Grain Harvested

Combines have been rolling in fields of what has been heralded as the salvation to the world's hunger. The new cross-breed grain is Triticale.

Bill Rich is one of the pleased farmers who experimented with the new crop.

Growing a strip of wheat along side the new grain, Rich found that the Triticale yielded more than 100 bushels per acre, with a test weight of 51 to 53 pounds per bushel.

The seed firm in Plainview, DOT, Inc., promptly bought Rich's entire crop when they saw it growing --- over four feet high, with heavy heads drooping.

Harvesting was no trouble, except that he could cut only a small plot at a time because his combine's hopper would fill so quickly.

Rich's Triticale was planted last Oct. 20 using 48 pounds of seed per acre. Because of

local rainfall in October, he didn't have to pre-water his crop. He watered it four times in all -- December, January, March and April.

He applied 250 pounds per acre of anhydrous ammonia, which he felt was more than enough, plus 200 pounds per acre of 11-30-7.

A grain of Triticale looks like an oversized, but shriveled grain of wheat. Because of its larger grain size, it weighs less per bushel than wheat.

Although it is listed as a man-made, synthetic grain, Triticale is not a hybrid. This year's yield is next year's seed.

Much research still has to be done on Triticale's effects on soil, its use of nutrients, etc. But so far, everything looks good.

The grain gets its odd name from a combination of botanical names for wheat (triticum) and rye (Secale).

Area Crops Look Good Despite Weeds, Insects

This is the typical statement by the area farmer as the crops are rapidly maturing during this dry hot summer.

According to the local aerial sprayers, crop spraying is in full swing and each farmer needed his crop sprayed "yesterday". Corn leaf aphid and green bugs are showing fast build-ups in the maize.

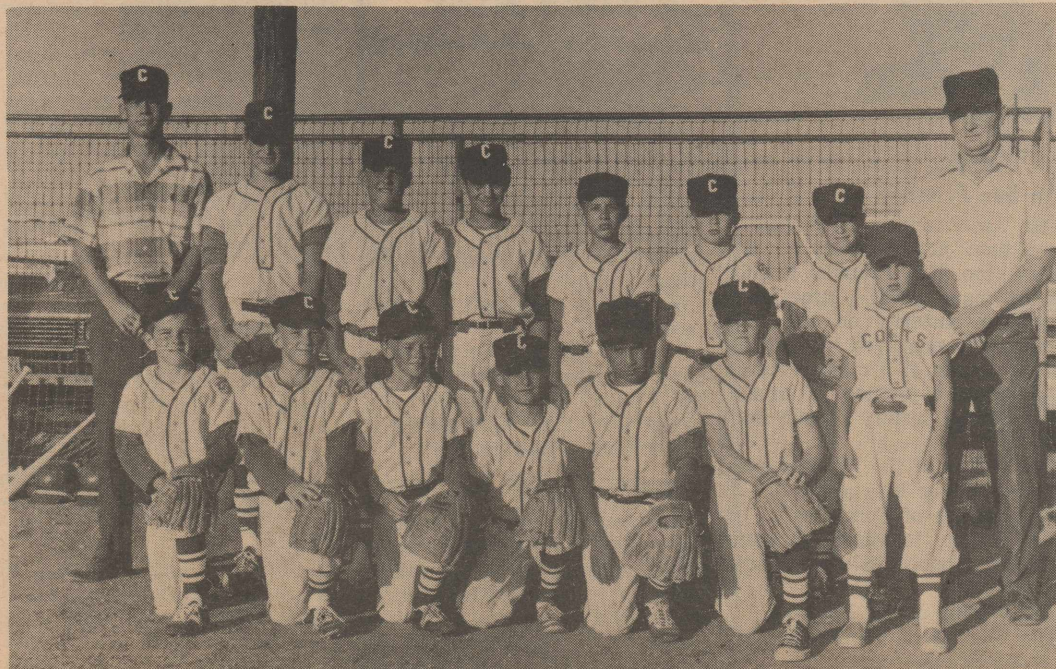
Despite the bug situation, early maize is beginning to boot. Squares are plentiful on the cotton, corn is tossing, carrots are maturing rapidly, and potato harvest procedures have begun.

On the Theron Morrison farm east of Hart, the potato tops were shredded twice last week. The tops were burned and the curing procedure is underway. The potato skins will toughen as the ground dries.

During the growing season, the crop was watered every third day, alternating every other row. In about 10 days, the potatoes will be dug up and the harvest will be in full swing.

Costs In Communications Cited By National C-C

The postal service and the telephone system are two of the most widely used means of communication today. There is little else the two systems have in common.

The cost of communicating between two cities such as Chicago and Los Angeles by first class mail has risen 300 per cent since 1932, and the possibility exists that rates may be raised again to 8¢ an ounce.

Telephone costs, in contrast have dropped dramatically over the same period, and today the cost of a three-minute daytime call between these cities is about one-fourth the cost in 1932.

These figures were compiled by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The postal service was one of the first and most important functions of the Federal

Government when the republic was founded.

Telephone service, on the other hand, has been left in the hands of private enterprise.

One can only wonder, observes the National Chamber, what would have happened if our founding fathers had telephones and had decided that only the government could make them work.

Old Values Needed

(Editor's Note - the following excerpts are from an Independence Day address to the American Legion at Terrell by Lt. Gov. Byron Fullerton.)

I am weary of what used to be called 'passing the buck' among those airing their views about the problems and wrongs of society today.

Youngsters mostly blame their elders who, in turn, blame the young.

Many parents put the blame on educators, many of whom, naturally blame parents. Politicians often blame the news media, which, just as frequently blames politicians. Churches blame a breakdown of morals while liberation and reform groups blame outmoded concepts.

And so it goes....

To some degree, each of the blame-fixers may be partially right, but in general they are all wrong. What concerns me most is that they are all more eager to fix the blame than to fix the trouble!

Crises, problems, and alarm about them are not unusual in America. We can all take pride, and we should find comfort, in the fact that this nation has endured crises of one kind or another for almost two hundred years. It has endured because it was founded upon strong basic principles which were built to last.

Like a piece of fine old silver our Constitution has not deteriorated with the passing of time, it only appears now to be tarnished from neglect. And, with rededication, with determination, and with elbow grease, it will polish and gleam anew!

It isn't new approaches we need so much as it is a sharpening up and restoration of

values to our old approaches.

Indeed, there is little wrong with society today that cannot be righted through a return to the noble ideals of our founding fathers.

Radicals can't do it for us....

News media can't do it for us....

Politicians can't do it for us....

Bureaucrats can't do it for us....

Churches can't do it for us....

Schools can't do it for us....

The building of a healthy, free and independent nation was blueprinted for us by the architects of our Constitution and our Bill of Rights, but from that point on it is strictly a "do-it-yourself" project....

Only ourselves, acting responsibly as individuals, and in concert, can re-establish the basic values which now seem lost to us.

The road back begins with Golden Rule equality in which we live and let live as a matter of sincere personal choice. When we restore self-discipline in our own lives we will see general respect for all discipline restored. When we obey laws with sincerity equal to the vigor with which we enforce them we will see a restoration of order. When we assume responsibility for governmental services at the level closest to the people we will witness the decline and demise of bureaucracy and relief from the staggering cost of big government. When we return to concepts of a man's worth based upon his personal achievements and his individual conduct we will then have restored the dignity of man in its truest interpretation. When we insure impartial equal opportunity instead of attempting to guarantee success, only then will we have restored proper balance to Democracy as intended by our forefathers.

Insurance Offers Complete Coverage For Feeder Cattle

A new insurance policy which offers full mortality coverage on feeder cattle in qualified custom feedlots was announced today by Harold West, Sales Manager for Panhandle Insurance Agency with home offices in Amarillo.

West stated that "accident insurance for certain perils has been available for feeder cattle for several years and life (mortality) insurance for certain types of animals has been available on a limited basis for several years.

"Panhandle Insurance Agency," he said, "determined that a more comprehensive coverage was needed for the cattle

feeding industry. Hence, we designed a full mortality policy to provide adequate limits, at reasonable rates, necessary for the protection of the high values involved."

At the same time Oran L. Marshall, a P.I.A. account executive, was named to head the agency's Agri-Business division which includes coverages related to producing, processing and marketing of beef and other agricultural products as well as feeder cattle coverage.

According to Wayne O'Keefe co-founder of Panhandle Insurance Agency, qualified feedlots within a radius of approximately 250 miles of Amarillo

may adopt the new insurance plan, if desired, and offer the insurance protection to their customers.

"As far as we know, ours is the only policy which offers full mortality coverage on cattle in feedyards without a specific limit of liability," O'Keefe stated. "It was developed, after two years of study and planning, to fill a need which we found in dealing with bankers, feeder-investors and feedlot operators," he said.

O'Keefe explained that feeder cattle mortality insurance against loss can be a factor in the continued growth of the cattle feeding industry. "Bankers and financiers invest more readily and with greater confidence when they know their funds are protected against insurable hazards," he declared. "And, with ample money available to buy cattle and put them on feed, investors are active and feedlots operate at greater capacity," he added.

Pointing to the ideal combination of favorable climate, excellent pasture and grain supply in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains, and in adjacent areas of neighboring states, O'Keefe forecast an increasingly bright future for cattle finishing in this region.

SENSING THE NEWS

The victory of the British Conservative Party at the polls in June was of interest to conservative-minded citizens throughout the English-speaking world. Not only did the Labor Party receive a severe setback, but socialism was rejected by British voters as the wave of the future.

Many of the socialist conceptions that have gained currency in the United States, Canada, Australia and other English-speaking nations were developed in Britain by the Labor Party and the Fabian Society. The Labor Party triumph at the end of World War II, which swept out the government of Winston Churchill, enormously encouraged socialists in America and elsewhere.

Unlike Great Britain, the United States has never been run by a party or an administration that openly proclaimed itself socialist. Yet socialist ideas regarding private property and public administration permeated such American political movements as the New Deal, Fair Deal, New Frontier and Great Society. The American Left grew up on political doctrines shaped by British political and social theorists such as the late Harold Laski. British leftwing journals such as the New Statesman and the London Observer have an intellectual impact on the Left-Liberals in the United States.

Thus it is instructive to consider the repudiation of the Labor Party by the British electorate. The British people have had years of experience with government by socialists. And when they chose a new Parliament in June they decided that they wanted government by Conservatives.

The British electorate learned the hard way that socialism isn't the answer to the problems of modern societies. They found that oppressive taxation of productive citizens (the classical socialist idea of redistributing the wealth by taxation) doesn't increase the real wealth of a people. They learned that passionate talk about social and economic reform isn't a substitute for efficient management of the public business.

They learned that political leaders in debt to union leaders and leftwing ideologues aren't in a position to develop the right kind of environment for foreign trade -- and Britain lives on foreign trade.

Finally, British voters realized that the socialists, with their doctrinaire old-fashioned "one-world" philosophy, were incap-

able of doing anything about the flood of immigration from Commonwealth countries in Asia and the Caribbean -- immigration that is fast changing the character of an Anglo-Saxon society.

So the British have gone back to the Conservatives who place reliance on private initiative, who believe that government should remove burdens from the backs of the taxpayers, and who understand the central importance of practical economics.

Hopefully, the American people will take note of the British experience of recent years and the British decision to discard the leadership of the socialists. The United States took a step in the right direction in 1968 when it rejected continuation of the Great Society, an American version of the socialist conception of society. But much yet remains to be done both in terms of government personnel, reorganizing federal departments; and in electing members of Congress who understand the falsity of American-style notions of socialism.

It is not easy in either Britain or the United States to get rid of political holdovers. The British government is run by a permanent Civil Service, and the Laborites have been enrolling members for many years since the end of World War II. In the United States, federal departments have been packed with liberals since New Deal days. The Eisenhower administration never really cleaned house in the 1950s, and then came the New Frontier and Great Society. As a result, many of President Nixon's plans are sabotaged from within the federal departments.

Improvements can and must be made at election time, however. This year, the congressional elections, especially the Senate races, hold the key to the future. If the United States is to have responsible, conservative government in the mid and late seventies, the voters must strengthen the ranks of conservatives in Congress. The situation is especially critical in the U. S. Senate, which is out of touch with the growing grassroots conservation on basic issues.

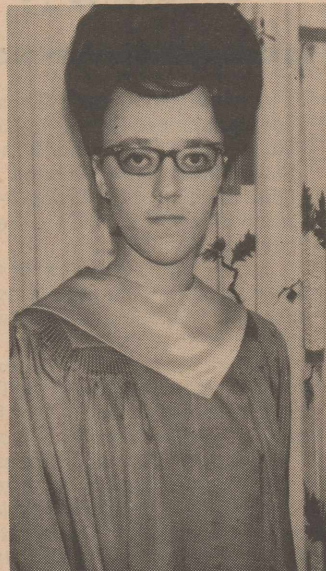
The point to bear in mind is that conservatives can win elections. Socialism and liberalism don't represent the wave of the future. Experience with socialism persuades a people that conservatism makes sense. That's the meaning and significance of the British parliamentary elections.

Hart Miss Tours Europe In 'Campaign For Christ'

Fairy tales can come true. Ask Meitizie Kennedy.

June and its memories are like a fairy tale come true for Meitizie who accompanied a group of young people on a European "Campaign For Christ."

Meitizie was one of 25 youth from Lubbock Christian College to make the trip. Also participating were 66 young people from Highland Church of Christ in Abilene and 13 from Hardin, Ark.

The never-to-be-forgotten trip began June 3 when Meitizie and ten others boarded a Dallas-bound Braniff 165 at Lubbock. They were joined in Dallas by other young people. Arriving in New York, they met the rest of the group.

After a get-acquainted time in which the group sang songs of praise to God for their safe journey thus far, the group boarded a Boeing 747 for Paris. Departing at 7 p. m., they arrived in Paris at 6:55 a. m. (a six hour time difference from Lubbock.)

Tired but eager, the group went sight seeing about Paris. Meitizie found Paris much too busy and was disappointed to find paper littered about the streets.

The next day the group traveled to Geneva, Switzerland for a ten-day stop. They rose at 6:30 a. m., had breakfast and at 8 a. m. walked to the Y.M.C.A. for daily assignments to work areas.

Walking to their assignments in groups of 10 to 12, the group would again divide into twos and threes to pass out pamphlets and talk with the French people.

In four and one-half days, the group distributed 244,000 pamphlets, finishing each day about 3:30. After work the group gathered for choir practice.

Devotions were held at 7:45 with singing at 8 p. m. Richard Andrejewski would bring the evening messages, speaking in French. Tired young people who did not understand French found it difficult to keep awake after their busy day.

Another song session lasted until 10. Visiting with the people for a time after services made it 11 or 11:30 before the group arrived back at their hotel for the short night.

"We sang every chance we got as this was a means to get

people to listen to us." Meitizie said. The group spent one afternoon singing in a park.

Leaving many new friends, the group left June 15 for Luzanne and an afternoon of shopping. The next day they went on to Interlaken where they visited the Castle of Chillon.

In Interlaken, the group were delighted to hear English spoken when they met a group of young men from Wheaton College in New York. They heard the all male chorus perform.

From the top of the cathedral, the group heard the town crier call the hour and Meitizie thought it a bit "spooky".

A picnic in the Swiss Alps was in store the next day and then on to Zurich. From Zurich, the group flew to Amsterdam, Holland.

Sunday, after worship with Christians in Amsterdam, the young people boarded a plane for London.

Monday was spent in seeing the sights of London including Buckingham Palace and the Changing of the Guards, Piccadilly Square, Westminster Abbey, Big Ben, Parliament, London Bridge, Tower of London with the Crown Jewels and St. Paul's Cathedral.

The next day was free for more sight seeing and shopping. Wednesday it was back to Paris for the flight home but an air strike delayed the homeward departure for three hours.

The three hour delay upset schedules completely with the late New York arrival and customs causing the group to miss their flight to Dallas.

After a long wait, the group were routed through Washington D. C. arriving in Dallas more than two hours after they should have arrived in Lubbock and too late for the last flight.

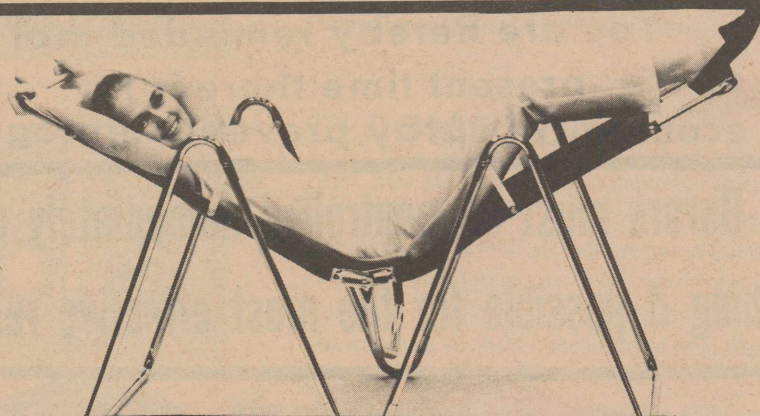

Swine Studies Get Underway

The second swine feeding study got underway last week at the High Plains Research Foundation.

Past swine studies at the Foundation tested the economics of raising swine in portable pens. Another feeding study, released in the High Plains Research Foundation's annual report in March compared feeding sorghum and Triticale as a base of feeding rations.

This study will compare wet and dry feeding rations utilizing sorghum based feeds.

The test will be in portable, raised slatted floor pens. Used in the study will be 100 head of swine from the Fred Breugel SPF swine operation at Dimmitt.

Special equipment necessary to meter and mix the wet feed or "gruel" has been installed for the study. According to Dr. Tom Longnecker, Foundation director, all water received by the 50 pigs on gruel feed will come from the feed and water mixture. The regular watering systems have been removed.

Ground milo is being used as the base grain in both the liquid and dry rations along with the necessary protein supplement, minerals, vitamins, etc.

If you are lucky enough to travel abroad, you are faced with the problem of limited luggage. What must I take and what is it that I can do without? If you are traveling by car it might pose the same problem in a minor way. For most of us our vacation would be short enough that it would pose no problem at all.

But, just think what we would take along if we were not coming back or if we did not know if we would or not. Fidel Castro overthrew President Fulgencio Batista government on January 1, 1959, and Batista fled the country. Castro claimed he was fighting to restore the freedom

of the Cuban people. By May 1961, he declared Cuba a socialist state, and said there would be no more elections. His government started land reforms and housing programs, nationalized education and most businesses and industry, and signed trade agreements with communist countries. Since this day in 1959, literally thousands of people have followed in President Batista's footsteps. Many have left with only the clothes that they wore. Many said goodbye to their loved ones, never to see them again. The most that they could possibly take had to be carried on a small barge and guarded closely across the rough waters of the Atlantic. Yes, a little later many were allowed to leave by plane, but many of these were to say goodbye to their businesses, lands, homes, and loved ones, to obtain their freedom and possibly never to return. This is one account that is close to home for the search of freedom. It has been repeated many times before and after 1959. We saw South Koreans fleeing before their enemies with all their belongings on carts being pulled by some member of the family. South Vietnamese have been fleeing from their aggressors. We will go to most any length to be free. How about our freedom today?

What about our religious freedom? It is true that most of these countries named has a few Christian churches and has had missionaries, but fear keeps those away that would normally attend. Christianity has been virtually stamped out of Communist countries. Abram had time to gather up what he would like to take along because he had many servants and goods.

Suppose that someone should tap you on the shoulder right now and say, "Come along with me, and I will show you a land which is large and a place that you will have complete freedom." What would you take along? First, we should think of those things that we should

leave behind. We should leave behind criticism, because there would be no one there to criticize, for they would all be made perfect before God. We should leave behind hatred because, those who harbor hate would not be able to enter the promised land. We should leave behind gossip because there would be no one to gossip about. All of the things that clutter up our lives now should be put aside and left behind. This is to make room for those things that we will need to take; such as faith, for without it it is impossible to please God. We need to be pure as he is pure. We need hope, "But if we hope for that we see not, then do we with patience wait for it." (Rom. 8:25) We would not overlook love, Paul said, "It is the greatest of all."

The priceless gift of Eternal Life, if we are so fortunate as to possess it here, will be our passport into heaven. We will not need time to cash in our stocks and bonds or sell our real estate or collect on our insurance because we will not need any of our earthly goods. Faith and hope will light our way beyond the darkness. Love will abide with us forever. "And if you be unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve,.... but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." (Joshua 24:15)

CHERRY PIE

1 c. cherry juice
3/4 c. sugar
2 T. quick-cooking tapioca
Dash salt
2 c. canned, pitted sour cherries
(1 No. 2. can) drained
1 T. butter or margarine
1 recipe plain pastry

Combine juice, sugar, tapioca, salt and cherries, and let stand about 15 minutes. Line 9-inch pie pan with pastry. Fill with cherry mixture. Dot with butter. Adjust top crust; flute edge. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) 45 minutes to 1 hour.

NOTE: For 8-inch pie, use only 1/2 cup cherry juice. Other ingredients remain the same.

OATMEAL CRISPIES

1 c. shortening
1 c. brown sugar
1 c. granulated sugar
2 well-beaten eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 c. sifted enriched flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
3 c. quick-cooking oats
1/2 c. chopped walnuts.

Thoroughly cream shortening and sugars; add eggs and vanilla; beat well. Sift dry ingredients; add to creamed mixture. Add oats and nuts; mix well. Shape in rolls; wrap in waxed paper and chill thoroughly. Slice 1/4 in. thick, bake on ungreased cookie sheet in moderate oven 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Makes 5 dozen.

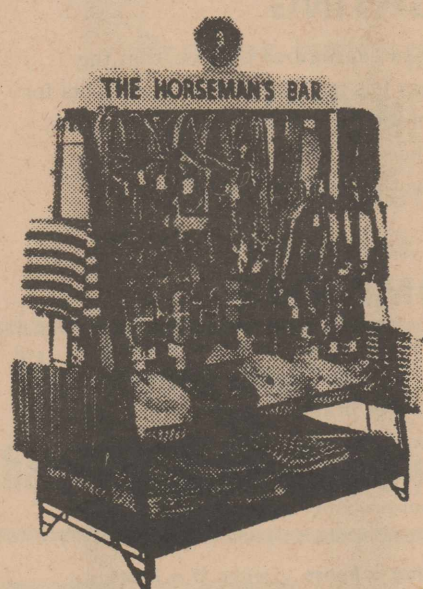

Homemakers Haven

By Mrs. Max Marble

Recipes shared today are family favorites that comprise a Tasting Bee cookbook prepared by the W.M.U. of First Baptist Church in Lockney. Some are a little different than the normal homemaker would prepare daily, although they are easy and very good.

LEMON PECAN CAKE

3/4 lb. oleo
4 c. sugar
1 lb. brown sugar
1 lb. pecans, cut up
1/2 c. milk
1 1/2 oz. bottle lemon extract
1/8 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder, heaping

Cream sugar and butter; add egg yolks. Add dry ingredients alternately with liquids. Add lemon flavor, then fold in beaten egg whites. Cook at 300 degrees in tube pan about one hour and 40 minutes. Do not cook too dry.

TRANSPARENT PIE

4 eggs
2 scant cups of sugar
1 stick oleo
1/2 tsp. lemon extract
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Mix well. Cook over low heat until oleo melts. Stir to keep from sticking. Pour in crust and bake about 25 minutes or until set.

SWISS STEAK

1 lb. steak
1 can mushroom soup
1 can water
1/4 c. LaChoy

Pound all the flour you can into steak. Do not salt. Brown meat in hot grease, then pour off all the grease. Put meat in casserole and mix well with other ingredients. Cook at 325 then turn meat and lower heat. Cook 2 hours.

APRICOT JELLO SALAD

2 pkgs. orange Jello
1 can apricots (sweetened)

1 can apricot nectar (1 1/2 c.)
1 small can frozen orange juice
4 c. liquid (using nectar, orange juice and juice from apricots) and water make the 4 cups.

Heat liquid to dissolve Jello and add apricots and then refrigerate.

DOUBLE FUDGE PUDDING

1 c. flour
2 tsp. baking powder
3/4 c. sugar
2 T. cocoa
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 c. milk
1 tsp. vanilla
2 T. shortening, melted
1 c. nuts
3/4 c. brown sugar
1/4 c. cocoa
1 3/4 cups hot water

Sift together flour, baking powder, granulated sugar, cocoa and salt. Add milk, vanilla, and shortening. Mix until smooth. Add nuts. Pour into greased 8x8x2 inch pan. Mix brown sugar and 1/4 cup cocoa; sprinkle over batter. Pour hot water over entire mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

POUND CAKE

2 c. sugar
4 eggs
3 c. flour
1 tsp. vanilla
1 c. buttermilk
1 c. shortening
1/2 tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt

Mix all ingredients together. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees. For variety of flavor, add one package Jello or one package melted German Chocolate.

BLUEBERRY-BANANA PIE

Cook until thick:
1 can sweetened blueberries
1/2 c. sugar
3 T. cornstarch
Add 1 tablespoon lemon juice and cool.
Slice 3 or 4 bananas into baked pie shell. Pour blueberries over

top. Chill and serve with whipped cream or Dream Whip.

APRICOT SALAD

Dissolve 1 family size orange Jello with 2 cups boiling water.

Add 2 1/2 cups apricot halves and 1 small can crushed pineapple. Chill until syrupy and add 2 cups miniature marshmallows. Chill in long pyrex dish.

Cook until thick:

1 egg
4 T. sugar
3 T. flour
1 c. fruit juice

Add 1 cup whipped sweetened cream. Spread over Jello mixture.

FRENCH SILK PIE

1 stick oleo
2/3 c. sugar
1 square chocolate, melted
1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs

Beat oleo until fluffy. Add sugar and beat. Blend unsweetened chocolate and vanilla into mixture and beat. Add one egg at a time and beat for 3 minutes after each addition. Pour into baked pie shell. Top with whipped cream or Dream Whip. Then top with chopped nuts. Chill 3 hours before serving.

Accent on Health

The crippling, contagious disease of polio has struck the State of Texas once again. Following an epidemic of the disease in South Texas, state, local, and federal health officials have mounted a statewide immunization campaign to protect all young children against this disease. By the end of June, the Texas State Department of Health had received reports of fourteen possible cases of the disease. Of these, only three have been confirmed as polio. One case was diagnosed as ECHO virus, and then others remain under observation. One death has been attributed to polio, and the disease is suspect in one other fatality.

Dr. M. S. Dickerson, chief of the Communicable Disease Services section of the State Health Department, reports the paralytic polio outbreak in Texas has become an epidemic under the definition of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the U. S. Public Health Service. Their guidelines say an outbreak will be considered an epidemic when there are two or more confirmed cases of the disease caused by the same type of virus during a four week period in a specific area. The three confirmed cases are of Type I polio virus, and all three were diagnosed in Hidalgo County.

The virus is attacking primarily children under one year of age, with the oldest re-

ported case only three years old. These reported cases are coming out of families who have failed to take their children to a doctor or their local health department for immunization against the crippling disease. None of the children under observation by health officials had received any polio vaccine. All cases have some degree of paralysis.

Dr. Dickerson says health officials have mounted a massive polio immunization campaign. Some 40,000 doses of the Trivalent Oral Polio Vaccine

were distributed in the last weekend of June to residents in the epidemic locality. But Dr. Dickerson stresses the need for a state-wide vigilance, and urges all parents to get their children immunized as soon as possible.

Polio immunization is carried out in five steps. The first dose of the Trivalent vaccine is recommended for the child of two months of age, when the protective antibodies the child received from his parents are beginning to diminish. A second dose is required at the age of four months. A third dose follows at six months of age, a fourth dose at eighteen months of age, and the fifth and final dose is recommended just prior to the child's admission to school. All five doses are necessary for full immunization.

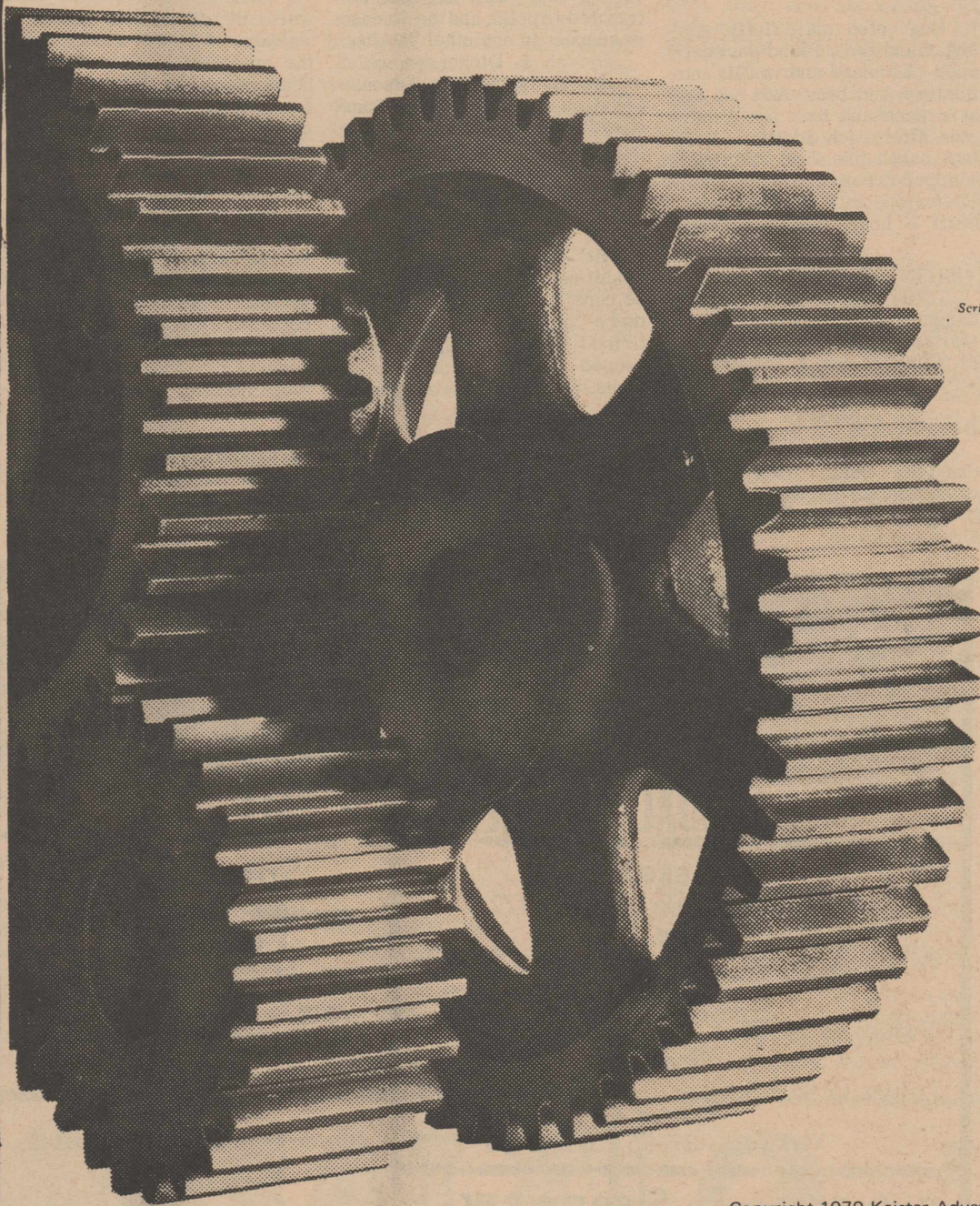
