STUDENTS DIE IN BLAZE AT DALLAS

Xmas Tree Blamed In Fatal Fire

MONMOUTH, Ore., Jan. 2 (P)—A dart of flame from an illuminated Christmas tree set fire to a private dormitory on the campus of the Oregon normal school here last night and three girls students burned to death. Six others escaped by leaping from a second story porch.

The dead: Evelyn Ohman of Portland; Florence Graham of Newport, Ore.; Margaret Hemmers, Gresham, Ore.

The tragedy came on the eve of the opening of school after the holidays.

Occupants of the dormitory had retired for the night and were trapped when the Christmas tree burst into flames, sumably started by faulty electrical wiring, and sent runners of the darts into curtains and other inflammable furnishings.

MIDLAND OIL MAN KILLED IN SMASH

COLORADO, Tex., Jan. 2 (P)—Just as Sam Sloan, wealthy Midland oil man, leaned from his plane to wave at friends the plane crashed, killing him here yesterday. Sloan had circled the Colorado Country club several times, flying low, before the crash.

Late Party Ends In Girl's Death

HOUSTON, Jan. 2 (P)—A late New Year's party ended in death yesterday for Florence Thaw, 14. A verdict of suicide was returned after an inquest. The girl's foster mother told the court she had reminded the girl for staying out late New Year's eve and that while she was talking the girl rushed into another room, seized a pistol and shot herself.

Body Of Man Buried Years Ago Claimed

LUFKIN, Tex., Jan. 2 (P)—The body of a man known as Fred Dowing, who died here more than five years ago and was buried after a fruitless search for kinmen, was identified today as Alphonse Charrett by his sister, Mrs. Philis Deragon, Plymouth, Mass., who had conducted a lengthy search for the missing man.

"Dowing" came here in 1923 with a pipe line crew, none of whom knew his real name. After his death an inquest was held, resulting in a verdict of death from a poison.

LESS FLU IN WEST STATES

REITERATE DANGER OF LATER OUTBREAK FOR MALADY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Influenza is believed to be decreasing in most states west of the Mississippi river and increasing east of the Mississippi. A warning against optimism was seen, however, in reiteration by the public health service of the possibility of a second and more severe wave of the disease later in the winter. It was recalled that in 1918 there was first a widespread outbreak, most of the cases being mild, but then it came again, and this time the malady was virulent in its nature.

Reports from 24 states and New York City for the week ending Dec. 29 showed 90,000 new cases, as compared with 168,000 cases in the same states and New York City for the previous week.

ELEVEN DEATHS IN 24 HOURS AT DALLAS

DALLAS, Jan. 2 (P)—Eleven deaths from influenza and pneumonia occurred in Dallas during the past 24 hours and from 10 to 15 per cent of pupils in high schools and almost one-third of those in elementary schools were absent today, supposedly due to sickness.

Although not wanting, the disease is under control, Dr. Manton M. Carrick, director of public health, said.

Orders were issued that all food dispensers showing symptoms of either disease be sent home.

THREE PLANES SEEK ENDURANCE RECORDS

CATAPULT IS USED BY PAIR IN MISSOURI

'QUESTION MARK' GOES GOOD AS FIRST 24 HOURS PASSES

(By Associated Press)
Three separate assaults on endurance flight records were underway in the West today with the army's big tri-motored monoplane, the Question Mark already on its second day of a cruise in California that may last for weeks with the aid of refueling in the air.

The Question Mark, carrying a crew of five, passed the twenty-four hour mark in the air at 7:34 o'clock this morning. Taking off from Los Angeles yesterday the Question Mark made contacts with a refueling plane at intervals and took aboard gasoline, oil and food. Until the engines or the fliers wear out the plane will remain aloft.

Blaine M. Tuxhorn and Leonard Rhiner, flying a small open cockpit monoplane in near-zero weather, got off the ground at Marshall, Mo., at 8:45 a. m. today in an attempt to shatter the refueling endurance flight record of sixty hours and seven minutes held in Belgium.

RANK ODOR NOT NECESSARILY SIGN OF IMPURE FOOD, TEXAS HIGH COURT SAYS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 2.—Food with a rank odor in cooking does not necessarily come under the penalties of the state pure food law for that reason solely, the court of criminal appeals ruled today, asking what—for example—would be done with the succulent onion, the appetizing hamburger, the tasty garlic, the luscious collard?

The court reversed and remanded the conviction of W. H. Elliott of Denison, fined \$101 for alleged violation of the pure food law for selling forty pounds of a slaughtered one year old boar hog to a certain Mr. Young. The state relied for conviction on testimony of Young and Policeman Distner that the meat gave off a "rank odor" when cooked.

Defense witnesses claimed they ate some of the pork and that there was nothing wrong with it. Discussing the pure food law, penalizing food containing animal or vegetable matter unfit for consumption, the court, through Judge O. S. Lattimore, said "there is no

'BLUE-BACK SPELLER' PROVES HARD NUT IN ROTARY CLUB HERE TODAY

Solemn college faculty members with numerous degrees, learned ministers of the Gospel and just common, ordinary business men quailed before words plucked from the famous "Blue-Back Speller" of the vintage of 1858 at noon today when members of the Lubbock Rotary club amused themselves by holding an old-fashioned spelling bee.

Long words and short words, queer ones and those of commonplace conversation took their toll as Prof. Cecil Horne, of Texas Tech., acting as school master, called them off to the delight and consternation of the civic clubbers. Approximately half the club was "spelled down" in the quarter of an hour thus spent.

Wallace W. Rix was in charge of the program. Rev. Walter P. Jennings and Dean James Marcus Gordon headed the spelling teams and short classification talks were made by Walter W. Royalty and W. C. Cole. Vice-president Jerry Clements presided in the absence of President Bob Murray, who is ill.

U.S. REGAINS VALUABLE OIL LAND IN WEST

ANOTHER ACT OF FALL WHILE SECRETARY IS SET ASIDE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—The government succeeded in the supreme court today in its effort to recover from the Standard Oil company valuable oil lands in the Elk Hills naval oil reserve in California.

In its decision the court set aside one more act of Albert B. Fall as secretary of the interior. It had been contended that Fall did not determine whether the land was known to be mineral land in 1923, when the matter was brought to his attention.

When the question was before Fall the government charged he failed to go to the position taken by the company.

Fires Are Fewer In 1928 Than For 1929

Although Lubbock's population experienced a substantial increase in 1928, the total number of fires during the past year was substantially less than in 1927.

According to Fire Chief W. E. Twitty, there were 114 fires in Lubbock during 1928 as compared to 138 for the previous year. So far there has been no fire in 1929.

The policy of fighting fires before they begin is given as the reason for the decrease in the number of fires last year.

Tennessee Price Fixing Law Loses

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (P)—The Tennessee law fixing the wholesale and retail prices on gasoline was declared invalid and unconstitutional today by the supreme court.

RUSH TO BUY NEW LICENSES IS CONTINUED

3500 AUTOMOBILES ARE REGISTERED TO DATE; STILL NO ARRESTS

With approximately 3,500—slightly less than half of the automobiles in Lubbock county—registered up until early this afternoon, employees of the county tax collector's office were still much rushed this morning with little hope of relief for several days.

A long line of car owners extended through the courthouse corridor all morning, and the collector's clerks and the extra employees were kept rushed in an attempt to meet the demand for new license plates.

ORVILLE, Ohio, Jan. 2 (P)—Three Orville men were arrested at 2 o'clock this morning for the supposed kidnaping of Melvin Horst, 4, who disappeared from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Horst, of Orville, last Thursday.

The men were placed in the city jail after being questioned for more than six hours. County prosecutor Walter J. Mowsey said charges of kidnaping would be filed.

INCREASE OF 300 SEEN FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS THIS SEMESTER

Holidays were over this morning for students at both the Tech and high school. Trains, buses and automobiles last night and this morning brought the hundreds of students who spent the holidays away.

An increase of approximately 300 in the Tech enrollment is expected for the winter term and Supt. M. H. Duncan of the city schools looks for approximately one hundred new pupils.

None of the faculty members of Tech have been reported ill and although several public school teachers have influenza, substitutes have been employed. Heads of both Tech and the public schools here yesterday took occasion to deny the rumor that school opening would be postponed due to the threatening influenza epidemic.

Registration will take up all of today at the college with regular classes scheduled for tomorrow morning. All of the faculty will be on hand today in connection with registration activities. The first convocation will be held the latter part of the week.

Regular class work was resumed at the public schools this morning. The first semester ends January 11, when 18 students will finish their requirements for graduation although they will not graduate until next spring.

NEW AUDITOR AT WORK IN COUNTY

J. Y. Boyd, Lubbock's first county auditor, assumed duties yesterday and for the present will be located in the county attorney's office.

Mr. Boyd comes to Lubbock from Hillsboro where he served as county auditor for some time. He said this morning that he would bring his family here in the near future.

Either influenza or pneumonia claimed the life early yesterday of John Bowen, 207 18th street. The body was sent today to Adkins, Ark., for burial by Rix undertakers.

Funeral services were held in O'Donnell yesterday for M. C. Russell.

MERCURY AT LOW MARK IN STATE TODAY

'FAIR AND WARMER' IS FORECAST FOR TEXAS TONIGHT, TOMORROW

Ice in abundance was to be found in Lubbock this morning as the mercury, pushed down by the north-easter which arrived along with the New Year, dropped to a low level of 16 degrees, sixteen below freezing.

Lubbock was thus the coldest Texas point reporting to the Associated Press.

A forecast of fair and warmer promised relief for tonight and tomorrow.

COLD WEATHER IN PANHANDLE REGION

WICHITA FALLS, Jan. 2 (P)—The season's coldest weather prevailed today in Northwest Texas and the Panhandle.

Locally the thermometer stood at 22 degrees, one degree below yesterday's minimum. At Texline the temperature was reported 23 and at Amarillo and Childress six degrees higher.

PORT WORTH, Jan. 2.—The coldest weather of the winter was felt here this morning when the temperature dropped to 34 degrees.

CORPUSCANA, Jan. 2 (P)—The coldest weather of the season gripped Corsicana last night, the government thermometer registering 20 degrees.

SAN ANTONIO, Jan. 2 (P)—With the mercury standing at 28 degrees this morning San Antonio experienced the coldest weather of the season. The skies are clear and a slowly rising temperature is forecast.

HOUSTON, Jan. 2 (P)—Houston this morning experienced its coldest weather of the season. The mercury did not stop sliding at the suburban weather station at Harrisburg until it reached 22 degrees and a temperature of 28 degrees was recorded at the main station atop the Post-Dispatch building.

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Jan. 2 (P)—Sunny skies greeted South Texas today after a cold night, during which the temperature dropped to 39 degrees, one degree above the season's minimum.

ABILENE WOMAN TELLS METHODISTS GREATER COOPERATION IS BIG NEED

(By Associated Press)
MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 2.—Closer cooperation between all agencies of the church was seen by Mrs. Nat G. Rollins, Abilene, Texas, as the answer to the difficulties in world evangelization in an address on a "united program of missions," before the international missionary conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, here today.

Mrs. Rollins, president of the Women's Missionary Society, Northwest Texas Conference, pointed to cooperative projects in the business and industrial world which had turned losing propositions into profitable and successful enterprises and said the same principle should be applied to the field of missions, thereby reducing overhead expenses and avoiding duplication of effort.

She detailed progress in unifying work of religious education by the various Southern Methodist organizations under instruction of the general conference, supreme legislative authority of the denomination.

While stressing the importance of new methods, Mrs. Rollins warned against the danger of discarding methods of the forefathers, saying that "tradition of the elders is not to be despised, but should be used as a signpost and not a hitching post."

"If," declared the speaker, "the supreme task of the church is to transform mere human beings into Christians whose influence will be exerted toward remaking this world and whose task shall not cease until all realms of life are truly Christian, then it must be true that missionary education, in and of the church, is an essential factor of true Christianity. As the several organizations in the church, potent as they are, have failed to reach the entire membership and give to them the necessary missionary education which all should have, the necessity of making an adequate program has gotten into the thinking of many who have made a far-reaching study of the whole subject of missions, both in its relation to fields and to the local church."

KELLOGG PACT IN FIRST PLACE

MEASURE IS AHEAD OF COMPANIONATE BILL IN THE SENATE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—An agreement to put the Kellogg peace pact ahead of its companion measure on the senate calendar, the cruiser construction bill, was entered into today by senators interested in the two proposals.

Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee, in charge of the peace treaty, and Chairman Hale of the naval committee, sponsor of the cruiser bill, entered the agreement which assures a vote first on the treaty. The arrangement is expected to lead the way also to an early vote on the naval construction bill.

When the senate reconvenes tomorrow Senator Hale will deliver a speech on his naval bill and then give way to Senator Borah who will move to take up the Kellogg treaty.

Senator Borah announced he would keep the treaty constantly before the senate until it is voted upon and he anticipates early and favorable action.

TWO YOUTHS ARE VICTIMS EARLY TODAY

ROOMING HOUSE BURNS; BODIES FOUND IN SMOKING RUINS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Jan. 2.—Two charred bodies were found today by searchers in the ruins of a rooming house destroyed by fire seven hours earlier.

Although immediate identification was impossible, it was believed the victims were James H. Martin, 23, Itasca, and Samuel R. Scott, 23, San Antonio, students at Baylor Medical College here.

Search of the ruins of the building and that of another structure destroyed at the same time was started when Martin and Scott failed to report for classes. Fellow students said they knew the two had been sleeping in the rooming house.

The only other occupant, J. Malcolm Daniels, was aroused by flames and smoke and leaped to safety from a second story window.

A woman told of screams she heard coming from the building as the blaze gained headway.

The bodies later were identified as Martin and Scott.

Martin's body was discovered on a stairway near the front of the house, indicating that he had almost succeeded in making his escape.

FIRE SWEEPS PART OF HOUSTON SKYSCRAPER

HOUSTON, Jan. 2 (P)—Fire gutted two rooms of the Elgin building, Houston's oldest skyscraper, and caused damage to several others early today while street car traffic was held up for more than an hour and hundreds of persons were attracted to the spectacular blaze at the corner of Main and Texas.

Two of the rooms and their contents belonging to the Levitt Jewelry company were a total loss.

A few hours earlier fire broke out in a battery of stills near Houston belonging to the Crown Oil and Refining company. Although the battery was said to be valued at \$500,000, M. C. Ehlen, vice president of the company, placed the damage at between \$4,000 and \$5,000.

The president-elect indicated clearly today that he has not made up his mind on the cabinet appointments.

It is no secret that Mr. Hoover has found amusement in some of the stories emanating from Washington as to his reasons for going there. He pointed out that his home is there and that he wants to make arrangements regarding his house and to pack his personal belongings before entering the White House. He also stated that, if he went direct to Florida, it would put the senators and representatives with whom he desires to confer at a great inconvenience.

OPEN COCKPIT PLANE SEEKING RECORD

MARSHALL, Mo., Jan. 2 (P).—Blaine M. Tuxhorn hopped off in his open-cockpit monoplane at 8:45 a. m., today in an attempt to establish a new endurance flight record by refueling in the air through use of a synchronized catapulting device.

The ground was snow covered and the thermometer stood at 5 degrees above zero when the Kansas City aviator and his co-pilot, Leonard Rhiner, took the air. No trouble was experienced in getting off the ground.

When the plane had been in the air a half hour, Tuxhorn dropped a note saying they had forgotten the leather face masks which were to protect them from the icy blasts. He asked that these be included when breakfast was sent up in a container by the refueling device.

To break the endurance record set by Belgian fliers, the little monoplane must stay aloft until 9:03 p. m., Friday.
The refueling device constructed

by Tuxhorn catapults four-gallon containers into the air when set off by a hook attached to a cable dropped from the plane. The containers are projected along the line of flight at approximately the speed of the plane and are hauled aboard by a winch operated by a small, wind driven propeller. The gasoline is pumped from the container into the fuel tank and then the container is dropped with a parachute.

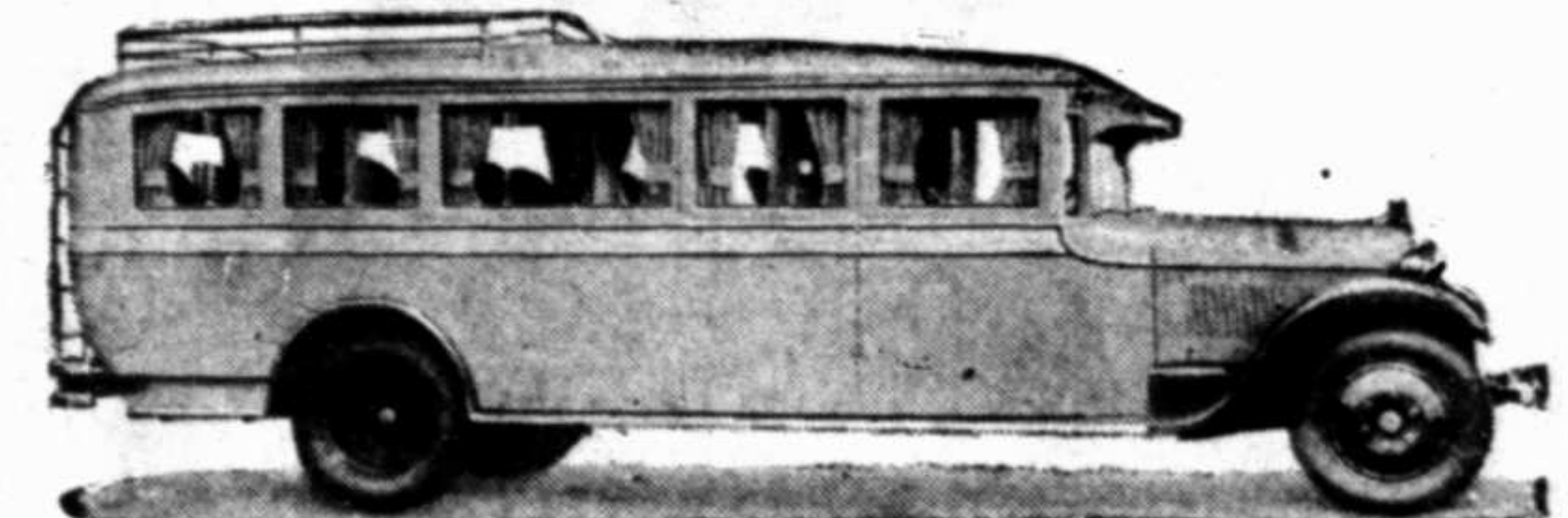

Chrysler Optimistic Over View For 1929

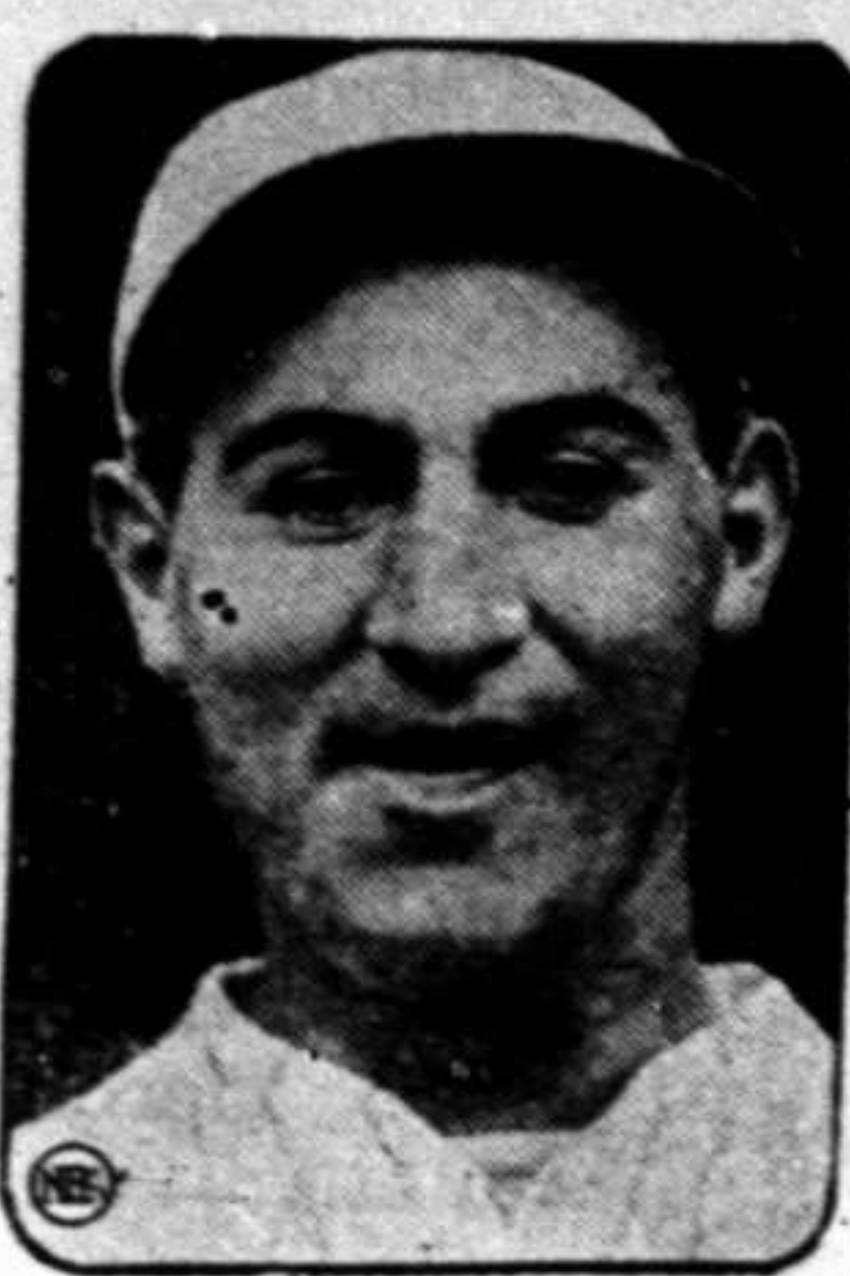

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FREAK RUN TO WRONG GOAL COSTS BEARS

CALIFORNIA CENTER IS 'GOAT' OF PRIZE 'BONE' PLAY

(By Associated Press)
PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 2.—The Golden Tornado of Georgia Tech today held a claim to the nation's mythical football championship honors because of its strangely wrought 8 to 7 victory over the Golden Bears of California in the Rose Bowl New Year's Day classic here.

Tech's victory was due in part, at least, to a spectacular blunder by Roy Riegels, center and captain-elect of the Western eleven, who, in the second period, ran 73 yards in the wrong direction, giving the Dixie tornado an advantage which was turned into a safety, and a lead that won the game.

Riegels lost bearings. A play that has been the subject of many gridiron plots and the basis of many a magazine thriller but seldom seen on a football field was that which Riegels made inadvertently when he lost his bearings. Neither side had scored. Tech had the ball on its own 25-yard line. "Stumpy" Thomason, Tech half-back, fumbled. Riegels snatched up the ball and started for the Georgia goal. He progressed a few steps, then wheeled about and headed for his own goal line.

Seventy thousand football fans watched in amazement as Riegels streaked down the field. Pursued by Teammate.

Riegels had gone perhaps twenty yards toward the California goal when his team mate, Benny Lom, first to realize what was happening, started in pursuit.

Not until Riegels reached the one foot mark did Lom overtake him. Lom then pulled Riegels by the shoulders and motioned toward the opposite goal. Riegels stopped, and at that instant two Georgia Tech players tackled him and threw him over the goal line. The referee called the ball down at the place where Riegels had been stopped by his teammate.

Block Kick For Safety. Standing with his back almost even with the goal posts, Lom then attempted to punt out of danger. But Vance Marree, Tech's tackle, crashed through to block. Stanley Barr, California halfback, fell on the oval behind the goal line after a mad scramble, and Tech had two points.

Demoralized by the freak "break" the Bears fell victim to a Yellow-jacket attack in the third period. The stalwarts of California stiffened to hold on to the goal line after the 15-yard line. Georgia failed in the try for point.

Bears Outgain Tech. A touchdown in the final minutes of the game was sweet fruit to California's gridders who faced a shut-out defeat, although they had out-gained their foes almost three yards to one, and outbattled them virtually throughout. Lom, the backbone of the California offensive, passed with uncanny accuracy in this last drive that carried 80 yards.
