SEEKING FINAL \$3,000

1,000 Letters Contain Fate of U.F. Campaign

Success or failure of Mitchell County United Fund's 1959 finance campaign will depend upon what the mailman delivers.

That was the situation Thursday as the final round-up continued with approximately 1,000 pledge cards in the mail to residents here in Colorado City and throughout the county.

The mailing is to persons who have not been contacted personally in the 1959 campaign and to individuals who asked early solicitors to contact them later or who declined, for certain reasons, to participate as United Fund supporters.

Envelopes mailed from United Fund headquarters contain a letter urging participation in the finance drive, a pledge card, blank check and postpaid envelope for return mailing.

The mail plan follows another phase of the United

Fund roundup — a special brigade of volunteer workers who are contacting approximately 100 individuals and firms overlooked in the original solicitation.

All of the 100 prospects being contacted by the roundup brigade are considered good United Fund supporters. And their contributions and pledges should sent the United Fund total nearer its goal of \$27,885.

Right now, the collections and pledges total \$24,425 — more than \$3,000 short of the amount needed to finance nine participating agencies next year.

However, campaign officials believe that the additional contributions and pledges to be turned in by the roundup brigade — plus a good response from the mail requests — can shove the campaign over the top.

Volunteers in the roundup brigade are working under supervision of Rev. Clarence

Collins and Bob Reilly, co-chairmen of the general division; Benny Franks, chairman of special gifts division, and W. J. (Dub) Turner, chairman of employes division.

The mail requests are being relied upon because of the

THEFT, BURGLARY CASES

Indictments Charge Pair

A Big Spring man has been indicted on charge of theft by bailee of a \$19,500 truck and van from a local trucker.

Shirley Lee Williams, who was taken into custody recently by Big Spring police, was one of three persons indicted Tuesday by Mitchell County grand jury.

He is charged with fraudulently converting to his own use a 1957 model Reo diesel truck valued at \$14,000, and a 1951 model Lufkin van, valued at \$4,500.

The truck and van was owned by E. M. Hardegreave of Colorado City.

Williams was a driver employed by Hardegreave on a transport trip to California. However, he did not report back to Hardegreave, according to District Attorney Eldon Mahon.

The truck was found in Harrisburg, Ill., several weeks after the trip began.

Two burglary indictments were returned against Robert Jackson Forrest in connection with break-ins Oct. 17 at Westbrook School and Oct. 20 here at D. W. Wallace School.

Approximately \$50 was taken in the Westbrook burglary and only about \$1 in dimes was taken at Wallace.

Forrest was arrested Oct. 21, the day after the Wallace burglary as he slept in his auto beside the highway at Stanton. A peculiar bar-type marking on the sole of his shoe made him a suspect in the local burglaries since similar markings were noticed in foot prints near the schools.

The grand jury returned a fourth indictment charging swindling with worthless check in amount of \$75. However, the suspect is still being sought by law enforcement

officers and the district attorney requested that his name be withheld until apprehension.

Exonerated by a grand jury no-bill was A. D. Williams, 55, Loraine FFA owner, who had been charged with murder in connection with a fatal stabbing Oct. 19 in his cafe.

Gus Carter, who last June had been fined and sentenced to jail for assault with a gun, was fatally stabbed at about 4:30 a. m. Oct. 19.

BEGINS DUTIES HERE

Range Specialist For Soil District

Range improvement program of Mitchell County Soil Conservation District is being strengthened with the addition of a range specialist to the district's Soil Conservation Service staff.

The specialist is Richard Reed, a graduate of Texas Tech in Lubbock, who for the last 13 months has been with the SCS staff in Sonora.

Reed, a native of Bronte began duties here Monday, increasing the regular, full-time district staff to four SCS technicians.

"Range program of the district has not been emphasized during the recent years," said A. V. Sheppard, supervising unit technician for the district, "and we believe Reed will strengthen that phase of conservation for our cooperators."

"In addition Reed will assist with the Great Plains Conservation Program which is gaining interest among more and more of our farmers and ranchers."

Reed will devote most of his time in work with ranchers in their range management practices. The long range Great Plains program ties into those management practices.

"Our district will be working for proper utilization of range acreage," Sheppard said, "with emphasis on use of native grasses so our range can maintain its vigor and withstand droughts that are so frequent in this West Texas area."

20,000 Acres Covered

Standard Oil Company of Texas is completing a land leasing program on three sides of Colorado City.

An estimated 20,000 acres is involved in the leases, the Record learned from sources close to the oil industry.

Standard is pouring approximately \$200,000 into the county as cash payments for the acreage leases, according to estimates.

The leases cover acreage strips northeast, west and southwest of the city and extend for five years.

SOME ACREAGE acquired in the leasing north of Colorado City extends to the Scurry County line in the vicinity of Standard acreage in Scurry County.

The extensive program also covers acreage near the city, 3 miles west of town on top of the hill and around the Lake Colorado City area.

Standard began acquiring the leases last October and continued the leasing program through November. Members of the firm's land department have been in and out of the city in the last few days.

AT ONE TIME Standard had nine men busy here in its leasing operation.

Some of the acreage leased by Standard for the new five year period formerly was held by Pure Oil Company in leases obtained in 1953 and which expired this fall.

It is unique that the major leasing program just being concluded is by a firm that paid the first oil lease money to Mitchell County land owners in the 1920's when the first Permian Basin oil was discovered at Westbrook. Standard of California then was the firm, however, and now operations are by the Texas corporation.

LANDOWNERS REPORT that Standard land men had definite lease areas mapped and chartered before they began contacting Mitchell County landowners in October.

A Standard Oil seismograph crew began operations here this week. It moved in here over the weekend from Fort Stockton.

It is the second crew of its kind sent here recently by Standard. The first unit came here from Sherman.

County Gains 2 More Oil Producers

Two Mitchell County oil fields have logged new producers and one of the pair gained a new drilling site.

Completed in the Westbrook Field was Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 3 Phelan, 72-barrel oiler with 20 per cent water.

The No. Phelan had production from perforations between 3,156 and 3,164 feet over total depth of 3,290 feet.

Location for the oiler is 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from east-lines, Section 48 Block 29, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

Adding to Itan-East, Howard Field production was Blue Danube No. 3 Foster, completed for daily yield of 53 barrels of 29 gravity oil, plus seven per cent water.

The well was finished after being fractured with 20,000 gallons of fluid. Production was from perforations between 2,676 feet, top of pay, and 2,686 feet over plugged back depth of 2,726 feet.

Site for the No. 3 Foster is 330 feet from south and east lines of Section 46, Block 29, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

Spotted as a new drilling location in the Itan - East Howard Field is Magnolia Petroleum No. 45-A Mary Foster, five miles south of Itan.

Drilling will be to 2,450 feet at a site 660 feet from north and west lines, Section 17, Block 29, T-1-S, T&P Survey.

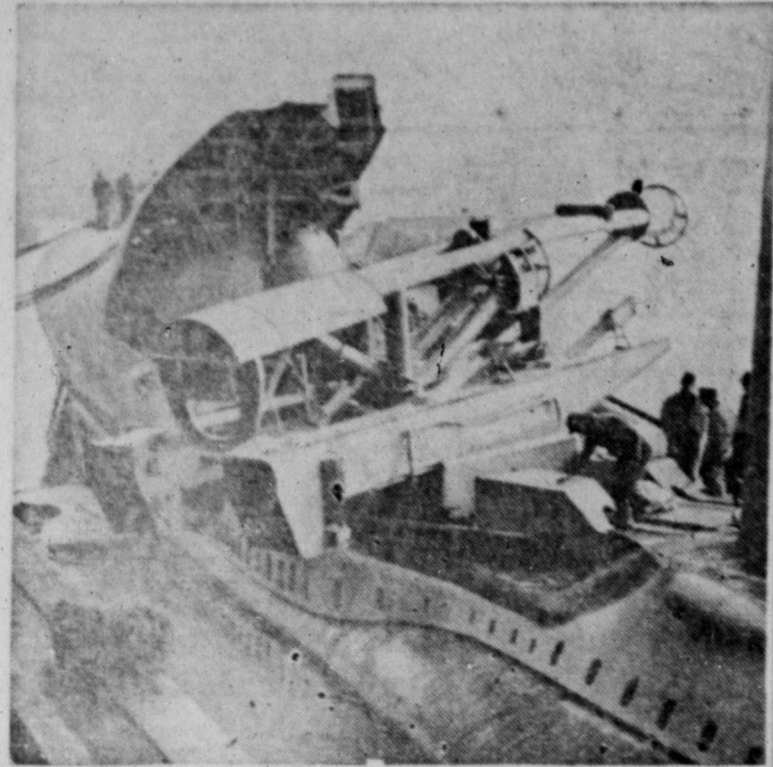
