Yoakum named president

Lone Star Gas Company has begun its fifth annual public solicitation effort in support of Project HAP'N (Heating Assistance Program for the Needy), said local manager Gary Parker.

Parker said information explaining the scope of the program will be included in Lone Star's billing envelopes. A pre-addressed return envelope can be used for mailing in donations.

Lone Star initiated the special program in 1982 to help the needy pay heating bills. Since that time over \$632,000 have been donated to this program through public support and Lone Star's contributions. These con-

tributions have helped more than 7,000 families in cities served by Lone Star.

The program is administered by the Community Council of Greater Dallas, a non-profit agency engaged in coordinating social services. All of the Project HAP'N donations are used in helping people throughout the Lone Star system.

In addition to Project HAP'N, Lone Star Gas also has available the deferred payment plan and an average bill plan for the convenience of those who can pay their bills, but prefer equal monthly payments over the entire year, or who need to pay a current bill in reasonable installments, said Parker.

Persons who wish to contribute to Project HAP'N should make checks payable to Project HAP'N - Community Council, and mail them to Project HAP'N - Community Council, P.O. Box 243, Dallas, Texas 75221. All funds collected go directly to the Community Council of Greater Dallas for disbursement via local participating agencies (area councils of government, community action agencies, etc.) throughout the Lone Star system. No contributions are retained by agencies participating in the program to cover operating expenses.

Heating assistance available

A. K. McCarley Jr. of Colorado City, chairman of the board of the Sweetwater Production Credit Association, has announced the appointment of Bill Yoakum of Sweetwater as the new president of the association, effective Dec. 18.

Yoakum began his career with the Farm Credit System in November, 1973, with Plainview Production Credit. He joined the Sweetwater office staff in March, 1981, where he has served as vice president-credit and acting president since that time.

The 13-year veteran of the Farm Credit System and his wife Elion have one daughter, Terry.

Joining McCarley in making the appointment were vice chairman Othell O'Kelly of Trent, Buster Haggard of Stanton, John Post of Jal, N.M., Sanford Boardman of Lamesa and Aundry Head of Snyder.

"We have complete confidence in Bill's ability to conduct the affairs of the association in a professional manner and to maintain its reputation as a strong

agricultural lender," McCarley said.

"We appreciate the past support of our member-borrowers and look forward to their continued support as we and President Yoakum work toward extending the PACs service in the area," said McCarley.

Sweetwater Production Credit Association is one of 28 PCAs in Texas which provides financing to more than 360 farmers and ranchers in a 15-county area of West Texas including Mitchell County.

Forms in the mail

Bah, humbug - it's tax time!

Colorado City residents start receiving annual holiday greetings from the Internal Revenue Service Friday in the form of federal income tax packages.

Tommy Reeves of the local post office said Colorado City postal carriers deliver to approximately 3,700 addresses including residential, businesses, post office boxes and rural routes on a daily basis. About 90 percent of these addresses should receive some type of tax form.

Reeves said Friday that "we're starting to send out the tax packages today and we hope to be finished Saturday," adding that it may be Monday before the task is completed.

Reeves said the forms were received at the post office about a week ago with delivery scheduled to begin the day after Christmas.

He said tax forms not deliverable to addresses on the form will be forwarded to new addresses if there is a current forwarding address on file not over 12 months old.

IRS officials stress that the 1986 tax forms closely resemble those of previous years despite all the publicity over the major tax overhaul that goes into effect Jan. 1. The law does not affect 1986 tax returns.

Taxpayers will notice some

changes from the 1986 forms.

The biggest impact will come from the second year of indexing, designed to eliminate "bracket creep," the phenomenon that pushes a taxpayer into a higher tax bracket when he or she receives a pay raise to offset the effects of inflation.

The index for 1986 widens the tax bracket by 37 percent, reflecting the impact of inflation last year. The indexing changes will also boost the personal exemption to \$1,080, up from \$1,040 on the 1985 return.

Another other changes on the 1986 returns:

-The line for the residential energy credit has been dropped, reflecting the fact that this credit expired at the end of 1985.

-Taxpayers who don't itemize will be allowed to deduct 100 percent of their charitable contributions, up from 50 percent last year. This increase, however, expires after this year.

-Taxpayers who itemize are directed to list the deduction for mortgage financing points separately from home mortgage interest. Points, or loan origination fees, are deductible only if they are paid for the use of money.

-Taxpayers who owe money will be asked to include a daytime telephone number so the IRS can call them.

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'85 farm bill is on thin ice

The 1985 farm bill may be on thin ice because it's failed to solve the problem of low farm income while costing the government a bundle (cost could approach \$30 billion).

While one year may not provide a true test of several new concepts in the bill, such as the marketing loan, there may well be a strong push to enact a 1987 farm bill early next year.

Some changes would amount to little more than mid-term adjustments, but others would constitute major changes in policy direction, point out economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Ron Knutson and Dr. Ed Smith describe some of the major proposals for a possible '87 farm bill.

—Government cost could be

reduced by targeting program benefits to farmers having the greatest financial need. Targeting benefits on the basis of need has never been a feature of farm programs. Instead, benefits such as target prices have been allocated on the basis of production. Attempts to limit payments have not been successful. Most other government social programs, such as food stamps and social security, operate with specific eligibility criteria. Such criteria would have to be developed for farm programs as would farm program objectives.

—An effort could be made to reduce commodity stocks with mandatory farm production controls as proposed in the so-called Harkin bill. Based on farmers' past production, mandatory controls would be installed if, for example, a majority of the farmers voted for them. The recent wheat poll reflected favorably on mandatory controls and brought renewed interest in the issue. In Texas 75 percent of the voting wheat farmers favored mandatory controls. Mandatory controls would raise domestic prices while exports would decline as U.S. prices moved above world market levels. Farm program costs would fall and consumers would pay higher food and fiber prices. Milk and sugar would be likely commodities for experimental mandatory controls.

—A decisive effort could be made to reduce commodity stocks by making prices more competitive in export markets. Rice and cotton exports were expanded through the marketing loan which allowed market prices to fall to world levels. Such an initiative could be extended to wheat and feed grains.

America's Team is passing away as this is being written on the 21st day of December, 1986.

Death follows a lengthy illness. A loyal, if booring, collection of family and friends are on hand at Texas Stadium during these final hours. Dr. Doug Flutie has come forward to pull the plug, all vital signs having ceased under those silver hats with the blue stars.

Death has been anticipated for weeks. The franchise, in fact, has been fighting draftheimers syndrome ever since the Carter years. Despite repeated free agent injections, the Cowboys have progressively declined.

The disease was first diagnosed as far back as 1979, just a year after the Cowboys had reached their peak by winning the Super Bowl.

Roger Staubach gave Dallas the illusion of health by repeatedly leading them to victory in the final two minutes. But NFL physicians weren't fooled. Draftheimers was making its presence felt, even as the Cowboys denied it.

Staubach finally left the team after being awakened on the sidelines with smelling salts each Sunday afternoon. Danny White did his best to continue the tradition, and Dallas bravely made it to the NFC finals for the next three years.

By this time draftheimers was acknowledged, even by protective family members. They nevertheless insisted it was in its early stages and expressed confidence treatment would ultimately prove successful.

The Walker infusion at the outset of the 1986 season brought renewed hope, but by mid-November the end was inevitable. The offense-less line had all but made a cripple of Herschel. Tony Dorsett was ailing with a bad ankle. Quarterback White was escorted to the sidelines, and replacement Steve Pelluer was finding new and creative ways to keep Dallas from achieving its goal.

Now, as the end nears, the defending Super Bowl champions are assuring the Cowboys of their first losing season in 20 years.

Just exactly what is draftheimers disease? Well, the body of the NFL is structured so as to keep itself healthy from head-to-toe. The theory is that no matter how healthy the face and chest, if the toes go numb, the league's body suffers. Overall health disintegrates.

With that in mind, the teams that get beat, get first pickings on the youngsters coming out of college. By the time the winning teams draft, the good players have been plucked.

All successful teams ultimately suffer draftheimers disease, but most just go ahead and die and get it over with. The wins decline, the draft picks get better, and a new baby team emerges into a giant killer wearing the uniforms of the previously buried.

Dallas proved to be the exception - partly due to an organization which was too effective, and coaching which was too creative. Dallas continued to win too frequently. Not just for a season. But year after year.

NFL physicians kept warning the organization it could not expect to retain health unless it took a voluntary fall, i.e. a 2-14 or 1-15, or 0-16 season.

Dallas didn't listen, and America's team has finally died, still concluding with a stubborn 7-9 record. That's hardly the 2-14 the new Cowboy team will need in order to be effective in the future. But it's still the best anti-draftheimers injection the team has had in 20 years.

For most coaches, another losing season might be necessary. For Tom Landry - well, America's team could be reincarnated by summer. Or at least by the turn of the century.

Better times ahead?

COLLEGE STATION—Texas farmers and ranchers should see somewhat better times in the year ahead.

"Agricultural income next year may rise moderately over 1986 levels," says Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "Higher cattle prices and better cotton markets are the main reasons for the improved prospects."

Although grain prices will remain under pressure from too many supplies, government payments will support income, notes Anderson. Production expenses will be held in check by low rates of inflation.

Even though demand for grain will benefit from higher livestock prices, total feed usage is expected to decline, says the economist. As a result, combined domestic and export demand for feed grains and soybeans will be below production levels. However, stocks of wheat, rice and cotton are expected to decrease as use exceeds production.

"Because market prices will remain depressed, participation in farm programs will be high in 1987," Anderson points out. "This will hold back production some while usage improves."

The number of Texas farmers forced out of agriculture in 1986 due to financial reasons beyond their control is expected to exceed 2,800, says the economist. That number is up moderately from the year before and about twice the number two years ago. Heavy debt loads, low prices and low yields are the main causes forcing farmers to quit.

The largest number of farmers forced out are in the intensified farming areas of the Panhandle, Southern High Plains and Rolling Plains. Anderson estimates that more than 100 farmers will leave farming in each of three West Texas counties where crop yields have been extremely low for several years.

Agricultural prosperity will be slow in coming during the rest of the 1980s. U.S. farm exports should expand gradually while heavy government income support will continue for crop farm-

Extension agent reviews year

As 1986 draws to a close, I

would like to say thank you for supporting Extension educational programs this past year. It has been a busy year for home economics and one in which I hope you have gained some knowledge that can make everyday living for you a little easier.

To highlight some of the programs this past year, there have been two Fit For Life courses taught, several workshops on home accessories, and a number of food demonstrations throughout the county.

The Extension Homemakers have sponsored two Lunch and Learn series focusing on individual strengths and a public information program on Alzheimer's Disease.

In the 4-H program we presently have an enrollment of 115. These 4-Hers are involved in about 20 different projects and participate at the county, district and state level. In addition they have been involved in such activities as collecting goods for tornado stricken homes in Sweetwater, raising \$850 for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, and making small gifts for nursing home residents.

Also in 1986 more than 12,000 Texans including 60 from our county, participated in citizen task forces to analyze local problems and tell the Extension Service what kinds of issues needed to be dealt with over the next several years. These suggestions from Mitchell County

have been compiled in book form and are available for your review.

"the state of the economy" begins at home. For the first three weeks in January, this column will feature ideas for being a better family financial manager.

January 1st marks state tax changes

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded Texans not to forget the increase in the sales tax rate that begins New Year's Day—January 1, 1987.

"Only the rate has changed. In every case, what is and what is not taxable under current sales tax law remains the same when the new law goes into effect January 1," reminded Bullock.

A special session of the Texas Legislature raised the state's sales tax rate one and one-eighth percent to deal with a shortfall of tax revenue caused by the collapse of oil prices.

The state sales tax rate goes from 4.125 to 5.25 percent.

Comptroller Bullock said that in many areas of Texas the state rate and local sales taxes, including transit and city sales taxes will put the combined rate to as much as 7.25 percent. In making accounting changes to collect the new tax rate, businesses should have adjusted cash registers and alerted and trained their personnel to collect

sales tax at the new local rates.

The new law also raised the motor fuels tax 5 cents—from 10 cents to 15 cents a gallon.

"My office has contacted taxpayers and sent new rate cards and updated information on these state tax changes," Bullock said.

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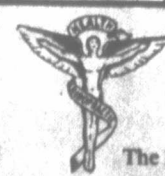
Veterans honored

New tax law affects business property

Editor's Note: This is the first of a three-part series on certain provisions of the 1986 Tax Reform Act.)

COLLEGE Station—The Tax Reform Act of 1986 or the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 has far-reaching implications for businesses, including agriculture. A major change concerns depreciable business property.

Effective Jan. 1, 1986, the new tax law repeals the 6 to 10 percent investment credit rate on many depreciable assets used in business, points out Dr. Ashley Lovell, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Unused investment tax credit from previous years can be carried over and applied 100 percent in 1986 against income tax liability. Any remaining investment tax credit carryovers are reduced by 17.5 percent after 1986 and by 35 percent after 1987.

Lovell recommends that a

business have its accountant do the calculations to determine whether it is advantageous to increase income in 1986 to take advantage of 100 percent of the investment tax credit carryover available. Or it could be best on an after-tax basis to use the reduced amount of investment tax carryover in 1987 or 1988, when individual and corporate tax rates will be lower.

Another change in the tax law is that it eliminates the Accelerated Cost Recovery System (ACRS) at the prior rate (150 percent) and replaces it with a new ACRS (200 percent of the declining balance rate). Although the new ACRS provides for a faster acceleration rate, the lives of many depreciable assets are increased, Lovell points out. For instance, the depreciable life of automobiles and light trucks is increased from three to five years and the depreciable period for most other farm property, except for breeding and dairy cattle and computers,

increases from five to seven years.

What is the cost of lengthening the depreciable life of assets for tax purposes? A present value analysis (with an 8 percent discount rate) would indicate that an increase in the three-year class assets to a five-year life would cost nearly 5 percent, whereas increasing the life of five-year assets to seven years has a cost of slightly more than 3 percent.

Taxpayers may elect to use the new depreciation system for property placed in service after July 31, 1986, says Lovell. Assets that would remain three-year assets under the new ACRS may generate a greater depreciation deduction in 1986 if the new three-year ACRS is elected. This election to use the new depreciation system can be made on an asset-by-asset basis.

Under the new tax law residential rental property is to be depreciated over 27½ years,

while non-residential real business property will be depreciated over 31½ years.

The 1986 tax reform also features a "last minute shopping provision." If acquisitions in the last quarter of the year exceed 40 percent of the purchases of depreciable assets, then the mid-quarter convention would apply to all personal property placed in service during the year. This means that rather than treating depreciable personal property as if it were placed in service at the middle of the year, all depreciation calculations relate to middle of the quarter in which each asset is placed in service, Lovell explains. Thus, there is a smaller total depreciation deduction in the year purchased.

Expensing the cost of depreciable business property also has changed. The new law increases the maximum amount that may be expensed each year up to \$10,000 if the taxpayer has less than \$200,000 of such property placed in service during the taxable year.

Lovell encourages businessmen to visit with their tax adviser as soon as possible to discuss points which might have a bearing upon both their personal and business situation.

Fertility program vital to cotton production

COLLEGE STATION—A well-managed fertility program is one of several essentials for profitable cotton production.

While the nutrient requirement for cotton is much less than some other crops, adequate amounts of nutrients at the right time or growth stage are essential in developing healthy, productive plants, says a cotton specialist.

"Since fertilizer prices are attractive right now, get all your phosphate, potash and a portion of your nitrogen down early this winter," said Dr. Bob Metzger with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "Fertilizer dealers will welcome your business as it spreads their workload and helps overcome delays due to unfavorable weather and wet fields."

A well-managed fertilizer program must take into account yield goal and soil type, Metzger points out. The producer must identify yield limiting factors such as compaction zones, salinity spots and poor drainage. With this information plus soil test results, the producer can determine more accurately the fertilizer rate that will provide the most profitable yield. Why fertilize for 2½ bales of cotton when the upper yield potential for a specific field may be only 1½ bales per acre?

"Efficient use of plant nutrients also can be achieved by application timing," says the specialist. "For nitrogen, effi-

ency tends to improve as the period between application and uptake by the crop is shortened. Preventing nitrogen loss becomes even more important in lighter textured soils subject to leaching or in poorly drained fields where denitrification can occur."

In many situations, it may not be practical to delay all nitrogen application just ahead of maximum plant uptake, notes Metzger. The cotton plant's high demand for nutrients occurs during the square to boll-formation period. While nutrients are equally as important during the early stages of plant growth due to the relatively small plant size, total use is less than during later growth and development periods.

"While low levels of nitrogen will limit total production and quality of most field crops, cotton also can be hampered by excess nitrogen," Metzger points out. The negative effect of excess nitrogen can be minimized

somewhat if the plant has a good fruit load. Otherwise, excess nitrogen will lead to rank growth and, delayed maturity, which will make plants more attractive to insects, and will cause greater difficulty with defoliation and regrowth during harvest preparation."

To assure their 1987 cotton crop has adequate nutrients, producers should begin with a soil test, emphasizes the specialist. A soil test enables a producer to make realistic decisions regarding the nutrient status of a particular field or farm.

The Extension Soil Testing Laboratories at College Station and Lubbock have "state of the art" equipment to provide precise analyses of soil nutrients in rapid turn-around time. Metzger reminds cotton producers that to obtain maximum returns for each fertilizer dollar, they must perform all other cultural practices in a timely manner during the season.

Crêpes

Gourmet desserts don't have to be horribly fattening, you know. This recipe makes 18 to 24 crêpes but uses only 2 eggs. Result: Only a fraction of an egg per serving and no need to worry about the fat content, if each person eats only 2.

- 2 eggs (or 4 egg whites or egg substitute equivalent to 2 eggs)
- 1 cup skim milk
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tablespoon oil

Beat the eggs, and blend with all other ingredients until batter is smooth and just thick enough to coat a spoon. If batter is too thick, add a little more milk. Cover and let stand at least ½ hour.

Heat a 5- or 6-inch frying pan or crêpe pan. Oil lightly. Pour in just enough batter to form a very thin layer, tilting pan so batter spreads evenly. Cook on one side, turn and brown on the other side.

Repeat until all batter is used. As crêpes are finished, stack them with a layer of wax paper or foil between each. Keep warm if you are serving them immediately, or set them aside and reheat later.

Crêpes are an excellent low-fat dessert when filled with whipped low-fat cottage cheese (flavored with vanilla or grated lemon rind, sugar to taste if desired) and topped with fresh strawberries. Other fruits such as fresh raspberries or blueberries may be used. Crêpes may also be rolled up with fruit inside—for example applesauce and topped with cinnamon flavored whipped cottage cheese.

Yield: 18-24 Crêpes

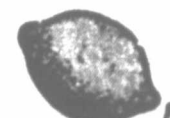

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Pyramids cheat unwary investors

If you are looking for either a full or part-time job, but want the independence of being your own boss, you may be searching the classifieds in the area called "business opportunities."

While there are many worthwhile businesses recruiting salespeople and investors, there are also a number of scams operating here in Texas. One of the most complicated and deceptive is called the pyramid scheme.

In order to avoid pyramid schemes, you need to know a few facts. The pyramid scheme derives its name from the structure of the organization: there are lots of people on the bottom, paying to a smaller group above them, who, in turn, pay a percentage of their earnings to an even smaller group above them in the pyramid.

For example: You are recruited as a "sales trainee", for which you pay \$1,000. Five hundred dollars of your money goes to the promoter, who is at the top of the pyramid. The other five hundred dollars goes to a "sales manager," directly above you in the pyramid. If you later recruit another "sales trainee"—which you will have to do in order to get your money back—you will get half of what he pays and the other half will go to the promoter.

The essence of the scheme is to continue to recruit more and more suckers. The people on the bottom always lose. Why? Because in any given geographic area there are only a certain number of suckers with \$1,000.

The pyramid scheme is illegal under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act. Specifically, the law forbids the following: "selling or offering to sell, either directly or associated with the sale of goods

or services, a right of participation in a multi-level distributorship. As used herein, multi-level distributorship means a sales plan for the distribution of goods or services in which promises of rebate or payment are made to individuals, conditioned upon those individuals recommended or securing additional individuals to assume positions in the sales operation, and where the rebate or payment is not exclusively conditioned on, or in relation to, proceeds from the retail sales of goods."

In other words, it is O.K. to recruit other salespersons; it is not legal to recruit them for a rebate. You, as a salesperson must derive your income from sales of goods or services, not from recruitment.

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
