HOOR HOUSEKEEPERS

It is now possible in New York to hire visiting housekeepers by the hour. The firm which deals in housekeepers will supply them for from one hour up. While retuning me of a conversation which I recently had with the director of a nurses' training school. We were talking about the h. e. l. of sickness, about hospital and doctor and nursing bills that soon swallowed the average family's savings; little out of all proportion to the average income.

Breakfast: Chilled steamed prunes or orange juice, cereal, cream, toast, milk, coffee.
Luncheon: Cream of spinach soup, croquettes, bacon and lettuce sandwiches, Bohemian tart, milk, tea.
Dinner: Brailed sirloin steak, new potatoes, French fried onions, beet greens, lemon cream pie, bean rolls, milk, coffee.
Bohemian Tarts
One yeast cake, 1-2 cup lukewarm milk, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup butter, 2 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 lemon, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups milk, about 4 cups flour. Scald milk and cool to lukewarm.

Add flour and beat for fifteen minutes. Let rise until double in bulk. Roll lightly on a floured moiling board into a sheet about 3-4 inch thick, cut in four-inch squares and fill with the following filling: One tablespoon butter, 2 cups cottage cheese, yolk 2 eggs, 6 tablespoons sugar, 1-2 lemon (grated rind), 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup saltine crumbles.
Beat yolks of eggs with sugar. Add remaining ingredients and beat well. Put a large spoonful in the center of each square of dough, pull corners together and brush over with the slightly beaten whites of the eggs. Sprinkle with shredded

nuts and bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven. Sprinkle with powdered sugar when done.

TWO BIG FIRMS OMIT DIVIDENDS**MARLAND OIL COMPANY AND LORILLARD PASS UP QUARTERLY CHECKS**

NEW YORK, June 1. (P)—Two large industrial corporations, the Marland Oil company and P. Lorillard company, today omitted quarterly dividends, action on which was due at this time. St. Louis-San Francisco railroad declared an extra dividend of 25 cents a share on the common stock.

The passing of the Marland dividend occasioned no surprise in Wall street, as it had been predicted freely for some time, owing to relatively poor earnings and the reluctance of directors to cut into the company's reserve. Declining prices for crude oil, resulting from over production, cut deeply into the company's income. The quarterly rate has been \$1.50 a share since December, 1925.

Official announcement was made three weeks ago that the Lorillard company would pass its quarterly dividend of 2 percent, in common stock, largely owing to financial needs in exploiting a new brand of cigarette.

The extra dividend of the St. Louis-San Francisco, was in addition to the regular quarterly of \$1.75 on the common stock. Both are payable July 1. Similar disbursements were made three months ago.

Plainview Holds Memorial Service

PLAINVIEW, June 1. Citizens of Plainview today turned out in large numbers to observe Memorial Day commemorating the memory of the honored dead, not only of the World War, but of all wars in which American citizens have participated. Practically every store in the city was closed, and several hundred citizens joined a parade led by two Plainview bands and the American Legion unit to the cemetery where graves of the war dead were decorated.

The American Legion was assisted by the local Battery of Field Artillery, which exhibited four caissons and various other pieces of equipment in the parade, and by the municipal band and the Junior band, and Boy Scouts. The parade starting at the Armory, led first to the First Methodist church, where an appropriate and very impressive service was held.

From the church the parade led to the cemetery, followed by two caissons, and at the cemetery another very impressive program was held, including the firing of a salute in memory of those who have gone west. Boy Scouts also participated in the marked graves of a year ago.

SHEEP ARE PROFITABLE TO ABERNATHY FARMER

Excellent profits have been recorded by Fritz Fuchs, Abernathy farmer, who owns 27 fine ewes. This year he clipped 100 pounds of wool, worth probably 25 cents per pound.

In addition he raised 70 early lambs, of which 65 were shipped to market, bringing 13 1/2 cents per pound, for a net profit of \$22.25.

All feed used in raising the lambs and caring for the ewes was raised at home.

THE INSIDE OF A BASEBALL

BY BILLY EVANS

1. Runners on second and third score on a base hit by an improper batsman, only to have the mistake properly discovered, what is the ruling?

2. Does the base umpire ever call a balk?

3. What happens when a catcher at first or third, stationed in foul territory, is hit by a thrown ball?

4. Bases filled, two out, batter apparently triples, scoring all runners but fails to touch first base, for which he is called out on appeal. What about the run?

5. Bases filled, two out, batter apparently triples but fails to touch second and is called out on appeal. What about the run?

This Tells It

1. Proper batsman is called out, since no runner can advance on any act of the improper batsman, they are sent back to second and third.

2. It is within his power, but he seldom does, that being regarded as a duty of the umpire-in-chief.

3. The ball shall be considered in play, unless in the opinion of the umpire the catcher intentionally interferes with such thrown ball. If he so decides, runner or runners return to the bases last touched and catcher is penalized by his removal from play.

4. The run does not score. No run scores on any play in which batsman fails to touch first, as was the case here, since the batsman who tripled never touched it.

5. All runs score on what was really only a single by the batsman. Failure to touch second had no bearing on the run that crossed the plate.

Lindbergh Not To Work In Ford Plant

DETROIT, June 1. (P)—Reports that Captain Charles Lindbergh had been offered a place with the aircraft division of the Ford Motor company, were characterized as a fabrication, by Henry Ford in a statement issued here tonight.

EARTH SHOCKS FELT

Three Distinct Tremors Felt On Jersey Coast But Little Damage Is Reported

ASHBURY PARK, N. J., June 1. (P)—Fifty miles off the north Jersey coast was rocked today by three distinct earth tremors which, while severe enough to cause great alarm in the affected area, confined their destruction to the tumbling of chimneys from houses at Long Beach.

The shocks occurred between 7:20 and 8:40 o'clock this morning, standard time.

They particularly were noticeable in and north of Ashbury Park, buildings in the city were rocked, and hundreds of excited persons fled to the streets. Huge rolls of newspaper in the cellars of the Ashbury Park press building were riddled and rolled about the floor.

Director Tondorf of Georgetown university, Washington, believed the disturbance was associated with a movement of sands along the beach. He said the occurrence was not unusual.

THE OTHER SIDE OF TRAFFIC

The matter of traffic has been one of the problems that has attracted much attention of the general public, and city officials, but it seems to have been a rather one-sided affair in as much as it has always regulated the driving side of the question rather than that of the pedestrian. Miller McClintock, director of street traffic in New York has written an article on the question that is quite interesting. If not full of splendid thought, he says very little can be expected in the way of satisfactory traffic regulation in American cities until the special problems presented by the pedestrian have been given thorough examination and adequate treatment, according to experts working to snarl the traffic tangles that are expected to reach an acute stage when the summer motoring season reaches its height.

That pedestrians must be protected at busy intersections, and that such protection not only reduces accidents, but materially speeds up the flow of traffic, is indicated by traffic studies made in a number of metropolitan cities.

Thus far the pedestrian has been left largely to follow his own inclination. Such regulations as have been passed have been directed almost exclusively against drivers of motor vehicles. Slight attention has been given to the adjustment of conflicts between vehicles and foot traffic. But the time has come when it is imperative that all classes of street-users be subjected to moderate and reasonable regulations if motor vehicles are to move faster and with fewer traffic snarls, and pedestrians are to secure the maximum amount of protection.

That such regulations actually reduce pedestrian accidents and increase the flow of traffic has been demonstrated in Los Angeles, Cleveland and Chicago. In Los Angeles, where a new traffic code incorporating regulations for the protection of pedestrians was adopted following a traffic survey, the city secured 50 per cent more effective use of the streets, accidents were reduced 30 per cent, and both vehicle and foot traffic were speeded up.

Chicago's famous "loop" district, where the Erasmian Bureau conducted an intensive traffic survey on which to base recommendations for a new traffic code, provided proof that the unregulated pedestrian is one of the chief sources of accidents and traffic congestion. In this congested business district 90 per cent of personal injury accidents involved pedestrians, the study showed. The survey also disclosed that the period of greatest vehicle and pedestrian density between 5 and 6 p. m., also produced the greatest number of accidents.

The effectiveness of improved traffic control without the aid of other pedestrian regulations was strikingly demonstrated following the installation of a system of traffic lights controlling every intersection in the area. During the five-month period immediately following the installation of the signal lights, accidents dropped 23 per cent, compared with a year, and traffic flow was materially similar period before the lights were in speeded up. Authorities attributed the reduction in accidents largely to the better movement of pedestrians. It was also considered significant, by the experts, that following the introduction of this accident peak no longer coincided with the late afternoon period of maximum vehicle and pedestrian density.

Other data collected by the survey further bore out the fact that the principal sufferer from motor vehicle accidents is the pedestrian. The accident record strongly supported recommendations made in the report of the survey, along such lines as: Better control of traffic, including speed control. Automatic signals or traffic officers at points of conflict between pedestrians and motor vehicles. Clear definition of the rights and privileges of motorists and pedestrian respectively, both at intersections where no signal or officer is posted and also between intersections. Greater regard by drivers for pedestrians in making right or left turns, and

observing the "make ready" or warning yellow light traffic signals.

Special care during evening rush hours. Educational campaigns to impress both motorist and pedestrian with the importance of these remedies and of mutual forbearance.

TRULY BENEVOLENT AND PROTECTIVE

Under a resolution unanimously passed by their annual convention in Houston, Texas Elks have adopted for their special care the State's under-privileged children. That policy put into action — as doubtless it will be with characteristic energy and thoroughness — will give an even broader meaning to the descriptive words, "Benevolent and Protective," in the order's title. It already has demonstrated a right to that title by innumerable acts of public and private benevolence since the organization was founded 59 years ago. Victims of calamity and the needy everywhere and at all times, have found in the Elks a sturdy, warm-hearted friend. An outstanding mission of the order, to scatter cheer, which it has pursued in many ways, will be served by this new program. Among fraternal societies and clubs in recent years a friendly rivalry in ways of well-doing has developed. For the most part deserving children have been the recipients of this philanthropy. For example, the Shriners have built hospitals for crippled little folk; the Kiwanians have become guardians of blind youths, the Rotarians help poor, ambitious young people to go to college; the Lions establish playgrounds, and so on. No finer outlet could be found for the energy and enthusiasm, humanitarian sympathies and good purposes which these organizations possess. The boy or girl who has "gone wrong" is peculiarly in need of such intelligent, sympathetic assistance as the Elks can bestow. Most juvenile offenders have erred because "nobody cared." They have lacked proper parental guidance and a healthful environment. No higher service to society can be performed than to provide these unfortunate boys and girls with influences which will turn them from criminal careers toward useful citizenship. Psychology has refuted our father's harsh theory that the child is inherent bad. If it becomes eloquent, that is usually attributable to faulty bringing up or unsavory surroundings. These are positive ills, as amenable to preventive and curative treatment as are bodily ailments. Viewed in this light, the constructive character of the Elks' program becomes evident and admirable.

THE LURE OF DANGER

Some men seem to be irresistibly attracted to enterprises fraught with danger. And when the spirit of high adventure gets into the blood, its craving is seldom satisfied.

This phenomenon is well illustrated in the case of Charles Nungesser, the intrepid French aviator, who has doubtless perished in a reckless attempt to cross the Atlantic under conditions which invited disaster.

During the World War, Nungesser was credited with bringing to earth 45 enemy airplanes. Even before that he had been the hero of many a daring exploit in South America and elsewhere. His utter contempt of death was shown over and over again. On each plane he flew he had painted a skull and crossbones, a coffin and a candle, a device which was borne by the fated White Bird, the airplane which carried him and his companion, Coli, to death.

In his latest and last adventure Nungesser discarded his wireless set, collapsible lifeboat, landing gear and other safety devices in order to reduce the weight of his craft, staking all on the slender chance of covering more than 3,000 miles in perfect flight. The odds were ten to one against him and he was perfectly conscious of the fact.

But the lure of adventure gripped him. He went to his doom smiling and unafraid.

ACOUSTICS

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The problem of acoustics, long the bugbear of builders of churches, theaters and concert halls, may at last be solved.

Emile Berliner, the inventor who is credited with inventing the microphone which completed the telephone and made radio possible, now claims, after a lifetime study of sound, to have achieved the solution in a form of "acoustics cement."

The question of hall acoustics has in the past been largely a matter of guesswork for architects. An immense amount has been written on the subject and many claims, after a lifetime study of sound, to have achieved the solution in a form of "acoustics cement."

What Has Echoes Do
Glass skylights of the Festival Hall at the St. Louis World's Fair were once shattered by notes from an organ, most unexpectedly, an example of unfortunate acoustics.

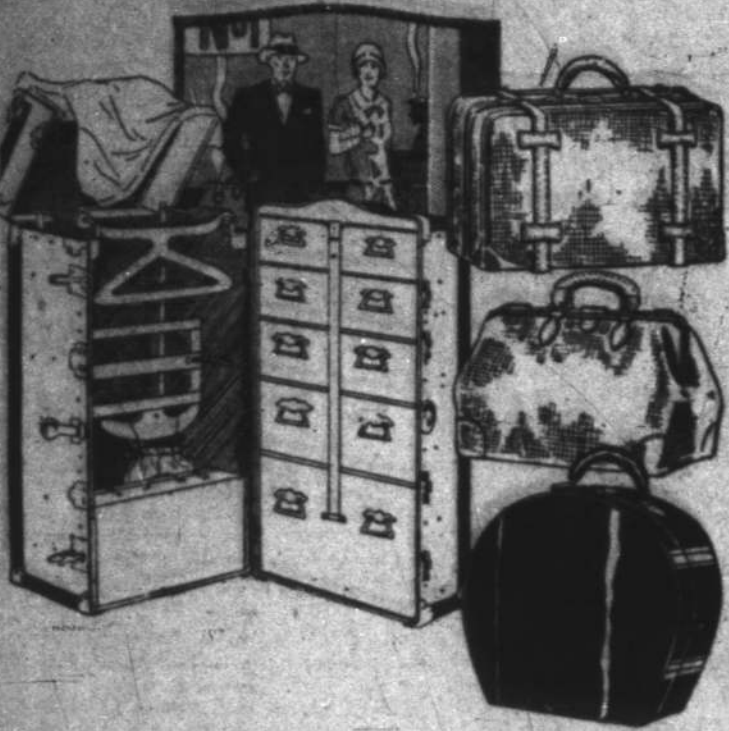

CYCLONE LASHES OKLAHOMA TOWNS

STROUD HARDEST HIT AS MANY HOMES WRECKED; NONE KNOWN DEAD

(By Associated Press) OKLAHOMA CITY, June 1.—High wind, hail rain and electrical manifestations lashed and lighted many parts of Oklahoma tonight with the fury of the storm concentrated most severely on St. Louis, where a tornado was reported to have leveled perhaps twenty-five houses and damaged three times as many.

Persons in the path of the roaring wind at St. Louis escaped injury and perhaps death by diving into storm cellars as they saw the terrifying funnel-shaped cloud racing towards them. No casualties were reported. A drenching rain and hail accompanied the storm which laid low telephone and telegraph wires in all directions.

Hail Pounds Norman
Hail pounded Norman, near this city, some of the stones being as large as hen eggs, and smashing windows and greenhouse glass.

Cushing received a 3 inch torrent of rain.

Ponca City reported two inches of rain accompanied by hail, but no destructive wind.

Okemah suffered a severe dust storm.

Onaps Is Struck
A telephone operator in the office of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad at Checotah reported that a high wind had struck Onaps, Okla., destroying one house and leveling telephone poles. The wind was accompanied by torrential rain, he said, filling the streets with water.

No injuries were reported. A heavy rain was reported at Westville, Okla., accompanied by wind and hail which broke many windows. The Kansas City Southern railroad trucks were said to have been washed out in several places near that place.

33 Dead In Kentucky
LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 1. (AP)—Additional reports trickling in from isolated sections of eastern Kentucky hit by a cloudburst Sunday showed the known death toll today at thirty-three, with the possibility of this number being increased considerably when a complete survey of the damage can be made.

Letcher county seemed to be the hardest hit with twenty-three dead, eleven of whom were reported today. Damage in this county alone, it was estimated today, would exceed \$250,000, with the total amount suffered in the mountainous sections unestimated.

Education Bill Killed

AUSTIN, June 1. (AP)—The administration bill to create a higher state board of education with wide powers in shaping Texas college curricula to avoid duplication, was killed tonight by the house committee on education, which has been postponing action for several days.

The committee first adopted a modified substitute for Senator Woods' bill favored by Governor Dan Moody, and then killed both of them. Vote was 16 to 6 against the substitute offered by Representative David of Fort Worth who is expected to test sentiment of the house Thursday with an attempt to bring his measure out on a minority report.

Would Be Advisors

Duval's bill provides that the proposed board would act only in an advisory capacity to the state board of control in the elimination of duplicate college and university courses during preparation of the school budgets. None of the nine board members proposed could be residents of a county containing an educational institution supported in whole or in part by the state.

LINDBERGH TO COME HOME ON SWIFT CRUISER

ALL HIS THOUGHTS NOW ARE OF AMERICA, HIS HOME AND FUTURE

START SATURDAY

PLANE TO BE PLACED ABROAD VESSEL WITH FAMOUS AIRMAN

(By the Associated Press)

LONDON, June 1.—All the thoughts of Captain Charles Lindbergh now are of America, home and his future. He will start back on one of Uncle Sam's fastest cruisers next Saturday morning and it is expected he will reach Washington the following Saturday, June 11.

Captain Lindbergh is pleased with the idea of going direct to Washington and being greeted by the president in the nation's capital. He has acquired the habit of meeting presidents and ruling monarchs since he dropped out of the skies into the welcoming arms of France.

Speed Pleases Him

The speed with which the trip on the Memphis can be made appeals to him. He is joyful also that his beloved monoplane, the Spirit of St. Louis, will be safely unfolded in the bosom of the Memphis, packed and crated as carefully as any jewel, all under his own direction.

The plane will be placed on the Memphis Friday morning, when the warship calls at Southampton. The cruiser will then proceed to Cherbourg to take on the young hero. Most of Captain Lindbergh's day was devoted to the derby, but tonight was Lindy's night with American residents in London. On the eve of his departure for Paris, on his way home, he was the guest of honor of the combined American societies, who assembled at the Savoy five hundred strong to heap compliment on compliment on the young man's shoulders for all he had done to bring the two countries into closer relationship.

Many Notables Present

Notable men from various ranks of the British life sat at the same board with Lindbergh and offered praise equal to that showered on him by the Americans themselves. Sir Samuel Hoare, the British air minister, said the English people, as well as Americans, were glad to honor one who symbolized the youth of today and who had done so much for civilization's progress.

BRITISH WAIVE SHIPPING CLAIMS

MONEY TO BE USED TO PAY CLAIMS OF AMERICANS AGAINST BRITONS

WASHINGTON, June 1. (AP)—Claims of the British government and its nationals against the United States for seizure and detention of shipping during the world war have been waived by Great Britain, it was disclosed tonight with publication of notes, following an agreement reached two weeks ago.

Will Employ Money

In return the American government agrees to employ the money thus saved to pay claims of Americans against the British, which might fall of settlement in the British courts but which the United States government regards as meritorious. The American note includes a promise to request congress to enact the necessary legislation to employ the money. British claims which the American government has recognized as just are understood to total approximately 1,000,000, with others for which liability has not been concerned reaching a higher figure. Claims of Americans against the British total approximately \$2,500,000.

Claims Removed

The agreement definitely removes the claims from diplomatic channels and international arbitration to the courts of both countries and Secretary Kellogg in his note to Sir Samuel Hoare, the British ambassador, agrees to ask congress to pass laws permitting British claimants not included in the settlement to sue the United States government in American courts. Similar rights in British courts now are held by American claimants.

80 TO FINISH AT CANYON NORMAL

CANYON, June 1.—Unusual beauty and dignity marked the opening of commencement week at the West Texas State Teachers college Sunday when Rev. J. Pat Hinton of Plainview delivered the baccalaureate sermon, taking as his text David's question "What is Man?"

Eighty seniors and the entire faculty in caps and gowns, music especially chosen for the occasion, and the presence of hundreds of parents and friends of the senior class made the occasion a momentous one.

Classes Meet Last Time

Monday was marked by meeting classes for the last time, and the annual commencement band concert in the evening.

Tuesday's most interesting feature to the people of the Panhandle will be the presentation and unveiling of the Ferdinand Paul Guenther Memorial, which is the gift of the class of 1925. The class chose a beautiful fountain as particularly fit to honor the memory of Professor Guenther who, gave fifteen years of his life to the service of the West Texas State Teachers college.

Market Is Sought For Helium Residue

By NEA Service

FORT WORTH, Tex., June 1.—The United States government is now confronted with the problem of selling 5,000,000 feet of good natural gas daily, at the danger of closing down operations of its helium plant here.

Recently given a million dollars for enlarging the plant and piping in gas from the new Nacoma field, the government set out to sell the residue gas, from which the helium content has been extracted.

59 Per Cent Residue

So far it has been unsuccessful. Only about 1 per cent of helium gas is removed by the method of processing gas, leaving 59 per cent of the gas that will flow through the pipe line to be disposed of in some manner.

The Home Star Gas Company, supplying Fort Worth and Dallas with gas, has declined to buy the residue. Now the helium plant is offering it for sale to any one who will "carry it away" at 6 cents per thousand feet.

Problem Is Selling It
Artificial gas in the north and east sells for \$2 and up and is lacking many of the qualities of natural gas, it is said.

State conservation laws prohibit the flowing wild of gas, so if a market is not found by the time the new pipe line is completed, helium plant officials are at loss to know what they will do.

The city and Chamber of Commerce have volunteered to assist in finding a market.

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Roby Man Buys Interest in Bank
At Littlefield And Assumes
Management Soon

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RAILROADS AND HIGHWAYS NEEDED IN DEVELOPMENT WORK, FLOYDADA MAN SAYS IN REVIEW OF PROGRESS

(Special to Avalanche Journal)
FLOYDADA, June 1.—Two methods of transportation have been essential to the growth and development of any empire, state or section during the past decade. With the exception of the public schools the modern method of travel has been the largest contributing factor to the happiness and welfare of the American people. No territory is fully developed until proper railway facilities are available and then the rapid development is likely to be retarded on the account of poor highways.

Much Progress Shown
The South Plains of Texas until a short time ago was practically unknown to the outside world. Today three of the greatest railway systems in the world either have or are constructing lines into this territory and there is every possibility that within a short time the entire section will be linked with its eastern markets with a paved highway. The continued prosperity of this section, although for some time its future has been assured, will be strengthened a hundred-fold. Small towns that have sprung into prominence only when a bumper wheat or cotton crop was produced will in a short time be known as little cities. Town sites are being located and plans made for the building of many other South Plains towns.

Mr. Sam Larasus, for many years president of the Quanah, Acme & Pacific, a subsidiary of the Frisco system, during his lifetime visioned the development of this section of the Lone Star state and made plans for the extension of his line from Roaring Springs to Floydada, which would give to the South Plains a one line haul to its eastern markets. Today the plans of this pioneer railroad builder are being carried out by his successors. Construction of the new road has been started and will be completed within a short time.

Plains Very Fertile
To the east of Floydada lies a section of the plains that has for many years been recognized as one of the most productive spots in West Texas. To the forethought, courage and industry of one man belongs the credit for the purchase and development of this fine body of farm lands. W. H. Dougherty, of Gainesville, began building on this great body of land as early as 1906. In the face of constant criticism he went ahead, his faith in this country to the day of his death being unlimited and unyielding. With the coming of the new railroad a new town will spring up on the Dougherty lands and an even greater opportunity will be offered the home seeker.

Building across a rough and rugged country that was thought for a long time to be impassable for railroads the great Ft. Worth & Denver railway system is entering the South Plains to encourage and enjoy the prosperity of this section. This well known system is constructing a line from Estelita to Plainview across Floyd County and from Silverton to Lubbock through Lockney. This gives more miles of railway to Floyd county than any county on the entire plains, and places every farmer within a short distance of a railroad. Already new towns are springing up on this road, the first being established on the Floydada-Silverton highway, seventeen miles north of Floydada.

Demand Paved Highways
But people in this territory are not satisfied with railroads alone. They are demanding paved highways that will connect them with the cities of their choice and present indications are that within a short time nine counties through which state highway No. 24 traverses will realize their ambitions. This state highway, which is nationally known as the Lee Highway is one of the cardinal roads of America.

Following noble streams and world famous valleys, and in sight of mountains almost all the way across the continent, the passing through the largest and finest body of hardwood forests remaining in the United States, this thoroughfare enters Texas near Vernon and passing through one of the best cotton sections of the Lone Star State, climbs the caprock and enters the "Llano Estacado" of "West Texas Plains" just seven miles east of Floydada. It is this road that state and federal aid has been promised and that four counties on the east of Floyd have already voted bonds to pave. Much of the credit for the recognition of this highway goes to Judge C. L. Olsen, of Amarillo, who has been instrumental in securing the dedication of the route and the aid that is promised. With the completion of the road in Texas, the Lee Highway will be one of the most alluring motor haunts in the country because of its scenic freedom from ruts and bumps, mud and dust, and because it will present unrivaled scenery, pleasant touring with safety and comfort on hundreds of miles of paved road.

Although it is the county seat of the greatest wheat producing county in the state and in the center of the diversified section of West Texas, Floydada is only one of the many towns that is enjoying the rapid growth and development of this section. Every town touched by either the new railroads or highways will reap much benefit and will grow and prosper as it has never done before.

LOCKNEY BEGINS NEW WATER LINES

ORDERS FOR MATERIAL ARE
PLACED AND EXCAVATION
WORK IS STARTED

LOCKNEY, June 1.—Contractors, Geo. E. Prendergrast and company, of Wichita Falls, Texas, will start work on Lockney's water extension within one week, according to their agent, Chas. Cohen.

Some delay has been experienced on account of a misunderstanding between the local council and the state Fire Insurance Commission, however, this matter has been remedied and orders for the material have been placed.

Starts Excavation
Mr. Cohen states that work will start on the 50,000 underground basin of concrete construction pending the arrival of the materials for the laying of the mains. This work is the result of a \$35,000 water bond issue passed in April which will provide a larger municipal water plant intended to serve industrial Lockney with fire protection along with an additional number of water connections in the residential district.

When finished, this system will provide Lockney's industrial district with an abundance of water, thus lowering the fire insurance rate.

The local council has lowered the water rate 33 percent since the contract has been let for this extension.

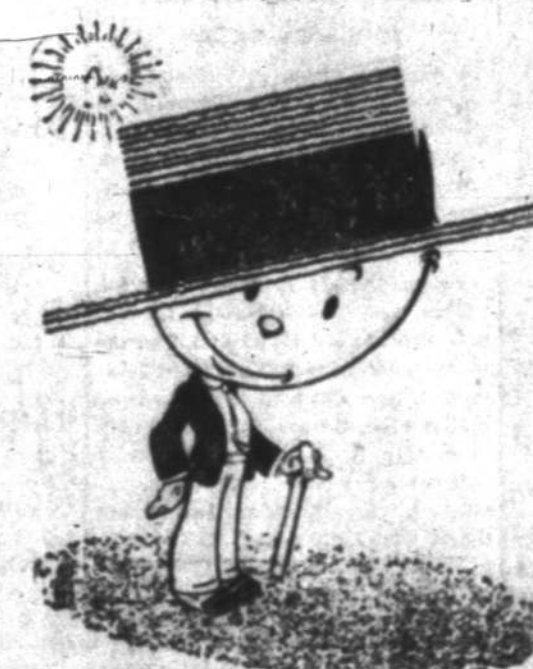
