TROOPS AT MINES ARE WITHDRAWN

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., Nov. 5.—The battalion of Federal troops which had been on duty in the Mingo county coal fields since the strike of the miners, was called almost three months ago, has been withdrawn.

Twenty-five troopers of the West Virginia constabulary arrived here today to take the place of the soldiers, and additional detachment of police are expected here within the next few days.

286 to 149 Will Make Up Republican Congress

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—With the size of Senator Harding's electoral vote virtually settled at 404 out of the possible 531, and the complexion of the new senate fixed at 59 Republicans and 37 Democrats, the Republican leaders today are only awaiting the belated returns from eight contests to fix the exact status of the Republican house majority.

Exclusive of the eight undetermined seats in the lower house, the Republicans had 286 members to the Democrats 137, and four other designations, making the plurality of 149 against the Republicans' majority of 286, the greatest ever held by any party in the house.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The make-up of the next house and senate became practically settled last night as returns drifted in from the so-called doubtful states.

The house will consist of 286 Republicans, 139 Democrats, one independent Prohibitionist from Pennsylvania, and one Socialist from New York. Some of the districts are missing in the tabulation below, and are indicated by the letter (m). The Republicans apparently will have a majority of at least 146 in the house and 22 in the senate. The senate and house will be divided as follows:

TO INVESTIGATE PALMER'S POWER

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 5.—Federal Judge Anderson declared in the United States District Court today, that the investigation to be made next Monday of Attorney General Palmer's connections with the soft coal conspiracy cases would be for the purpose of ascertaining whether "the attorney general can make an agreement to suppress certain portions of the government's evidence in the cases."

NO MORE SPINDLE TOPS IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 5.—"There will never be any more Desdemonas or Spindle Tops in Texas," is the opinion of Dr. G. C. Butte, who has returned to his position in the Law School of the University of Texas after a year's work in the organization of the new Oil and Gas Division of the State Railroad Commission. Dr. Butte deplored the waste of oil in Texas with the supply becoming more limited. Conservation of oil and gas resources of Texas is an important part of the work of the Oil and Gas Division of the Railroad Commission, as organized under the direction of Dr. Butte. Twelve engineers are employed by the Division for observation and reports of conditions at the various oil fields. These engineers have been able in many cases to overcome loss thru salt water flooding or other conditions due to ignorance on the part of oil men, it is stated. Periodic reports from the oil companies, and other methods are also used to increase efficiency. According to Dr. Butte, the state receives from oil an annual revenue of approximately \$400,000,000.

At the request of the State Railroad Commission, the Board of Regents granted last fall a year's leave of absence to Dr. Butte, in order to enable him to do this valuable work.

TEACHER KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

MINERAL WELLS, Tex., Nov. 5.—Miss Lilly Rose Couch, a teacher in the local schools, whose home is in Magnolia, Arkansas, was killed, and Cleve Harrison, a hotel manager, was seriously injured when their automobile overturned two miles West of Weatherford last night.

The wrecked car was found early today, Hanson being unable to extricate himself, and remained penned under the car from the time of the accident until found today. He was unconscious and Miss Couch was dead when discovered by parties traveling along the road.

Mr. Hanson and Miss Couch left here early yesterday evening and went to Weatherford to take part in a local talent play in that city. They were supposed to have been en route back to Mineral Wells when the accident occurred.

COTTON STILL GOING DOWN

Practically five dollars per bale is what cotton suffered Friday, the market closing ninety points down below the previous day's slump of about 40 points.

What was being looked forward to as a better market after the election, has already cost the farmers between ten and fifteen dollars per bale, which is a pretty good drop for a three-day's run. In addition to the sharp decline in prices, the low grade cotton is now coming on the market, and finds a slow sale at prices ranging from 11 to 15 cents. The cotton picked before the storm finds a better sale at prices ranging around 19 and 20 cents.

IS COUNTY CHAIRMAN OF AMERICAN RELIEF

Stuart L. Williams, Secretary of the Young Men's Business League of this city has been appointed county chairman for the American Relief Administration by E. A. Peden, Chairman of the Texas division. Herbert Hoover is the national chairman of this organization, and is appealing to the generosity of the people of the United States to provide sufficient funds for the feeding of 3,500,000 waifs and under-nourished children in Eastern Europe until the next harvest.

Farmers continue to pay \$2.00 per hundred pounds for cotton picking, but if the weather continues as it has been for the past week, but little more cotton will be picked. Some of the farmers express indifference as to whether more of the crop is gathered because of the low prices prevailing.

Wilson Offers Harding Ship for Panama Trip

HARDING OFF FOR TEXAS TRIP

MARION, Nov. 5.—In final preparation for the first real vacation in many months, President Elected Harding today disposed of the last remaining business of the recent campaign, virtually abandoning the headquarters building in which was housed his office and campaign assistants since last July, when the Harding boom for president was launched.

With Mrs. Harding and party of friends, Senator Harding will leave tomorrow for a month's vacation trip which is scheduled to end early in December.

After his vacation, Mr. Harding is expected to take preliminary steps towards a consultation with statesmen for the formulation of America's program toward a world peace association. Whether he will actually assemble such a council before his inauguration, however, is regarded as doubtful.

MUSSEL BEDS OF TEXAS TO BE EXPLOITED SOON

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—Texas mussel, or fresh water clam, beds will be exploited by representatives of pearl factories of Iowa, who have started a survey of the San Saba, Llano and Concho rivers, where they will begin work soon.

Aside from the fact that the shells are worth from \$50 to \$170 per ton, depending upon their size and color, for making buttons and other articles, Texas mussels bear pearls of varying value and the pearl find is a portion of the profits of the enterprise.

The state will receive a royalty of \$1 a ton for all shell gathered and a license of \$10 for each operator will be charged.

Don A. Swett, who has been in the Halley & Love sanitarium since stricken with paralysis some weeks ago, is improving slowly. He has been removed from the sanitarium to the Park Hotel.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—President Wilson today, directed Secretary Daniels to place a battleship at the disposal of President Elected Harding for Mr. Harding's contemplated visit to the Panama Canal Zone. Mr. Wilson also instructed Mr. Daniels to offer for Mr. Harding's use the presidential yacht Mayflower to convey Mr. Harding and other members of his party to Hampton Roads to go aboard the battleship when they are ready to start on the trip to Panama.

T. C. Gardner of Dallas, leader of the Baptist Young People's Union of Texas, will address the young people of Ballinger at the Baptist church Sunday night.

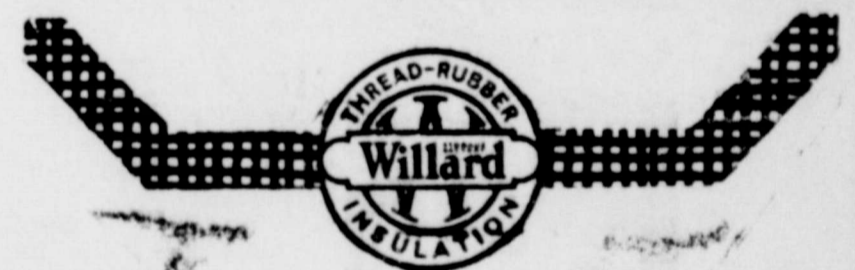

GOMPERS SAYS UNION WINNERS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared today, in his first statement in commenting on the outcome of Tuesday's election, that "every forward looking man and woman must feel some deep regret because of the great plunge toward reaction. But democracy will right itself at the proper time," and the labor leader added, "in the meantime the actual tabulation of the results in congress, the law making body shows a definite and specific gain for all makes of progress and responds to the needs of our time."

Mr. Gompers asserted that every man in the House whose "record of service was perfect, had been re-elected," and he added that the new congress would show an increased number of members holding union cards.

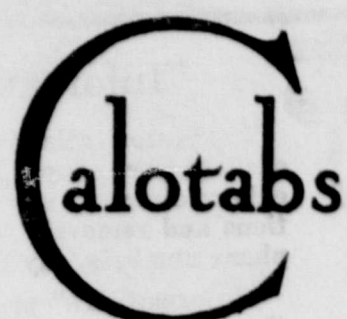
The sale will continue for ten days, during which time everything in the store will be tagged a big cut for cash.

O. R. Routh sold a bale that brought him \$256, exclusive of the seed. Mr. Routh's bale was purchased by F. C. Miller, Mr. Miller paying forty cents around for about forty bales, some of which was 1917 cotton.

The bale sold by Mr. Holloway went to Mike Boyd & Son, for forty cents. The seed from the bale brought \$47.65. Seed are bringing \$75 per ton.—Daily Ledger, Nov. 7, 1919.

Nov. 5, 1920.

C. C. Lollar was here from Marie today with two bales of cotton. Mr. Lollar was offered 11 cents, but declined to sell and stated that he could not afford to pay \$2 per hundred for picking and \$8 per bale for ginning and sell his cotton for \$55 per bale.

The market varied considerably today, buyers offering all the way from 11 cents to 20 cents. The low price cotton has been picked since the rain, but with the exception of trash and stain, is good cotton, having a good staple.

Many farmers are still paying \$2 per hundred for picking, and the cotton picking negro is making more money out of the crop than the man who has worked hard, furnished the labor and the land, the capital, and took all the chances on making a crop.

Ventilation.
Through persistent education the why and wherefore of this great health necessity has been explained; still to the many, air is air, and that is all there is to it.

Ventilation does not simply mean "open wide the windows," but it should be done scientifically, especially in a sick room. To properly ventilate, the air must be kept in motion. The entrance opening for fresh air should be larger than the one for exit. If these openings are directly opposite, the motion will take place without doing the room any good. If there are two windows in the room, one should be opened from the top and the other from the bottom. For the general daytime room the temperature should be 68 degrees and at night 65. A bathroom should be kept at 70. For the sick room of pneumonia patients and several other diseases, of course, the temperature should be kept as low as possible without having the patient in a draught.

Worse Than Modern Drill.

In ancient China a man suffering from toothache proceeded in this wise: He repaired to the Chinese doctor, who was armed with a lot of sharp needles of various sizes and lengths, and his method of treatment was and still is known as acupuncture. This operation consisted of the insertion of these needles into various parts of the body, the choice points of selection being 26 for toothache and six others for inflammation of the gums. The depth to which the needles were inserted is said to have been an important point in the operation. This puncturing was associated with cauterization.

Bees Swifter Than Pigeons.

There is a story to the effect that a farmer in Westphalia laid a wager that 12 bees of his, released at a distance of three miles from their hives, would travel as rapidly as a like number of pigeons over the same course. The first bee, properly powdered for purposes of identification, did, as a matter of fact, arrive at its hive a quarter of a minute before the coming of the first pigeon to its cot; and there were three other bees that came in before the second pigeon arrived.
