Tornadic Like Winds Hit Primary School

MORE EXPECTED

Class Enrollment Hits 1,705 Total

Colorado Independent School District enrolled 1,705 students for the start of the 1966-67 school year.

Those figures were released by the administration Friday with the prospect of an additional 150 students signing up during the next week.

Coordinator Earl Cook Jr. said present enrollment forms had been turned in by some students who have not as yet formally registered for classes. These pupils, he said, are moving into the district and will push the Friday figures upward.

At Primary School 437 students were enrolled with the grade tally as follows: first, 173; second, 149; and third, 114.

Hutchinson has 353 enrolled with 141 in the fourth, 149 in the fifth and 15 students in special education classes.

Junior high total was set at 268 including 150 seventh graders, 139 in the eighth and nine in special education.

Colorado High enrolled a whopping 599 students which may be a new high mark for the school.

Class by class it went like this: freshmen, 132; sophomores, 127; juniors, 122; and seniors, 99.

Sixth graders enrolling at Wallace School added up to 115 students.

Lunchrooms at CHS, Junior High and Wallace are expected to continue serving sandwiches throughout this week until kitchen equipment is put into working order.

Remodeling and reconstruction of new lunchrooms have caused the delay at the three schools.

Westbrook Increases

Westbrook School, which opened Aug. 29, had an enrollment increase of four students.

Total number of students was 162 according to Principal Ralph Bryant.

Two new teachers are included in the 13-member faculty. The instructors are Mrs. Charles Pope, sixth grade, and Mrs. Doug Chitsey, high school English.

The school is still in need of a science instructor.

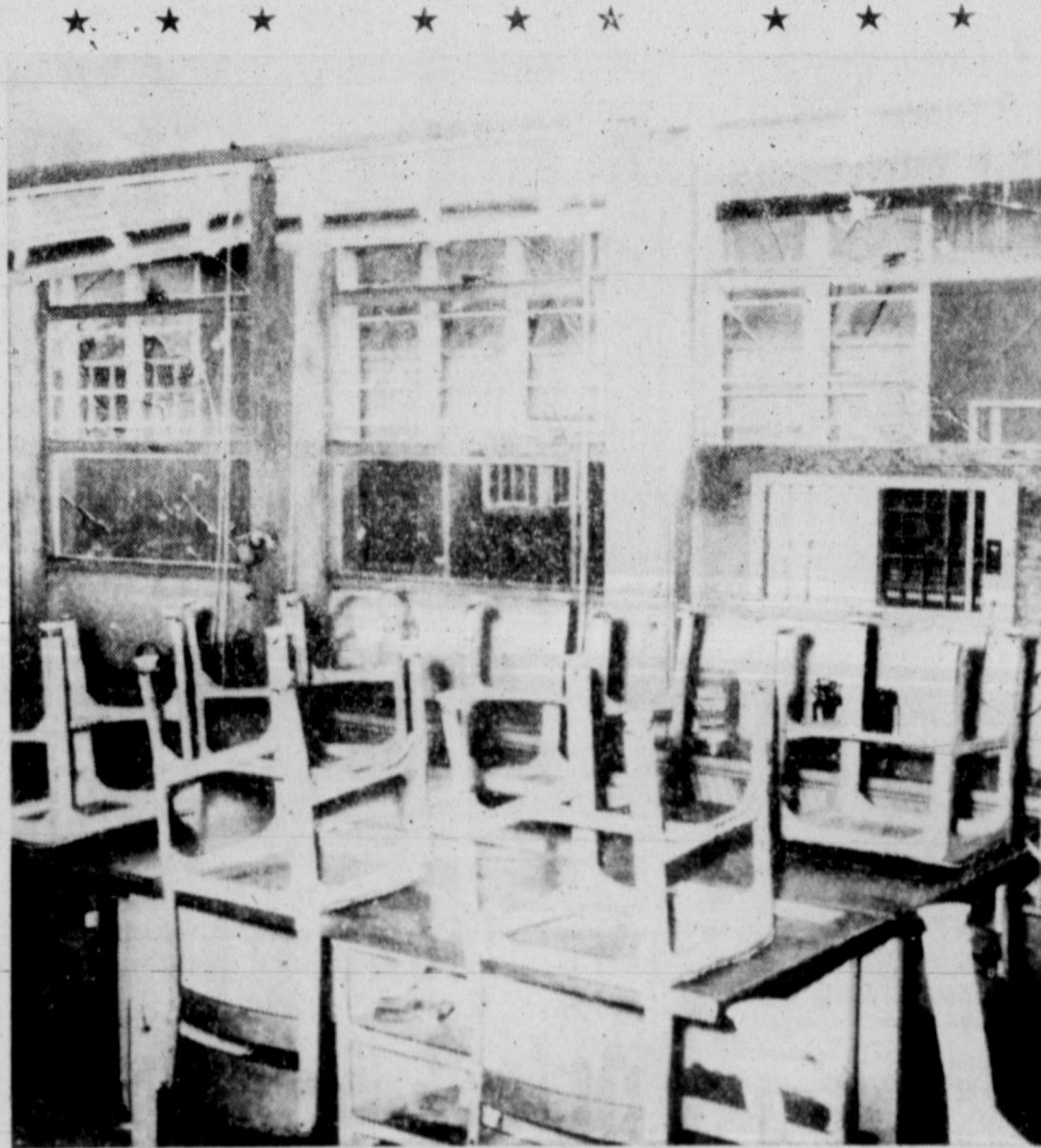

Cars, Property Also Damaged

Tornado like winds struck Colorado City about 3 p.m. Friday inflicting heavy damage on portions of Primary School and causing lesser damage in other parts of town.

Well over 200 window panes were partially or completely damaged at the school and three sections of the building's roof were torn loose.

No injuries were reported in the storm.

While scattered debris, including pens and broken limbs were observed in most sections of the city, the bulk of the damage appeared to be at Primary.

Work crews were already at labor Saturday morning repairing the roof and replacing broken windows.

Glass from the shattered panes covered the floor in some classrooms at the school which had just emptied of children prior to the storm blow.

Most students living in the city were already on their way home when the storm struck and other pupils waiting for buses were quickly hustled in to hallways to escape injury.

Principal Brooks Teague said some of the students were frightened by the storm, but otherwise escaped unharmed due to the quick action of school personnel in getting them inside the building.

Cars parked near the school received damage when the metal on the roof pelted them in the same hail of rocks that damaged the building's windows.

Several textbooks received water damage with the accompanying rain that officially measured 70 inches in the area.

A large plate glass, show window at Frank Motor Co. was blown out, but Frank DeLoe reported no damage to any of his autos.

Chamber of Commerce office received damage to the ceiling when the strong winds struck plus the scattering of office papers as the current blew open the front door.

J. C. Penny Co. had a back window blown out and lost several pieces of roof tile.

Damage was reported by Mrs. Wayland Webb, 425 Hickory when a tree blew down on her car.

Also 100 tons of crop damage in Mitchell County had been reported Saturday morning.

Roof damage on one of the city's units at Delaney Circle was reported by Dee Tonn.

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Tollett Says Local Plant "Status Quo"

Coalition president R. L. Tollett Friday predicted another year of operation for the company's Col-Tex Refinery in Colorado City.

Speaking before a crowd gathered for the annual Col-Tex barbecue, Tollett said, "I do not make predictions of more than one year, but I know that Col-Tex will be operating a year from now."

The company president noted that "we can't expect a program of improvement in Colorado City, but neither is it prudent or provident to abandon an efficient complex for the refining of crude oil."

Tollett added that it would take savings of considerable magnitude through location and improvement in refining technology that would give the same yield before there was a definite possibility of shutting down the local operations.

He said no formal suggestions in writing had been received by his office to indicate a change in the manner of operations.

"I hope to be here with you a year from tonight with a message of the same forecast," he said in closing.

During his talk, Tollett said he expected the Big Spring plant to be in operation for "many more years."

A crowd numbering around 200 was on hand Friday night at the Col-Tex Club on Lake Colorado City for the annual barbecue and dance.

Other Couden officials on hand for the event were Jack Y. Smith, director of industrial relations, and vice presidents, R. W. Shouse and R. W. Thompson.

Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, October 11, 12 and 13, are the dates chosen for the World Wide film. The movie is part of the Billy Graham evangelistic campaign.

Interviewed after they saw "The Restless Ones" premiered here were four of the citizens invited to see the showing at 1:30 Friday afternoon.

All expressed high praise for the film and enthusiasm for the public showing coming October 11 through 13.

Bob Barnes, minister of the 22nd & Austin Street Church of Christ, said "I very definitely appreciate the film. I think it will have a great effect for good in the moral area of our lives."

Mrs. John Chinn, wife of a Colorado City physician, mother of five children and member of St. Ann's Catholic Church, said "I thought it a very worthwhile film — one I should like for my children to see."

As a mother, I think it is a must-see for every parent and certainly for every teenager."

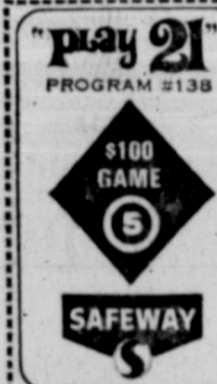

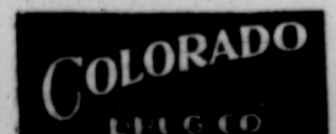

Amendments Add New Provisions

Many Mitchell county residents are losing thousands of dollars monthly because of their failure to take advantage of the 1965 disability amendments. Even Fisher, district manager of Social Security in Big Spring announced:

Under these new amendments, he said, disability payments are no longer limited to persons with "permanent" disabilities. Previously, one could receive benefits only if the mental or physical impairment was expected to continue for a long and indefinite time, or to result in death.

Today a person may qualify for benefits if his disability has lasted, or is expected to last, twelve months or longer. He added that many people in this capacity are not filing for these disability benefits.

Fisher said the potentiality of disability hovers over all of us. While only one out of every hundred workers may become disabled, it definitely affects a family's financial security.

Two kinds of disability protection are provided under the social security program, he explained.

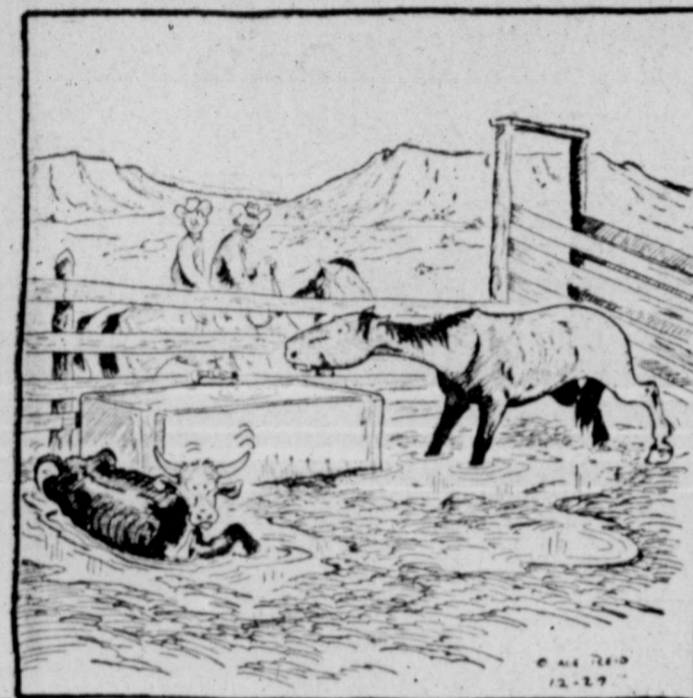

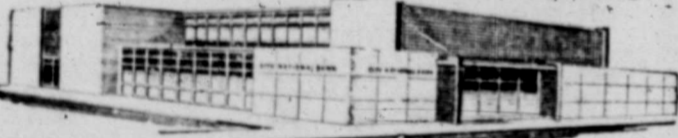

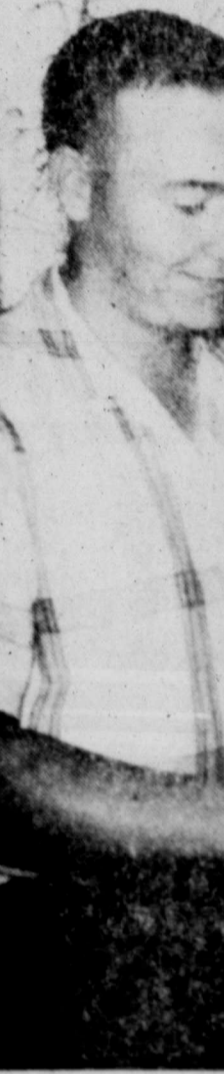
