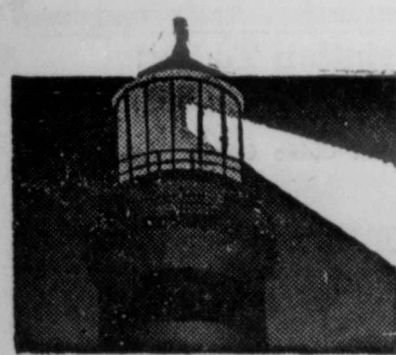

Throughout our town there is a lot of property on which no taxes have been paid for some time. This condition creates a bad situation for the City is deprived of the taxes it needs to operate all of the services it renders for the people of the city. It is a bad situation for the property owner too for his taxes pile up year after year and after a while the amount becomes so large it is difficult to pay. City officials regret such circumstances for they are charged with the responsibility of operating the city government. Such operation becomes difficult when there is a large amount of taxes that are not collected each year. The only course left for the officials is to try to collect such taxes even if they have to resort to entering suit to foreclose tax liens. A tax attorney was hired recently by the city for the purpose of collecting delinquent taxes and he is at work now preparing to sue when necessary. This perhaps will work a hardship on some who owe delinquent taxes but the city government needs to get this property back on a tax paying basis.

I have been wondering if those farmers who have already defoliated and harvested their cotton lost by doing it so early. The kind of weather we have had for the past two months has been the kind of weather we needed for the cotton to put on more cotton forms. Even one or two bolts added to each stalk would produce quite a lot more cotton per acre.

Bulldogs Throw Bronte Longhorns Into Daze Fri.

The Loraine Bulldogs made their way into the District 8-B winning column at the expense of the Bronte Longhorns at Bronte Friday night. The Bulldogs rolled up 398 yards on the ground for a 46-18 victory.

The first time the Bulldogs got their hands on the ball they moved rapidly down the field for their first TD, which was a one-yard run by Larry Rankin. The conversion was run by Ronnie Blair.

Bronte fullback Douglas McCutchen brought the hometown fans to their feet with an 85-yard scoring run on the kick-off. The pass attempt for the extra points was incomplete. The Longhorns took a 12-8 first quarter lead when McCutchen, a 165-pound freshman, scored from 16 yards out, a few minutes later, but the conversion try failed.

The Bulldogs came back in the third quarter when Larry Rankin broke loose with a five yard plunge, and Randy Britton ran the conversion. This gave the Bulldogs a 16-12 lead over the Longhorns.

The final Bronte TD came in the second quarter, and gave the hosts a 18-16 halftime lead. The score came on a 60-yard aerial from Royce Lee to Rickey Wheat. The Bulldogs came back in the third quarter with a strong determination. The Bulldogs scored 14 points in the third quarter and 16 more in the fourth while holding Bronte scoreless.

Quarterback Kenneth Brame scored 12 of the points on two touchdowns, while Blair got six more points on a 25-yard burst over right tackle. Britton got loose on a long run for one touchdown and ran two of the bonus points. Rankin ran for two points to complete the good night's work. The win of this game gave the Bulldogs a chance for District 8-B championship. The Bulldogs showed their strength Friday night in a very good showing of the whole team.

During the nights work three of the Bulldogs suffered minor

injuries. They were Ronnie Blair, Donnie Phillips, and Catarino Martinez.

Bronte moved for 8 first downs while Loraine moved for 19. The Longhorns had 161 yards rushing while Loraine took 398. Bronte had 94 passing yardage, and Loraine did not have any. Bronte completed 4 of 18 passes while Loraine did not complete any of 2 passes. The Longhorns had 1 pass interception, and Loraine took 3. Bronte was penalized 3 for 32 while Loraine only had 2 for 10. The Bronte Longhorns lost 4 fumbles, and the Bulldogs lost 2.

Johnson - Humphrey Wins

Loraine and the Mitchell County voters Tuesday joined with voters throughout the United States in giving a native Texan an overwhelming popular vote and an impressive electoral vote to send him back to the White House as President for another four years.

Returns were still incomplete Wednesday morning but with 91 percent of the vote tabulated President Johnson and Hubert Humphrey had won in 45 states with a total of 486 electoral votes for the Democratic Party. Senator Barry Goldwater and Bill Miller for the Republican Party had nailed down five states with an electoral vote of 35 with Arizona's 12 votes yet not decided.

The Democrats forged the greatest victory since Franklin Roosevelt defeated Alf Landon. Near 72 million voters went to the

polls Tuesday which was the largest number ever to vote in an election in this country.

In the Loraine precinct Johnson and Humphrey got 441 of the 530 ballots cast while Goldwater and Miller received 89 votes. Senator Ralph Yarborough received 422 and his opponent George Bush got 108. Congressman At-Large Joe Pool got 458 votes and his Republican opponent 66. Congressman George Mahon of

the 19th District captured the largest vote among Democratic candidates for national office when he garnered 492 votes to 54 for his Republican opponent Joe Phillips.

Other Democrats for state offices also were far ahead of their Republican opponents in Loraine precinct. For Gov. John Connally got 478 to 54 for Crighton; Lt. Gov. Preston Smith also got 478

and his opponent Horace Houston 48; Attorney General Waggoner Carr 495 to 47 for John Trice; Ag. Com. John White 476 to 53 for John B. Armstrong; Com. General Land Office Jerry Sadler 483 to 60 for John A. Matthews, Comp. Public Accounts Robert Calvert 484 and Dallas Calmes Jr. 46; State Treasurer Jesse James 481 and Fred Neumann 44; R. R. Com. Jim C. Langdon 494 and Don Flanagan 47; Asso. Jus.

Sup. Court Jack Pope 492 and T. E. Kennerly 48; State Senator David Ratliff 488 and J. R. Anderson 48.

The constitutional amendments on the ballot all received affirmative votes in Loraine. Number 1 was 208 for and 64 against; No. 2, 180 for and 81 against; No. 3, 214 for and 74 against. The amendments also carried in Mitchell County.

In Mitchell County the demo-

crats garnered 2420 votes to 737 for the republicans in the presidential race. Senator Ralph Yarborough carried the county handily over his opponent George Bush 2281 to 876. Congressman George Mahon led the democratic candidates in the county 2724 votes to 502 for Phillips. Governor Connally was next highest vote getter in the county with 2666 to 447 for Crighton.

Social Security Benefits

Many people do not realize that earnings of babysitters who work in private homes must be reported and social security taxes be paid if their earnings from one employer amount to as much as \$50 cash paid in any calendar quarter, Erven Fisher, social security district manager in Big Spring, said today.

This means that babysitters or any other workers in a private home (such as maids, cooks, gardeners, and the like), who work for the same employer often enough to earn at least \$4 a week have the same protection under the law as workers in commerce and industry. An employee is never too young or too old to be covered under social security, Mr. Fisher said.

Every employer who has household help that meets this requirement should:

1. Make a record of the employee's social security number.
2. Deduct social security taxes from the employee's earnings each week or payday.
3. File the quarterly report with Internal Revenue Service including both the employee's and employer's share of the tax.

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A VIGNETTE FROM THE PAST

SEPT. 25, 1931

Judge O. E. Stevenson, who is buying cotton on the streets of Loraine, is perhaps Texas oldest cotton buyer from a standpoint of number of years spent buying cotton. The Judge has been buying cotton since 1880 -- a period of fifty one years. The lowest he has ever paid for cotton was 3 1/2 cents per pound while the highest mark he has paid was 43 1/2 cents per pound, in 1919, when he bought A. C. Taylor's cotton crop of that year for that price. He paid Mr. Taylor more than eight thousand dollars for his cotton crop of 1919.

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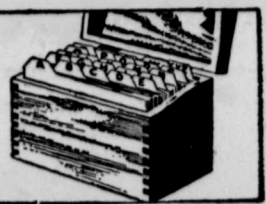

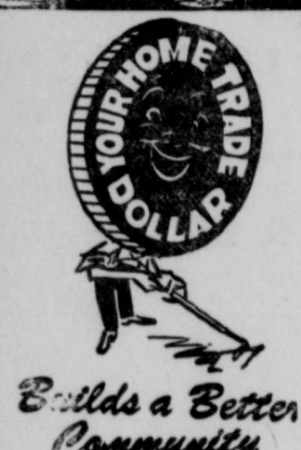
