Work Begins On City Police, Court Annex

Work has started on a project that will convert a vacant one-story building between City Hall and Post Office into a municipal police and court annex.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. said it is expected the renovation will be completed in about 6 weeks.

When the job is finished, the city will move its police department and city judge office from the basement of City Hall into the remodeled building.

City acquired the vacant structure a year ago from the J. A. Greene estate. At that time City Council already had given the go-ahead signal to Sadler to plan the remodeling.

John Harvey, local contractor who supervised the city's razing of the vacant 2-story building at the downtown corner of Walnut and East Second, is supervising the remodeling.

"We are using city crews and equipment wherever possible to maintain economy," said Sadler.

The remodeling will include approximately 1,700 square feet of the building fronting on West Third and facing Colorado City Historical Museum.

At the West Third will be the main entrance lobby and Police Chief Jesse Browning's office.

A north-south hall will divide the remaining renovated facilities. On the west side of the hall will be police dispatcher's office and a booking-waiting room for persons in custody.

Municipal Judge W. A. Brimberry's office and a storage room will be on east side of the Hall.

Improvements will include paneled walls, new lowered ceilings, year-round air-conditioning and new electrical facilities.

A carport will be built at the rear of the 1,700 square foot remodeled area, on the west side, to provide for police vehicles to drive to the northwest entrance into the booking and waiting room. Access will be from the parking area north of City Hall.

Sadler said the remainder of the building, at the north end, will continue to be used for storage of fire department equipment.

Move of the municipal court

and police from the cramped City Hall basement has been viewed by city officials for years as a prime need.

Although city workers and equipment will be used in the remodeling contract, the city plans to ask for bids for installation of ceiling, electrical wiring and air-conditioning.

There is no area for handling prisoners in the basement area, steep outside steps to the basement entrance are dangerous in foul weather and a hazard to proper handling to suspects to and from jail.

Judge Brimberry's office is so small in the basement that hearings are interrupted by police radio broadcasts in the adjoining room. And, if a trial is scheduled, it must move up to the third floor City Council room.

There is no space in the basement for Chief Browning's office or for interrogation of suspects or complaints.

30 with two divisions scheduled for judging Dec. 31 and a third division in competition New Year's Day.

Swine judging will begin the competition Dec. 31 morning, followed by sheep judging in the afternoon.

Beef cattle will go before judges the morning of Jan. 1, with all judging and awards completed in time for exhibitors and spectators to return home in time to watch New Year's Day football games.

In past years the show has scheduled swine judging one afternoon, then followed the next day with a morning of sheep judging and an afternoon of cattle competition.

General superintendent for

the new show will be Hill, long active in the association and its show.

Members of the association voted to spend the \$1,250 gift from Frontier Round-Up Association for permanent improvements to be used at the show in Mitchell County Agricultural Buildings. These improvements will include a permanent showing ring and completion of hog penning.

Pamphlets Delivered

Gold and brown "what to see in Colorado City" pamphlets have been distributed to scores of contact points throughout the community.

Chamber of Commerce Executive Vice President Sefton Pickens said the three-fold, six-face information pamphlets have been delivered to motels, restaurants, garages and most service stations.

"We'll get to 'em all this week," Pickens said. Museum, library, city hall, courthouse, and City National Bank also have a supply.

"What to see" is brownprinting on gold background. It is designed to relate brief historical data about Colorado City and to point out interesting sites for visitors.

Chamber of Commerce com-

plied the data and had the pamphlets printed as part of its tourist development program.

All 30 of Mitchell County's Official Texas Historical Markers are listed, with addresses, on one page, under a photo of the Colorado City marker on courthouse lawn. A photo of the new Colorado City Playhouse interior and an account of that project is on another page.

One entire page also is devoted to a capsule history of Colorado City, dating back to the arrival of a T&P Railroad grading crew Nov. 3, 1880.

Brief information about Lake Colorado City State Park, Lake Champion, Ruddick Park, Colorado City Historical Museum and Mitchell County Public Library are included on 2 pages along with photos of the library and museum.

New Preservers Law

New Senate bills signed into law immediately affect boat owners and operators at Lake Colorado City and Lake Champion.

Effective immediately is Senate Bill 331, signed into law by Governor Preston Smith, which provides that the operator of every Class A and Class 1 motorboat while underway shall require every pas-

senger 12 years of age or under to wear a life preserver.

The preserver must be of the type prescribed by Coast Guard regulations.

Also signed into law by the governor, Senate Bill 578 includes aircraft, motorboats and watercraft within the provisions authorizing state agencies

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2nd Gas Hearing Set

Lone Star Asks Monthly 'Adjustment'

Lone Star Gas Company has asked Texas Railroad Commission for authority to get a monthly "cost of living" adjustment in its intra-city gas rate.

Representatives from 25 Texas cities--including Colorado City--heard the request in prepared company testimony Monday in Austin.

And, the cities have a postponement until July 28 to examine Lone Star testimony.

When the adjustment request goes before the Railroad Commission again later this month, attorneys for the cities will question gas company officials as groundwork for opposition to the plan.

Dallas City Attorney Alex Bickley will head up the cities' opposition which is being organized by the Texas Municipal League.

When Lone Star last obtained Railroad Commission approval for an upward adjustment in intra-city rate structure (the charge for gas delivered by Lone Star through its lines to its own gas gates at a city), the company immediately requested higher gas rates for residential, commer-

cial and industrial customers within the cities.

Richard D. Brown, executive director of Texas Municipal League, has alerted city officials across the state that "it is axiomatic" that should Lone Star's gas rate be adjusted upward "the price of gas furnished your city necessarily will rise accordingly."

Mayor C. C. (Mike) Burt and City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. were in the group from 25 towns at the Austin hearing Monday.

Only 9 copies of the Lone Star testimony and data exhibits were available to the cities during the hearing.

Sadler complained in the hearing that city officials were handicapped in "going back and properly telling our people what the gas company proposes" without copies of the prepared data. His copy arrived the next day after his return from Austin.

He told the commission that Colorado City had been given no information and had not been contacted in any manner by the gas company in regard to its new intra-city request.

"You have 2,000 customers in Colorado City and not even a manager for your company," the manager told company officials.

What Lone Star is seeking is an adjustment in the city gate charge of gas based upon a weighted average cost of gas purchased by Lone Star of 16.29 cents per MCF.

Effective Aug. 1 and the first day of each month thereafter the company proposes, the intracompany city gate charge will be increased or decreased by the amount by which the weighted average cost of purchased gas is more or less than the 16.29 cent mark.

This will be determined by a certified statement filed by the company the first of each month with the Railroad Commission.

Lone Star further proposes that the company's adjustment in intracompany city gate rates be adjusted according to the company statement unless the Railroad Commission acts within 15 days of the filing date to suspend the adjustment pending further action by the commission.

If his adjustment plan is approved by the commission--

then the company will receive what amounts to a monthly "cost of living" adjustment automatically unless there is reaction from the commission.

Cities then would face the prospect of facing formal application for higher rates for customers inside the cities in view of higher costs related to Lone Star's intracompany cost-of-living increases.

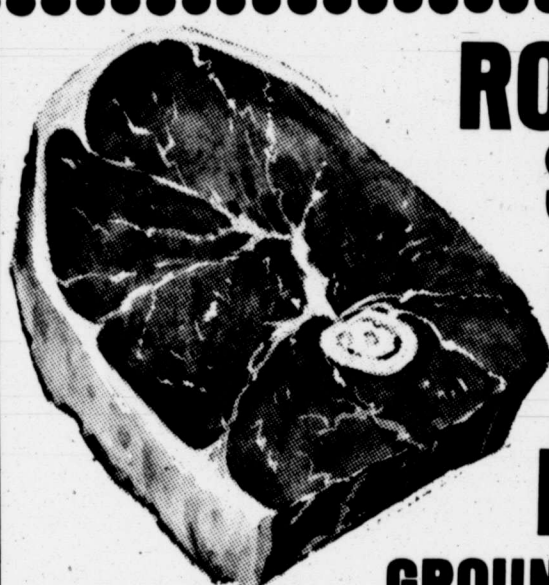

Local Teachers Compile UNIPAC

Four Mitchell County teachers have returned from an annual Area II in-service conference for home economics teachers sponsored recently in Midland.

They are Mrs. Curtis Latimer of Loraine High School, Mrs. Ather Ellis of Westbrook, Mrs. Caddo Matthews and Mrs. Jay Craddock of Colorado High.

The four were responsible for compiling a UNIPAC concerning consumer budgeting.

UNIPAC, "used on an experimental basis last school term in Colorado High Homemaking classes, is a new concept in teaching, "a self-contained set of teaching-learning materials designed to teach a single concept and structured for individual and independent use in a continuous progress school program."

They are designed to help students achieve at their own best learning rates.

"If the pre-test results indicate that he is ready for

concepts or skills of the UNIPAC," Mrs. Matthews said in explaining the new teaching method, "he selects from suggested learning materials and activities in the UNIPAC those which fit his own unique learning style."

"Behavioral objectives, which are contained in his UNIPAC, guide the student as he learns."

"When he feels that he has achieved one behavioral objective, he proceeds to the next one and again selects from suggested learning materials and activities."

"If the self test results indicate that he is ready for teacher evaluation, the student can request the post-test for his UNIPAC."

From that UNIPAC a student can proceed to his next UNIPAC or participate in quest activities.

"During the learning sequence the teacher provides as many opportunities as possible for student-teacher and student-student interaction during conferences and seminars."

"The teacher monitors each student's progress, diagnoses learning problems, prescribes possible alternative learning

materials and activities which help solve problems and evaluate progress.

"The teaching-learning act becomes much more personalized both for the teacher and for the student."

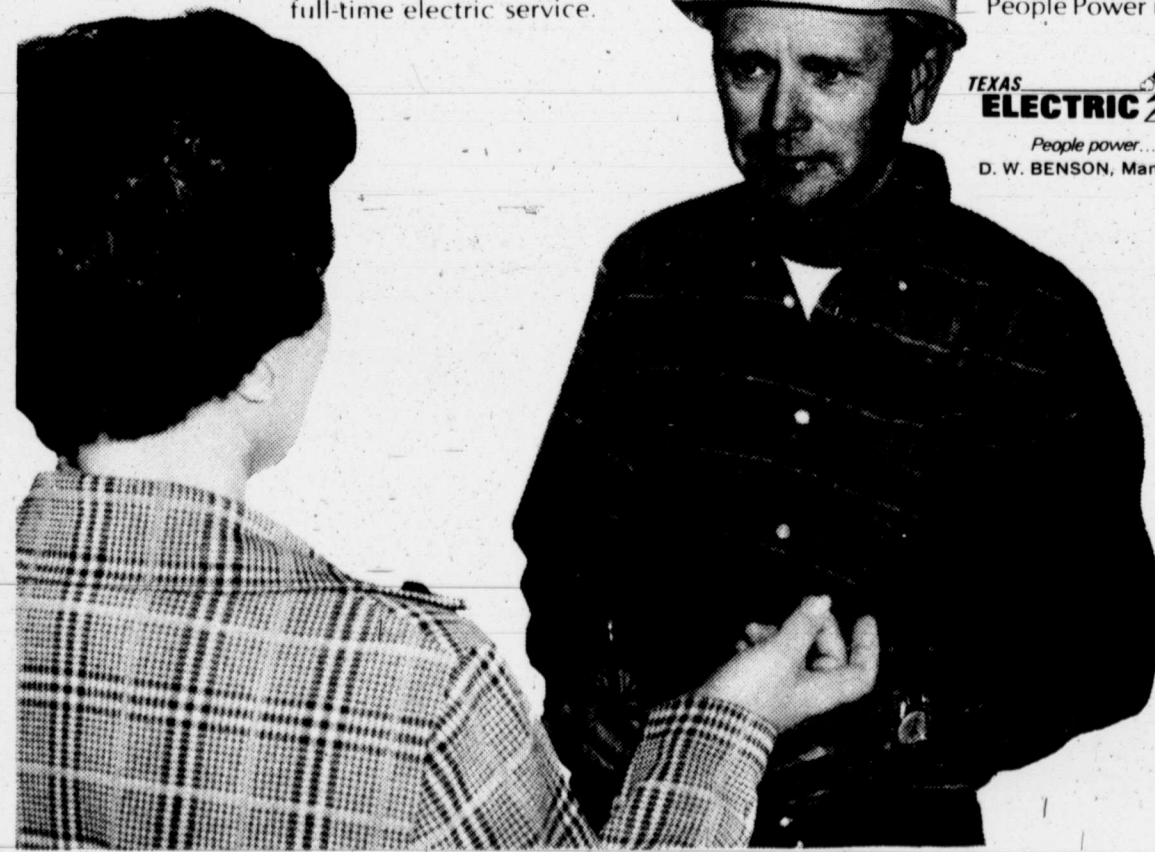

Daily devotions were presented by Dr. Roy McClung, president of Wayland College.

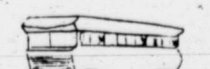

Effective in 90 days will be House Bill 866 which amends the trespass law to increase the minimum penalty for first violation of \$25 and maximum penalty of \$200. It also provides that all game or fish taken by persons trespassing shall be disposed of to charitable institutions.
