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Water production on tap for Thursday at desalination plant

Board of Economic Development Director Sue Young said last week that she expects the desalination plant to produce water on Thursday this week, weather permitting.

Crews from Alpha Water Systems Inc. have been loading membranes into tubes in an effort to be ready to produce desalinated water. The miles of membranes are what "cleans" and desalinates the water.

With the membranes installed, the plant is prepared to make water. Part of Thursday's work will include taking lots of samples to be sent to the lab. After testing is performed, Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) will receive the results and have the opportunity to sign off on the water quality.

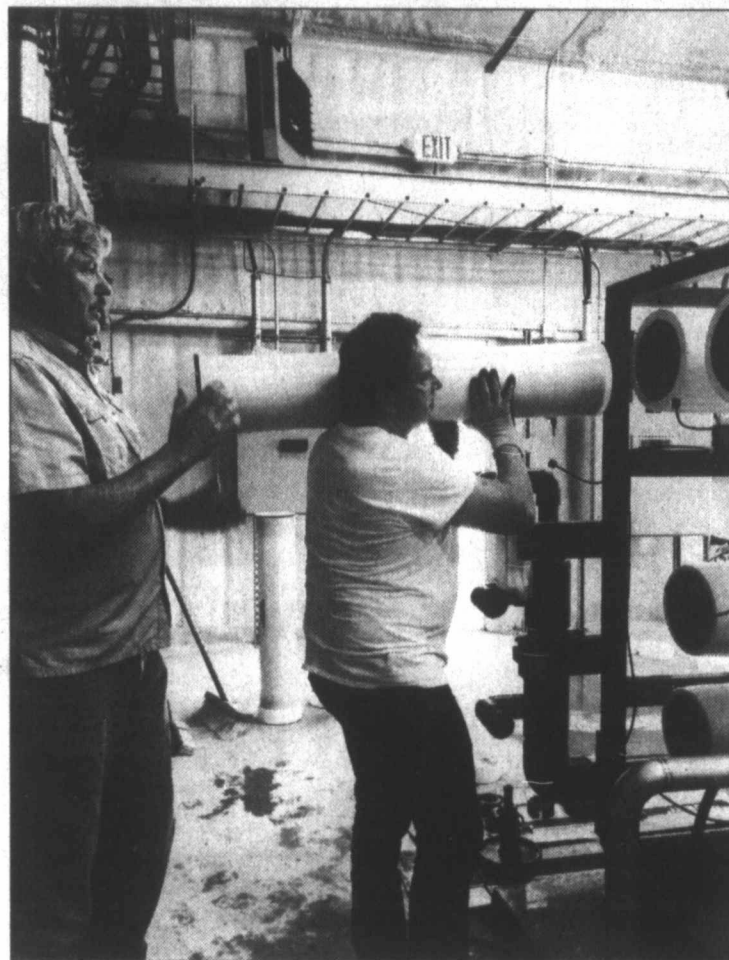
Young said board members will be drinking water Thursday, but none will go into the public water system until all tests are back and the turbine is operational.

When the water is put into a public system, it will go into the Corix lines.

Mitchell County Utility contracted with the county to purchase the desalinated water, and that contract was assumed by Corix Utilities when the company bought Mitchell County Utility.

There's still a punch list of detail items to be completed, but Young said the big push this week is to get the water going through the membranes and get the samples taken and on their way to the lab and, ultimately, to TCEQ.

Young said she has received a schedule of work from General Dynamics who will be making some repairs to the turbine. She also said the turbine is functional now, but the company will be changing out some screws and performing a re-grout. She expects those repairs to continue through January.

C-Court consults with attorney during closed session Monday

Mitchell County Commissioners' Court convened Monday morning for a short open meeting but longer closed session to consult with County Attorney Sterling Burleson.

Payroll in the amount of \$121,961 was approved as presented by County Treasurer Jennifer Rivera.

Court members agreed to table the consideration of the renewal of a Certificate of Deposit at FirstBank & Trust until Monday, December 11th. County Judge Ray Mayo said the court

has 10 days to make the decision, so the subject will be decided at the next meeting.

The court convened in closed session for about 40 minutes, and no action was taken once the open meeting was resumed.

No new filings made in upcoming election

There were no new filings this week for the March 6th Primary Election. The filing period continues through December 11th.

Carla Kern was the first to announce her intention to run for County Clerk. So far, Kern is the only candidate to file for the seat. Current County Clerk Debby Carlock has announced that she will not be seeking re-election to the position.

Shortly after the filing period began, three candidates stepped forward to seek election to the position of County Commissioner Pct. 4. Incumbent Bill Preston has filed to run for re-election on the Democratic ticket, and he will face Republican challengers Brodie Harris and Ricky Bailey. Many have speculated that there

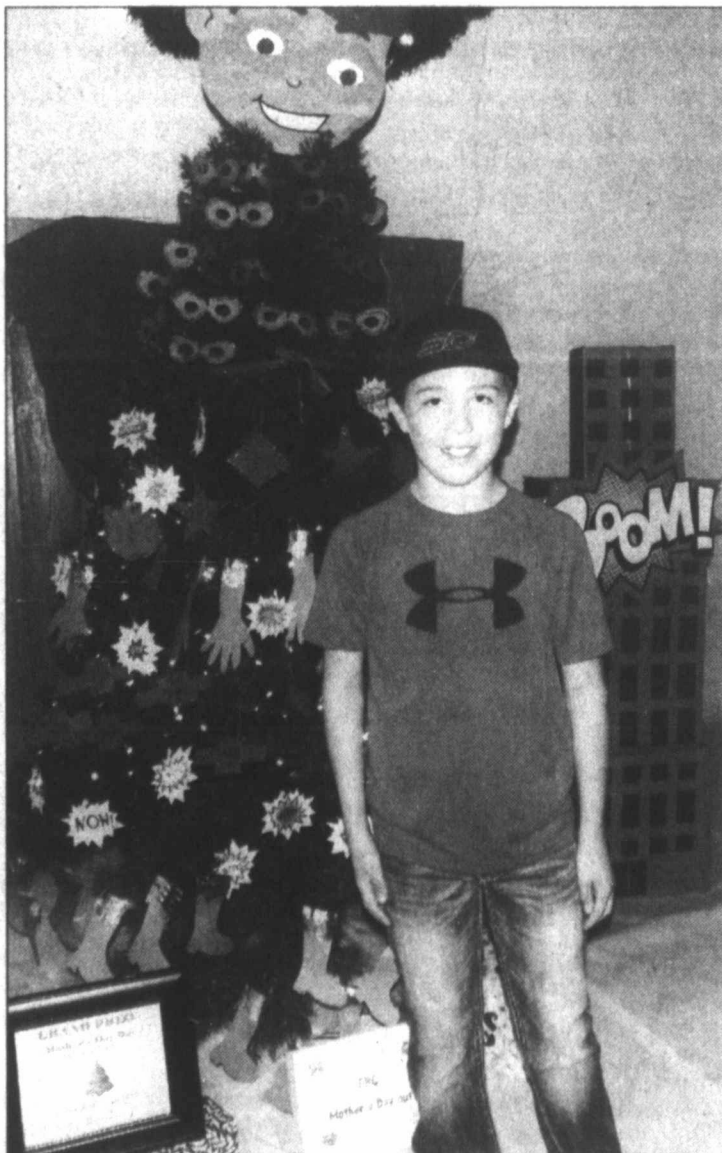
will, most likely, be a run-off election in May to determine the Republican candidate.

Incumbent Jeremy Strain has filed for re-election to the post of County Commissioner Pct. 2, and he is the only person to throw his hat into the ring so far.

Justice of the Peace Pct. 1, 4 Rick Grissam has filed to run for re-election to his current seat, and he will face Normalinda Perez. As of press time, incumbent James Williams is the only candidate to file for the position of Justice of the Peace Pct. 2, 3.

Mark Merrell has filed to run for County Judge as a Republican candidate, and incumbent Belinda Blassingame has filed to run for another term as District

Arrests made in module fire

Arrests have been made in an arson investigation into what caused modules on the Producers' Co-Op Gin yard to catch fire. Three male juveniles have been arrested and turned over to the juvenile probation office for setting fire to the cotton.

CCPD Chief Charles Rice said three Colorado Middle School boys were arrested last week after it was determined that they started the fire that resulted in the loss of 22 modules and 16 round bales of cotton. The chief said the three boys were playing on the gin yard and jumping on the modules before the fire started.

According to Rice, the boys had a lighter and flicked a few sparks that ignited the blaze. They all ran away after they realized the cotton was on fire. Rice said he didn't think the ramifications of their actions occurred to the juveniles.

"They just made a bad mistake," he said.

A bad mistake, indeed. Gin Manager Ray Ritchey said the fire destroyed about \$130,000 in cotton.

Because the boys are so young, all further punishment will go through the juvenile justice system.

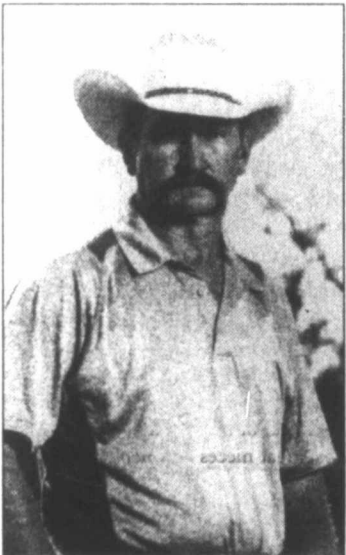

Scott is recognized by Angelo State University

Dr. Cody Scott, son of Susan and Larry Farr and David Scott, was recognized by Angelo State University as a distinguished member of the ASU staff recently. He has been selected for the 2017 Distinguished Faculty Achievement Award.

A recent article from the ASU Ram featured Scott. The following is from that article.

Dr. Cody Scott knows ASU's Management, Instruction and Research (MIR) Center like the back of his hand.

Through teaching range and wildlife courses, mentoring student research projects and conducting his own grant-funded research, Scott has investigated and managed virtually every outdoor aspect of the 6,000-acre MIR Center, commonly called the ASU Ranch. All of his efforts are geared toward providing students the knowledge and skills needed for productive careers after graduation.

"When I first came to ASU, probably 60 percent of our ag

students had a farm and ranch background," Scott said. "That is not the case anymore, as probably at least that many students don't have that background. So, having the ASU Ranch where students can gain real-world experience really separates our graduates from those at other institutions."

"The fact that we can mesh classroom teaching and hands-on research activities together," he added, "that really makes the graduates of our programs unique."

As a result of Scott's approach to teaching and research, 68 former students are now employed by the Natural Resource Conservation Service. His own research has resulted in numerous publications and presentations at scientific meetings, and he recently completed a term as president of the Texas Section Society for Range Management. He also manages public deer hunts at the ASU Ranch that generate revenue for ranch improvements.

Recognizing his dedication to his students, outstanding service at the ASU Ranch and research contributions to agricultural science, the ASU Alumni Association has selected Scott for the 2017 Distinguished Faculty Achievement Award.

"My interpretation of the award is that it is not focused on just the research or just the teaching," Scott said. "It's focused on your collective effort, and that's a great feeling. To get this award for accomplishments during my career at ASU, it's a great honor."

Scott is a 1986 graduate of Colorado High School.

"That is absolutely true. But it is a common misconception. And when people ask me 'where do you surf in Texas' they follow up with the comment 'there's no surf in Texas.'"

He says surfing in Texas is seasonal.

"You go to the beach in the summer, right? You don't surf then. Surfing in Texas is from September to the end of May. During the summer months there is no surf in Texas. The Gulf of Mexico is flat and great for fishing, but the only time there's any surf is when it storms. There was even a movie made about 10 years ago and the title was There Ain't No Surf In Texas and it plainly shows that there's plenty."

Ellis estimates there are about 200,000 surfers in Texas.

"It kinda depends on how you define a surfer. It could be someone who has a surfboard in his garage or someone who surfs on a surfboard every week. You're not going to see that many people in the water with surfboards in Texas. However during a storm that's another story. Now we don't surf during the hurricane. We surf when the hurricane is 200 miles away and the waves are coming up here. They're very good when they travel that far."

He knows the best surfing spots along the Texas coast.

"You start at High Island and go south. The more south you go the better it gets. By the time you get to the coastal bend it's great and it's also great on South Padre Island. If you go into Mexico by the time you get to Vera Cruz there's beautiful blue water and the waves are huge down there. When northerners blow through Texas and blow the surf flat, five days later there's fantastic, beautiful surfing in Vera Cruz, Mexico. I surf every chance I get."

Ellis has worked for years to prevent erosion on Texas beaches.

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Diet success may depend on DNA

Research in animal models with different genetics shows that one diet really doesn't fit all, and what works for some may not be best for others, according to a Texas A&M study recently published in the journal *Genetics*.

"Dietary advice, whether it comes from the United States government or some other organization, tends to be based on the theory that there is going to be one diet that will help everyone," said David Threadgill, PhD, with the Texas A&M College of Medicine and College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, senior author of the study. "In the face of the obesity epidemic, it seems like guidelines haven't been effective."

Threadgill thinks he knows why. The researchers used four different groups of animal models to look at how five diets affect health over a six-month period. The genetic differences within each group were almost non-existent, while the genetics between any two of the groups would translate to roughly the same as those of two unrelated people. The researchers chose the test diets to mirror those eaten by humans—an American-style diet (higher in fat and refined carbs, especially corn) and three that have gotten publicity as being 'healthier': Mediterranean (with wheat and red wine extract), Japanese (with rice and green tea extract) and ketogenic, or Atkins-like (high in fat and protein with very few carbs). The fifth diet was the control group who ate standard commercial chow.

Although some so-called healthy diets did work well for most individuals, one of the four genetic types did very poorly when eating the Japanese-like diet, for example. "The fourth strain, which performed just fine on all of the other diets, did terrible on this diet, with increased fat in the liver and markings of liver damage," said William Barrington, lead author on the study and a recently graduated PhD student from the Threadgill lab.

A similar thing happened with the Atkins-like diet: two genetic types did well, and two did very badly. "One became very obese, with fatty livers and high cholesterol," Barrington said. The other had a reduction in activity level and more body fat, but still remained lean. "This equates to what we call 'skinny-fat' in humans, in which someone looks to be a healthy weight but actually has a high percentage of body fat."

"In humans, you see such a wide response to diets," Barrington said. "We wanted to find out, in a controlled way, what was the effect of the genetics." They measured physical signs, especially evidence of metabolic syndrome, which is a collection of signs of obesity-related problems, including high blood pressure and cholesterol, fatty liver and levels of blood sugar. They also studied any behavioral differences, from how much they moved around to how much they ate.

"I wanted to get the diets as close to popular human diets as possible," Barrington said. "We matched fiber con-

tent and matched bioactive compounds thought to be important in disease."

Perhaps as could be expected, both in earlier research and in anecdotal evidence in humans, the animal models tended not to do great on the American-style diet. A couple of the strains became very obese and had signs of metabolic syndrome. Other strains showed fewer negative effects, with one showing few changes except for having somewhat more fat in the liver. With the Mediterranean diet, there was a mix of effects. Some groups were healthy, while others experienced weight gain, although it was less severe than in the American diet. Interestingly, these effects held, even though the quantity of consumption was unlimited.

The results demonstrated that a diet that makes one individual lean and healthy might have the complete opposite effect on another. "My goal going into this study was to find the optimal diet," Barrington said. "But really what we're finding is that it depends very much on the genetics of the individual and there isn't one diet that is best for everyone."

The research team's future work will focus on determining which genes are involved in the response to the diets. "One day, we'd love to develop a genetic test that could tell each person the best diet for their own genetic makeup," Barrington said. "There might be a geographical difference based on what your ancestors ate, but we just don't know enough to say for sure yet."

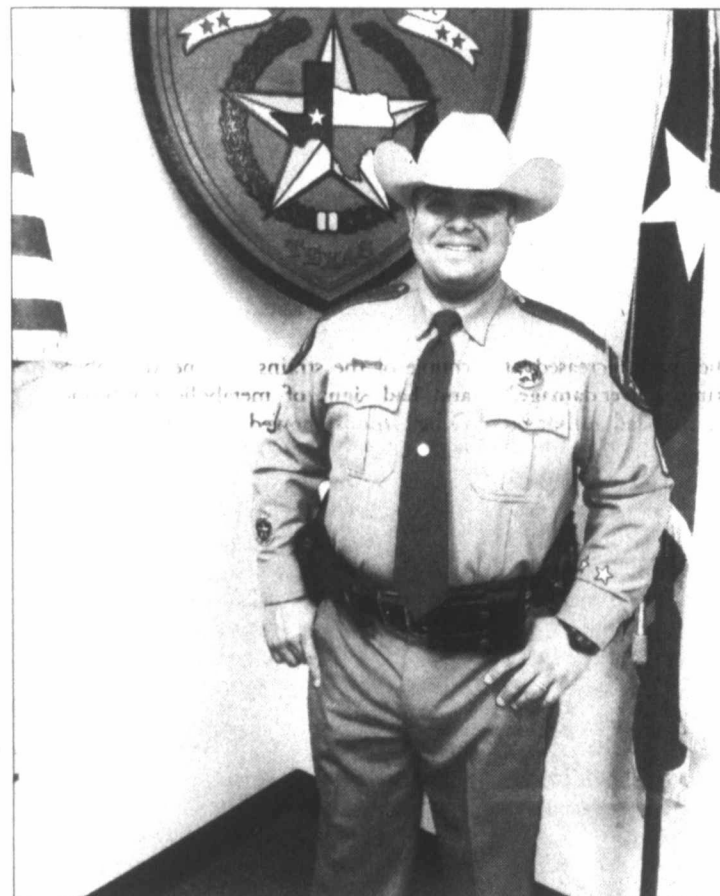

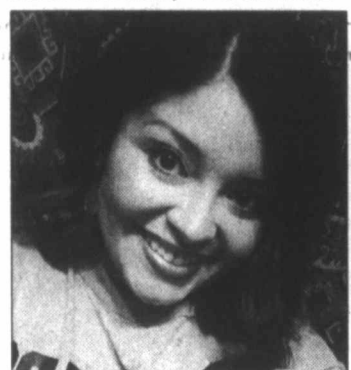
Kelsee Graham, LVN as the December Employee of the Month. Graham has worked for MCHD for 5 years in the Med/Surg Department.

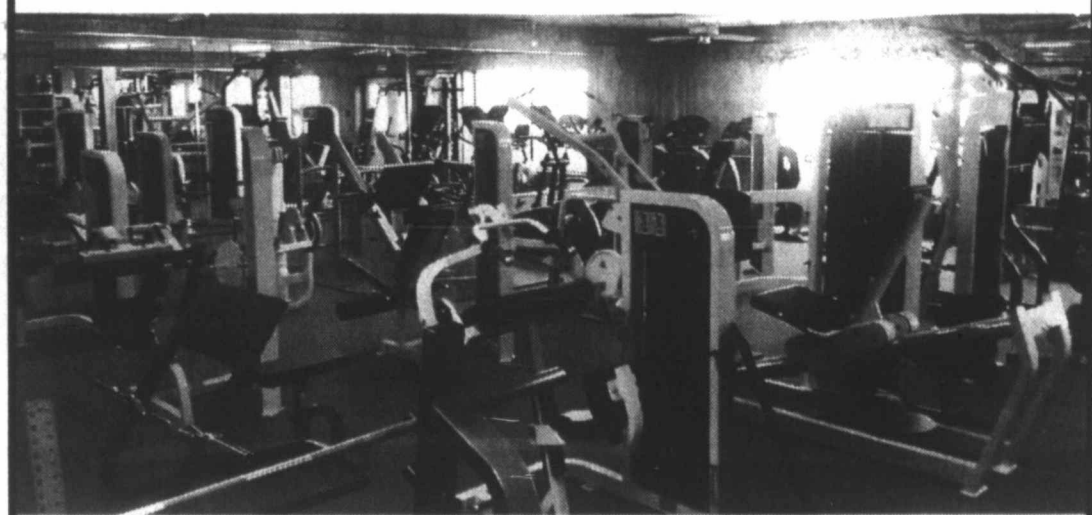
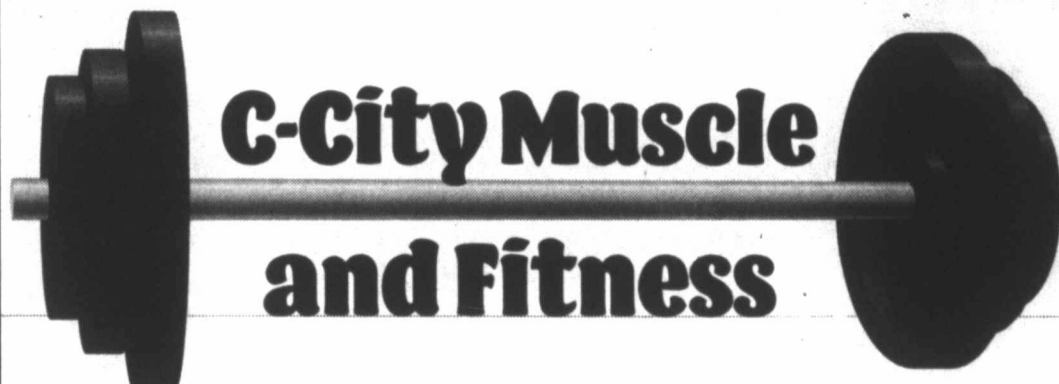

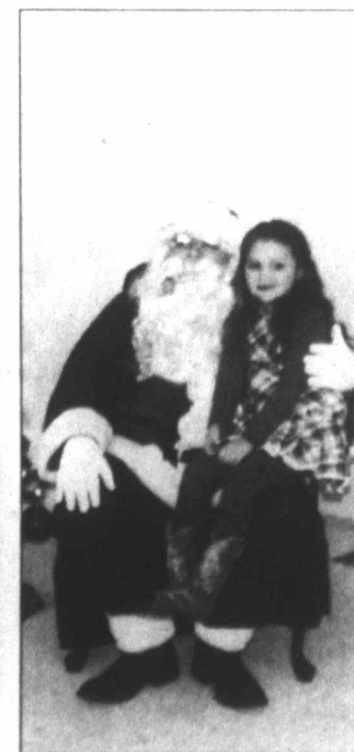

Wolves season ends with loss to state ranked 'Cats

Everyone knew something had to give when the Canadian Wildcats rushed their unstoppable offense onto the turf at Leo Brittain Stadium in Vernon on Friday night to face off with the Colorado Wolves' unmovable defense.

Unfortunately for the Wolves, it was the defense that flinched first.

Canadian, despite facing one of the state's top defensive units, rolled up more than 400 total yards and scored six touchdowns en route to streaking to a 45-8 victory over Colorado City in the third round of the Class 3A, Division II, state playoffs. The win enabled the fifth-ranked Wildcats to improve to 13-0 and advance to the state quarterfinals.

With the loss, the Wolves' finished off their most-successful season since 2010 with an 11-2 record.

Canadian's win wasn't quite as easy as the final score may have displayed. Colorado City pieced together several long drives early in the contest but failed to turn their efforts into points.

The Wildcats, who had entered the game averaging more than 500 yards per game during their first two playoff games, rode the arm of quarterback Casen Cavalier to a quick lead. After C-City had punted away its initial possession, the junior passed staked Canadian to a quick lead early in the first quarter by tossing a 78-yard touchdown pass to Matthew Lynch.

The first of three TD passes Cavalier would throw to Lynch staked the Wildcats to a 6-0 advantage just 3:01 into the contest.

Colorado City answered Canadian's offensive fireworks with a flurry of their own. The Wolves, aided by a roughing the passer penalty on the Wildcats that nullified a pass interception that was returned for a score, put together a 17-play drive that took more than 9 minutes off the clock on their ensuing series.

After the penalty had set the Wolves up with a first down at their own 25, Bubba Williams reeled off a 16-yard gain to the 41. Three plays later, Markis Monroe plowed ahead for 3 yards and a first down on a 4th-and-1 call from near mid-field. Monroe's run was the first of two key fourth-down conversions by Colorado City in the drive. Shortly after Monroe's run, Reid Harris took a pitch around the right side for an 8-yard gain that moved the ball to the Wildcat 15.

Canadian managed to weather the Wolves' threat, however. Canadian intercepted a C-City pass on a fourth-down throw into the end zone.

Canadian managed to stretch its lead late in the second quarter. The Wildcats reeled off a 9-play, 57-yard march that took them to the CHS 2. On the next play, running back Jack Koetting pushed his way into the end zone for a touchdown. The Wildcats tacked on the 2-point conversion moments later and took a 14-0 cushion with 3:20 left in the opening half.

Tragedy struck the Wolves from there. The Wildcats recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff, taking over the ball at the Colorado 25.

One play later, Cavalier converted the turnover into points by hitting Lynch with a 25-yard scoring strike.

Cavalier finished the game by completing 16 of his 23 passing at-

tempts for 245 yards. He also tossed a pair of interceptions, including one in the third quarter by Harris that came inside the Wolf 20.

Canadian held a 21-0 lead heading into the half.

Tracy Smith recorded C-City's other interception midway through the third.

Lynch finished the game with seven receptions for 166 yards and three touchdowns.

The Wildcats continued to hit on all cylinders in the first 12 minutes of the second half. Canadian reeled off the first 10 points of the second half, booting a 32-yard field goal and then garnering a third TD reception from Lynch en route to building a 31-0 lead.

The Wolves didn't roll over and quit, however. Colorado City managed to spoil the Wildcats' shutout bid from there by putting together a clutch 7-play, 61-yard scoring drive. Harris came away with the key play in the drive, pulling in a 30-yard pass from Monroe that moved the ball to the Canadian 24. A 15-yard face masking penalty tacked on an additional 15 yards and moved the Wolves into a 1st-and-10 situation at the 19. Two plays later, Monroe faked a handoff to Jacob Munoz and sprinted around the right side for 13 yards and a touchdown.

Monroe's 14th rushing TD of the season cut Canadian's lead to 31-8 with 2:46 left in the third.

The Wildcats tacked on a pair of

touchdowns in the fourth quarter to close out the contest.

Offensively, the Wolves amassed more than 230 total yards in the contest, including 99 yards rushing by Williams.

Monroe finished the contest by completing six of his 16 passes for 75 yards. He also rolled up 35 yards rushing.

Several Wolves were also named to the All-District 1st Team. Bubba Williams, a junior at CHS, was named 1st team fullback. He also was named 1st Team ILB.

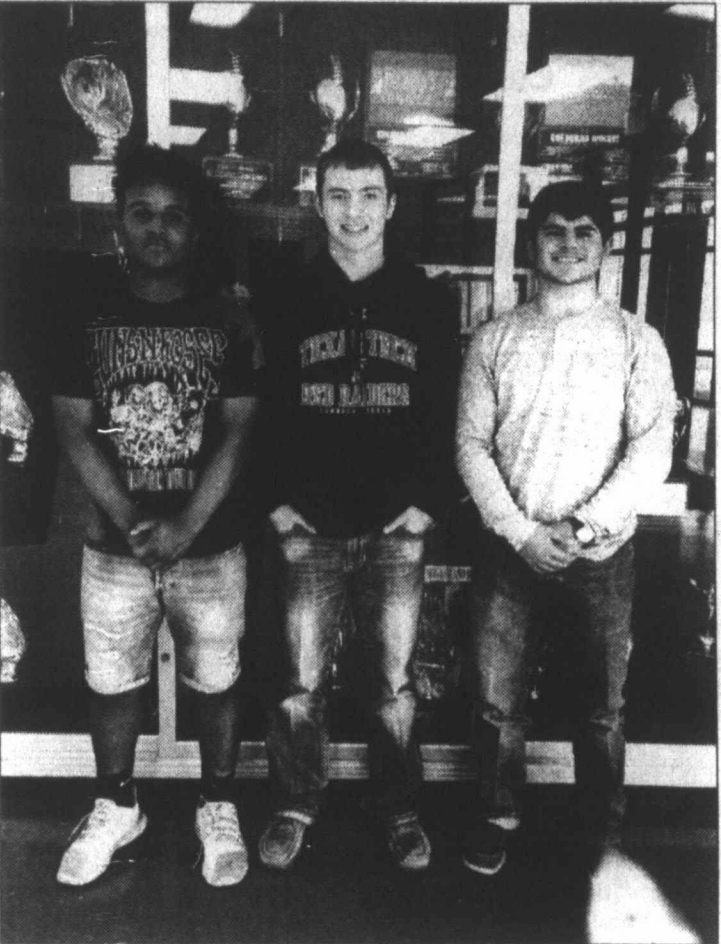

McMullen speaks to Lions Club concerning Main Street program

Main Street Director Mary McMullen, a member of the Colorado City Lions Club, was asked to speak to her fellow club members about the program she oversees.

According to McMullen, the Colorado City Main Street program started in 2010. McMullen said small businesses employ 40% of people, and in 2016 shoppers spent \$15.6 million in small businesses.

Since the inception of the program, the equivalent of

\$2.4 million has been invested in Colorado City in the last 11 years. That's over \$200,000 per year of public and private funds reinvested in the infrastructure of businesses in the Main Street District.

The district runs from 1st to 4th Streets and from Hickory to Cherry. McMullen estimated there are close to 60 small businesses in that area.

McMullen said Main Street businesses have created 91 jobs over the last 11 years, and a net of six businesses have been added. Net is the term she used, because some have opened and some have closed.

"Volunteers are very important," McMullen said. She estimated that \$486,000 worth of volunteer hours have been put into the program over the years.

The program has allowed for

16 sign and façade grants totaling more than \$36,000 to be awarded to businesses within the district. McMullen said all those funds came from fundraising. Although Main Street is a state program, it is not funded by the state and relies on fundraising. The city pays McMullen's salary.

There have been several fundraising programs over the years. Most recently, program volunteers, including Main Street Board members, put on Gun-slingers & Ghosts. Those attending enjoyed delicious gumbo and an historic walking tour of downtown Colorado City. As the tour progressed, groups touring got to hear colorful stories that really happened in Colorado.

McMullen said she and others have been working to put together a historical account of many of the buildings in Colorado City. She is hoping C-City can get a Historic Context Survey, which would mean state and national recognition for the town.

The director is always looking for more volunteers, and she's hoping some of the downtown merchants will offer to help. Because the program benefits those businesses, Main Street is meant to be a volunteer-based program with merchants helping out their fellow merchants.

Shopping at home is also a big part of making Main Street successful. McMullen advises everyone to check out the businesses in town before going out of town to shop. You may be surprised what you can find.

"Come enjoy and spend your money in downtown Colorado City," McMullen said.
