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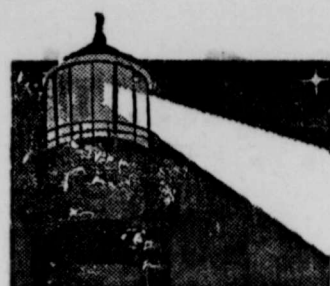
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On The BEAM

Orbie Ray Linder In Navy Hospital

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Linder and family were saddened by the news received Sunday concerning their son, Orbie Ray, who is serving his third year in the U. S. Navy.

Chaplain Porter of the USN hospital at Bremerton, Washington, wrote a letter to the parents disclosing the diagnosis of specialists and doctors after a rigid examination that the condition of Orbie Ray was such that X-ray treatments daily was to be given for three weeks followed by amputation of his left limb at the hip joint.

Orbie Ray arrived at the hospital from Adak, Alaska, July 15, and shortly after called his parents to inform them he was flown to the States for treatment of his leg. Parents recalled that when he was home in April he casually mentioned that he had noticed a small knot on his leg and that it bothered him some when he lifted a heavy weight or was tired. After his leave he was sent to Adak and the trouble gradually increased and when he went to the base hospital there on July 13, they immediately sent him to the Bremerton hospital.

The Chaplain's letter continued by telling of the unusual courage and cheerfulness of Orbie Ray under such circumstances.

After the letter had disclosed the circumstances to the parents they received a call from Orbie Ray Sunday afternoon. He seemed very cheerful and said that after being among so many that were in much worse condition he felt he was well off just losing a limb and he felt they would have him walking again with an artificial limb in a short time. He commended very highly the treatment and consideration of the doctors and specialists there.

It was Orbie Ray's wish that his parents not make the long trip to Washington, but save the trip to go to Oakland, California, where the operation will be performed, unless, as they hope, a miracle can happen to prevent the loss of the limb. All friends in Loraine join the parents and Orbie Ray in this wish.

Generous Rains Fall In Parts of Territory

Showers have dotted this area almost every day for the past two weeks, leaving light rains in some places, heavy rains in others and still other places with practically no rain.

This immediate territory has been visited by some heavy rain both north and south of town. North of town last Thursday afternoon one of the heaviest rains for quite some time came on the area north of town leaving a smuch as three and a half inches in some places and lighter amounts in others. In some areas hail did some damage to cotton. The little creek north of town overflowed its banks for the first time in about two or three years. Some reported the water at a higher level than they had seen it in a long time.

Sunday afternoon the area south and southeast of town received good showers ranging from .10 here in town to three inches. The shower covered a wide area, filling in some places where rains had been light before.

Practically every part of our territory has now received good rains, though some spots still need more to bring them up to par.

Cotton is growing rapidly since the rains and some say it is fruiting up well. With more rain within a few weeks a fair crop should be produced here. Showers fell both north and south of town again Tuesday.

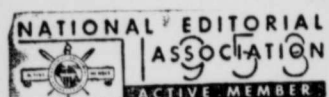

Cattle Prospects

Texas farmers and ranchmen, surveying their parched, brown earth and gaunt cattle, can very easily get a distorted picture of future prospects. The situation is bad—but not hopeless.

Cattle owners must carefully consider their long-range plans. If you rush stock to the market which could be held, you may be cutting your income unnecessarily.

A larger part of our cattle

back-log has been wiped out through quick marketing than many persons realize. Over three and a half million more cattle and calves were slaughtered during the first six months of 1953 than at the same time last year. In many cases, even the foundation herds of cattlemen have been cut drastically or eliminated entirely.

There is always the danger of going to far. Although the extremely favorable prices of the last few years may not return

soon, measures are being put into effect which should add some strength to the market and encourage conservation of our foundation herds.

Some relief is on the way in the form of drought hay purchases, reduced railroad fares for transportation of necessary fodder, and loans. Cottonseed pellets and meal is expected to sell to needy stock farmers at emergency prices of \$35 a ton, corn at \$1 a bushel, wheat at \$1.10 and oats at 50 cents.

In addition, all efforts are towards quick and effective sale of beef through consumer advertising campaigns, government purchases and foreign exports. It seems likely that supplies of beef will continue high the next few years but that there will be very little increase in herd sizes. The long range effect is expected

to help stabilize the market. The stocker's chief problem will be in determining what part of his herd to sell and what to keep for continued production. Growers in the hard-hit areas should try to hold on to as many cattle as it is economically feasible to feed. Those with good pastures, principally in East Texas, may find this a good time to buy a few more head, depending on the size and condition of their range.

Farm and ranch people have demonstrated their mettle in asking only for the type of aid and relief which they could eventually pay back. With this kind of determination behind it, our cattle market will regain its solid footing.

Questions and Answers

Q. I have a National Service Life Insurance term policy, and I've decided to leave my dividend money with the VA to pay premiums that I happen to miss. What will VA do if my term insurance expires and I don't take action to renew and pay the premium myself?

A. At the end of the term period, VA will pay the premium required for renewing your term policy out of your dividend credit—unless you write to VA and request otherwise before the present term expires.

Q. I plan to take my medical interne training under the Korean GI Bill. Will I be paid GI allowance as an on-the-job trainee, or will I get the higher rates paid to full-time classroom students?

A. You will receive the rates paid to those taking full-time classroom training. However, your medical internship course must be accredited and approved by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association. Its length also must be approved by the Council. No allowances at all may be paid to veterans in non-approved internships.

Q. A few years ago I received an automobile under VA's program of providing up to \$1,600 toward the cost of a car for certain disabled veterans. My car is beginning to show signs of wear, and I wonder if I could get another VA grant to buy a new car.

A. Under the law, you are not entitled to another grant to buy a new car.

Q. I want to express my thanks to everyone who remembered me by cards, visits, flowers and other expressions of kindness shown me during the time I was hospitalized after breaking my arm. The doctors and hospital staff were wonderful and I thank you, Mrs. J. R. Wheeler.

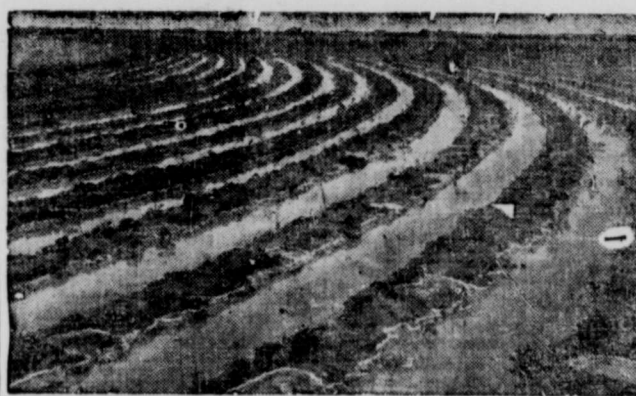

Some Misunderstandings About Pasture Rests or Deferments

There are many opinions expressed and practices followed about when pastures should be rested. It is a common practice to rest the poorest pasture first. Actually it is better to rest the best pasture first. This better pasture will respond sooner and will show a greater increase in forage production. The best pasture in top condition can carry a heavy load during the long periods of rest needed on the poor pastures.

Often a pasture is rested except for a few livestock. They are left in the deferred pasture because it makes a handy place to keep some horses, heifers, rams, or sick cows. This practice has two effects: first, the parts of the pasture that need the most do not get it; and second, just a few head will keep areas near water and along draws grazed down. Another bad effect of this practice is that the very best grasses, the kinds that need rest the most, will be kept grazed down about as much with five head as with fifty. Survivors of good grasses often are scattered over the pasture but if they were all put in one place they would not cover more than an acre or two in a section. Two or three head of livestock in a poor pasture make the rounds often enough to keep these most palatable grasses from increasing.

Tame pastures can be rotated at set intervals of 2 to 3 month intervals with good results. On ranges the periods of deferment must be aimed at increasing the amount of certain kinds of grasses. This means that the pasture must be rested during the months that certain key grasses make their growth and mature seeds, or during the months that they store food in their roots and rootstocks. The season of rest must be based on the needs of certain grasses rather than on a certain number of months. As an example of this it can be noted that deferment of bluestem range for 5 months from April to September had little benefit in improving range condition because the livestock ate the seed heads from the grass before the seeds were mature. It is true the grasses were strengthened during this rest but no new seedlings were developed. A deferment from June to frost on this bluestem range would have met the needs of this grass and paved the way for new seedlings and an improved range condition. Pastures with different key grasses require different seasons of rest for improvement.

Another common misunderstanding about rests is that they should show immediate benefits in greater livestock gains. Actually they seldom do on range land. The benefits in gains per acre usually show up after the better kinds of plants on the range have increased. The increase in good plants on the range does not happen in the first year. The role of plant succession takes place wherein the better grasses must first produce seed. Then their seedlings must become established and crowd out the weeds.

On very poor pastures with crusted soil a rest may provide a mulch of weeds to let more rain enter the soil. In such cases many of the same kinds of weeds grow much better and may result in better livestock gains the next year.

Experiments with year-round cow herds and long deferments have shown good results. A common and excellent practice with cow-herds is to give one pasture a complete rest through the growing season until hard frosts. Then this deferred pasture can provide an ample supply of roughage for winter. Such roughage is usually low in protein and phosphorus. Cottonseed cake or a similar concentrate will have to be provided during the winter, but this is usually needed anyway. The rancher with plenty of roughage on the winter pasture won't find it necessary to have to buy and haul hay to his cattle because he will have it on the ground for them.

But food is for full-grown men, even those who by reason of time have their senses exercised to discern good and evil. (Heb. 5:11-13.)

Eph. 4:11, 14. "And he gave some to be apostles; and some prophets; and some evangelists; and some pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, unto the work of ministering, unto the building up of the body of Christ; till we all attain unto the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a fullgrown man unto the fullness of the stature of the fullness of Christ."

MISTAKE: We cannot divide the congregation into classes for the purpose of teaching the Bible.

CORRECTION: "Now I beseech you, brethren, through the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same things, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfected together in the same mind and the same judgement." (1 Cor. 1:10, 11). This command that there be no divisions had reference to teaching of the word of God in harmonious agreement and had no reference to the manner of the teaching.

MISTAKE: In congregational teaching the preacher or teacher can spread a meal of both milk and meat and all may feast upon these according to their needs.

CORRECTION: Paul said he did not do his teaching in such a haphazard manner. "And I brethren, could not speak unto you as unto spiritual, but as unto carnal, as unto babes in Christ. I fed you with milk and not with meat; for ye were not yet able to bear it." (1 Cor. 3:1, 2). According to the inspired apostle Paul, we are not to set meat before babes in Christ, for they cannot bear it.

MISTAKE: It is all right to teach a class in a Christian home, but not in the meeting house of the church.

CORRECTION: The Temple of Herod, in Jerusalem was the place of meeting of the first church of Christ in Jerusalem. And all the apostles of Jesus both preached and taught daily in the temple, a building of vast dimensions. It is not the numbers that one teaches, but the truth of God's eternal word which pleases God. "If any speaketh speaking as it were the oracles of God. (Peter) Jesus taught individuals both men and women as well as the multitudes upon the mountains, by the seaside and in the deserts and in the houses of his friends.
