GRANDPA SMITH DIES AT DAUGHTER'S HOME IN DUNCAN FLAT SAT.

BELOVED OLD TEXAN IS VICTIM OF PARALYTIC STROKE

The Angel of Death sowed fields of sorrow in claiming the spirit of Grandpa Smith, beloved old character of the Duncan Flat Community Saturday, March 4. Suffering a paralytic stroke Wednesday, Grandpa, as he was known by his grand children, great grand children and many friends, did not regain consciousness. Death came quietly Saturday.

John Crockett Smith was born in East Texas, June 29, 1854. He was married to Miss Josephine Ward in Parker county. The family Bible with important family records was lost in a fire which destroyed his home many years ago. Eleven children were born to this union, ten of whom are living and were at his bedside at the time of his death. The five sons and five daughters are: W. E. Smith, Seminole; J. J. Smith, Lubbock; J. S. Smith, Atton; B. J. Smith, Jayton; A. A. Smith, Jayton; Mrs. J. P. Bass, Fort Worth; Mrs. J. M. Dunlap, Roaring Springs; Mrs. T. M. Clingman, Abilene; Mrs. O. S. Perry, Fort Worth and Mrs. N. M. Jackson, Lubbock. He is survived by 33 grand children and twenty great grand children. Grandpa Smith was the youngest of three brothers to be called by death in the past two months.

Mr. Smith came to west Texas 32 years ago where he was engaged in the cattle business until 12 years ago when he retired and came to Dickens county to make his home with his favorite daughter, Mrs. J. M. Dunlap. Mrs. Dunlap, happy to have her devoted father during the declining years of his life, adjusted her home to conform with his needs and comforts.

Perhaps none of the great characteristics of this noble character will be remembered more, now that he is gone, than his great love and devotion to his children. A sympathetic friend to all who knew him and his acquaintance legion, his passing brings sorrow into many homes.

Grandpa Smith became a member of the Christian Church 35 years ago and had lived a devoted Christian life.

Law Sets Aside One Fourth Gas Tax To Provide Money

JUDGE CAMMACK SAYS COUNTY PAID \$210,000

Good Roads Association Fights Against More Tax Diversions

(Special to The News)

Austin, Texas, March 8—Motley county taxpayers will save more than \$150,000 on their outstanding road bonds through the refunding act of the Legislature last year, according to preliminary figures just compiled by the state highway department.

Gasoline tax revenues are providing the money for this saving, beginning this year. The law sets

In a recent letter to County Judge W. R. Cammack, the Texas Highway Dept. declared that it could do but a small amount of construction work during 1933 owing to the many diversions made in gas tax. The letter stated that new work would be ordered as funds became available to pay for it.

aside one cent of the four-cent gas tax, or more than \$7,000,000 a year. Each month's portion of this income is to be divided in the proper ratio and paid against the maturity of each county for that month.

The ratio is to be set by the new Board of County and District Road Indebtedness. Gibb Gilchrist, its chairman, said that while payments already have been begun, the amounts thus far are too scattered to bear any real significance.

The highway department's records show that Motley county has contributed \$136,853 to the construction of designated highways and bridges since the department was established in 1917. Judge W. R. Cammack has given strict official estimate which covers a longer period, totalling \$210,079. The amount finally approved will be somewhere between the two.

The total expenditures of this type by all the counties of the state, since 1917, total \$90,345,267, according to highway department records. Estimates of county officials are still larger but highway officials believe the ultimate total will be about \$110,000,000. On the basis now set by the legislature, from 12 to 15 years would be required to pay it from the gasoline tax.

The Texas Good Roads Association, which secured these figures from the department, pointed out that in addition to the one cent of the tax which goes to county bonds, another cent goes to the state school fund, leaving but two cents of the tax for its primary purpose—the construction and maintenance of roads.

"Surely the motorists of Texas," the association's statement said, "are entitled to the remaining one (See Road Debt Page 2)"

STATE TO PUT TEETH IN ENFORCEMENT GAS TAX

Austin, Tex., March 8.—The state senate, struggling for ways to increase revenues without adding to the burden of the taxpayer, soon will have its chance at a "windfall" of \$4,000,000 in added income yearly. This windfall is the Matealf bill, which passed the house by the overwhelming vote of 119 to 8, and which puts teeth in the enforcement of the state gasoline tax.

Under the new bill the comptroller will be able to employ an adequate collection force, all gasoline carriers must be labeled, all adulterated or blended motor fuel must be labeled as such, and violation is made a felony.

"What a hue and cry would be raised if yeggs broke into the state treasury in the night and made off with \$4,000,000! We would call out the dogs, organize score on score of posses, and neither eat nor sleep until the thieves had been caught. Yet robbery on this scale happens every year through organized, cunning racketeers who evade the gas tax.

"Not alone do the highways lose by this. One-fourth of this stolen tax money, or \$1,000,000, is lost to the common school fund every year. Translate that into actual work, and you find it would pay the \$17.50 per capita allotment on over 57,000 children, or the yearly salaries of 1,000 teachers, or the \$1.43 free text book allowance for 700,000 boys and girls.

"Another \$1,000,000 is lost to the fund from which the state is now beginning to pay off outstanding county highway bonds.

"The remaining \$2,000,000 is, of course, lost to the highway fund; and every one of the state's 1,250,000 motorists is vitally interested in this money. With highway funds radically reduced this year, only about \$7,000,000 of state money is expected to be available for new roads, and the recovery of this much bootleg revenue would add about 200 miles of new construction on Texas' 9,000 miles of unpaved state highways."

half of this special tax for highways and highways alone, unmolested by any further diversions. It will provide barely enough money to carry on the highway program on a much-reduced scale."

In order to weld the motorists of the state into a unified force for concerted action in their own interests, the association is now engaged in a statewide membership campaign, at a nominal fee. Civic leaders in every county in Texas are being selected to head local campaigns.
