RELEASES HILL'S WINE SUPPLY

(By Associated Press)

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 14.—Following acquittal of Congressman Hill yesterday by a jury on the charge of making intoxicating wine and cider in his home here, an injunction against Hill's home will be lifted in a few days, it was said today by United States District Attorney Woodcock.

The lifting of the injunction which had closed Hill's cellar under federal seal will give Hill the right to use the wine and cider stored in his cellar.

SAYS LABOR WON IN ELECTION

(By Associated Press)

EL PASO, Nov. 14.—The labor interests fared almost phenomenally well in the general election just held in the United States, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, said here today in a public statement commenting upon the results of the November balloting.

In face of the tremendous Coolidge landslide there were elected to the House of Representatives more members having the endorsement of labor unions than are to be found in the present congress, Mr. Gompers said.

SCHOOL BOARD TO MEET MONDAY

A meeting of the school board which was scheduled for Thursday and at which time it was expected to order a bond issue election for the purpose of floating \$100,000 in bonds to build a new high school building, was postponed until next Monday. It was announced Friday that the meeting would not be held until Monday. The petition for the bond issue has long since secured the required number of names. It was also stated that the election would be ordered within the shortest time the law would permit.

DIES IN CHAIR FOR MURDER

MICHIGAN CITY, Nov. 14.—Harry Diamond, of Gary, Indiana, met death unflinchingly in the electric chair at the Indiana state prison here today. He was convicted of murdering his wife in February 1923.

FIGURES ON COTTON USED

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Cotton consumed during October aggregated 532,629 bales of lint and 55,095 bales of linters, as compared with 543,260 bales of lint and 57,401 bales of linters in October of last year. These figures were made public today by the Census Bureau. It will be observed that there are only a few thousand bales difference in the consumption of cotton for the October reports of 1923 and 1924.

MAN KILLS 4; ENDS OWN LIFE

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 14.—Reese Weber, brother of Henry Weber, a barber, who shot and killed four persons here last night and then slew himself, was placed in jail today on a technical charge.

Reese Weber is said to have made threats against a man who he held responsible for the beginning of the trouble that ended in five deaths last night.

The dead are: Mrs. Bessie Weber, wife of Henry Weber; Earl Shadler, Mrs. Earl Shadler, Mrs. Thomas Alexander and Henry Weber, who killed the other parties and then took his own life.

Henry Weber and his wife separated last Sunday and the police assign as the cause for the killings domestic difficulties.

WOMEN FAVOR LEAGUE NATIONS

AMARILLO, Nov. 14.—A number of resolutions were adopted by the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs in convention here today. The enforcement of all laws, and especially the laws having to do with the enforcement of homicide were endorsed. Another resolution adopted favored the entrance of the United States into the League of Nations.

FOUR NEWTON BROTHERS ARE READY FOR PEN

Four of the Newton brothers, Texas bandits who figured in a number of robberies in this state, are ready for the pen after entering pleas of guilty in Chicago for complicity in the \$2,000,000 mail robbery of a Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul train at Roundout, Illinois, last June. Joseph and Jess Newton, who at first entered pleas of not guilty, this week withdrew such pleas and entered pleas of guilty. Willie and Willis Newton plead guilty to the robbery several days ago. Tull Newton, fifth of the Newton brothers, and who was held in the case, was set free, the grand jury failing to indict him.

The Newton brothers are products of Texas, although most of their work has been out of the state. Willis had a hand in the robbery of the Winters State Bank a few years ago, and made his get-away by breaking out of the Runnels county jail here. Joe, Jess, Willie and Willis will now do service in the penitentiary and no doubt when the Illinois authorities get through with them Texas and Oklahoma officers will be ready to step in and take charge of the boys.

BUGG ACCEPTS AUSTIN PLACE

Prof. J. J. Bugg will retire from the county superintendent's office of Runnels county on Dec. 31st, and on January 1st will report for duty at the state superintendent's office in Austin.

Prof. Bugg has accepted the appointment of rural school supervisor in the state department of education. State Superintendent S. M. N. Marrs tendered Mr. Bugg the position of rural school supervisor several days ago, and it became known here Thursday that the county superintendent had accepted the place, and would report for duty on January 1st.

The state superintendent has used good judgment in selecting Prof. Bugg to serve the state in the rural school division of the state department of education. The Runnels county superintendent has the reputation of being one of the most progressive and untiring county superintendents in the state. He has made a reputation in rural school work which has brought echoes from many other states.

Mr. Bugg is serving his third term as county superintendent. He was elected to that position in this county three times, and at the end of the present year he will have served six years and one month, and during his term the rural schools have made wonderful progress under his leadership. Twenty-seven modern school buildings have been constructed under his administration, and a number of consolidations and rural high schools have been organized. At present there are five independent districts in the rural division of the schools of the county, and a forty-five rural schools with a total enrollment of about 4,000 pupils. The Wingate school was the last to form an independent district. There are 106 teachers employed in the rural schools of the county. This is an increase of about six over last year, the increase being made possible by the gradual improvement of the educational interests of the county, and the bringing up of the rural schools to a higher standard.

Beginning in November 1918, Mr. Bugg will retire on the close of the present year from the county superintendent's office with a record that he has just cause to feel proud of. He has not been opposed in campaign for reelection since he was elected six years ago. Mrs. Bugg and the little Buggs will accompany Mr. Bugg to Austin to make their home during his employment with the state, and their friends trust that Ballinger will continue to be their permanent home.

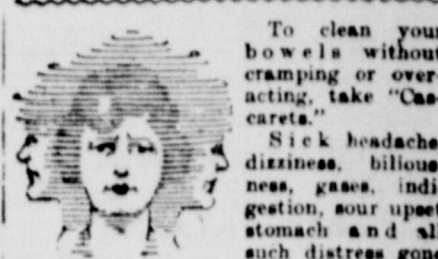

New Principle in Motors is Being Tested on West Coast

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 14.—A new principle in gasoline motors is being tested here on a power boat. The tests are being watched by engineers and others to discover if a new era in the history of gas engines is to be marked. The engine under experiment is the invention of three Spokane, Wash., men. It operates on a by-pass valve-in-piston plan that does away with the need of any valve gear and is designed to produce a cool-running motor of great flexibility.

The motor is intended for automobile, but marine tests are being made also. The specimen under investigation was built on specifications laid down by a group of consulting engineers, after scientific tests had been made at the University of Michigan last year.

Mirrors Strange to Natives of Island Group in South Seas

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 14.—Dr. William B. Herms, professor of parasitology at the University of California, returned recently from the South Seas with the description of natives on the Fanning group of islands who were shown their first mirrors when his party arrived. When photographs of them were taken, he explained, they often failed to recognize themselves. Their own countenances apparently were strange to them.

He found these natives fond of adornment and very primitive in their habits. They were friendly. Dr. Herms said there was evidence that the islands had been occupied in ancient times by Polynesians. There were indications, too, that strains of the Malay and the American Indian apparently had been contributed to the native race. He saw no point of contact with the African negroes, however.

Wheat in Dairy Rations

Is Highly Recommended

Recent low farm prices of wheat and the relatively higher price of bran and other grains and by-product feeds have produced an interest in the feeding value of wheat for live stock. As wheat is usually too valuable to feed to dairy cattle unless unfit for milling purposes, few dairymen have had experience in feeding it.

Ground wheat, while not as palatable as other cereal grains, due to the fact that it forms a sticky mass in the mouth, still is an excellent feed. The grain can be crushed instead of ground and, when fed in a grain mixture with bulky feeds, this objection is largely overcome.

Wheat contains practically the same amount of digestible carbohydrates, but considerably less fat than corn. Wheat is slightly richer in digestible protein, but is slightly lower in total digestible nutrients.

As compared to wheat bran, whole wheat contains less protein, but almost 25 per cent more total digestible nutrients. White bran is light and bulky, while wheat has the opposite characteristic. Therefore, bran does not replace wheat as well as does corn.

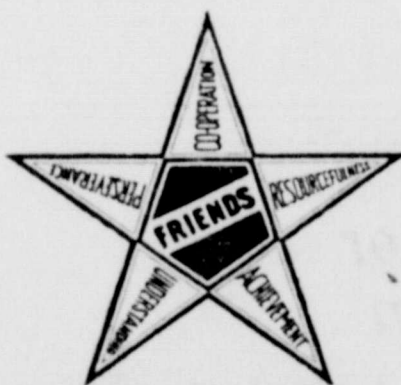
