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ASKS PUNISHMENT IN HUSBAND'S PLACE FOR DEATH OF MAN

DENVER, COL., Dec. 29.—Mrs. James Monroe today demanded that authorities inflict on her any punishment which her husband might have incurred through the murder of Albert Knook.

Monroe, after he had heard reports concerning the friendship between Knook and Mrs. Monroe, entered Knook's room, killing him and seriously wounding William Wade, who was also in the room at the time.

Youth Learned To Make Bombs From Dictionary

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Declaration that he "learned how to make bombs from the dictionary" and that one of the home-made products killed a child and probably fatally injured another boy and himself last Sunday, was made by Herbert Brann, a Brooklyn youth, the police said today.

Brann, who first claimed he had found the bomb at Bergen Beach while hunting, also confessed, the police say, he has made other bombs and had "set them off" in an outlying district "to fear the noise."

HEAD TEXTILE COUNCIL REFUSES TO COMMENT
FALL RIVER, MASS., Dec. 29.—James Tamm, president of the Fall River textile council, refused to comment today on their action of the six unions of the American Federation of Textile Operatives in voting to accept the 24 per cent wage reduction recently announced by the manufacturers and effective January 1.

CHILDREN IN TRAGEDY AS PARENTS SEARCH FOR WORK
GRAND RAPIDS, MICH., Dec. 29.—While Martha Walocki and his wife, who live several miles east of here, were in search of work and food last night, their own Walter, six, found his father's shotgun.

Pointing it at his sister, Cecilia, 2, the weapon was accidentally discharged and her face was blown off. The parents discovered the tragedy when they returned home early today with a small quantity of food.

ONLY \$2,000 COLLECTED FOR THE STARVING BABES—CULBERTSON ASKS FOR IMMEDIATE RESPONSE

Wichita county, up to this time, has not come anywhere near meeting what was expected of the citizens of this county in the way of aid for the starving children of Europe. Only a little over \$2,000 has thus far been collected by Jack Culbertson, chairman of the committee for this county.

"Never did a charity have a stronger appeal for those who are inclined to good deeds than this one," stated Culbertson Wednesday in commenting on this relief fund. "Since the world was never it has been a duty of mankind to give children a fair chance to grow into strong, healthy members of society. Children that are under-nourished, half clothed and without hope cannot grow into strong and vigorous men and women."

"It should be understood that America is but aiding in this great work. For every dollar that America contributes war-torn Europe will contribute \$2. Every organization in America that has for its object the amelioration of suffering is behind this movement. Herbert Hoover is head of the joint organizations committee and practically every dollar contributed will go to buy soap and black bread for the starving children."

"Those who are most able to give, with some exceptions, are making but small contributions, while many who are rich only in good deeds are sharing their cash reserves without stint. Every father and every mother in Wichita county should give something for the sake of their own offspring. Every one who has read the Literary Digest and the Saturday Evening Post, as well as the local papers, is familiar with the dire needs that now beset the children of Europe."

"It should not be necessary that personal solicitation by committee be made in this worthy cause. I ask that everyone to whom this appeal reaches to at once send me a check for as large an amount as can be given, made payable to Edwin Hobby, treasurer, for this fund. Superintendents of the Wichita county Sunday schools who have taken up a collection for this splendid cause should at once send to me the amount collected, or if they have sent this amount elsewhere they should notify me, in order that proper credit for same can be secured for this county."

"In God's name let's don't fall down on this work. Let's give the children a fair chance. The money needed will not be expended for luxuries, but will be used to merely keep soul and body of helpless children together until another harvest. The sinister victims of a sinful war should not be made to pay the penalties of that horrible conflict. And unless those of us who are of good health and are well nourished share our stores with these needy young people of Europe there will be a harvest of death that will forever

FATHERS SEEK CHILDREN THOUGHT TO BE HERE

J. H. Huffman of Blum, Hill county, Texas, is in Wichita Falls seeking his three children—two girls and a boy, aged respectively eleven, eight and three—who are thought to have come here recently with their mother, Clyde Huffman, from Munday, Texas, where they picked cotton during the autumn. They should have arrived here the middle of December.

The family's household goods were sent here from Munday by rail and are at the freight house of the Wichita Valley railway awaiting a claimant. The Huffmans were divorced in January of 1920 at Cleburne, Texas. The eldest girl, Ollie, wrote to her father until last April, since which time he has received no letters from any of them, though he has written several times to the child.

Neither the police nor the Salvation Army are able to give him any information. The mother is described as being about forty-five years old, five feet tall and weighs usually about 115 pounds. Her hair is dark, mixed with gray. Her eyes are dark and her nose straight.

The children are Ollie, eleven and a half years old; Ruby, eight, and Grady, a boy, three years old. The boy has a small notch in his upper lip, near the center. All have dark hair and eyes.

CITY WILL ENFORCE DAIRY PRODUCTS LAW

The city health department has issued the following: Final notice to dairymen and individuals selling dairy products from one or more cows that begins January 1 the health department will prohibit those parties from selling dairy products in the city who have not complied with the requirements of the ordinance relative to having their cows tested for tuberculosis and securing a permit.

Properly qualified representatives of the health department are ready and available for the testing and their services may be secured promptly by making application.

The apparent laxity with which a few dairymen and many individuals are observing the requirements of the ordinance, which was designed purely for the protection of public health, will make it necessary for the department

to file complaints against those who persist in ignoring the law.

WILL CARRY RECEIPTS CASE TO HIGHER COURT
COLUMBUS, OHIO, Dec. 29.—Plans to carry to the court of appeals a suit asking appointment of a receiver for the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company of Akron, were announced today by Frank S. Monnet, minority stockholder.



CHANGES FOR KATY TRAINS ANNOUNCED FOR JANUARY 1

Announcements from the dispatcher's office of the M. & T. P. Railroad were made Wednesday, stating that slight changes were to be made in the time tables of the system on January 1. MEMBERS CHAMBER URGED TO SUPPORT TRADE EXTENSION

The chamber of commerce today mailed more than 1,500 letters to its members urging them to encourage and support the campaign started by the retail merchants to obtain business from the general trade territory surrounding this city.

The letter follows:

"Realizing that as the retail merchants of Wichita Falls prosper, we all prosper indirectly, and believing that a campaign to increase retail buying on the part of our neighbors in towns in this trade territory will be of benefit to the entire city, the chamber of commerce, through its council and board, has heartily endorsed the proposed retail merchants' advertising campaign.

"While this project is being handled particularly by the retail merchants' group, I feel that every member of the chamber of commerce no matter what his business may be, should be intensely interested in its success.

"By carrying the right kind of goods and offering them at as low, if not lower prices as other large cities of Texas, we can induce people in Northwest Texas to come to Wichita Falls instead of going to some of those other large cities. It will increase our merchants' business and at the same time it will bring a large amount of outside capital into circulation and into our banks and trade channels. It will also enable our merchants to maintain better establishments and do more along all these lines.

"Plans have been perfected, including extensive newspaper advertising, personal letters and printed matter. Trade trips will also be conducted during the coming months. Wichita Falls newspapers will make special efforts to increase their circulation in nearby territories. It has been estimated that our retail stores can increase their volume of business approximately 15 per cent, or about \$3,000,000 annually.

"I simply want to notify you of this important work now which is being undertaken by our retailers, and to advise that in the opinion of our directors all members of the chamber should encourage this important movement in every way possible."

TRAFFIC VIOLATOR FINED SERVES NOTICE OF APPEAL

Business at the local police court was decidedly lax Wednesday morning after the hectic period of Tuesday. 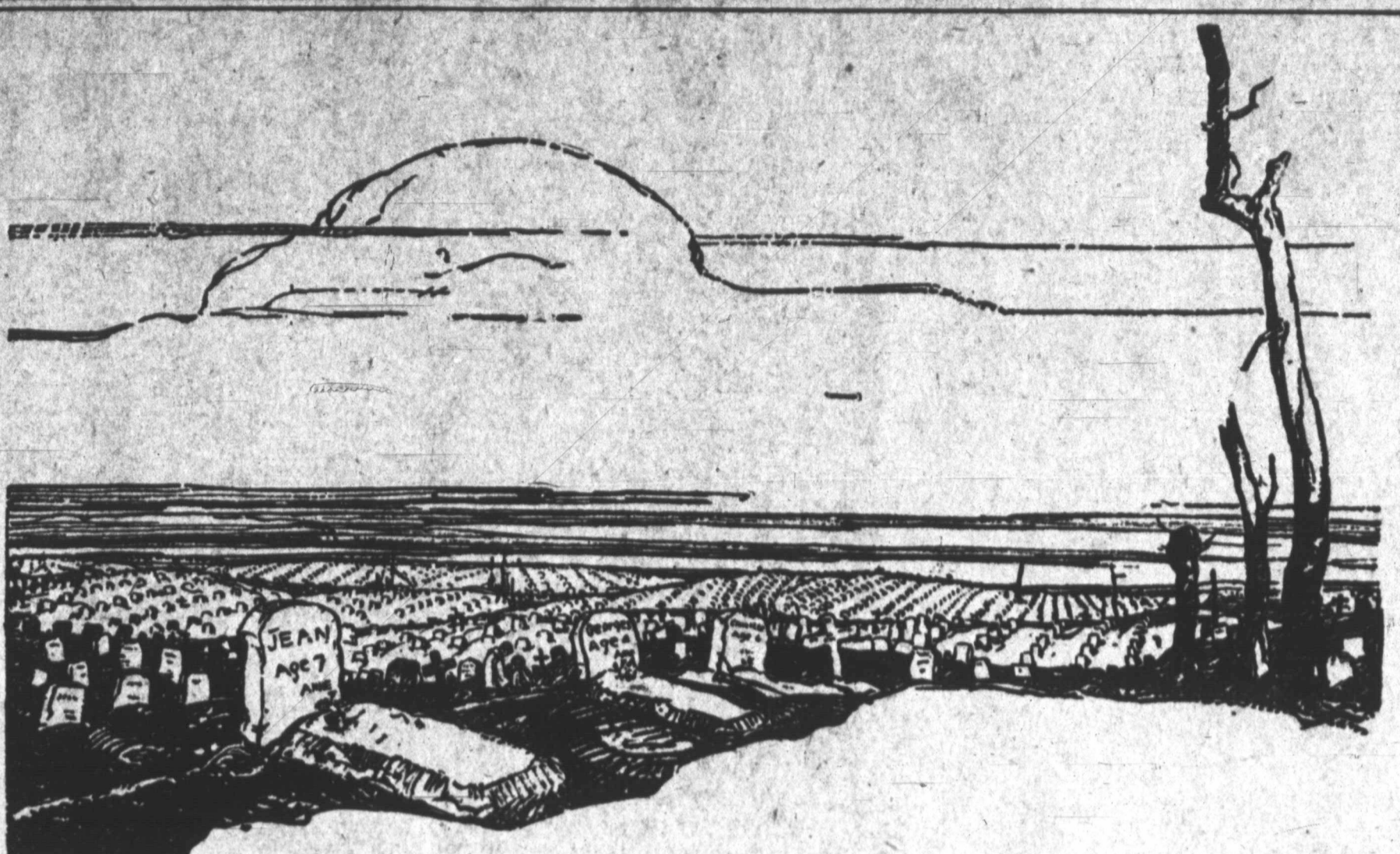
