Final rites were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the Church of Christ at Fifth and Elm Streets for Rupert H. (Dock) Barber, a clothing store salesman here for many years. The 64-year-old man died Tuesday morning in the local hospital following a heart attack. Floyd J. Spivey, church minister, officiated in funeral services. Burial was in the Colorado City Cemetery under the direction of Kiker and Son Funeral Home. Pallbearers were G. D. Foster, John Hale, A. C. Craig, Hubert Moore, Huron Dorn, Jake Merritt, Joe Pond, of Big Spring and Charlie Farris of Sweetwater. ## Chairmen Named To Direct Major United Fund Groups

### LORAIN HOUSE TOTAL LOSS

## One Residence Burns, Another Damaged as Lightning Strikes

One Mitchell County residence was destroyed by fire another damaged Tuesday night during an electrical storm.

Lightning was blamed for both losses. Destroyed by a blaze was the five-room brick veneer residence of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Stewart, 1.5 miles south of Loraine.

The fire was believed to have been caused by a bolt of lightning striking the residence while Mr. and Mrs. Stewart were on a trip to see their new grandchild.

Damaged when lightning struck the roof was the residence of E. R. Venus, 7.5 miles south of Colorado City on State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee) in Payne community.

Venus, who was in the house, felt the shock of the lightning bolt but escaped injury.

The fire at the Stewart home was discovered at about 10 p. m. by a passerby, Ace Lee. He reported the fire to Loraine and three fire trucks—one from Loraine and two from Colorado City rushed to the scene.

However, the structure was enveloped by flames before the first fire fighting equipment arrived. And the roof already had caved in when Colorado City's units reached the scene.

Water was not available at the scene but water from fire truck booster tanks was utilized to prevent spread of the blaze to the Stewart garage. Loraine's truck also relayed water to the scene.

Mr. and Mrs. Stewart had left early Tuesday morning for Rockdale, where their daughter—Mrs. Douglas Parker—gave birth to a son Monday night.

The couple's son, James Stewart, left Loraine early Wednesday to meet his parents in Rockdale and notify them of the fire loss. A total of \$8,900 in insurance was carried on the house and furnishings.

Lightning at the Venus residence south of Colorado City struck in a valley of roof at the west front of the six-room house,

knocking sheetrock off the walls, disrupting phone and electric service, and scorching an interior wall.

Venus, who was in a room at the northwest corner of the house when the lightning struck, said he felt the shock, but was not knocked out. He smelled smoke, but observed no flame after the lightning.

The area of the house where Venus was when the bolt hit the residence had a tin roof and was grounded. The front part was not grounded, he said.

Chairmen were announced Thursday to lead five of the six major divisions in Mitchell County United Funds 1957 finance campaign.

Simultaneously, it was revealed there will be no increase in the overall budget that will provide money for seven service organizations.

Goal for the 1957 fund raising campaign will be \$25,454—the same as for 1956, according to Dr. W. S. (Bill) Rhoads, chairman of the new campaign.

Again the "one for all" fund raising campaign will seek contributions for seven agencies. There is one change, though, in the list of participating agencies as Gonzales Warren Springs Foundation succeeds the Heart Association.

Other agencies that will share in funds contributed by Mitchell County citizens through the United Fund are Salvation Army, Boy Scouts, Red Cross, Mitchell County 4-H and PFA development program, and Texas United Defense Fund Committee (USO).

Named to division chairmanships in the big campaign are:

G. D. Foster, owner of G. D. Foster Insurance and head of Mitchell County United Fund in its first year of organization.

Charles Root, building contractor and head of Root Memorial Hospital.

N. H. White Jr., laborator, chief for Col-Tex Refinery.

John T. Merritt, co-owner of Pond & Merritt Cleaners.

Foster will chair the advance gifts committee, which traditionally has the largest individual goal of any division in the United Fund campaign.

Root will direct the special gifts division and White will chair the employees division. Co-chairman with White in the employees solicitation will be Otto Throver, accountant for Caddell Transit Corporation.

General solicitations division will be chairmanned by Merritt.

Mrs. John Wornack will lead the county west division, which will organize and direct the United Fund drive in communities and rural areas outside of Colorado City in the western half of the county.

Still to be named is a chairman for the county east division, which will shape up the campaign in the eastern half of the county.

United Fund headquarters have opened in the 200 block of Walnut in the building formerly occupied by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Members of the office staff include Miss Ruby Davenport and Mrs. Ann Fowler, secretaries.

Rhoads reported Thursday that division chairmen already were selecting work assignments in the countywide solicitation.

John Hester, Perry Bowles of Looney, M. A. Webb of Westbrook and T. J. Riden of Loraine on the district board.

Eligible to vote in the election at Loraine will be persons owning land in the soil district's Subdivision No. 3. The subdivision includes that part of Mitchell County east of Baumann School Road and south of U. S. Highway 80 and all of the Nolan County area that is included in the Mitchell district.

The supervisor must be at least 21 years of age and must hold title to land within the subdivision.

Nominations will be made from the floor and voting will be by secret ballot, according to Herold Stephens, Soil Conservation Service unit conservationist here.

In addition to the election, the meeting will feature a conservation program. Color slides of the recent Loraine Golden Jubilee celebration may be shown, also, Stephens said.

## Better Parking Urged for Pupil Safety

Parents were urged Thursday as a safety measure for their children to eliminate double parking at local schools.

The appeal for proper parking in place of double parking came from Mrs. Wilford Oyler, safety chairman for Parent-Teacher Association.

Mrs. Oyler said the public appeal to "mothers and fathers" to use proper parking spaces in school areas was being made after conference with Police Chief Leon Yaggar.

Police assistance in the parking problem was sought after continued double parking by parents and other persons—leaving and picking up children at school—loomed as an increasing hazard and danger to pupils.

The danger is cited at all schools, but especially at Hutchinson Elementary.

"For the safety of your children," Mrs. Oyler urged, "please use the proper parking spaces instead of double parking."

"When you double park—it causes the child to weave in and out of cars to get to his own car."

"There were several children hurt last year because of this. I have asked the chief of police to help," the appeal to mothers and fathers continued, "and he suggested this letter instead of using tickets."

"We don't want to use the law to solve this problem."

"Let's work together and save some child from getting hurt."

Mrs. Oyler, in addition, called attention to the fact that a "school crossing" zone will be placed in operation across Hickory Street at E. 14th Street. The crossing will be marked by lines and sign and will be a traffic safety measure especially for Primary School students, who walk to and from school across busy Hickory in the vicinity of E. 14th.

Clark, a retired drilling contractor, was 92 years old.

## Leaders Named For Ground Observer Plan

Organization of three Ground Observer Corps posts is under way in Mitchell County.

Supervisors for the three posts have been appointed and personnel—at least 12 persons for each post—are being sought to put the observer program into actual operation.

Tech Sgt. M. M. Curtice, Ground Observer Corps specialist organizing seven counties in this area, was here during the week.

Post supervisors announced by Curtice are L. A. Scott for Colorado City, Mayor Vance Dickenson for Loraine and Mrs. Jesse Cuthbertson for Westbrook.

The sergeant emphasized that the ground observers would be accepted on volunteer basis in the age bracket of 12 years and up.

Persons volunteering for service with either of the three posts will receive training in their home communities and then will serve only on an alert basis.

Practice sessions, according to Curtice, will be scheduled by the posts at least one Sunday each month from 2 to 6 p. m.

The posts will be ready to serve as observers of planes when alerted, but will not be subject to regular around-the-clock duty.

## BUT TWO PROJECTS PLUGGED

## Three Oilers, Four Locations Logged in Two County Fields

Oil operations during the first half of the week added up to three well completions and locations for four new tests.

But at the same time two other projects—one a wildcat—were plugged and abandoned.

Leading the oil developments within the county was Westbrook Field with two new oilers and two additional drilling sites.

Sharon Ridge-1700 Field gained one new well and two more drilling locations.

Completed in the Westbrook Field were Fred Shield No. 5 Nettie Hale, three miles south of Cuthbert, and Paul DeCleva No. 7-D Strain, nine miles north of Westbrook.

No. 5 Hale was finished for 81.67 barrels of 24 gravity oil plus three per cent water after fracturing with 20,000 gallons of fluid. Production was from pay zone topped at 3,053 feet over total depth of 3,170 feet.

Drilling site for the No. 5 Hale is 2,011 feet from north and 3,680 feet from west lines, Section 2, Block 29, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

No. 7-D Strain was completed for daily potential of 77.44 barrels of 26 gravity oil plus 12 per cent water. Pay was topped at 3,100 feet over total depth of 3,131 feet.

Location of No. 7-D Strain is 1,650 feet from east and 990 feet from south lines, Section 1, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

Adding to Sharon Ridge production was Simms & Waggoner of Amarillo No. 5 J. D. Fuller, eight miles northwest of Colorado City.

The No. 5 J. Fuller was completed for daily potential of 63 barrels of 28.8 gravity oil plus 12 per cent water. Production was from perforations between 1,701-1,709 and 1,710-1,714 feet over total depth of 1,725 feet.

Well site is 330 feet from south and 1,650 feet from east line, Subdivision 9, Section 8 & 9, Reiger Survey 1 & 2.

Simms & Waggoner spotted its No. 6 J. D. Fuller as a 1,735-foot rotary test four miles east of Ira at a site 330 feet from north and east lines, Section 8 & 9, same survey.

Also staked in the Sharon Ridge was Melton-Krug No. 3-B C. C. Mills, 7.5 miles southeast of Ira. The 1,625-foot project will be 990 feet from north and 1,650 feet from west lines, Section 196, Block 3, H&GN Survey.

Standard Oil of Texas located two new tests in the Westbrook Field, its No. 11-1 and No. 12-1. W. H. Abrams, both three miles north of Westbrook.

The Standard projects will be rotary tests to 3,200 feet with No. 11-1 Abrams located 330 feet from south and 990 feet from west lines, Section 29, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey, and with No. 12-1 Abrams staked 1,990 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines, Section 29.

A wildcat test plugged and abandoned at 7,428 feet in the Ellenburger was Miami Operating Company No. 1-A K. C. Adams, 10 miles south of Loraine at a site 1,980 feet from south and east lines of Section 56, Block 12, H&TC Survey.

Plugges in the county's southwestern area was Cosden Oil No. 1 Bowen, drilled to 2,932 feet in Albaugh (Yates) Field at a site 330 feet from south and west lines of east half, northwest quarter, Section 10, Block 17, SPRR Survey.

## DURING 75 YEARS

## Tiny Mission Key To Church Growth

Here in the 1881 it was a typical frontier village, probably just a bit busier and more booming than the usual.

The T&P Railroad has reached the east bank of Colorado River, Mitchell County was being officially formed.

And in the midst of it all was a little mission that attracted the attention of God-trusting pioneers.

Next week in a series of special services the First Baptist Church in its Diamond Jubilee Celebration observes the birth of that mission.

For it was the pioneer mission, established here in 1881, that became Colorado City's First Baptist Church.

Tornado and fire have destroyed most of the church's early records, but Dr. George W. Baines established the mission here. Baines, who was president of Baylor University when that institution was located in Independence, laid the foundation for the church and then moved on west.

Taking his place was Rev. Peter Turner, missionary of State Baptist Convention.

During those years of infancy, the church congregation met in a small building located at the present site, Chestnut and E. Third.

But that building was demolished by tornado in 1885 and with it all the records of the first five years.

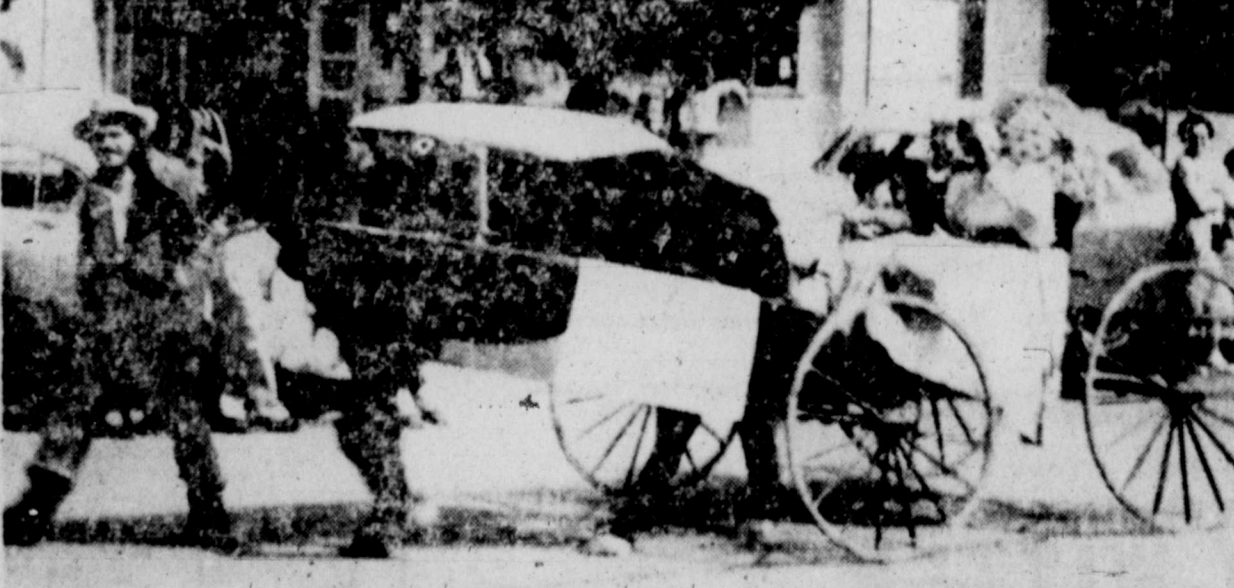
Another building was erected at the same location, however, and served the Baptists for 10 more years. Pastors during the early years included Rev. W. E. Tines, Rev. W. A. Whittle, Rev. E. Z. F. Golden and Rev. A. J. Tant.

Rev. J. C. Burkett became pastor in 1891 and was followed in 1894 by Rev. Pinckney Harris.

First permanent building of worship was erected in 1895 under the ministry of Rev. B.H. Carroll Jr. The structure, dedicated in 1897, remained the church home until 1927 when it was razed to make room for the present First Baptist Church building.

Dr. R. C. Campbell, then executive secretary of Baptist General Convention of Texas, preached

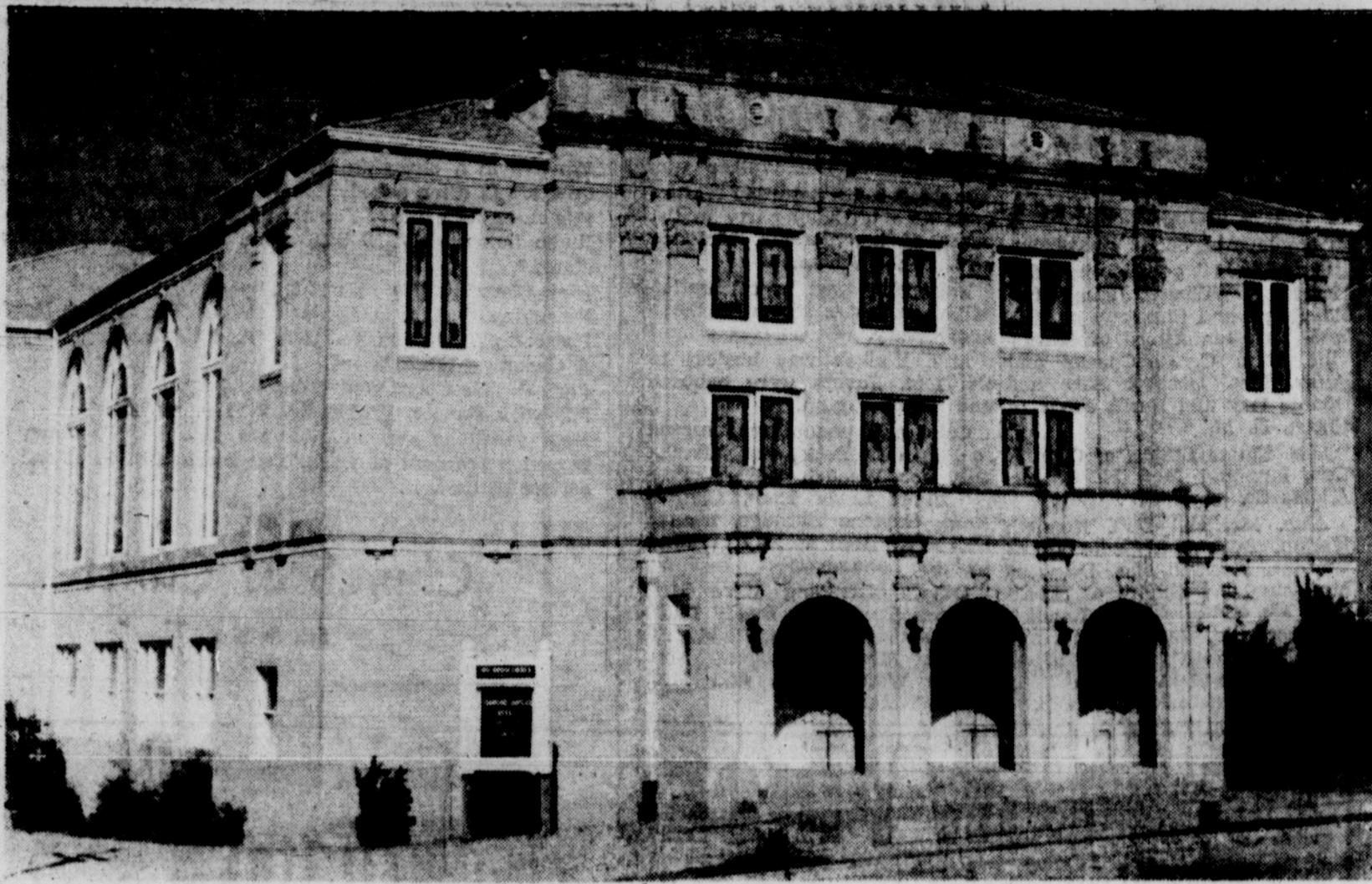

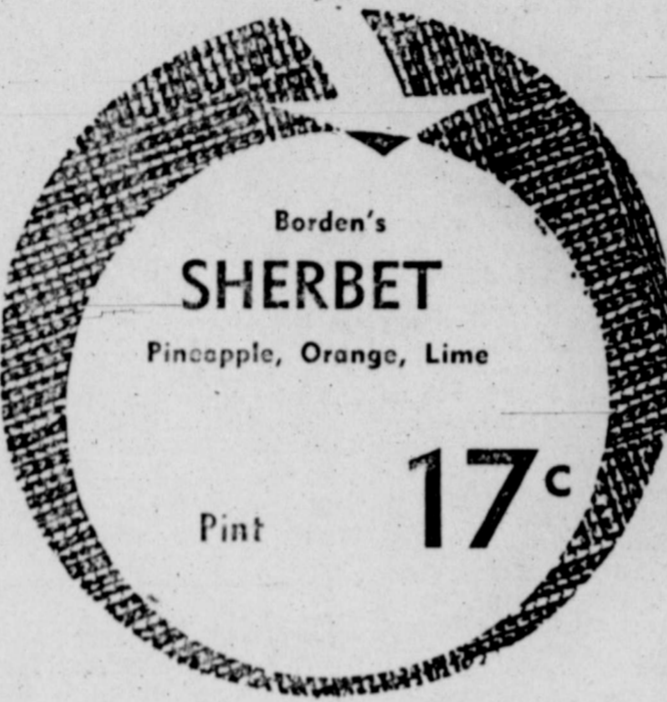

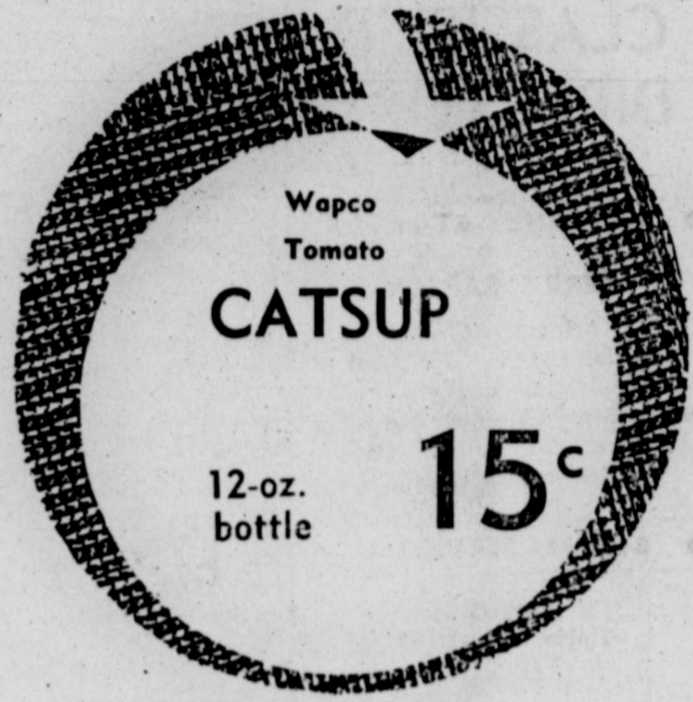

# Wolves Open Home Season Against Tricky Monahans

The versatile Monahans Lobos will throw their many running formations against the Colorado High Wolves in the Wolves' home debut Friday, 8 p. m. in Wolf Stadium.

Coach Bob Reilly's forces will be seeking their first win after suffering setbacks at the hands of Seminole, 37-6, and Ballinger, 39-13.

Monahans will also be hunting their first win after dropping the season opener 14-0 to Crane and tying McCamey, 14-14, last Friday.

Lobos downed the Wolves 7-0 at Monahans last year after the Wolves had camped on the Monahans goal line all night long.

Wolves will be bolstered in the line this week with the return of all-district Dru Vowell, 175-pound tackle.

But at the same time, Wolves' will be seeing only limited service from two starting backfield gridders—James Shoemaker and Troy Maples. It was Shoemaker that romped 75 yards on the opening play last week against Ballinger.

Both are suffering from injuries received last week in the Ballinger game.

Bancker Cade, who re-injured an ankle at Ballinger, has been going fine in practice this week.

Other starters who are injured slightly are end Jimmy Richardson and center Bobby Carpenter.

Reilly said Thursday he will probably start Roy Maples at quarterback, Delbert Lewis at wingback, Cade at fullback and a promising newcomer, Fred Womack, 125-pound sophomore.

Womack looked good in practice this week to earn the starting berth.

Available to spell Maples at quarterback will be sophomore Bobby Caffey and junior Richard Compton.

Reilly will go along with his same starting ends—Richardson and Don Black.

Windham and Vowell will hold down the tackle positions while Kenny Simmons and Paul Free take their stance at the free slots.

Vowell, if he stands up under the pace after the early season layoff, will replace Simmons on defense in the center of the line.

Other defensive changes will put Ray Weaver and Marion Flippin the line and Don Powell at line-backer for Lewis.

Monahans' starting offensive line will outweigh the Wolves approximately 10 pounds to the man with an average of 175.

But being outweighed worries the Wolf coaches less than the multiple offense of the Lobo backfield.

Lobos' basic formation is single wing with unbalanced line, something the Wolves haven't faced in several years.

But the Lobos won't stop there. They employ a spread formation and a T-formation with an unbalanced line to the right.

They are abounding in speedy backs with the ace being Benny Milburn, 145-pounder at fullback.

Milburn, who is seeking his third letter, has run wild in the Lobos' two previous games.

Larry Bilhartz, 155-pound-tailback in the single wing, is especially keen on the run and pass play.

Blocking back is Tommy McLain, 145, and wingback, Johnny Winder, 155.

But to mix-up the Wolves even more, the Lobos pull their right end, Jerry Mobley, 175, back into tailback for occasional passes. And Mobley is a left-handed toser.

On the Lobos' unbalanced offensive line, end Bill Raines, 165, and tackle Herbert Pearce, 190, are on the left of the center, Brooks Franklin, 170.

On the right side of the line are guards David Wiley, 165 and Mike Etheridge, 175; tackle Jimmy Muldrow, 180 and end Mobley.

On the spread formation the guards and tackles may split five to seven yards apart with the ends spread as much as 10 yards out.

Wolves have been working all week to defend the freakish formations.

## Buyers Gain With Lower Food Prices

That consumers are receiving the benefit of lower food prices levels was indicated this week by the Consumer Price Index is-

sued by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Attention to these lower prices was pointed out by Earl Cliff, Dallas division manager of Safeway Stores.

Cliff stated that the BLS Index as released this week discloses all food prices had declined 1.5 per cent by mid-August from their seasonal peak in July. Foods consumed in homes drop-

ped 1.8 per cent at retail stores.

Furthermore this latest BLS Index is 4.1 per cent lower than the all-time peak in retail food prices reached in August, 1952—four years ago.

During those four years, incomes have continued to rise, with weekly earnings in manufacturing plants, for example, up about 19 per cent. This means the average factory worker's pay-

check now will buy about 24 per cent more food than in August, 1952, Cliff said.

"Anyone in our business knows," he explained, "that the food industry's modern methods and its competitive self-service retailers constantly press against rising food prices and help to translate our increased wages and higher consumer incomes into higher standards of eating."
