## Construction Work Started On Highway No. 4 Welfare Association Sponsors "Smile Day" Drive For Clothing

### NOTHING WILL BE COLLECTED SUNDAY, OCT. 30

Organizations In City Cooperating In Drive For Old Clothing For Charity Work

### Smiling In Proclamation

Members Will Be Cleaned And Repaired By Women Workers Of The Welfare Association

Cooperating with the state-wide movement of the American Legion Texas, the Perryton Welfare Association will stage a gigantic drive to collect old and cast-off clothing next Sunday, October 30. Plans have been made for a clothing drive on three days preceding Thanksgiving, but on account of the many items already received for clothing it was decided at a meeting of the association on Monday afternoon that this date was too late.

The state-wide movement setting for Sunday, October 30, as "Smile Day" was inaugurated by Carl Nesbitt, State Commander of the American Legion.

The idea was presented to Governor Ross Sterling, who immediately put his official stamp of approval on the movement by issuing a proclamation designating Sunday, October 30, as "Smile Day" in every city, town, village and community of the state.

Governor Sterling's proclamation appeals to the citizenship to lend every effort toward this project of cheer and success. The plan of the American Legion and Auxiliary was adopted and adopted as the best way to obtain a supply of clothing for the care of the needy.

House to house campaign will be made Thursday and Friday by committees from the different organizations who are members of the welfare association. These workers will explain the nature of the drive, and the appeal for the clothing. The drive need for a generous response. Mrs. Jas. E. Barbour, chairman of the association, has appealed the following chairmen who select workers from their own homes to make this canvass: Mrs. J. Woodward, Methodist church; Mrs. J. R. Buchanan, Baptist church; Mrs. J. L. Couger, Christian church; Mrs. H. T. Cropper, Presbyterian; Mrs. Gladys Bray, Sorority; Mrs. George Powers, Full Gospel church; and Mrs. Van W. Steward, American Legion Auxiliary.

It is planned to solicit every home in the city. Clothing will not be gathered up by the women workers. They are asking that the garments be placed on the front door steps of the home, so that the collection committee can take them up at two o'clock Sunday afternoon. Each of the workers has been assigned a certain area of the city. Mrs. Barbour states that in case donations of clothing cannot be gotten ready Sunday afternoon, arrangements will be made for them to be gathered up later.

Miss Jones is the chairman in charge of the collecting squads. Her appointment and organize this part of the work. The collection cars will start out at two o'clock and stay the job until every home in town has been visited. The garments will be taken to the welfare association headquarters, the building formerly occupied by the Jitney-Junk company. The use of this building has been donated by W. B. Lafferty to the association. Free electricity is being given by the Louisiana Power company, the Service Corporation is providing the gas for heating; the City of Perryton the water; and the telephone company has been asked to install free telephone service.

The women workers will clean and repair the clothing, so that it will be in good wearable condition. The city has offered their services of charge to the association in cleaning of donated clothing. The clothing is not all that the association has to have. It has many other items for the needy. Buttons, thread, and many other items must be purchased. There will be many cases where food will have to be provided for the sick and the aged.

### Showers Measure .44

Nearly Half Inch Rain Received In Past Week, Saturday And Monday

Two showers during the past week supplied less than a half inch of moisture, according to the official government rain gauge kept by Jack Allen.

The first fall was received early Saturday morning and measured .34 of an inch. A slow misty rain Monday night supplied an additional .10 of an inch, making the total for the week .44 of an inch.

### WILL OBSERVE ARMISTICE DAY

LEGION HAS PLANNED A FULL DAYS PROGRAM; YANNIGANS WILL MEET RANGERS; DANCE

J. R. Thomas, commander of the American Legion Post of the American Legion, reports that the Armistice Day celebration, under the sponsorship of the local Post, promises to be one of the biggest days in the history of Perryton. The program for the day activities is now just about complete and the chairman of the respective features of entertainment are hard at work.

Invitations have been extended to nearby Legion posts in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Many of these have accepted. During the next week advertising will be distributed to all towns within a hundred mile radius of Perryton. There are no places nearby celebrating Armistice Day, so Perryton should again entertain a record breaking crowd.

The tentative program starts off with the Reveille call at 7:00 a. m. A number of aerial bombs will be discharged over the city, after which the "Get 'em Up" call will be sounded by buglers stationed at different points over town. All bombing is under the direction of E. B. Gyger and Harry Nails with G. Ward Moody in charge of the buglers.

At 9:30 a. m. the flag raising ceremony will be held on the courthouse lawn. A band concert will be held in connection with this event. G. Ward Moody and H. P. Lorenz will supervise the flag raising.

Legionnaires W. B. Irvin and Jack Allen will have charge of the "Zero Hour" program which will be held at the school auditorium. Legionnaires from Spearman, Gruvmon, Liberal, Canadian, and other towns are contributing talent for this program. At 12:30, the Perryton Legion will be host to all visiting Legionnaires and Auxiliary members and their families at a feed at the Legion Hall. This is the only part of the entire days program which is not open to the general public. W. P. Ballew has charge of the "chow".

### EXHIBIT GRAIN CHICAGO SHOW

COUNTY AGENT SHEETS SHOWING AGENTS, BARLEY AND WHEAT; WON FIRST DALLAS FAIR

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 26.—First entry from Texas for the 1932 International Grain and Hay Show, to be held at the Chicago Stock Yards November 26 to December 3, in connection with the International Live Stock Exposition, comes from Ochiltree county, being entered by Guy R. Sheets, county farm agent. Grains from this county place first in wheat, oats and barley at the Dallas Fair this year.

Sheets will exhibit samples of Texas red rust proof oats, Kanota oats, six rowed barley, and hard red winter wheat in this largest of the world's crops shows.

The finest samples of the world's harvest during the past year will be exhibited at the coming International Grain and Hay Show. Wheat samples have already been received from as far away countries as Australia.

According to the management, entries will be accepted for the Grain and Hay Show up to November 10, and may be made without cost to the exhibitor. Samples will be returned to the exhibitor if requested.

Closing date of entry in the livestock departments of the Exposition in November 1, Secretary B. H. Heide announces. He predicts that the 1933 Show will be the largest in point of exhibits ever held. Prize money offered in most departments will remain the same and in a few instances will be even higher. All railroads entering Chicago will grant reduced round trip fares during the week of November 26 to December 3.

### OUTLAWS LOSE PHILLIPPS "66"

BORGER TEAM TAKE SAFETY AND TWO TOUCHDOWNS TO WIN IN NIGHT GRID GAME

Borger, Oct. 24.—With six points earned from football playing and nine more coming from Perryton fumbles, Phillips 66 football team Saturday night defeated the eleven from Ochiltree county 15 to 0 in a game crammed with thrills.

The Oilers' first score was a safety, gained when the Perryton punter dropped the ball behind his own goal line while trying to kick to safety, and recovered behind the line to give the locals two points. This was early in the second quarter. On the next play, after Perryton had taken the ball on her own 20 yard line, the center threw the ball over the quarter's head and Frazier recovered for Phillips behind the visitors' goal line for a touchdown. Terry kicked goal.

Receives Fumble.

The other counter came near the end of the same period after Hanna had recovered a fumble on the Perryton 30 yard line. Terry gained 12 yards around right end, Bullock made a yard around left end, Goodwin plunged the line for three, Terry broke loose around right end for 13 yards, and Goodwin plunged a yard for a touchdown. Terry failed to kick goal as the half ended.

Perryton's passes were a continuous threat to the Oilers, who themselves now and then attempted the aerial route, once with unusual success. For instance, a pass from Goodwin to Hayhurst, near the end of the game, gained 44 yards for the 66 men. Two successive Perryton passes gained 39 yards as the third quarter ended. Perryton attempted nine forward passes, completing four for 56 yards. Phillips completed one of four for 44 yards.

The first downs were even—four each, but Phillips 66 gained a total of 123 yards as compared with 67 for the visitors.

Reach One-yard Line.

Phillips reached the one-yard line early in the first quarter after Roberts had recovered a Perryton fumble on the invading team's 30 yard line and Frazier, Knight, Terry and Bullock carried the ball 29 yards, but Perryton took the ball on downs. It was then, attempting to kick out of danger, that the Perryton punter dropped the ball and the Alamo boys scored a safety.

Perryton outplayed the Oilers during the third period, making three first downs to none for the local team. Two of these were on passes, and the ball was on the Alamo 16 yard line at the end of the period. However, the Ochiltree county boys were thrown for continuous losses at the opening of the fourth until the Refiners took the ball on downs on their own 30. The teams made a first down each during the final stanza, and due to Goodwin's 44 yard pass to Hayhurst, 66 had the oval on the Perryton 11 yard line as the game ended.

### WILL EMPLOY LARGE NUMBER HOME WORKERS

Drainage and Grading Work Started Today By Davies & Son, General Contractors

### Caliche To Farnsworth

No. 117 To Farnsworth Will Be Open To Travel This Week End; Waka Road Closed

Actual construction work on Highway No. 4 from Perryton north to the state line was started this morning by Davies & Son, general contractors. A force of men and teams were the first put to work, tearing out the old culverts and preparing for the new drainage structures. Teams will start tomorrow, Friday, morning on the grading for the road bed. The pouring of the concrete for the drainage structures has been sublet to French & Son of Farnsworth.

Highway No. 4 is a Federal project, consequently a new schedule of labor regulations will govern. Qualified ex-service men with dependents will be given preference for all jobs on this highway. Home labor will be paid 30 cents per hour, skilled labor will draw 45 cents per hour. All workmen, trucks and teams, with the exception of the foremen, will be limited to 36 hours per week, three days of 10 hours each. The Federal government makes this provision in order that as many men as possible will be given employment at a wage which will enable them to live without the assistance of charity.

Paul Sherman, who is in charge of the labor employment, states that there will be a meeting at the courthouse next Monday afternoon at two o'clock, at which the contractor will present a plan whereby teams may be used for the stripping of the caliche pit. All men who have signed up for team work are requested to attend this meeting.

A. E. Dyatt, state engineer in charge of the highway construction in the northeast Panhandle, estimates that it will require about three weeks to get No. 4 ready for the placing of the caliche. He states that a detour route has been put in good travel condition, one mile east of the highway.

Work on No. 117 from Perryton to the Hansford county line is progressing rapidly with the fine weather which has been prevailing this fall. The laying of the second caliche course from Perryton to Farnsworth will be completed to Farnsworth and opened to travel this week end. The road from Farnsworth to the line the other side of Waka is now closed to travel. It is expected that the contract for the rock asphalt topping on No. 117 from Perryton through Hansford county to the Hutchinson county line will be let just as soon as the base courses are completed in this county.

# Win Intersectional Grid Contest From Shattuck

## Take Seasons Second Conference Game From Gruver, 27-0

### WIN FROM UNDEFEATED TEAM

RANGERS PLAY BRILLIANTLY TO TAKE 13 TO 0 GAME FROM SHATTUCK INDIANS

The Perryton Rangers added their third consecutive scalp to their list of wins for the season last Friday afternoon when they met the Shattuck Indians on the local field, in an intersectional grid contest, winning from the hitherto undefeated Oklahomaans by a 13 to 0 margin.

The Indians probably offered the hardest competition for grid supremacy of any team met this season by the Rangers and their triumph over the visitors was accounted for by the brilliant offensive and equally stellar defense of the locals.

Scoring in the opening quarter with Pattison making the final lunge and Ellis kicking goal from placement, by fighting the ball down the field after receiving the kick-off, the Rangers were quickly put on the defensive when DuBourdeau made a total of 32 yards on three plays. Almost within the shadow of their own goal, the Rangers held the Indians for downs.

#### Third In Second Quarter

Nor did the locals find any consolation in their narrow seven point lead during the second period when with a strong wind behind them, the visitors were constantly inside Ranger territory. The third quarter revealed another offensive Ranger drive which was carried into the final period and ended on the 2 yard line when the Indians held for downs. The drive however was continued after a quick punt and resulted in a touchdown when Hull, supported by plenty of interference, romped around end in an improvised play. Another Ranger drive was halted by the final whistle.

For the first time this season, the Rangers exhibited a dangerous threat in their air attack. The combination, Pattison to Morton, was responsible for the completion of four of the six passes attempted, accounting for 26 yards. On the other hand the visitors completed only one out of six attempts, and it was good for only a yard.

The summaries of the game reveal a total of seventeen first downs for the Rangers and six for the visitors. The total yardage made from scrimmage by the Rangers nearly doubled that made by Shattuck, being 214 yards as compared to 111 yards.

The game opened with Shattuck kicking off, the Rangers receiving on the 21 and carrying back to the 38. Line backs, sprints around end and a pass, Pattison to Morton, accounted for the first down, and the Rangers carried the ball to the 4 yard tape. Johnson went over standing up but was called back when it was decided that he stepped outside. The cross the goal line again on the next play but head linesman ruled both teams were offside. Finally Pattison slipped through center for the counter Ellis booted the piskin over the uprights for the extra point from placement.

#### DuBourdeau Visiting Star

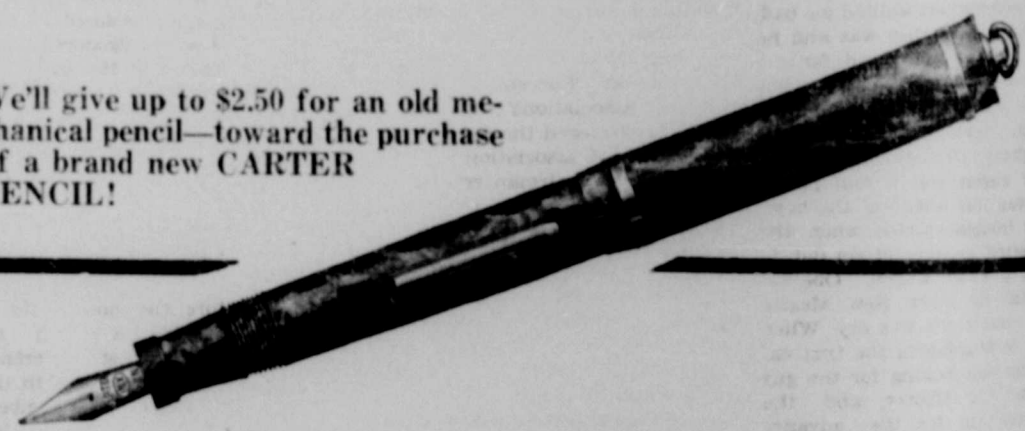

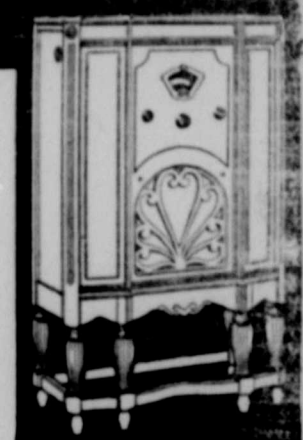

## Ferguson Is Bolter

Many Instances Cited Where Jim Refused To Stay With Nominees Of The Democrats

If Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt were a citizen of Texas, "he would not vote for Jim and Ma", says Porter R. Underwood in a public statement given Sunday after a conference of local Democrats who are forming a club to support Orville Bullington for governor.

A Roosevelt-Garner-Bullington organization is being formed in Amarillo and officers will be announced this week, Mr. Underwood said.

Mr. Underwood in his statement reviews the public utterances of Jim Ferguson wherein Mr. Ferguson bolted the Democratic party and told his supporters they were not bound to vote for the nominees.

The statement by Mr. Underwood follows:

"If the matter were not so serious it would be rather ludicrous to contemplate the appeal of Jim Ferguson and his adherents to 'vote the ticket straight from President to constable'.

"Possible some of Jim's and Ma's followers have forgotten the attitude of Jim in times past. For their benefit and for the benefit of new residents and new voters of our state, it might be well to review some history.

"Jim has not always believed in 'Lo and behold! As soon as the Democrats got in power they have made the corruption of the Republicans look like 30c and we who have been members of that party are truly ashamed of the record' (Ferguson Forum, August 21, 1919.)

And in a signed statement in his Forum of March 4, 1920, he said: 'What interest has a Democratic President ever shown for the welfare or even the rights of the Texas farmer or Texas ranchman? Who wants to be a Democrat anyhow? It is past history, present trouble and a future disgrace.'

And in a signed statement in the Forum of April 15, 1920, Jim Ferguson said: 'The Democratic party is a blow-up concern and everybody knows it. It is dead and it ought to die. It has betrayed the people and belied its principles.'

Jim would have you believe that he is a great admirer and follower of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Let us see what he said when Franklin D. Roosevelt was a candidate for the office of vice president with Cox for President, on the Democratic Ticket and Harding and Coolidge on the Republican Ticket.

"The infernal Democratic party can't run the schools.

"The infernal Democratic party can't build roads without graft.

"The infernal Democratic party can't run the State government without vicious extravagance.

"The infernal Democratic party is already condemned and beaten in the national campaign. Cox is a joke, and Wilson is a memory—Amarillo News.

## COLORED FERGUSON-FOR-GOVERNOR ORGANIZATION

Dallas, Oct. 26—Rumors that a group of Ferguson supporters is organizing a "black and tan" wing of the Democratic party in Texas gained ground Tuesday with the announcement that a "Colored Ferguson-for-Governor Club" with a state-wide membership had been organized at the negro Pythian Temple here.

The organization meeting followed closely upon the heels of a similar meeting held in Houston a week ago. The Houston gathering, according to a report published in "The Sentinel", a negro paper at Galveston, was attended by several white Ferguson leaders, including Ed J. Hussion, secretary of the new State Democratic executive committee, and M. Frank Hammond, former sheriff of Harris county and South Texas Ferguson manager.

"The Sentinel" reports in its issue of October 15 that the Houston rally was attended by "strictly a Ferguson crowd which cheered and applauded vociferously every time the name of Mrs. Ferguson or her husband, former Governor James E. Ferguson, was mentioned."

The hint of a "deal" with the executive committee was contained in the "Sentinel" report which quotes C. F. Richardson, negro political leader, as saying "if we do our duty in this campaign I don't believe that the state Democratic Executive committee will vote to keep us out of the primaries in 1934."

R. D. Evans, negro lawyer from Waco, charged that the "illy-white Republicans and Sterling Democrats were responsible for the negro's disfranchisement in Texas" and told his hearers that "James E. Ferguson has never opposed negroes voting in the primaries."

When future historians have written the real story of this country during the four years of the Hoover administration it will disclose that they were the four blackest pages in our history. Among other things it will disclose:

It will disclose that during his administration we lived in a land that had so much corn and other foodstuffs that we were hungry; so many houses that thousands were homeless; so much cotton, and clothing that millions of the people were in rags; so much coal, and fuel that they suffered when the winter winds blew; so much gold that the masses of the people were penniless; so many roads to build, flood waters to control, swamps to drain and dry lands to irrigate that the people were idle and without work—a people in a wilderness of plenty, dismayed and suffering and with a President unable or unwilling to lead them out.

That we had bursting granaries, bulging gold reserves, over-stocked warehouses of raw and finished products awaiting buyers; idle ships tied to our idle docks; millions of idle men and women walking the highways in search of work, and that when we looked to our leader in Washington (our president) for assistance and guidance we saw nothing in his eyes but an expression of confused hope and pitiful promises.

And all this during a time when our Treasury was filled with gold and gold bullion of the people, kept out of circulation and treated as "sterile" by the influence of the Money Trust, while the people cried out for credits and went hungry by reason of lack of them.

But they will not wonder for long why this condition existed when they scan the pages of the corporate records during his administration and discover that thousands of industries were merged into allied and interlocking consolidations operated and controlled by the few; that one corporate system controlled three-fourths of our telephone, another the same proportion of the telegraph and still another the field of radio.

They will not wonder when they discover that during his administration a few great investment trusts dominated the entire electric industry and that one corporation alone owns more than one-half the country's iron industry; another 90 per cent of the nickel; that four major concerns rule the copper industry, while eight own 80 per cent of the nation's coal.

Searching further it will be revealed that two giant concerns owning 80 per cent of the automobiles produced; two packing companies handled more than 50 per cent of meat in interstate commerce and that 1 per cent of the country's banks held resources equal to the other 99 per cent.

And when the story of hunger is told they will know why when they learn that through amalgamation of flour mills, food packing plants, canning factories and chain stores (now withstanding our anti-trust laws which were not enforced by Hoover's administration) that our "daily bread" was not only dependent upon soulless monopoly, but that the price paid the producers for the raw commodities, as well as the price at which the finished product was sold was regulated from the self-same corporate desks.

These are only a part of the things that have been done or left undone by Hoover and have contributed to our suffering.

And when the future citizen has read the complete story he will not wonder that Hooverism was repudiated (as it will be) by the people of the United States at the election on November 8, 1932.

And he will look with pity and amazement upon the minority who, in November, 1932, expressed a desire for a continuation of Hoover policies by voting for him, and say: "That bunch were gluttons for punishment."

## FORMER ATTORNEY-GENERAL AGAINST FERGUSON

Dallas, Oct. 26—General M. M. Crane, former attorney general and for many years a leader of the Democratic party in Texas, will not vote for Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson for governor in November, he announced here today. It will be the first time he has failed to support a Democratic nominee for president or governor, he explained, adding that he has always recognized the fact that "any nomination procured by fraudulent or illegal votes does not bind any Democrat."

Gen. Crane, an ardent supporter of both Franklin D. Roosevelt and John Garner, says he is "intensely interested in electing the national ticket." He recalls that he was for Garner when the presidential boom for the speaker was launched, but that he was "very happy when it was adjusted by having Roosevelt for president and Garner for vice president."

In explaining his refusal to support the candidacy of Mrs. Ferguson, Gen. Crane said, in part: "Governor Sterling having charged and standing ready and demanding the right to prove that Mrs. Ferguson's alleged majority was procured by fraudulent and illegal votes, and the Ferguson interposing dilatory pleas, would have been itself almost tantamount to an admission that Sterling was right."

Presenting Three Act Mystery Play Nov. 10

Advance sales of one hundred tickets for the play "Death Takes a Holiday" has already been made, three weeks in advance of presentation, November 10, Miss Dorothy M. Roberts, supervisor of dramatics has announced. Large blocks of seats have been taken by people in Guymon, Texhoma, Hooker and in Elkhart, Kansas.

"Death Takes a Holiday" was recommended in 1931 as one of "the year's best plays" by Playgoers League incorporated, an organization which provides plays on tour. This three act mystery comedy has had 180 performances at the Ethel Barrymore Theatre in New York. In a survey of two hundred leading colleges and universities "Death Takes a Holiday" was chosen as the preferred play of the year.

Seventy Million Voters

Census Bureau Estimates That We Now Have This Staggering Number Eligible Voters

The Census Bureau estimates that the number of persons in the United States who will be of voting age on election day, November 8, and who are not disqualified from voting by reason of being aliens, will be slightly more than 70,000,000. The Bureau explains, however, that this figure covers all the potential voters, but it does not mean that the entire 70,000,000 will be actually eligible to vote, since local and state regulations will bar many from the polls.

In some states, for instance, poll taxes must be paid a certain number of months in advance of the election, or the voter is barred from balloting, and a wide variety of restrictions are imposed by many states. These restrictions cut down materially the total number of those who are eligible to vote.

In the Presidential election of 1928 the total vote for all candidates, including blank, void and defective ballots, was 36,879,474. President Hoover's popular vote was 21,392,190, while Alfred E. Smith, the Democratic candidate, received 15,016,445, giving Hoover a majority of 6,375,747.

It has long been a reproach to American citizenship that only about 50 per cent of the qualified electors cast their ballots, even in Presidential elections—a percentage lower than in any other self governing country in the world.

It is worthy of note, however, that the total registrations and the number of votes cast in this year's primary elections throughout the country have been far above the average. All indications point to a record vote at the next general election.

## EDITORIAL

### UTILITY RATES

The depression may be on, prices on all commodities have come down, but in so far as the customers of the utilities serving Perryton are concerned, they are still rolling in the fat and making just as much money as they did several years back. Rates for electric, natural gas and telephone service is at the same high level of good times. All other business houses have had to reduce prices; the farmers have had to take prices below cost of production for their products, yet the utilities continue to charge the same rates. We say to the devil with all this bunk that the corporations put out about being allowed a fair return on their investment. How about the business man and the farmer during these days? Few of them are even starting to pay operating expenses, let alone making anything to apply for interest on investment and depreciation. Yet we pay the same "boom day" rates to the Texas-Louisiana Power Co., the Southwestern Associated Telephone Co., and the Public Service Corporation. Folks, it's not right, these big corporations are playing unfair with us in not voluntarily making reductions in times such as these. If they were fair minded and wanted to get in line with the rest of us, they would not be forced to reduce their rates. God knows that they have had plenty of time to reduce. This depression has been on us three years now and we suppose that the minute times begin to get better, they will ask for an increase in rates to make up for the great amount of money they have lost. When the utilities talk about a fair profit on their investment, they figure the return on their capitalized stock, which in many cases, due to the high methods of financing, is many times the actual value even at the peak of the prosperity era. Let these corporations figure themselves a fair return based on the actual value of their property today, or better still on the value they themselves place on it for taxation purposes. We would see a different schedule of rates in effect in Perryton if this was the case. The Liberal papers recently announced that after a conference with a committee from the Liberal Chamber of Commerce, the gas company serving that city reduced their rates to a maximum of 35c per thousand cubic feet. Perryton pays 60c for the same amount, almost double. The City of Perryton hired a bunch of high powered (and that means high priced) lawyers to fight the Public Service Corporation for lower rates. After almost a year of high powered (?) effort on the part of these attorneys, a hearing was finally held before the Railroad Commission. Since then, we have heard nothing but we do know that the citizens of Perryton are still paying 60c per thousand cu. ft. for natural gas. With all due respects to the managers of our utilities for their public spiritedness, it just doesn't seem to us that they are totin' fair with their customers, many of whose earning power has been reduced to nil, when they go on charging the same rates for electric, gas and telephone service as was the custom when everybody was making plenty of money.

### CONSTITUTION AMENDMENTS

Nine constitutional amendments will be voted on by the electorate of the State of Texas at the general election on November 8. As a general rule Texans are prone to amend their constitution, many actually expressing the opinion that the constitution framed by those grand old patriots back in the days of yore is good enough for all time. But, this idea has lost ground. Two years ago, five amendments were approved by the voters and most of the present proposals should be adopted. It is the duty of every citizen to study these questions and endeavor to put themselves in a position to cast an intelligent vote upon each and every one of the proposed amendments.

The first amendment appearing on the ballot is that all lands and property, and proceeds from same, belonging to the University of Texas shall be put into a permanent fund to be invested only in bonds of the United States, Texas, any county, school bonds of municipalities, or any city, in the state. This is a change of the amendment passed two years ago. At that time the University regents asking for the privilege of using proceeds for the purpose of erecting buildings at the

state university at Austin and at Texas A. & M. Now that the building program has been completed the regents are asking that this restraint be placed on the university so that unnecessary expenditures will not be made, thereby keeping the permanent fund intact.

Another amendment provides that property may be sold for delinquent taxes without court suit, but that only sufficient portion be sold to satisfy amount of taxes past due. Under present laws, the owner may redeem lands and property sold for delinquent taxes by paying double the amount of sale price. Under the proposed new amendment, property may be redeemed within one year by the payment of all costs, plus not exceeding twenty-five per cent of the aggregate total, and within two years by the payment of not exceeding fifty per cent of the total. It appears to us that this is another amendment that should carry.

The third amendment provides that the state or any political subdivision shall be restrained from the collection of any taxes that are delinquent for a period of ten years or more. This is a very good amendment and should be approved by the voters. If the state, county, school district or city, is negligent enough to permit tax obligations to go unpaid for a period of ten years, they should be barred from collecting same just as a business firm has outlaw dates on accounts.

Another amendment gives the right of the ballot and to hold office to officers and enlisted men of the Texas National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps. These men should be given the right to vote and hold office in Texas.

At the present time, counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico, are required to carry bond issues for the construction of sea walls, breakwaters, etc., by a two-thirds majority of all qualified voters. A new amendment gives them the right of carrying same by a two-thirds majority vote of all voters voting in the election.

Here is another amendment that has to do with the qualifications for voting. In the past in this state, electors who owned any property of any nature whatsoever that was subject to taxation, were entitled to vote in bond elections, even though said property was not rendered for taxation. In other words, a person could own a dollar watch, which is taxable, and his or her vote would count just as much as the person who paid hundreds of dollars in taxes. Under the amendment, only electors who own taxable property, and who have duly rendered same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote in elections called for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming debt. This is an excellent law. Its only trouble is that it does not go far enough but it is a step in the right direction.

Now comes the amendment which carries a lot of potential dynamite and one that is very likely to carry and one which in our judgment should by all means be defeated. It is the amendment exempting \$3,000.00 of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from the payment of state taxes. If this amendment passes, the 35c state ad valorem school tax will be eliminated. It is estimated that the loss in revenue to the state will \$5,000,000. The valuations of all property other than homesteads have been greatly decreased and the income of the state available school fund is decreasing accordingly. Local school income, on account of decreased valuations, has declined in the same proportion. Income to the school fund from the gasoline tax is 23 per cent under 1931. These facts show that school incomes for 1933-34 will be 25 per cent to 30 per cent lower than last year with the possibility that such income will not be over one-half of that of last year. Can we as believers in good schools afford to vote for such legislation that will stunt and retard our public school system? Why should residence homesteads be exempted from state or any other taxation? The government is by the people and for the people and the people should pay it in proportion to their property holdings. Some say that such an exemption is taking the taxes off the little man and putting it on the bigger man. We say that this is not the case. How about the center, who is the man least able

of any to pay taxes? Under this amendment the man who rents property will have to pay the taxes on the property which he rents. Rent properties are not exempt, the landlord will have to pay taxes on same, and this tax is naturally passed on to the renter. Does this help the poor man? We say that it is the duty of every man, be he rich, poor or just in between, to pay for the support of his government and the schools, in proportion to the amount of property that he owns.

But here comes the most serious

part of this "Homestead" exemption law. It is the part that can wreck real havoc with our schools, our city and our county government. Mr. Putman, the author of this amendment, and a number of other very competent authorities have rendered the opinion that no political subdivision can impose taxes upon property which the State itself cannot tax. If such is the case, then the County of Ochiltree, the various school districts, and the City of Perryton, will have their revenues so depleted that it will be impossible

to maintain an adequate government and school system. It will be impossible to raise enough taxes from property that is not exempt to operate our schools. We are appealing to the voters of Ochiltree county to give due consideration to this amendment. On first thought, it looks like a wonderful way to save money, but the more you investigate it, the greater the dangers appear to be. Think seriously before you ruin our schools and county and city government by voting for this legislation.

It is estimated that the amendment to combine the offices of tax collector and tax assessor will result in a saving annually to the people of Texas of one-half million dollars. In counties under 10,000 population, such as Ochiltree, the offices of sheriff, tax collector, and tax assessor would be combined. In counties of over 10,000 population, where the sheriff and tax collector offices are separate, the tax assessor's office would be combined with that of tax collector.

The last amendment is to author-

ize the legislature to provide funds for a Texas Centennial celebration, prescribing time, place, and manner. The Texas Centennial is sponsored by the Texas Press Association, the Texas Advertising Federation, the Texas Daily Press League, the Progressive Texans, and scores of civic and patriotic organizations throughout the state.
