

EASTLAND INVITES FIREMEN'S CONVENTION

TWO MEN ARE UNIDENTIFIED BY COMPANION

Shooting Occurs As Officers Sought To Question Trio In Automobile.

MIAMI, Okla., June 12.—A young officer and two unidentified gunmen were slain today in a battle on Main street.

Jack Dunaway, 33, merchant policeman, was killed as he walked up to an automobile to which he and two companions had pursued suspicious characters. The shooting began without warning as he asked:

"What's going on here, boys?"

The gunmen, one about 35 and the other 25, were believed to be from Muskogee and Cookson Hills sections. Their companion at the car, who gave his name as Frank Sinn, said he was from Webber Falls, but denied he knew either of the victims. He was unarmed.

Fingerprints were taken and sent to Oklahoma City for classification in an effort to identify the men. Sinn refused to talk except to say he had been an unwilling companion of theirs.

Officers believed the two men killed intended to rob a drug store. They entered the store a few minutes before the shooting and looked the place over.

National Planning Board to Draft Greater New Deal

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The national planning board within a few weeks will submit the draft of the first steps in translating President Roosevelt's proposed "greater new deal" from words to blue prints.

Little known, but officially recognized as a vital unit of the recovery administration, this board has been engaged in research on which the government may base its future policies.

Its work promises to bring a step nearer realization the President's ideas for planned progress for the nation. Its report will be submitted to President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Interior Ickes, jointly.

Hitler and Mussolini To Hold Conference

VENICE, June 12.—Chancellor Hitler of Germany is due to arrive here at 10 a. m. Thursday for his conference with Premier Mussolini, it was learned today.

Mussolini will meet Hitler at the airport where he will be waiting for the chancellor's arrival from Munich. Mussolini and Hitler will go to Venice by launch and to the Grand Hotel, which will be Hitler's headquarters.

COLLECTED DRIFTWOOD

PERRY, O.—Fifty-six different kinds of driftwood from one Lake Erie beach have been collected over several seasons and encased by the Rev. W. A. Warren. Included are black walnut, yellow pine, cherry and white oak. Some of the wood had apparently come from shipping boxes thrown off boats, and broken furniture, long adrift. Strips of white ash from an old broom handle hold the display case in place.

KANSAS MARRIAGES UP

TOPEKA, Kan.—Mr. Dan Cupid's arrows are hitting their mark with more precision this year than last, the marriage recorder's office here shows. During the first four months of 1934, 4,278 more marriages were solemnized than in the same period last year.

DARROW BOARD MAKES SECOND NRA REPORT

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The unofficial text of the Darrow board's second report, a new attack on national recovery administration of small business, was revealed today.

The second Darrow report also charged that the retail code was offered after it had been approved by the industry and before it was submitted to President Roosevelt for signature.

The document levels its strongest criticism against the retail trade code. The board took sarcastic notice of the recent NRA order regarding price-fixing and continued its attack on the administration of Gen. Hugh S. Johnson.

Elks of Oil Belt To Celebrate Flag Day On June 14th

National Flag Day will be celebrated in Ranger on the night of June 14 by the Elks of the Oil Belt in an impressive and interesting ceremony at the Elks hall.

C. J. Moore, chairman of the program committee, has announced that the nine flags under which the United States has served, will be used in the program and that the Boy Scouts and National Guards will participate.

The program is open to the public and everyone is cordially invited to be present. The American Legion Tickville Band will render a patriotic program during the ceremonies.

Elks from Eastland, Breckenridge and Cisco are expected to be present at the program, which is conducted each year, each town in the Oil Belt district taking turn about in putting on the program.

Baer and Camera In Good Condition

NEW YORK, June 12.—Max Baer, challenger for Primo Carnera's championship, was given a thorough physical examination by physicians of the New York Athletic commission, and reported in "fine shape."

Carnera, who arrived late, also was examined and reported in "excellent condition" despite the fact that he is "suffering with the after-effect of a slight touch of laryngitis."

Body of Girl Is Found On Tracks; Murder Suspected

HEARNE, Texas, June 12.—The mutilated body of a young girl struck by a Missouri Pacific train was said to contain bullet wounds.

Officers believed the girl was slain and her body placed on the tracks.

A young boy who had accompanied the girl and who was questioned yesterday said the girl was Helen Dexter of Central City, Ky.

After being questioned the boy and girl were released. Efforts to find him after the girl's body was struck by the train today were unavailing.

Administration's Hold On Congress Approaches Test

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The administration's holdover congress approached a vital test in the house today when the scope of the housing program was challenged in a fight which may delay adjournment.

The senate was ready to take up the permanent appropriations bill after approving the silver proposal and rejecting the bonus.

Despite charges by Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator and the national emergency council that the housing bill, as reported to the house, was "unsatisfactory" the group decided to bring it up today without the revisions.

Hamilton Jury Completed Today

HUNTSVILLE, June 12.—A jury to hear the trial of Raymond Hamilton, under indictment as an habitual criminal, was selected before noon today.

Presentation of evidence, with which the state hopes to send the Texas desperado to the electric chair, started this afternoon.

Tugwell Approved As Undersecretary

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The agriculture committee voted 16 to 2 today to report favorably to the senate the nomination of Rexford Tugwell to be undersecretary of agriculture.

Chairman Ellison D. Smith, Dem., S. C., and Senator Henry Hatfield, Rep., West Va., cast the only vote against Tugwell.

JURORS HEAR OPINION READ IN GAS CASE

AUSTIN, June 12.—Twelve jurors in Fifty-third district court today listened to the drone of lawyer's voices as a long pamphlet giving the opinion and order of the state railroad commission for reduction of natural gas rates was read.

The report was read at the suggestion of Judge Charles Wheeler when it was offered as part of the record of the case in which Attorney General Allred asks an order requiring the Lone Star Gas company to obey the order to reduce its rate from 40 to 32 cents a thousand cubic feet.

After reading the order first testimony is expected to be from D. A. Huley, assistant to the president of the company, on the contention the 32-cent rate does not give adequate returns to the company.

Phil-Pe-Co Club To Have Second Golf Tournament

RISEING STAR, June 12.—The second annual invitation golf tournament of Phil-Pe-Co Country club, located midway between Rising Star and Cross Plains, will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday, June 22, 23 and 24. Club officials here expect a big entry from all over West Texas.

Gid Faircloth, Ranger, is defending champion, and Bill McMahon, Cisco, was medalist in 1933. Both have signified their intention to enter the 1934 tournament in defense of their honors.

J. T. Hammett, Rising Star youth who was medalist in the West Texas tournament at Big Spring, and semi-finalist in the Ranger tournament, will lead the local contestants.

Fishing and bathing, in Lake Phillips, along which the golf course is laid out, will be features of the play during the three days of the tournament.

Morton Valley to Have Revival Meet Beginning Sunday

"Ex-Bomber" Fails In Extortion Plot

NEWARK, N. J., June 12.—A letter mailed to Miss Doris Duke, probably the richest girl in the world, threatened she would be "bombed" if she failed to make a payment of \$3,000 to the writer, it was disclosed today in federal court.

The letter signed by "Ex-Bomber" said the payment must be made before May 26, on threats of a bombing at 3 p. m. of that date. The day passed safely, however, for Miss Duke.

Oklahoma Slayer Suicide Victim

McALISTER, Ok., June 12.—John Lemke, bald, vision-seeker slayer from Custer county, hanged himself with a rope made of a sheet in his cell on death row at state's prison today.

A guard found him gasping and struggling weakly at the end of the crude cord as it hung from the top of the cell door. Lemke was cut down and taken to the prison hospital, but died as he reached it.

Malaria Increases In State of Texas Health Officer Says

AUSTIN.—According to information reaching the Texas State department of Health, the number of malaria cases is increasing; a sharp turn upward was noted for May. This is directly related to a parallel increase in the number of mosquitoes. The Malaria Unit reports that not for years have they noticed such large numbers of mosquitoes.

Probably one item that favors this increase is the mild winter and rainfall which leads to many temporary collections of water. Of course the breeding of mosquitoes is not limited to temporary water, but they are the ones that are often the cause of the increase of the mosquito population. They must have water to propagate.

Attention paid to the following and similar points will largely reduce the opportunities for mosquito breeding. Remove all trash from the back yard, including old cans, pails, bottles, and automobile tires or bodies. Clean up the premises.

Put new washers in leaky hydrants. Screen rain-water barrels or oil them regularly. Get some top-minnows and place them in lily pools and cisterns. Look over the roof gutters and drain-spouts and remove trash and straighten up any sagged portions. Change the water in flower vases frequently. If there are low spots in the yard where water stands for days after a rain, either fill or drain these places. In any event before complaint is made about mosquitoes to the health department, be sure that your own premises have been thoroughly inspected and found free from mosquito breeding places.

Two Good Pitchers Needed By Cats To Win Pennant

FORT WORTH.—What a pair of top-notch pitchers could do for the Fort Worth Panthers almost sends Manager Del Pratt into a nightmare every time he thinks about it.

With two consistent flingers to aid the veteran Dick Whitworth, Pratt would appear a virtual certainty to put his club into the Texas League play-off.

The Cats are in second division now, but the mire is not so thick. The distance between them and the first division could be overcome in a short time with winning ball.

Pratt may have one of his highly desired pitchers in Claude Jonnard, twin brother of Clarence Jonnard, Dallas catcher.

Jonnard is recognized as an able twirler. Difficulty over contracts was the principal thing that kept him out of American association clubs.

It may be that if he can win as consistently as Whitworth it will give other pitchers rest from relief duty and increase their earning powers, offsetting the need for another new pitcher.

The Cats are hitting in the upper deck of the league but they are in the over half in games won and lost. With five men clubbing above the .300 mark and four others just below the coveted crest there is ample stick work to support good pitching.

But most of the season the Cats have had to pile up a football score before they could win. The opposition hit too freely.

Whitworth is pitching around around the .700 mark for games won and lost. He is the only Fort Worth pitcher above the .500 line.

Fans entertain hopes Jonnard will produce and that before the season is too far gone another pitcher will be added or the others on the roster develop winning habits.

W. D. R. Owen acted as chairman of the meeting. All candidates had been advised of the meeting, but not all of them were present.

Most of those not present, however, had sent messages advising that they were willing to abide by the decisions of the meeting.

Due to the fact that the candidates for Representative, including those for the 10th and 107th districts felt that their speeches would require so much more time than those seeking county offices, it was decided by a majority vote that the legislative candidates would arrange separate speaking dates.

Committees were appointed by both the legislative and county candidate groups and these committees are arranging speaking dates to be announced through the press later.

Tonight all candidates are invited to a meeting at Grapevine and Friday night they are invited to attend a meeting at Mangum. Neither of these dates were made by the candidates.

TEXAS COAST APPEARS SAFE FROM STORM

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, June 12.—The Texas coast is safe from the hurricane threatening eastern Mexico, weather observers believed today when the barometer went back to normal.

Clear weather and a slight breeze were other indications the storm would miss this section. The Gulf of Mexico still was choppy, but not so much as yesterday.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The weather bureau reported today that the tropical disturbance off the Mexican coast has swerved somewhat to the southwest and probably had decreased in intensity. The exact position was uncertain, but believed to be about 125 miles northeast of Vera Cruz, Mexico.

County Agent J. C. Patterson made a brief talk on keeping farm records and accounts and he and Vocational Instructor J. M. Bird, Cisco, distributed record books to the farmers.

Bird discussed the foot rot disease found to have affected small grains in this territory, doing particular damage to wheat, oats and barley.

OTHER TOWNS COOPERATING IN THE MOVE

Big Delegation Moves On Mineral Wells To Extend Invitation For 1935 Convention At Eastland.

Eastland delegates to the State Firemen and Fire Marshal's convention, which met today at Mineral Wells for a three days meeting, left this morning for the convention city. The Lone Star band, Cisco band and Ranger band are scheduled to accompany the larger delegation which will journey from the Eastland county towns to Mineral Wells Wednesday to assist in extending an invitation to the convention to meet in Eastland in 1935.

This delegation will leave Eastland from the courthouse square at 8:00 a. m. Wednesday. State Highway patrolmen will lead the motorcade to Mineral Wells. Just outside of Mineral Wells the motorcade will be met by a delegation from the Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce and welcomed to Mineral Wells. Here also the visiting delegation may register. Following registration they will be furnished with badges which will admit them to all courtesies extended the visiting firemen.

Those in either of the Eastland county towns who are unable to attend the convention are requested to send a telegram to the convention at Mineral Wells personally extending an invitation to the convention to meet in Eastland in 1935. The telegraph company has the convention address.

Ranger, Cisco and other towns and communities of the county are cooperating whole heartedly in the effort to obtain the 1935 meeting for Eastland county.

The motorcade from Eastland to the Texas State Firemen and Fire Marshal's convention in Mineral Wells consisting of about thirty cars will leave Eastland at 8:00 a. m. Wednesday.

Preparatory to the departure of the motorcade, Eastland citizens making the trip will meet at the banking headquarters in the Beatty building at 7:30 to obtain Eastland hat bands.

One of the State Highway patrolmen which is stationed in Eastland will head the Eastland motorcade. At Ranger, Fire Chief Murphy will meet the Eastland group and in company with others will join the body. A group of Mineral Wells patrolmen will meet the motorcade on the outskirts of the city and accompany the Eastland county group to the convention group.

Entertainment features which the Eastland group is taking to Mineral Wells include the Lone Star Band under the direction of A. J. Campbell and acrobatic and tap dancers from the Maxine Francis school of dancing. Other bands from Eastland county which are scheduled to render programs are the Cisco and Ranger bands.

In view of the fact that Eastland is supported by both Ranger and Cisco in its bid for the convention next year, optimism marks the keynote of Eastland for the securing of the convention.

Allred Speaks Here Wednesday P. M. at 4 o'Clock

James V. Allred, candidate for governor of Texas, will deliver an address in the interest of his candidacy from the east side of the Eastland county courthouse lawn here Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The speaker will be introduced by Frank Sparks, Eastland attorney. Sound amplifiers will be arranged for the occasion in order that all will be able to hear distinctly.

The address to be delivered by Mr. Allred in Eastland will follow one he will deliver at Ranger tonight, and will precede one he is to deliver at Cisco Wednesday night.

ROBERT L. HOLLIDAY LEGAL MEMBER OF RELIEF BOARD

Legislators enact laws. High courts interpret laws. The supreme court of Texas has spoken its judicial mind. Robert L. Holliday is a legal member of the state relief board. Julius Dorenfield, Jr., of Potter county is on the outside looking in. Justice Greenwood wrote the opinion. It was a unanimous decision. In its answer to certified questions to the civil appeals court of this district the Texas court of last resort held that the act creating the state relief commission made its members state officials and that they could be removed only by judicial trial or impeachment. Therefore, the court held Speaker Coke Stevenson's removal of Holliday was void and Dorenfield was not legally a member of the state relief organization.

Speaker Stevenson appointed Holliday. It was alleged that certain labor organizations in El Paso demanded the removal of Holliday. Stevenson bowed to demands of the El Paso faction seeking the scalp of Holliday. He tossed the former member of the university board of regents in the discard. It goes without saying that the supreme court decision held Holliday could not be removed without notice and trial and that his removal by the speaker was void.

This places Holliday back on the commission except for 15 days allowed for a motion for a rehearing. Justice T. B. Greenwood declared that 'language could hardly make it clearer that the commission members are state officials and could be removed only after trial, that a state officer is given a definite term, as was accorded in the act creating the commission or other trial prescribed by law and that a legislature would not have the authority to prescribe a different method of removal in the face of the specific terms of the constitution.' In an elaborate review Mr. Justice Greenwood construed the commission act as according terms of office and that 'the legislature did not attempt to prescribe differently.' Incidentally but to the point, after the Stevenson removal Holliday asserted his right to vote and has continued to do so. It is also a matter of record that the commission voted four to three to unseat Holliday and recognize Dorenfield. After Speaker Stevenson had tossed Holliday aside the state relief commission ousted Adam Johnson as state director and elected Miss Marie Dresden to the place which she now holds.

It is a clear-cut decision. Had it been the reverse in the political haunts of men it is whispered that the ax would have been swung on the heads of many officeholders who were appointed to place in recent years and the heads would have rolled into the wastebasket of the political executioners.

Upon the solicitation of many friends and after due consideration, I herewith respectfully submit to the people of the 106th Legislative District of the State of Texas my candidacy for membership in the House of Representatives, the Forty-Fourth Legislature convenes.

I am in favor of integrated administrative reorganization to the end that duplication and high costs of operation should be eliminated and in its stead efficiency, economy, and wise business policies supplanted. I do not further detail my position in this announcement. During the progress of my campaign I shall speak freely upon the issues involved and frankly discuss with the people my position and my conception of the policies of government.

Above all things I believe in the honesty of public office. Integrity is the highest attribute of man; it is the most noble feature of an officer; it is the most necessary principle of democratic preservation. In the people of Eastland county I have a firm belief and in the people of Texas I place a steadfast confidence. Together we may make of Texas a state unparalleled in the Union and for Texas we may conceive a government dedicated to the proposition that ultimately all the rules of society should conspire to promote "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

Two Hours From Garden to Can Is Canning Program

By United Press
SAN MARCOS, Texas.—"Two hours from the garden to the can" is the slogan adopted by the new \$2,500 relief canning kitchen here.

Nearly 85,000 shining tin cans are stacked in the kitchen awaiting farmers' produce. The canning plant has a daily output of 1,000 to 1,500 cans.

A farmer who hauls his produce to the plant will receive about 45 per cent of his vegetables, canned, in payment. He will be returned about 40 per cent of his canned meat.

The remainder is turned over to the Texas relief commission's commissary for distribution to destitute persons.

Commodity clerks estimate the farmer will net more for his produce at the canning kitchen than at commercial markets. He will receive, for example, about \$2 per bushel for roasting ears and about \$1 per bushel for tomatoes.

A bushel of roasting ears is sufficient for 43 cans of corn. The

farmer will receive about 20 cans, each worth approximately 10 cents on the market.
