## Plans Complete For 4-H Club Livestock and Poultry Show

Plans for the 4-H Club Livestock and Poultry Show and the Dairy Cow Show to be held here Friday and Saturday of next week are being completed. The show will be held in the large cottonseed warehouse located on the railroad southeast of town and owned by Lubbock Cotton Oil Company. The building will be lighted and prepared for the show next week.

The \$185 prize list for the 4-H Club show will be paid by various Lamesa firms. A list of the prizes with the names of the donors will be found below. Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation is supplying the \$50 prize list for the Dairy Cow Show which will be held in connection with the 4-H Club show. 4-H Club members will receive their entry blanks at the office of the County Agent and dairy cow exhibitors in the Kraft-Phenix show will call at the plant for entry blanks. The club show is confined to 4-H Club members. Any owner of three or more milk cows may exhibit in the cow show.

The Kraft-Phenix Company will give away a cow in addition to the prize money. Any 4-H club member and/or one member from any family owning three or more milk cows may have the opportunity of getting this cow by registering at the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Company plant.

The five top beef calves at the local show will be shown at the Plains Quality Meat Show in Lubbock, March 29, 30 and 31. Arrangements are being made for an auction sale of several of the winning meat animals.

## School Census Being Taken This Month

March is the month in which the school census is taken, and now enumerators are at work in every school district in the county getting the names of all the children between the ages of six and eighteen on the rolls.

A special effort is being made to see every family in the county, but should your enumerator fail to see you, see that your children are rendered at the County Superintendent's office. Quite a number of scholastics are missed every year. This means a loss of money to the county, as every scholastic draws \$19 state money. Your fullest cooperation in this matter will work to the interest of your school.

Children must be six years old and under eighteen the first of September 1937 to be eligible for enumeration. Census slips must be signed by the parent or guardian.

## East-West Highway Association Meets Here Thursday

Representatives of towns along State Highway 15 in Texas and from New Mexico, are here today, Thursday, March 18, holding their annual session of the East-West Highway Association. Over 200 visitors were in attendance.

The program was started at 10:00 o'clock, with the Lamesa High School band giving a concert. Speakers for the day included: Charles G. Cotton, Fort Worth; John A. Chamberlain, Mineral Wells; John Wood, member of the State Highway Commission; Gec. M. Garrett, Lubbock, division highway engineer; Judge O. T. Burleson, Abilene; Senator Harris, Hobbs, N. M.; W. A. French, division engineer of Abilene; Gibb Gilchrist, chief engineer of the State Highway Department; and Col. R. A. Thompson, of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

Sam Richardson, Lamesa, is president of the organization, and Victor L. Minter, manager of the Carlisle, N. M. chamber of commerce, is the New Mexico vice president.

The Association, organized several years ago, has aided in the paving program along the route. Only three counties and a part of another in Texas remain unpaved. The western half of Gaines county is to be paved this year, work is being done on the eastern part of Dawson, and some of Borden county as well.

The State Highway Commission, at a meeting February 10, approved recommendation for Federal Aid to the United States Bureau of Public Roads, for the route from Dallas to the New Mexico State line.

Some time Sunday night or early Monday morning a thief or thieves loaded up a truck with 57 cases of eggs at the Lamesa Poultry and Egg Company and made away with them.

The 57 cases of eggs, valued approximately at \$325, were the property of the Lubbock Poultry and Egg company, of which the Lamesa firm is a branch.

The truck load of eggs were traced to Wichita Falls where it is reported they were disposed of, and Wednesday two men were arrested in Lamesa as being the egg stealers. It is said that officials of the company were only a jump behind the thieves all the way to Wichita Falls and after finding that the eggs had been disposed of traced the men back to Lamesa where they were arrested.

This is the first time in the history of this section of the state that such a quantity, to be exact 24,624 eggs, had ever been taken at one time.

**PRESIDENT WRITES GOVERNORS ABOUT SOIL CONSERVATION**

President Franklin D. Roosevelt has sent to the Governors of all the States in the Union an identical letter, of which the following is a copy:

"My Dear Governor:

The dust storms and floods of the last few years have underscored the importance of programs to control soil

erosion. I need not emphasize to you the seriousness of the problem and the desirability of our taking effective action, as a Nation and in the several States, to conserve the soil as our basic asset. The Nation that destroys its soil destroys itself.

"In the Act of Congress approved April 27, 1935 (Public No. 46 of the 74th Congress), the Federal Government, through the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture, initiated a broad program for the control of soil erosion. Demonstration work has been undertaken but much remains to be done. The conduct of isolated demonstration projects cannot control erosion adequately. Such work can only point the way.

"The problem is further complicated by the fact that the failure to control erosion on some lands, particularly if such eroding lands are situated strategically at the heads of valleys or watersheds, can cause a washing and blowing of soil onto other lands, and make the control of erosion anywhere in the valley or watershed all the more difficult. We are confronted with the fact that for the problem to be adequately dealt with, the erodible land in every watershed must be brought under some form of control.

"To supplement the Federal programs, and safeguard their results, State legislation is needed. At the request of representatives from a number of States, and in cooperation with them, the Department of Agriculture has prepared a standard form of suitable State legislation for this purpose. The Act provides for the organization of 'soil conservation districts' as governmental subdivisions of the State to carry on projects for erosion control, and to enact into law land-use regulations concerning soil erosion after such regulations have been approved in a referendum. Such legislation is imperative to enable farmers to take the necessary cooperative action.

"I am sending to you several copies of the Standard State Soil Conservation Districts Law, with a memorandum summarizing its basic provisions. I hope that you will see fit to make the adoption of legislation along the lines of the Standard Act part of the agricultural program of your State.

"Very sincerely yours,  
Franklin D. Roosevelt"

Austin, Texas.—This week marked the passage of several important measures by the House of Representatives, one of which was the so-called Dental Bill. This bill regulates the dental profession in Texas, places that profession on a higher level because of this regulation, and prohibits an unscrupulous member from fraudulent advertising. The vote on this measure was 120 to 0.

Possibly one of the most important measures to every Texan was the other bill passed by the House this week, namely the bill of Rep. Fred Mauritz of Ganado remitting all ad valorem taxes to the counties of Texas. This will mean, in the event it is passed by the Senate and signed by the Govern-

or, that all ad valorem taxes now being paid into the general fund of the state will be remitted to the counties for the purpose of soil conservation, building of roads, and other general purposes in the counties. Although a vigorous fight has been waged against this bill, it passed by a vote of 84 to 37 and apparently has a good chance of becoming a law in Texas. In the argument on the floor it was pointed out that although the State of Texas' bonded indebtedness was only thirty million, that of the counties amounted to nearly two hundred million dollars, and this measure would permit the retirement by the counties of Texas of that indebtedness.

One of the most stirring addresses heard for many days in the House of Representatives was that of Stuart Chase, who is undoubtedly the greatest economist of our time. Speaking to a packed house Friday morning he stated, "The political leadership must pass to the West for the country to be safe." He also stated with the possible exception of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, there is little feeling in the Eastern States for the people of the West or their condition. This acted author, whose latest book, "Rich Land, Poor Land," is hailed by critics as the outstanding work on economics of recent years, in closing his remarks to the Legislature, stated, "I am not flattering you people of the West, I am only warning you, you must be on your guard if you are not to turn over your vast resources to lower Manhattan and the denizens of Wall Street."

The first bill which has been killed

in the committee, and be printed on minority report this session was that by Rep. Brown and others limiting graduate work to Texas University, Texas A. & M. and Texas Tech. Wise-aces see in this the possibility of this bill becoming a law before the session ends.

WHEREAS, Barney Google had a horse. That paid its followers in remorse; and

WHEREAS, This horse started slow. Like the Senate, don't you know; and

WHEREAS, He was too full of oats. Like the Senate full of votes; and

WHEREAS, Spark Plug picked up speed. When the master told of need; and

WHEREAS, The Senate picked up a bit. When the Governor came to sit; and

WHEREAS, Sparky let Google down. Like the Senate, turned around; and

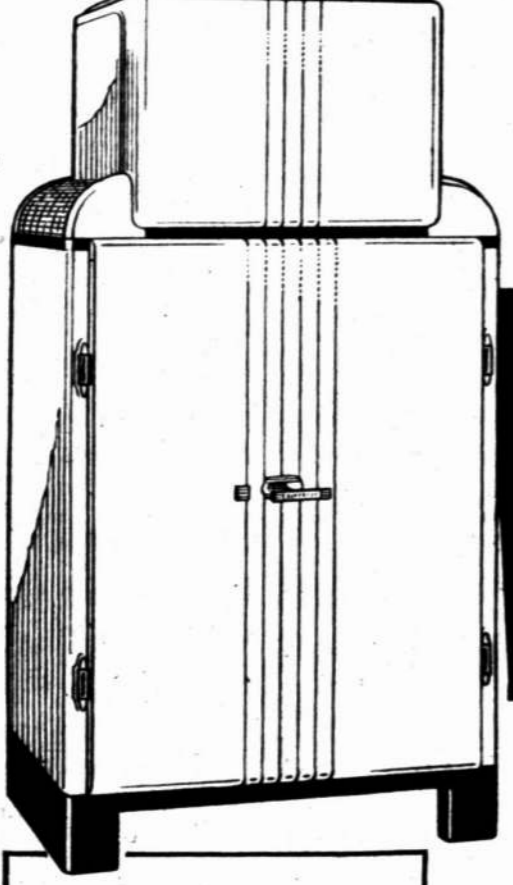

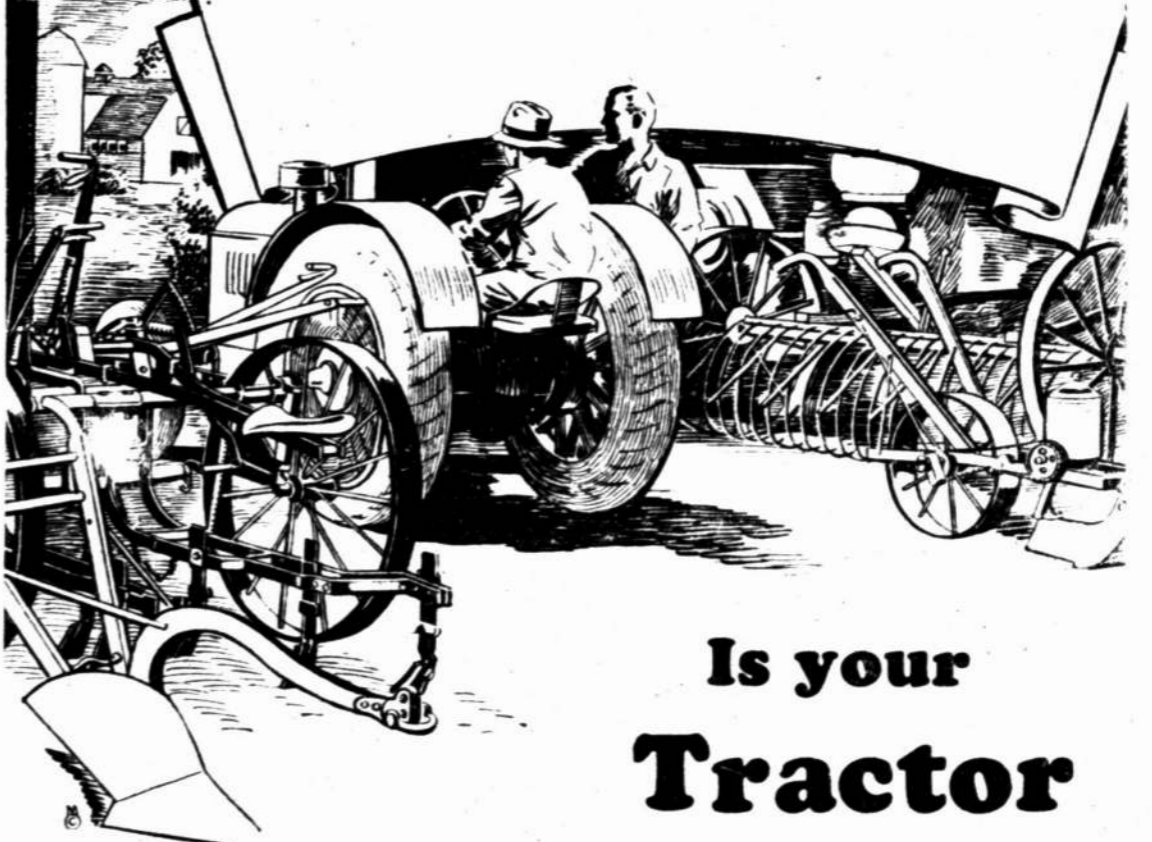

**TEXAS LEADS NATION IN PROGRESS OF AVIATION**

Denton, March 16.—While nations of the world vie with one another in contributing to the progress of aviation, Texas has managed to hold its position as a leader in this field.

Such factors as the great amount of open country in this state, the high percentage of clear days, and the relatively warm winters caused the national government to center its military aviation training here during the World War. Randolph Field, often called the "West Point of the Air" was established near San Antonio, and is now one of the greatest military fields in the world.

Apart from the Army set-up, six commercial airlines operate regular schedules between important cities within the state. They connect with the national lines to Chicago, Atlanta, Ga., Charleston, S. C., and New Orleans, as well as with the transcontinental line from New York to Los Angeles and the international air system to Mexico City.

Airports in Texas total 133, this compares favorably with the national total of 2,369. A general idea of this state's rating can be seen from the 1935 statistics, which show 8,613 airplanes in operation in the United States, 449 being in Texas. The number of licensed pilots in Texas reached 728 in 1936.

**BUICK REPORTS UPSURGE IN ORDERS FOR NEW CARS**

Flint, Mich., March 16.—An upsurge in orders for new Buick cars, presaging one of the liveliest spring quarters in the history of this General Motors division, marked announcement of the resumption of production on Feb. 18 it was disclosed today.

Orders at the factory jumped from 29,412 to 37,131 representing a record wholesale demand. Since the introduction of the new cars Buick normally has carried a bank of from 20,000 to 30,000 orders on its books.

At the same time retail orders with individual dealers jumped from 14,854 on February 10 to 17,033 on February 20, the bulk of the increase coming during the last few days of the period.

With output now on a basis of more than 1,000 cars a day and expected to average in excess of 1,200 cars a day in March, shipments are going forward on a basis to meet the heavy demand, it was said.

Dealers' stocks are being replenished rapidly, according to W. E. Hufstader, general sales manager, with immediate delivery now being made on nearly all

Austin, March 17.—The Annual Clean-Up and Fire Prevention week will be held April 4 to 11, according to word just received from Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. In observance of this week there will be a joint effort between the State Fire Insurance Department and the State Department of Health.

The warm days of spring will soon be here and everyone is urged to see that their property is cleaned of the accumulation of trash. It is only thru individual responsibility and effort that one can have a clean and neat appearing city.

In planning your spring cleaning start with the house itself in the attic and work down, not forgetting the basement. Attics and basements are the greatest collectors of refuse and therefore of dust and dirt that the house possesses, and their neglect often constitutes a serious fire hazard. Do not forget to screen against flies and

mosquitoes. The better the job of cleaning and with a garbage pail kept tightly covered, the fewer flies there will be, because flies love dirt and filth and breed in garbage and other filth.

We are prone to judge people in no small measure by the kind of a yard keeper we think they are. Many times you have heard some one say, "No, I don't know the people next door but they can not amount to much because their yard is cluttered with tin cans and papers and their garbage can is always open." Do not let your neighbors be able to pass judgment on you on such grounds.

### U. S. SQUANDERING SOIL RESOURCES IN A HURRY SAYS CONSERVATION CHIEF

"Unless we make rapid advance against the inroads of soil erosion, the cumulative cost to the nation during the next fifty years is likely to exceed 20 billion dollars, and it may easily extend to beyond 30 billion dollars," H. H. Bennett, Chief of the Soil Conservation Service, warned the Philadelphia Forum in an address delivered before the group at Philadelphia last week.

Pointing to the damage already done by uncontrolled erosion, Bennett declared this country has been squandering its natural soil resources more rapidly than any other nation, civilized or barbaric.

Some 100 million acres of agricultural land already have been ruined or seriously impoverished in this country and erosion has been allowed to gain headway on an additional 200 million acres, Bennett said. He estimates that about three-fourths of the agricultural land in the United States is affected by erosion in some degree.

A direct relationship exists between erosion and floods, Bennett declared, pointing out that gullies caused by erosion become, in effect, man-made tributaries which speed up the concentration of surface water in head-water streams. Also, he pointed out, land ravaged by erosion does not have the capacity to hold and absorb large amounts of surface water.

Urging that downstream engineering work be coordinated with "upstream" engineering, Bennett said, "We have left little undone to spread the violence of erosion and to increase the volume of floods. Unless downstream structures are supplemented with smaller upstream structures and comprehensive conservation treatment at flood sources, I see no permanent escape from the flood hazard."
