Denton, Gilreath, Durrett, Lane Are Choices Of County Voters On May 4

Hall County will not have a Democratic Party Primary runoff as none resulted from the May 4th Primary. Some counties in the area will be involved in a second primary due to local and area races.

Minor discrepancies in the election board tabulations which were caught in Democratic Party canvassing of figures have been completed, and a completed box by box tabulation is published on Page 9 of this issue.

Editor Bill Combs said, "We are sorry for the inconvenience to our readers of the delay in publishing the complete results of the primary."

Winners of the contested County races include Loran Denton for County Judge, with 950 votes over W. W. Cooper with 369 votes; Vera Tops Gilreath for county school superintendent with 1,183 over Ladislaus Wolko with 119; Incumbent V. C. (Zipp) Durrett for County Commissioner Precinct No. 2 with 112 votes over Mack Cofer with

66; and Incumbent Harold M. Lane for County Commissioner Precinct No. 4 with 174 over James Fuston with 155.

Pari-mutuel wagtrng was defeated in this county 736 to 433 which followed the state-wide trend.

Hall County gave Jack Hightower 86 per cent of the vote, 1,146 for U. S. Representative, Dist. 13, over Ray Ruffin with 108 and Louis A. Finney, M. D. with 70.

The County voters also gave Governor Briscoe 1068 voters over Sissy Farenthold 199, Bill Posey 13 and Steve Alexander 19.

For State Senator, County voters preference was the same as over the senatorial district as they gave Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls 729 votes to Charles Finnell of Holiday 438 votes.

Hall County voters followed statewide trends in all contested elections as indicated on Page 9 in the box by box tabulation.

Supt. Bates is 46 years old and is highly qualified for the position, having spent 24 years in a wide variety of jobs in public education in the panhandle area.

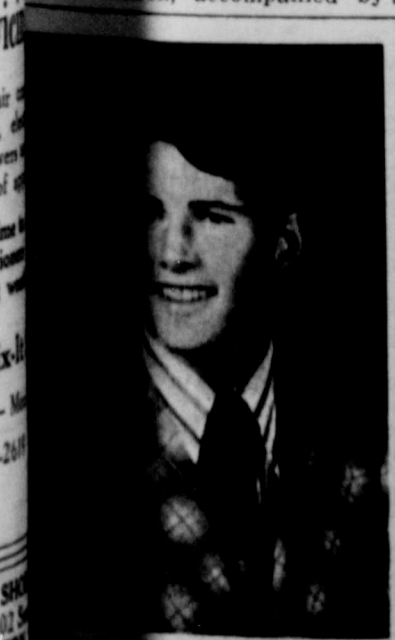
He has coached at Idalou Groom and Stratford. In addition he is a fully certified counselor and driver education instructor. He has spent some eight years in

More Holidays?

Great balls of fire! Among the many things this country does not need is another legal holiday every 2 years with elections as an excuse.

This is just one of the many amendments getting a parasitic ride on the campaign reform bill currently being added to and subtracted from in the senate.

The plan offered by the in- congruous odd couple, Senators Goldwater and Humphrey, actu- ally is a resurrected one pre- viously offered by Senator Hum- phrey which passed the senate but did not get through the house. The proposal for another "vac- ation day" is no more valid now than it was then.

It is hard to imagine, for in- stance, that a voter finds it im- possible to cast his or her ballot under present conditions. Polls are open before and after work- ing hours, and in many cases business and industry give their employees time off to go to the polls.

With 10 legal holidays already established for most workers, 5 of which have been tailored into 3-day weekenders, plus birthday holidays in many union contracts, more time off for fun and games with elections as an excuse is not what this sluggish economy of ours really needs.

Another one or 2 paid legal holidays might be nice but they certainly aren't necessary, espe- cially in government and banking operations which seem to halt for holidays at the slightest pro- vocation.

But the major mistake of the Goldwater-Humphrey amendment is the assumption that more vot- ers would go to the polls if they had the entire day off. This does not follow unless there is a plan to move the voting booth to the first tee of the golf course, the best fishing holes, favorite bars and bowling alleys.

Check out church attendance on Good Friday when many work- ers had a day off. There were lots of empty pews while golf courses were busy, the highways were full of holiday travelers and those who stayed home got a lot of yard work done.

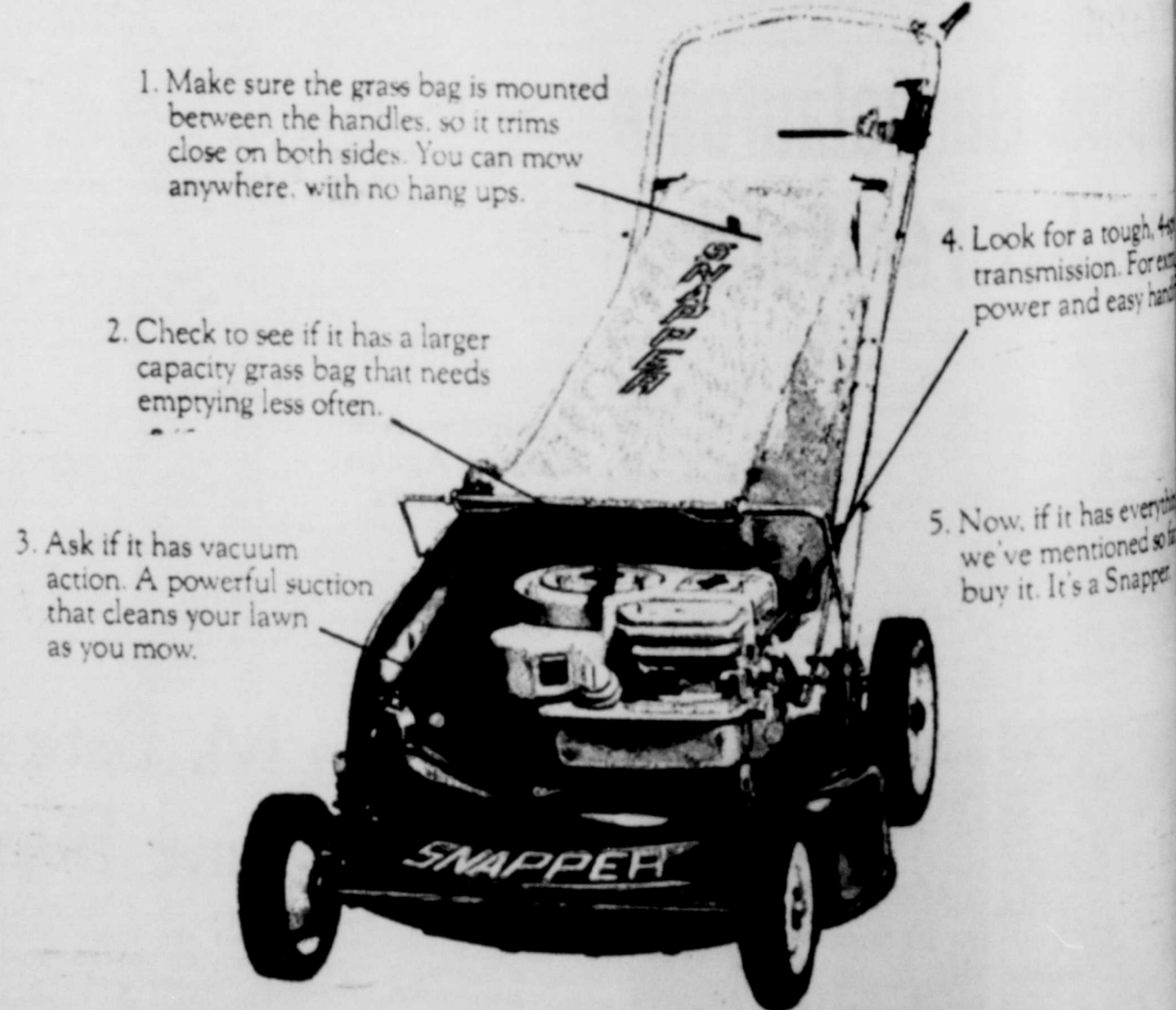
The holiday proposal is, of course, part of the whole weak- kneed argument that registration and voting will be stimulated by

with it a certain responsibility and it is not unreasonable to expect at least a minimum effort from voters to exercise that prerogative.

There is clearly plenty of room for campaign reform, but that description scarcely fits notions like proclaiming another holiday. This amendment should be con- signed to oblivion as its pre- decessor was two years ago.

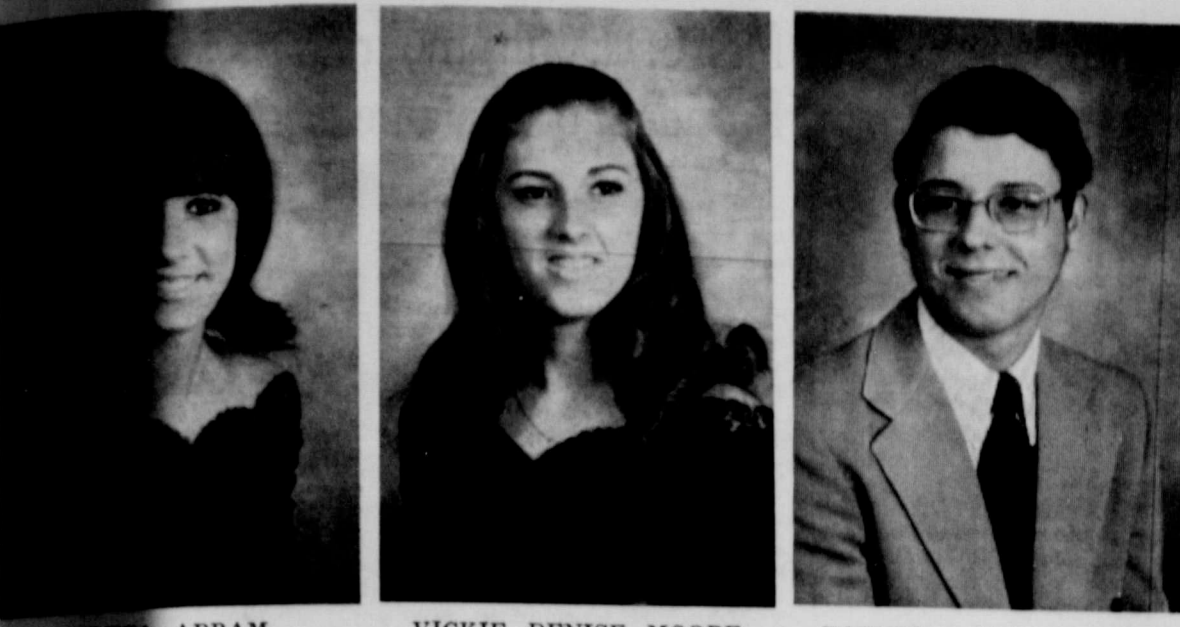

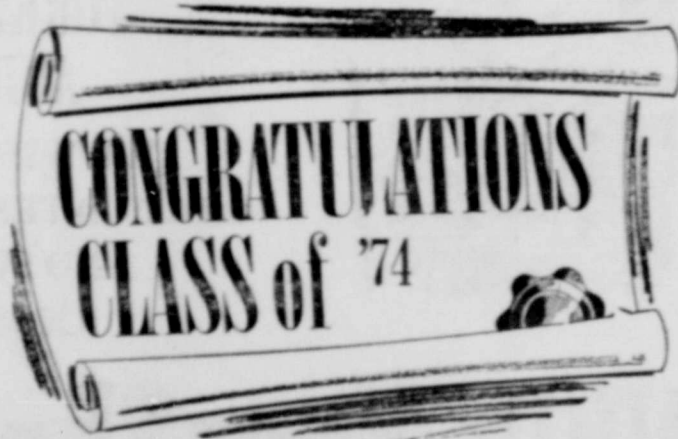
