Ginning Figures For Past Years Show Big Spread

Cotton's history in Hall County, as far as ginning figures are concerned, has followed an uncertain course. Some bumper crops have been made along with the failures. All are the direct result of the amount of rainfall received—and damage from wind, hail and insects. Acreage controls also have resulted in smaller figures.

The biggest crop of cotton ever produced was 88,214 bales in 1949, according to data in the office of W. B. Hooser, county agent. Smallest crop on record was 113 bales, which was listed in 1899, the first year the crop was grown here.

Dr. P. L. Vardy, Pioneer Citizen Of Estelline, Passes Away Tuesday

One of Hall County's first doctors, Dr. P. L. Vardy, died Tuesday in the Childrens General Hospital. Dr. Vardy had practiced medicine in Estelline for 58 years.

Funeral services will be conducted today at 4:00 p. m. in the First Methodist Church of Estelline with Rev. Albert Cooper of Mobeetie, formerly of Estelline, and Rev. E. E. White of Childress officiating.

P. L. Vardy was born January 8, 1871 in Parker County. He first came to Hall County in 1892 and filed on some land near Turkey Creek. He returned to Parker County eight months later, but returned to Hall County the following year to work on the Mill Iron Ranch. After working there for three years, Vardy enrolled in Missouri Medical College in St. Louis.

Farmers Warned To Dispose Of Excess Cotton Before Maturity

Many Hall County farmers are delaying disposition of their excess cotton, with many fields reaching maturity, according to information released out of the county ASC office this week.

It was pointed out that this delay in disposing of the excess cotton may cause undue hardships on uninformed producers who do not understand the need to clear up their records.

"The County ASC committee realizes there has been many delays in the measuring of his cotton crop," Lynn L. McKown, ASC office manager stated Wednesday. "The committee recognizes that this was one of the hardest crops to measure we have ever experienced. But the law is clear regarding the disposition of all cotton in excess of the farm acreage allotment."

All excess cotton must be destroyed or a penalty of 17 cents per pound will be assessed on the excess, it was pointed out. In addition to this, the producer loses the advantage of price support on all cotton on which he or his landlord has an interest.

Every one in the ASC knows that it is not a pleasant task to

Army Sgt. Bill R. Jenkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Jenkins, of Hedley, is scheduled to take part in the National Aircraft Show at Philadelphia International Airport, Sept. 3-5, according to information furnished by the Army News Center at Kansas City, Mo.

The army's part of the show will feature a square dance team of helicopters moving to the steps of the caller's chant. These acts will demonstrate the maneuverability of the helicopter.

A mock battle with infantrymen and artillerymen turned "helitroopers" and brought in by transport "copters" will illustrate how aircraft can supply and support the Army's "flying cavalry" in event of war.

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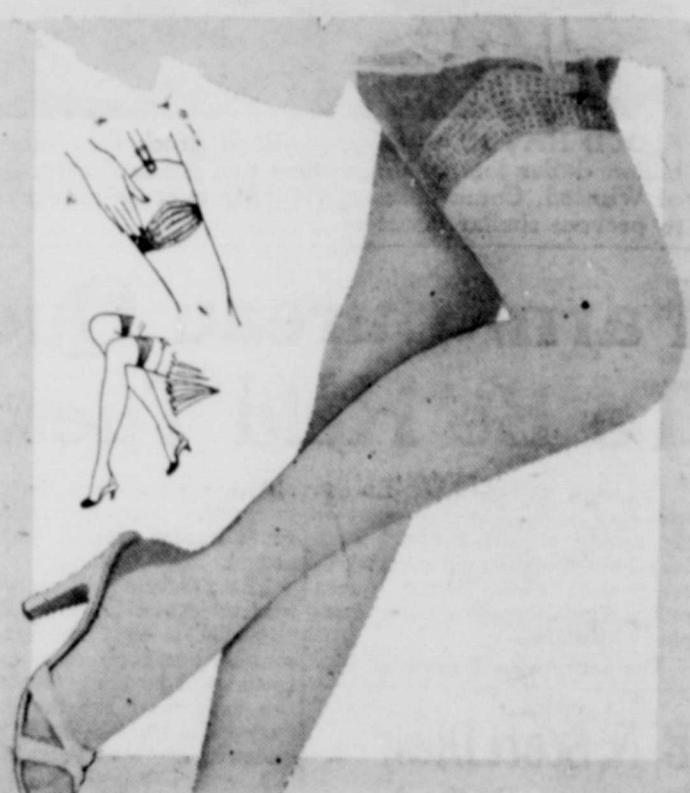
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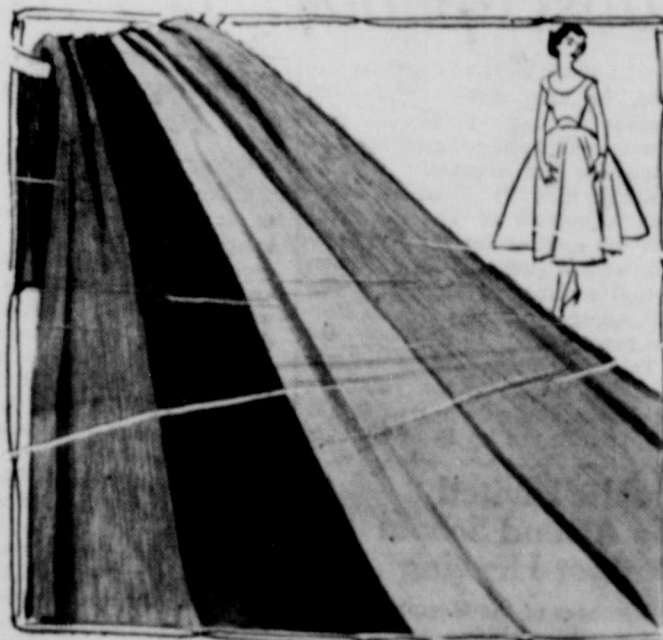
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Report From Washington

Back To Washington For Committee Work

QUOTING OUR NEIGHBORS

Why wait? Why wait until the horse is stolen? Why wait until a grand jury meets? Why wait until a newspaper unearths a scandal?

Anyone who handles public funds should be required by law to publish a full accounting of same at regular intervals. Frankly—both the lawmakers and the public are to blame for this in public office.

Every state in the Union, with few exceptions, and Texas is one of the exceptions, requires that every public official who handles public funds publish a full accounting of same at stated intervals.

When legislators fail to act it is time for the people to act. It is time for the people to take a hand in drafting legislation or electing men who will do so.

During the last session of the legislature there were two bills introduced by Representative Elbert Reeves of Matador, to force publication of financial statements by the Commissioner's Courts, the school districts, and by other groups handling public monies.

Why weren't these bills passed? That's what the people would like to know.

We think the people should ask their elected representatives just why those bills were not passed. Any state failing to pass such legislation is guilty of tempting public officials to pocket the people's cash. It is just as guilty as the man who takes it.

Theft of public funds is not uncommon in such states where financial reports are not required.

And thievery will continue until such time as the people demand of their elected representatives that laws be passed that remove such temptations, by requiring published reports of all receipts and disbursements by all officials entrusted with the collection and distribution of public money.—Ochiltree County Herald.

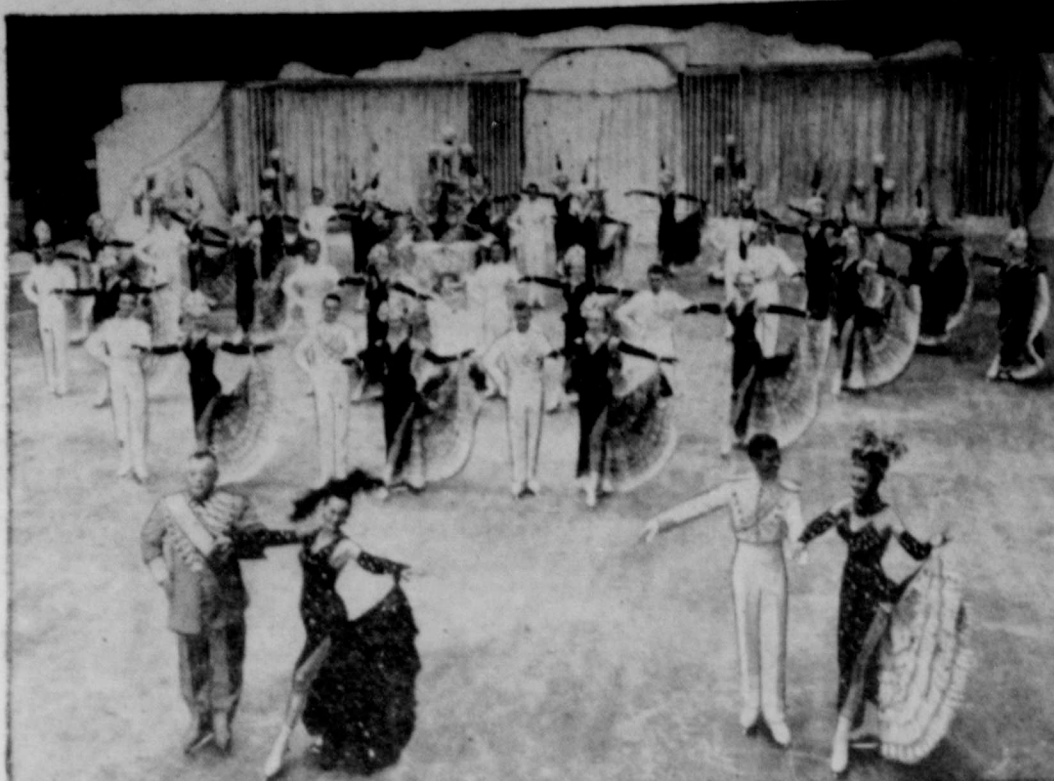

Louis, now a branch of Washington University. After his graduation in 1897, he came back to Estelline and began his long medical career there.

Dr. Vardy was united in marriage to Miss Mary E. Eddins on Oct. 11, 1899, in Chico, Texas. Five children, three boys and two girls, were born to the couple.

In the early days of Estelline and of Dr. Vardy's practice, he made his calls on horseback over a radius of about thirty-five miles. Estelline's pioneer horse-and-buggy doctor bought his first automobile, an E.M.F., in 1910. Dr. Vardy was featured in an article written by Clarence R. Wharton in his "Texas Under Many Flags" which was published in 1930 by the American Historical Society.

Dr. Vardy was a member of the Armstrong, Donley, Childress, Collingsworth and Hall County Medical Societies. He was also an honorary member of the Texas State Medical Association. 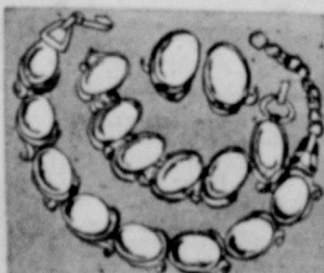
