Three Contracts Awarded On Weinert Waterworks Job

Contracts totaling \$67,497 covering three phases of construction work in the new waterworks system for Weinert have been awarded by the board of directors of the Haskell County Water Supply District.

One remaining contract, for an elevated storage tank, will be awarded at an early date, the directors stated.

Major contract for water supply lines and distribution system, went to S. E. Lanier of Haskell on a bid of \$61,253.

Dickerson Well Service of Munday was successful bidder for the contract on developing two water wells for \$3,672, and contract for two well pumping units went to McKee Engineering & Equipment Company of Lubbock on a bid of \$2,572.02.

Construction work on the largest phase of the project, water lines and distribution system, is expected to get under way at an early date, according to Raymond Liles, president of the district board.

Contractor Lanier has advised the board that if no delay in arrival of materials and equipment occurs, he expects to have water lines from the wells completed to the city limits of Weinert by March 1.

Water source will be from wells to be located on a three acre tract purchased by the water district on the Truman Winchester place approximately four miles west of Weinert.

Lueders, Roscoe Men Charged in Burglaries Here

Julien Lambert, Jr., 32, Lueders and James Conway, 26, of Roscoe have been charged with four recent burglaries in Haskell County, according to Sheriff Bill Pennington.

The two men have already been tried and convicted of burglary in Baylor County. They received three year sentences and are now in the Sweetwater Jail, Pennington said.

Charges will also be filed against them in Nolan, Fisher, Shackelford and Scurry Counties, officers stated.

Sheriff Pennington, accompanied by Albert Hise, Haskell, one of the burglary victims, took the men to Fort Worth, January 12 in an effort to recover some of the stolen articles which had been pawned there. Several items have been returned to Haskell by the Sheriff's Department in Sweetwater.

Among the articles recovered are: Watch, stolen from Tom Smith, Sagerton; electric clock belonging to Howard Overby, Sagerton; quilt and comforter owned by Roy Clark, Stamford; an electric extension cord taken from Albert Hise, Haskell.

Clothing had also been taken in the thefts, but it was not possible to regain possession of the articles, stated Pennington.

Local Concern Plans Water Testing in Haskell Area

To assist farmers in the Haskell area develop water for irrigation, a selsomograph drilling unit has been brought here by A. F. Fought and George Burkett, they announced this week.

The equipment is used altogether for drilling tests for water, they explained, to determine whether water exists in sufficient quantity for irrigation.

They report a heavy demand for water tests, principally in the area north and west of Haskell and in adjoining Knox County. Water in varying amounts is found at depths ranging from 25 feet to 60 feet, and some exceptionally strong wells have been developed in the area, according to Burkett. The concern will have headquarters in Haskell.

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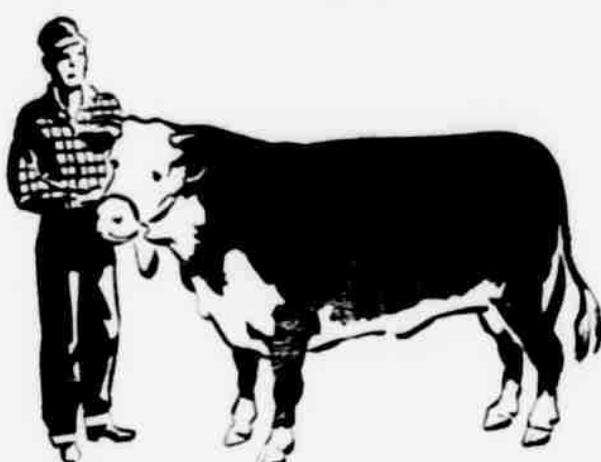

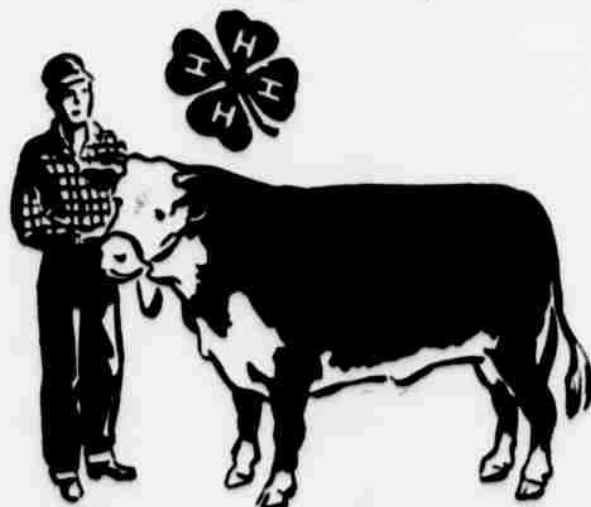

Those who were 60 years of age BEFORE JAN. 1, 1955 are entitled to vote without an exemption certificate.

"Forward with Christ" is Emphasized at District Meeting of Presbyterian Women

An all day clinic on Fundamentals of Organization, and Principles of Program Building, was held in the First Presbyterian Church Jan. 11. Attending were Presbyterian women of District III of the Mid-Texas Presbytery.

Conducting the all-day session was Mrs. C. R. Caldwell of Shreveport, La. Theme of the meeting was "Forward with Christ," with emphasis on Christian Family Living.

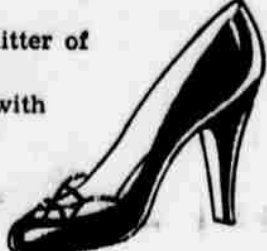

This was graphically indicated in a spot survey this week of the amounts paid out in salaries by some of the major oil industry concerns here in 1955.

Service Pipe Line had a monthly payroll of around \$15,100 or \$182,000 for the year. This amount was paid to some 36 families in Haskell. This company has been in Haskell since October, 1951.

Schlumberger, with 13 people employed, paid out \$64,000 in salaries last year. They've been here for four years. How long do they intend to stay? "As long as the oil is."

Carl Anderson Construction Co. paid its employees a total of \$84,115 this year. It is estimated that all but approximately one-tenth is spent in Haskell County.

These are only three examples. In addition, there are numerous other firms: oil field service, oil field hauling, oil field supplies, chemical service, drilling mud, logging, perforating, and producers.

These companies and their influence have helped make Haskell the properous community that it is.

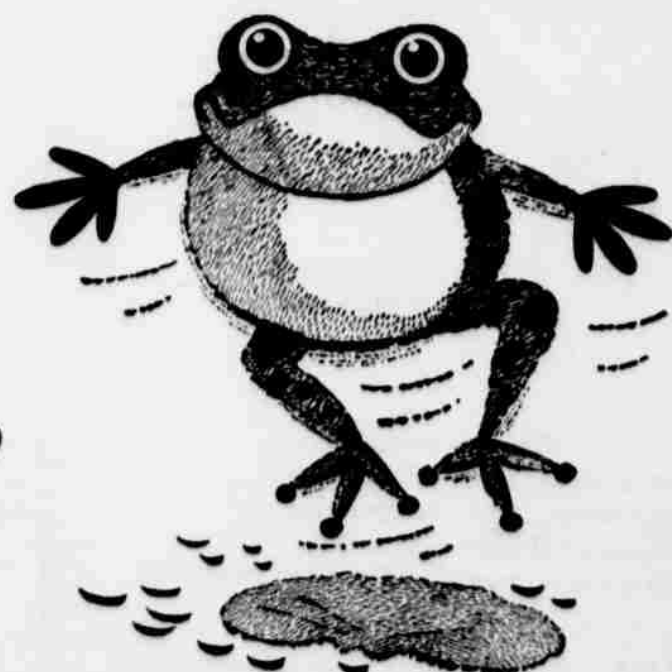

Local Educators Attend Conference

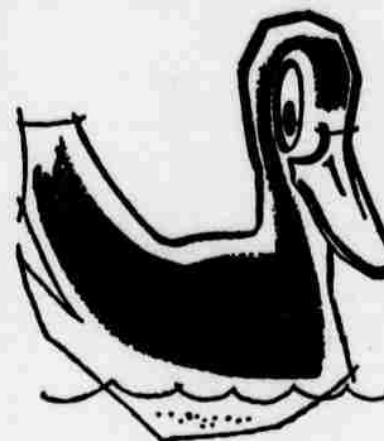
Seven Haskell County School Superintendents and the County Superintendent, accompanied by some of the members of their boards, attended the School Administrators' Conference held in Austin last week.

Few Cars Checked as Safety Inspection Deadline Nears

Apparently frustrated motorists are going to be a commonplace sight again this year as the deadline date for safety checks draws imminent.

With approximately 6,000 vehicles in the county which must be inspected, only a small minority have been checked, according to a survey made last week.

Captain G. L. Morahan, Commanding Officer of the Abilene District of the Texas Highway Patrol warns that only three months remain during which new approval inspection stickers must be secured.

Captain Morahan cautioned that Patrolmen and local officers will begin issuing tickets on April 16 to operators of all vehicles not bearing a current sticker. A maximum penalty of \$200 can be assessed.

Mattson Lunchroom To Use Extra Milk Program

At a recent meeting of the Mattson School Board, trustees voted to use the extra milk program in the Mattson school lunchroom. It was decided to continue serving one extra half pint of milk to First and Second Grade pupils at no extra cost, and to charge two cents to all other students. Adults will pay six cents for each extra half pint served in addition to the one with the meal.

In other action, the board voted to buy a large dictionary for the library typewriter covers, and first aid supplies. Sam B. Guynes will teach a first aid school this spring. Supt. Elvin T. Mathis is to see that the census is taken and a meeting arranged for Jan. 25 to decide on more written policies.

Supt. Mathis gave the board a report on the recent trip to the conference on education in Austin, urged means of getting ready for the accreditation visit, and discussed the school in general.

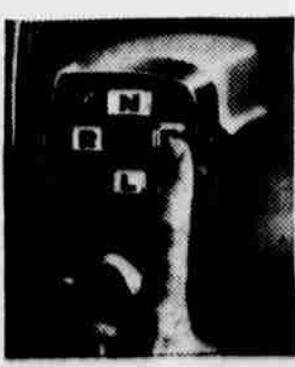

Farm Bureau Backs Tax Exemption on Farm Gasoline

Farmers in Haskell County will receive refunds on the federal tax they pay on farm-used gasoline if the Farm Bureau is successful in its efforts to secure gas tax-exemption legislation during the session of Congress.

S. M. Royall of Haskell, president of the Haskell County Farm Bureau, is making every effort to secure an exemption for farmers on the 2-cent-a-gallon federal tax which the government now collects on farm-used gasoline.

President Royall said he wanted to urge all farmers in the county to contact their U. S. Congressman, George Mahon by letter to give him their opinions on the matter.

If the tax exemption measure is passed, it will mean a savings of about \$6,000 for Haskell County farmers. Texas farmers stand to have about \$6,000,000 if the legislation passes.

The Texas Farm Bureau secured an exemption several years ago on the state tax of 4 cents a gallon on farm-used gasoline. President Royall said it has defeated many attempts to take away this state tax exemption, he added.
