COUNCIL VOTES TO PUNISH ITALIANS

Tigers Grab World Series With 4 to 3 Win

GOSLIN'S HIT BRINGS HOME RUN IN NINTH

NAVIN FIELD, Detroit, Oct. 7.—The Detroit Tigers won the baseball championship of the world today—the first in their long history—4 to 3, in the sixth game of the 1935 world series.

Goose Goslin's single in the last half of the ninth inning to score Manager Mickey Cochrane was the deciding blow that turned a 3 to 3 deadlock into a victory for the Bengals.

Following is the play by play account of the game:

First Inning
Cubs—Galan was thrown out from Rogell to Owen. Herman was thrown out at first. Bridges to Owen. Klein fouled out down the first base line to Owen.

Tigers—Clifton was out at first. Hack to Caveretta. Cochrane singled in short left field for the first hit of the game. Gehring singled to right field, advancing Cochrane to second. Goslin popped out to the Cub short stop. Fox singled over the third base line, scoring Cochrane and sending Gehring to third. Fox stopped at second. Walker was walked intentionally to fill the bases. Rogell hit a slow one in front of the plate and French threw in to home, forcing Gehring. Score, Tigers 1, Cubs 0.

Second Inning
Cubs—Hartnett fanned out swinging. Denarre hit a high one to right field that was taken by Pete Fox. Caveretta singled over first base and then went to second on an error by Owen. Hack grounded out, Gehring to Owen. Caveretta was retired at second.

Tigers—Owen struck out swinging. Bridges was thrown out. Herman to Caveretta. Clifton struck out swinging. Score, Tigers 1, Cubs 0.

Supreme Court In New Building For New Deal Session

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—In the modified Grecian glamor of its new \$11,000,000 white marble home, the supreme court met today for its 1935-36 term, to sit in solemn judgment on the New Deal.

Notables of the bar crowded the courtroom. The 60 seats reserved for lawyers and 283 open were filled long before noon. The session today was a mere formality. The first decision will be handed down next week.

Most of the attending lawyers were in morning attire, cutaways and striped trousers, the customary dress for attorneys visiting the court, which was once obligatory.

DRYS VICTORS OVER WETS ON SMALL'S BILL

AUSTIN, Oct. 7.—Drys in the Texas house today won a preliminary victory over the liberal wets by ordering Senator Clint Small's bone-dry bill defining an "open saloon" returned to the house.

Given 30 minutes to report the bill, the committee returned with a favorable 8 to 4 recommendation that it pass. Thursday night the committee had refused to report the measure by a 10 to 8 vote. The senate already has adopted the definition. The bill prohibits sale in broken packages and consumption on the premises.

Advocates of the favored Bradbury plan of liquor control today criticised house members who failed to appear at Saturday's session.

"I move to put in the journal that those absent and making excuses be shown as making these excuses to perfect their political platforms," said Representative Lon Alsop, Carthage. He condemned what he termed "this frameup Saturday to break a quorum." The house was forced to adjourn when too few were present for business.

House Votes Salary Cuts Be Restored

AUSTIN, Oct. 7.—A bill restoring pay cuts for district attorneys serving more than one county was passed by the house today.

During the regular session members voted to limit salaries to \$3,000 a year, effective in 1936. The action today would allow up to \$3,600 for those serving more than one county.

WACO, Oct. 7.—Because they smoked cigarettes, three young women students who were working part time to pay their way through school, have been dismissed from their jobs.

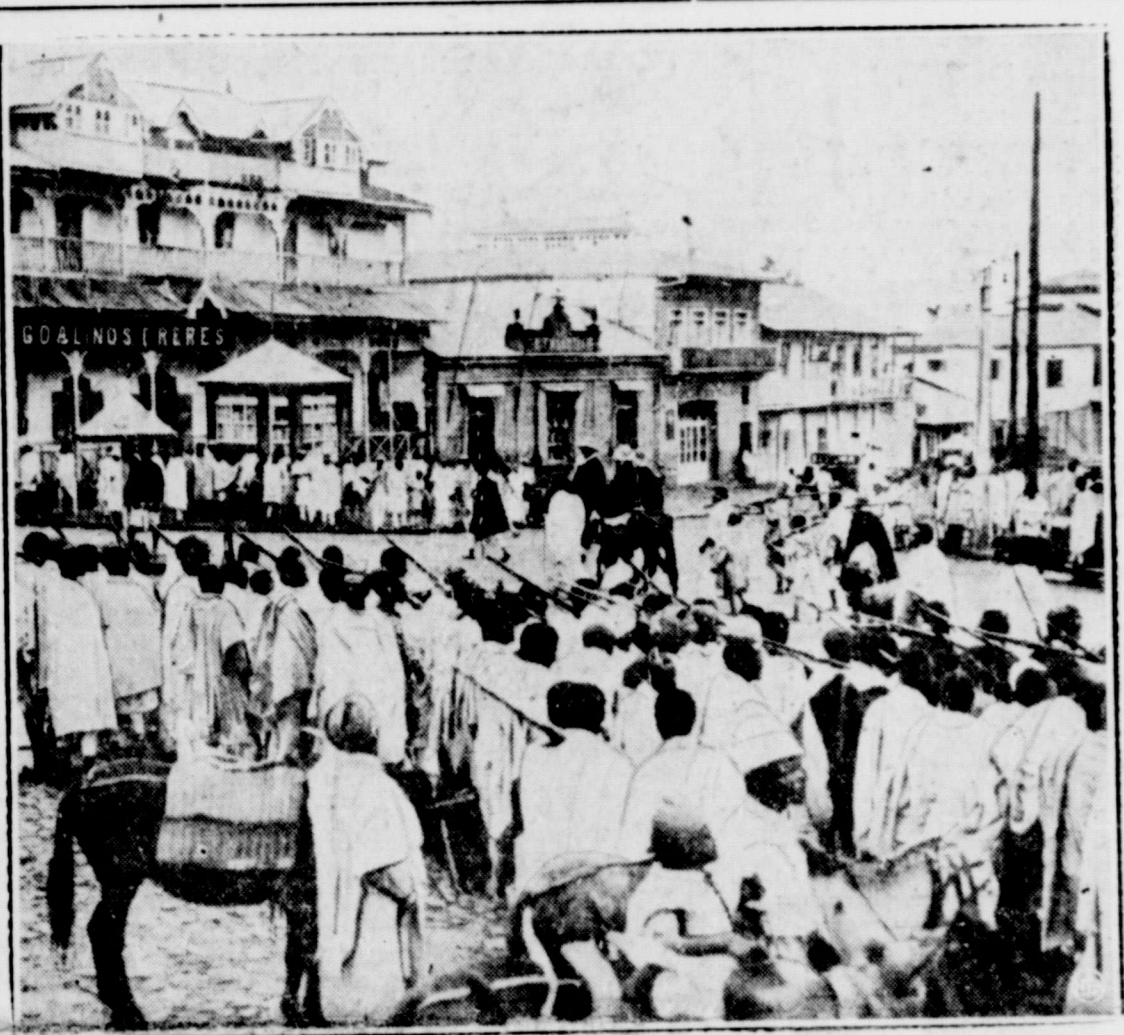
Although their jobs were taken away from them, they were not suspended from school.

Engine Trouble Given As Cause of Wreck Near Airport

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 7.—Apparently suddenly disabled by motor trouble, a United Airlines transport plane crashed in the hilly country west of here today, carrying its crew of three and nine passengers to instant death.

Almost within view of the Cheyenne airport base of the company where it was to land, the plane was reported by its pilot, H. A. Collison, to be cruising easily through the calm, clear night at 2:17 a. m. in a radio message received here. The big Boeing plane was coming in from Salt Lake City and the west.

Simultaneously another plane approached from the east airport for a landing.

"Please delay landing until further orders while westbound planes comes in," the airport dispatcher radioed Collison after the pilot had reported he was within sight.

INVASION IS IN VIOLATION OF COVENANT

Latest war developments: Addis Ababa, Oct. 7.—Haile Selassie, scoffing at Italian gains, said Ethiopia hasn't begun to fight yet, intimating Italians will encounter serious opposition.

Aduwa—Italian troops began a slow flow into captured regions to mass for a sweeping drive south.

Harar—150,000 Ethiopians concentrating on Jijiga to defend the railway to the capital. Italians start bombing in southern Ogaden.

Djibouti—Italian planes start bombing operations in Mount Mussa Ali region bordering French Somaliland.

Rome—Italy rejoices over fall of Aduwa—"avenging 1896."

London—Mussolini may fly to Aduwa, London newspaper reports.

GENEVA, Oct. 7.—The 13 members of the League of Nations council, Italy excluded, unanimously bound themselves under the League covenant today to press economic and financial sanctions (penalties) against Italy.

Setting the example to the 47 nations of the assembly which meet Wednesday to vote on the same measure, the council agreed that in invading Ethiopia "the Italian government has resorted in disregard to its covenant under Article 12 of the covenant of the League of Nations."

Article 12 provides that League members must submit disputes to arbitration and "in no case resort to war" within three months after a decision has been returned. It automatically leads to Article 16, which provides that any member resorting to war in violation of Article 12 "shall in itself be deemed to have committed an act of war against all other members of the League who hereby undertake to subject it to the severance of all trade or financial relations."

BRITISH AMBASSADOR PROTESTS BOMBING

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Sir Sidney Barton, British minister to Ethiopia, telegraphed from Addis Ababa today, asking the foreign office to make representations to the Italian government against the bombing of Addis Ababa and Dire Dawa on the grounds that both are unfortified and contain many foreigners, including women and children.

U. S. CITIZENS WARNED OF FOREIGN TRAVEL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—President Roosevelt today warned American citizens that if they traveled on Italian ships they did so at their own risk.

Rangers Begin Work Under New Comm'n

DALLAS, Oct. 7.—Texas rangers, famed as law enforcers for 100 years, began operating today as an agency to war on crime under the direction of the Texas public safety commission.

Albert Johnson, chairman of the commission, announced the assignment of officers and men to five districts, created by the commission at a meeting yesterday in Austin.

Captain Fred Daniel will command the northwest district, west of Tarrant county and north of the Texas and Pacific railroad. Headquarters will be in Wichita Falls. Tom Hickman will be in the central district.

School Tax Honor Roll

The Cisco school board Sunday announced an "honor roll" of property owners who have already paid their school taxes for the coming year. The list will be added to from time to time as others pay their school taxes for the year.

The taxes, which were due on October 1 and which become delinquent on February 1, were paid, by several persons owning property, before the actual date set.

The list of those who have paid was termed an honor roll because those on it have aided the school and its teaching force materially by an early payment.

School teachers generally have about the hardest time in collecting what they are actually worth in dollars and cents of any group of people in the nation. This, perhaps, is because they have a little less of the money-grabbing tendency than the rest of us. They turn their eyes to other forms of remuneration—service to humanity, respect in the eyes of their fellow citizens, joy in their work—more than the rest of us, and this takes the place of large salary checks, to a great extent. Most teachers have invested a great deal in their profession. They have made an investment in brains, just as the average business man has made an investment in his business. Their pay comes not so much in cash as in achievement—which is really the achievement of their pupils.

But there is a certain amount of pay that must be in good, hard cash. This is the part which the early taxpayers have made possible. Of late years the average American school teacher has been in a precarious position in regard to this pay. Maybe he gets it and maybe he does not. Cisco has been in a much better position in this respect than many of the nearby cities. It has been able to pay the teachers, although their pay necessarily has been cut and in some instances they have not been paid on the date that their salary was due.

The early payment of local taxes has enabled pay checks to be issued. If the average person's salary check is a day or so late he sets up a howl. If the teachers' check is late he goes ahead with his lesson plans, keeps wearing last winter's suit, and hopes some thoughtful souls will come forward soon with their tax payment.

The Daily News will continue to publish the names of those thoughtful persons who make up the school tax honor roll, just as it published yesterday the names of the first group.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON—More pressure than ever before will be thrown into the convention of the American Federation of Labor at Atlantic City, starting Oct. 7, looking to formation of a distinctive labor party. Certain of the more radical A. F. of L. affiliates have always wanted this, but the pressure is growing.

Representative Ernest Lundeen, House Farmer-Laborite, says the following unions are favorable to a new party and are ready to abandon the traditional A. F. of L. practice of supporting friends and defeating enemies within the old parties:

Amalgamated Clothing Workers, Bakery and Confectionery Workers, Brewery Workers, Cloth Hat and Cap Makers, Fur Workers, Hotel and Restaurant Workers, Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, Jewelry Workers, Ladies' Garment Workers, Lithographers, Pulp, Sulphite, and Paper Mill Workers, Patternmakers, Quarry Workers, Railway Clerks, Journeymen Tailors, Teachers, Textile Workers, Amalgamated Food Workers, and Railroad Trainmen.

Even admitting that in some of these cases Lundeen's wish may have been at least stepfather to the thought, and that many members of all these unions may be less enthusiastic to the idea than Lundeen, enough of them will have a voice in A. F. of L. proceedings to make it plain that there will be plenty of labor party speeches at the convention.

THERE will also be spirited rows over new international unions such as have just been formed in automobiles and rub-

ber. One that you haven't heard much about as yet is in the radio industry, where a youthful and peppery organizer, only about 26 years old, James B. Carey, has organized 10,000 radio workers into the National Radio and Allied Trades in Philadelphia, Buffalo, Cincinnati, Chicago, Terre Haute, Springfield, Mass., and New York City.

Carey is going to bat for an international charter for radio workers, but has up to now been opposed by the Electrical Workers and Machinists, who claim jurisdiction. Carey has promoted perhaps the most successful of the A. F. of L.'s federal unions, and will be hard to stop.

Why the A. F. of L. tends to go slow with these new internationals is shown by the rubber workers, who refused to elect the federation's organizer, Coleman Claherty, as their president, picking their own local man, S. H. Dalrymple.

YOU haven't heard the last of the death of the 300 war veterans in the Florida hurricane. The most will be made of it in the coming campaign for the bonus when Congress reconvenes, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Communists are already making the most of it. The fact that both are drumming at it may make it necessary to find some official goat to sacrifice, after all.

SPEAKING of World War veterans, there are only 4,178,887 of them left, according to Veterans' Bureau figures for July 1 of this year. Since 4,764,071 were inducted into service in 1917-18, that means that more than a half million have died since that time. (Copyright, 1935 NEA Service, Inc.)

last eight months, an invasion of Ethiopia. At Aduwa, though, the Italians massed and massacred the Italians in the most humiliating defeat they had ever suffered.

The Italians have been living since then for an opportunity to avenge that defeat. Whether they win another battle and annex Ethiopia or whether they are willing to call a halt now and make peace with the world, they will have achieved one of their great aims, capturing Aduwa—although they gained little materially—while giving Mussolini the prestige he needed.

"What Will Germany Do?"

"What will Germany do?" appears to be the question which most of the thinkers of the Ethiopian crisis are asking these days.

Herr Hitler, Der Fuehrer of the Nazis and Chancellor of the Third Reich, has been the bad boy of Europe until his place was suddenly taken over by Benito Mussolini of Italy with his campaign to conquer unconquered Ethiopia. Now, however, little is being heard from the Rhineland.

What Germany appears to be doing is waiting for developments in the African crisis—and possibly European war. The Reich is playing a silent hand, letting France, Britain, and Italy battle it out with words, while the German leader sits back and waits for the proper moment to accept somebody's bid for German support.

Germany will be in a key spot to aid either side. France fears the Reich has hesitated to join Great Britain until as of support on its northern borders in case of invasion. At the same time Italy would not like to see Germany annex Austria and come marching down into the northern part of the Great Boot.

AUSTRIAN LOT SEEN AS TIED WITH ETHIOPIA

By GEORGE I. MARANZ
United Press Staff Correspondent
VIENNA, Oct. 7 — "Austria's lot will be decided in Ethiopia," has become the new motto of Austrian Socialists and Nazis.

The conflict between Italy and Ethiopia has raised anew the expectations of both.

Each tried to overturn the government by force, but without success.

When the Socialists revolted against the government in February, 1934, they were convinced that all members of the party would take arms. But only the "Schutzbund," the Socialists' military organization, obeyed the party's call to arms, and against the combined forces of the regular army, the police and the Heimwehr they had no chance.

Nazis Blunder Also
The Austrian Nazis, who started their revolution in July, 1934, had had occasion to learn from the Socialists' blunders, but had profited little therefrom.

After the suppression of the two revolts, once again reigned in Austria, Socialists and Nazis needed months to reorganize. Both came to the conclusion that their predicament could be bettered only by world-shaking changes.

Now both hope that Haile Selassie will fight indirectly for their interest in Austria.

Both hope and believe the Negus will defeat the Italian army, but each draws a different conclusion from this defeat.

See Fascism's End
The Socialists prophesy the outbreak of a revolution in Italy when Benito Mussolini's army returns home. The disaster of Italian Fascism will, in their opinion, upset the equilibrium of Europe and start a series of revolutions which will destroy not only the Austrian government but capitalist society throughout the world.

Only Hitler-Germany, according to the Nazis, and Soviet Russia, according to the Socialists, will emerge from the chaos with enhanced power.

In this readjustment Austria, they both hope and believe, will constitute only one bit for their respective social revolutionary crusades.

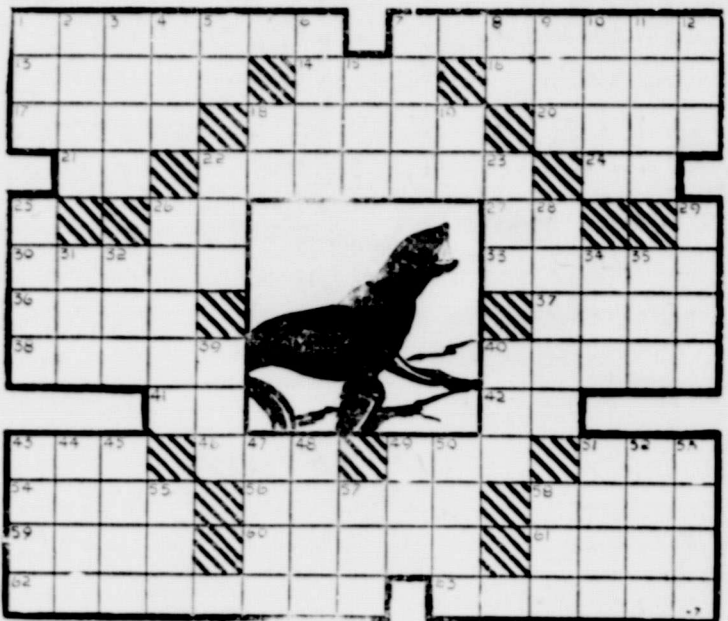

Heavy Ethiop Coins Bother Foreigners

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 4 — The newcomer forced to lug in his pockets a handful of two of Maria Theresa thalers is apt to drag weary feet after the first two steps and start wondering whether the Ethiopians were wise to give up salt bar and cartridge currency.

A cartridge may be fired off in an emergency. Of course, then, it loses its value, but it also loses weight. A salt bar may get wet, with similar results. A Maria Theresa thaler remains under all conditions one of the best examples of sheer weight ever invented by man.

Actually, salt, bullets and even livestock still are used as money in some parts of the interior. But Addis Ababa and most large towns are

under the complete domination of the buxom lady from Vienna.

Larger Than U. S. Dollar

The Theresa thalers are awesome things, somewhat larger than the American silver dollar. On one side is the profile of the Empress, stern and placid; on the other is the imperial double eagle and the date, 1780.

There are notes of 100, 50, 10, 5 and 3 thalers, but the amount in circulation is relatively small, and most business is in the cartwheels. Skinny Armenians with gazelle eyes, drooping mustaches and black skull caps cart the week's take to the bank, sometimes dozens of bags, dump them onto the counter and count them into special boxes each holding 500. Then the bank counts them all over and they are lugged off for deposit.

Pay clerks emerge from the

bank with two or three boys following, bowed under the weight of the week's payroll. Foreign correspondents move heavily around like so many Frankenstein's monsters, a dull clink coming from their trouser pockets.

There are also Menelik thalers, roughly the same size, but less frequent. There are half thalers, quarter thalers, dimes and piastres, the latter coming to 16 to a thaler, for some reason or other.

"Well," said Hagan, "I suppose he's all right to work for."

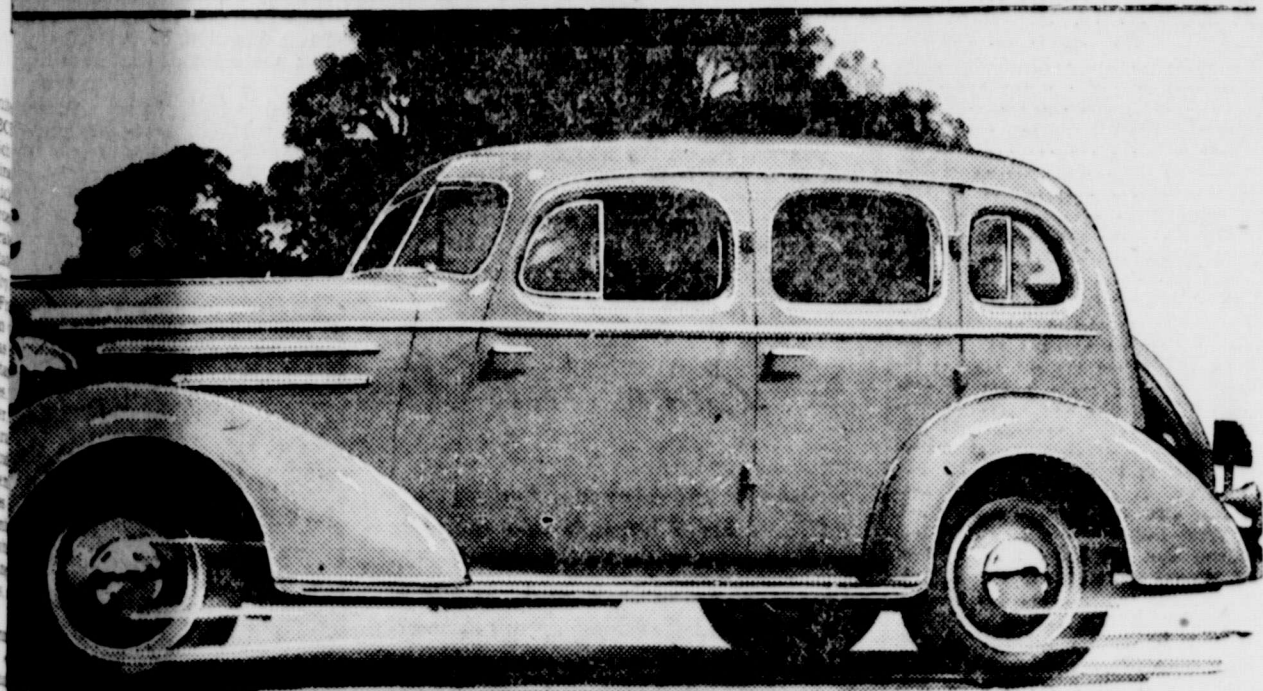

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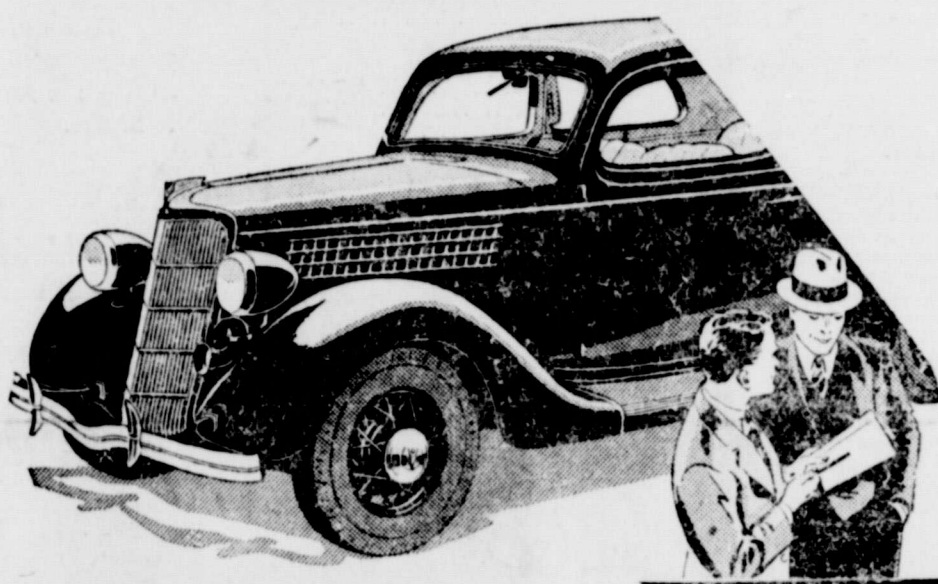

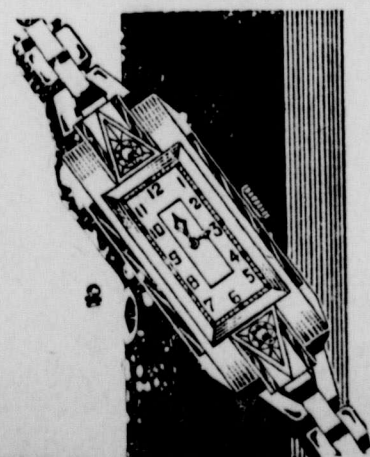
