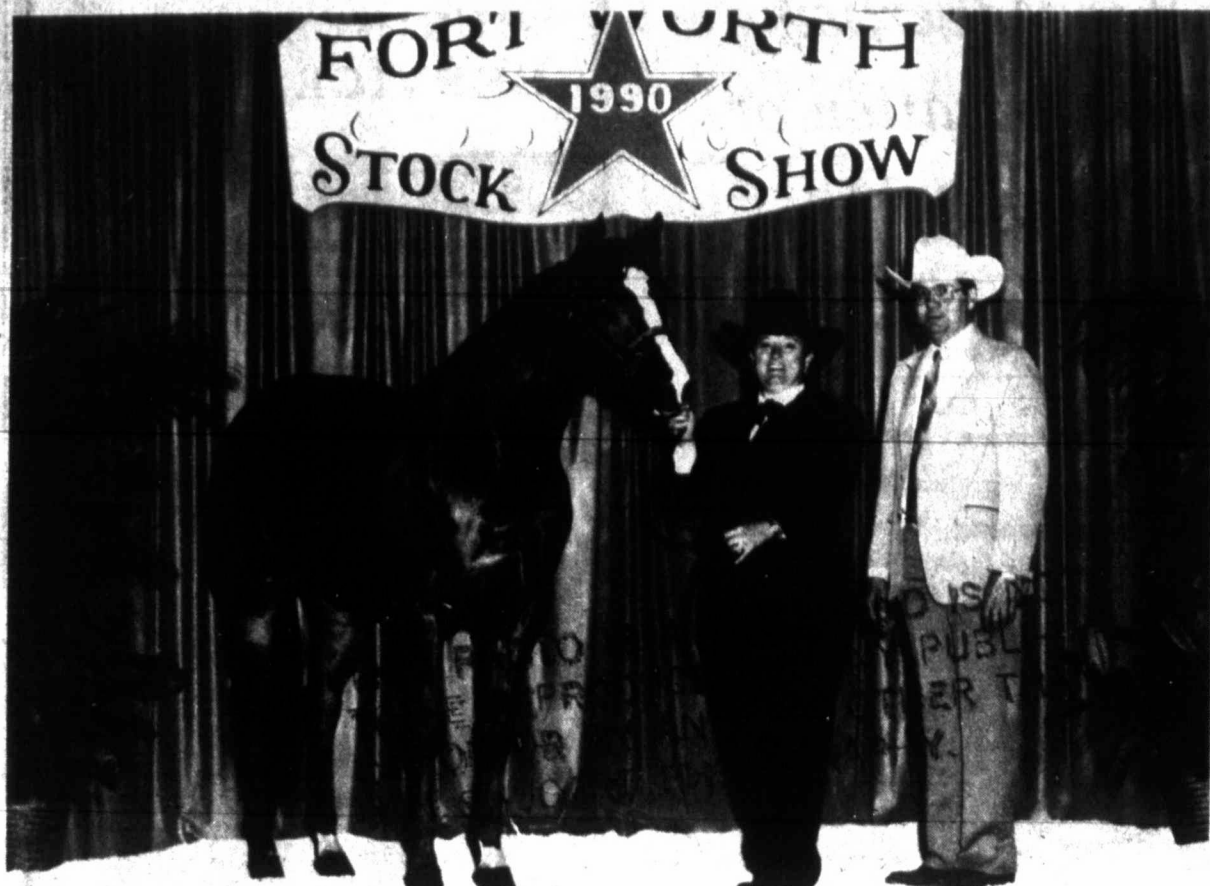
