at least bring up Ira Lee Watkins' history on up to date. And some day someone will. We have used Watkins' history several times and in several ways since we got permission to do so years ago.

Ira Lee will probably never know how many people have copies of his history in the files and cut outs of the News-Record through the years.

Most of the old stalwarts of the early years have gone on to their reward. Uncle Bill Kellis, one of the founders of this paper, sold out to me in 1944. He had seen and made history here. He served as the editor, the school teacher, a postmaster, a county attorney and county surveyor, state legislator, and historian.

I heard him make a short talk at a Jackson Day banquet once in San Angelo at the Cactus Hotel. He said his father knew Andrew Jackson.

He laughingly once told that people considered him a sort of atheist when he was younger. Then later, they all thought he was about the most religious guy around.

He loved to poke ridicule and acid remarks toward politicians and those that he found fault with. His Book of Jim, about Jim Ferguson, was a masterpiece of satire. His Book of Leo, about W. Lee O'Daniel, was well worth reading. He could have had good jobs writing editorials for the big state dailies if he had accepted offers made to him. But he was content to live and stay in Sterling.

His death in forty-five was perhaps the beginning of the end for the most of the old timers around here. They pass in review now—W. L. and R. W. Foster, Malcom Black, D. C. Durham, J. T. Davis, P. D. Coulson, B. F. Brown, J. S. Cole, Fannie and Jeff Copeland, Hank Davis, Shorty Williams, J. L. Glass, Gid Ainsworth, J. S. Augustine—Dr. W. B. Everitt, Neal Reed, Mrs. J. H. Bugg, and on and on—many that I can't recall or never even heard of.

All had a big part in the settling and making of Sterling County.

Sometimes I think of the businesses that have folded up around here in the last two decades: The Santa Fe railroad, Palace Theater, Caperton's Chevrolet, Johnson Ford Co., Chapple's, City Cafe, Cole Grocery, Pearce Electric Co., Lumber Yard, and some little or small ones that changed owners or closed.

Time marches on. What will the next seventy-five years bring to Sterling?

The county will probably be criss-crossed by a couple of super four lane highways and the town missed. A business route or a service route will get one into Sterling City. If cars and speed increase a lot in the future—as in the past—it'll only be a breeze to sail into San Angelo or Big Spring. (If you can get on to the freeway without any trouble.)

In all likelihood there will be private landing strips at ranches and home for private planes or helicopters—owned like cars today. Land held in settlement of estates and holdings.

Mrs. Nora Coulson Buried Thursday

Mrs. Nora Coulson, 78, member of a pioneer Sterling County family, died Tuesday at 7 p.m. in Sterling County Hospital after a long illness.

Funeral was held Thursday in the First Methodist Church here with burial in Foster Cemetery directed by Lowe Funeral Home.

Officiating at the services were the pastor, Rev. Bill Wiemers and Marion Hays, Church of Christ minister.

Born July 4, 1887 near Sterling City, she was a daughter of the late R. W. Foster who came to this area before the county was organized and while it was still a part of Tom Green County.

She was married to C. L. Coulson on Dec. 27, 1904. A West Texas druggist and rancher, Mr. Coulson died in 1961.

Mrs. Coulson was active in the First Methodist Church of which she was a life-long member.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Ira Lee Watkins of Midland, two granddaughters, Mrs. Deanna Mercurio of Houston and Mrs. Karla Jean Brown of San Angelo and a great granddaughter, Angela Mercurio of Houston, and one brother, T. F. Foster of Sterling City.

The program was printed on the form of a pineapple; everything carried out the South Sea Island theme.

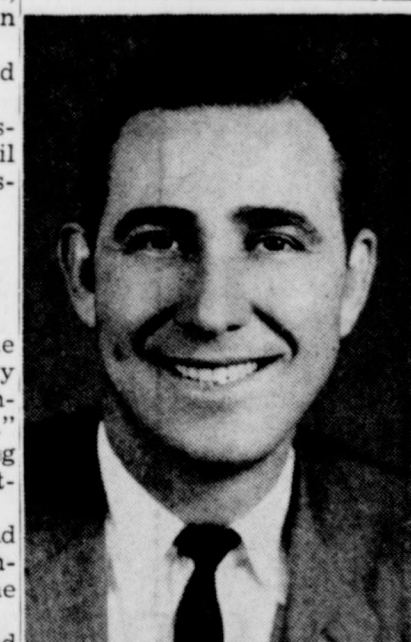
Golden Wedding Observed by Reeds

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Perfect Coffee Always

Americans are the world's greatest coffee lovers, downing 441,000,000 cups daily. Stands to reason that making perfect coffee should be one of a home-maker's special talents.

Whether you perk, drip, or vacuum brew, there are certain inviolate rules: measure carefully, never guess or skimp (one level standard measure for every cup, and one for the pot); use freshly drawn cold water and superior blends of coffee; learn to judge the deep, non-watery color and flavorful aroma of excellent brew; and keep the coffee-maker spotlessly clean to prevent natural coffee oils from clinging to the inside of the pot and spoiling flavor. Stainless steel coffee-makers are the easiest to keep clean (use a sponge or cloth and mild detergent, never an abrasive), and because of their smart styling, can be brought right to the table.

Unless you're preparing demitasse, never brew less than two-thirds the maximum capacity of your coffee-maker. Consider owning both a small and large stainless steel coffee-maker.

For a gourmet touch—and a variety in taste—serve demitasse, extra strong coffee served in small cups, after dinner. Prepare by using two, instead of one, level standard measures of coffee per cup in drip or vacuum method. Go continental with Dutch coffee—put a cinnamon stick in each cup of demitasse, then float butter on top.

Brew espresso-flavor coffee right in your stainless steel coffee-maker without special equipment. After brewing coffee in regular fashion, simply add one measure of instant coffee for every cup, stir well, and serve in demitasse cups.

Always remember, coffee is most perfect when freshly prepared and served piping hot.

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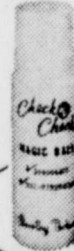
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AS IT LOOKS
FROM HERE

Washington, D. C. — Future historians will undoubtedly mark September 2, 1945, as a significant turning point in the affairs of the United States, as well as the world. The history of World War II ended on this date with the surrender of the Japanese, but there is also another important significance.

At that exact time the U. S. stood alone on a pinnacle of power. No other nation anywhere on the earth could challenge us.

Both allies and the vanquished had to turn to us for assistance. Russia could not have saved herself without the equipment we had given her. Europe could not have rebuilt itself without our wealth. Smaller nations everywhere had no other place to look for help except to America.

Also at this exact time it seemed that we developed a sort of complex half apologizing for having won the war in the first place. Ever since VJ Day it seems some self-consciousness has bitten deep into us and has affected our foreign policy. At times we have seemed to apologize for our power. This appeared to be the case with Berlin, Korea and the Middle East, which were dealt with by several Administrations.

This is what sets Viet Nam apart from other periods of actual wartime. Other wars, with all their agonies, were made bearable by an enthusiasm for what we felt was right and a confidence in our ability to bring victory. What we knew we had to do was to rise up and fight.

This attitude seems to be lacking in our conduct of the war in Viet Nam.

The evidence of this is now being demonstrated in Geneva where Secretary of State Rusk is trying valiantly to gain support from European leaders for the United States' position in Viet Nam.

Secretary Rusk admits that our prestige is down in Europe because "it has been so long since the United States has had a resounding success or victory."

Europeans have observed the hesitancy and reluctance of the United States to use its power — in Berlin, in Korea, at the Bay of Pigs — and now what appears to them to be a stalemate in Viet Nam.

The forces of history have not changed. Despite the introduction of nuclear weapons, a nation is not regarded as a great power if it shrinks from the use of its strength when attacked. It is doubtful that under such conditions a nation could expect allies to flock to its side when it is said we only have "limited goals" and those goals not

clearly defined.

England's Winston Churchill did not rally the free world to Britain's side by calling for restraint against the Nazis or giving the half-V sign.

These are the things which make it difficult for our friends abroad to understand. Voices of the "no win" policy for the United States are loud and clear. They were mistaken by a well known Canadian newspaperman and Canadian Parliamentarian who recently visited Washington. Before coming they thought "American public opinion was shifting toward disengagement in Viet Nam and some kind of a rapprochement toward Red China."

After being in Washington a few days the Canadians found a different view. "Right or wrong, The vast majority of Americans still cling to the opinion that the war in Viet Nam must be fought to the bitter end, that Communism must be contained in Southeast Asia and that it must be stopped there if we do not want it to come over here."

Certainly most people would like to see a peaceful settlement in South Viet Nam, but who can imagine a "peaceful settlement" under prevailing conditions and attitudes.

Indications are that Mr. W. Averell Harriman will soon set off on another round of travels to other nations to explore the possibility of a negotiated settlement.

Mr. Harriman's trip has added significance by statements from Ambassador Arthur Goldberg, calling for "mutual cessation of all types of hostilities in Viet Nam and a new Geneva Conference to reaffirm the 1954 and 1962 Agreements."

It seems time that we should conduct our affairs in such a way that those who want peace may come to us instead of our doing all the going.

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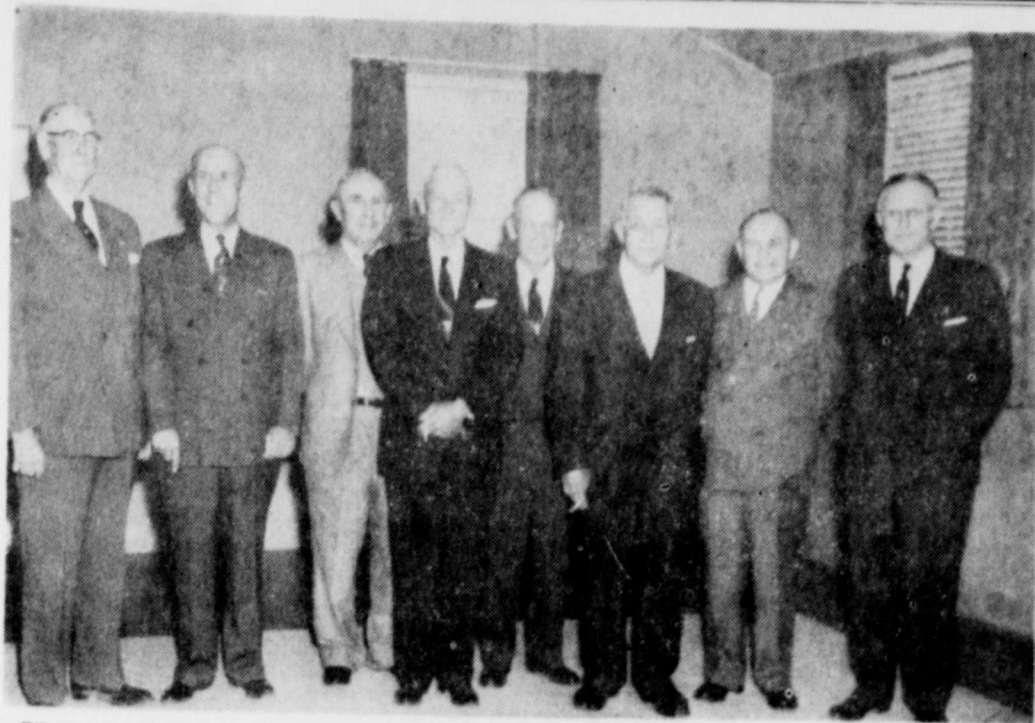


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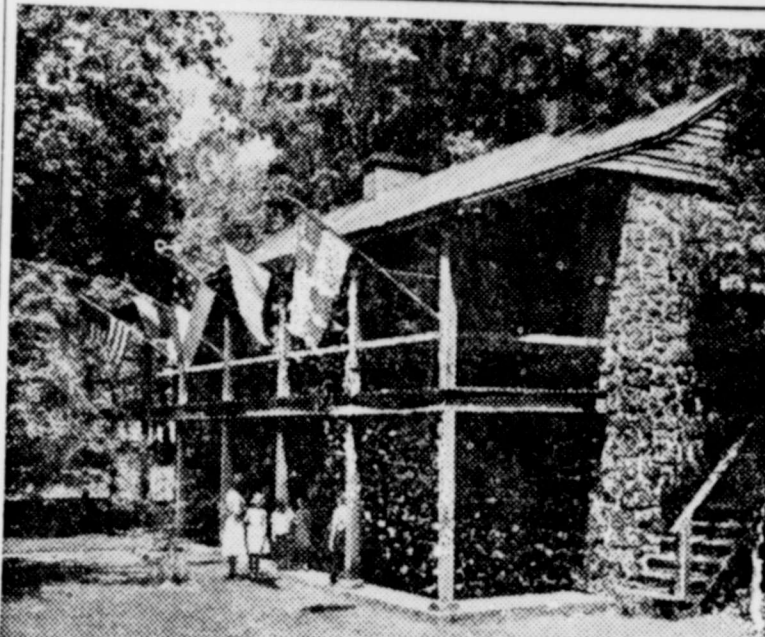

INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS

... a must in Economic Development

Obtaining leads on industries that might locate in a community is one of the hardest parts of any sound economic development program. The lack of an industrial prospecting program that produces several leads may cause serious mistakes by a community in financing or other endeavors to attract unsound or unattractive industry. A community needs a well balanced program, combining all the techniques and utilizing all of the sources that will give it increased effectiveness and chances for real success.

LOCAL PEOPLE AS A SOURCE OF INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS — usually provide a sound reason or give the community a competitive advantage in attracting the industry.

—**BUSINESSMEN**—should ask the company representatives they buy from if the company needs additional manufacturing facilities to serve this market area, also, service stations, restaurants and motel people can ask their customers.

—**CITIZENS**—who know someone that works for an industry should inquire if that industry might be interested in locating a plant.

—**EXISTING INDUSTRY**—may need a companion industry to supply them with raw materials or services. Expansion of existing industry is sound economic development.

—**LOCAL IDEAS**—can provide leads for the local people to establish an industry of their own or attract a certain type industry.

—**EX-CITIZENS**—should be contacted, advising them and asking their help to obtain leads on any industry that could logically locate in the town.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITY — should utilize such programs as direct mail, asking local citizens to call on industries when they are on a trip — watching all news media for possible leads or indications that a company might expand.

COOPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES — such as utilities, banks, railroads, regional and state development organizations can provide leads for new industry. Keep all of these organizations fully advised of the local programs, advantages, activities and community interest for attracting new industry for improved economy in your community.

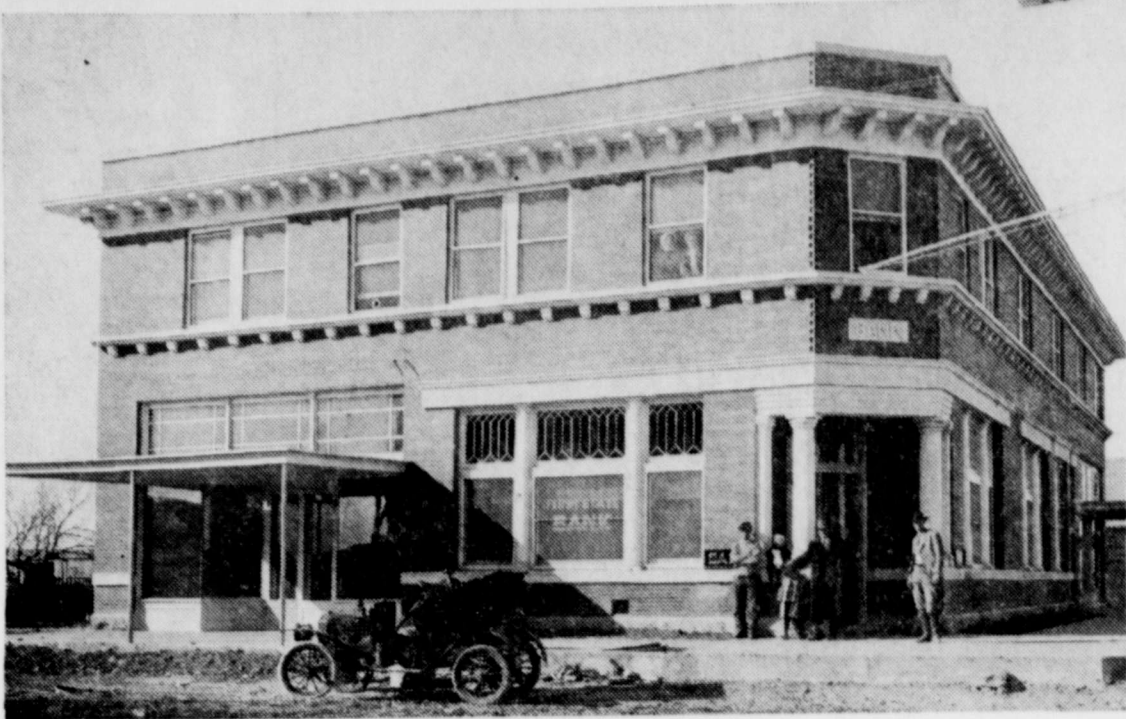
ANY and ALL industrial leads should be handled through and by the local group that has been delegated this responsibility, usually the Chamber of Commerce.

Once a bank — The State Hotel and Sterling Drug was a bank — back in 1910. The First State Bank as it looked in 1912 or thereabouts.

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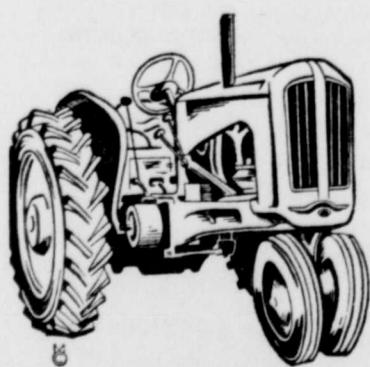
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DRIVER ED CLASSES TO START AUGUST 15

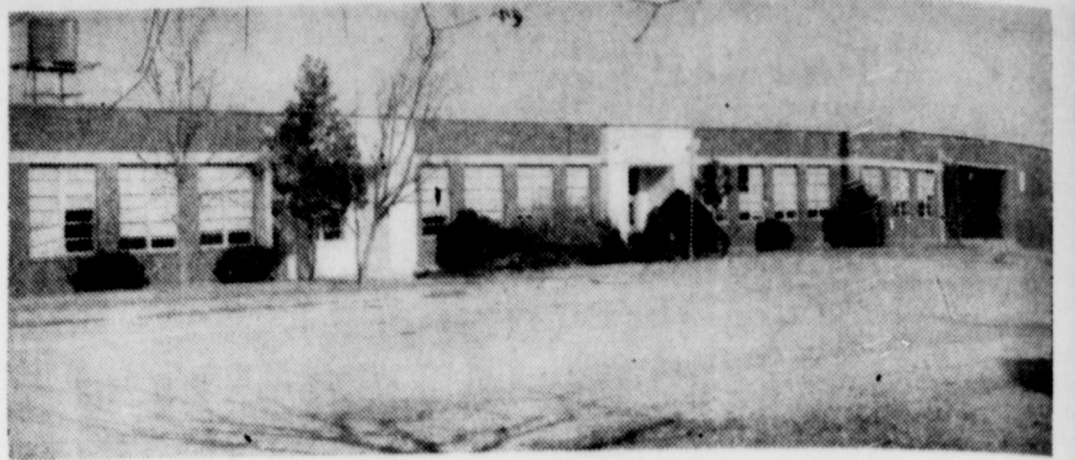
EXAMINATION

A new examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector has been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, for filling positions paying \$6-269 a year with the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the U. S. Department of Justice.

These positions offer young men interested in immigration law enforcement an opportunity to begin a career in such work with on-the-job training for positions of greater responsibility. No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgement, and aptitude for learning a foreign language; those who pass the test will be interviewed to determine if they have the personal qualities needed for the work. Since the duties are arduous, applicants must be in sound physical condition.

Full information is given in Announcement No. 398 B. Applicants who file by July 15, 1966 will be scheduled for the first test on August 20, 1966. Three additional tests have been scheduled. The final date for applying is February 15, 1967. Applications should be sent to the Board of Examiners, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D. C. 20536.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country, from the Board of Examiners above, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

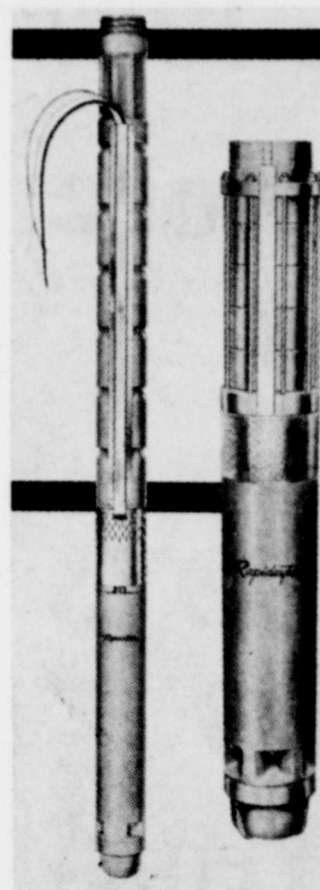


The Sterling Public School serves the whole county and has been the only school in many decades. About 265 students are enrolled annually and the long-time superintendent is O. T. Jones.

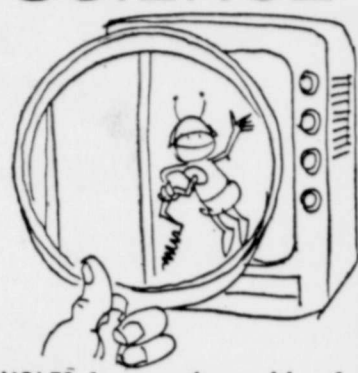

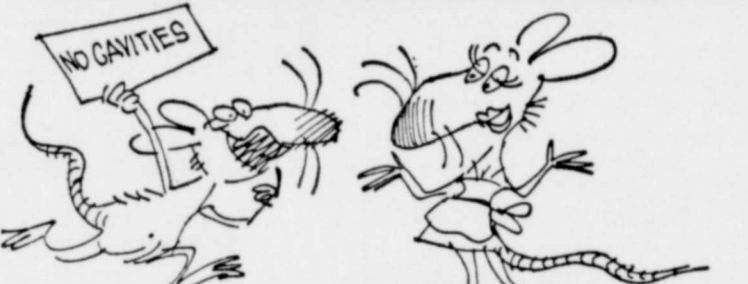

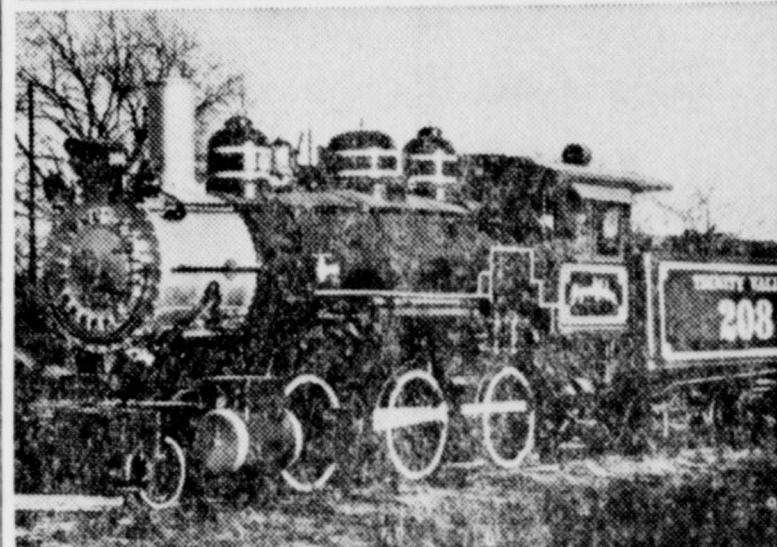

DISABLED MAY BENEFIT FROM SOCIAL SECURITY

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not yet applied for them according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected to last as long as 12 months by his doctors. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

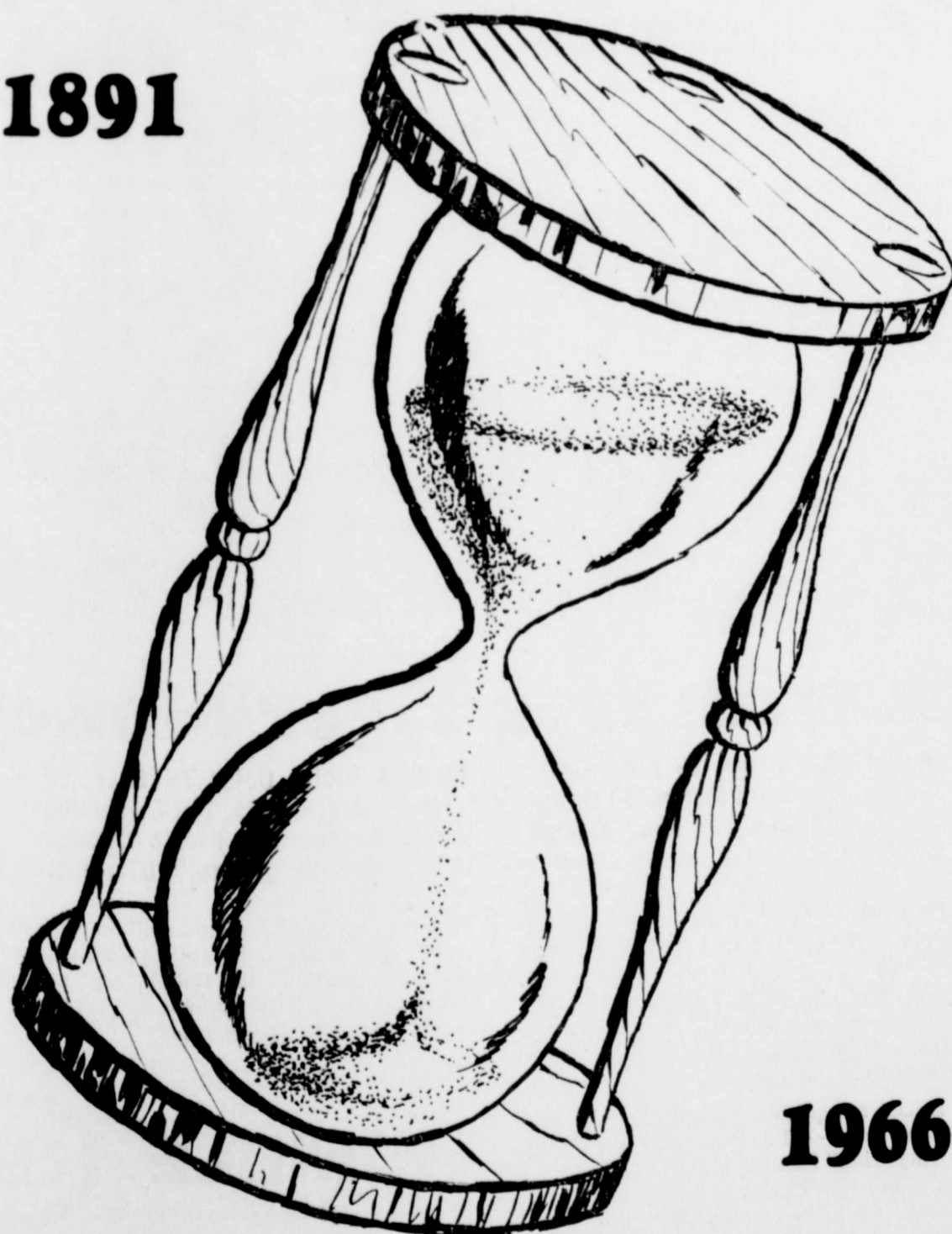

POLICE BRUTALITY IS
UNJUSTLY STATED SAYS
DIRECTOR

Law enforcement today is
being degraded, purposely in
many instances, by the wide-
spread and indiscriminate use
of the term "police brutality."

The practice is call a guilt-
by-language process by some
individuals. They may be
right. For example, the word
"juvenile" has been associated
with "delinquency" so often and
so long that now, when used
alone, it has a disagreeable
connotation to much of the
public.

"Police brutality" conjures
up visions of hulking men in
uniform clubbing and beating
innocent people. Rarely, how-
ever, does the term fit the cir-
cumstances to which it is ap-
plied. It is used in wild ac-
counts of enforcement officers'
lifting limp demonstrators who
block busy thoroughfares, in
references to oral commands
by policemen who disperse po-
tential trouble-makers, in de-
picting efforts by officers to
halt violations of the law, and
in describing any number of
other sworn duties performed
by policemen.

We know there is a calculat-
ed and deliberate attempt by
some groups to inflame hostil-
ity against law enforcement by
charging "police brutality"
without cause. To a large de-
gree they have succeeded. The
term is bandied about in all
media of communication with-
out serious consideration as to
its true meaning or its harm-
ful effect on a profession
which is charged with enforc-
ing the basic rules of civilized
living.

I agree with a growing num-
ber of responsible news edi-
tors, public officials, and law-
abiding citizens that is is high
time to get this "pet slogan"
into a better perspective. We
do not deny there have been
instances of misuse of force
by enforcement officers, but
such incidents are not as pre-
valent as the public has been
led to believe. A general and
accepted principle of the law
has been that an officer may
use such force as is necessary
to make lawful arrests, pro-
tect his life, and perform other
specific duties. Frequently,
however, the choice is not his
to make; he HAS to use force
or be maimed or killed and
have the rights of all people
trampled by those who have
no respect for law or due pro-
cess. Even then, his best ef-
forts often are not enough, as
evidenced by the appalling
number of officers assaulted
and killed each year.

Policemen have the same
basic rights as others. There
is no reason why they should
be singled out for ridicule by
invalid blanket accusations.
The public, the press, and law
enforcement itself should
launch a concerted drive to
stop the semantic indictment
of police. Allegations and in-
stant cry of "police brutality"
should be reported and used
described in realistic, impar-
tial, and truthful terms. If an
officer is assaulted while mak-
ing an arrest and uses undue
force to subdue the person,
then call it "undue force." If

The Sterling County 4-H grass identification team which took part in the State 4-H contest at College Station last week finished fourth. Seventeen teams from all over the state took part in the contest. Team members were Chris Frizzell, Debbie Reed, and Frank Price.

The State contests are held as part of the State 4-H Round Up each year. Some forty different contests are run off and the state winners determined. Dates for Round Up were June 7 and 8 this year. Mrs. Neal Reed also accompanied the group to the contests.

Team members were required to identify fifty grasses and check the life or growth habits, grazing value for wild life and livestock, and the season of growth. The plants this year were extremely hard to identify; this was the hardest identification contest that I have ever seen. Several others who have taken part in a number of these contests agreed—all were glad the club members had to do the identifying.

The team members deserve a pat on the back for their efforts. In an extremely hard contest, they did very well. They did not have a fourth member to fall back on as an alternate so the three scores they made were the team total; with an alternate or fourth member, the lowest score is eliminated and the three highest are counted.

Seventy-eight dogs and cats

were given the rabies shots last week by Dr. Percy Turner. This is the most animals that have been given the shots in the history of the one-day clinic as it is held now.

The majority of the animals given the shots were dogs. Probably sixty-five or seventy of them were dogs. In spite of the number of dogs around, there were no dog fights. And none of the cats escaped to hide under the Community Center as has happened on an occasion or two in the past.

Aerial spraying of mequite is well under way in the county. There are at least three applicators operating in the county at the present time. The conditions have appeared good for the spraying this year. The late-April rains put moisture into the ground and the trees responded by putting out another crop of foliage which has matured into dark green, glossy leaves that are ready for spraying.

The experimental plots on the R. T. Foster, Jr. ranch were sprayed on Thursday morning of this week. One small block on the plots is receiving its third annual application, another block is getting a second application, and one block is being sprayed after being skipped for one year. In addition, new acreage that has not been sprayed since the chaining in 1963 is being sprayed. Anyone interested is invited to watch the plots—they are just across the Big Lake road from Tommy's ranchhouse.
