Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

GEORGE WASHINGTON issued an order on July 9, 1776, that the Declaration of Independence be read to the Constitutional Army... with an audible voice. In my opinion the words of that Declaration should be no less audible today throughout the land. Just imagine if Americans everywhere would stand up together and repeat, with all sincerity, the concluding phrase of the Declaration — "... we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor." Such harmony of spirit would in my opinion go a long way toward solving our problems, foreign and domestic.

ABA ADMITS MISTAKE. On June 1, the president of the American Bankers Association publicly accused me of making untrue statements about the banks' use of a 360-day calendar to calculate excessive interest rates. My charges were made only after an exhaustive nationwide survey of banks conducted by the Federal Reserve Board. On June 17, the ABA president, Clifford Sommer, wrote and apologized for his statements, regretting that the Association had attacked the accuracy of my report. It is always hard for an organization like the American Bankers Association to admit mistakes and I commend the president of the ABA for facing the issue forthrightly, and retracting his charges.

PUBLIC HEARINGS ON THE BANKING REFORM ACT, H. R. 5700, are now complete and the Banking and Currency Committee is hard at work to perfect legislation that will strengthen our banking system. A complete 965-page transcript of the public hearings is now available and individual copies will be sent free to constituents upon request.

THE HONORARY DEGREE OF ASSOCIATE OF ARTS was conferred on me during commencement exercises at Paris Junior College when I was also privileged to address the fine graduating class. This was a very special occasion since I feel so strongly that our junior colleges are a most important segment of our educational system extending education beyond high school to many who would otherwise lack this opportunity. In fact, I believe we should build toward a comprehensive system of public junior colleges to offer all young people at least 2 years of free college or vocational education.

WHILE IN PARIS, I VISITED THE MAXEY MUSEUM. The museum is housed in the former home of Confederate General and later U. S. Senator from Texas (1875 to 1887) Samuel Bell Maxey. This historic building was recently listed on the National Register of Historic Places maintained by the Department of the Interior. This designation confers national recognition and makes the property eligible for preservation grants from the Departments of the Interior and HUD. East Texans can be proud of our rich and eventful history, and I am always glad to assist constituents in their efforts to preserve our heritage.

MAJOR GENERAL MAXEY, incidentally, graduated from West Point, 58th in a class of 59. Number 59 was General George E. Pickett who led "Pickett's Charge" at the Battle of Gettysburg. This battle, which commenced 108 years ago today, has been called the "High-water Mark" of the Confederacy, and "Pickett's Charge" with 3,393 of 4,500 men of his own regiments left on the field, has been described by historians as "one of the most magnificent military efforts in the history of the U. S." It is also, in the opinion of some analysts, the high-water mark of human courage.

HOUSE UPHOLDS SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE (SCS) WATERSHED PROJECTS. Environmentalists have made much of allegations that some isolated stream channelization projects have had adverse side effects due to poor planning, and channelization critics have called upon the Congress to stop funding all channel work. While the measure offered last week was aimed at halting new channel work only, I voted against this proposal feeling that the SCS and local conservation officials will handle future channelization properly.

Austin. — Gov. Preston Smith, in an unprecedented veto action, turned the job of rewriting the entire 1973 state budget to a special legislative session next year.

Smith took the axe to \$3.1 billion in state spending which he found "unnecessary and unwarranted" for the second half of the biennium. He announced his decision on a statewide television program, and said that he will submit to the lawmakers, before September 1972, a new 1973 budget proposal which will require no new taxes.

Smith made it clear that a 1972 special session is inevitable, anyway, because the legislature did not appropriate welfare funds for the second year.

Governor's action may accomplish the following regardless of whether a new tax bill can be avoided next year (Texas Research League estimates a \$474 million biennial tax bill will be required in the 1972 special session):

— Legislators will have to take a sober second look at spending items in an election year when many are faced with general election contests.

— Fact that a little additional federal aid is available for welfare spending, in spite of predictions by Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and others, will be partially obscured, since the special session will not be confined to welfare alone but opened to the entire area of government spending for 1973.

Smith declined to reveal his future political plans but left dangling the prospect of a third term race.

Governor claims the public response has been almost 100 per cent favorable to his historic veto. Lieutenant Governor and House Speaker Gus Mutscher pledged cooperation.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court, in a five-four decision, held that an insurance company can't fight its policyholders in suits against uninsured motorists except in unusual situations.

A man fired by an oil company for not getting enough new business in the Beaumont-Houston area was granted a new trial through a Supreme Court order.

High Court upheld the county court at law finding that a San Antonio woman could collect damages from the City of San Antonio for condemnation of her land and for damage to property due to erosion.

Supreme Court heard arguments in the Braniff and Texas International Airways effort to ground the new Southwest Airlines (Dallas, Houston, San Antonio routes).

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the death penalty of a man convicted of a 1967 knife murder of a Baylor University coed and ordered a new trial.

Trial of former San Marcos Police Chief Waymon Dial, for burglary, has been transferred to Harris County.

AG OPINIONS — Texas Water Quality Board may contract for the state with the federal government for federal grants or loans under the federal water pollution control act — subject

to a 60-day limitation and the governor's approval — Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

• El Paso can contract with the Council of Governments for a recreation area partly within the city limits, partly in the county, and partly in Dona Ana County, New Mexico.

• National Guard Armory Board has authority to determine the lowest and best bid and best interest of the state on armory construction which involves unknown factors on a fixed bid, price and congressional factors.

• Concentrated Employment Project federal funds are not subject to auditing procedures applicable to county funds.

• A city fireman, on returning from military leave, is entitled to credit for the time spent in service, in figuring city payroll longevity.

• Where the legislature has made specific lump sum appropriations, for hourly wages, the head of a state agency to whom an appropriation is made has the discretion to fix the hourly rate of pay.

CITIES COLLECT \$35.5 MILLION — Texas cities which levy a one per cent local option sales tax received nearly \$35.5 million from January - March collections on sales within their boundaries.

Collection for the first quarter of 1971 compared with \$39.6 million for the final quarter of 1970 and \$36.5 million for the third quarter of 1970.

More than 400 cities levy optional sales tax.

Money goes to the state comptroller and is handed back to cities of origin. During the quarter ending March 31, the state retained \$719,756 as its service fee.

INSURANCE RATE HIKE ASKED AGAIN — Auto insurance companies were expected to request rate increases of more than 25 per cent at a hearing before the State Insurance Board June 30.

Companies six months ago were granted a 14 per cent increase, but were far from happy and insisted on more. They wanted a 27 per cent boost.

A new law permits motorists to purchase deductible liability insurance if they are willing to assume the risk of the first \$250 damage their car may do to property. Another new act gives the State Insurance Board direction to promulgate rules for cancellation and non-renewal of policies.

SHORT SNORTS Construction of a million dollars worth of new ward buildings has been started at Rusk State Hospital.

Texas Parent-Teachers Association board of managers went on record as opposing busing to achieve school racial balance.

A total of 162 Texans have lost their lives in water accidents during the last six months, Texas Safety Association noted in warning that the most dangerous months for such accident are just ahead.

BOATING SAFETY STARTS WITH "U"



"Dreamboat" standing aboard a Crestliner dreamboat won't stand for pollution. She's got the litter problem in the bag, a special bag which makes storage of soft drink bottles and cans a soft touch.

The letter "u" has a unique history. A descendant of the letter "v," it is related to "f," "w" and "y." Its original forms were in Egyptian hieroglyphics, Phoenician and Greek writings. For a time the Romans used one sign for three signs, namely "u," "v" and "w."

The letter's relevance to boating extends far beyond the term "U-boat." When it comes to boating safety, here are some precautions that spell initial success:

Use caution when another boater is waving to you. His "friendly" ways may actually be a signal to steer clear.

Understand all the various distress signals. One recognized signal used on small boats is to slowly and repeatedly raise and lower the arms outstretched to each side.

Unintelligible words over a ship radio can spell doom in an emergency. Regardless of how excited you may be, speak clearly and slowly.

Uninvited guests on board can wreak havoc with the owner's safety precautions. Don't assume you're welcome aboard unless the skipper offers a specific invitation.

Untidy housekeeping makes for accidents. The makers of Pepsi-Cola urge that you keep all soft drink containers for appropriate land disposal. Whether you're a woman or a man, make sure that your boat is ship-shape.

Underway, don't come too close to other boats. The wake your boat leaves can endanger other crafts.

Urgent warnings from other boats — whether over the radio or by hand or flag signals — should always be heeded. If you were in trouble, you'd expect other skippers to show the same courtesy which, incidentally, can save lives.

Follow these suggestions and your safety record as a boater will be unmatched.

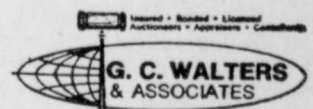

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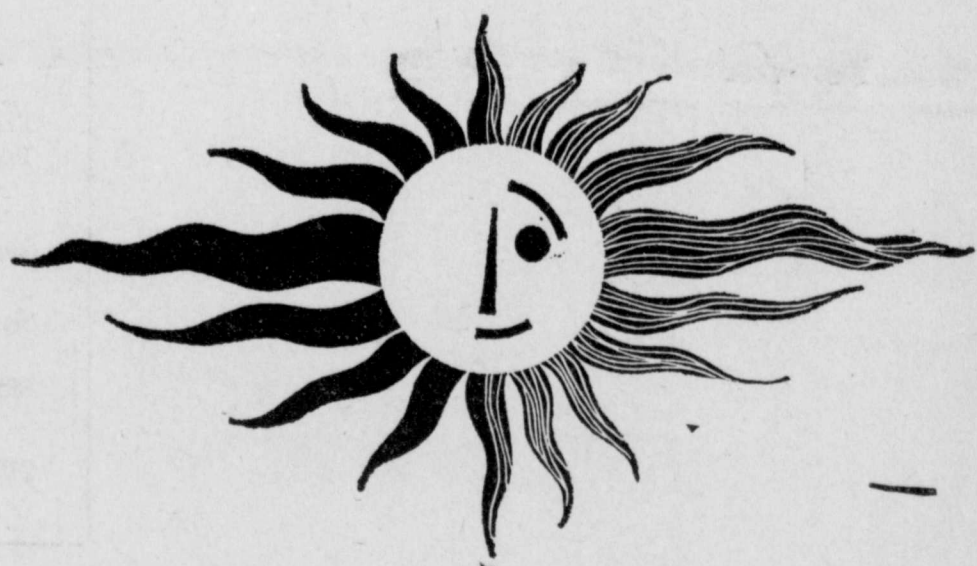


Make your own family salads as unusual as the chef who created the original Caesar Salad. Whether the unique Caesar Salad was first made and served in Mexico or San Francisco is open to question. But with your own creativity make a version to suit your family. We think that during this salad season — the summer season — you'll try this one.

FAMILY CAESAR SALAD

- 1 head western iceberg lettuce
- 1 small head romaine lettuce
- 1 egg
- 2/3 cup grated sharp cheddar cheese
- Salt to taste
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1 to 2 cloves garlic
- 1 cup toasted croutons
- 1/3 cup Mazola corn oil
- 3 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Core, rinse and thoroughly drain lettuce. Refrigerate in plastic bag or crisper. Cook egg in simmering water 2 minutes. Chill immediately in cold water. Tear enough dry, crisp lettuce into large bite-size pieces to make 4 to 6 servings; chill remainder for use another time. Place greens in large salad bowl. Sprinkle with cheese. Break egg into small bowl; stir with a fork. Pour over lettuce. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Squeeze garlic through press into salad or mince and add. Sprinkle on croutons. Mix corn oil, vinegar and lemon juice; whip with a fork. Pour over salad. Toss lightly to coat greens evenly. Serve immediately. Makes 4 to 6 servings.



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
