Deer Hunting By Bow and Arrow Set for October

Deer hunting with longbows and arrows will be permitted this year for the first time in the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge.

Rep. Leroy Wieting reports that details as to the way the hunting will be conducted and the number of deer permits will be released as soon as officials of the Wildlife Refuge and the State Parks and Wildlife Department get final approval on proposed plans.

The Wildlife Refuge will operate under the law as an individual property owner, according to Wieting, and can set such regulations over and beyond those set out in state proclamation.

This hunt, when permitted, will be during a certain period during the special open season covering Aransas County, from Oct. 1 through 31.

This special season on buck deer with prolonged antlers is the period when only long bow and arrow hunting will be permitted.

In part, the proclamation which makes deer hunting permissible in Aransas County on the Wildlife Refuge is as follows:

"There shall be . . . an open season on fish, game animals, game birds and fur bearing animals on so much of the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge as lies in Aransas County to the extent that Federal laws, rules or regulations may permit an open season thereon."

The basic law on archery in Texas is as follows:

"It is lawful to hunt deer, bear, turkey and javelina during the open seasons provided therefore with a longbow and arrow only if:

a) The bow is capable of shooting a hunting arrow equipped with a broadhead hunting point for a distance of 130 yards, and

b) The arrow is equipped with a broadhead hunting point at least 7/8-inch in width and over 1 1/2 inches in length, and

c) The arrow bears the name and address of the user in a non-water-soluble medium, and

d) The arrow is not either poisoned, drugged or explosive.

It is unlawful to use a crossbow.

Wieting said, "The move to set up special hunting in Aransas County started several years ago and definitely in that direction when I first passed the bill placing Aransas County under the State Regulatory Authority."

"This made it possible for the State to come to the local people and land owners, as in this case, present testimony of overstocked conditions, so a proclamation could be issued making certain changes as needed.

"There is a possibility in the future that a controlled shotgun or rifle may be used in the taking of deer on certain portions of the Refuge if deemed necessary by the land owner because of overstocked conditions.

"The present State law, as just passed, would cover such a hunt although, since the Refuge is a land owner, Federal laws, rules and regulations will apply if an open season is permitted.

"The present law does not cover antlerless deer in Aransas County so I am drafting a bill to introduce in the next legislature to include antlerless deer in a future proclamation, if the people of Aransas County so desire."

Fulton Lions Sponsoring Essay Contest

The youth of Fulton have been given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their local Lions Club—a challenge that could earn one of them a \$25,000 educational and/or career assistance grant.

The Fulton Lions Club, together with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the most important world subject today—Peace. The contest offers \$50,000 in total awards, including the \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Illinois in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.

"We are hopeful one of our young people will win this world-wide prestige award," President E. T. Busch, president of the Fulton Lions Club, said in announcing the contest locally today.

The contest, open to young people who will be 14 but less than 22 years of age as of Jan. 15, 1967, was announced by the president of Lions International, Edward M. Lindsey, of Lawrenceburg, Tenn., during the Association's Annual International Convention in New York.

"The Peace Essay Contest is divided into eight world divisions for the \$1,000 prizes," President Busch said.

"Our Club's winner will advance to Lions District 7 competition in his (her) effort to qualify for the multiple district contest," Busch said.

Shrimp Landings Decline In July

Landings of headless shrimp at Texas ports in July 1966 amounted to 6.3 million pounds—1.2 million pounds below July 1965, according to O. F. Farley of the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries at Galveston.

The sharp decline resulted from a drop in brown shrimp landings from both bay and adjacent Gulf waters.

The Brownsville-Port Isabel area accounted for 35 per cent of the July landings; Aransas Pass - Rockport, 29 per cent; and Freeport, 20 per cent.

Landings for specific areas and periods were as follows: Galveston - Seabrook: July 1966 - 1,374,700; January-July 1965 - 624,500.

Freeport: July 1966 - 1,348,300; January-July 1966 - 2,377,100; January-July 1965 - 516,700.

Matagorda - Palacios: July 1966 - 61,900; January-July 1966 - 193,800; January - July 1965 - 400,300.

Port Lavaca-Port O'Connor- Seadrift: July 1966 - 198,800; January-July 1966 - 637,400; January-July 1965 - 759,600.

Little Bay Now In City Limits

LITTLE BAY SHORES SUBDIVISION UNIT 1 NOW PART OF CITY OF ROCKPORT

The City Council Monday night passed an annexation ordinance admitting this attractive residential area which is just north of what was the city limits.

Residents of Little Bay Shores Unit 1, all of whom have been getting water and sewer service from the city but at a slightly higher rate than city residents, now will receive these services at the lower cost which applies to city residents.

Also, their area will come under the regulations of the new zoning ordinance passed recently to help assure orderly expansion and protect property values.

This action was taken after a petition signed by a majority of property owners asked for annexation. The Council also:

—Voted to pay Carl Vickers Water Wells, Corpus Christi, \$25,639.72 for drilling water wells Nos. 17 and 18, after Director of Public Works Tom Shults reported that bacteriological tests had shown that water from these wells was satisfactory.

—Passed a resolution recommending that the new causeway be named "Lyndon B. Johnson Causeway." Aldermen N. F. Jackson and N. C. Vandagriff voted in favor of the resolution, and Alderman Earnest Harriest and Charlie Garrett against it. Mayor Delmar R. Hiller broke the tie by voting in favor of it.

—Agreed on specifications for a new garbage truck which will be mailed to bidders whose bids must be received by Sept. 12.

—Named J. W. Hunt as a regular member of the Board of Adjustments to succeed Miss Miss Lola L. Bonner. Hunt had been an alternate. The Council also named Jimmy Little as an alternate to succeed Hunt.

—Named R. L. Eckman as a member of the City Planning and Zoning Commission to serve during the unexpired term of Jack McDavid who resigned because of the press of business.

—Agreed to pay the expenses of Chief of Police Bob Hewes to attend a conference of the Texas Check Investigators Association in Dallas, Sept. 25-26.

—Set Monday, Sept. 12, 7:30 p.m. as the time for a public hearing at the City Hall on the city's budget for Oct. 1, 1966 to Oct. 1, 1967.

—Set Oct. 3 for a joint public hearing of the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Council to consider all requests already received, or which will be received by Sept. 11, for changes in the zoning ordinance or for special permits.

—Reviewed the tentative budget for the coming fiscal year.

—Two local men charged with stealing 114 pounds of shrimp worth about \$95 from Rouquette and Wendell Fish Company. They are being held in lieu of \$1,000 bond each.

—Another local man is held on three bad check charges, two here and one in Corpus Christi, and for what is called conversion by bailee which in this case means he failed to pay for a used fan or return it when he couldn't pay. He is held for failure to post \$1,000 bond, and there is a "hold" order on him for Nueces county authorities.

—A fourth local man is held under \$1,000 bond on a bad check charge.

1966—1,836,700; January-July 1966—4,223,900; January-July 1965—4,926,900.

Brownsville - Port Isabel: July 1966—2,172,400; January-July 1966—7,492,100; January-July 1965—8,277,400.

Total: July 1966—6,273,900; January-July 1966—16,971,700; January-July 1965—19,296,200.

The 45-day statutory closed shrimp season in Texas offshore waters ended July 15. Shrimp trawl vessels working adjacent waters made sporadic heavy catches of 31-42 brown shrimp in all areas east

of Freeport to east of Port Isabel. However, the areas of concentration were small and fished out in 2-4 nights.

All areas had a short supply of small 51 and over count shrimp that contribute largely to the brown shrimp fishery in September and October. Throughout July only about 30 per cent of the brown catch were 51 and over whereas in July 1965, about 49 per cent were 51 and over, and in July 1964 approximately 35 per cent were in this size range.

Vessels working large white shrimp inside of 10 fathoms made fair to poor catches of 10-15 count shrimp due in part to the 25-foot maximum net size for the first 15 days

of the month. Female white shrimp containing mature "spawn" were taken in quantity as late as July 20.

This is highly irregular in that the small first of the year crop were in the estuarine systems by this late date as usual, but the members taken from our most productive bays indicated a drop of 15-20 per cent below last year's marginal crop. Pink shrimp landings were practically non-existent in July as was expected from the poor catches since November 1965.

The ex-vessel value of all grade size shrimp maintained record levels throughout July with the top four machine grade counts bringing over \$1 per pound.

Several Mexican flag vessels worked waters off the Texas coast in July. The trawlers worked from east of Corpus Christi to Port Isabel for about five days. One was seized and fined for working in Texas waters without proper license. The vessel and crew were released in about 48 hours.

Under U. S. Maritime laws, Mexican fishing vessels can enter some U. S. ports, take provisions, and return to sea. However, Mexican fishing vessels cannot sell their catch to regular dockside processors.

Blue crab landings totaled 373,000 pounds compared with 463,000 pounds in July 1965. Commercial landings have been down monthly throughout 1966 compared with the two previous years.

New Texas-built vessels entered the domestic fishery throughout July with several others nearing completion. Three vessels were lost at sea in July.

Several weeks ago you printed a letter in your column. This was in protest to the naming of the new causeway after our President, Lyndon B. Johnson. Also it stated the Chamber of Commerce has hopes of securing thousands of dollars worth of free advertising from this event.

Altho I have no inside information as to what the Chamber of Commerce has in mind. I feel quite confident this is exactly what they are aiming for, free advertising. Never let it be said, nor ever let the fact be sold short, that advertising is indeed a very important factor in our every day life. It is the backbone to many a business and community success.

The name to be bestowed upon the new bridge is of mere importance. Frankly I wouldn't care less if they named it

after the Queen of Sheba or some cotton picker from Taft, Texas. Who of us will ever remember or use the name it is honored with? We will of course, call it by a name more suitable to our individual liking. So what's really in a name.

Seems to me the important issue here is advertising; and indeed it is an important factor. Rockport-Fulton area can either sit back and enjoy their historical markers, and let the rest of the surrounding area enjoy progress and prosperity; or they can join the progress in motion era. Our area has growing pains. Like it or not it is a fact to be faced, and improved upon. This area can in time be a year round tourist area. We have much to offer the tourist, much more than our number one tourist state of Florida. For this is a family area. Wonderful year round climate, beautiful beaches, fishing, swimming, water skiing, golf, boating, round and square dancing; you name it and we have it. Problem is what to do with it?

You cannot stop progress but you sure can turn away prosperity. The more advertising we do, free or otherwise, the more people come to our area, the more people the more money is spent here. Shell will be operator for the No. 1 State Tract 691-L (SE) to be located 6,200 feet from the east line and 2,600 feet from the south line of the 1,440 acre lease and of the state tract.

A Migration Tragedy

Publisher's Note: The following article was written by L. D. Nuckles, Information and Education Officer, Region V, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and published in the August news letter of the Texas Ornithological Society.

This spring, on a fishing trip to the Gulf of Mexico, we didn't catch any fish, but the trip was well worthwhile. We witnessed a strange quirk of nature. The wind had been blowing from the north for three days, but had let up in time for the seas to quiet down enough to allow us to fish. This had been a strong

blustery norther, the last of the season.

As we trolled, some 16 to 18 miles offshore, we saw hundreds of small birds flying from the south. It soon became obvious that the little songsters were having serious difficulties.

They appeared to be exhausted, and once in a while we would see one plunge into the water. It looked as if his motor had just quit running, or he had run out of fuel. Many of the little finches, song sparrows, warblers and orioles, as well as cowbirds landed on our boat and rested before continuing their journey.

Some died aboard the boat while many fell into the water because they were unable to

gain enough altitude above the water to perch on the deck (about five feet). Some of the smarter ones, including a pair of cowbirds, stayed on the boat until we reached the dock.

We stood by helplessly and watched the swooping, daring gulls forcing the small exhausted birds into the water. As soon as the little bird crashed into the sea, the gull would light and gobble up his little cousin. I don't think I will ever like gulls again.

I have been in the wildlife management business for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for over 20 years, and I am well aware of nature's cruelty. She is just as relentless in her effort to keep down surplus numbers as she is in trying to maintain and reproduce any particular species.

This, however, was more than I could understand. I don't think I have ever had such a completely helpless feeling, not being able to do a thing to help the thousands of little brightly colored songbirds who needed help so badly.

One touch of comedy was the pair of cowbirds which came on deck together. In a few minutes, they were wandering around the boat as if they owned it; and in a little while they were walking around on our arms. They would sit on our shoulders and peer at us as if trying to decide just what kind of birds we were.

After a little while, they went down into the cabin and made themselves at home. When we docked the boat, they hopped ashore and went walking down the dock which was alive with people. The people gave way and let the birds walk by, still too tired to fly.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:

"Section 63. (1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

(2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen vicinially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner. (b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section.

If designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use, or is sold, the land shall be subject to an additional

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

Meeting Your Child's Teacher? Be Prepared For Some Surprises

"Mom and Dad, this my teacher." Whether your child is 6 or 16, you're likely to hear these words sometime during the next school year—in the classroom when you visit, in the supermarket, at church or clubhouse.

The confrontation may hold a few surprises for you. For one thing, your child's teacher may be younger than you expected. According to the National Education Association, the average teacher today is on the sunny side of 40—39.1 of age, to be exact.

they actually outnumber the women. Men teachers on the average are about six years younger than women members of the nation's teaching corps. If your child's teacher is typical, he will be about 35 years old, married, and teaching in the high school. He probably has taught for 10 years—six to seven of them in your school system. His subjects? Probably math, science or social studies. He has, on the average, 134 students in five classes a day, not counting his home room and study hall assignments. He has earned his bachelor's degree (91 percent of all teachers have) and is working toward his master's.

As for the teacher's salary, that depends a great deal on which region of the country his teaching post is located. On a regional basis, the Southeast section of the U. S. continues to have the lowest average salary for its instructional staffs—\$5,585 last year, compared with an average of \$8,168 in the Far West and with \$7,503 in the Middle Atlantic States.

whole country this year is \$6,506. Texas ranks far below this average being 32nd among the states with an average slightly more than \$5,000 per year. The teacher's salary prospects have grown considerably brighter in the last 20 years, but his take-home pay still is considerably less than other occupations with similar preparation requirements—less than that of the auditor and attorney, the mathematician and chemist, the research scientist and the engineer.

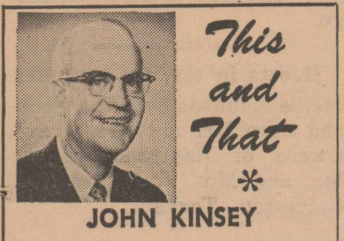

The 28-foot cutter, I learned, belongs to Betty and Bob Stroot who moved here a few months ago from San Antonio. They found the vessel lying in drydock in Dumbarton, Scotland, during a visit in 1963. In 1964 they returned and purchased her.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;

(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and

(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis. "Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment."

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized."

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, either or both of them, for the purchase, acquisition by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof, after any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that

vote in favor of its creation if existing airports are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority, said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner of taxable property within the county or counties, said bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayers voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November,

1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties using voting machines, the above provision for voting, for and against this Constitutional Amendment, shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machines for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

How Medicare Works

This is the seventh in a series of articles from H. M. Cleveland, district manager, Social Security Administration, Corpus Christi, on how Medicare will work. The information is based on "Your Medicare Handbook," the guide that was issued to all medicare beneficiaries.

By H. M. Cleveland District Manager

The medical insurance program is financed by monthly premiums paid by those who sign up for this protection and by matching payments from general revenues of the Federal Government. The monthly premium rate (and the matching payment) is \$3 for each person enrolled.

How the Premiums are Paid The \$3 premium will be deducted from your monthly checks if you receive social security, railroad retirement, or civil service benefits, beginning with the check you receive at the beginning of the month your medical insurance protection begins.

If you are not receiving any of the above benefits, you will pay the premiums directly to the Social Security Administration.

If you are eligible for social security, railroad retirement, or civil service, you will receive a premium due notice for \$9 every 3 months.

A punchcard and return envelope for you to use in sending in the payment will be enclosed with the premium notice. Be sure to send in your payments promptly, and pay by personal check or money order instead of sending cash. And remember to return the punchcard with your payment. If you fail to send in your premium, your medical insurance coverage will be terminated, after reasonable notice.

People who are getting old-age assistance payments will have \$3 a month added to their old-age assistance checks by State Department of Public Welfare. They will be expected to use this \$3 a month to pay their premiums for medical insurance benefits.

If You Decide to Drop Your Medical Insurance

You are not under any obligation to continue your medical insurance coverage. If you wish to drop out of the medical insurance program, you may do so by giving written notice to the Social Security Administration during a general enrollment period.

Austin.—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reminds hunters that the deadline for the second annual experimental teal season is Monday, Aug. 8.

That, according to a spokesman, means that the application for a special permit must be in the Department headquarters by that date. The address is John H. Reagan Bldg., Austin, Texas, 78701.

Reports from the northland that the summer nesting season got off to a late but apparently successful start, is expected to influence the interest in the test shoot.

When the second consecutive season was announced ap-

plications flooded the Department but inquiries now have slackened to a pace below that of 1965.

Last fall, 12,943 hunters participated in the season that was authorized to determine feasibility of permitting an early season harvest of teal. These fleet birds usually migrate so early they already have departed southward before the regular waterfowl season opens.

This fall, the season is being held one week later, or from Sept. 10 to 18, inclusive.

The bag limits are the same four per day and eight in possession after the opening day.

Participants must have the special teal season permit as well as a regular state hunting license and a Federal duck stamp.

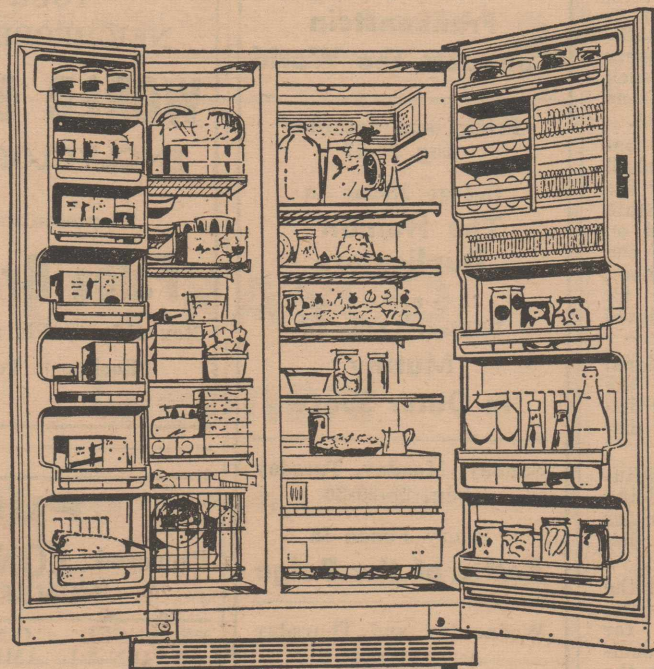

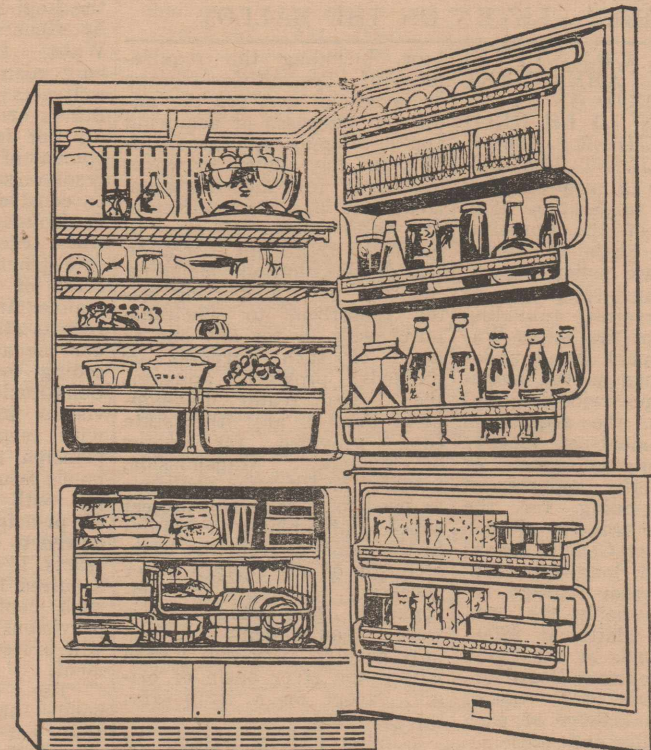

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; their terms, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.
