GRID FAMOUS BRECKENRIDGE IS HOME OF NOTED CHOIR OF BOYS

(Editor's Note: This article concerning the Boys Choir of Breckenridge was sent to The Press by the publicity chairman for the group and is being reprinted in full because of its unusual interest.)

The city of Breckenridge has long been noted for its outstanding football teams, but there is another organization of boys for which it is also becoming justly distinguished. This is the Breckenridge Boys Choir, an extremely enthusiastic, well-coached group of boys, whose ages range from seven through approximately fourteen years, or until the inevitable voice-change occurs.

Breckenridge Buckaroos are not

"made" in high school. They are trained from the early grades, so that by the time they have reached high school age, they have had as many as five years experience playing on organized teams. Many of the boys who comprise the boys choir groups are members of these teams. The school officials feel that boys should have the opportunity to develop every phase of their natures, and, along these lines, they have made provisions for them to attend choir rehearsals regularly. All athletic practices are eliminated in the ward schools on Monday afternoons so that there will be no conflict with choir rehearsal. In Junior High the choir boys are dismissed from football practice at 4:30 in order for them to attend the Principal Choir rehearsal. The other regular practice for the choir is held on Saturday.

Just as good football teams are not developed in a single season, so it is with a good boys choir. Much training and practice must precede admission to the "A" squad. There are three choir groups and an ear-training class, including some ninety boys. The sub-prep choir is composed of boys from seven to eight years of age, and is the youngest group of boys in the organization. There is a unit called the Glee Men, made up of boys who have had at least one year of training. As members of the Principal Choir must "graduate" they are replaced by boys from the Glee Men. The Principal Choir is the goal to which these boys aspire, and it is a great day, indeed, when they are allowed to don the official vestment of the Principal Choir.

The observance will be held at the 11 a. m. service at the church. The theme of the observance this year will be "Partners In The Way." It is built around the idea that more thought should be given to the mission churches, and that they should be given the place of true partners in the task of taking the gospel to those who have not had the opportunity to hear it, Mrs. Armstrong said.

A dramatic presentation, "In All the Years Between," will be given at the Sunday services. The Rev. Sidney Spain, pastor of the church, and Mrs. Ruby Miller, president of the C.W.F. are the directors for the skit. Several members of the church, both men and women, will appear in the play.

An offering for mission work will be taken.

At other seasons of the year the boys participate in Little League and Pony League baseball, basketball, track, swimming, and golf; some of them are band members. The scouting program occupies much of their time as most of the boys are either Cub Scouts or Boy Scouts. They are also active in church and school activities. The citizens of Breckenridge truly believe that "busy boys are better boys," and a complete program to help them become well-rounded individuals has been established. The choir boys are active, well-adjusted boys, and there are few absentees among their membership. They are made to feel that their attendance is essential to their group's success, and there is a definite sense of pride in being a choir boy.

The Principal Choir, consisting of forty-three boys, is much in demand in Breckenridge and surrounding towns where they present programs for various civic groups, clubs, schools, and churches. The choir made appearances in Albany, Stamford,

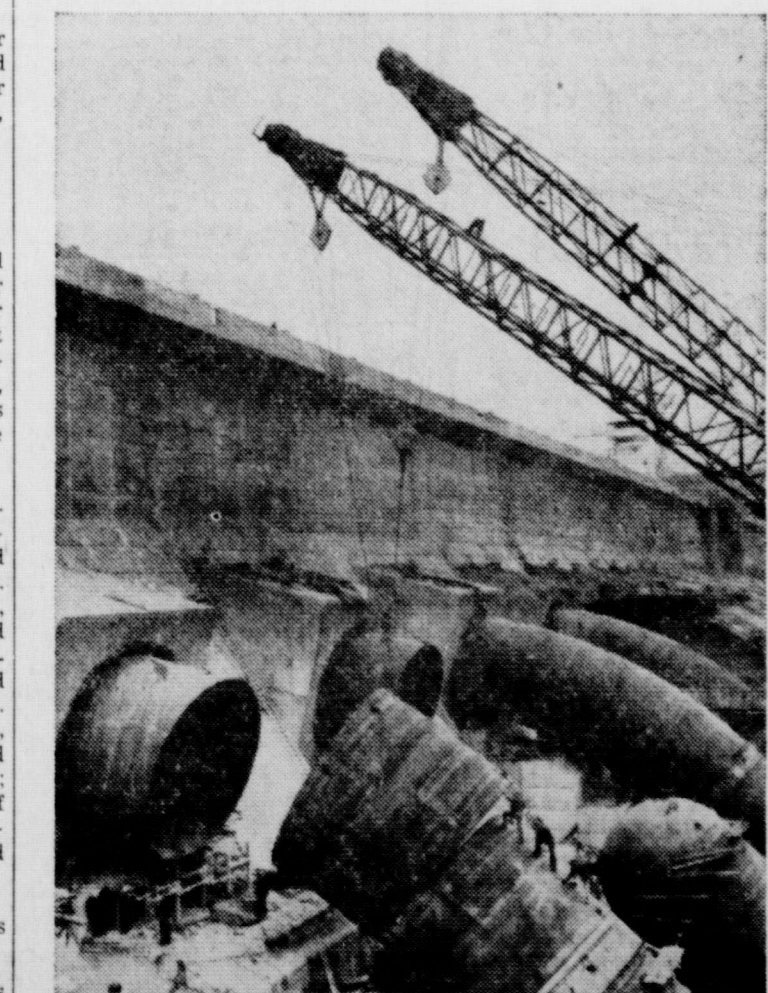

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TAX STRUCTURE OVERHAULED

Every Congress enacts tax laws. But the last Congress did something which is unprecedented in modern times. It passed a law overhauling the entire federal tax structure — the first such overhaul in 75 years.

Writing in the Saturday Evening Post on October 2, Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey describes the purposes of the new law as being these: "To remove many hardships on individuals, to reduce restraints on the kind of enterprise which creates new business and new jobs; to close loopholes; and — so far as possible — to make the tax laws more simple, clear and certain."

Then Mr. Humphrey observes that the benefits of the law are of two kinds — direct and indirect. We will enjoy the direct ones next April when income tax returns are due again. Just about everyone will be helped, from working mothers, who will be allowed deductions for baby-sitter charges, to farmers who want to buy new equipment. In this connection, the Secretary adds that the government is eager to acquaint taxpayers with their rights under the new law, and urges that the nearest Internal Revenue office for help with his return.

The indirect benefits, for the most part, will not be felt so quickly. But in Mr. Humphrey's view, they are by far the most important. 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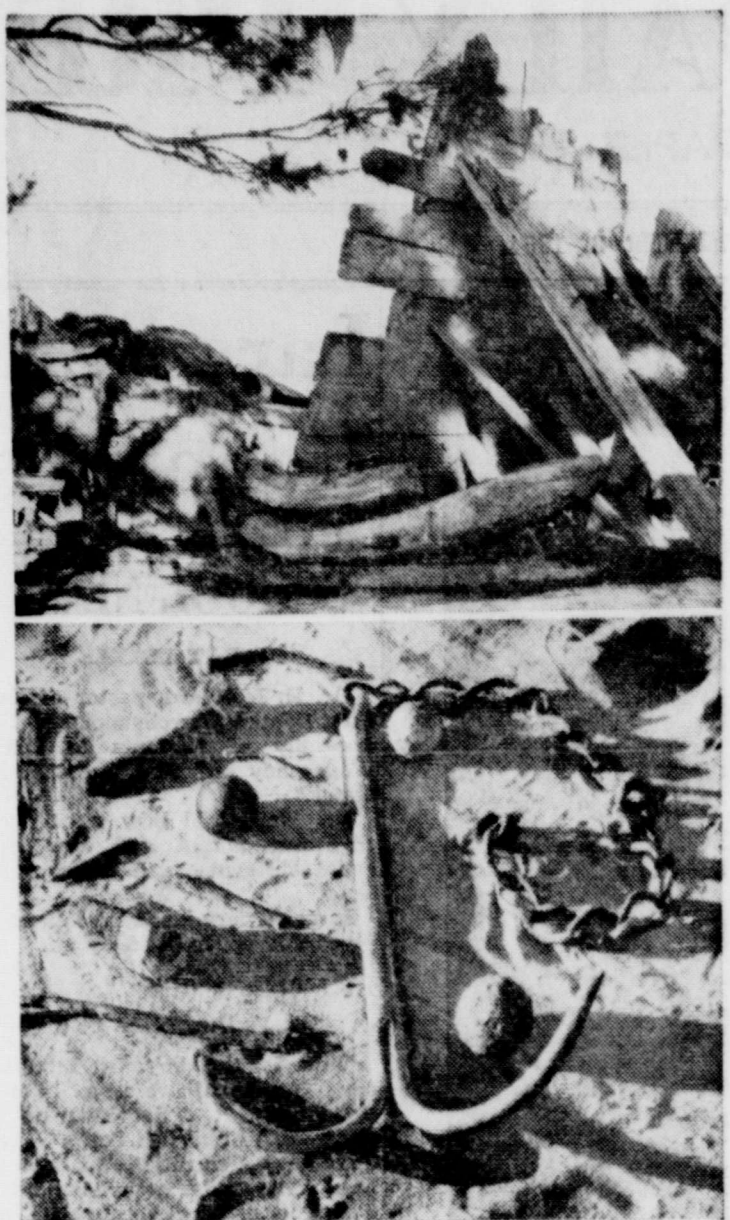
