Due to the extreme drought conditions, the City Mayor specifically requests all citizens to please limit the use of water to household necessities. He further states that this condition should be corrected by the latter part of the week, under the able directions of Water Commissioner, Bill Sinclair. Any inquiries in regard to this situation should be directed to Mr. Guy Craddock, Secretary for the City of Strawn.

The shortage of water is a result of a crack in the secondary water vat losing approximately 120 gallons of water an hour.

Attractive, modern homes make life more enjoyable for 230 Parker and Palo Pinto County families, and their construction has given a shot in the arm to the local building industry, Marvin Elliott, county supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration said today.

In addition, Farmers Home, the rural credit arm of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has helped the local economy with loans to farmers to buy land or finance operations.

The agency's wide range of services added a record 1½ million dollars to resources available for housing, farming and community facilities in the two counties last year. At year's end, the outstanding loan total had climbed to more than 2½ million dollars, and was providing direct benefits to 1622 families in the area.

Farmers Home Administration loan services are carried on in Palo Pinto County through the agency's office at 1241 Mineral Wells Highway in Weatherford. FHA representatives are at the Courthouse in Palo Pinto each first and third Wednesday morning of each month. Housing loans may be made for homes in the rural countryside, and in all towns of the county except Mineral Wells and its urbanized surrounding area. Community facility projects may include service to rural town of not more than 5,500 population.

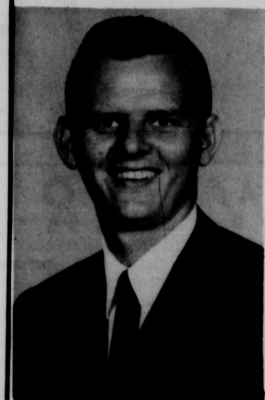

Student Congress on Evangelism

Billy Graham, widely acclaimed Christian evangelist, has been named honorary chairman of EX-
PLO '72, the International Student Congress on Evangelism which is expected to draw 100,000 students and laymen to Dallas next June.

The multitudes will train in how to share their faith in Christ.

"The message of Christ is still the most powerful force for change in our world today," said Graham in accepting the position. "I believe that the training and inspiration that will be given at this Dallas Congress could make EX-
PLO '72 the most significant and historic student gathering of our century."

Campus Crusade for Christ International will sponsor the Congress, which Dallas conventioners estimate will be the largest training conference ever held in the history of the United States.

"EX-
PLO '72 will launch a strategy to train one-half million people during 1972 for a spiritual explosion across America and around the world," said Campus Crusade President, Bill Bright. "Billy Graham has accepted the leadership role because he is greatly concerned with the students of America and the world."

Graham commented, "One of the greatest needs today is a world student congress. That is why I am so excited about Campus Crusade's plans." The internationally respected evangelist was honorary chairman of the World Congress on Evangelism in West Berlin in 1966 and the U. S. Congress on Evangelism in Minneapolis in 1969.

"Operation Penetration" will follow EX-
PLO '72 as an extension of the nationwide training program. Hundreds of additional conferences will be held across the U. S. to allow the EX-
PLO delegates to reach still more laymen and students. "Potentially, one-half million people could be trained during the summer of 1972," Bright said. "We are seeking to saturate the entire nation with the claims of Jesus Christ by 1976."

During 1970, Campus Crusade Lay Institutes for Evangelism trained some 100,000 in how to share Christ's message. The organization, headquartered at Arrowhead Springs, near San Bernardino, California, has more than 3,000 full-time staff members who are working in 45 countries.

Highlighting EX-
PLO '72 will be a National Chris-

tion Leadership Seminar, mass sessions nightly in the Cotton Bowl, and a huge final meeting of an anticipated 250,000 in a natural amphitheatre near Dallas. National TV coverage is planned for all major meetings.

The Leadership Seminar will bring together hundreds of Christian leaders from the U. S. and foreign countries, to develop strategies for accelerating the spread of the claims of Christ throughout the world and the fulfillment of the Great Commission in this generation.

Campus Crusade is an interdenominational Christian movement of students and laymen, founded at UCLA in 1951 by Bright and his wife. It is designed specifically to serve as "an evangelistic arm of the local church," according to the founder.

Fruit Soup is Dessert

Popular in European countries, fruit soups are gaining in importance here in America. This recipe for cranberry fruit soup is so quick and easy, you can have a European dessert delicacy with a minimum of effort.

Quick Fruit Soup

½ cup sugar
¼ cup corn starch
4 cups cranberry juice
1 (2-inch) cinnamon stick

Mix together sugar and corn starch in saucepan. Gradually stir in cranberry juice. Add cinnamon stick. Bring to full boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cover and simmer 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Discard cinnamon. Serve either warm or cold, topped with a dollop of dairy sour cream. Makes 8 (½-cup) servings.

He has added several magazine cover illustrations to his list, a dozen or more one-man shows, all highly successful, and continued his fast paced painting of cowboys, ranch kids and the modern quarterhorse. The list of collectors and owners of his work has grown tremendously and includes many famous names and ranches.

ON THE BIAS *by Carol*

Being of the female species, I find it hard to write a completely unbiased article. So I might as well call a spade a spade, and proclaim to all that any subject covered will be biased in that they are all from a woman's point of view. But I do hate to admit that an opinion might be wrong, even if it is biased.

There are so many interests the average woman has. Sewing and cooking remain the basics out of necessity, but also included are child psychology, the arts, literature, crafts, even ecology to mention a few. Name a subject and someone is interested. So let's cover a variety of subjects from week to week and attempt to find things of interest for all of our readers.

Household hints apply to anyone who has a household to run. I have found a 3 x 5 card file to be a most valuable organizer. Normally, they are used for recipes, but how about one to file sewing information, another for household hints and even one for child care. (This one could include summer games and activity ideas you find in the household magazines.) I even use one instead of an address book with 3 x 5 alphabetical dividers. Every family has its own card complete with address, telephone number, each members first name (don't forget the pets), birthdays and any personal interests of the family. It is a handy reference when corresponding or telephoning. It is easy to make a new card when the old one is filled with address changes, etc.

Start your household tips card file with the clothing care tips I have below. When clipped it will fit in your file box. These tips have worked for me and I hope they work as well for you.

Clothing Care

1. Ball point pen stains: Spray with hair spray. While damp rub with paper towel. Repeat process until stain disappears. Wash article (if washable) as soon as treated.
2. Miracle Fabric Stains: It is important to treat grease marks, food stains, etc. before washing. Treating after they have been laundered makes them more stubborn. Fantastik spray cleaners sprayed on the area and rubbed in gently just before washing will remove most any stain...even that dirty shirt collar. It is also good for removing small carpet stains. Spray area, scrub with damp cloth or brush and go over with clean damp cloth.
3. The lost sock: To keep pairs together during laundry process, pin at the top with a small safety pin before dropping in washer. Remove pin after they are dried and are ready to be put away.

TURKEY TALK

Texas housewives are talking turkey more and more, just as are restaurant cooks, when it comes time to prepare meals that are nutritious and delicious for the family.

That's the evidence compiled by the Texas Department of Agriculture for its July-August promotion of turkey as another quality Texas agricultural product (TAP), Commissioner John C. White said.

Consumption of turkey as a year-round food has steadily gone up in the past 30 years, from 2.9 pounds per person in 1940 to approximately 8.3 pounds per person in 1970. The TAP promotion of "summer-time turkey" is designed to increase that per capita consumption in 1971.

The 1970 promotion helped, according to Bill Powers, executive secretary of the Turkey Producers Board who said that birds in storage were at a minimum at the end of last year.

Turkey sandwiches are being featured in the promotion this year and especially in the point of purchase placards in food stores and in billboards. The TAP promotion also includes news releases to newspapers, radio and television stations and direct mailings.

Turkey production means about \$30,000,000 a year to the Texas economy. The state ranks fifth in the nation in production; and Bell, McLennon, Gillespie, Blanco and Bosque are the top five counties in turkey production in that order.

FREE License Plates for DAV's

Details of a new program which will provide free 1972 automobile license plates to some disabled veterans were revealed today by the Texas Highway Department.

The program was set up by an act of the 62nd legislature.

To qualify, an applicant must:

- Be a Texas resident;
- Be a veteran of the armed forces of the United States
- Have a disability rating of 70 per cent or more
- Be drawing compensation from the federal government as the result of service-connected disability.

A qualified veteran is entitled to register one passenger car or light commercial vehicle with a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of one ton or less for his own use without paying the prescribed registration fee. There is a statutory fee of \$1 which must accompany each application.

Specially designed license plates will be issued with the letters "DV" appearing as either a prefix or suffix to the license number. The words "Disabled Vet" also will appear on the plates.

Vehicles with Disabled Vet plates will be exempt from paying parking fees charged by any governmental authority other than the federal government. This includes parking meters.

The license plates will not be available until the beginning of the 1972 registration year. The law provides that the disabled veteran must make application by October 1 preceding the registration year for which the plates are requested.

All Disabled Vet plates will be issued directly from the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

As a prerequisite, the veteran's disability rating must be verified by the Veteran's Administration or the branch of the armed forces from which he draws his disability compensation.

Also, the Texas title to the vehicle must be issued in the name of the veteran.

Application forms and instructions may be secured from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, 40th and Jackson Avenue, Austin, Texas 78703.

The forms also will be available from Motor Vehicle Division district offices in Houston, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Port Arthur, El Paso, Fort Worth, Dallas, Lubbock, Amarillo and Longview, as well as county tax offices; county veteran service officers; American Legion headquarters in Austin and Veterans of Foreign Wars headquarters in Austin.

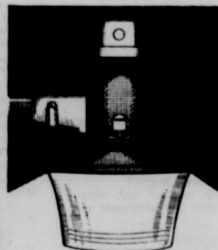
