Absentee Voting Ends On Tuesday

Absentee voting ends Tuesday at 5 p.m. in the County Clerk's Office for candidates in the May 3 Primary.

A total of 73 absentee votes had been cast as of Friday afternoon.

The Democratic Primary ballot includes the names of local candidates for the office of County Attorney, County Commissioner Precincts One and Three, County Tax Assessor-Collector, Sheriff, County Chairman and Precinct Chairman.

State, district and national offices which will appear on the ballot include, United States Representative, District Attorney, District Judge, State Representative, Railroad Commissioner, Supreme Court Associate Justice and President.

Again the vote here is not to elect a president but only to show preference for the candidate for nomination by that party.

This is not a vote to elect the President but a presidential preference referendum to let the Democratic Party know who the favorite candidate for nomination by that party should be.

The Republican Party Primary Ballot will include only one listing for local election. That listing is for County Chairman and is a write-in slot.

Listed on this ballot will be Railroad Commissioner, Supreme Court Associate Justice and President.

Listed for Republican nomination are Ronald Reagan, George Bush

County Oil And Gas Production Increases

Mitchell County oil and gas production continues to increase, although according to a Railroad Commission report released this month, overall production in Texas has decreased.

Commission figures indicate Mitchell County produced 5,984,728

barrels of crude oil in 1979. This is up 191,796 barrels from the 1978 production figure of 5,792,932 barrels.

Mitchell County produced 5,401,970 in 1977. This showed an increase in 1978 of 390,962 barrels.

Mitchell County produced 4,934,117 barrels

in 1976 which indicated an increase of 467,853 barrels in 1977.

In 1979 the total Texas crude oil production was 978,544,145 barrels.

Texas production in 1978 was 1,040,065,995 barrels.

Mitchell County also produced 273,905 Mcf in gas well gas production as compared to the total Texas production of 5,775,570,824 Mcf in 1979.

In 1978 the total Texas gas well gas production was 5,690,601,922 Mcf.

Of the 1,340,247,339 Mcf of casinghead gas produced in 1979, Mitchell County produced 3,496,327 Mcf. In 1978 the total Texas casinghead gas production was 1,386,499,376 Mcf.

In all three instances total production is indicated to be down from the previous year.

Neighboring counties of Scurry and Andrews ranked in the top ten counties in production of crude oil and casinghead gas.

In crude oil production, Scurry ranked fifth by producing 48,187,208 barrels. Andrews ranked eighth by producing 41,563,603 barrels.

In casing head gas production, Scurry ranked second with a production figure of 62,539,209 barrels. Andrews ranked tenth with production figures of 29,777,776.

Nolan County production figures for 1979 indicate 2,289,566 barrels of crude oil produced; 422,900 Mcf of gas well production; 2,753 barrels of condensate output and 3,731,376 Mcf of casinghead production.

Dog Catcher Is Back On Duty

Colorado City, once again, has an official animal warden.

Paul Davila, who was formerly employed by the City under a CETA grant which expired last December, will return to that position.

When grant money for the dog catcher position expired last year, the city was not able to make provisions in the remaining budget to retain Davila.

Davila began work again Monday under the City's 1980 budget and his duties have been expanded to include maintenance on city buildings, as well as duties of Animal Warden.

"I am glad we were able to budget a full year for Animal Warden

in this year. This is a much needed position," City Manager Ray Mason said.

"We (the city and police department) have tried to relieve the temporary inconvenience of not having an animal warden by utilizing street department personnel to pick up dead animals and the police department to collar strays, but this was just not adequate to meet the needs," Mason said.

"Maybe now we will be able to stay abreast of the problem," he noted.

Mason said the city currently has a dog truck but it is in the shop due to transmission problems which he hopes will soon be solved.

He explained that he has a one year vacation and in that time plans to tour, on bicycle, across four continents, including America and Canada, South America, Africa and Europe.

Kem is a civil engineer and is studying the roads, dams and bridges of the world. Kem crossed the ocean by plane, sending his bicycle on ahead so that it was waiting at the Los Angeles Airport when he arrived.

Using the hilly back roads, he crossed California against what he called "hard winds."

Back several years ago there was a boy in Decatur, Illinois, who was very much interested in photography. He ran across an ad in a magazine that offered a book that told all about photography for only a quarter. He sent his quarter to the address that was listed and waited for his book on photography to return.

The folks at the other end of the line made a mistake, however. Instead of sending him a book on photography as he had ordered, they sent him another one on ventriloquism. Well, most of us would have fussed and fumed and written back and let the business house have a good tongue lashing without ever looking at the book.

But the youngster didn't do it like we would. He opened the book and found the story of ventriloquism very fascinating. He began to practice "throwing his voice." Well, he kept practicing and before long he became pretty good at it. Fact of the matter is that he became very good at it.

He made himself a dummy to use the "thrown voice" with and then set out on his trail to entertain people. Before long millions of people were listening to those two on Sunday nights and later were viewing them on television. What had begun as a bad break ended up as a way of life for Edgar Bergen, and his "dummy," Charlie McCarthy.

All of us could profit from this story. Most of us don't find life to be exactly like we ordered it. Sometimes the breaks seem to go against us. Sometimes we order books on photography and are sent books on ventriloquism. But the test in life comes with what we do with what we have to do with.

In the Bible there was a fellow named Paul who wanted very much to go to a place called Bithynia, but was prevented and went rather to a place called Troas. He didn't get what he wanted, but he used what he did get to his and others' advantage. And using it he was able to change the course of the world.

Most of us have to live like that. We have to do with what we have to do with. Sometimes it is a second choice, or third, or even farther down the line. Very rare, indeed, is the person who gets exactly what he wants in life.

There was a song a few years ago that was popular that went something like this: "Do what you do do well, boy. Do what you do do well." And there is a great philosophy of life in that little tongue-twister. We can't all do what we want to do, but we can all do what we do do well.

Now this brings us around to a Cross. The Bible tells us plainly that He didn't want that Cross. But He took it, mastered it, used it, and is conquering the world with it. He didn't get what He wanted, but He used what He got.

When life hands you a lemon, the thing to do is to make lemonade.

Economic Emergency Farm Loan Program Extended

The Emergency Farm Loan Program has been extended by President Jimmy Carter. Farmers' Home Administration County Supervisor David Marion said. On March 31, 1980 President Carter signed

legislation extending the FmHA Economic Emergency Loan Program until September 30, 1981. The program

was due to expire on May 15 of this year.

W.H. Pieratt, FmHA State Director said, "President Carter's action will enable us to continue the EE Program. Not only through the remainder of this year but through the next fiscal year as well. Although the EE Program was not due to end until May 15, we were just about out of funds when the President signed the bill on March 30."

The EE Program provides direct or guaranteed loans to farmers and ranchers who suffer economic hardship because of area or national economic conditions beyond their control, Marion said.

Texas producers received \$115 million in economic emergency assistance last year.

The new law immediately increases the ceiling on outstanding principal for EE loans nationwide from \$4 billion to \$6 billion.

FmHA has already obligated the \$4 billion authorized under the Agriculture Credit Act of 1978, Marion noted.

The additional \$2 billion will be allocated to the states, about half of it for use this year. The current interest rate is 14 percent.

Marion said the new law requires that the stronger credit elsewhere criteria be enforced before an EE loan can be approved.

Any application for an insured loan of \$300,000 or more must be accompanied by letters from at least two private lenders explaining why they turned down the request for a loan, Marion said.

FmHA expects to issue the strengthened regulations within 30 to 60 days, comprehensive study of the EE Loan Program and to recommend to Congress by March 31, 1981, whether or not the program should be extended beyond the Sept. 30, 1981 expiration date, Marion said.
